Q. I'm 74, and I applied for iocial security retirement bene-fits in October 1961. I was turned down because I had not worked long enough under social security to qualify, Would voluntary pa mts into social security made me be acceptable?

A. No. Voluntary contributions cannot be accepted since the So-cial Security Law makes no pro-gion for this arrangement. You must work on a job covered by notial security or have selfem-ployment income from your own Dustness in order to pay the so-cial security tay and the tax and get the

Q. My husband died last month, and 1 am his only survivor. 1 am 59. Will 1 receive widow's benefits each month in addition to the lump-sum death payment?

to the lupp-sum deau paymene. A. No. Not until you reach 62. To qualify for widow's benefits before age 62, you must have ehidren entitled to benefits in your care. Since you have no ehidren widow's benefits cannot be paid to you at this time. You should get in touch with your so-cial security office now about fil-ing for the lump-sum death bene-fit.
