## That Unpaid \$8,000 Invoice

Since last September our able Town Treasurer, Francis H. McCoy, has refused to pay an invoice submitted by the Franklin Contracting Co. for work it performed in patching up our roads after the devastating 1960 winter season.

The industrious and hardworking town Purchasing Agent, Thomas J. McLaughlin, processed the invoice attaching thereto to a qualified approval which caused McCoy to wrinkle his brow.

Town critic James Golden invited Essex County Prosecutor Brendan Byrne to inspect the Franklin Contracting invoice and the contract which was relied upon as the authority for the work performed.

Prosecutor Byrne's office has been inspecting the contract and the invoice since September 29, 1961 — a full seven and a half months ago. For three months we have attempted to obtain information from the office of Prosecutor Byrne regarding the status of his investigation — but all we get is evasion — evasion — evasion. Not a satisfactory answer is in the carload of questions.

Mayor Isadore Padula who on September 26 voted to approve payment of the Franklin Contracting Co. invoice of \$7,896.50, on October 11 made a statement to the press that he would not sign the invoice. The Belleville Contracting Co. until the prosecutor completed his investigation.

As of this writing the Franklin Contracting invoice is unpaid. Prosecutor Brendan Byrne should tell the people of Belleville whether or not his investigation is complete — and what are the results of his investigation. If the investigation is not complete — why not? Seven months and two weeks have passed us by since Byrne was asked to look into the contract and the invoice.

Rumors have been widespread that local city hall politicians would make attempts to influence the Prosecutor's office with respect to this investigation. Delay gives aid and comfort to the rumor mongers.

Mayor Isadore Padula should tell the people of Belleville what is the status of the \$7,896.50 invoice. He approved the invoice for payment — but why does he now — eight months after that approval withhold his signature from the check. If Franklin Contracting performed the work as alleged — if the services were legally contracted for — then why should the Town of Belleville withhold payment of the invoice? Is the transaction illegal? Or don't we have the money?

On October 10 Padula's handpicked Town Attorney, Thomas D'Avella ruled that the invoice was legal and justified. Is there anything going on "behind" this invoice that the politicians don't want the people to know?

The contract originally was awarded to the low bidder, Franklin Contracting Co. for \$5,735.00. An invoice was processed and paid on account of this contract in July, 1961 to the tune of \$6,933.50. Both the Town Treasurer McCoy and Purchasing Agent McLaughlin assumed this payment completed the contract. Imagine their surprise when another bill was submitted in September calling for the payment of an additional \$7,896.50!

According to Town Treasurer McCoy the bid contained an unusual clause — it permitted a 100 per cent increase in the amount of work called for under the contract bid specifications. McCoy says in his 27 years experience at Town Hall his recollection is that clauses concerning increased quantities under a bid document usually provide for an increase of 50 per cent. Last October McCoy said, "this 100 per cent clause is unusually high."

The problem was compounded when James Golden discovered that the overall cost of the contract exceeded the original bid price by 150 per cent going from an original \$5,735 to \$14,879.

And this isn't all — while the overall cost of the contract increased 150 per cent some individual items recited in the contract may have been increased by as much as 500 per cent. Was this legal? Has our distinguished town attorney ruled on this point? Has Prosecutor Byrne ruled on this point? Has the Prosecutor referred this matter to the Essex County Grand Jury? As Director of Revenue and Finance, has Mayor Isadore Padula examined thoroughly all facets of the contract and the invoice?

The people are entitled to the answers — and in time for the June 12th Town Council election.

## The Big Winner

Who is the greatest beneficiary, financially, from profit-making private enterprise?

Some figures from the 1961 annual report of one of our hundreds of oil companies are enlightening. This company's (\*) total revenue was \$702,293,000 of which costs, operating and general expenses, intangible development costs, depreciation, cost depletion and retirements and interest took \$732,506,400. Profit amounted to 6.4 cents on each dollar after operating expense. The company paid in direct taxes to all levels of government, \$46,841,000. Taxes levied on products sold by the company and on its employees — all collected and paid over to federal, state and local governments — totaled \$19,388,000.

The stockholders who risked their money in developing this oil property over many years received cash dividends totaling \$13,047,000 plus a six per cent stock dividend. In other words, Government profited nearly four times as much from this one oil company operation as did the shareholders who risked their money to make it possible.

Tens of thousands of private enterprises pay proportionate taxes to maintain our \$100 billion national budget and \$300 billion national debt. As taxpayers and jobmakers, they face all kinds of legislative and regulatory schemes that make it more difficult to operate.

It would seem reasonable to suppose that lawmakers would encourage rather than discourage the source from which government derives its support.

## "Exercise In Tyranny"

Indianapolis, Ind., was the scene recently of a dramatic and, perhaps, historic constitutional fight. It was in that city that The Kroger Co., a retail food chain, defied the Federal Trade Commission in its investigation of low milk prices.

The company objected to the conduct of the investigation on the grounds that the hearings were contrary to the rules of practice of the Commission, in conflict to decisions of the Supreme Court of the United States, and prohibited under the Bill of Rights of the Constitution. In a statement filed with the FTC, Kroger declared its position was in defense of fundamental principles of justice and decency, as well as in defense of the right of the consumer to purchase milk at low prices.

