

SCHOOL BUDGET CUT \$277,900

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Twice - Voter Defeated Budget Slashed by Town Council, 4-1

The Town Council, meeting in special session Sunday, reduced the Board of Education's twice defeated budget by \$277,900 as recommended in a special analysis prepared by Town Manager John Burnett.

The Council accepted the proposed reduction by a 4-1 vote. Councilman Ralph Casale was the sole dissenter. Casale had urged that \$150,000 be sliced from the proposed \$3,670,269.50 budget. He said Monday night

that he had wanted to reduce the budget by the lesser amount as he felt the "large reduction might reduce the educational process."

Voting in favor of the motion to accept Burnett's proposals to reduce the budget by the \$277,900 were Councilman Robert E. Westpy, who moved the motion; Councilman James H. Golden, who seconded the motion; Councilman William Cullen and Mayor Nuncio R. Pico.

A resolution passed by the Council, 4-1, said: This Municipal Council does hereby determine that the amount necessary for Current Expense and Capital Outlay to provide a thorough and efficient system of schools in the Town of Belleville for the next fiscal year is the sum of \$2,712,502; and that the amount be included in the 1965 tax levy for the town of Belleville for such purpose and that the said amount be certified to the Essex County Board of Taxation.

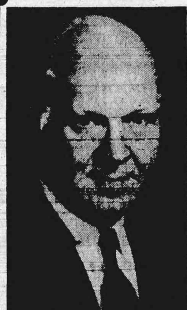
In the four-page report, submitted to the Council upon the request of Councilman O'Neil, Town Manager Burnett noted that the average daily enrollment shows little change for the three-year period, 1963 to 1966 and that while the teachers' pay increases may be necessary to provide a competitive salary scale, he could see no reason for the additional 11 new teachers. Arvidson Raps Durkee On Pro-Budget Memos

The Board of Education is apparently divided over the action of President Ernest S. Arvidson in submitting a letter to the State which he charged that Dr. Frank M. Durkee, Superintendent of Schools, "is assuming authorities without Board sanction which is harmful to the public education in Town."

In a letter, dated March 1, Arvidson noted that the Board was criticized by members of the Town Council at a joint-budget session for a letter which Dr. Durkee had sent to all principals and teachers following the defeat of the budget for the second time by the voters in which he noted the defeat was caused by the "inability to get parents to vote for the budget," and stated that the budget was "now at the mercy of the Town Council."

Three Rescued from Blaze

Two women and a man were rescued from a burning apartment building at 5 Overlook Avenue early Sunday morning by Town firemen, after six youths turned in the alarm and raced through the building waking most of the residents.

Rescued from a top-floor apartment were Mrs. Clara Smith, 51, and Mrs. Clara Navak, 42, by fireman Thomas Murphy and Fire Captain George Meyer, who used the aerial ladder to reach the fire and smoke-filled apartment.

Also rescued from a second-floor apartment where he was found on the floor at the foot of his bed, overcome by the dense smoke was Joseph Edwards, 27. Edwards was dragged from the burning apartment in which firemen believe the blaze originated, by Fireman Leo Killen.

Edwards was rushed to Clara Maass Hospital where he was treated for smoke inhalation and is reported in good condition. Fireman Killen was also taken to the hospital where he received treatment for an injured hand and smoke inhalation, and released. Also injured in the fire was J. Byrne, who bruised his upper right leg.

Fire Chief Carl T. Hundertpfund said both Firemen Murphy and Killen would receive department commendations and an additional three-days vacation for their heroic actions.

The alarm was sounded at 12:15 A.M. by one of a group of six youths who noticed the flames as they were leaving the Guys and Dolls Billiard Parlor. The youths then raced into the apartment and woke many of the residents before they were beaten back by the dense smoke and flames.

The youths were: Mike Marano, 17, of 52 Malone Avenue; James DelGuercio of 161 Forest Street; and Ralph Riefolo of 215 Little Street.

'Sorry to Disturb You, But...'

"Sorry to disturb you, but your three residents house is on fire."

That was the polite reprimand of Joe Delaport, to a smoke-dazed man who threatened to "punch you in the mouth" after he was awakened by hammering on his apartment door early Sunday morning.

