Land Use Proposals Attacked At Public Hearing: Major Protests From Valley Area

Belleville's land use plan came under fire Thursday night when about 65 residents appeared at a public hearing to discuss the first section of a Master Plan proposed by the Planning Board.

Most of the protesters were concerned about the section of the plan aimed at making the Valley area an industrial park. Theodore M. Wells of 13 Quinon Street, speaking for a large group of Negro residents at the meeting, demanded to know if the Planning Board would make certain the Valley families had a place to live after their homes were replaced by industries. Will we just be told to "pick up your tent and look for a place to pitch it?" he asked.

Ralph Visco, board chairman, assured him that "other areas in town" would be developed to accommodate them.

SEEKS ASSURANCE

"What assurance do we have," asked Wells, "that we can purchase other parts of town. Would my people have enough money to rent these houses. And would they rent to me in the first place?"

He predicted that Belleville would "join the parade of towns with problems in housing."

"It is most unfortunate and peculiar that most planning boards concentrate their efforts in areas where minority groups live," he said.

Wells called upon the board to give serious thought to selling aside a portion of the Valley to be developed just for homes. "There is no way to avoid it. The town has a responsibility," he said.

ENOUGH INDUSTRY

Other residents of the Valley said this year there was enough industry there already. "We don't want it disturbed," said one person summing up his argument.

Two other proposals received protests. The first, to convert the Silver Lake section for apartments, was argued by Daniel Gabriel of 107 Celia Terrace, among others. Gabriel insisted the Silver Lake residents didn't want to become "cliff dwellers" in apartment houses. "We are satisfied where we are," he said. "Never mind a public hearing put it to a public vote."

The second, to create a modern shopping center along Washington Avenue, was discussed by two local realtors who said it would be better to develop only a portion of the avenue for business.

"There doesn't seem to be enough business to support the entire section," contended Norman H. Thompson of 302 Washington Avenue, Joseph W. Kane, who lives at 28 Emmet Street, said apartments should be built along some parts of the avenue.

WITHHOLD ACTION

Several citizens argued that the board should withhold action on the plan until the new government is installed this Summer. Thomas P. Greco, former building inspector, called for a second hearing on the plan. Others agreed on the need for another hearing, which they said would have better attendance. School Board Splits Votes; Drake Elected President, Arvidson, Vice President

Richard H. Drake, school board member of three years, was elected president of the Board of Education at an organization meeting Monday night. Ernest S. Arvidson, who has been on the board for two years, was elected vice president.

The board will hold a regular meeting Monday night, Feb. 26, at 8 o'clock in the board office.

Drake was nominated by Mrs. Norma McCool, newcomer to the board. His election was secured by four votes to three for Nicholas S. Juliano, nominated by Arvidson.

For the vice presidency, Arvidson, who was nominated by Juliano, received four votes. George H. Brown, newly elected member, received one vote. He had been nominated by Dr. Frank D. Ruggiero, who was re-elected last week to his third term. Arthur M. Pico nominated Mrs. McCool who received two votes.

By motion from Juliano, the officers were declared unanimously elected.

TO SERVE BOARD

After taking the president's chair, Drake said he was looking forward to giving "greater service to the board and the community" in the new position he held.

"The challenges facing the board at this time are great, but the strides we can make are even greater," he told the board.

Route 21 Freeway To Replace Local McCarter Highway

State To Seek Bids In Spring For \$4 Million Project: Work Expected To Begin In Early Summer

Construction is expected to begin in early summer on a six-lane roadway replacing McCarter Highway from Elwood Avenue, Newark to William Street, Belleville, according to a New Jersey State Highway Department spokesman. The 1.1 mile section will be the final link in the Route 21 Freeway started in 1953.

Roy Dasche, speaking for the state department, said the project would be the Spring near William Street, and work would begin shortly after.

The freeway will provide a direct route from Newark to Paterson, he said.

The project includes construction of a bridge over Second River, the boundary between Belleville and Newark. The bridge will be at the mouth of the river, carrying the roadway across.

The highway will merge with McCarter Highway and the completed section of the freeway would be the Spring near William Street, and work would begin shortly after.

Northward almost to Grafton Avenue, the new road will run close to the Passaic River between the river and several industries east of McCarter Highway. Some of the small riverfront pharmaceutical buildings of Wallace and Therman will be removed, along with part of the existing parking area of Viking Tool and Machine Corp., according to Wallace J. Schonwald of Edwards and Keely, engineering consultants in Newark.

The Norold Boat Club will be completely removed, he said.

