

PEOPLE SMASH THE POLITICAL MACHINE!

Jubilant Winners And Their Wives Demonstrate Their Joy Voters Show They

Want A Cleaner, Better Bellville

The voters of Belleville—better than 10,000 strong—went to the polls Tuesday and in a tremendous demonstration of the power of the ballot brought the long-entrenched Belleville political machine to a screaming halt.

School Board Meets Monday

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Bids will be accepted at 8:30 for the shoring up of the wall at School 4.

Some teacher resignations are expected to be accepted, and some new teacher contracts may be awarded.

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Mayor Isadore Padula said that in a brief conversation with a representative of the County Prosecutor's office he had been told it would be well to hold off payment until there was no further question about its validity.

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In the at-large contest the two present commissioners and the one former commissioner who were running were almost ignored by the electorate, whereas Thomas P. Greco, who was once deposed as Town Building Inspector by former Commissioner Kenneth D. Smith, garnered 822 votes to become high man, James R. Golden, an outspoken critic of the present government and high man in the May 8 election, came in second with 6,096 votes. G. George Addonizio, who unsuccessfully ran twice for Congress against Representative Peter Rodino and last year was an independent candidate for Governor, placed third with 4,696 votes.

The losers were Commissioner Nuncio R. Roy with his pre-election endorsement of Greco and Golden failing to carry him to victory with them; Commissioner Harry J. Sullivan, whose total vote of only 3,685 was one of the surprises of the race; and former Commissioner Smith, who was low man in the contest with 3,385 votes.

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In Ward 1 Vincent Strumolo piled up 2,790 votes to overwhelm machine-backed candidate Nicholas Raimo, who was able to garner only 1,832 votes. Strumolo throughout the campaign adopted a policy of strict independence and constructive proposals, and this proved popular with the voters.

In Ward II Robert M. Laterza, well known Belleville pharmacist, who likewise conducted a clean-cut campaign, came through the winner by 1,336 votes over his rival, John Bass. The vote: Laterza, 3,134; Bass, 1,738. The total vote cast in the election was 10,655, a figure close to the 10,690 forecast by The Times-News last week. There are approximately 17,000 registered voters in Belleville.

Casale, 11 Emmet Street, treasurer.

President Griffin promised that both she and her fellow officers would do all in their power to bring relief and assistance to those afflicted with a stroke in the Belleville area. She called upon all citizens to help in this endeavor. She emphasized the need for the Foundation in view of the ever increasing number of strokes (over two million) occurring annually in this country.

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Belleville Post Plans To Present American Legion School Award Again

Belleville Post 105, American Legion, is again presenting to the boy and girl graduates of the eighth grade public and parochial schools the American Legion School Award.

This medal and certificate were well received last year and are expected to go over big again this year.

The award is designed to place emphasis on the development of the qualities of honor, courage, scholarship, leadership and service; to develop those ideals of Americanism among young people which will make them citizens of the highest type; and to give recognition through the award of the American Legion medals to the boy and to the girl who are deemed most worthy of the high qualities of citizenship and of true Americanism.

Qualities to be developed are outlined as follows:

Honor — Highly developed moral character; moral excellence; strength and stability of character;

high standards of conduct; devotion to duty; adherence to truth; keen sense of what is right; practice of clean speech and thoughts.

Courage — Bravery in the face of opposition and danger; determination and force to do the right without public applause and regardless of personal advantage. A quality of the intellect.

Scholarship — Attainments in school studies; quality of school work reflecting the fine traits of industry; perseverance; efficiency and intelligence.

Leadership — Ability to lead and to accomplish through group action; ability to work in harmony and in unison with other

leaders in accomplishing group results; desire and ability to fill the voids in the lives of others caused by sickness, illness, and other handicaps.

Service — Kindness; unselfishness; fellowship; protection of the weak; promotion of the interests and the welfare of associates; and constructive aid for the upbuilding of schools and of community.

Charter Day Observance Set For Tonight

A special Charter Day observance will be held in Military Park Hotel, Newark, tonight, at 8 p.m. to recognize the newly organized Scout units in Robert Treat Council.

District Chairman Ernest Arjison will head the Belleville delegation.

The Mayor and the other Commissioners, with the exception of Gruhn, said they would prefer a definite and positive word from the prosecutor as their authority, rather than the absence of a reply to a letter.

Gruhn said the Commissioners should be ready to take some responsibility on their shoulders.

"This situation is unhealthy," he said. "It's government by threat, fear and intimidation, and it's time it stopped."

James R. Golden sat with the Commissioners during a caucus session preceding the regular meeting. He asked that the voters in Tuesday's election be given the opportunity to meet with the outgoing Commissioners and discuss methods for an orderly changeover from Commission government to Council-Manager government. The Commissioners did not warm to the suggestion. They said in substance that the changeover would come naturally enough on July 1 and that an overlapping of the two governments would be impractical.

mark such an important milestone in the history of Belleville. Prior to July 1 the new Council will choose a Mayor from among their number. Just who will get the nod is currently one of the most interesting speculations among the citizens of Belleville.

Golden, the man who polled the highest number of votes in the May 8 election, placed second on Tuesday, changing places with Greco, the second highest man on May 8. The job of Mayor might go to either of these men. However, there is nothing in the rules that would prevent it from going to Aldomizio or to either of the ward candidates — Laterza or Strumolo. If the votes for either of the ward men were projected town-wide, these totals would rank with the totals polled by the leading at-large candidates—especially Laterza with his 3,334 total in 11 districts. There are 23 districts in all in Belleville.

There will be two major appointments for the new Council to make. They will be that of Town Clerk and Town Attorney. The Mayor personally has the authority to appoint only members of the Library Board as vacancies on that body occur, a right invested in him by an act of the Legislature.
