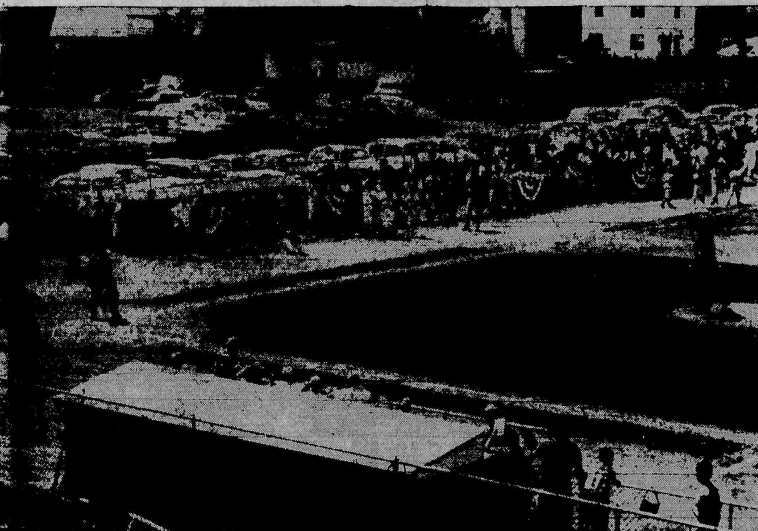

## Edward Moro, Builder, Is Dead At 74

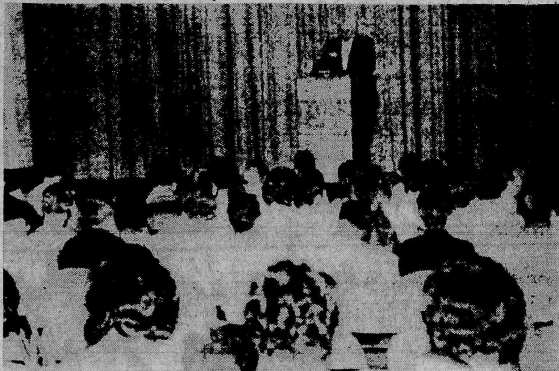

Your Own Driving Record Is Used To Determine Auto Insurance Rates

Why do automobile insurance rates differ from community to community within the same state? A motorist questions. Because the accident records of drivers in one section of a state often vary from those in another area of the same state. Since auto policy premiums are based on the driving record of insured motorists, it is only fair to charge lower premiums in a community where the motorists have relatively few accidents and higher premiums in a community where motorists have a high accident rate.

Generally, auto liability premiums are higher in urban areas where streets are more congested and the chance of accident is greater. In the suburbs, where there is less congestion, the rates tend to be lower. The lowest auto insurance rates usually prevail in the rural areas where there are fewer families, fewer cars and consequently, fewer chances for an accident.

An accident caused by a suburban motorist driving in the city, or in another state, is charged against the suburban rating territory where the car normally is garaged — not against the city where the accident occurred.

No matter where an accident occurs it is charged to the rating territory of the driver. Careful driving habits can keep the rates in your community low, but even more important, they can save lives.

**Plans Tour Of World This Summer**  
Victor Greene of 64 Mt. Prospect Avenue, Belleville, is planning a world tour this summer. The trip is part of a worldwide international assembly of Jehovah's Witnesses scheduled for 24 cities in the U. S., Europe, the Middle East, Asia, Australia and the islands of the Pacific.  
Greene said 583 delegates are participating in the world tour and another 150 persons have scheduled trips to Europe and the Middle East. The conventions begin in Milwaukee, Wis., June 30-July 7, an end at the Rose Bowl in Pasadena, California, September 1-8. The largest crowd is expected at Yankee Stadium, New York, July 7-14.  
"I've been planning on this trip for over a year," Greene said. "This is like a dream come true. When the Watchtower Bible and Tract Society announced a series of conventions around the world two years ago, I started saving for the trip. Now it's 'here'."  
The tours are by jet plane, with most delegates scheduled to depart from Idlewild Airport in New York July 18. The world tour includes such places as London, England; Munich, Germany; Istanbul, Turkey; and Israel, Jordan and Lebanon.  
"Other places of interest include Delhi, India, and Manila, Philippines," Greene said. "Delegates will also be visiting Melbourne, Australia; Shou Feng, Taiwan; Kyoto, Japan; Auckland New Zealand; Seoul, Korea, and Suva, Fiji."  
"I conclude the trip with a convention at Honolulu, Hawaii, the end of August and the big Rose Bowl convention the first of September. This is a once-in-a-lifetime trip," he said.

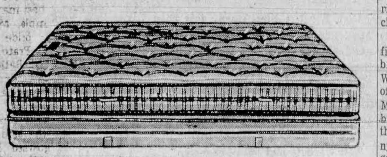

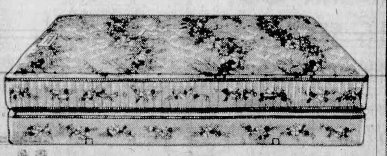

Brides Reminded To Change Name On S.S. Card

Sinder, District Manager of social security in Newark, points out that a change of name requires the issuance of a corrected social security card. The same account number is kept but the card is issued in the bride's new name. Immediate reporting by the bride will lessen the possibility that her future earnings may be incorrectly reported.

Continuing, Mr. Sinder said, "If you're married and haven't yet changed your name on your social security account, do so immediately. If you are just planning marriage, be sure to notify the Social Security Administration after the happy event takes place."

