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# WOUNDED COP NABS GUNMAN

## Officer Returns Home; Man's Condition 'Poor'

A gunman who shot a Belleville patrolman and was wounded himself in a blazing dawn gun battle early Friday morning was reported in poor condition late Tuesday afternoon at Clara Maass Memorial Hospital.

## Chief to Ask 6 More Men, Sergeant

A request for six additional patrolmen and one additional sergeant is expected to be made to the Town Council in the wake of the shooting of Patrolman Harry J. Sullivan.

Police Chief Charles McGinnis said two-man patrol cars were placed in operation Monday night after a meeting with a delegation from the PBA, headed by Detective Michael Marotti, president.

The Chief explained that he managed to put two men in each car during the night hours by taking two men from other assignments and reducing the number of patrol cars in operation from five to four.

Of the four cars now on the road, three of them are manned by two patrolmen and one is still a single-man patrol.

Chief McGinnis explained that he would ask Town Manager John R. Burnett to recommend to the Town Council that six additional men be hired. And an additional sergeant be appointed. The PBA had reported 14 to 16 men would be sought. However, in the Civil Service examination for patrolmen held last month, only six men qualified for appointment.

The two men in a patrol car has been a goal of the State BPA Association for several years.

Marotti said: "The minimum for adequate protection is two men for each 1,000 population. We have only 63 men. We have been short 18 men for a long time. The town hasn't been replacing men who resign or retire."

The move to two-man patrol cars was motivated after Patrolman Sullivan was wounded by a man he had apprehended as a suspect in a taxi-cab holdup.

The one-man patrol cars had been ordered as an economy move by former Town Manager William Sommers.

Police commissioner and the present undersheriff, who was wounded in both arms by the gunman, was released from the hospital Monday afternoon.

The gunman was identified by police as Thomas Burns, 27, of 28 Washington Street, West Orange. When apprehended he gave his address as 250 Nye Avenue, Newark, the home of a brother. Hospital authorities said Burns had been shot two times, one bullet piercing the abdomen and a second bullet piercing the right thigh. Both bullets passed through his body.

Patrolman Sullivan also was wounded twice, one bullet grazed the right upper arm and the second bullet punctured and was lodged in his lower left arm. No bones were broken, hospital authorities said.

Police said the gun battle climaxed a chain of events which started shortly after 3 a.m. Friday morning when Burns called a cab and asked to be taken to the Nye Avenue apartment.

Cab driver Robert J. Benjamin of 141 Ridge Court, Orange, employed by the Bolen Cab Company, West Orange, told police Burns asked him to wait when he reached the Nye Avenue address. He left a \$10 deposit with the cabbie while he entered the building.

Benjamin said Burns reentered the cab and asked to be taken to Franklin Avenue, Nutley. While enroute, the cab driver said Burns pulled a gun and robbed him of \$24 at the corner of Baldwin Place and Minker Place, Belleville.

Burns ordered the driver from the cab and then left it and started to walk from the scene. Benjamin ran to the home of a private citizen and reported the holdup to police. A radio alarm was put out for the gunman.

Patrolman Sullivan was on a one-man patrol when he noticed a man walking who fitted the description of the gunman.

Police said he checked out the man and the next thing they heard over the police radio was: "Send an ambulance. I'm shot. He's shot."

Police said that Patrolman Sullivan had checked the man and was calling for assistance when Burns pulled a 22-caliber, seven-shot pistol from someplace and opened fire. He fired all seven shots hitting Sullivan twice and putting two other holes in his coat.

Patrolman Sullivan returned the fire, getting off three shots. (Continued on Page 11).

## Girl Hit by Car, Dies

Joan Loree, 5-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John S. Loree, 26 Prospect Street, was struck and fatally injured when she ran in front of an automobile about 4:52 p.m. on December 10.

Jean had been playing with a neighborhood girl friend and was on her way home when she was struck in front of 168 Holmes Street. The driver of the car was Thomas McGeehan, 44, of 42 Wilbur Street, Belleville, who was also on his way home from work.

McGeehan told police that the girl darted into the path of his auto from a driveway. The child was taken to Clara Maass Memorial Hospital by Detective Michael Marotti, who lives in the area. She died of internal injuries about 20 minutes after arrival at the hospital.

McGeehan was released on \$1,000 bail for appearance Thursday on a charge of causing death by automobile.

