

## Board Majority Sticks To Guns On Pupil Redistricting

Board of Education member Norma McCool argued for nearly an hour at a special meeting of the board Monday night in an effort to have the recently passed redistricting resolution rescinded but received support from only one other board member, Ernest S. Arvidson. The other five members were openly critical of the proposed move.

Mrs. McCool would have submitted a voluntary redistricting program in which parents who wished to cooperate would be encouraged to do so, but those who felt otherwise would not be forced into a change.

Nicholas Juliano called it an invitation to compounding of the "favoritism" charge already brought by parents in regard to previous changes in school districts. He said the results would be in direct proportion to how much individual pressure could be brought upon Superintendent of Schools Frank M. Durkee.

Dr. Frank DiRuggiero commented, "The favoritism of the past is just what we're trying to eliminate."

George Brown was openly caustic regarding the proposed redistricting of the redistricting resolution and said Mrs. McCool's substitute proposal made "no sense whatever."

Arthur M. Pico said he could not go along with any proposal to abandon controlled redistricting.

Board President Richard H. Drake said the board would lay itself open to the criticism that it did not know its own mind if it now abandoned its previously passed resolution. He reminded Mrs. McCool that the step had not been taken without due consideration, as she had charged, but after long study of the redistricting situation.

Mr. Arvidson offered an amendment of \$100,000 which also would have permitted transfers on a voluntary basis but which outlined some of the procedures more fully. He did not receive even Mrs. McCool's support on this.

Lee H. Garson, chairman of the education committee of the Citizens' Tax Council, renewed his demand that the board form a committee to investigate what the council calls "untruths told the public" about the new high school.

"If we decide to take other steps," he said, "the board will have only itself to blame for the resultant bad publicity."

Mr. Arvidson said the board would discuss the subject next Monday night and that the topic will appear on the agenda at the next scheduled meeting.

"There are members of this board just as desirous of finding out about this as you are," he told the representative of the tax group.

## Town Council To Meet Again Next Tuesday

The Town Council will meet at 8 Tuesday night to consider passage of the new administrative code. According to law, a tentative code must be on the books within 30 days after the council takes office by the new council. The body assumed its duties July 1. Later a permanent code will be introduced, advertised and a public hearing set. Following the hearing and possible revision, the code will become an integral part of the administration of the municipality.

At its meeting this Tuesday the Town Council authorized Mayor Robert M. Laterza to appoint a ten-member Advisory Transportation Committee to study problems of transportation that exist in Belleville and to make recommendations to improve facilities throughout the town.

The mayor was also named to the Second River Joint Meeting. When the council holds its first meeting in August, the portion of the meeting chamber will have been removed, thus affording much more space for spectators.

## Resident Asks Restrictions On Apartments

Paul J. Schwanenflugel of 70 Plunge Drive this week appealed to the Town Council for tighter building restrictions on low-rise apartments. He charged that, although they are called "garden" apartments, they currently are getting up in Belleville have no restrictions on this term especially implicit.

Schwanenflugel made his appeal by letter to Councilman Thomas P. Greco, with copies to Mayor Robert M. Laterza and Councilmen James R. Golden, George Addonizio and Vincent Strumolo. The letter follows:

"I've noticed recently, like many other people in town I'm sure, the presence of so-called 'garden' apartments in town. I use the word garden loosely since any resemblance to the garden apartment as we think of it is accidental. My concept of a garden apartment includes landscaped areas, play areas for children and ample parking facilities. These low-rise apartment houses under construction have none of these except a meager parking area."

"For a curious incident only to mention a property inspection of 24-room low-rise apartment house on Franklin Avenue and Arthur Street to see that the room allotted for parking is insufficient by today's standards. Are some of these cars doomed to parking in front of someone's house or on Franklin Avenue to aggravate the traffic problem to say nothing about violating the law against overloading street parking?"