The roadway will pass under the Erie-Lackawanna Railroad tracks in a double-decker viaduct three lanes wide. Two piers under the railroad will have to be removed to make the distance wide enough for the highway to run between, said Dasche. "It is not a major job," he added.

He also said the construction of the Second River bridge would not present major difficulties. He called it "a normal" job.

PROPERTY ACQUISITIONS

"There will be normal property acquisitions along the way of the river," he expected, "but

Surplus Applied To Cut Town Costs

Heavy use of surplus funds helped achieve a drop in municipal costs reflected in the town budget for 1962. The municipal budget was \$2,654,264, which was \$2,415 lower than last year, but school and county levies caused a 20 point tax increase bringing the rate to \$8.85.

The budget, which was adopted by the commissioners at a meeting Tuesday, Feb. 12, showed an overall tax levy of \$5,450,711, providing \$1,968,265 for municipal purposes, \$2,231,509 for schools and \$1,250,937 for the county.

An additional \$226,000 current expense surplus offset increases. This brought the total current surplus to \$425,000. From water surplus \$125,000 was applied to the anticipated revenue. Also by participating an additional one per cent of taxes collected, the commission counted on \$34,643 more in the reserve for uncollected taxes.

DEPARTMENTAL DECREASES

In departmental reductions, major decrease was \$11,429 in the department of Revenue and Finance account of \$226,684. Savings were in employee insurance

Campaign oratory will continue in Belleville. With the Board of Education race over, the election spotlight just refocuses on the May 8 municipal contest.

Last week two more petitions were taken out. Michael J. Caffone of 701 Main Street said he would run for second ward councilman. Joseph Sooy of 26 Howard Place will try for Ward One seat.

James R. Golden of 52 Tappan Avenue announced his candidacy at a Planning Board public hearing Thursday night. He took out a petition yesterday for an at-large seat.

Service Of Dedication Sunday For New Montgomery Church

The Service of Dedication of the newly completed sanctuary of Montgomery Presbyterian Church, Mill Street, will be held this Sunday, Feb. 25 at 4 p.m.

The completion of the new church is the culmination of a program of construction undertaken during the past decade which includes a large parish hall and educational facilities.

Construction of the new sanctuary began last September, following a fund-raising drive in 1960. Nearly two thirds of the total cost of \$70,000 was pledged by the members of the congregation after the former church

Town Sends Appeal To State On County's Tax Assessment

The town has filed an appeal with the State Division of Taxation contending the county made a mistake in levying a \$5,600 and \$7,350 assessment on Washington Avenue property owned by the Planning Board. Robert C. Gruhin, the town attorney, who prepared the appeal letter.

The town is asking for this assessment based on a true value of \$65,000, according to an appraisal by C. Clemmshaw Co., professional appraisal firm.

The County Board of Taxation placed the lower assessment on the property after a public hearing Dec. 28, 1961. Real value was set at \$14,000, which is the price Gruhin paid when he bought the property from Congregation Abayath Achim in 1960.

The county set the real value for 1962 at \$15,875, which would result in a \$7,350 tax assessment. The increase over the 1961 \$5,600 assessment was due to alteration in building size acquisition.

The board of commissioners decided by a vote of 4-0 to file an appeal on Wednesday, Jan. 17. Gruhin abstained from voting.

According to the county decision, Mrs. Gruhin owes \$484 for 1961 taxes on the property. The town sought \$2,231 at the hearing before Maclay Goldman, tax board commissioner.

In addition the town sought six months taxes from Congregation Abayath Achim. The county, however, decided the congrega-

I don't know of any severe locations around the bridge area."

It was expected that right-of-way purchases would be completed before construction bids are sought in the Spring.

When the plan was presented about two years ago it was proposed that the freeway would directly pass through Wallace and Tiernan, Hanlon and Goodman and Viking Tool and Machine Co. Mayor Isadore J. Padula asked the State at that time to build a projection over the Passaic River for the freeway route and thereby preserve the present status of those industries in Belleville.

The adopted plan calls for the road to be close to the river, requiring about 700 feet of concrete sea wall to be constructed. In addition some areas will be filled.

TO BE A CANDIDATE

To be eligible for candidacy, a person must be a citizen, a resident and a registered voter in Belleville. Petitions must be filed by Saturday, March 24 at 4 p.m., 45 days before election.

The minimum number of signatures required on petitions is one per cent of the registered vote at the last general election.

For councilman at-large, 177 registered voters must sign the candidate's petition; for Ward One councilman, 69 must sign; for Ward Two, 88.