The accident was investigated by Patrolman Harold I. O'Reilly of the Belleville Traffic Squad. The funeral was held Saturday from the Kiernan Funeral Home 101 Union Avenue, Belleville. A Mass of the Angels was offered at St. Peter's Church.

Jean was a first-grade pupil in St. Peter's School. She is survived by her parents and a brother, John Jr., 8, and a sister, Judy, 1.

## Council Will Get Ordinance On Fire Equipment Monday

The controversial \$110,000 ordinance for the purchase of three new fire engines and a secondary ambulance will be reintroduced at Monday's meeting of the Town Council.

Town Manager John R. Burnett who was instructed by the Council to prepare an ordinance for the purchase of the engines at the last Council session, said Monday night that he would submit the same ordinance which was voted down last month, 3-2, with Councilmen James R. Golden and Nuncio Pico in opposition.

The ordinance was introduced when Fire Chief Carl Hundertpfund reported to the city manager that the department could no longer provide first-class fire protection for the Town with the present equipment.

The Chief asked for two new 750-gallon pumpers and an 85-foot aerial ladder to replace two worn out pumpers and a worn aerial ladder.

Three drivers were fined last week in Municipal Court by Judge Edward Abramson on various charges.

James Stevens Sr., of 366 Sussex Avenue, Newark, was fined \$10 and \$5 court costs when he admitted a charge of speeding.

Harry Ault of Roselle also admitted a speeding charge and was fined \$15 and \$5 in court costs.

Carl Peterson of 137 Steuben Street, East Orange, paid a fine of \$25 and \$5 court costs when he admitted a charge of failing to yield to a pedestrian at a crosswalk.

## Board Eyes Closing of Two Schools

The closing of two schools and the standardizing of the number of pupils in each class through out the school system was proposed at Monday night's meeting of the Board of Education.

In a surprise move, Ernest S. Arvidson, Board vice-president, proposed that Dr. Frank M. Durkee, superintendent of schools, conduct a survey of the entire school system with the idea of equalizing the size of classes in the entire system to about 25 students per class.

The closing of two schools was revealed when the Board aired a letter from Dr. Durkee, dated October 31.

Dr. Durkee said he believed a saving in the vicinity of \$28,000 could be effected with the combining of School Nine with School One and a saving of about \$13,000 could be effected by the combining of School Two with School Four.

He said the figures on savings were only estimates and that he did not want to be held to them.

Members of the Board voted to ask Dr. Durkee to prepare a report on the merits of the plan and to present it officially to the Board by January 15, 1964.

The Board also considered a motion to appoint a lay board of 10 advisors, one from each school district, to study the situation in the community and to issue a report, subject to approval of the Board of Education at a future date for study.

Arvidson stated that whereas the 6-3 plan was scheduled to go into effect in the school system in September, 1964, that it would be a good idea if the Board had this information at its disposal so it could be used in preparing the new budget. If it were decided to transfer pupils in September 1964 the proper information would be available and the Board could act accordingly.

Most of the meeting was devoted to the airing of charges by Mrs. Norma McCool, board member, that the estimate of \$200,000 additional funds were needed to complete the new senior high school now under construction. Mrs. McCool says the amount needed to complete the school is much more than the \$200,000 announced by the board's committee several weeks ago.

## Judge Orders Recount On Strumolo; Appeal Planned by Addonizio

An election for the recall of Mayor Robert M. Laterza and Councilman G. George Addonizio was ordered Monday afternoon by Superior Court Judge Alexander Waugh.

The status of Councilman Vincent T. Strumolo, whose recall is also being sought by the For Recall Committee headed by Robert Westpy, was to be decided yesterday afternoon, after a recount of all petitions by the Town Clerk.

Judge Waugh ruled on five counts Monday as follows:

1. The use of outside help by Town Clerk John R. Burnett to check the original petitions was legal.

2. No fraud was indicated in the petitions.

3. Additional names could be submitted under the Faulkner Act's right to amend clause. Ruling that to amend means to amend, correct or substitute.

4. The determination of cause for recall should be determined by the voters and not the judge.

5. Said the Act's ruling that 25 per cent of qualified voters in a municipality must equal 25 per cent of those qualified in each ward as far as the election or recall of councilmen from a specific ward is concerned.

Town Clerk Burnett was ordered to re-check the petitions against Strumolo to find out if a sufficient number of voters from the first ward had signed the original petitions to recall Strumolo.