"Many of these apartments are two-bedroom units which invariably include children. Where are they to play? In the parking lot at the risk of an auto accident? Or will they roam in groups to

### AN EDITORIAL:

#### Eugene G. Barnett

Followers of Acting Town Clerk, Eugene G. Barnett packed the Town Council chambers Tuesday night and designated spokesmen called upon the Council to support a resolution introduced by Councilman James Golden and supported by Councilman Thomas Greco, granting Barnett a four year appointment in the position of Town Clerk.

The four year appointment was opposed by Mayor Robert Laterza, Councilmen G. George Addonizio and Vincent Strumolo. They successfully supported a 30-day extension of Barnett's Acting Town Clerk status. This trio held that every effort should be made to engage a Town Manager who would be able and willing to discharge the additional duties of Town Clerk — all for one salary.

All applicants for the Town Manager's job interviewed to date by the Council, except one, readily agreed to take on the additional job of Town Clerk. In speaking it might be well to note that both Golden and Greco pointedly asked the Town Manager hopefuls if they would be willing to serve in the dual capacity. During the conferences with the expert drafting the Administrative Code it was Greco who has been insisting that the jobs of Town Manager and Town Clerk be combined as permitted under the Faulkner Act.

The question arises—can one Belleville municipal employee perform two jobs. Well, let's take a look at the record. Town Treasurer Francis McCoy has had the additional duty of Acting Town Manager since July 1. During these past three weeks McCoy has discharged successfully the duties of Town Treasurer, Assistant Town Treasurer (Isadore Padula Jr., Assistant Town Treasurer was away on a two week vacation), and all the duties performed prior to July 1 by Public Safety Director Harry Sullivan, Revenue and Finance Director Isadore Padula, Public Works Director Robert Gruhn, Public Affairs Director Nuncio Pico and Parks and Public Property Director George Kiernan. Quite an imposing composite task for Mr. McCoy — and incidentally — he is performing all this additional work AT NO EXTRA PAY!

What meaning does the possible consolidation of the duties of Town Manager and Town Clerk have for our oppressed taxpayers? What happens to Eugene G. Barnett if he is not continued in the position of Town Clerk? What would have been the result to the taxpayers if Greco and Golden prevailed in their determination to reappoint Barnett to a permanent four year term as Town Clerk?

Taking up the last question first — If Greco and Golden were successful Tuesday night in their effort to give Barnett a four year term as Town Clerk he would have come under tenure protection since the state law bestows lifetime tenancy upon a Town Clerk who has served five successive years in the office. The four year term proposed by Greco and Golden would have given Barnett more than the minimum five year continuous service as Town Clerk, thus securing the post for him until his retirement — a probable 25 years hence. The Greco-Golden action would have forever precluded the possibility of combining the two jobs. What would this mean in dollars and cents to our taxpayers?

Barnett is now drawing down a base pay of \$6500.00. In addition our taxpayers must pay pension contributions, social security taxes, and other fringe benefits such as Blue Cross and Blue Shield. But the Town Clerk's salary does not stop at \$8,500. Former Mayor Padula saw to that in January, 1961. In the not-too-distant future the job will be paying \$10,500 per year — plus fringe benefits — all for a 32½ hour week less coffee breaks, etc.

If Barnett secured reappointment Tuesday night he could have remained in the job for another 25 years and then retire. This action, supported by Greco and Golden would have cost the taxpayers an estimated cool \$300,000 or about a third of a million dollars!

With this money involved isn't it worth the effort suggested by Laterza, Addonizio and Strumolo to explore the possibility of obtaining a Town Manager who might be willing and capable of also performing the job of Town Clerk? What is there lost to defer action for 30

## Peter Torre Is Appointed Belleville Town Assessor

The Town Council made three appointments Tuesday night. It named Peter A. Torre Jr. assessor for one year, replacing Emanuel De Noia Jr. It reappointed Thomas D'Avella town attorney for one year. And it reappointed Eugene G. Barnett town clerk for 30 days.