Persons who are not registered voters must register by Thursday, March 29 in the Town Clerk's office to be eligible to vote in May. The clerks' office,

Candidates may have a slogan of no more than six words opposite their names on the ballot. Political party affiliations are not permitted on the ballot.

Candidates are permitted by law to spend up to 15 cents per voter on election expenditures. The maximum amount permitted for councilman at-large is \$2,487.15; for councilman from Ward One, \$1,304.10; from Ward Two, \$1,183.05.

Before receiving contributions or spending any money on his campaign, a candidate must appoint a campaign manager. A certificate must be filed in the clerk's office of the appointment. A candidate may serve as his own campaign manager.

body could pass ordinances. The land use plan, as well as all other sections of the master plan, could be adopted by the board, not as law, but as a guide to the overall development of the town during the next 20 years.

NEW ZONING ORDINANCE

He admitted, however, that the board would recommend a new zoning ordinance to the commission within six months. The recommendation would be based on

the land use plan.

Praise for the land use plan was voiced by Harry T. French, executive director of the Chamber of Commerce, who called the goal set up by the plan "something to shoot at." It is a fine thing, he said, "to set up a scheme by which in the future the town will develop."

He added that if such a plan were envisioned 20 years ago, "we wouldn't be in the predicament we are now." French said he recognized that "there were going to be disturbances, but in the long run my property will increase in value with new industry and homes coming into town."

James R. Golden of 62 Tappan Avenue used the public hearing to announce his candidacy for the May election. He condemned the land use plan, saying "This proposal is quite unpopular" and insisted the board was using "high-handed, authoritarian methods" to make the Valley residents sell their homes.

"I opposed the formation of the planning board," Golden said, "and I told you we would run the day we created a planning board."

While being ruled out of order by Visco, Golden declared, "I am going to run for public office and abolish it elected." He later said he would seek one of three at-large seats.

The board decided at a brief meeting after the public hearing, to withhold action on the plan until the next board meeting, which was scheduled for Tuesday, March 1.

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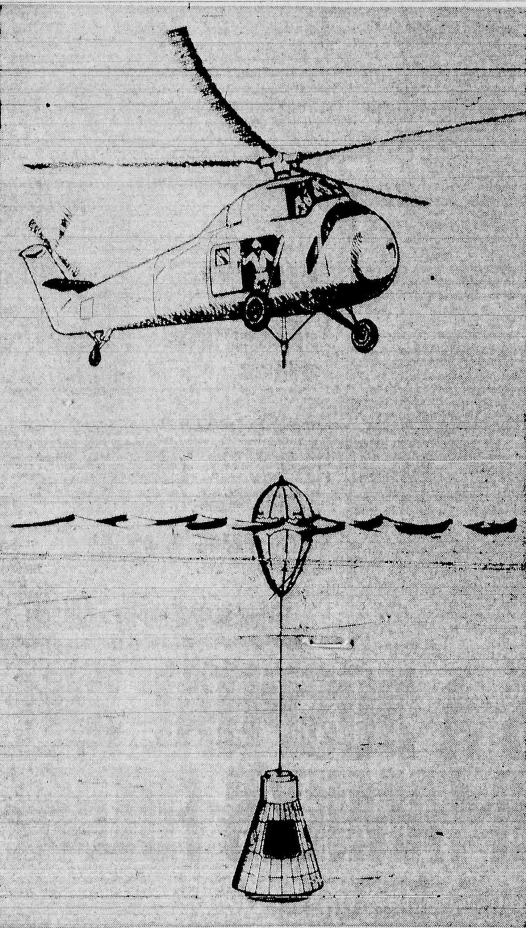
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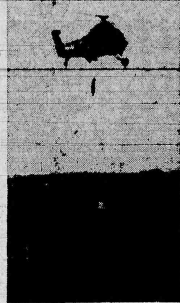
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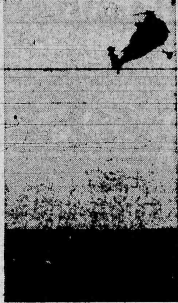
Kidde Floatation Bags Safeguard Spacecraft Recoveries

The danger of sea loss of Project Mercury spacecraft that may fill with water after helicopters arrive on the recovery scene has been virtually eliminated through use of new floatation equipment designed by Walter Kidde and Company, Inc., here in Belleville.

