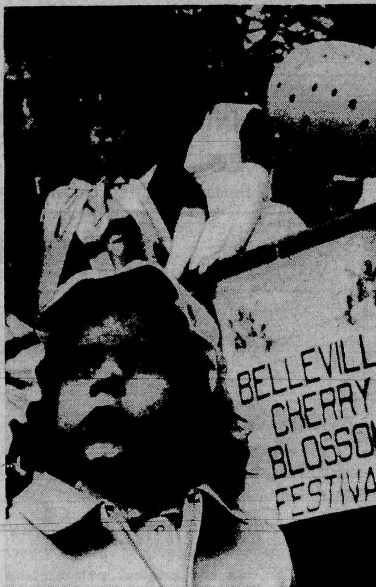

## Veteran Educator Dies At 82 . . .

### James G. Shawger, Retired Principal Of School Four

James G. Shawger, a former principal of School Four who retired in 1950 after an adult life devoted to education in Belleville schools, died at Clara Maass Memorial Hospital April 26. He was 82.

"Jimmy" Shawger, as he was known to his many friends and associates, had been a familiar figure as he rode his bicycle from his home at 14 Division Avenue to School Four a mile and a half away.

Upon his retirement in 1950 after 53 years as vice principal of School Four, grateful parents and fellow educators in the Belleville School system renamed the school during a farewell dinner in his honor. The school is now the only one in the system bearing a name—all the others are numbered.

He was born in Rockaway and lived here for 47 years. In 1902 he graduated from Trenton State Teachers College. Five years later he joined the Belleville school system where he was to remain until his death last Friday.

His first teaching position had been at a one-roomed school house at 22 Fairway Avenue. (Continued On Page 2)

### Student Teachers Help Classmates

There's nothing like a little student-to-student talk when a perplexing problem raises its ugly head.

And students at Belleville High School are finding this out today as the Key Club rounds out its seventh week as tutor to hard-pressed classmates.

The Key club, a group of top students at BHS, inaugurated the unique—but ever so practical—service to assist students who had fallen behind in their studies because of a lack of time, talent, or trouble.

Classmates Teachers Most of the academic roadblocks come from the time honored—but still formidable—mathematics courses, with English and its attendant complexities running a close second.

The main reason for its success among some 35 students who are being tutored, is the fact that another student understands and appreciates the problems in a manner no adult can match.

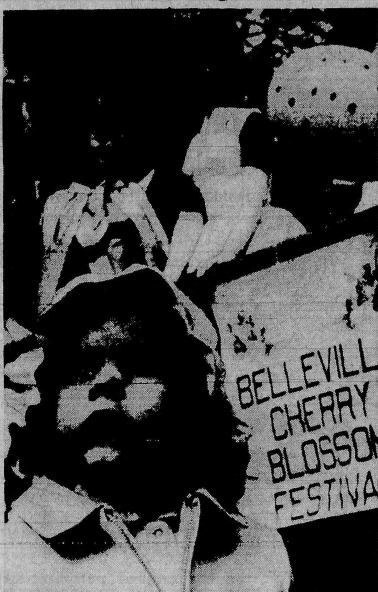

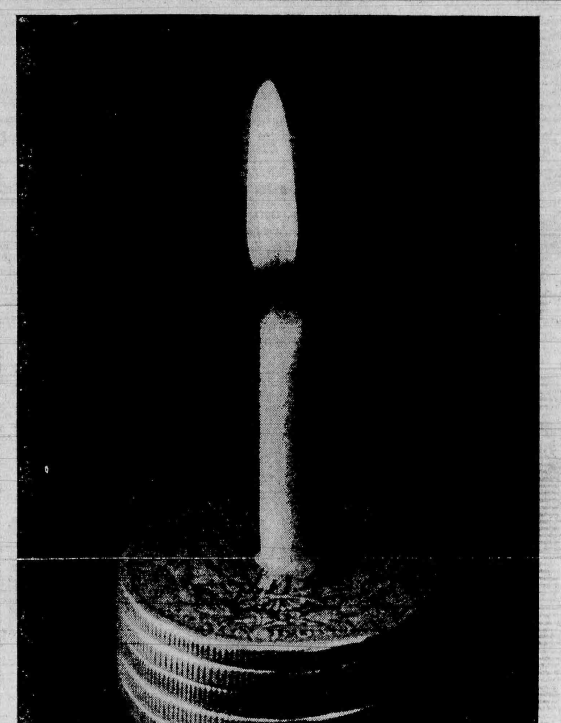

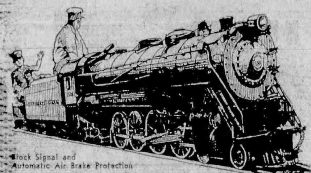

## The Town Mourns Its Loss

When James G. Shawger died Friday at the age of 82, he left a gentle touch of intelligence and understanding on two generations of Belleville students.

