

## Grosch Appointed Principal Of School Nine; Lees Made Acting Principal Of B. H. S.

George T. Lees was named acting principal of Belleville High School and Joseph B. Grosch, principal of School Nine, at the Board of Education special meeting Monday night.

Grosch's appointment came after an eight-month fight by parents of School Nine pupils for a full-time principal. The vote was six to one for the appointment.

George H. Brown was the opposing board member. He insisted there were too few pupils at the school to warrant a full-time principal. There are only about 150 enrolled there, he said. "I don't think this community can afford private education with public funds," he said.

Lees has been acting as principal of the high school since the beginning of the

courses.

A resident of Belleville, he lives at 4 Melvex Street. He and his wife, Eleanor, have two sons: George, 21, who is in the Navy, and Philip, 18, a student at Paterson State College.

The School Nine post has been before the board since last January. A majority vote blocked it from being considered then and the appointment was delayed. Parents, who had been fighting since October for a principal, charged that politics were delaying the board from acting. Several board members also charged politics were involved and it was decided to wait until after the February school board election to fill the job.

**LARGE AUDIENCE**

Monday night a surprise showing of about 80 persons caused the meeting place to be switched from the Board of Education office to School Eight's auditorium. The crowd of parents came especially to hear the board's decision on the principalship of School Nine. Mothers phoned the news to each other that this meeting was an important one to attend and then formed car pools for transportation, according to one woman.

Schools One and Nine have been under the control of one principal, Mrs. Violet Spray, who will continue as principal of School One.

When the board decided last year to combine the schools under one administrator, a full-time clerk was employed at School Nine. Ernest S. Arvidson, board member, failed in his attempt Monday night to add an amendment to the proposal that the full-time clerk be eliminated.

**WASTE OF MONEY**

He insisted it was a waste of taxpayers' money to have a full-time clerk at the school. He said employees in the school would be "chasing themselves all over the building looking for work to

## Split Sessions Set For Next Term

Belleville High School students will attend classes on split sessions next semester.

In an attempt to alleviate overcrowding at the school, the Board of Education adopted a plan Monday night calling for a longer school day with half the students beginning classes at the end of the first period.

The board also authorized a redistricting plan to equalize enrollments in the elementary schools. The first phase of the plan, which is to be submitted within 90 days, would divide the city into three districts, retroactive to Jan. 1, 1962. He is one of the applicants for the permanent post.

few pupils, they said.

Dr. Durkin indicated it would be up to the board to decide which a class would be transferred when the plan goes into effect next September, but it was suggested a switch would begin the lower grades.

**THREE-PART PLAN**

The high school plan for split sessions would remain in effect until the new high school is completed in September, 1969. The plan was one in three parts dealing with overcrowding at the school.

The only negative vote against the measure was cast by Mrs. Norma McCool, who insisted it would present "numerable problems," both disciplinary and administrative.

The plan also set up a single curriculum for students. Under this, students can specialize in their own particular fields of interest. Presently the school is under a college preparatory, business and general course division.

## Many Signatures Seen As A "Vote Of Confidence"

Belleville firemen thanked their fellow citizens yesterday for what they termed "a most gratifying vote of confidence."

The firemen were referring to the 5,272 signatures they received during the ten-day period they circulated petitions in quest of a 42-hour week.

Since they received approximately three times the necessary number of signatures, the petition will be on the ballot in the form of a referendum for the May 8 election. It is believed to be the only referendum that will be on the ballot. Firemen are seeking reduction of their 56-hour work week.

Theodore Del Grosso, chairman of the 42-hour committee, said the success of the Belleville F.M.B.A. have issued a joint statement, thanking the voters. They declared that firemen were not only grateful for the public's sympathetic attitude towards their 56-hour week but they were also pleased to

have in fair play" to support the firemen's request.

**OUTDATED**

"We thought the 56-hour week went out with battles and are shocked to learn that Belleville's firemen must work such hours, particularly when Newark, Bloomfield, East Orange, West Orange, Kearny, Jersey City, Hoboken and other municipalities are on the 42-hour week," he said.

"Why should a fireman, who often risks his life answering the call of duty, also be expected to give the equivalent of two extra 8-hour days per week to his community—time which is just as precious to his family as is our own?"

"We call upon all laboring men and women who enjoy a 40-hour week, all office employees, and all who believe in fair play to join us in rallying around the firemen and vote 'yes' in the May 8 referendum."

Sullivan was endorsed last week by Regular Democratic Organization candidates who are seeking to oust Vara town chairman for the past 14 years. The group received the regular party designation from the County level. Vara's candidates have taken the name Democratic County Committee for the primary election April 17.

Sullivan said if the "organization" Democrats win he would accept the chairmanship.