The naming of Barnett was a point of high controversy. Supporters of a movement to appoint him for four years were

among those who packed the Council chamber, the stairs leading up to it and the street outside. Estimates of the entire crowd ranged from 250 to 400 persons.

A group calling itself Friends of Eugene Barnett presented a petition signed by 443 persons, calling for his permanent appointment as town clerk. Leslie W. Finch, principal spokesman for the group, said the names

were all those of registered voters and represented 26 per cent of the registered vote in Belleville. He said the signatures had been gathered in only two weeks. He made a strong plea for Barnett on grounds of personal friendship, the clerk's ability to do the job, and the unlikelihood that any real economy would be saved by eliminating the job. Some others who worked on the petition also spoke.

Councilman James R. Golden noted that there were more signers to the petition than there were votes cast for some of the councilmen at the polls. He offered a resolution to appoint Barnett to the clerk's post for four years, noting this would give him tenure in the job. Councilman Thomas P. Greco, in a switch from his previous position, seconded the resolution and demanded that Councilman George Addonizio also back the Barnett appointment, reminding Addonizio that he had previously endorsed the reappointment of the clerk.

Addonizio was nettled at Greco's insistence. He said he had considered it "a sad commentary" when a councilman found it necessary to threaten in order to make a point. He accused Greco of switching his position "like that" and he snapped his fingers. Addonizio was also critical of Golden, who had been jumping up and down and waving a stick with Barnett's name at the top.

"You're campaigning four years hence, Councilman Golden," he said. "But that's your prerogative. I'm not."

Councilman Vincent Strumolo offered an amendment to Golden's resolution, reducing the appointment to 30 days, ending August 31. He explained that he felt it only logical to wait until the administrative year is adopted, and a town manager is named.

On the vote for the amendment Mayor Robert M. Laterza, Addonizio and Strumolo voted yes, and Golden and Greco voted no. The Mayor said he had been told by some persons who had signed the petition for Barnett that they had been told by the councilmen that he, the Mayor, had requested the petition. "This, of course, was not so," Laterza said. "I certainly am a petitioner signer were not told the true story."

The Mayor told those gathered in the chamber that the Council had already interviewed several applicants for town manager and that all of them with one exception had agreed that the job of manager and clerk could be combined in one position.

Golden offered a resolution to appoint Emanuel De Noia Jr. assessor for a four-year term. Greco seconded this. Laterza then offered an amendment substituting the name of Peter Torre Jr. for the post and making the term one year. Golden protested the amendment and wanted his own resolution voted on first, but Town Attorney Thomas

## Licensing Of Civil Defense Shelter Spaces Strikes Snag

Belleville CD Director Ludwig Peas has revealed that many problems have arisen in soliciting license agreements from property owners and managers for use of fallout shelter space.

Under the National Survey Program, those who own buildings with suitable shelter space for 30 or more persons have been asked to sign license agreements which will permit marking of buildings with appropriate shelter signs, storage of supplies, and periodic inspections by local CD officials. The Federal government most hopes to establish throughout the country some 50 million shelter spaces this year for which \$168 million commitment has already been made.

More than 75 per cent of the license solicitations have been "falsified," Peas stated. "The reluctance on the part of the managing property owners in making the license is based on such reasons as invasion of privacy, concern over liability insurance

protection and general distrust in the shelter project."

A multitude of details and consequences will have to be taken into account and dealt with. Since the community Civil Defense program is based on a volunteer effort it would be an almost impossible task to correspond or consult with individuals. However, by clarifying the most common problems and misconceptions in the public press it is hoped that the holdouts will diminish," Peas asserted. He provided answers to the most common questions presented.

Who will be assigned to the shelter in the event of a real emergency? First availability for all practical purposes will be made to the occupants of the building whether it be tenants or employees. The second will be during off-business hours, the shelter space in industrial building would be made available to nearby residents or pedestrians. Access to the building's interior would be the charge of a responsible person.

days on a final decision concerning the permanency of the Town Clerk position? A little political advantage accruing perhaps by reason of soliciting the goodwill of Barnett's friends? For the taxpayers this is a small price for Council to pay when weighed against the possible saving of \$300,000 in tax money.

