

VETO SCHOOL BUDGET AGAIN

Council Gets Mandate To Cut, Says Mayor

The \$3,670,266.50 proposed school budget was rejected for the second time Tuesday night by the voters by about a 3-2 margin.

The Current Expenses item was defeated, 1,613 No to 1,138 Yes. The Capital Outlay section was turned down, 1,664 to 1,073.

The proposed budget was rejected February 9 by the voters, however by much slimmer margins. In the first vote the current expense item lost by only 136 votes, 1,545 against to 1,409 in favor. The capital outlay section was rejected 1,534 to 1,266 in the first vote.

The proposed budget will now go to the Town Council for its action before being submitted to the County Board of Taxation.

Mayor Nuncio R. Pico, hearing of the budget defeat, said: "We must cut the budget. It is a clear mandate from the people." The Mayor said the Council must act within 10 days and sent the budget to the County Board of Taxation for certification. Failure by the Council to act on the budget within 10 days would send it to the Commissioner of Education for his final decision.

Board of Education President Ernest S. Arvidson, following the defeat of the budget Tuesday night said: "Of course we feel a reduction would postpone some of the necessary things that must be done. It would only postpone the inevitable, but the people seem to want it."

Commenting on the reason for rejection of the budget by the voters, Arvidson said: "I believe it's a vote against taxation in general — the whole tax picture — state, school, county and national."

School Board Attorney Max Schwartz said the state statutes provide that the Council must meet with the School Board to go over the budget and then after consultation, has 10 days to certify the budget with the County Board of Taxation. He said:

License Fee Fight Mapped By Chamber

The Board of Directors of the Chamber of Commerce met with their attorney Tuesday afternoon to discuss the controversial licensing ordinance.

Harry T. French, executive director, said the group decided to meet with the Town Council. He said the Chamber is awaiting confirmation of the date which it has suggested, March 15, for the meeting.

"It is the desire of the Chamber to do all possible to convince the Town Council that since no other community in the area has such a licensing ordinance, and since the present ordinance contains many inequities that should be rescinded," French said.

\$100 Donated For Boathouse By Jaycees

The Belleville Jaycees last week donated \$100 to the Belleville Nutley Boathouse Fund.

The money is part of the local Jaycee Chapter's share of the annual football game between the National Football League's Philadelphia Eagles and the New York Giants. The game is sponsored by the State Jaycees and Belleville's share of the proceeds comes as a result of eleven of the local members working at the game taking tickets, selling hot dogs and soda and directing parking.

The local Jaycees now boast a membership of about 30, and are able to undertake sizeable community development programs, such as the forthcoming Cherry Blossom Pageant and the curb-number painting project.

Councilman James R. Golden moved to have both bids rejected and the contract readvertised but the motion was defeated, 32 to 18.

Cullen then introduced a motion for additional study and it was approved 32 with Councilman Westpy and Councilman Golden voting in opposition.

Councilman Golden explained that he did not want to continue the matter, since Town Manager Burnett had explained that the two bidding agencies were the only two active in the area.

Golden urged that the bids be rejected so that the "spirit of competition" would reduce the cost to the Town on succeeding bids.

In other action the Council introduced two ordinances. One pertaining to rules and regulations for the management and use of public sewers, drains and connections which ban any person or business with permission to connect to the sewers to allow any substance to flow into the sewers or drains that tends to fill or block the sewers.

The second ordinance regulated the height and bulk of buildings and regulated the area of yards, courts and other open space. This includes a 20-foot setback for multi-family dwellings and prohibits basement dwellings in multi-family dwellings except for quarters for the building superintendent. Both ordinances were approved, 5-0.

An ordinance on second reading creating and establishing a commission on Civil Rights, which added two more persons to the Council was amended to read: "Appointed by the Mayor with the approval of the Council."

The ordinance before the amendment gave the Mayor the appointive power outright. A resolution submitted by Councilman Golden awarding Town insurance coverage by public advertisement and bids was defeated when it failed to gain a second. At present the insurance is granted after the Town Manager and his committee secure quotations from various agencies.

Also approved was a resolution by the Junior Chamber of Commerce to conduct the Cherry Blossom Festival within the budget allowance. Prior to this year the festival was conducted by the Chamber of Commerce.

The distribution of ashes will take place at St. Anthony's Church Wednesday morning after the 7:30 and 8 a.m. Masses, at 8 a.m. after the 8:30 p.m. Mass and at 7:30 p.m. Stations of the Cross will be held each day.

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Schools Exceed National Norm in Tests

Results from nationally standardized tests, Iowa Test of Basic Skills, indicate that Belleville Schools are doing well.