**LOCAL PROBLEM**

"This is strictly a local problem," he said. Vara lost the County endorsement because of his opposition to Dennis F. Carey, County chairman. Reportedly,

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### Vara Points To Record Of Getting Out The Vote For The Past 14 Years

Ralph Vara, Democratic town chairman, pointed this week to his record of getting out the Democratic vote for the past 14 years. This, he insisted, is what his job is and his record shows he is successful.

A split in the Democratic party has aligned a part of the group with Vara and the other with Mr. Mae Mead Marza, Vara's vice chairman. The Marza group candidates have asked Commissioner Harry J. ### Waltock Demands Public Apology From Sullivan; Questions 1958 Action

Edward Waltock insisted yesterday that Commissioner Harry J. Sullivan owed him a public apology for saying it was "selfish" of Ralph Vara to support him for town chairman.

Waltock hit back at the commissioner by bringing up a 1958 Grand Jury presentment, which criticized the police department for being "poorly organized" and "lax in operation." Sullivan, director of Public Safety, was director when the presentment was made.

The Grand Jury based its investigation on two cases and stated that "an effective chain of command" did not exist and therefore the force did not have the high standards of efficiency which the citizens of Belleville had a right to expect to be maintained by their police department.

Also declaring themselves for the Second Ward race were Mrs. Elsie Albertine of 631 Joramelon Street, Merwin Daniels of 15 Myrtle Avenue and Andrew E. Colaninno of 235 Division Avenue.

building inspector of Belleville, will seek an at-large seat. Also in that contest is Michael Maglia of 87 Fredericks Street.

Dominic A. Lally, former president of the Board of Education, will run in Ward One. Lally was defeated in his bid for reelection to the school board in February. He served one term.

dent of the Citizens Tax Council, reversed his previous decision not to run. Petitions already had been taken out for Calabro by Joseph J. Inzerio who began a movement to draft the CTC leader.

Calabro said Tuesday he would run for an at-large seat with the backing of the council and of a newly formed Businessmen for Better Government group.

Gruhin has been a commissioner since 1957 when he was named to fill an unexpired term. He was re-elected in 1958.

Michael V. Albertine, former school board member, was defeated last month when he sought re-election.

Greco, who lives at 2 Morse Place, was building inspector for 13 years. He resigned last October to accept a position in private industry.

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## Nicholas Raimo First To File Council Petition

Nicholas Raimo, long active in Belleville's civic and community affairs, became the first official candidate for the May election when he filed his petition to represent Belleville's First Ward.

Raimo, 40, was born in Belleville and now resides at 25 Harrison Street. Best known for his service and work with veteran's organizations, he was founder and Commander of the Barbone-Mosco Post here. He has also served the Italian American War Veterans as State Commander, 1955-1957; National Jr. and Sr. Vice Commander 1957-1959, and

Volunteer Co. No. 2, then known as the Eastwood Co., had its headquarters. From 1888 to 1935 it hung in a 50-foot tower at the William Street firehouse.

One of its most joyous tollings was when it rang out the news that the Armistice on Nov. 11, 1918, turned the key of its chimes could be heard in all sections of town.

"The real advantage of the single curriculum is that it tends to develop the potential of students who are not too sure what areas they want to pursue," said George H. Brown, board member.

If the curriculum is successful it will be used in the new high school, said the board.

### GUIDANCE COUNSELOR

For additional work with each individual student that the curriculum change requires, the board authorized the superintendent to add another full-time guidance counselor to the high school staff. Half of the cost of this is reimbursed by the state, the

board said.

The split session requires Juniors and Seniors to begin classes at 8:30 a.m. and continue to 2:35 p.m., for a full eight periods. Freshmen and Sophomores will attend classes from 9:17 a.m. to 3:19 p.m., for their eight periods.

The plan calls for teachers to spend an additional daily hour in class.

George T. Lees, acting principal of the high school, was questioned about the teachers' opinion of the extended day.

"I could not truthfully say all teachers are wholeheartedly behind it," he said. "I think it is safe to say a majority at the present time is in favor of the plan. And I know it is safe to say, if past experience is any judge, we can expect wholehearted cooperation from our teachers once the plan goes into effect."

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

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## Gruhin's "Negligence"

Commissioner Robert Gruhin, Director of Public Works, apparently has assumed a new role. It appears that he has taken over the Public Transportation Division of local government which he voted four years ago to place in Commissioner Pico's Public Affairs Department.

It seems that Gruhin — after four years in office — has suddenly discovered that Belleville citizens are not receiving adequate public transportation. Without so much as a glance toward Pico, Gruhin contacted the N. J. Public Utilities Commission requesting that body consider a bus-transportation franchise to extend the No. 18 line which serves Newark and terminates at the Belleville-Newark line.

Gruhin's interest in our inadequate public transportation problem comes on the eve of a municipal election in which we find him campaigning for a Council seat in a form of government which he vigorously opposed.