"If a sufficient number from the First Ward had signed, even if rejected, then additional names from the ward must be accepted to replace the names found invalid on the original petitions," explained Burnett.

"It means that if there were 47 names from the First Ward among those rejected for the recall of Strumolo and 48 names can be found from the First Ward on the additional petitions submitted that Strumolo would also be recalled. If there are not enough rejected names on the original petitions, Strumolo would not be recalled."

Burnett must report his findings Wednesday afternoon. The Judge is expected to set the date for the election for recall of Laterza and Addonizio at the same time. It is necessary for the Judge to set the election date as by law the election must be held 90 days from the date the original petitions were submitted. However, candidates must file petitions 45 days before the election date and there is not enough time left for candidates to meet the 45-day rule if the election was scheduled January 31 as required by the law.

Councilman Addonizio was expected to appeal the decision of the judge yesterday, which could delay the elections even longer. "I will appeal, probably tomorrow," Addonizio said. "I will not resign and I will see this thing through and let the right thing happen."

Mayor Laterza plans no appeal. He said: "I am not planning to appeal. If the people of Belleville think they can do better it's up to them. I feel I gave them good government. Facts and figures prove it. If they want to listen to untruths, it's their opinion. I will not resign. They will have to make the decision."

## Driver Killed in Rt. 21 Auto Crash

An Ocean Grove man was killed early December 12 when he lost control of his sports car and it veered off Route 21 in Belleville, jumped a curb and struck a pile of steel girders.

Dead on arrival at Clara Maass Memorial Hospital was Quinton N. Horter, 28, of 55 Clark Avenue, Ocean Grove, who was employed as an industrial engineer for the Sun Chemical Company of Nutley.

Police said Horter was driving alone at 3:30 a.m. when his car veered to the right, jumped the curb and rammed a pile of steel girders, which were piled along the side of the road in connection with the Route 21 construction project.

Police said the impact moved the 20-foot long pilings about five feet. Horter was northbound on Route 21 when it went off the road in the vicinity of the Belleville exit, the scene of several other fatal auto crashes during the last 18 months.

Horter was taken to Clara Maass Memorial Hospital by the Belleville Fire Department ambulance and was pronounced dead on arrival.

He lived in Ocean Grove most of his life and leaves his wife, Mrs. Carol Horter, a daughter, Theresa, and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Clinton Horter of Ocean Grove.

## Nine Alarms Last Week Keep Town Firemen Busy

Town firemen answered nine calls last week, with six of the alarms involving actual fires.

On December 6 the department was called to 8 Tremont Avenue, the residence of A. P. Wadley, to extinguish a fire in a trash can.

On December 7, faulty controls in an oil burner ignited a blaze at 39 Maple Avenue, the residence of M. Manelardo. Damage was confined to oil burning equipment.

The firemen answered three calls on December 8. The first was to the De Rosa Truck Builders Shop where fire in a trash pile caused minor damage before it was doused. The call sent the firemen to 53 Brighton Avenue to board up a building after a truck

crashed through the wall of the building. The last alarm of the day sent the department to extinguish a mattress fire at the corner of Cleveland Street and Washington Avenue.

On December 10, two alarms busied the firemen. The first call came in at 8:04 a.m. and sent the firemen to 11 Federal Street, the residence of J. Dalacoma, where a blow back from an oil burner caused smoke and soot to spread throughout the cellar. The second call came at 1:45 p.m. from 253 Greylock Parkway, the residence of Elwood Russell, where fire caused by an electric blanket, burned the contents of a bedroom, damaged the room and caused smoke damage through the entire home.

Two more alarms on December 12 rounded out the week's activities. At 3:36 a.m. the department was called to release a person trapped inside a car involved in a crash on Rt. 21 near Bayard Street. At 12:10 p.m. test fires burning at Walter Kidde's proving ground caused heavy smoke in the area and resulted in an alarm being sounded from the box at Ralph Street and Belleville Avenue by a person who mistook the smoke as coming from a building.

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## A GOP Opportunity

The U. S. Senate seat now held by Democrat Harrison Williams is up for grabs November of next year.

Politically sophisticated citizens round these parts are predicting a Republican sweep of New Jersey come November, 1964. Important Democrat and Republican leaders believe it will be difficult for President Lyndon B. Johnson to carry the Garden State regardless of who he may designate as the Vice - Presidential nominee. Logically they conclude, such a result will materially weaken the reelection chances of Senator Harrison Williams. Our own experience leads us to give a large measure of credence to the conclusions.

