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\$29,000 Third River Project Will Widen, Deepen River and Provide Embankments

An emergency appropriation for \$17,500 was one of several measures authorized by the Town Commission Tuesday night to help alleviate flooding in the area bordering the Third River. In order to overcome the floods that occur on Fairway Avenue after heavy rain, the Third River channel will be widened and deepened.

The commission accepted a bid from A. Corino & Son, 15 St. Mary's Place, to remove 10,000 cubic yards of dirt from the river channel for \$15,500. The additional \$2,000 appropriation will be used to erect gates at the Fairway Avenue entrance homes on the side of the Forest Hill Golf Course. These will serve as a backstop against the overflow from the river and a golf course pond, said Commissioner Robert C. Grubini, Public Works director.

Serious flooding on Fairway Avenue has plagued residents three times over the past two years. Homeowners were hit hardest last month when rains caused three to four feet of water in the street and brought up to six feet of water into cellars.

Plaques Await Winners Of Cherry Blossom Contests

THIRD RIVER BEND

The trouble spot has been the bend in the Third River. As the river fills, the rush of water cannot be contained. Instead of making the turn, water backs up, fills sections of the golf course and the street and goes into basements.

Plans call for the river to be widened and deepened from the Joramelon Street Bridge to the Bloomfield town line.

With the commission's action on the emergency appropriation could come final adoption of an ordinance for construction of permanent embankment for the Third River. The proposal had been continuously tabled since it passed a first reading on July 2, 1960.

Grubini said the ordinance had been delayed to allow its presentation as part of a more complete Third River project, for effective water control, the river channel must be protected at the Nalley end, Grubini explained during discussion about the ordinance.

Sugar Bowl Store Not Involved In Arrests

Belleville Police Chief Charles H. McGinnis said last week that recent arrests of five youths on narcotics charges did not in any way involve the Sugar Bowl at 306 Washington Avenue.

An out-of-town newspaper reported the arrests and court sentencing and referred to the Sugar Bowl in the story to indicate a general location area.

The police have requested the Times-News to make public the fact that the Sugar Bowl was in no way involved with the arrests. The Belleville Police Department has given the Sugar Bowl a clean bill of health.

As a result of the unfavorable publicity the Sugar Bowl's business has suffered immensely. Parents, in the mistaken belief the establishment was the locale of the arrests, have forbidden their children from patronizing it.

The youths were arrested at different points in town. The Sugar Bowl had nothing to do with the incident, the police chief said.

Democrat Chairman Is Issue Of Tuesday's Primary Vote: Republican Fight Subdued

Vara Defends 14-Year Record As Chairman In Primary Contest Between Two Democratic Factions

Belleville Republicans and Democrats go to the polls Tuesday from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. to pick congressional and freholder candidates and to elect members of the county committee. The local issue is in the Democratic County Committee race. Two factions have emerged and the town chairmanship is at stake.

Ralph Vara, who has held the post for the past 14 years, is being challenged by a group that is supporting Commissioner Harry J. Sullivan, director of Public Safety.

Mrs. Mae Mead Mazza, Vara's vice chairman, now trying to unseat him, said the opposition formed after the November election when Vara "publicly urged citizens to vote only for two Democratic candidates: Governor Hughes and Sheriff D'Aloia."

She called her opposition to Vara "legitimately political and completely justified." Vara, she insisted, "disqualified himself as a Democratic leader."

Vara has been a strong opponent of Dennis P. Carey, county Democratic chairman. This caused Vara to lose the regular party ballot line and designation for the primary election.

Vara's followers have adopted the designation "Democratic

County Committeeman." The Mazza group has the regular designation, "Regular Democratic Organization."

Vara has reacted by pointing to his 14-year record, which shows a positive rise in Democratic voting strength here. "When I came to office I inherited an organization that was unable to carry Belleville for a single Democratic candidate," he said. "Last November Belleville gave Democratic Governor Richard Hughes 6,676 against his opponent's 5,072."

Majority of 1,500 votes. On the county level Democrat freeholders carried Belleville by an average 1,000 majority over the Republican's 11,772 voters casting ballots.

The Republican contest is subdued. In marked contrast to Democratic double ballots, the Republican ballot is blank in many

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Cavalcade Of Progress A Sellout

All booths for the Cavalcade of Progress have been reserved, announced James Devaney, chairman.

