It was like Old Home Week at Town Hall Monday afternoon. A son joined his father on the Belleville Police force, and a brother-in-law was promoted to sergeant in brief ceremonies in the council chambers.

Sgt. Joseph McNish, a member of the department for the past 18 years and an officer for 10 was sworn in as a lieutenant, replacing Police Lt. Jerry Lillore, who died at Clara Maass Memorial Hospital after a lengthy illness two weeks ago.

A new patrolman, Martin J. McNish, 22, whose father, the new lieutenant, was sworn in at the same time. The younger McNish had been a military policeman with the U.S. Army in Germany and had been employed by United Parcel Service before getting in line for the new position with the department.

Meanwhile Michael Hanley, a brother-in-law, was sworn in as a sergeant, replacing McNish who had been promoted.

"The funny thing is," said Town Manager John R. Burnett, "that all three were on top of the list with Civil Service."

"One of the features of the parade will be the appearance of both State Commanders of the Veterans of Foreign Wars and the American Legion," John Cramer of Little Ferry is the VFW commander, and William R. Huggard is the American Legion Department Commander.

## The New Code Of Conduct Isn't Too Likely To Please Students

Thursday afternoon some 1,225 Belleville Junior High School students will receive a 16-page "Practical Guide" from the Committee on Narcotics which will tell them dating, drinking, smoking, and late parties should be forbidden to their age group. Reactions were predictably diverse.

"I think it's too strict," said 17-year-old Carol Shelesky of Belleville High School. But she agreed that even if all the recom-

mendations in the pocket-sized guide aren't followed, students will be well ahead of the game if they follow any of the committee's suggestions.

"It's a good thing," agreed Dave Bukunus, 16, president of the Student Council at Belleville High School. Nothing in agreement was Gail Cronauer, 16, executive secretary of the Student Council. All three, after studying the contents of the yellow booklet, will explain its contents

to Junior High School students today during a special assembly program.

Subjects Covered  
Included in the booklet are advice on home work ("... your homework should be placed first on your list"); telephone calls ("These should not be received during meal hours, or later than 9 p.m."); and extra-curricular activities (Scouting, Red Cross, and church activities).

Sartorial elegance also came in for comment by the Subcommittee on Teen-Age Standards and Deportment. "Slacks and d-shirts, dungarees and T-shirts, and tight-fitting trousers will not be permitted," said the booklet.

A blow to feminine vanity came in when they were told make-up will not be permitted. High heels, veined blouses and sweaters were also on forbidden list.

Smoking, long a boy's fond (but mistaken) version of manhood was listed as being strictly prohibited. Over this two-paragraph recommendation was a picture of large, still-smoking butt to emphasize its off-limits to students.

## Tardy Tax Delinquents Being Dunned By Town

You can't beat Town Hall. Not if you owe back taxes, that is, and three municipal employees — one of them a town official — were on the delinquent tax list made up by Town Treasurer Francis McCoy last week.

The three didn't receive their pay envelopes Thursday until they had given written or verbal assurances to pay monthly payments on personal household taxes would be forthcoming.

The town official, who McCoy declined to name, had given a verbal agreement to pay up the \$34.09 McCoy says is due. The figure includes taxes for 1943-45 — 20 years ago.

McCoy threatened to serve the official with a tax warrant if the bill hadn't been paid by Nov. 2. Two other employees signed agreements to pay monthly installments on the delinquent taxes would be forthcoming.

## Equal Facilities Sought By School 4 Representatives

## Walter Kidde Says Earnings Increase Over \$1 Million

Earnings of Walter Kidde & Company, Inc. for the nine months ended September 30 rose to \$1,000,000 this year, from \$500,000 for the comparable period of 1964. Fred R. Sullivan, president, reported today.

Earnings per share increased 63 per cent, to \$1.14 in 1965 from 70c in 1964, based on the number of shares of common stock outstanding at the end of the period and adjusted for stock dividends.

Sales of \$70,780,000 for the nine-month period were more than double the previous year's sales of \$33,782,000 for the comparable period.

Kidde also announced that the board of directors voted October 18, to declare a 3 1/2 per cent stock dividend, payable December 31, 1965 to common stock of record Nov. 22, 1965.

Kidde is a major producer of safety, security and protection aerospace systems and equipment, and temperature-controlled and other display equipment.

Headquartered in Belleville, Kidde has other plants in eight states.

## Veterans Day In A Weary World

Forty-seven years ago, on Nov. 10, 1918 a group of soldiers entered Marshal Pico's railway coach near Compiegne, France and signed an armistice that ended World War I. The next day — at 11 a.m. — army bugles sounded the "Cease fire" and the "war to end all wars" finally ended.

Since that day of hopeful idealism we American servicemen who wore the uniform of our country have witnessed a second World War, a Korean War, and two interventions on both sides of the hemisphere — all of which cost good American lives in the thousands. And still there is no peace.

