

## R. Jackson Foundation's New Head

### Belleville Group Installs 1961 Officers at Dinner

The Belleville Foundation, local philanthropic organization supported by Belleville residents, announces the election of Robert M. Jackson as its president. He succeeds William J. Orchard, Orchard was elected honorary president at the Foundation's general meeting June 27 at the For-Hills Restaurant, Newark.

Jackson becomes the organization's third president in its nearly 20 years of existence. Harry Specht of Eastwood-Nealey Co., Belleville, served as the Foundation's first president for 14 years. He was succeeded by Orchard, general manager of Wallace and Tiernan for over 40 years, prior to his retirement. Jackson, too, is associated with Wallace and Tiernan Inc., and has been the company's president since 1959. Jackson recently celebrated his 20th anniversary with Wallace and Tiernan. Graduating from Belleville High School, he started with W&T in the accounting department. His later education was all obtained at night school. He received the degree of BS in business administration from the Seth Boyden School of Business (later Newark University), and later studied at night law school.

He rose through the company via the positions of head of the accounting department, treasurer, and executive vice president of Wallace and Tiernan. In January 1959, when the late E. G. Merckel retired, Jackson became president.

**BELLEVILLE FOUNDATION**  
Highlights of the five years of Orchard's presidency were recalled at the annual meeting. In 1956, the Foundation established a \$25,000 revolving Community Aid Fund to provide direct loans to religious, fraternal, civic and other organizations operating in Belleville. The loans are intended to help finance capital improvement projects in the town. The first loan, of \$5,000, since repaid, was made to the Pew-Smith Memorial Presbyterian Church, to help complete its Christian Education Building.

The sum of \$25,000 was donated to the Foundation to help in the building of a nurses' home for the Clara Maass Memorial Hospital, and an additional \$10,000 was given for the Hospital's School of Nursing. The nurses' home, now being erected, will be located at Sanford Avenue, Belleville. The Foundation's Dental Clinic, which it had sponsored for 12 years, was given to the town by Deed of Gift of equipment last December.

May 1959 saw the inception of another award for an experimental period of four years. This was the annual "Scholar of the Year" award carrying a cash grant of \$500 for the outstanding student among those currently participating in the Foundation's Scholarship Loan Fund. The first two winners were John D. Donohue, of 75 Berkeley Avenue, Belleville, and Frank J. Miele, of Copper Place, Belleville.

An activity which benefited by a grant of \$3,000 in 1961 is Camp Ro-Li, near Butler. The camp for

## Multiple Sclerosis Drive Underway in Belleville; T. E. McMahon Chairman

Residents of Belleville have an opportunity to aid victims of multiple sclerosis now as the Multiple Sclerosis Service Organization of New Jersey holds its annual fund drive now through July 31.

Several hundred local volunteers will canvass the town under direction of Thomas E. McMahon, one of the founders of the Multiple Sclerosis Service Organization of N. J.

McMahon is past president of the Service Organization and for many years served as manager of the Belleville Elks Lodge. He is still serving as a member of the executive board. A disabled veteran of World War II, McMahon is a victim of multiple sclerosis. He is a trustee and past exalted ruler of the Belleville Elks Lodge.

McMahon is married and the father of two children. He lives at 89 Montgomery Place.

For the past 11 years MSSO has been active pursuing a commonsense approach to aiding victims of this crippling disease, mostly young people 20 to 40. The disease, cause and cure of which are unknown, attacks the central nervous system.

From a beginning of one wheelchair, the group, formed by MS victims themselves, had grown to a point where more than 200 wheelchairs are out on loan as well as hundreds of other pieces of therapeutic equipment. In addition, an out-patient clinic is operated at East Orange headquarters where specially trained personnel help the patients help themselves. To reach those vic-

timously crippled to travel, a mobile unit goes throughout the state bringing them the care they desperately need.

Horman, the retiring president, was presented with a carved plaque consisting of a mahogany gavel imbedded in a polished wooden base with an inscription. The plaque was designed by Bill Patten.

A non-sectarian, non-political group, the Retired Men's Club of Belleville was organized in April 1956 with a membership of 11. Today the club has 88 members.

Open to everyone, the club meets Wednesday mornings at 9:30 in the recreation hall of the Fawcett Memorial Church, Union Avenue and Little Street. Motion pictures are shown on alternate Wednesdays.

