NEW JERSEY'S Governor Meyner and Attorney General Furman are to be congratulated for their fast action in naming two deputy attorneys general to probe the Mafiacontrolled \$200,000 dice game in Belleville exposed by this newspaper.

Of this amount \$7,896.50 remains unpaid as of this writing, although the invoice has been approved by Revenue and Finance Director Isadore Padula and his colleagues, and ruled legal by Town Attorney Thomas D'Avella. James Golden is the reason the invoice remains unpaid — almost a year after the contract was approved. Golden charged that it was illegal for the Commission to increase the original bid by 150 per cent. Apparently Golden has something, for the bill remains unpaid despite the opinion by D'Avella.

The Committee for Economic Development has outlined a program designed to reduce "economic illiteracy" in this country, And, going by all the available evidence, it's high time.

The Committee's announcement, which is advanced to teachers writers publish.

is addressed to teachers, writers, publishers, business and civic leaders, among others, observes that better understanding of how our economy operates "is vital to the survival of the American society." All manner of surveys have shown that we lack that kind of inderstanding to an alarming degree. We are, as a nation, weefully ignorant of how the American enterprise system works, what makes it tick, what it earns in profit and pays out in taxes, and so on down a long, long list.

The Committee's projected program lays special stress on the teaching of expensive in the high schools According to

onomies in the high schools. According to it, the opportunity to give a majority of imericans some knowledge of economics is lost after high school — only a quarter of the students attending college take economics courses. This will be implemented according to the plan by a nationwide television course in economics addressed both to teachers and to students. We can't have informed students unless we have sound economics teaching — and, says the Committee, less than a fourth of the hation's high school social studies teachers are believed to be adequately prepared to teach the subject.