Delaport, 15, of 61 Forest Street, was one of six youths who dashed into a burning apartment house at 5 Overlook Avenue early Sunday morning and was credited by fire officials with saving the lives of at least

the flames," said the 21-year-old DelGuercio. "We yelled to the other guys that there was a fire and started to run across the street."

"I looked back and saw Marano standing by the alarm box. I yelled: 'Pull the alarm. It's legal,' explained DelGuercio. Marano, 17, pulled the alarm. He admitted yesterday that he was a little doubtful about pulling the alarm and "getting into trouble."

Too High, Say Two Councilmen

The 1965 Municipal Purpose Budget of \$3,308,188.10 was adopted Monday night by a 3-2 vote of the Town Council following an all but silent public hearing on the measure.

The expected shout of taxpayers to reduce the budget, in view of the opposition to the school budget — never materialized and could be taken as a vote of confidence in the Council and the Manager — form of government.

The Council, backed up by a battery of Department chiefs, was prepared to answer all questions relating to the budget. However, except for a plea entered by Norman Lauterette, chairman of the Board of Adjustment for a change in fees for variance requests and additional funds for the board, only about three citizens had any questions on the proposed budget.

Mrs. Norma Hood and Mrs. Joan Barnes asked several questions and entered into debates with the Council on several items, but neither expressed objection to the budget or any of the items listed. Mrs. Hood asked for explanations of items in, reserve and how surplus money was handled. Mrs. Barnes questioned the allocation of funds for a roof in a special appropriation which, when approved by the Council, did not include the roof. It seems that a typing error, not a fiscal error raised her questions.

The most spirited plea against the budget was raised by Councilman James R. Golden, following the public hearing section of the meeting.

Golden called for a big reduction in the budget and charged Town Manager Burnett with shifting figures and covering up (Continued On Page 4)

Street; Joe Delaport, 15, of 61 Forest Street; Bruce Jackson of 213 Little Street, Ralph Riefolo of the Queen Ann Apartments, Jorammon Street, and Joe Palmer of Nutley.

Damage was heavy but no fatalities were made by fire officials. The second-floor of the structure was burned out, the third-floor received heavy smoke and heat damage and the first-floor, which is occupied by a drug store and a luncheonette received heavy water damage.

Fire officials believe the fire started in a studio couch on the second-floor apartment of Edwards.

Captain Meyer was high in his praise of Murphy and Killeen. He said:

"Fireman Murphy ascended the ladder followed by me. Fireman Murphy is to be highly commended for entering the smoke and intensely heated apartment and rescuing Mrs. Clara Smith and Mrs. Novak who he passed out the window to me. I cannot speak too highly of the courage and calmness he displayed.

"While proceeding down the fire escape with the two women, I noticed Fireman Killeen was in the bedroom on the second floor which was full of smoke and fire. He is credited with rescue of Joseph Edwards who was unconscious from smoke inhalation."

"These two men are deserving of all the credit that can be given to them."

the first two boys to enter the burning building. They were joined by the other youths and they started pounding on apartment doors to wake the residents.

"The place was full of smoke," said DelGuercio. "No one knew the house was on fire. One woman started to scream when she told her. She was afraid for her children who were still sleeping."

The youths located the apartment where much of the smoke was coming from but were unable to awake anyone. They started to kick in the panel door but were only able to break in a transportation facilities including a new spacious Manhattan Terminal for the Port Authority Trans-Hudson (PATH) System.

"He just ran right through the door," said Delaport. "He ran into the door and the center pieces just fell in."

The apartment was the one occupied by Joseph Edwards, who was found by firemen overcome by smoke, and rushed to Clara Maass Hospital.

"It's funny," said DelGuercio. "The place was full of smoke, but I didn't see the man."

"It wasn't like in the movies," said Delaport. "In the movies only the walls are burning and you can see what's in the room. We couldn't see anything. The room was just full of smoke."

The youths attempted to reach the third floor but were forced back from the top of the stairs by heavy smoke.

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Fire officials were high in praise of the youths action in sounding the alarm and waking the residents. Fire Chief Carl Hundertfand said individual letters of commendation would be sent to the youths.