And while Gruhin is pre-occupied trying to get some campaign mileage from his bus route No. 18 extension pitch, many Belleville taxpayers find their homes under water, because of flood conditions arising from the recent 3rd River overflow.

The flood conditions of the 3rd River are a direct responsibility of Gruhin's. While we have heard much talk from him during the past four years on this subject, the problem remains with us and we are no nearer a solution today than we were when Gruhin took office four years ago.

Homes in the area were inundated with six feet of water, completely flooding the cellars and reaching the first floor level of a number of homes. Washing machines, dryers, and other basement valuables were destroyed by the flood.

The Fairway Avenue residents who suffered most from the flooding conditions of the 3rd River have charged Gruhin with "neglect."

In our judgment Gruhin was not only guilty of gross negligence but the much more serious charge of dereliction of duty.

There is a taxpayer answer to Gruhin's dereliction — get rid of him at the May Council Election. With good men running against Gruhin the job should be easy. All the voters need is a reminder of Gruhin's sorry record in public office — and matching that record with his broken campaign pledges.

## Cheated Again

The citizens of Belleville have been cheated again. The two "great" parties — Democrats and Republicans — have seen fit to ignore our 35,000 residents and have awarded organization endorsement to Freeholder candidates with total disregard of Belleville's legitimate claim to representation.

For years our citizens have not had a direct voice on the Essex County Board of Freeholders. This despite the fact that we will contribute this year over \$125,000 to the Essex County government. Clearly we have taxation without representation.

The Essex County Republican organization is presently in the process of experiencing one of its periodical convulsive reorganizations. From the looks of things we see nothing in the GOP picture which will insure Belleville its rightful voice at the county government level.

As for the Democrats — that is another matter. ### Urges Reduction Of Firemen's 56 Hour Week

To the Editor:  
I have just learned from your paper that our firemen are working 56 hours per week. I was of the impression that their hours were the same as our police force.

These public servants have committed many heroic acts in their line of duty and are justified in their request for a 42-hour work week, which I feel should be granted. It would give them more time to spend with their families.

As a former State and County employee I never worked more than 40 hours per week around the clock. Being familiar with work schedules of this nature, I believe a solution can be found that would satisfy everyone.

#### NEW SCHEDULE

We have three fire houses in town with a total of 69 men, which includes captains and chief. It would be an easy matter to rewrite a new work schedule, granting our fire fighters a work week of 42 hours without the addition of any new men or any increase in the tax rate.

The town has approved a new high school, which will be ready in 1963. They have also approved the school budget, which was a good one, yet has increased wages of all school personnel.

Our firemen, all men of good material, are requesting a work week of 42 hours, not more money under the new form of government which the town will soon have. No new men will be added to the fire department.

I am urging the approval of the 42-hour work week on the grounds it can be done.

No significant changes have taken place with these sets during the last few years. Prices for these sets start at about \$15. Sometimes less, when they are used as a loss leader by a store for a special promotion. Prices range up to about \$40, and the amount of money you spend more, essentially buys better sound. In this vicinity we do not need a powerful set, there are plenty of stations available, just by the slightest turn of the dial.

The popular clock radios are still the same. The little knob are still there and they are a nuisance. Why someone does not make a clock radio with decent size knobs to set the wake up, slumber switch and the frequently used third little knob to turn the set on and off, is anybody's guess. The first manufacturer who will have a set with substantial sturdy knobs instead of the tiny, easily broken, hard to handle knobs should do a land office business.

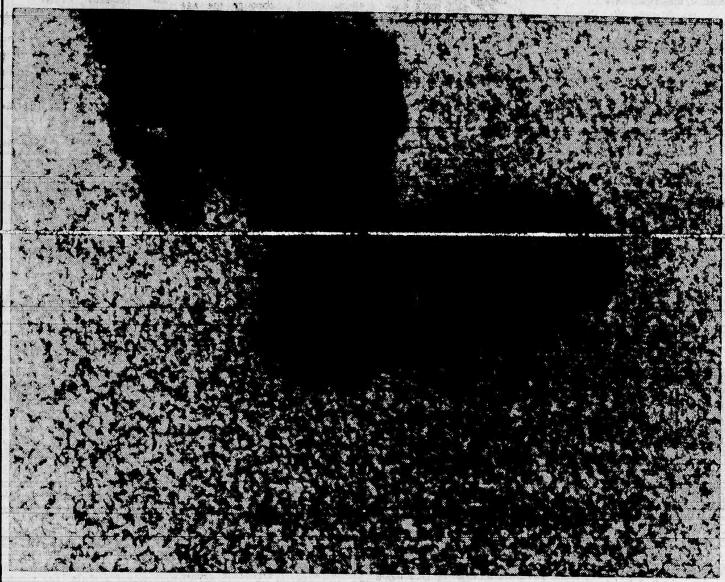
