### Addonizio Orders Flow Cut by 50 Per Cent

The City of Newark cut the flow of water into Belleville and five other area communities yesterday to 50 per cent of its normal rate.

The order to cut the flow of water to Belleville and other Towns supplied by Newark was issued Tuesday by Newark Mayor Hugh Addonizio after he toured the five reservoirs in the Newark watershed and found only a 56-day supply of water remaining in the Pequannock system.

Final approval of a 48-inch main from Elizabethtown Water Company facilities in Linden which will bring 25-million gallon of water daily into Newark will not be completed for 105 days, if approved. This would not be in time to help out in the current drought situation.

In addition to Belleville, towns whose water flow has been reduced are Nutley, Wayne, Bloomfield, Pequannock and Packanack Lake.

In announcing the reduction in the flow of water into the listed Towns, Mayor Addonizio said:

"This is a hard spot. However water conservation in other municipalities show after failure of the water conservation program.

"We can't continue to underwrite other municipalities. We have done our best to encourage area conservation and participation but all of our actions have been met with coolness.

Now we must act to protect ourselves. The key factor in the decision was that the affected Towns have consumed three-quarters of a billion gallons more in the first six months of 1965 than they did last year. The city of Newark reduced its consumption by 331 million gallons last month alone.

### Summer Work Program Rapped

Councilman James R. Golden termed the Town roster of temporary summer employees as a "Who's Who of the Town's political offshoots" in a prepared release rapping Town Manager John R. Burnett and Mayor Nuncio R. Pico.

Golden said the roster was a list of youths with political connections rather than a staff of workers whose employment would best serve the needs of the Town.

Golden charged that the local summer work program was "not in conformity with the precepts outlined in the President's Youth Opportunity. Campaign launched on May 22."

He said: "Under that impressive program endorsed by the National League of Cities, Mayors of all towns and cities over 30,000 population are called upon to take the following steps:

"1. Request the director of the local office of the State Employment Service to meet with the Mayor to plan the local Campaign, including survey of local job market.

"2. Provide temporary facilities in city hall as a Youth Employment Center, to be manned by Employment Service Personnel.

"3. Encourage employers—public and private—to create extra summer jobs and make an inventory of those additional work opportunities.

"Emphasis is placed upon the desire to help our needy young people this summer, not only the sons and daughters of local political 'big shots' who might aid the political ambitions of Town Hall politicians.

"Councilman Golden denounced the failure of the Town Manager and Mayor Pico to comply with the procedures outlined by the President's Youth Opportunity Campaign, calling their conduct in this matter arbitrary and actuated by sheer political motivation designed to facilitate the perpetuation of incumbents in public office by giving Summer jobs to the children of local political

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Belleville Man Among Six Found Guilty in Counterfeiting of Bonds

Joseph Mattia, 35, of 29 Myrtle Avenue, Belleville, one of six defendants charged with conspiring to counterfeit between \$2 and \$3 million in General Motor Acceptance Corporation bonds, was found guilty Friday night by a jury of nine women and three men before Federal Court Judge Reynier J. Wortendyke, Jr.

The jury acquitted Romeo Mattia, 61, of 29 Myrtle Avenue, Belleville, owner of Mattia Printing Company, 29 Park Avenue, Newark, where the bogus bonds allegedly were printed. His son, Joseph, was manager of the company.

Others found guilty by the jury were Frank Mancinelli, 46, of 228 Union Avenue, Irvington; John Raio, 34, of 86 E. Almira Street, Bloomfield; Gerald Penna, 43, of 257 Parker Street, Newark; and Dominick Natale, 40, of 28 Synard Place, Newark.

Judge Wortendyke ordered that sentencing would be held later at the convenience of the probation department. Those convicted are subject to a maximum of up to five years in jail, up to \$10,000 in fines, or a combination of both.