Although the Indianapolis issue is extremely complicated, it was very simply stated by the Indianapolis Star in a lead editorial: "Constitutional government, not the price of milk in Marion County, is at stake."

Barron's financial magazine in a front page editorial called it: "Exercise in Tyranny" and quoted former FTC Commissioner Lowell B. Mason as follows: "Inquisition without warrant, punishment without trial."

Kroger, along with several other retail food companies in Indianapolis, was subpoenaed by the Federal Trade Commission and ordered to produce various documents before an FTC hearing examiner. Kroger charged that it was incompatible with the American judicial system to allow charges to be hurled in public against anyone who is simultaneously denied any opportunity for self-defense — which is precisely what the examiner did — and that such a procedure is characteristic of the police state.

In these days of spreading bureaucracy and law by administrative ruling, it is refreshing to find a citizen — individual or corporate — who has the courage to stand up and be counted.

with food supplies, medical supplies and radiological instruments at government expense.

Phase 1 has been completed and involved the selection and establishing those areas having a safety factor of 20 per cent or over and this was done by engineers sent out by the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers.

Phase 2 is now under way, and the owners or representatives of those buildings which have been approved by the Federal Agency will be contacted and asked to sign an agreement whereby these spaces will be open to the public in an emergency. This program will be voluntary.

Phase 3 will be an attempt by the Federal Government to improve such shelters at Federal expense for which they will pay \$2 for each square foot of space in all areas — accepted as shelters. This phase will at first apply to schools, hospitals and public welfare buildings, and then expand toward the privately owned properties.

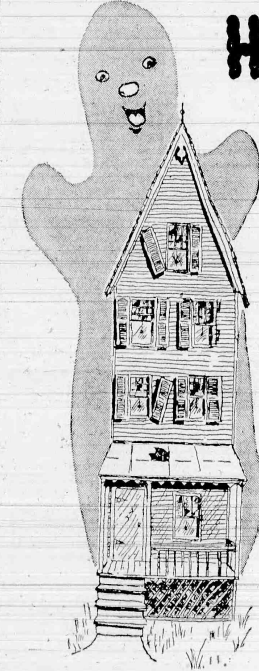

# Realtor Head Advises Homeowners To Be Careful

With the Spring home repair and improvement season once more at hand, homeowners were warned today by Wm. J. Maddams, president of the Bloomfield, Glen Ridge, Nutley and Belleville Board of Realtors, to beware of racketeers operating in this field.

"The eagerness of many homeowners to repair winter damage to their residences or to take advantage of the favorable Spring weather in making additions or improvements is commendable," Mr. Maddams explained. "As Realtors know, home maintenance is an essential factor in conserving property and neighborhood values and standards. And as long as our homeowners contract with our many established, reputable repair and maintenance firms for services and products, results will be good.

"Unfortunately, however, Spring always brings a return of fly-by-night operators who annually 'take' the public for millions. It is against this latter group that homeowners should be on guard."

Mr. Maddams said that, in issuing his warning, he was following a suggestion made to all Realtors by their national organization, the National Association of Real Estate Boards. He pointed out that NAREB and its members have consistently sought to protect the interests of property owners in all fields.

While there is no hard and fast rule that may be used by homeowners in distinguishing between the claims made by the racketeers and reputable firms, Mr. Maddams cited six simple steps that have been developed by the Federal Trade Commission from its experience in investigating home improvement frauds. These are:

1. Before signing up for any offered service or product, get comparable cost estimates from at least one competing firm. Reputable merchants are quite willing to have this done. "Hit-and-run" organizations will immediately think of scores of reasons why the homeowner should sign up with them immediately.
2. Obtain names and addresses of previous customers from the soliciting firm and contact these customers. Note in particular how long they say the work or product has been satisfactory.
3. Make sure the firm has a place of business. Many fly-by-night groups operate out of temporary headquarters, such as a hotel room.
4. If the product or service is said to be guaranteed, find out exactly what is guaranteed, any conditions that are attached to the guarantee and who will make good on it if necessary and where he can be located.
5. Back up suspicions and ask many more questions if the price of the service or product is a great deal lower than the going price in Bloomfield, Glen Ridge, Nutley and Belleville for similar services or products. There are, of course, real bargains. But many so represented are no more than bait.

Mr. Maddams urged homeowners who find that they have been cheated despite taking these precautions to report their experiences to the proper authorities as a public service.

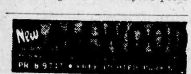


# Schedule Is Made Up For Summer Classes In Belleville School

# Grade Schools Science Fair Well Attended

During the past week, each of the Belleville Elementary schools sponsored a Science Fair which was well-attended. Many of the projects were started in the beginning of the school year on an individual or committee basis.

At School One exhibits included an atomic reactor plant, a city water supply, a miniature machine shop, and a model of Cape Canaveral with a space capsule. Experiments were conducted to demonstrate conduction, convection, gravity, and centrifugal force.