We say appoint the Town Manager first — and then make a determination and final disposition on the question of the office of Town Clerk.

Now what about Barnett's future. First it must be recognized as a fact of every day life under our new form of government that Belleville taxpayers should not be asked to pick up the tab to load the public payroll with persons seeking employment. Town Hall is not — and should not be an employment center. Is the Town Council obligated to place on the public payroll every Belleville citizen out hunting for a job? Where would this policy lead us?

But let us examine the fact with respect to Barnett. Will he be thrown out of a job as some people have been misled into accepting as fact? The answer is a simple NO. Barnett is at this very

moment on leave from his permanent job as Principal Clerk in the Revenue and Finance Department. And under the reorganization of our municipal government the position takes on added importance and significance. Barnett's Principal Clerk job is a civil service protected job — one he can hold for life. This job is waiting for him the moment he relinquishes his Acting Town Clerk position.

Frankly we were disappointed with the votes of Greco and Golden Tuesday night respecting their determination to make permanent a job that may prove within the next 30 days to be utterly unnecessary — resulting in a savings of \$300,000 over a period of time.

This newspaper supported the election of Greco and Golden. We had reason to believe these men would keep their oft-repeated campaign pledges to effect economies in Town Hall.

Their effort to bestow a four year term upon Barnett in the office of Town Clerk does not appear to be a redemption of campaign pledges the citizens accepted in good faith — and which led The Times-News to endorse both men.

We salute the courage displayed by Mayor Laterza, Councilmen Addonizio and Strumolo in resisting the pressures of crowd hysteria and government by duress so obvious at Tuesday night's Council meeting. While there may have been a hundred or so partisans of Barnett's present at the meeting who would have been happy had a majority of the Council voted their wishes, we are confident there were thousands of taxpayers at home praying for the Council to make the decision which would keep down taxes. Laterza, Strumolo and Addonizio did just that.

**PUBLIC OFFICIALS ARE SENSITIVE TO THE PRESS**  
To the Editor, The Times-News:  
Perhaps as no other group of people, public officials are sensitive of the power and value of the press, since it serves as the media of instruction to the general public with the events and developments of the time. A fair press is a good press. A "slanted" or prejudiced press is a bad press. Communities and populations thrive when the manner of their news publication is without the taint of tendentious or propagandistic reporting intended and designed to further a special purpose.

Besides being served by the several reliable metropolitan newspapers of this area of which the Newark News is probably the one with the widest circulation, Belleville enjoys the distinction of being served by two news dissemination agencies. The Belleville Telegram and The Belleville Times-News. Should one take the time to read both these publications for any given period, the question MUST inevitably arise how can the same news look so obviously different in each of these papers?

The question is well put and the explanation is quite simple to those reasonably conversant with prevailing patterns in the realm of Belleville's external political life and mad quest for control.

Politics and political administration certainly can always stand the helping guidance of the objective press. However, when newspaper editors and publishers "kick their noses in the affairs of state to the extent of trying to build up their stogees and hammer those who have the fortitude and guts to tell them off, it is time for the people of the community to be told plain, pure and simple just what is going on... and why."

Thinking people of this town have just about, in my opinion, reached the saturation point of being brainwashed by "slanted" news copy. They are not so stupid as to be hoodwinked by screaming headlines and snide innuendoes that are only intended to the politically minded publisher serve the fallacious theory that



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can force independently minded subscribers, to insist upon it, if it is being "blasted" in his newspaper.

Men and their wares as well as their newspapers will and must be judged upon the merit and accuracy of their fair representations. Belleville is an integral and component part of a great democracy which makes short-shift of the Paul Goebble type Nazi propaganda that built up Hitler to the later despair and humiliation of a proud but glibble people.