## Hospital Joins Belleville Groups At Disaster Drill

The Belleville Police Department, Belleville Fire Department, members of Boy Scout Troop 375 of Belleville and the Clara Maass Memorial Hospital Staff collaborated successfully last week in a disaster drill—one of the accreditation requirements of the hospital.

School Number 8 on Union Avenue was selected as the site of a simulated bus accident involving 10 Scouts and the Scout Executive for this area, Charles Kelly. Three squad cars of Belleville Police were the first to respond to the accident call and they, in turn, summoned the ambulance squad of the Fire Department. On arrival of the first emergency ambulance, the personnel of both the police and fire departments administered first aid to the injured youths who had previously been tagged to indicate their simulated injury. Those who were unable to walk were placed on stretchers and taken to the hospital in the police cars.

Upon arrival of the accident cases at the emergency department of Clara Maass Memorial, nurses, staff doctors and house doctors were immediately called into action. Regular hospital procedures were followed with minor injuries being treated in the emergency room, stretcher cases were taken to a second emergency room that was pressed into action because of the number of patients involved where they were administered initial treatment and injuries diagnosed and then dispatched to other departments for further treatment.

Only four of the ten youths were found to need hospitalization. The entire drill covered approximately 70 minutes and was considered very successful by Dr. Nicholas Rubino, Coordinator for the Medical Staff and Emil Horak, Assistant Director and head of the hospital's Disaster and Civil Defense program.

Following the drill, the Scouts were treated to a lunch in the hospital cafeteria and then dispatched to their homes. The following Scouts participated in the program:

## Application Hasn't Come From Owner

A rally and demonstration against the proposed Krugman-DePetro apartment along Third River is planned for this Sunday at 3 p.m. on the Fairway Avenue playground. The rally is being sponsored by the Fairway Civic Association headed by Charles Borbone of 233 Fairway Avenue.

Although Belleville Commissioners last week assured the Fairway group that they knew nothing about any apartment proposal, recent events clearly indicate that the Clifton real estate firm of Krugman and DePetro does have definite plans to erect a 320-unit apartment structure on land along the Third River.

David Krugman has made it clear his firm will apply "within a month" for construction of the luxury apartment project. Estimated cost of the proposed four five-story buildings is between three and four million dollars.

Thomas Greco, Belleville building inspector, yesterday said he still has not received any communication at all from the Krugman-DePetro firm. When the application is made it first will be handled by Greco's office. Because of zone violations, Greco can't issue the building permit so Krugman-DePetro will be sent to the Zoning Board of Adjustment for a public hearing.

The seven and a half acre tract is now zoned A-2 which does not permit construction of apartment buildings.

Some Belleville Commissioners already have spoken on the apartment. Although all five commissioners say they would like to see a park developed on the site, Mayor Padula indicated at a January meeting that the Belleville Planning Board ought to take a more active interest in the Krugman-DePetro project.

Padula said he does not want the Board of Commissioners to take a stand on the apartment project for fear any action would influence the planning board in its decision in planning various apartment sites in town. Padula also based his "no action" policy on the fact that no formal proposal for the apartments has actually come before the town and any rejection by the commissioners would be premature.

Commissioner Robert Grahlin, who introduced plans for the apartment at a caucus meeting of the commission last December, said if the project material-

Joseph Pieffer Offers Tips to Vacationers

If you are one of the many thousands planning a motor-trip vacation this year, you should be interested in the expert travel advice offered today by Lincoln Mercury dealer, Joseph Pieffer of AAA Motors in Belleville.

"The most important thing to do before leaving on a vacation auto-trip, says Pieffer, 'is, of course, to make sure that your car is in peak operating condition.' Pieffer suggests that you have your car checked out by a reliable mechanic about two weeks before you are scheduled to leave on your trip. This will allow enough time for any necessary repairs. Don't put off even minor repairs work until after you return, a breakdown on the road will waste valuable time and may be hard on your vacation budget.

The day before you leave, give your car a last minute check-out of your own. Test headlights, directional signals, brake lights. Check tire pressure and the condition of your spare tire. Have the gas tanks filled, the oil checked, and add water to the radiator and battery if necessary.

