

SCHOOL BOARD ELECTION FEB. 6

Deadline Set  
January 2  
On Petitions

The deadline for filing nominating petitions for the annual Board of Education election is nearing with two seats up for grabs this year in the Town of Belleville.

The deadline for filing petitions is 4 p.m. on January 2, 1964 with the drawing for position on the ballot scheduled January 3 and the election slated February 6.

The two members of the present board who must seek re-election are Richard Drake and Arthur M. Pico. Neither indicated as yet whether he would seek re-election or not.

The state education law provides that all persons who wish to file nominating petitions as candidates for election to the Board of Education must file their petitions with the secretary of the Board of Education of the school district in which the candidate resides.

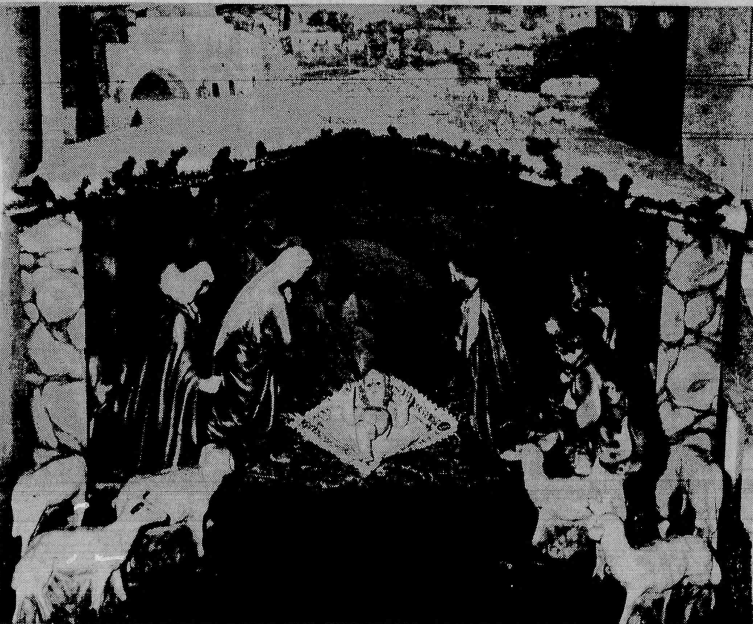
All candidates filing petitions must meet the requirements as prescribed in the New Jersey School Law. They are:

1. Candidate must be a citizen and resident of the territory contained in the district, for at least two (2) years.
2. Candidate shall have been a resident of the school district for at least two (2) years immediately preceding his becoming a member of the Board of Education.
3. He shall be able to read and write.
4. He shall not be directly or indirectly interested in any contract with or claim against the board.
5. He must be twenty-one (21) years of age to qualify for office.

The drawing for position of candidates on ballots or voting machines must be determined by the secretary of the Board of Education by conducting a drawing.

The drawing, by state law, must take place at 8 p.m. on the day following the last day for filing nominating petitions for the election at the regular meeting place of the Board of Education. Any legal voter of the district shall have the privilege of witnessing the drawing.

Members of the present Board whose terms will continue through 1964 are Nicholas Juliano, Board president, Mrs. Norma McCool, Ernest Arvidson, Dr. Frank D. Di Ruggiero and George Brown.

Snow, Fire Ordinances Due Airings

A loud, lengthy Town Council meeting is expected tonight when the controversial \$100,000, bonding ordinance for the purchase of three new fire engines, a new snow removal ordinance and a plea from the PBA for additional policemen are heard.

The reintroduction of the fire ordinance has the approval of all five councilmen in general. However the bomb in the proposal is that no specifications are listed in the ordinance. At the last meeting of the Council, Councilman James R. Golden said he would oppose any ordinance unless the specifications were included. The first ordinance for the purchase of the equipment was voted down on the objection of Councilmen Golden and Pico. Although the ordinance is expected to pass, it will not be moved without loud, lengthy fireworks.

Councilman Golden is expected to introduce a snow removal ordinance calling for up to a \$30 fine for residents who fail to clean their walks of ice and snow within 12 hours after a snowfall. This is expected to meet opposition because no provision is included to have the walks cleared if a resident does not clean them. A snow removal ordinance was hammered down several weeks ago when the councilmen could not agree on how or how much should be charged residents to (Continued On Page 2)

Judge Adds Strumolo To Recall Order, Asks Recheck of Signatures

A recall election was ordered March 3 in the Town of Belleville for the recall of Mayor Robert M. Laterza, Deputy Mayor G. George Addonizio and Councilman Vincent T. Strumolo.