"Jimmy" Shawger had been a familiar figure to town residents along Division Avenue as he pedaled his bicycle on his way to School Four where he served as principal for nearly four decades.

He was wiry and active and, as one friend said, "he had a way with people."

When he retired 13 years ago after a lifetime spent as an educator, the Board of Education, backed by a group that was the fore-runner of the present day Parent-Teachers Association, ordered the school to be renamed James G. Shawger School in his honor.

To this day it remains the only school in the system bearing a name instead of a number. A fitting tribute to a devoted teacher and friend.

## Why Must We Always Do It The Hard Way?

The 1963 Cherry Blossom Festival is now just a happy memory.

But there are some rather unhappy memories despite all the Chamber of Commerce and the Junior Chamber did to make it the success it was. In recent outbursts of oratory and belated publicity from all concerned, one basic fact was consistently overlooked.

Why wasn't a Belleville girl chosen Miss Cherry Blossom?

It would have been for Belleville on the map, both now and at later appearances of the Queen at similar festive functions. It may have provided a sadly lacking ingredient in Belleville — an intangible esprit de corps that would have made Belleville proud of their daughters.

We intend no distraction from Irving-

ton's lovely Miss Andra Gale Demko, who made a beautiful Queen. She won it fair and square. And she is now an honorary Belleville citizen. But, it could have been a Belleville girl.

One of the main reasons for Belleville having a Cherry Blossom Festival is to promote the town, its people, and, of course, its commerce. Therefore, may we respectfully request the two Chambers to re-evaluate their rules of qualifications? Next year assure Belleville a Cherry Blossom Queen by eliminating the requirement that applicants be eligible for scholarships.

After all, what is a beauty queen but a lovely symbol of one of the best towns along the banks of the Passaic River? A scholarly outlook is fine; but Belleville needs a beauty queen!

## A Fresh Start For Town Government

For a while there had been evidence that the memory of the late and not specially lamented William A. Sommers would be flaunted for some time to come as Belleville's soiled oriflamme of various political groups and humanitarian malcontents.

But the recent installation of John R. Burnett as town manager seems to have contrived to batten off his remains with an economy of waste. From the vantage point of three or four weeks of comparative tranquility we can now appraise Burnett's attitude towards his new position as one of the town's chief executives.

Burnett, who obviously does his homework well, has displayed a real pro's approach to the multitude of problems that

face Belleville and its new-acquired form of government. During his first council meeting recently he diplomatically fielded several matters that would have taxed a less experienced man. Indeed, we would not have made serious objection had he claimed unfamiliarity with the problem.

The job of town manager is to lead and coordinate a team, not to be an omnipotent minister. Burnett has that ability. Lacking any evidence to the contrary, it is safe to say that the vast indeed overwhelming majority of responsible citizens, voters and taxpayers heartily, approve his appointment.

We wish you well in your new job, Mr. Burnett.

## Let's Throw The Bums Out!

It can be argued of course, that the loud — and often profane — sounds coming from the council chambers are merely those of red-blooded Americans exercising their rights as citizens. Even Mayor Robert M. Laterza broke a gavel banging for order two weeks ago. It gets loud up there!

Therefore a small book published in Canada a few months ago, "How To Organize An Election" by Norris Denman of

Montreal, could be more than useful to town politicians. Not to be overlooked is one tip which, in view of the general tenor of Belleville town meetings, might prove exceptionally valuable.

For the protection of committee rooms and meetings says Denman, "wrestlers or prizefighters are usually available for a reasonable sum." Here is a good idea for the next time around. But, will taxpayers begrudge us the extra item on the budget?

## Movie Waste

Daryl Zanuck, movie producer Hollywood style, recently announced he had spent \$37,000,000 making a certain motion picture starring controversial Elizabeth Taylor.

The last three million, the movie maker said, had been spent in Spain or re-takes. These became "necessary" after Zanuck and his director, one Joseph Mankiewicz, got into a brawl over the final version of the film.

Zanuck, nevertheless, spent three additional millions to retake certain Spanish scenes. That is his privilege — a rare one among most business individuals but a relatively common thing in the world of Hollywood.

So now he has spent \$37,000,000 to give the world this motion picture. What that money could have been used for — if put to better purposes! How lavish and wasteful American-made movies have become!

Are they worth it? Some of the best pictures ever made are being made comparatively inexpensive in British or other foreign film centers. Big money does not produce big or good pictures.

The worst thing about it all is to realize that we, the public, make this sort of horse play, and the excessive salaries paid to the so-called "stars" possible by paying to see poor pictures.