The Cavalcade, sponsored by the Belleville Chamber of Commerce, will be held May 3, 4 and 5 at the Belleville Roller Rink. Exhibitors will display in the Cavalcade's 45 booths.

Newest firms to reserve booths are, J. Walker & Co., Investments, Olympic Bowl and Try, Chim line.

Devaney said exhibitors would set up their displays on May 1 and 2 so the Cavalcade would be ready for the opening at 2:30 p.m. on Thursday, May 3.

The promotion committee under the leadership of Harold Richter has arranged for a bus to provide free transportation to the show from the western and eastern parts of Belleville that are not reached by public transportation. The route will be decided later.

Most business houses in Belleville have tickets for the cavalcade, which they are giving to customers, Devaney said. Laterza Launches Voter-Education In New Wards

Sharply criticizing the "do nothing" attitude of incumbents in Belleville's City Hall, Robert M. Laterza, independent candidate for council - manager form of government, this week embarked on an educational program for Belleville voters to acquaint them with the newly established alignment of the town's two wards, establishments of new voting districts and other information for the May election.

At the same time Laterza promised an administration of Belleville's affairs "that will instill a personal pride in every voter by giving them an efficient and well-balanced program through a voice in government."

Laterza said he comes "well-qualified and equipped for the post of councilman despite whispering campaigns emanating from political machines."

He said his life-long residence in Belleville - his father and grandfather also planted their roots in Belleville - his education, professional and business background and his association with various civic and fraternal groups give him the necessary qualifications to understand Belleville's problems and push for improvements in the town.

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Pico Stresses His Experience Of Four Years

Nuncio R. Pico, commissioner and director of Public Affairs, stressed his experience and cautioned voters that qualified candidates must be elected to represent them in the new council-manager government.

Pico is running for one of three councilman at-large seats. At the official opening of his campaign headquarters at 476 Washington Avenue, Pico told a crowd of one hundred persons that "now more than ever, the voters of Belleville must elect qualified



the duties of the social case worker would be assumed by John J. Hewitt, Director of Welfare, working on a full time basis. "This will make possible complete service to our people at lessened expense," the board said.

Pico, in response to questions from board members, gave a resume of the first year's activities of the Dental Clinic, now an adjunct of the Municipal Health Department. Other changes of the Department of Public Affairs include more extensive use of Public Health nurses in conformation with the minimum standards of New Jersey State Department of Health.

Third River

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Golden, town critic and councilman-at-large candidate, attacked an ordinance on Civil Service salary ranges, affecting 16 town positions. Golden called the ordinance, which passed first reading, "part of the usual trend of omnibus, extraneous legislation" of town employees being hired, jobs created and then made permanent, followed by salary increases in excess of the present scale.

Also passed on first reading was an appropriation of \$38,000 for improvement on Greylack Parkway from Washington Avenue to Union Avenue. The measure calls for reconstruction of the existing parkway island to four feet, 11.5 to 12 feet. Golden said the cost would not be assessed against individual property owners in the area.

FAIRWAY AVENUE PARK

Under questioning from Daniel Gabriel of 107 Cella Terrace, Commissioner George F. Kiernan, director of Parks and Public Property, said he still hoped to get funds for a park on Fairway Avenue. Kiernan's proposal for \$40,000 for a park there failed twice to gain the necessary four votes for passage.

He said he planned to release certain recreation lands for public sale. With the money going back to the Recreation Department from the sales, Kiernan said he hoped "to accumulate enough funds to go ahead with condemnation" and apply for State matching funds under the Green Acres program.

The land Kiernan wants for a park at the foot of Fairway Avenue is owned by Kruman and DePetro. Clifton real estate firm that hopes to build luxury apartments on the site.

community security and growth, but the beginning of a new effort to overcome past mistakes and guard against further mistakes" he said in a statement.

"An election in our free society is reaffirmation that government is still by the people as a whole regardless of mistakes, and not by directives from an ambitious press, power seeking organization, or self-styled 'Crusaders.' Unless the voters guard this right, they are in danger of being deprived of it by aggressive men who believe such a right is theirs to exercise, while they make it the duty of others to follow their lead."

"I believe the people of Belleville who are old enough to vote are also old enough to spot the wolf in sheep's clothing. The motto is, 'promise them anything, but give them the run-around after election.'"