Administered in Grade 4 and Grade 6 to all pupils, the Iowa tests measure language skills — vocabulary, reading, comprehension, spelling, capitalization, punctuation, and usage; work study skills — map reading, reading graphs and tables, knowledge and use of reference materials; and arithmetic skills — concepts and problem solving.

In every area the 370 fourth graders and 377 sixth graders had an average grade equivalent above the national norms for the

Iowa tests. Fourth graders averaged 2 to 4 months above national norms. Sixth graders averaged 20 to 30 months above national norms. The schools, Dr. Frank M. Duckee, Superintendent of Schools, commented further: "The objective in education is always to assist the learner to become increasingly independent and capable of finding the knowledge that he needs himself. This objective can be obtained only by increasing the knowledge and use of training and experience."

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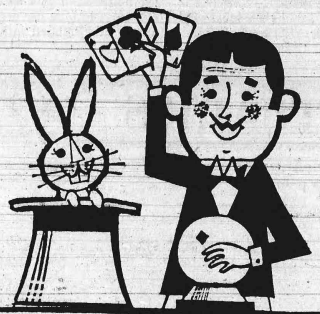

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A GOP Blunder

Well, the Republican Party in the State of New Jersey went out and did it again. The leaders from the various Counties in the State met in Trenton Tuesday night and presided over the final liquidation of the Republican Party in this State. It performed this miracle by selecting our good friend Senator Wayne Dumont as its nominee for the GOP gubernatorial nomination.

Only a hairline separated Dumont, the winner, from Senate President Charles Sandman, the loser. Dumont received 31 votes to Sandman's 29.

It is obvious the party is split right down the center in its selection of a gubernatorial nominee. The tragedy of Dumont's selection in this 1965 election year is the fact that for years he has been espousing a broad-based tax. Wayne Dumont thinks the people of New Jersey should have a Sales Tax.

Many times in the past we have personally supported and worked for Wayne. We believe he is among the finest Americans who have ever participated actively in the game of politics. A principled public official, Dumont knows no duplicity. Unfortunately the albatross around his neck is the Sales Tax.

It is our judgment candidates for the Legislature this year will be pretty much in the same boat as the Congressional and Senatorial candidates of last year. Most of the candidates below the office of president in 1964 were attempting to defend their presidential nominee, Barry Goldwater. This year the entire New Jersey Legislature is to be elected. This year candidates for the Senate and the Assembly will be compelled to explain why they are running on a ticket with Dumont when most of them are opposed to the enactment of a Sales Tax. This is especially true in Essex County. It is to the everlasting disservice to its party that a majority of the Essex County delegates at the Tuesday night conference cast their ballots for Dumont.

It is our judgment the Republican Party cannot win in Essex County supporting a candidate for Governor who favors the adoption of a Sales Tax. If Tuesday night's vote is the final answer in the selection of a GOP nominee, we believe the time has come when serious consideration should be given to the replacement of leaders in Essex County who made the selection possible. — FAO

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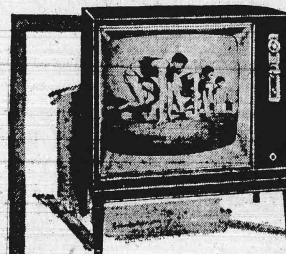

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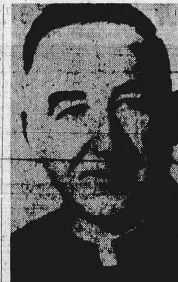
Seton Hall Dean To Speak At St. Peter's Breakfast

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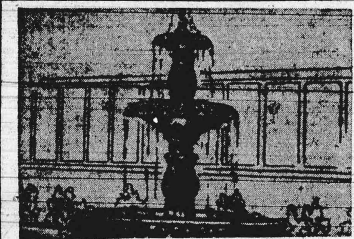

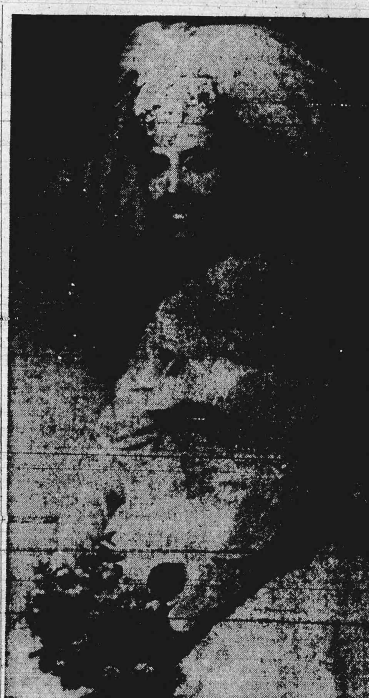

Guidance Department Continues Program of Testing Students

In an effort to fairly evaluate students' abilities, the Guidance Department of Belleville Senior High School, under the direction of Louis McKee, is continuing its testing program.