## We're Back Where We Stayed

Now catching up with the more advanced savages, who beat gongs to scare away evil spirits technological man is, now applying the same bright aboriginal idea to warfare.

The U. S. Atomic Energy Commission has devised a weapon called Pluto whose main function is to produce deafening bangs. A nuclear ram-jet traveling pilotless at three times the speed of sound; it can be computer-aimed to fly thousands of miles at tree-top level.

The beneficial effect on the enemy can be readily imagined. Like a hound of hell, says one account, and Belleville veterans who experienced the ghastly artillery bombardments of the last few wars know what that means. Pluto, said its

inventors, "will hammer the ears of the population into terror." Oh, what fun!

But the inventors do not admit to contemplating anything so beastly it seems, as frightening people out of their wits first and polishing them off second with an H-bomb. The idea is, that Pluto will "bring sudden peace." The peace of the graveyard!

It is an interesting theory. But surely if the nations began spending billions — Pluto would cost \$5 billion, and is not yet in production — on noisemakers to intimidate one another, modern warfare will have reached a new high of insanity and inanity.

As one scientist said, nuclear war is not unthinkable but, on the contrary, has to be thought about. Pluto proves once again that the only rational way to think about it is to look for new ways of settling arguments.

When we get to settling them with Pluto, it will be time for the human experiment to fold up and make way for a species with brains.

### Safety Rules In Home Can Prevent Tragedies

(A public service column)

Each year, hundreds of children die or are made severely ill because they drink medicines, insecticides, cleaning fluids or other potentially poisonous substances carelessly left within their reach.

These tragedies frequently can be avoided, the Insurance Information Institute says, if the following safety rules are observed in the home.

Medicines, cleaning solvents and insecticides should be stored where children cannot get to them.

Medicines should be inventoried several times a year and old prescriptions of no further use should be thrown out. When discarding medicines, make sure you do it in such a way that children do not have the opportunity of recovering them.

Never store potentially poisonous substances in food or beverage containers. This can confuse a child who may associate the container with food.

When medicines are given to a child, do not refer to it as candy. This may encourage raids on the medicine cabinet.

If a child does swallow a potentially poisonous substance, call a physician or the police immediately. Do not wait for symptoms to appear. Keep an antidote chart posted on the inside of the medicine cabinet door.

# Burnett Admonishes Library For Lack Of 'Fiscal Facts' In Preparing Its 1963 Budget

The Belleville Public Library has made a request for reappropriation of all money received during the present year for library fines, and at the same time declared an "impairment of the library's service implicit in the drastic reduction of its 1963 budget requests."

Acting Town Manager John R. Burnett, in a reply to Mrs. Richard A. Shaffer, Library Board member, said he found a "most unrealistic projection of library costs to the taxpayers in your 1963 budget presentation."

The library had been smarting under the recent reduction of some \$327 in its operating budget. The library had asked for \$62,200 during 1963. Director Ben E. Grinn's main objection was the lack of money with which to increase the purchases of new books.

Burnett pointed out that some \$505 had been tabbed under deferred charges for Blue Cross, Blue Shield, and medical coverage, while another \$3,126 went for "personnel fund contributions and life insurance."

The town also provides the Library with all accounting services which would add \$6,000 for personnel alone, said Burnett.

"Simple addition," said Burnett, "would show the actual cost for the library to the taxpayers to be \$72,225 per year, or an amount in excess of \$2 per inhabitant."

State aid, amounting to \$5,774.65 per year, is not a tax burden here, he said, but as an urban municipality town residents contribute more than their pro-rated returns toward money raised by the state for all state aid categories.

Actual expenditures, Burnett said, are in excess of \$2.20 per capita here. If the library board proceeds with its plans to grant increments to employees retroactive to January 1, only \$85 will be left for future replacements.

However, Burnett added, he

was not belittling the Library or its service to the town.

"I do believe," Burnett continued, "that a more realistic budget presentation should be made with the resulting and proper awareness of the fiscal facts."

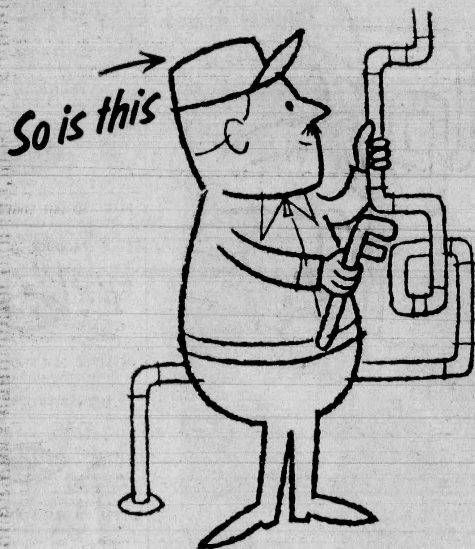