## The Fault Lies In An Indecisive Mayor

Every man has a few mental hair-shirts, and mayors differ only by their larger wardrobes. One of the itchiest Mayor Nuncio R. Pico has to squirm under is that fabricated by a boorish councilman and several of his colleagues, whom he goads into senseless name-calling and flagrant digression from public business at hand.

All this nonsense would come to a screeching halt if Mayor Pico were to exercise the authority entrusted to him by the people of Belleville when they made him the town's highest executive officer.

Next week is Veterans Day, and our nation is still paying tribute, not only to those who served in 1917-18 but to the 16,112,566 men called to the colors in World War II, and the 5,720,000 of our servicemen in the Korean War, plus ever increasing numbers who fight in Viet Nam.

Thursday, flags should fly from every place of business throughout the town and from homes in the quieter neighborhoods as a salute to the men who gave blood, and too often, their lives for YOU.

Make Belleville known as the town who remembers its veterans!

He would, by his lawful demand for decorum in the council chambers, be called an exponent of "gag rule." It's an over-worked cliché the offending councilman holds dear in his vocabulary. But no mayor should fear his duties. He should say "Stop!" — and mean it.

Town residents will applaud the mayor's strong stand against the infantile theatrics of the town clown. It is an action long overdue by a "tolerant" mayor who could end the disgraceful circus-like atmosphere which makes Belleville Town Hall the laughing stock of its neighboring municipalities. G.F.A.

### BECK'S COLUMN

If you are in the market for a new black and white TV set, you have a choice of 12 different tube sizes, from 9" to 27". This does not include the very small sets with 5" and 8" tubes imported from Japan.

Of course there is no need for so many different sizes. It is a typical example of waste. Concentrating on a few sizes would result in production economies with consequent price reductions.

Not all factories make all sizes. Magnavox for instance is the only manufacturer of 27" sets. Although there are not too many customers for this screen, some people with very poor eyesight are glad that such a large picture is available. The same company still does a good business in 24" sets. I bet there is of course the most popular 23" size, which is used in most h/w consoles and even in some table models.

By far the most popular TV sets today are the 19" portables. They are quite heavy and really not suitable to be carried around frequently, as many owners have found out. Still, for a convenience at home it is not too difficult to handle them. And then there are all sizes from 9" to 17". The most popular one of all sizes under 19" is the 12" portable. This is easily carried around and fits into small spaces, but is only a couple of inches larger than the 12" sets in h/w. Gradually we see more and more transistors used in these small sets, which is an advantage because transistors do not overheat like tubes.

One should think that television manufacturers have learned to standardize picture tube sizes. But no, they haven't. There is a 16" color tube which is 1" only in impaled color sets sold exclusively by the largest retail order house. Then we have a 19", a 21", a 23", and a 25" color tube. The most popular one at this time is the 21" round tube. Now there is talk about a 19" and a 22" color tube in the works, which would make the situation as confusing as it is now. It seems as if some people never learn.

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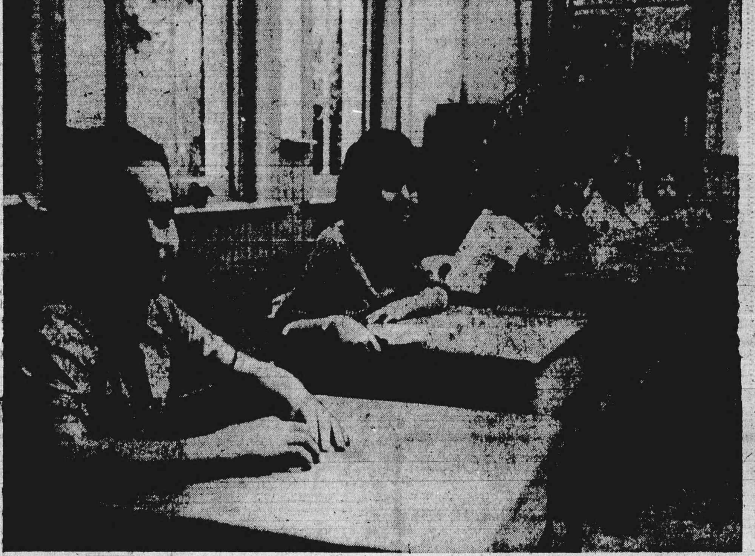

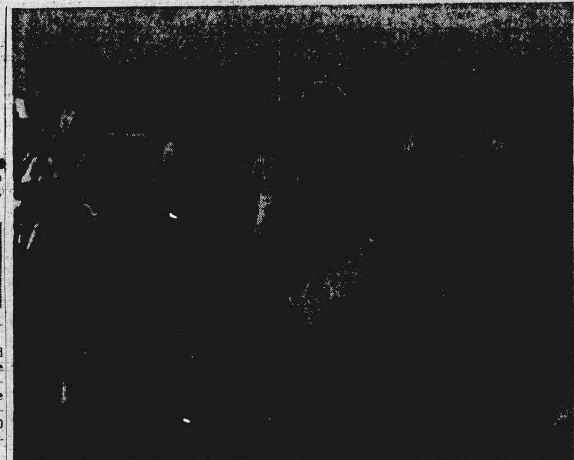
The final penalty took the cake, since it is virtually impossible.