"Your nearest social security office will mail you the necessary form for the change of name. But if it's convenient, stop in yourself. The completion of this form takes only a minute and may save a great deal of confusion some time in the future."

The social security office in Newark is located at 1016 Broad Street.

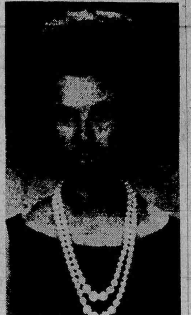

### BECK'S COLUMN

We mentioned repeatedly during the last year that by decree of the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) TV sets to be manufactured next year, just about by the time of the annual model change, will have to have an Ultra High Frequency (UHF) tuner built in, if they are sold in interstate trade. There is no TV set on the market that is sold in one state only (so far), consequently every TV set will have to have an UHF tuner. This means that the price of almost every TV set will be higher next year, about \$30. So far no manufacturer offers UHF equipped sets at a lower price.

What does this UHF mean for us in this reception area? Not much, unless you are interested in educational TV. There is no UHF station presently in the New York metropolitan section that has conventional programs. By this is meant the usual programs we are all acquainted with on channels 2 to 13. One UHF station, channel 31, operates in New York now, transmitting educational programs.

Many customers ask us what can be done to receive one or several UHF stations with their present sets.

If you want to receive all additional 70 channels, you will have to purchase a converter. They cost \$25. to \$35. If you want to receive only one station, you may be able to add a so-called strip right in your station selector at a cost of about \$10. This can not be done with some sets. For one station only you may add a one station converter for about \$15.

It also may be necessary, depending on your location, to have a separate UHF roof or attic antenna. In good locations the conventional "rabbit ear" antenna may be satisfactory.

As this additional broadcast service develops, we are going to report about it in this column.

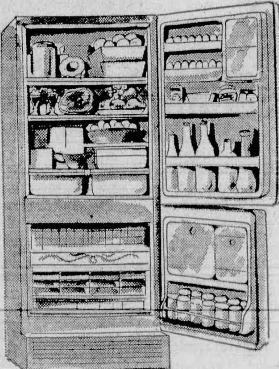

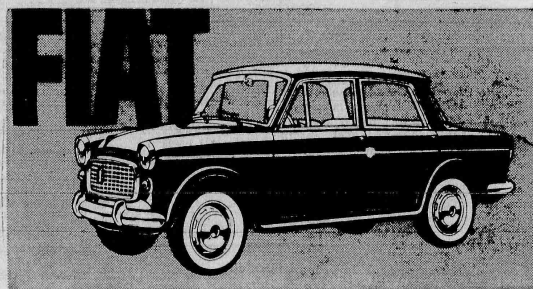

On hand for the opening of the New Jersey Public Market Commission's Washington Street office were Commission Chairman Eugene Farrell, Commissioner George Fangmann, and Executive Director Thomas Gansel, Jr.

Displays designed to interest New York's food brokers as tenants for the multi-million dollar food distribution center in Hudson County also proclaimed the Jersey site as "The Center of Food Traffic — the Middle of 23 Million People in 1985—"

Brightly-colored brochures inside the Washington Street office and at a second office at 14 Little West 12th Street in the heart of the meat distribution area, pointed out that the Jersey market — whose initial development on 153-acres is slated to open in 1965 — will "save money" because its modern design will speed food handling; it is easy to get into and out of; it provides for breaking of car lot quantities into mixed loads for sending to secondary markets; it assures earlier rail and truck delivery to North Jersey than upper Bronx or any other site; it assures freshness and better quality products to the consumer; total distributor costs will be lower and can be passed on to the consumer.

Speaking of transportation advantages, the brochure noted the markets' direct access to existing track facilities of six major railroads, plus a network of highways and air-freight terminals to serve it.

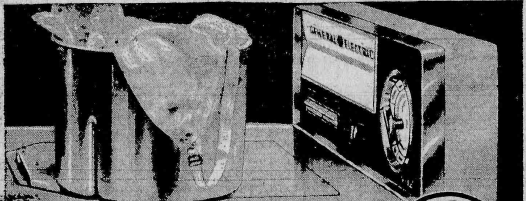

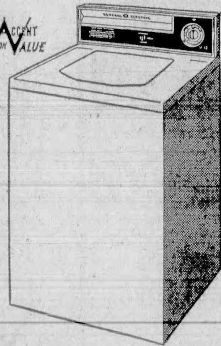

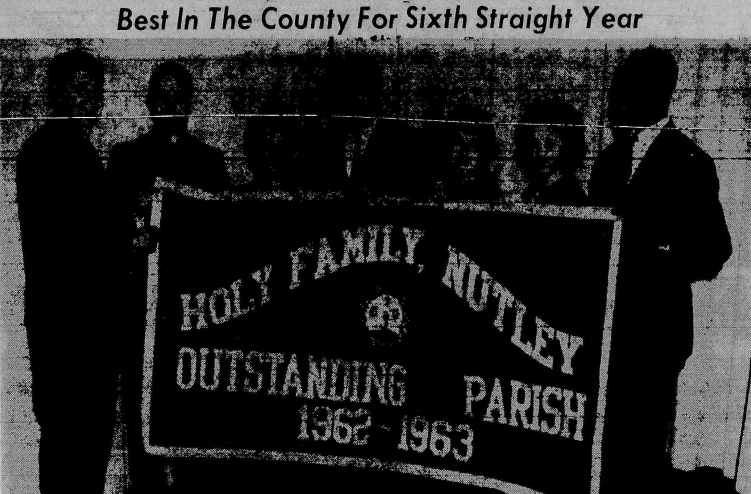
