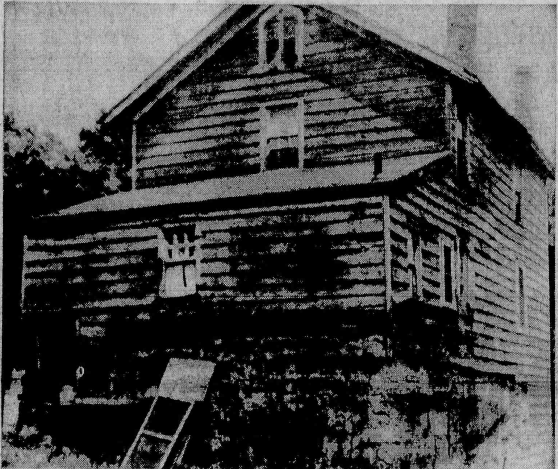

## The End Is Nearer

Steps are now being taken to assure the demolition of two dilapidated buildings—one, which was condemned by the Town Commission on June 27, the other, for which a demolition permit was issued on Aug. 3.

Action on the first, at 20 Valley Street, is being delayed by ownership rights. Thomas J. D'Avella, town attorney, is preparing the resolution, which would give the town the power to destroy the building rather than wait for the owners to do it. Notices were served to three owners after the building was condemned. The deed is in the name of Mrs. Julia Emorette Parry, who is deceased. Her descendants said she sold her share to the late Madeline Matthews.

The resolution is expected to be considered at the next Commission meeting on Monday, Nov. 13. The first Commission resolution called for demolition of the building, which it called "unfit for human habitation." There are no persons living there.

The building was called an extreme fire hazard by Carl Hunsicker, fire chief. From his department's inspection, he had urged requested "immediate action to condemn the extreme hazard, to prevent fires, loss of

## World Accordion Champ To Be Honored At Concert

Belleville residents, the people who helped send Donald Hulme to Milan, Italy and the World Accordion Olympics, will have the opportunity to honor him as the World Champ in his first performance here since his triumph abroad.

Friday, Nov. 10 is Donald Hulme Day. Hulme will give a performance sponsored by the United Fund of Belleville at the Capitol Theater. A parade in his honor will start at 7 p.m. at William Street and proceed behind a Color Guard and the High School Band to the Capitol. Starting at 8:30, following the first regular double feature movie, Hulme will play the First Movement of Tschakowsky's Violin Concerto and several standard popular arrangements.

Following his performance, Mayor Isadore J. Padula will formally present him with the mayor's proclamation in recognition of his great achievement as the town's "first" and only World Champion who has brought honor

## United Fund Has Only 25% of Goal

After getting off to a good start, the Belleville United Fund campaign is again lagging far behind, not only as compared with previous years, but also when compared with other communities in Essex County. Only 25 per cent of the goal of \$38,200 has been achieved.

As a result, both the efforts of the campaign workers and the contribution total must be greatly increased in the next couple of weeks if this year's campaign is even to equal last year's when only about 52 per cent of the goal was obtained.

"Just why there should be this apathy in Belleville toward the United Fund is hard to understand," said one spokesman. "Are the residents of Belleville less civic-minded than those of other communities? There must be many who care enough and, therefore, are interested enough

The Town Commission will hold its next regular meeting on Monday morning, Nov. 13 at 9 in the Commission Chamber. The meeting is being held at that time, instead of the usual Tuesday night, because of the 48th Annual Conference of the New Jersey State League of Municipalities, which begins on Tuesday and lasts until Friday.

The conference in Atlantic City has specialized meetings for all municipal departments. Belleville's Mayor, commissioners and many town officials will attend. Commissioner Harry J. Sullivan, director of Public Safety, has been appointed to the resolutions committee. Commissioner Sullivan is chairman of the League Traffic Safety Committee.

## T.B. Seal Sale Starts This Week Through Mail

Edward G. Burdzy, Belleville Seal Sale Chairman of the Belleville-Tulley Tuberculosis Association, said today that Christmas seals will be received in the mails this week by residents and industries of the two towns. This is the 26th Annual Christmas Seal Sale, he said, and 45,000 appeal letters with seals will be sent out. It is estimated that \$12,000 will be needed to continue the association's services during the coming year.

Burdzy said the funds raised by the Seal Sale are the only means of support of the local association. The money is used to carry on a free program of Tuberculosis prevention and control services in the two communities which consists of community X-rays, pitch testing of high school students, X-raying of school personnel, chest clinic, nursing service, etc.

The chairman, who is the local health officer, cautioned against

## Vara Says Party Could Have Won By Much More

### Claims Vote "Would Have Been Double Without Dennis Carey"

Belleville cast its votes Tuesday for the Democratic ticket—straight down the line. Like Essex, it went Democratic. But unlike Essex, the victory here did not seem to give all Democratic workers evidence that Dennis F. Carey was successfully running the party's county organization.