The date for the election was set Friday afternoon by Superior Court Judge Alexander Waugh in Newark, after he signed the order directing that Strumolo be included in the recall election.

Judge Waugh ordered the recall of Mayor Laterza and Addonizio December 16, but ordered a recount of the petitions against Strumolo after ruling that additional names could be added to the original petitions.

A recount of the signatures from the First Ward alone showed Strumolo 41 votes short of the 2063 necessary to recall. However more than enough additional votes from the First Ward were included in the additional names.

After Judge Waugh signed the recall order, he directed Town Clerk John R. Burnett to check the additional names for validity and to be certain that there was no duplication, that is the names appearing on the original petitions as well as the list of additional names submitted in the 10 days after the original petition were rejected as insufficient.

This places Strumolo as a part of the recall election, with the reservation that if the number of valid signatures should fall short he would be removed.

The date of March 3 for the recall election also posed a problem for the judge. However it was set on agreement between the Judge, the Town Clerk and the attorney for Robert West, chairman of the For Recall Committee, who had initiated the civil action asking that a recall election be ordered.

Since the original petitions were submitted November 1, the date for the election by state law had to be no later than 90 days or January 31. However the same law said candidates for the election must file their petitions 45 days prior to the election. When the Judge ruled December 16 that a recall election was in order, less than the necessary 45 days remained for candidates to file petitions. The question was solved by agreement on the March 3 date.

It is possible that an appeal entered by Addonizio for all three members of the Council facing recall could still delay the election. However, if the date is not changed or a stay issued until the regular May election, Town voters will be going to the polls once a month for the five months beginning with the Board of Education election in February.

The lineup of elections will probably be: February, Board of Education; March, Recall election; April, Primary election; May, regular council election. (Continued On Page 9)

Recall Vote Appeal Filed By Addonizio

An appeal of the Superior Court order for a recall election was filed with the Appellate Division of Supreme Court, by Councilman G. George Addonizio soon after the order was handed down by Judge Alexander Waugh, Friday afternoon.

Councilman Addonizio said he filed the appeal in the names of all three councilmen facing a recall election scheduled Friday for March 3.

Facing recall are Mayor Robert M. Laterza, Councilmen Vincent T. Strumolo and Addonizio. The recall of the three was sought by the For Recall Committee headed by Robert West, on charges that they had formed a majority bloc and usurped the powers of the Town Manager.

The original petitions were found insufficient by Town Clerk John R. Burnett and, on advice of Town counsel, additional names were rejected as the law did not spell out the meaning of the word amend as used in the law.

Judge Waugh ruled the right to amend, included the right to substitute names for those found invalid and ordered a recall election set.

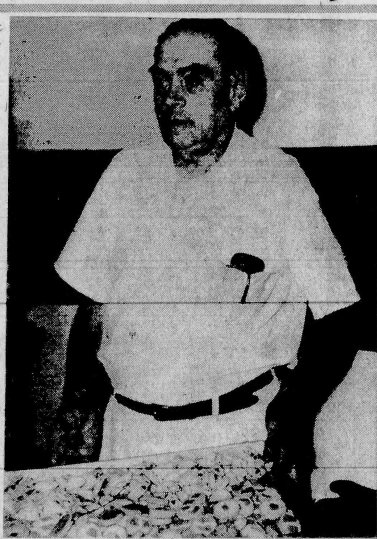
Goeckeler's Christmas Cookies Span Years from 1730, Germany

