

## Taxpayers' Groups Unanimously Oppose Apartment Project

### People Want Land In Fairway Area Used For Park Purposes

Seventy-four residents in the area of the Fairway Avenue playground and Rutan Estates Sunday afternoon heard officials and civic leaders condemn the proposal to construct an apartment house project adjacent to the Fairway Avenue playground bordering the Third River on the south side of Joramelon Street.

Charles Borbone, 253 Fairway Avenue, president of the Fairway Taxpayers' Association, told the assembly in Fairway playground that "Commissioner Gruhin has said an apartment project on this site would be a monument to Belleville. We don't want a monument facing our homes. We want a park for our kids to play in."

"A 320-unit apartment off Fairway Avenue would bring untold hundreds of automobiles to the area, endangering the lives of our children. What we need is a park to accommodate the needs of our growing children."

"We will not stand for exploitation of this ground by promoters whose only interest is in making a buck."

Commissioner George Kiernan, Director of Parks and Public Property, received mighty applause from the taxpayers when he said: "There are enough people in this area to warrant a park. At present there is no other open land available for development for park purposes. There are thousands of people in this area."

Double tragedy struck a Belleville home last week when Mrs. Alfred Viscido, of 18 Maple St., suffered a heart attack Friday evening, July 8, and was taken to Clara Maass Memorial Hospital, and her husband died suddenly the following day after suffering a heart attack while driving a bus in Neptune.

Mr. Viscido, who drove a Newark - Asbury Park Public Service bus, became ill on route to Asbury Park, stopped his bus in Neptune and, after discharging his passengers, suffered the fatal attack.

Mr. Viscido, who was 53, was born in Newark and had lived in Belleville the past four years.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Mary Remondelli, still a patient at the hospital and unable to attend the funeral services; two daughters: Mrs. Marie Vanderhoof of Sayreville and South Toms River, and three sons: Joseph and Alfred Jr., at home, and Franklin, serving in the U. S. Air Force and stationed at Seymour Johnson Air Force Base, Goldsboro, N.C.

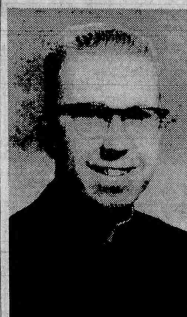
### Daily Vacation Bible Schools Now In Session

### Padula Prods Kiernan About Cost Of Plan; Ordinance Introduced

Belleville Town Commissioners this week took a tiny, timorous step toward providing a playground in the Fairway Avenue area when they passed a resolution sponsored by Director of Parks George Kiernan to acquire lands "by purchase or condemnation" for the project. The vote was four to one, with Commissioner Robert C. Gruhin the dissenter.

THE TEMPEST IN TEAPOT The move triggered a tempest in a teapot for a while, as tempers came to a boil in the steamy Commission chamber. A small, but very vocal, coterie of Fairway area residents gave raucous support to Kiernan's resolution. One of them was threatened with expulsion at one point by Mayor Padula for heckling Commissioner Gruhin.

Kiernan said he thought they should first acquire the land for the playground. Prodded by Padula as to how much it was going to cost the taxpayers, the Parks Commissioner said simply:

"I'm going to introduce the resolution."

The lands involved are owned by developers Krugman & De Petro, who are reported to have paid \$40,000 to \$50,000 for the parcel, as well as spending an undisclosed sum for improvements. Kiernan said a town like Belleville should make some provision for parks. He said the town was 250 or 300 years old.

## Charles Borbone Raps Plan Board's Secrecy

"The Belleville Planning Board, advised the Fairway Taxpayers' Association that it only meets in private. Its meetings are closed to the public and taxpayers interested in siting neighborhood zoning problems do not have a right to attend Planning Board meetings," stated President Charles Borbone of the Fairway Taxpayers' Association. Mr. Borbone was the principal speaker at a rally held Sunday at the Fairway Avenue playground to protest the erection of a proposed apartment site on the playground location.

Mr. Borbone and his fellow officers made an appeal to the Planning Board because they were told by Mayor Isadore Padula that the Commission cannot act upon any proposed apartment project until after the Planning Board considers the matter. Padula suggested that the Fairway Association officers contact the Planning Board. Mayor Padula is a member of the Planning Board.

At Sunday's meeting, Borbone decried the secrecy which prevails at Planning Board meetings. He said another attempt would be made to obtain an opportunity to appear before the

## Five-Day Civil Defense Course Open To HSSeniors

Belleville High School students, 17 years or older, have been invited to enroll for a free five-day course in several phases of Civil Defense and Disaster Control to be conducted at Manhattan Beach, N. Y. Some of the courses offered are Civil Defense, Planning, Basic Civil Defense, Radiological Monitoring, Health Mobilization, Emergency Food Planning and Communication Resources.