If you are planning a seashore holiday, be sure that your car is coated with a good, protective wax, giving special attention to chrome plated areas. Salt spray and air are damaging elements and your car's finish can age six months in a single week of exposure.

Pieffer also had a few suggestions on how to handle some of the usual problems that may arise while you are on the road:

—Flat tires and blowouts are the most common highway troubles. You can avoid them by checking your tires frequently during the trip. See that they are properly inflated and look for cuts, bruises and uneven wear.

In case you do get a blowout, keep calm, steer straight ahead but do not jam on the brakes. Let your engine act as the brake and, when you are sure the car is completely under control, pump gently on the brakes and pull off to the side.

—If you are driving in abnormally hot weather and do not exercise a little care there is always a chance that your engine might overheat. You can prevent this by using your low gear only when necessary and by not shutting off your engine during extended periods of stop and go driving. If you have repeated long waits because of traffic conditions, shift to neutral and speed up your motor for about thirty seconds at two minute intervals to make the fan turn faster and cool your engine.

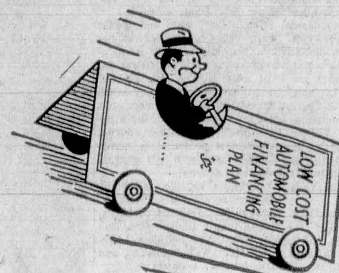

### A Slight Case of Prejudice and Ignorance

Last week one of Mayor Isadore Padula's principal spokesmen circulated a story alleging that a New Brunswick attorney accused The Times of "unethical" conduct because prior to a public hearing we editorially opposed the granting of a permit to construct a gas station on the northwest corner of Union and Belleville Avenues — an area congested with 21 gas stations within a one mile radius.

Assuming the attorney, Anthony N. Arico, made the statements attributed to him by Padula — we can only conclude the man spoke with complete ignorance concerning the ethics and responsibility of the legitimate press — and obviously prejudiced in favor of his client.

This interloper from New Brunswick would gag the press. Why? So that he could earn a big fat fee and his client become enriched at the expense of Belleville's progress.

There is a question of unethical conduct involved — but it involves the attorney — Anthony Arico and not The Times-News. Is it ethical for an attorney to deny freedom of the press to the local, legal, legitimate press while pursuing the selfish interests of a client?

Need one wonder what Attorney Arico would have said had the Times-News endorsed his client's application for a gas station permit?

We don't blame the attorney for wanting to make a fee. We can't blame him for pleading his client's case. But when he inveighs against the legitimate press on the grounds that editorial comment on matters coming before the Town Commission for decision is unethical — then we believe he has parted company with his obligation to represent a client — he involves himself in conduct infringing upon his own profession's code of ethics.

Our advice to the attorney from New Brunswick is to spend a little less time castigating the free press and a little more time reading the lawyer's Code of Ethics.

As we see it — it is not only the right but the responsibility of the local newspaper to alert its readers to the dangers inherent in Commission action on matters of grave concern to our community.

The editorial of May 18th which Attorney Arico found objectionable follows:

### "Not In The Public Interest"

"Tuesday night the Town Commission will be asked to take official action on an application for permission to erect a gas station on one of Belleville's most valuable corners — the northwest corner of Union Avenue and Belleville Avenue.

"Three buildings now occupy the site. These would be demolished and in their place and stand Belleville would obtain a gas station — the 22nd within a one mile radius.

"We do not believe a gas station in this area is necessary. We further believe this proposed use is not in the public interest. Yes — the owner would stand to make a chunk of money with a long term gas station lease — but what effect will another gas station at this intersection have upon the future development of Belleville? Has the Belleville Planning Board been consulted regarding its own projection of zoning for this area? Or are we to assume the Town Commission cares not about the Planning Board's opinion?

"The people of Belleville are excited over the new possibilities open to our town with the adoption of the business-like Council Manager form of government. Even so innocuous an enterprise as a gas station will have its impact upon the future development of Belleville the Beautiful."

"The vote on this resolution Tuesday night will let the people know whether or not the politicians who control the Commission have learned anything from the election of May 2nd.

"Clearly a favorable vote upon the gas station application is not in the public interest."

The objections of the attorney from New Brunswick notwithstanding — we will comment again — again — and again whenever in our judgement the public interest demands it.