The town would have been even stronger in the Democratic vote column if it hadn't been for the Carey issue and cries of bossism surrounding him, according to Ralph Vara, Democratic Committee chairman, who has declared himself anti-Carey.

"The vote would have been double without Dennis Carey," he insisted. Democrats under Vara expressed disgust about out-of-town Election Day workers sent from the county level. One member of the group said local leaders were informed only the evening before of the auxiliary work.

## James F. Flynn, Retired Police Captain, Dies

James Francis Flynn, retired Belleville police captain, died at his home, 24 Smith Street, on Nov. 1 after a long illness. He was 87.

Police Headquarters is draped in purple and black in mourning for Mr. Flynn who served on the force for 32 years. The fourth member of the department when he joined it in 1908, he later became the town's first motorcycle policeman and its first captain.

He is remembered by the department as a fine policeman and a humanitarian. In the late 1920's and early 1930's, wanderers often spent the night in the police department. "The captain would always ask if they were hungry and then he'd share his food with them," recalls Chief of Police, George R. Spatz. "He was a crackerjack policeman."

Mr. Flynn was born in Belleville and attended St. Peter's School. Around the turn of the century he played semi-professional baseball on local teams in North Arlington and Harrison and on the Paterson Olympics and the Belleville Woodstocks, of which he was the last surviving member. He was a pitcher and second baseman.

## Belleville Civil Defense Mobilizes In State Alert

Statewide exercise, "Operation Readiness" was called last Saturday by the New Jersey State Civil Defense Department. The general public was not asked to participate.

Ludwig R. Pesa, Director of Belleville CD-BC was called at 7:45 a.m. from the county control, and immediately started for the control headquarters in a radio-equipped mobile unit, calling Belleville radio stations on the way. The first station to respond was K20RI owned and operated by Ed Johnson on Birchwood Drive. He took to the air, and shortly four other radio stations responded. By 8:10 a.m. the headquarters control was activated and all branches of the Civil Defense organization were notified by telephone and reported in.

Belleville simulated a plane crash in the vicinity of Greylock and Main Streets. The newly formed light rescue team, under the direction of Joseph Roccosano, was alerted by mobile radio.

### Orchard Receives Award Created To Honor Him

The new Federation William J. Orchard Award was presented to William J. Orchard, retired general manager of Wallace & Tiernan, at the convention of the Water Pollution Control Federation, by Ray E. Lawrence, president.

The award for distinguished service, was a surprise for Orchard and those attending the Awards Banquet. It will be presented in the future to those making exceptional contributions to the water pollution control field.

In presenting the award, Lawrence cited the long association of Orchard with the sanitary engineering profession and the Federation.

After graduation as a sanitary engineer, Orchard served with the Metropolitan Water Board in Boston, the Massachusetts Department of Health, and the New Jersey Department of Health.

He began his long career with Wallace and Tiernan Inc. in 1915 as general manager. He held various executive posts in the affiliated Wallace and Tiernan companies prior to their consolidation. In 1953 he retired from the company.

Orchard has always been quite active in the technical and professional groups. He is past president of the Water & Sewage Works Assn., as well as treasurer and director of the American Water Works Assn. The latter group has granted him honorary membership. He is a Fellow in the American Public Health Association.

The Water Pollution Control Federation is a technical organization with over 10,000 members and subscribers in the United States, Canada, and other countries. This annual meeting marked 34 years of Federation leadership in water pollution control. More than 2,000 at the convention saw, heard and discussed the latest developments in the field. Comprehensive exhibits of equipment and processes were included in over 115 booths.

### BHS Seniors Are Eligible For GM Scholarships

Senior students at Belleville High School are eligible to compete for the 100 four-year scholarships offered by General Motors under its National Scholarship Plan, according to Hugh D. Kittle, principal.

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

## Vicious

The organization with the high-sounding name and low campaign tactics is at it again. The Belleville Citizens Tax Council filed more charges with the N. J. State Department of Education.

Again it shows an unrestrained eagerness to engage in character assassination attempts. This time it accuses last year's valedictorian at Belleville High School, Howard Ellis, of stooping for our school officials.

Expressing deep indignation, Ellis denied that school officials urged him to criticize the inadequacy of the Belleville High School in his formal address.

The Tax Council didn't stop with Ellis. It went further. It made accusations against three individuals whose attorneys are now engaged in analyzing the state laws for possible libel action. The Tax Council charges are known to be untrue. They were cruel, vicious, and unfair. But coming from the Tax Council we are not surprised at the charges. They conform to the Tax Council's self-imposed standards.

Belleville needs a town-wide group of taxpayers to serve its best interests. On past performances most certainly the Citizens Tax Council is not it.

Well, finally, after two years we are to get a look at a new zoning plan for Belleville. It was devised by the Padula-appointed Planning Board. At this point it may be historically important to note that Padula ordered press releases be issued only through his Honor. That Mayor Padula chooses to ignore doesn't offend us for seven and a half years he has been ignoring the complaints of Belleville taxpayers—so why should we be an exception.

and immediately dispatched to the scene of the simulated accident, in the recently acquired light rescue truck, equipped with stretchers, first aid supplies, and other available items. It was the fact that they have had only a few short weeks of training and that this was a surprise call-up without any previous rehearsal, Director Pesa and other key members of the CD staff, commended them on their proficiency.