## Blame Teens for Most Reported Car Thefts

At a conference on car thefts held last year under the sponsorship of the Motor Club of America, Samuel Green, executive vice president of the Company, told the audience of law enforcement officials, representatives of the insurance industry, county and state lawyers, "The problem of car thefts in our State, especially as it relates to the youthful driver — a teenager in most cases — is becoming increasingly burdensome."

"In terms of money," Green said, "this burden reaches over \$400 million annually in the U.S. In terms of property damage, the figure is equally appalling. In terms of injury and even death, by far the greatest cost, all you have to do is ask your local police officials."

Green's remarks point up the increasing concern among members of the insurance field in the mounting problem of car thefts in the nation today. As a major insurance company, MCA alone deals monthly with over 20 car theft cases. Throughout the nation, over 1000 cars a day are stolen.

Through excellent police work, 92 per cent of the cars stolen in New Jersey are recovered, but the remaining 8 per cent cost the insurance companies over \$3,000,000 a year.

**Thief's Best Friend**  
Just one upsetting factor to insurance people is that the car

owner is often the thief's closest ally. It is the owner who leaves the windows ajar, the doors unlocked, and the keys in the ignition.

Insurance and law enforcement people estimate that 40 per cent of all car thefts could be avoided if the owners did not leave the keys in the ignition as an open invitation.

Another aspect of the problem that disturbs all who must grapple with it, is the fact that 80 per cent of all cars stolen are taken by teenagers. Teenaged "joy-riders" often complain that they steal the cars because the insurance rates are so high they cannot afford the necessary insurance to own a car.

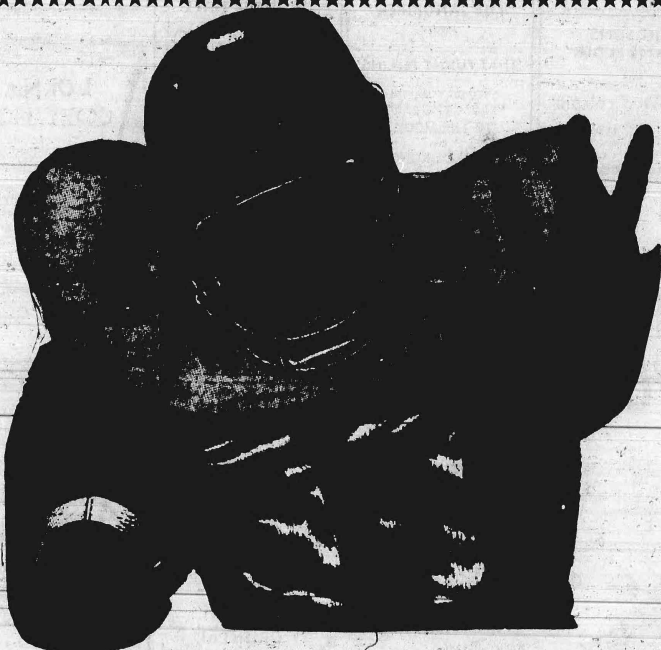

Medicare Kits Mailed To Local Sr. Citizens

Working round the clock since September 1, Social Security Headquarters has completed the mailing of Medicare information kits to all of the 154 million persons 65 and over on the social security medical insurance part of Medicare. William J. Arnold, Social Security District manager, said.

By now, an elderly social security or railroad retirement beneficiary in Nutley, Belleville and North Newark should have received their kits and the enclosed application for the supplemental medical insurance part of Medicare.

About 1,000 other older persons — those not on the social security or railroad retirement benefit rolls — have already been in touch with the Social Security District Office in Newark, he reported. But many others still need to take action to protect their Medicare rights.

Eight out of ten aged persons will be reached through the mass mailing, he noted. About one-third of those who will not be reached this way are receiving old-age assistance payments and will hear directly from their local welfare agencies.

Some Full-Time  
Another third are still working full time and will need to file social security applications. About one million will also have to get in touch with their local Social Security District Office. The enrollment period for those who will be 65 or over before the end of the year, closes March 31, 1966, Mr. Arnold pointed out.

The March 31 deadline is very important, he stressed. Everyone who is 65 or will be by January

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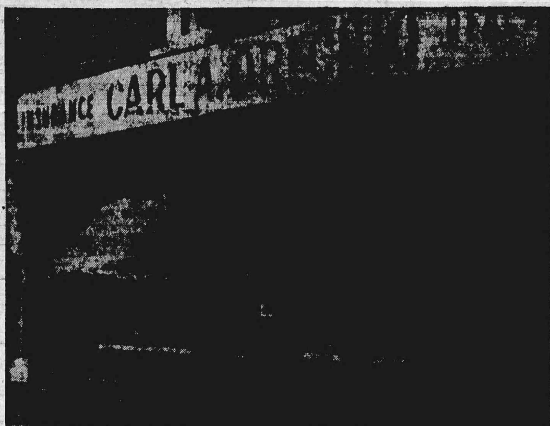