P.S. The application was rejected.

### Accommodate One Inconvenience 3000

The four-member Essex County Board of Elections and Town Clerk Eugene Barnett according to law comprise Belleville's Ward Commission — the body charged with the responsibility to consolidate Belleville's four wards into two.

This redrafting of ward lines is to be accomplished in such a manner as to result in an equal division of our voters among the two wards. The total voters in one ward must not be more than 10 percent of the number in the second ward.

Belleville's Ward Commission recently met and we all know what happened. Mayor Isadore Padula's house was placed in the ward which includes the Silver Lake section — a stronghold of Commissioner Nuncio Pico. By some strange line of reasoning — which defies our imagination — the Ward Commission established a ward boundary which runs through some backyards and follows an irregular path around Commissioner Nuncio Pico's backyard thus placing Pico in the North Ward and Padula in the South Ward. The significance of this gerrymandering is found in the fact that Pico was cut away from the neighborhood which contributed a sufficient number of votes in 1958 to permit him to emerge a winner in the Commission election of that year.

While the Ward Commission was accommodating Padula it mercilessly tore up the boundary lines of one election district in such a manner as to require the realignment of possibly four election districts affecting approximately 3000 voters. Apparently the interests of 3000 voters is not quite as important to a Ward Commission out to serve the selfish interests of some local politicians.

At the "inquest" held last week by the Essex County Board of Elections Belleville Democrat Chairman Ralph Vara offered a ward plan which would leave undisturbed the present district boundaries and with a slight change in the proposed two-ward realignment accomplish the purposes of the election law.

The proposal may not suit the political convenience of Mayor Isadore Padula but we are certain it will meet with the approval of our 3000 voters in the present 4th ward who may not know which polling place to visit at next May's Town-Council election.

We understand that the Republican members of the Essex County Board of Elections led by vice-chairman Joseph Intile are demanding a public hearing to be held in Belleville at which time interested citizens may have the opportunity to express themselves on the issue.

The Democrat members of the board led by Ed Reilly are reportedly opposed to the public hearing. That Reilly is a political lieutenant of Democrat County Chairman Dennis Carey who is on Vara's you-know-what-list may be a deciding factor in the establishment of our town's ward boundaries. We hope Reilly considers first his sworn duty to Belleville's citizens.

Commissioner Intile deserves the thanks of our community for insisting a public hearing be held — and in Belleville. Good for him.

### Gruhin Should Substitute Seriousness for Sarcasm

On June 27th I attended the Town Hall meeting. The first two and a half hours concerned itself with a detailed analysis of the facts pertaining to the construction of a new gasoline station.

Every detail was carefully examined including cross examination of experts, analysis of photographs, plot plans and blueprints, yet when the citizens spoke, no similar consideration was given them.

For example:

Mr. Calabro, president of the Citizens Tax Council, objected to the addition of an extra full-time captain to act as a training officer on the basis that he could not gainfully be employed in this capacity for 56 hours a week. He asked Commissioner Sullivan to analyze the facts to make certain that the services of an additional captain was necessary.

He further pointed out that the fire department was allowing itself to be dictated by the fire underwriters and that so far we have spent more money in the addition of 10 firemen, the new captain, the fire drill tower and additional expenditures that have been authorized for building improvements.

Despite all this we still have a class "C" insurance fire rating. He stated that the expenditures amounted to \$140,000 and that if we retained our "C" rating the additional insurance premiums would have amounted to about \$30,000.

It was amazing to observe the disinterested attitude of the commissioners, particularly Commissioner Sullivan who made no remarks whatsoever but had Commissioner Gruhin, who to my knowledge has no connection with the Public Safety Department, make all of his sarcastic remarks such as telling Mr. Calabro that if he attended the meetings frequently he would get weaker and weaker and weaker on the train.

At another point, he stated that The Belleville Times belongs in Bellevue (for the benefit of the people who do not know what Belleville is, it is a hospital in New York famous for its ward for the insane).

Now I ask you, why wasn't Commissioner Gruhin just as anxious to examine the facts as he was in his detailed analysis of the gasoline station application?

Does he and the other Commissioners assume they have no obligation to the taxpayers whose money they are spending or are they so simple minded to believe that the people don't know what they said, namely economy in government by their vote in the recent election for the change of government.