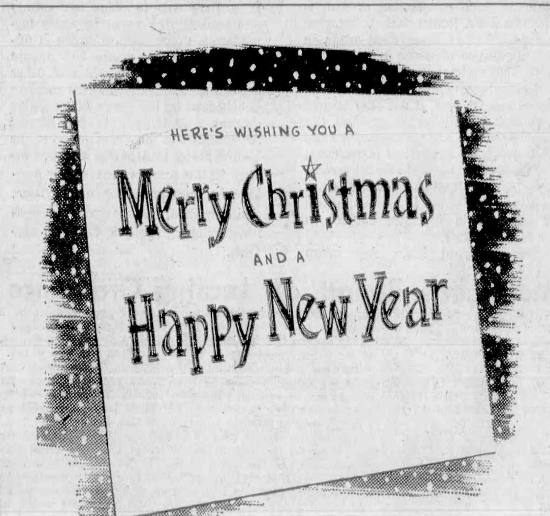
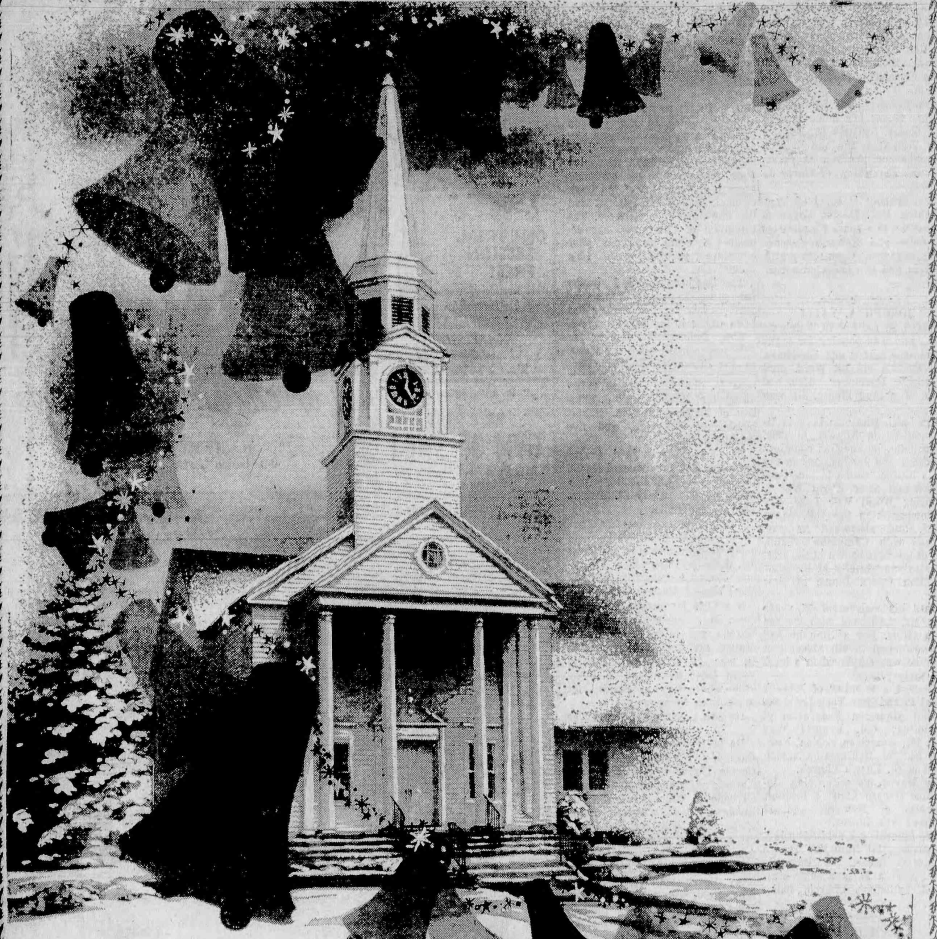

## Realistic Firearms Control

Since the death of President John F. Kennedy everyone is getting into the act calling for legislation on the sale of firearms. In Belleville Councilman James R. Golden has asked that an ordinance be drawn placing restrictions on the sale of all weapons.

The editorial presenting the side of gun owners by the National Rifle Association best presents the views of those against stricter control of firearms.

Their editorial says:

The American people and the peoples of the world mourn the death of President John F. Kennedy. This was an incredible tragedy which shocked all civilized human beings. To those who treasure the right to keep and bear arms and the other basic American freedoms, the use of a rifle to assassinate our nation's leader is a calamity added to our grief at his loss.

In this disturbing time, there is a tendency to seek a sweeping solution to crimes of violence. The days following the tragic events on Nov. 22, 1963, saw the eruption in the press, radio, and television of a highly-emotionalized reaction to the weapon with which the terrible deed was performed. Never before has there been such a wave of anti-firearm feeling or such vocal and almost universal demand for tighter controls over the mail-order sales of guns. Although much of this was hysterical in nature, it has had its impact upon the U. S. Congress and it most certainly will have its impact upon the legislature of each of the 50 states.

No group of individuals has done more over the years, or is doing more now, to evaluate the problems related to firearms and to protect the right of law-abiding American citizens to keep and bear arms, than members of the National Rifle Association of America. The NRA believes that firearms legislation is of insufficient value in the prevention of crime to justify the inevitable restrictions which such legislation places upon law-abiding citizens. Nevertheless, it does not oppose proposed legislation to prohibit the sale of firearms to persons who have been convicted of a crime of violence, fugitives from justice, mental incompetents, and other undesirable, or to proposed legislation to make the sale of firearms to juveniles subject to parental consent.