Who is to carry the banner of the GOP against a youthful, attractive, incumbent Democrat Senator? A number of names have been thrown into the hopper. Congresswoman Florence Dwyer of Union County, who beat Williams when he was running for reelection as Sixth Congressional District Congressman (Union County), is considered a sure-shot to once again take Williams' measure should she decide to make the run.

Popular Congressman Peter W. Frelinghuysen whose fifth district congressional covers Somerset and Morris Counties also finds his name among the entries for next year's U. S. Senate sweepstakes.

Former New Jersey Assembly Minority Leader, Carmine Savino from neighboring Lyndhurst has been receiving attention from state GOP leaders anxious to win back the U. S. Senate seat formerly held by Republican H. Alexander Smith.

President Dwight Eisenhower's able Appointments Secretary, Bernard Shanley of Somerset County, the GOP's National Committeeman, is among the most favored names for the coveted Republican nomination.

Superior Court Judge James Giuliano, a Republican leader from way back, (because of his judicial position no longer active in the party he loves), is also among the persons under consideration for the U. S. Senate GOP nomination. Mrs. Dwyer, Frelinghuysen, Savino, Shanley, Giuliano — every name represents integrity, ability, civic responsibility, Republicanism, and Americanism.

Anyone of these great public servants stands a chance of winning against Harrison Williams next year. The only occurrence that can destroy the Republican Party's bright 1964 future to recapture the second United States Senate seat in New Jersey is a bitter Primary fight.

We believe common sense can — and must prevail — if the party is to make a successful comeback in 1964.

The roster of candidates for the U. S. Senate is very impressive. We know everyone of the aforementioned individuals. We think anyone of them would make an outstanding United States Senator. Republican State leaders owe it to their party to select the best qualified Republican who can win over a popular Williams — and then go forward to support that person. Only in a united effort can the Republican party succeed. Will its leaders have the common sense to see the light? We think so.

## Joralemon St. Should Remain So

Allan P. Crisp, Mr. Belleville to most of us, has objected to the renaming of Joralemon St. Some well motivated citizens, wanting to create a living memorial to honor our beloved late President, John Fitzgerald Kennedy, have suggested the name of Kennedy Boulevard for our present Joralemon St.

In a letter to the Town Council Mr. Crisp properly makes the point that the name "Joralemon" is very much a part of old Belleville. The Joralemon family gave three of its sons to the Revolution-

ary War, all of whom lie buried in our Reformed Church cemetery. They were Revolutionary War Heroes.

Each new generation of Belleville citizens has an obligation to respect memorials dedicated in years past. We agree with Mr. Crisp that Joralemon St. should remain as a living memorial to Belleville's Revolutionary War Heroes.

Suitable memorial projects are available for Belleville to perpetuate the memory of a great President. In so doing the sacred past should remain unmolested.

## Confidential Report Issued on School

Investigation by "Prosecutor's Office."

It is now clear that Board members will be called to the prosecutor's office in respect to the investigation of borings for the new high school site and the use of pilings. The charge, as we have heard it in many open meetings by the Tax Council apparently is that the Board of Education "perpetrated a fraud upon the public of Belleville" by inserting in its election brochure prior to the December 21, 1961 election this statement, item 24, page 8: "Test borings of the site show that no piling or large foundation expenses would be required." It is extremely important that this investigation be closed as rapidly as possible so that it may not cast a cloud on the sale of \$2,982,000 of school bonds. If this is to happen, each Board member should be confident in his knowledge of what happened and present testimony tently. I call your attention to a number of facts:

1. Refer please to memorandum of April 30, 1962.

2. Alfonso Alvarez, April 12, 1961, had presented to the Board of Education drawing TB-1 showing the location of the additional borings that he desired.

3. April 12, 1961, the Board of Education passed a resolution authorizing the Superintendent of Schools to engage the services of the William Walsh Company, North Bergen, to make borings indicated by the architect on drawing TB-1.

4. The Walsh Company reported on a map dated April 28, 1961 the data relative to each of the locations previously requested by the architect on drawing TB-1.

3. This map was delivered directly to Mr. Thomas on May 2, 1961 according to Mr. Walsh.

4. This map with soil samples was turned over to Mr. Alvarez by way of his representatives Mr. Philipp and Mr. Boyd. Mr. Alvarez referred this map and soil samples to Mr. Alexander for evaluation. The oral report to the School Planning Committee from the architect's office was that the data showed no indication of piling being needed.