They were 45 simulated casualties, and these "victims" were distributed among four nearby hospitals. Some "live" stretchers were actually used. They were placed in the CD vehicle, and moved at the staging area to Clara Maass Memorial Hospital, while the mobile unit maintained control headquarters.

Upon receiving instructions from the County Control at Livingston, the exercise was terminated shortly after 11 a.m. The Civil Defense participants made a summary of the exercise and a review of operating shortcomings was established. Chief Rocco and the director concluded that preparedness planning by way of many rehearsals would be necessary to pave the way for future operations.

life or injury to local children who might be tempted to enter the premises."

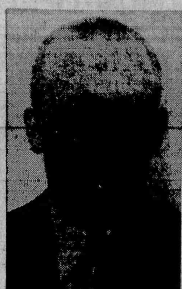
After a later inspection, the former building inspector, Thomas P. Greco, reported on Oct. 11 that "no action has been taken on demolition" of the building.

Sullivan, who had endorsed the anti-Democratic ticket, conducted their own tabulations. Kiernan had strongly endorsed Hughes.

And there was more communication Election night by the group in Kiernan's office with Republicans next door than there was with the mayor's two commissioners group across the hall. Vara wore a Hughes button at the polls and members of his group had badges declaring the "official Democratic challenge." — there were buttons and badges in the other Democratic group declaring the same thing; but the similarities seemed to end there.

Belleville cast 6,576 votes for the next governor, Democrat Richard J. Hughes. This was 56 percent of the votes. His opponent, Republican James P. Mitchell, polled 5,070, or 44 percent of the votes. The ward breakdown for Hughes was: first, 448; second, 1,733; third, 1,795; fourth, 2,405. For Mitchell it was: 377, 1,161, 1,820, 1,703.

Four years ago, the Democratic Governor, Robert B. Meyner, received 6,068 here and Republican Malcolm S. Forbes got 4,573 votes. Meyner's percentage was 57.

Belleville helped the significant Democratic victory for sheriff by giving 57.45—56 percent of the votes to LeRoy J. D'Aloia against 4,587 to the Republican, William S. Macdonald. By wards D'Aloia, 543, 1,535, 1,594, 2,971; Macdonald, 356, 1,066, 1,522, 1,493. In the last election for sheriff the Democrat, Neil G. Duffy, received 53 percent of the vote—4,417. Edward V. Weber, the Republican polled 3,909.

Frank De George, Conservative candidate for the Assembly, received 47 votes. G. George Adonizio, Independent candidate for governor, got 36 votes.

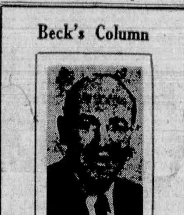

Four state referendum questions passed here in Belleville, as they did throughout the state. The Institutional Bond issue received 3,478 yes votes and 1,821 no votes. Green Acres Bond Issue, 3,035 to 2,167; Continuation of Government during National Emergency, 3,908 to 1,091; Licensing Amusement Games at Agricultural Fairs, 3,291 to 1,777. The Third Ward had the highest percentage of voters—70. By wards the registered voters and the number of votes cast were: First Ward—1,707 eligible, 1,041 cast, or 61 percent; Second Ward—4,355, 2,933 or 67 percent; Third Ward—5,054 3,539; Fourth Ward—6,606, 4,239 or 64 percent.

We would like to correct some widespread misconceptions about presenters used in manufacturing methods in the TV industry, commonly called "printed circuits."

The word "printed" is not quite correct, it should be "etched" or "plated." However, since the expression is so widely used, we will stick to "printed."

There is no question about it, there were lots of troubles with printed circuits 6 years ago, when some factories changed from hand wiring to automation. As it happens so often, many products are reaching the market before they are given exhaustive tests. The consumer is made the guinea pig and the market place becomes the testing ground. This is exactly what happened with printed circuits. We advised our customers at that time not to buy sets using this new method. At the same time we made it clear, that there is nothing basically wrong. The difficulties were "bugs" which sooner or later would be ironed out. This has been done. For the last 2 years "printed circuits" have been very good. The sets are far more uniform in performance than they ever could be made by hand wiring. Repairing is made easier and easier, since the value of the parts is printed right on the boards. The whole assembly is smaller and lighter, without loss of quality. This system is used extensively in the making of missiles. If hand wiring would be better, surely it would be used there. Some small manufacturers who do not have the money to invest in the expensive machinery for automation, still use hand wiring. One large manufacturer who stresses hand wiring and makes it appear as if it were better, has already had printed circuits in some station selectors. It won't be long and this factory also will have to change to "printed circuits," and probably will go through the same rough period than all the others previously.