Last week, the sophomores took the Vocabulary part of the battery of Iowa Tests of Educational Development, and the seniors took the Iowa Tests of Correctness and Appropriateness of English Expression.

As a follow-up of the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test (PSAT), the School and College

Ability Test (SCAT) will be given to juniors on March 10 and 11.

These tests are part of the school testing program of Achievement Tests, Reading Ability Tests, and Intelligence Tests that are conducted at various grade levels throughout the elementary schools, junior high school, and the senior high school. Such a series of tests is needed for a fair evaluation of the student's ability and aptitude.

One test would not be fair to the student; he may have had a headache or a personal problem

when the test was administered. In such a case, the score would be far below his ability.

"When you look at a single test score, you know the student is at least this good if not better. Then, by looking at other scores you can better evaluate his aptitude. When you have a group of scores from various aptitude tests and report card grades (which show how the student applied himself), you are able to decide what category the student falls into — low, average, or high. Through a group of tests, you can make a closer approximation than from one test," explained Louis McKee, Director of Student Personnel Services.

"The SCAT will usually be found working after school dismissal, for an hour or two, in BHS. Satisfaction from his work comes from 'being able to contribute to the school system' and 'helping interested students learn the art of printing.'"

Some of the approximate 125 boys he teaches in a year, upon the graduation, have gone into the entire school system.

The SCAT will be administered in the American History I classes and will take two class periods. The Guidance Department hopes that there will be a minimum of absences during the examination.

The purpose of the tests is to give the students a realistic chance for judging what their chances are for succeeding in post-high school studies. The tests help students to decide where they should go or what careers they might choose. Therefore, the tests should be taken very seriously by the students.

By dealing with numbers and quantitative thinking, the SCAT can help the student to decide about technical school. Advancement in literature can be predicted also for the test measures abilities to handle verbal subject matter.

The School and College Ability Test is published by the Co-operative Test Division of the College Entrance Examination Board, which also administers the College Board Examinations.

For this reason, the SCAT has good predictive values on how the junior might do on the College Board Examination that the majority of the colleges and universities require for admission.

Last October when the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test (PSAT) was offered, many juniors did not take advantage of this practice. Since the entire junior class must take the SCAT, any student with potential for "post-high school study" who didn't take the PSAT will be tested now. The students who did take the PSAT will be able to see if they have improved during the past four months. These students should be fully prepared for next semester's SAT after two practice tests.

The Iowa Tests of Educational Development on Vocabulary that the sophomores took last week is of considerable interest to the Guidance Department because it is appraised upon a ranking with tenth grade students throughout the country.

This test is also important, as the sophomores will soon discover, for a mastery of vocabulary is essential for many tests, including the verbal part of the College Board Examination, the SAT, and other various business and industrial placement tests.

The better students can also look forward to a vocabulary section on their special scholarship examinations.

Over the years, students are given tests to evaluate their abilities. This vocabulary test is one of a series of tests designed to record the progress of "growth." McKee urges students with weak vocabularies to "help themselves" by trying to learn new words and use them whenever possible.

The English Test, which was taken by Seniors last week was to measure their development since the last test and to point out where they are weak and where further attention must be given. The test was administered on Thursday and Friday and took 55 minutes not including time for explanations.

Stephen Wolosonovich, a violinist, and Renan DeCamp, a pianist, have performed a concert for students with a program on Wednesday, February 17. This program is a part of a series for the advancement of music appreciation among BHS students.

Both musicians have studied at the Juilliard School of Music and have performed notably in Chicago, New York, and other cities of the United States.

After being introduced by Dr. Samuel Peck, Musical Supervisor for the town of Belleville, the two opened the program by playing the Third Movement, Violin Concerto No. 3 by Mozart.

They then followed with the Second and Third Movement, Sonata No. 3 by Grieg, which was played in C Minor.

De Camp played Mephisto Waltz by Liszt, originally a baritone melody. Next, London-derry Air, an Irish tune was played.

Assisting the parents through the new building were members of the Key Club and Student Council.

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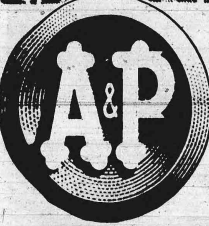


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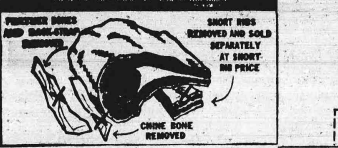
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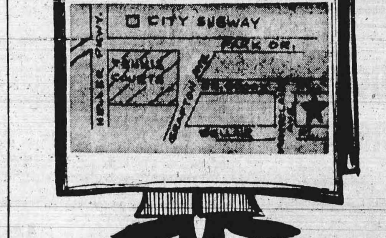
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Parisi Assigned To Airborne Unit