"The responsibility of a continuing thing. The voter cannot leave the voting booth and go home and sit down with folded hands and wait for the plums of prosperity to fall into his lap. The old saying, 'All good things come to him who waits,' does not mean that we wait in idleness. Nor can candidates promise many great and daring innovations while campaigning and bow out of the fulfillment of those promises after the campaign is over, win or lose. The man who dares to put himself before the people as a candidate for public office is honest bound to promise only that which he is potentially capable of fulfilling if elected and which he will continue to work for if he is not elected. In this way the voter and the candidate make community progress a living goal."

DEFENDS BELLEVILLE

"I believe a candidate should be truthful, and the truth is we are not replacing commissioners with councilmen because Belleville is on the verge of collapse. I despise those who picture our town as burdened by a corrupt administration, run down businesses, inadequate police protection and a woefully unhappy citizenry."

"As a councilman for the first ward I would want to have a survey made of the ward as to its physical and cultural needs before any move was made towards redevelopment as set forth in the overall Master Plan. I would want this survey to be made by a committee of responsible citizens living in the area. As I have said before, ward government can be a blessing or a curse, depending on the people chosen to leadership. The first ward's

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


Extra trucks will be furnished to remove the large accumulation. No stumps, plaster, soil or tree trunks will be picked up.






Phi Beta Kappa Honors For Patricia A. Maucione

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

the understanding know-how of what is intended setting up the new government. That is why it is imperative that my experience and knowledge in this field be best utilized through my election to the new governing body so that both the public and the new councilmen may benefit from a modern administrative code to implement the new charter and set up a completely new departmental structure. The new code must define the scope of operation of all departments and pinpoint the responsibility of every official."

NO GAG RULE

"This new administrative code, actually will be the framework of the new government. As such it must be our Magna Carta and guarantee of citizen's rights that protect the principles of free speech and lawful assembly. That blots out vicious 'gag rules' and returns government to the people that consolidated those departments which can be operated together most efficiently and economically while separating those which are cumbersome and unwieldy. Without this essential tool of good government it will be impossible for Belleville to operate effectively. That is why my election becomes essential to the future of Belleville at this crucial period in its history."

"Many would call upon outside experts on municipal government to draft such a code, such as William Miller, Princeton professor who worked on the Faulkner Act and directed the formation of many city's administrative codes. This is expensive and unnecessary," Golden said. He considered that "experienced councilmen, who are trained in local government, such as he would be, are capable, with proper legal advisory assistance and should be forthcoming from the town council, to draw up and formulate a municipal administrative code patterned from other communities and tailored to fit the needs of Belleville which would be both workable, efficient and inexpensive. That is what Belleville people want and I'm disposed to give to them."

Golden suggested "between election of the new councilmen and the first start of the new government, that work and consultation on the new administrative code get underway so that the governmental machinery is ready the moment the new administration begins."

He reminded voters it is "vital that they elect those to office who have demonstrated by past performance they know local government," such as himself; in this area which encompasses the important role of representing your welfare, it is urgent that those who have already demonstrated their concern for your interests be given first consideration.

Golden insisted no other candidate could boast of his record of attendance at past council meetings.

taxpayers to compare their tax load with comparable properties. Only by comparison can one be confident that each taxpayer is carrying his fair share.

"I also favor a monthly publication of all assessments and additions, decreases and increases."

"If my proposals are adopted by the new council taxpayers and city hall employees alike will be receiving fair treatment."

"All leading state tax experts have urged publication of tax assessments, including former Governor Robert B. Meyner."

Many New Jersey municipalities have already taken the step.

"As a member of the new Town Council I would urge the adoption of a law to publicize any assessment of real estate which does not use a deed transaction as the basis for real estate taxes."

"(1) To make every effort to have the new council obtain for Belleville an intelligent qualified manager, free from political wranglings, and keep him that way. With a motto 'Pay and share alike and special privileges for none.' You can't please everybody in this case, but neither can you fool everybody; let the chips fall where they belong, no matter who gets hurt."

"(2) All aspirations of the council for yearly gains and pay raises must be stopped cold by ordinance; that no gains and pay raises can be obtained without approval and vote by the taxpayers. I would propose 600 to 800 dollars as maximums, anyone looking for the opening of a new goldmine in Belleville

NO SPECIAL PRIVILEGES

"(3) While strict supervision of the manager is in order, no restriction or pressure must be applied to favor groups of one kind or the other seeking special privileges."

"(5) Overhauling is one of Belleville's greatest evils. Only one man for every job that requires only one man."

"(6) The Water Department has been more or less used as a sugar plum for the political playboys. Investigation and a clean-up is in order."