5. Mrs. Shader, Board Secretary, requested from Mr. Thomas a copy of the Walsh Company map prior to the payment of the bill. The bill was on the list of June 22, 1961, approved at the meeting of June 26, 1961, and paid on June 27, 1961.

6. There is no indication that any member of the Board of Education saw the Walsh map report.

7. The professional staff and the Board of Education replied upon the professional experts in their belief and in the statements that were issued and in the campaign for the new school that no piling was needed. The every right to rely upon the authority of the experts in this situation.

8. The Walsh Company, Alvarez, architect, Mr. Alexander, his professional evaluator.

9. No written report was ever prepared or presented by the Walsh Company. The only report was the map report, so far as the location of the additional borings that he desired.

10. Only when Mr. Coronato, structural engineer, was brought into the picture by Mr. Alvarez for the designing of the foundation of the new school, was any additional question raised about the knowledge of soil conditions. In order to know how to design the foundation, Mr. Coronato asked for additional information. On that basis Mr. Alvarez asked the Board of Education to approve the hiring of the Joseph S. Ward Co., Inc., consulting soils and foundation engineers, 91

Roseland Avenue, Caldwell, New Jersey. This firm presented a report as of February 19, 1962, which the Board of Education reviewed proposing Phase I and Phase II of possible borings. Approval of the proposed program was granted by the Board of Education in its meeting of February 28, 1962.

11. March 13, 1962, the Joseph S. Ward Company informed Alfonso Alvarez, school architect, that it was necessary to enter Phase II of the proposed borings. Board members received a photocopy of this letter.

12. April 12, 1962, the firm of Joseph S. Ward Company reported to the Board of Education in writing of the results of the soils and foundation investigation. Pages IV-V, item 2, the Ward report, indicated that one of the alternatives was to excavate all of the organic soil and replace it with compacted fill. This could be done without using any piling. But, as indicated on page V-1, item 4, "the slab will undergo a settlement of about 13 inches." Other methods were suggested, but each was subject to settling. Page V-2, item 8, indicated that all "deleterious materials should be stripped and replaced with compacted fill," and that "spread footing with an allowable capacity bearing of 1.5 TSP can be constructed with column and wall support in this area," but the soil specialist recommended as the best method of developing the foundation, page IV-4, item 1, and page V-2, item 7, the use of piling.

13. All of this preliminary data indicates one simple fact; the need for the use of piling was discovered only after Mr. Coronato asked for additional information to assist him in designing the foundation for the new senior high school. This information was brought to light only by the Joseph S. Ward Co. report.

14. Members of the Board of Education and the professional staff had every right to rely upon their professional consultants, Dr. McCormick, Alfonso Alvarez, and his staff, and they informed the public of the truth as they knew it at the time of the referendum. Even after the Ward Report they still had the choice of not using piling, but chose to use it as the best method recommended by the soils and foundation firm.

"I've seen pain in the eyes of people who have just had an accident," confided the chief. "Even if there are no serious injuries, there's pain of plans rudely interrupted."

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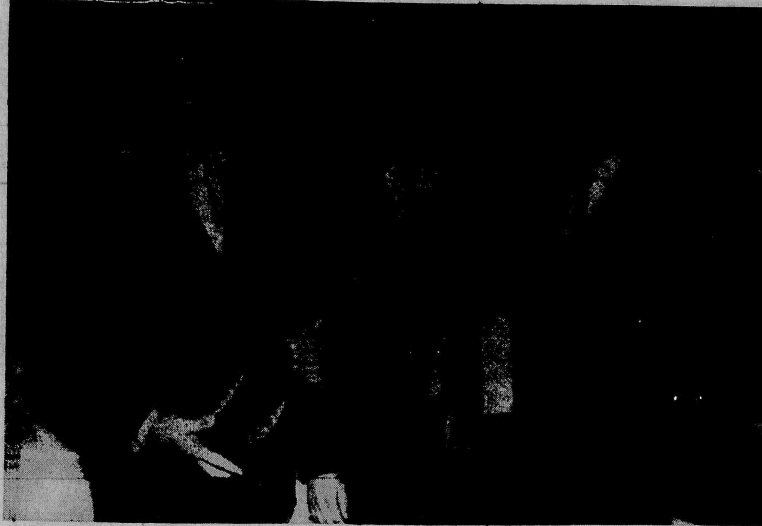