Upon completion of any course the student who qualifies, is awarded a trainee certificate, and is provided with instructor guides, reference material and appropriate training aids, for his

or her personal use in conducting local training courses, upon returning to their own municipalities.

All rooms, travel and meals expenses are provided for upon application through the Civil Defense organization, and the OGD.

The training center is located at Rockaway Inlet at Sheepshead Bay, with 250 feet of private beach, indoor and outdoor recreational areas, with housing for more than 250 students. Accommodations consist of individual bedroom and a semi-private bath.

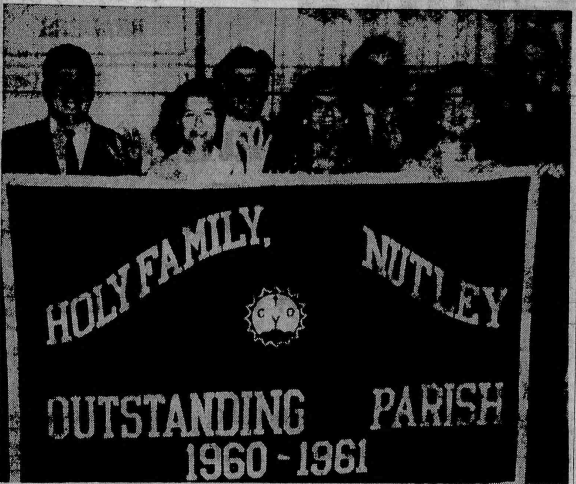

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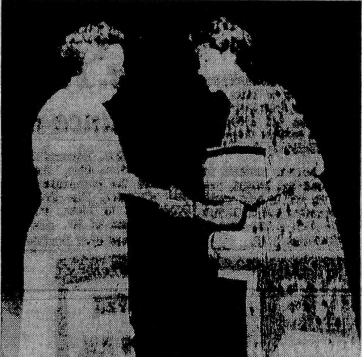
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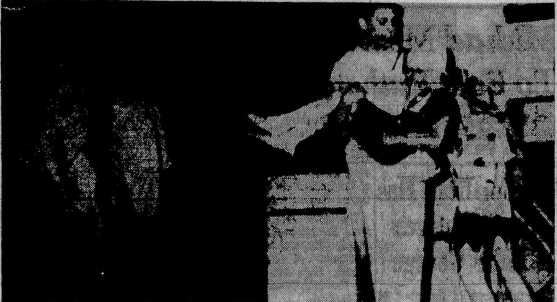

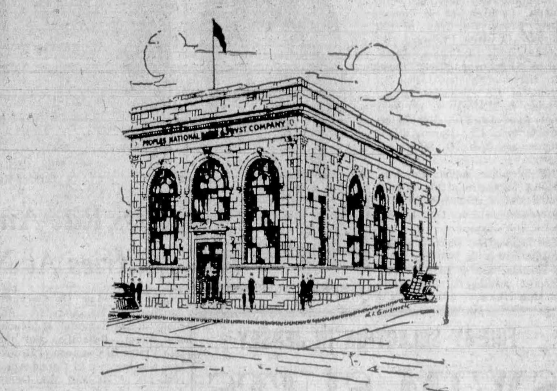

Bass said "I am not opposed to apartments in Belleville but I am most certainly opposed to apartments in a residential zone. This property is not zoned for apartments. As taxpayers we are entitled to a little consideration from the Town Commission. There are about 4,000 residents in this area, who, by any standard, are entitled to park facilities to serve the aged and the young."

Ralph Vara, Democratic Town Chairman, in addressing the rally, pointed out that he was a resident of the area and, speaking as an individual promised to work for the development of a park and playground area to serve the needs of the citizens.

Vara said: "We must put a stop to this nonsense coming from our Town Commission majority. In January the Commissioners passed a resolution asking Parks Director Kiernan to obtain the land."

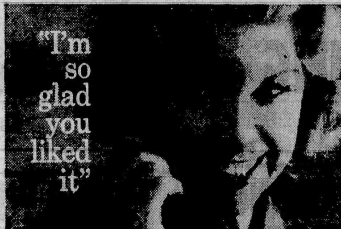

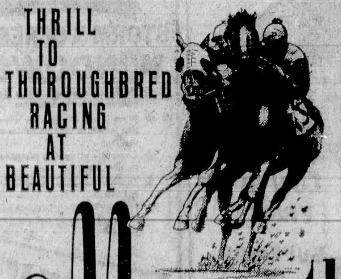