Those on trial were among 14 men who were indicted in October 1962, for counterfeiting the GMAC bonds between August 1 and December 20, 1961, with intent to sell them or to transport them from Newark to New York, Toronto, Miami, and Los Angeles to use them as collateral to borrow money.

A key witness during the trial which began June 17 was Stanley Adlar, a former bookkeeper for Mattia. He testified that in September 1961, he overheard Joseph Mattia and Leo I. Sagal, 45, of Maplewood Avenue, Maplewood, discuss printing the bonds. He admitted that between September and December 1961, he also observed Mattia and the four other defendants employ employees discuss work on the bonds.

Sagal, a self-employed business promoter, pleaded guilty during the early stages of the trial. State Senator C. Robert Sarcone, attorney for all the defendants except Natale, besides putting his clients on the witness stand to deny the charges, produced a printing expert to testify that the bogus bonds weren't printed on Mattia's presses. Another Mattia employee also testified that he never saw any bonds at the plant.

Questioned by Sarcone, Romeo Mattia testified that his son actually ran the business and that he worked only occasionally, because of illness. Mattia also testified that he never worked nights, when Adlar claimed the bonds were printed.

Natale's attorney, Humphrey Famularo, produced witnesses who testified that his client wasn't employed at the Mattia firm during the period when the bonds allegedly were counterfeited.

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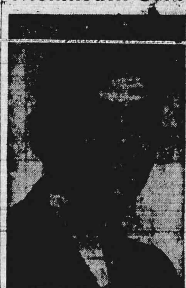

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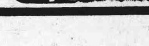
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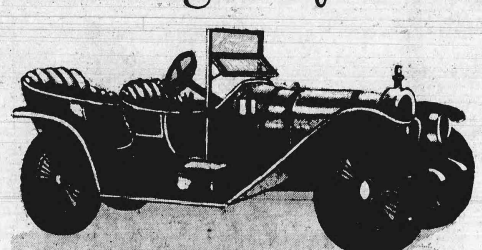
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## "Pet-Napping"

Last week Congressman Joseph Y. Resnick, Democrat of New York, introduced legislation to regulate dog dealers who sell pets to medical facilities.

The purpose of the proposed tough law is to punish thieves who make a living by stealing family pets and selling them to research laboratories.

When a child or an adult takes a pet into his or her home, soon there develops a relationship between the two that, in some instances, transcends affection as between people.

When a child is robbed of his pet by a scoundrel who is out to make a fast buck, the thief should be punished with a mandatory, stiff jail sentence.

## What's Our Engineer Doing?

The Town Council has been charged on several occasions with not paying any attention to the wants of the public. Now it looks like Mayor Nuncio Pico is going to ignore the demands of his fellow councilmen.

Both Councilmen James Golden and Robert Westpy have asked — What is the Town Engineer doing that has him overworked and made it necessary for the Town to spend about \$10,000 for outside engineering work on the Joramemon Street repaving project? Westpy went further at the last Council meeting and suggested that the Council-as-a-Whole investigate the engineering department. However his suggestion was ignored.

It may come as a surprise to some of the Council members, but there are many taxpayers in Town who would also like to know.

Councilman Golden said several weeks ago at a Council session, when the hiring of outside help for the Joramemon Street project was first suggested, that he had received a report that the Town Engineer

was refusing to do any outside work since he had not been granted a pay raise this year.

If this is true, we don't believe the Council, the Mayor or the Town Manager has a right to hide the facts and cover up for an employee on the public payroll who is not performing his assigned tasks.

We believe the Mayor should call a special session of the Council — since the next meeting is not scheduled until the last Monday of the month — and have the Council conduct an investigation and report the facts to the public.

Councilman Westpy said: "If the Town Engineer is not doing his duty we (the council) should start looking for a new engineer." We believe the taxpayers agree with him 100 per cent.

Buried in the reports that the Town consumption of water has been reduced some five per cent since the Governor and local officials have urged the public to cut our water consumption is the hard fact that during the first five months of this year our residents have used 168,255,803 gallons more than they did last year.