INVESTIGATION

"(11) I want to encourage homeowners to improve their property and keep it in order, but without fear of having outrageous uncalled for taxes imposed. We want no slum districts in Belleville."

"(12) I am in complete favor to improve the recreation facilities such as skating rinks, swimming pool, parks, youth center, etc."

"(13) To obtain recreation improvements, the county should provide real estate and also should carry its proper share of financial help; and there is no good reason why Belleville should not have it and why the taxpayers should carry all the burden."

ning board, zoning board of adjustment or personnel board in the municipality, and may create commissions and other bodies with advisory powers. L. 1950, c. 210, p. 487, 9-9.

Comment: "It is apparent from this provision that members of the Council must be capable individuals with the necessary background skill and experience to determine what is needed on an objective basis. They must also be uncommitted politically so that only those appointments which are absolutely vital to the interests of the community are made and that this is done in unbiased and impartial manner."

40-69A-90 Departments, Boards and offices, Deputy Manager:

"The municipal council shall continue or create, and determine and define the powers and duties of such executive and administrative departments, boards and offices, in addition to those provided for herein, as it may deem necessary for the proper and efficient conduct of the affairs of the municipality, including the office of deputy manager which shall not be included in the classified service under Title II of the Revised Statutes. Any department, board of office so continued or created may at any time be abolished by the municipal council. L. 1950, c. 210, p. 487, 8-10.

Comment: "It is important that we realize that a good councilman must have executive and administrative experience in order to determine and define the powers and duties of executive and administrative departments, boards or offices. Good intention, alone, is not enough. Therefore, in making your selection of councilmen on May 8, I urge all voters to weigh each candidate carefully."

Until now, Laterza said in launching his voter-educational program, "City Hall has done nothing to inform the people of the circumstances and requirements surrounding the elections and the new form of government. The only action City Hall has taken, and that action is a mandate from the State of New Jersey, is the printing and distribution of sample ballots."

"To make up for the laxity," Laterza said he and his supporters are now making personal deliveries to "each home in town" a map showing the dydlog lines for the wards, voting districts and data containing other pertinent information.

"The politicians and the political machines have conveniently overlooked the distribution of this vital information and their reason for it is obvious—they seek to entrance themselves in office for personal gain," Laterza said.

The candidate described his current educational campaign as his initial step in making every resident in town a part in the administration of Belleville's affairs when he takes office. As a member of the council, Laterza added, "all citizens will be informed and kept abreast of

the town's business so that they participate in them."

STIMULATE CIVIC PRIDE

"Only through such educational programs and information can the people be expected to take an interest and a part in their government. And this is the kind of program the people want. There is no question it will stimulate civic pride and interest and consequently lead to a better and more prosperous Belleville."

"Voter educational projects will be a major step in cutting down the domination of government among those political groups interested solely in personal selfishness."

Citing his background, Laterza said he would let the voters decide on his capabilities to take the lead in giving Belleville a better administration for tax monies contributed to the town.

A third generation of a family that settled in Belleville in the 1890's, Laterza attended Greylock School Five, and was graduated from Belleville High School. He attended Rutgers College of Pharmacy and was president of his junior and senior class. While at Rutgers, he was captain of the basketball team that won two championships.

unheard of individuals who unexpectedly loomed on the local political scene."

Bass, president of the Rutan Estates Homeowners Association, charged that the sudden emergence of new organizations "smacks of a cheap program of seeking unearned publicity for unworthy candidates who have never done anything constructive for the town and now get to have the spotlight played upon them because some handful of ambitious individuals desirous of shaping the town's destiny from behind the scenes come forward with a paper organization of about five people in a clever effort to 'by-pass' the real leaders who have uncovered the dirt and waste that has characterized town hall."

MOTIVES CHALLENGED

Bass challenged "the motivations of such groups" and called for a "full public listing of the full roster of membership of all organizations going about trying to build up 'paper-tiger' candidates that have no record of public achievement nor activity."

"Their's seems to be an indirect way of confusing the voters with untried candidates without experience, put into the race to flood the field and make it impossible for the experienced commissioners to get back in."

Bass said his candidacy was "as an unattached aspirant who will continue his fight to bring relief for the people from the heavy burdens of costly and poor government such as we have endured for the past four years." He promised he would "bring the truth to the people of the sad conditions that are the outgrowth of poor town administration and indifference by the present officeholders to the needs of the citizens and taxpayers."