DelGuercio is employed by the Walter Kidde Company, when not busy as part owner of Jimmy's Kiddie Rides. Marano is a student at Don Bosco Tech. Delaport is studying with a private tutor after a knee injury forced him out of Belleville High School to which he will return next year, Jackson is employed at the Wilbur B. Driver Wire Works.

Palmer is a manager of Korvette's and Riefolo is a member of the Riefolo Construction Company.

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TO THE GOP

Senator Sandman Says Suicide or Survival

Senate President Charles W. Sandman Jr. this week announced his candidacy for the Republican nomination for Governor. Incumbent Governor Richard J. Hughes is completing a four year term he won in 1961 defeating the late James Mitchell. Hughes has stated that he intends to seek reelection in November.

Sandman's entry into the race presents a challenge to Warren County State Senator Wayne Dumont who won a hair-line decision from a 60 member Republican committee, besting Sandman on the ninth ballot 31 to 29.

According to reports appearing in the daily papers Dumont's immediate comment upon learning of Sandman's decision was to yell foul. He accused Sandman of failing to abide by the decision of a 60 member screening committee. Dumont sluffed off the sales tax as an issue and said, "Sandman's failure to abide by the screening committee's decision may be the paramount issue."

It is clear that Dumont, in making this statement, is beginning his primary campaign on the wrong foot. His first salvo is an attack upon the personal integrity of a senate colleague who happens at the moment to be his only primary opponent.

If Dumont's charge is true it would appear Sandman is keeping good company. Two other senators, Nelson Stamler of Union and C. Robert Sarcone of Essex were members of that same 60 member committee — and as of this moment both Stamler and Sarcone are attempting to enlist sufficient money and organization support to contest Dumont for the nomination. If they enter the race will Dumont also accuse them of failing to abide by the screening committee's decision? Will this be his only primary issue?

We recall last year the GOP established a similar committee to select a U.S. Senate candidate to vie for the seat of incumbent U.S. Senator Harrison Williams. U.S. Senator Clifford P. Case was a member of that 1964 committee. But after the results were in and the committee selected Bernard M. Shanley as its standard bearer, Case decided he wanted to support former Assembly Minority Leader Carmine Savino of Lyndhurst.

On the one and only issue which Dumont has raised against Sandman, the Senate President is keeping the company of Case, Sarcone, and Stamler. We think that is pretty good company for Sandman to keep.

In the intervening three weeks since the 60 member committee made its choice, Sandman has been hearing an avalanche of criticism aimed at Dumont's sponsorship of a 3 per cent sales tax. This caused him to reconsider his original decision to support Dumont.

During the past seven days Sandman has conferred with Dumont three times attempting to convince the sales tax advocate to modify his position.

For one hour last Friday, Sandman and several other senators, i.e. Frank Farley, William Ozzard, Robert Sarcone, were led to believe that Dumont agreed in con-

ference to accept Sandman's demands to alter his rigid sales tax stand. To the disappointment of Sandman, his senate colleagues, and GOP State Chairman Webster Todd, all present at that fateful Friday conference held in the Governor's office, (Sandman was Acting Governor last week), Dumont at 5:30 p.m. addressed a hastily called press conference in the Senate chambers denying everything Sandman told the same reporters one hour earlier.

Monday of this week Sandman again sat down with Dumont in a final effort to convince Dumont to abandon the sales tax. Dumont refused — and Sandman, very reluctantly, decided to edge his sombrero into the gubernatorial primary ring.

Sandman believes a Republican gubernatorial candidate, advocating a sales tax, cannot win in November. Dumont is the foremost sales tax advocate in New Jersey. He has introduced legislation for the adoption of a 3 per cent sales tax. The legislation is, before the present Legislature.

Because this is a reapportionment election year with all senate and assembly seats to be contested in addition to the governorship Sandman believes Republican candidates should not be handicapped at the November election explaining why they oppose sales taxes yet run on a ticket led by a gubernatorial candidate who is its prime supporter.

"Republicans stand a good chance of losing control of the remaining few courthouses still managed by our party if a sales tax advocate is the Republican gubernatorial candidate," adds Sandman. We agree.

It behooves Republican leaders to consider the wisdom of Sandman's concern. In becoming a candidate for the state's highest office, Sandman has risen to his party's highest calling. He has sounded the alarm for all to hear.