The five per cent reduction really means nothing when you get down to the basic facts that this year we have an extreme water emergency and we are still using more water than ever.

Town Manager Burnett has attempted to show Newark water officials that we are trying to cooperate with the conservation measures and that the additional water usage has been caused by an influx of new residents and the construction work being done at Clara Maass Memorial Hospital. We are sure that these are contributing causes, but we don't believe they are the

major reason the Town has failed to reduce its water consumption to at least last year's mark.

We believe the public still fails to realize the seriousness of the situation. We don't believe there are many residents who can say that they did not waste some water last week or even today.

We don't blame anyone for this waste because for years water, like air, seems to be impossible to use up. However the year of the water shortage has arrived. It is this year that each one of us must quit depending on our neighbors to save enough to take care of our needs.

Each one of us should make it a practice to save at least one glass of water each day. We are now at a stage where every drop saved is important. Remember the glass of water you save today may be the only glass you can drink in the not too distant tomorrow. FCW

### Calls for End of Snooping on Refugees

I introduced legislation this month to prohibit private American detective agencies from acting as a hired gargoyle for any foreign government or foreign political party. This bill is intended to bring to a halt such spying and other snooping activities on refugees, exiles and other foreigners who come to this country. The long arm of totalitarian regimes should not be permitted to touch these people, especially through private American detective agencies. I think that all will agree that the United States should remain a haven for the persecuted. This is a policy closely interwoven with the very beginning of American history. I feel quite strongly that this bill will help to keep America as a sanctuary for these unfortunate.

My attention was first drawn to this matter last year when Virginia Prewett, the distinguished columnist on Latin American affairs, described the plight of Haitian refugees and exiles in the United States. She said in a column appearing in the Washington Daily News that "the same terror that stalks dictator-ridden Haiti now haunts Haitians in the United States." She

reported that "a new secret service recently created by Haiti's 'President' Francois Duvalier and called the 'International Squad' is spying on Haitians in New York and elsewhere with brutal reprisals for those who criticize Duvalier overseas and then go home."

Private American agencies allegedly operated as part of this apparatus. Indeed, records of the U. S. Department of Justice substantiate the charge. They show that not only has such surveillance and investigative work been performed for Haiti by private American detective agencies, but also for other countries. And I cannot help but feel there is much unreported activity of the same type.

This sort of nefarious snooping should be halted immediately. At the same time, Congress should amend the Foreign Agents Registration Act to make it clear that such activity constitutes a violation of American law and will be punished accordingly. Simple justice demands no less. I hope the House Committee on Judiciary will approve this measure separately or as an amendment to legislation currently being considered to legislate the Foreign Agents Registration Act up to date.

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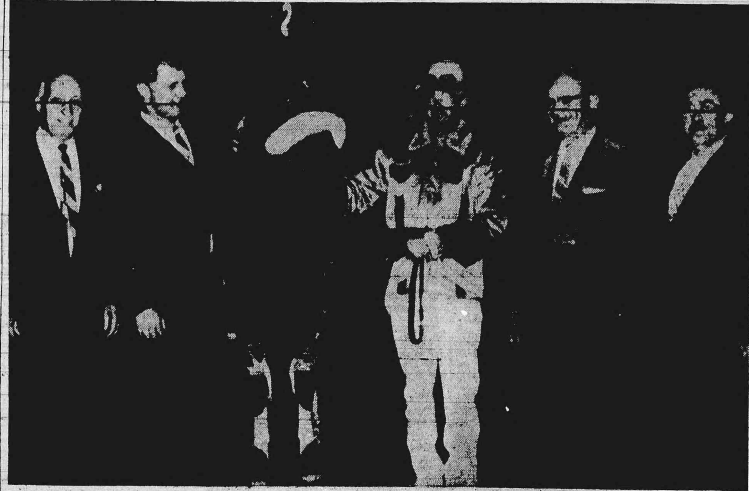