Marine Corps helicopters assigned to spacecraft recoveries are now equipped with a rapidly inflatable floatation bag that is hooked to the space vehicle's lifting assembly simultaneously with the attachment of the lift cable. The floatation gear and its carbon dioxide inflation system were designed and engineered by the Aero-Space Division of Kidde.

This extra protection during recoveries will prevent a recurrence of events which led to the loss of the second manned Mercury spacecraft. When the spacecraft hatch accidentally opened shortly after the vehicle hit the water, Astronaut Virgil Grissom was able to emerge safely but the vehicle began shipping water. The recovery helicopter, which had attached a lifting line to the flooding spacecraft, developed engine trouble while attempting to lift the waterlogged spacecraft out of the sea and crewmen were forced to release the lift lines.

INFLATABLE BAG
The new Kidde system provides for the floatation gear to be coupled with the lifting cable from

cord actuates a carbon dioxide gas cylinder which inflates the float bag. When the bag is floating with the spacecraft suspended beneath it, another hook-up ring on the uppermost section of the bag is in position for a follow-on ship to attempt retrieval of the assembly. The lines on the float bag are fashioned so that as the ship makes the second attempt at recovery, the hook-on ring and nylon harness lines pull away from the float and take the weight of the spacecraft directly.

The floatation bag has a buoyancy of more than 2,500 pounds, more than adequate to support the spacecraft which weighs considerably less when submerged in the water. The harness equipment attached to the bag is designed to withstand the loads imposed by lifting clear the water-filled spacecraft.

The Kidde equipment was supplied for the Manned Spacecraft Center of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration at Langley Air Force Base, Va., and will be utilized by the Department of Defense forces supporting the project.

Pfc. Joseph W. Yuknalis In Operation Great Shelf

Army PFC Joseph W. Yuknalis, 21, whose wife, Jean, lives at 86 Tappan Avenue, participated in Operation Great Shelf, a bilateral air-ground mobility exercise involving Army and Air Force units of the U. S. and the Republic of the Philippines near Clark Air Base in the Philippines. The ten-day exercise was scheduled to end Feb. 15.

Operation Great Shelf is designed to strengthen the operational readiness of the continental U. S. and Pacific Theater Army and Air Force units plus the armed forces of the Philippines to participate in bilateral operations. More than 10,000 personnel participate in the exercise which consists of two phases. Phase one was the air movement of U. S. Forces to the Philippines, while phase two involved air and ground operations.

Yuknalis, a truck driver in the 23rd Transportation Company, which is regularly located at Fort Campbell, Ky., entered the Army last October and completed basic training at Fort Dix.

He attended Kearny High School and was employed by Commercial Can Corporation in Newark before entering the Army.

To Dominic Lally; Better to be Respected Than Elected

By less than 50 votes, Board of Education President Dominic Lally failed in his bid for reelection. The result could have been otherwise.

Much as Dominic Lally desired reelection, he could not bring himself to stoop to a shabby political deal involving two key educational posts in a trade for votes.

Lally was offered a proposal to trade the appointment of Joseph Grosch as School Nine principal in exchange for the appointment of a high school football coach with powerful political connections through whom Lally could have gained a couple of hundred votes.

Anyone with a grammar school education can see that Lally could have won reelection if he made the accommodation mentioned.

In defeat Lally has grown in stature. All Belleville citizens now know that Lally is a man of integrity—above and beyond the reach and influence of politicians, those in high places and their associates of much less eminence.

He incurred the wrath of certain "Silver Lake" political figures and the election results clearly prove the manner in which they penalized Lally for his refusal to sell out our school system for certain reelection.

Another school district, where the football coach "in waiting" has powerful sponsors and allies, also put the skids under Lally for his refusal to play politics with school board appointments.

When the chips were down, Lally passed the acid test with flying colors. In defeat Lally proved himself to be possessed of greater integrity than many people who run for public office in Belleville.

Elected he wasn't — but respected he was. And when the shadows of night descend, Lally can lay his head on his pillow at peace with the world and his conscience. No man can ask for more.

In his three years as a member of the Board of Education, Lally has proven to Belleville citizens that he is a sincere man and a person of indestructible integrity. For Belleville, this is a refreshing experience.

Still a young man, Lally can be of service to our community and its people in the future in many ways. Belleville needs honest public servants like Lally in positions of public trust.

We hope Lally will give the people of Belleville another opportunity to pass judgment upon him by their votes. Next time, we are confident, the result will be different.

The School Board Election

It could have been worse — much worse. We are referring to the campaigning during the recent school board election.

During the last week before Election Day, rumors began flying — all kinds. We heard the one about the candidate who was supposed to be suffering from a whispering campaign against him allegedly because his children attend a Roman Catholic school.