The National Rifle Association

is opposed to the registration of the ownership of firearms at any level of government; to the requirement of a license to purchase or possess a firearm; to control measures which levy discriminatory or punitive taxes or fees on the purchase or ownership of firearms; and to legislation which denies or interferes with individual rights of our citizens or is designed for the purpose of circumventing due process of law.

Reputable gun owners maintain that legislation should not be aimed at the firearm but at its misuse. The NRA does not oppose reasonable legislation regulating the carrying of a concealed hand-gun, but it does oppose the theory that a target shooter, a hunter, or a collector should be required to meet the same conditions. It strongly supports legislation providing severe additional penalties for the use of a dangerous weapon in the commission of a crime.

It is certain that anti-firearm sentiment will remain a vital problem for some time. Regardless of what the U. S. Congress may ultimately do in the way of Federal legislation, it is certain that many state legislatures will attempt solutions of one kind or another. Nothing in the present crisis has changed the fundamental policy of the National Rifle Association of America with respect to the purchase, possession, and use of firearms by law-abiding American citizens for lawful purposes.

It is important that each gun owner formulate a policy to govern his own thinking and that he accept the responsibility, as well as the privilege, of making his views known to his elected representatives. The time for hysteria and name-calling is over. It is time now to point out calmly and logically the areas in which legislation is proper and effective in discouraging the ownership and misuse of firearms by criminals and other undesirable. The lawmakers must be enlightened on the views of reputable citizens who believe in the Second Amendment to the Constitution of the United States of America and who believe in the preservation of our heritage to keep and bear arms. Then, and only then, will we have the basis for developing realistic firearms controls.

## Manager's Report on Leasing Ordinance

REPORT TO BELLEVILLE TOWN COUNCIL RE THE FINDING PROPOSAL OF THE LLOYD ENGINEERING CO., OF 75 RUTGERS STREET, BELLEVILLE, TO EITHER PURCHASE OR LEASE THE TOWN OWNED PROPERTY LOCATED AT 51-53 VALLEY STREET.

This property is listed on the official tax map of the Town of Belleville as Lots 26 and 27 on Block 74, and is commonly known as Nos. 51-53 Valley Street.

Lot 26 has a 30 foot frontage, with an average depth of 120 feet. Lot 27 has a frontage of 30 feet, with an average depth of 134 feet. The full plot, therefore, has a frontage of 60 feet on Valley Street, and contains 7706 square feet.

The premises were purchased by the Town of Belleville in 1959 and 1960. The sum of \$3900 was paid for Lot 26, with a subsequent cost of \$600, to demolish the dwelling unit on the property. Lot 27 was purchased for \$8500, making a total cost to the Town of Belleville of \$12,400 for the acquisition of said premises.

Immediately after the acquisition of Lot 26, commonly known as 53 Valley Street, the Town Commission entered into a lease with the Lloyd Engineering Co., whereby the Lessee agreed to spend the sum of \$1000 to improve said property for the purpose of parking lot use by the Lessee. This was a three years lease running from September 15, 1960 to September 15, 1962.

Comparable sales of industrial properties in the past two years show industrial purchases by American Drywood Co. 1.1 acres for \$30,000, or 62 cents per square foot. A sale at 80 Roosevelt Avenue for a 50 x 88' parcel - \$182 a square foot. A sale at 104-108 Roosevelt Av.

## Women Aid Boathouse Building Fund

Gift of a check for \$101.90 to the Boathouse Building Fund by former officers of the Nereid Boat Club Auxiliary was hailed this week by President William Chapman of the Belleville-Nutley Rowing Association, Inc., as "just another indication of the lasting influence that the old Nereid Boat Club has had — and continues to have — on the development of high school rowing in our two neighboring towns."

The check, constituting the remainder of the treasury funds of the Nereid Boat Club Auxiliary, was presented to Chapman at his office at School No. 7, Belleville, by Mrs. Margaret Dallanegra, of 7 Cathedral Avenue, Nutley; Mrs. William Bennett, of 197 Linden Avenue, and Miss Margaret Walker, of 133 Joralemon Street, Belleville, all three former officers of the Auxiliary.