School Two displayed charts, murals, and scientific collections, along with demonstrations conducted by the children on each grade level.

School Three displayed a model space station and capsule, the growth of a frog, the six most important alloys; a low frequency transmitter; the digestive system; and a hot air heating system. They also showed models of the heart and brain.

At School Four some of the feature displays were a model missile base, a volcano, a space suit, the eclipse of the sun, life on the moon, a crystal radio, and a telegraph set.

School Five introduced a novel feature to add to their many displays. They presented a dramatization of scientists from antiquity to the present day in a program titled, "Who's Who in Science."

This was a continuous performance on Wednesday evening. School Seven displayed projects on the telephone and telegraph, heating systems, electricity, water systems, electric conveyor, volcanoes, and elevators.

At School Eight there were presentations of simple machines, plant life, sound, weather, electricity and volcanoes. School Nine showed a space capsule, testing grounds, rockets, and missiles. Other displays included engines, plastics, electromagnets, and weather instruments.

School Ten displayed murals, charts, and scientific principles were demonstrated. The youngsters have been working on their projects as an out-of-school activity under the guidance of their classroom teachers. To accommodate the parents who could not attend the afternoon programs, each school scheduled an evening performance.

The annual science fairs in Belleville have served as a stimulus to youngsters during this period when increased emphasis is being placed on science. Students have become aware of the competitive nature of our space efforts, and a program of this nature demonstrates their desire to develop better scientific skills and knowledge.

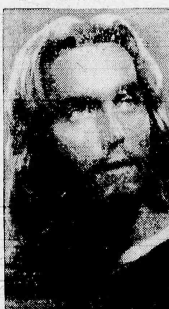

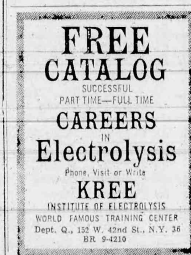

# Skin Divers Cautioned On Safety By Montclair YMCA Administrator

Skin and SCUBA diving, relatively unknown in this country only a decade ago, today ranks among our most popular water sports, and their popularity is still climbing.

According to Herbert S. Burleigh, general secretary of the Montclair YMCA, more than 11 million Americans have literally taken the plunge into the dim, mysterious underwater world opened up by diving.

"Because of the fascination of underwater exploration, more and more sport fans are attracted to diving," Mr. Burleigh said. "Unfortunately, many of them don't take the trouble to learn how to dive properly. They see somebody put on a mask and flippers and jump into the water on television and they think that's all there is to it. So, they try it, and two, often, find themselves in trouble."

A pioneer in water safety and water recreation, the YMCA has developed standards for skill and safety in diving, he said. Standards adopted at a recent national aquatic conference are followed at all YMCA pools and camps that teach diving. The Montclair YMCA offers two courses a year in skin and SCUBA diving for adults and two courses for high school boys.

## LEARN TO SWIM

As part of its continuing campaign to reduce accidents and drownings, the YMCA advises learning to swim as the first step in any water activity, Mr. Burleigh pointed out. In the case of diving, being a good swimmer is essential.

"Unless you are a good swimmer, diving is not for you," warns Mr. Burleigh. "Even then, it may not be. Before you try it, get a medical checkup to find out if you can take underwater swimming. Not everyone can."

Because it requires little equipment and training, skin diving is by far the more popular form of diving, explains Mr. Burleigh. But it can be just as dangerous, he adds, if you don't know what you're doing.

"The name skin diving is actually something of a misnomer," says Mr. Burleigh. "Skin divers usually lower themselves into the water. They may sometimes jump in feet first, but they never dive while wearing a mask and flippers. In fact, doing so can be dangerous."

## LITTLE NEEDED

Although only a face mask and flippers are needed for skin diving, both should fit properly, he cautions. The mask must be airtight; when you inhale through your nose the mask should stay on your face by suction alone.

Incidentally, ear plugs should never be worn in diving. Flippers aid amazing speed to your RUDY SYSTEM swimming. They should fit snug, but without chafing or interfering with circulation. And, not too flexible.

Underwater know-how in diving is quite simple, Mr. Burleigh said, but important for safety. Before diving, take a couple of deep breaths, then an ordinary one for the dive itself. Until you are experienced, it's best to stick to water you know pretty well, and which is safe. Once in the water, go down slowly and being sure to "pop" your ears as you go down. To do this, every five feet of drop, hold the mask tight against your face and snort lightly through the nose. That should clear your ears. If it doesn't, or if you feel your ears hurt, don't go any deeper than 30 feet at any time.

Always use the "buddy system" in diving. Mr. Burleigh recommends. Don't go down without a partner, and stay in sight of each other at all times, even in familiar water. Strong tides and rough water can be dangerous, avoid them. If you happen to cut yourself or are bleeding, get out of the water immediately. SCUBA (Self Contained Underwater Breathing Apparatus) diving calls for more elaborate equipment and a lot more training, Mr. Burleigh explained. Do not try it without expert instruction and supervised practice. A good book on diving is no substitute for a certified course but your ears hurt, don't go any deeper than 30 feet at any time.