Certainly for the Republican Party in Essex County November may be its last chance for this generation of Republican voters to recapture control of county government. Essex County GOP runs the real risk of going down to a smashing defeat this fall if its county, senate and assembly candidates are obliged to appear on a ballot led by the chief architect of a 3 per cent sales tax. Would the party leaders knowingly commit suicide? We don't think so.

For any Republican to be elected Governor in November he must carry Essex County — hence what action Essex GOP leaders take during the weeks ahead in the unfolding gubernatorial sweepstakes not only will determine the fate of GOP candidates in the county but in the state as well. This awesome responsibility should have a sobering effect upon sincere, dedicated, well motivated leaders like GOP Chairman Andrew Axtell and Clean Government President Frank Bate. Upon the shoulders of these two men will rest the fate of the Republican party in Essex County and New Jersey. Will they decide in favor of suicide or survival? —FAO

Drienza said he believed it would have been better if Arvidson would have had the Board approve the letter before sending it to the State Commissioner. Mrs. McCool said she believed Arvidson had taken powers upon himself and was using the office of president to wage a personal vendetta.

The fastest growing industry is "electronics". There is hardly a new house being built that does not have a number of electronic gadgets. First of all, there is an antenna and the wiring of the house for several outlets for TV sets. Often, one finds a public address system, which uses transistors. Many washing machines have electronic controls. Air-conditioners have electronic filters for better dust elimination. The new house will be wired so that speakers can be hooked up in different rooms. The telephone is equipped with a gadget that takes a message when you are out and plays it back to you, when you turn a switch. As you approach your garage, you press a button on the dashboard and the garage door opens. There is a little transmitter in the car and a receiver in the garage waiting for the signal to start a motor which opens the door. If you go on vacation, you protect your house against burglars by invisible infrared light beams, which sound an alarm if the beam is interrupted.

All of this sounds fantastic to many people, but if you look at a new house these days, you will find many of these new devices built right in. And then, of course, there is the radio, the TV and the phonograph, without which a home appears to be incomplete.

The industry is faced with the great problem to find men to install, service and repair all these instruments. At present there is a desperate shortage of mechanics to do these jobs. And this condition will become worse. A young man with technical ability would do well to take up electronics. He would never have to worry about a job.

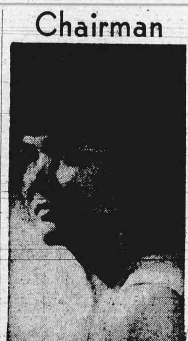

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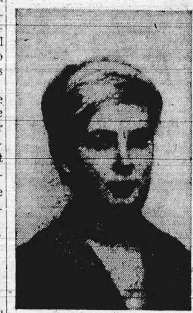

Dr. Peck Keeps Music In Key at High School

Dr. Samuel Peck, Director of Music in the Belleville Public Schools, has made numerous contributions to the music education of Belleville school children during his 20 years here.

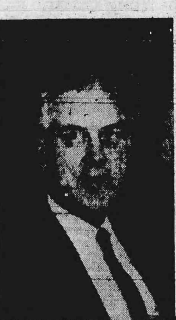
Dr. Peck graduated from Sharon High School in Massachusetts and received his A. B. and M. A. degrees from Boston University. He received his Doctor of Education degree from Columbia University.

A resident of Belleville, Dr. Peck has received instructions at such institutions as the Eastman School of Music, the New England Conservatory, the Malkin Conservatory, and the Mozart Academy in Salzburg, Austria. He studied with such well-known personalities as Serge Koussevitzky, world-famous conductor of the Boston Symphony Orchestra, and was a classmate of Leonard Bernstein who now conducts the New York Philharmonic Symphony Orchestra.

In 1937, Dr. Peck founded the Reading Symphony Orchestra in Massachusetts, which he was director of Music, and conducted this group until February of 1945 when he came to Belleville. In Belleville his name is associated with the Baker's Dozen, a select group of high school girl singers who were organized in 1947 and have sung many concerts in Belleville and the surrounding area.

Dr. Peck is a member of the Music Educators' National Conference and is a former president of the New Jersey Music Educators' Association. Besides directing the music program in all the public schools, he teaches two chorus groups and two classes in music appreciation at the Belleville High School.