Mrs. Lynn Bennett, who teaches at School No. 7, Belleville, is the wife of "Bill" Bennett, the pioneer of High School rowing in these parts. 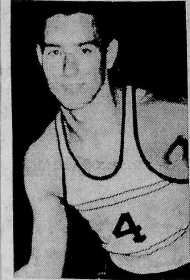

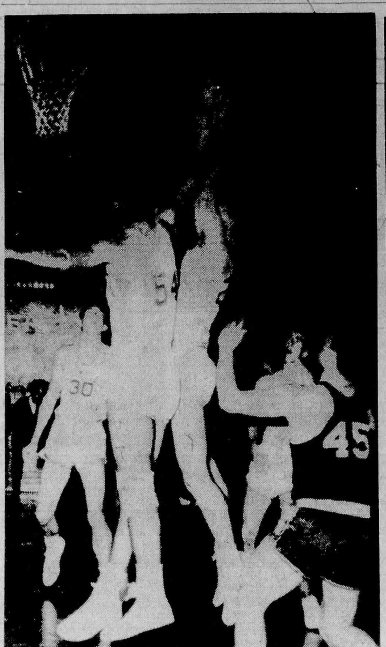

## Kearny Hands 1st Loss To Belleville Five, 60-50

A strong Kearny five led by senior sharpshooter, Walt Kilculen and Sophomore Robert Brateris combined forces last Tuesday to down Belleville, 60-50. Kearny took a quick lead in the first period, as Robert Scott drove in for a three-point play. This lead was not relinquished as Kearny's big men Kilculen and Brateris led the way with 22 and 15 points respectively.

Both squads went into the game with one win under their belts. Kearny posted a 75-53 win over Lodi, while Belleville entered this Big 10 opener with a 54-53 squeaker over Garfield.

The Bellboys showed a great deal of improvement in this game as their defense was very tough. However, the offense was slow and the shots just didn't come. The Bellboys shooting percentage was very low, as their moderate give-and-go offense couldn't function for that one good shot. From the line the Bellboys went about 66 percent hitting 12 out of 17 free throws, while the Cardinals were very poor, making 18 out of 31. Nevertheless, they could afford to have the lesser percentage since they had almost twice as many chances at the line. On the overall picture Kearny hit 33 percent more than Belleville on the line, while they put in 22 field goals to Belleville's 19.

Kearny, who averages a tall 6 feet 3 inches, managed to control the boards against Belleville's defense. The Belleville defense did hold up though, for they managed to steal the ball a number of times and they made Kearny work for almost every shot; nevertheless, the Bellboys, who average less than 6 feet, could not keep their offensive consistent and most of their scoring was done in spurts.

Nether team moved too quickly in the first quarter, but Kearny grabbed a 7-4 lead that gathered momentum. Belleville only scored one field goal in the first quarter and that may be attributed to the defensive prowess of Mike Liloia.

Both teams doubled their first period scores in the second period with Kearny coming out of the period with a 21-14 lead.

The game finally broke open in the third quarter, as Kearny scored eight field goals for 17 points and seven foul shots to bring the Kearny tally to 44. Belleville's campaign was revived in the third period by back courtman Ron Tomaszewski, as he put defense into offense for 10 points. 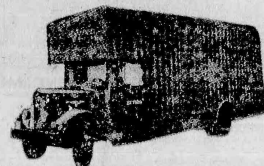

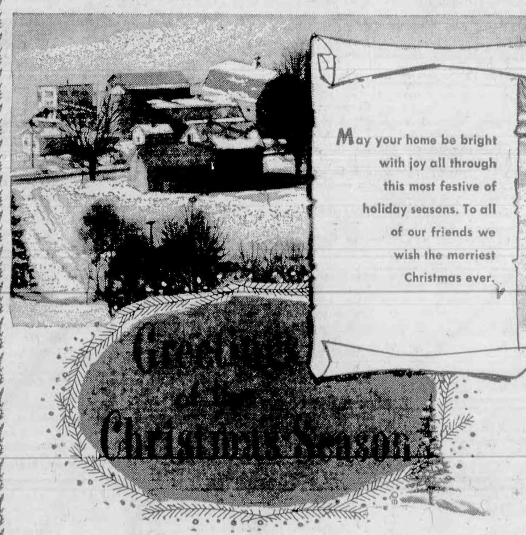

Statistics from previous years indicate that during the holiday season a greater number of persons will drink and drive than would ordinarily be the case. The reason is that holiday merry-makers are added to the hard core of drinking drivers.

Although a sustained effort to eliminate this menace is necessary at all times, an extra effort is called for during the holiday season.

During the Christmas Season, the days just preceding Christmas Day will usually see an increase of drinking and driving.