The "bullet voting" reports were widespread. Unfortunately, some of these reports proved to be true. A study of the voting results leaves no doubt.

And there was the one about Dominic Lally causing a rival candidate to lose a steady job. Of course, the report was untrue. But it hurt.

And in the political no-man's-land of Silver Lake, there were more rumors than voters.

Despite all this, judged by our election

standards the campaign was relatively clean. This is good for Belleville.

We congratulate the winners — Mrs. Norma McCool can make major contributions toward the welfare of our school system. She is the only newcomer to the Board, the other two winners already having seen service on the Board.

Mrs. McCool holds views diametrically opposed to those of a majority of the Board's membership. This could be healthy. It depends upon how she adjusts to the heavy responsibility of public office. We believe she has the capacity to become a good public servant. Even before she was sworn in as a Board member, politicians around were trying to barter away her vote to elect the new Board president. It is to her credit that she refused to submit to such pressure.

George Brown returns to the Board. As an experienced Board member he should have no difficulty in assuming and adjusting to the responsibilities of membership. If Brown permits factionalism to influence his judgment and decisions as a Board member, our school system and our children are in for a rough time.

Brown has too much common sense to permit such a condition to develop — but people's opinions many times reflect the company they keep. Hence, only time will tell if Brown will rise to the needs of our times or reach down to embrace our school system's ugly enemy — factionalism.

For his own good as well as for the welfare of our school children, we hope Brown's future service on the Board will be as good as his past record.

Dr. Frank DiRuggiero, dean of the Board, was re-elected to a third term last week. His victory was a personal tribute. Dr. DiRuggiero ended his second term on the school board championing the rights and prerogatives of the school superintendent. It is to his everlasting credit that he joined Lally in refusing to make a political deal on the football coach's job.

Dr. DiRuggiero resisted tremendous political pressures brought to bear upon him regarding this job in the closing days of the fiercely contested campaign. Men of lesser stamina and integrity might have yielded to the temptation to pick up a block of several hundred votes by entering into a "political payoff."

By his refusal to be blackjacked into the job-trade, DiRuggiero not only proved he placed the school system above the call of politics but, what is more important, he proved that we have among us another elected public official who can't be "bought" at any price.

We knew Dr. DiRuggiero as an honest man, but there are among us some cynics who claim they're from Missouri — they want to be shown. Well the evidence is in, and Dr. DiRuggiero has shown that he stood up to the challenge.

To the three winners go our best wishes for success during their tenure in office.

As for the losing candidates, there were among them some well-qualified citizens. We suggest they continue and expand their interest in our government, both school and municipal. Opportunity for service to our community will come again. Many elections are ahead — and if the past is any indication of the future, there will be too few qualified, honest citizens willing to risk a campaign for elective office in Belleville.

Chalk One Up For Belleville

Well, don't look now — but it really happened! Belleville citizens approved the school board budget on the first try.

Belleville has come a long way in its attitude toward our educational needs. It seems only yesterday that our citizens impulsively rejected successive school board budgets, only to throw the mess into the lap of a politically-motivated Town Commission.

Our voters are entitled to congratulations on their affirmative action on the school budget. It was an excellent document and merited approval.

Belleville is fast regaining its first class status in the field of education. Some of the credit for the change belongs to our brilliant school superintendent, Dr. Frank Durkee.

Cooperstein Urges Support Of UHF Legislation

In a "UHF Factsheet" sent to the entire New Jersey Congressional delegation recently, Belleville's Edwin Cooperstein, the head of a New Jersey television company attempting to create a new commercial — education Ultra High Frequency station outlined developments in UHF at the recent F.C.C. hearings in Washington. He also cited an endorsement from Gov. Richard J. Hughes for his proposal.

Cooperstein, president of the New Jersey Television Broad-casting Corp., in an open letter to the state's Washington delegation highlighted the endorsements of the three network heads of the F.C.C.'s proposed all-channel receiver legislation. Urging support, Cooperstein noted: "Such legislation will truly open up the television spectrum to greater diversified services to all citizens."

In addition to the broadcaster's endorsements, the factsheet listed support for the legislation by the National Association of Broadcasters and cited articles and editorials from newspapers and magazines.

CITES SUPPORT

Cooperstein told the Congressional delegation that Gov. Richard J. Hughes had endorsed his proposal last week, writing: "I am sure that your proposal, if put into effect, will be a great benefit to our citizens, especially those in southern New Jersey."
