Mr. Sommers Played Politics With Belleville's Most Vital Job

In the memory of Belleville's old timers it is unificult to recall any Town Hall incident Mareria a public official publicly admitted he attempted a brazen deal involving the use of taxpayer money to substance a position which the public official termed unnecessary — and freezing in that post an individual the public official calmed was incompetent. Because of the fact that Clara Maass Hospital is located fact that Clara Maass Hospital is located within the boundaries every birth and every dark occurring at Clara Maass becomes a vital statistic of our community. This circumstance lends greater importance to the position. If there is any job at Town Hall which should not be a subject of political deals this is it. The position of Registrar of Vital Statistics should be shove and beyond the reach of politics and its influence.

Sommers didn't see it this way.

Almost from the very first day he assumed his job at Town Hall Sommers began scheming of ways to remove Risoli from the post of Registrar of Vital Statistics. Risoli held title to the job since November, 1961 although as Deputy Registrar of Vital Statistics he was actually

November, 1961 although as Deputy Registrar of 2 Vital Statistics he was actually discharging the duties of the since August 26, 1958. The job carries no salary. Risoli receives \$4,800 as senior clerk although all of his time is taken up with his duties of Registrar.

received a passing mark on the exam.

Sommers contended the post could not be placed under Civil Service jurisdiction since it was a statutory job and asked Civil Service to cancel the results of the examination. Civil Service complied with

Soon after Civil Service danced to Sommers' time the post of Registrar of Vital Statistics was caught up in a political chess game with Sommers calling the plays. At times it appeared that Sommers was holding Risoli as a hostage and at other times Sommers used Risoli's

consequence of his maneuve is upon risoli, a 46 year old inter-two children didn't appear too import-t to Sommers. He was determined to

gain his objective at almost any cost.

But what was Sommers' objective?

Clean 'government'? Government without politics? Government without deals? Let's look at the record.

The Administrative Code adopted by the Town Council provides that the Registrar also head the Department of Health and Walfare. This provision of the Code enjoyed the support of all five Councilmen. As a matter of fact, soon after the new Council was elected, both Council-men James R. Golden and Thomas P. Greco fold their colleagues that Risoli was underpaid and was entitled to a substan-tial raise in pay. Golden and Greco were talking about a \$1,000 raise for Risoli. Sommers "couldn't swallow" Risoli as Registrar and department head. Som-

ittegally attempted to change the instrative Code substituting the title one Manager' as head of the De-tent of Health and Welfare. Sommers' megal attempt failed due to the alertness of Mayor Robert M. Laterza who personally visited the offices of The Belleville Times-News and ordered a half to the publication of the legal notice which was noments away from press time. The legal notice cost the town \$511.00 and if it was printed as desired by Sommers a second printing would have been necessary, thus costing taxpayers an added \$21.00.

When Sommers couldn't get away with his illegal effort to change the sense of an ordinance legally adopted by the Town Council he broached his first deal attempt.

"I will make Risoli secretary to the Town Planning Board at \$6,000 a year in exchange for his resignation as Registrar," Sommers is quoted as proposing Both Mayor Robert Laterza and Deputy Mayor G. George Addonizio are the authorities for this quotation. 