No public official should ever permit himself to become the docile, hidebound pawn of any local newspaper publisher or editor, friend or foe, who would seek to twist his thinking on the basis of his supposed influence within the community because he happens to run a newspaper. I say for shame to any who might fall victims of such an arrangement. Belleville, like America, in my way of thinking, will only become great and prosper upon the rock of independent courage and strength of character that stands firmly for what it believes proper and right.

I like many proud friends and relatives of men and superior officers of Belleville's police department from Chiefs down, take strong issue with the false concept that these stalwart guardians of Belleville's law, in the past, were flunkies who served under political bosses. It is just such deceptive presentation of news that must be stopped if truth in the printed word is to be the order of the day in reporting Belleville news in our town papers.

We want and demand truth and honesty in our local publications, not propaganda. Will we get it?



A few weeks ago we reported that the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) has cited one TV manufacturer about claims for its products which the FTC thinks are "exaggerated" and "incorrect."

This matter was reported in a recent article in "Consumer Reports," together with some remarks about the advertising claims of other manufacturers. One of these is Magnavox.

The magazine lists some claims, taken out of context of course, by Magnavox, which one can not help conclude, are questioned. They do not exactly say so, however, although the implication is obvious.

Since we sell and service Magnavox sets, we are familiar with this product. One of the claims for Magnavox listed and apparently questioned is "revolutionary Videomatic... the only fully automatic TV." This statement is correct, there is no exaggeration. It is well enough known that lots and lots of people simply can not tune a TV set correctly. This routine adjustment of the fine tuner when a station is changed, Magnavox sets do not have to be retuned with every station change. This adjustment has to be made once and stays that way for months. A light-sensitive device eliminates the constant re-adjustment of the brightness and contrast control. All one has to do on a Magnavox set is to turn the set on and off, by a push-button. The volume stays the same at when the set was tuned off. There is no exaggeration in this claim.

We don't have enough room to take issue with the other matters listed in the magazine. If our readers care to come to our store, we will be only too glad to show that, considering the general use of superlatives in advertising these days, Magnavox claims for their merchandise, if anything, are moderate.

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**TWO ISSUES OF INTEREST**  
To the Editor, The Times-News:  
As a citizen of Belleville I read the Belleville newspapers. I am particularly interested in news pertaining to political doings and actions of the municipal government. I am specifically interested in anything that costs me money, and happenings that affect the decent and worthwhile character of my town.

Two issues of interest to me, and I'm sure to others, are the pending possibility of reaching the establishment of a salary status for the Mayor and Council members, and the prospective hiring of a city manager. Both are relative.

To clear myself to make the below recommendation I wish to present my position. I do not aspire for any political office or departmental appointments within the framework of the local government. Nor do I wish to favor my underserving person or group of persons except as I feel is in the best interests of myself, my family and my neighbors. 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The Mayor and members of the Council during the last election campaign, exposed their desires and intentions to improve the general conditions of the town. To generate new conditions and rejuvenate wayward functions is a task worthy of dedicated men. I and I hope others, do not expect a miracle. Belleville will not become a model town overnight just because there are new faces and a new form of government. Any improvement will take lots of work in

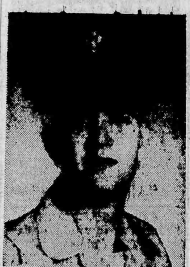

## Burdzy Issues Warning On Lead Poisoning

"Cases of lead poisoning among young children are likely to rise in number this summer," Edward Burdzy, Health Officer, reported today.

"This seasonal increase has been noted for several years," he said. "The most frequent victims are children one to four years of age who live with their parents in old houses in which lead paint has been used for interior painting or in which the walls have been plastered with plaster containing lead. Young children will characteristically bite and chew on many things, including wood sills and flaky plaster. Lead poisoning is one of the principal causes of child deaths due to poison."

"Parents should be sure toys and furniture, such as cribs, used by young children are not painted with paint that contains lead. If toddlers are seen chewing on window sills or other painted objects, the physician should be advised, especially if the child is already being treated for an illness."
