## \$40,000 Tab For Company

### Wallace Tiernan Found Guilty On 4 Drug Charges

A 15-month-old indictment against Wallace & Tiernan, Inc. of Belleville ended Monday when the firm, one of the town's largest, was fined \$40,000 by Federal Judge Matthews McGuire after entering a plea of no contest to four charges of improperly withholding information regarding the effects of the drug "Dormal."

Four other charges were dismissed in the eight-count indictment.

Dr. Charles Hough, a former medical director from Morris Plains told the court there had been no suppression of data, but that it had been "rather an intention to eventually report the full results of a thorough medical investigation which was actively conducted."

Two former employees were placed on probation. Dr. Hough was placed on two-year probation after pleading no contest to one count. Dr. Robert Connor of Los Angeles, a former director of pharmaceutical research pleaded to two misdemeanor counts and was placed on probation for six months in 1964.

The indictments were made in August 1964 when the Food and Drug Administration charged the firm with withholding information on the after effects of the drug, a mild tranquilizer.

The indictment had been dismissed by a federal judge who ruled the Grand Jury had been improperly impaneled, but were later reinstated on the government's appeal.

Three deaths were alleged to have resulted from use of the drug. Eleven reports had been received from the doctors who said a blood disorder also resulted from its use.

An attorney for the firm admitted that these reports had been promptly conveyed to the FDA as soon as received. "The defendants believe that this was neither necessary nor desirable as far as the FDA was concerned."

**Report Delayed**  
The incoming reports were tabulated in an effort to evaluate data in a clarified report which would be submitted to the FDA, said a spokesman for the firm. "The data was meaningless until supplemented by hospital records and other medical data," said the attorney.

The company believed it could first evaluate and examine data before reporting to the FDA, he added.

The firm had been in the process of forwarding this data when the FDA first learned of the cases and began court proceedings. The company withdrew the drug from the market in November 1961.

## Slick IBM Forms Will Replace Report Cards At High School

The impersonal efficiency of International Business Machines took its grip on student life last week when Belleville High School principal Raymond O. Smith ordered the first of some 1,651 data processing cards printed that will translate student names and grades into neatly punched holes in a 4 by 7-1/4 inch form.

"I'm not too sure of them yet," Smith said Tuesday. "This is the first time we've ever used them."

For the first time in the school's history student report cards will be punched on forms resembling government checks guaranteeing immediate availability and all-encompassing information on a single card.

Names, grades, and credits earned will become part of a series of three cards. Two go to parents who keep one, sign the other and return it to the school. A third is kept for school records.

Absentee and tardy records will also go on the cards with the total time lost being accumulated by the month.

### Housing Council Meets on Friday

The Belleville Fair Housing Council will hold a meeting Friday, Nov. 12, at 8:30 p.m., in Belleville's Recreation House at 407 Jerusalem Street.

Plans for 1966 will be discussed, said Mrs. Muriel Finch, Belleville attorney, and James Brown, Belleville, co-chairman. The public is invited.

Grades — good, bad, or indifferent — are printed on the face of the cards, along with midterm and final examination results and final grades.

The tell-tale cards will also allow the school to send "warning" notes to parents of students who are not doing too well with greater efficiency and dispatch than before.

A sorter speedily flips out cards of students doing below average work. The notice will be mailed out to parents Oct. 19, Dec. 15, March 2, and May 18, thus notifying parents that junior is in need of more concentrated study in certain studies.

Following the Nov. 17 issue of the first of the new cards, others will follow on Feb. 2, April 6, and a final card on June 15.

One column designated as "Eff," rates the student as "hon," "decidedly unsatisfactory," and an ominous "Parent conference desired." Numbers one through three are used as numerical designations for the three notations. If there is no figure in the "Eff" column, junior is doing alright.

Three machines are required to handle the cards; a printer, key punch, and sorter, all are rented by the Board of Education at an annual \$4,000, said Smith.

The business department of the school is now in the process of teaching students how to operate the machines.

"When trained," said Smith, "those kids will be in demand." No matter how you look at it, Belleville High School is taking another lead in scholastic progress.

## Appeal To Be Made On Court Rule

### Does \$250,000 Nursing Home Meet Zoning?

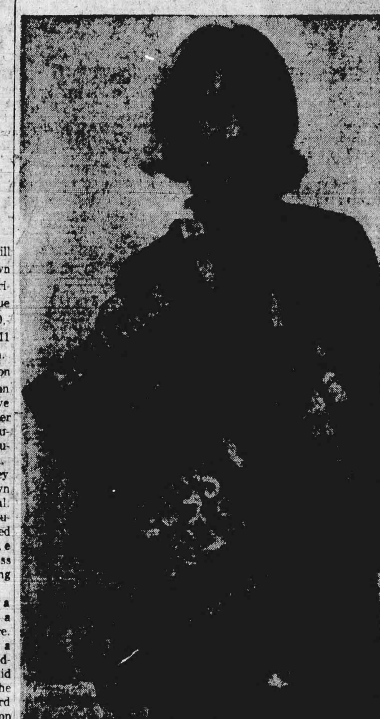
Whether or not Belleville will appeal a decision handed down by the Superior Court last Friday ordering the Town to issue a building permit from a \$250,000 private nursing home, at 911 Forest Avenue, is still uncertain.

"We reached no conclusion on it yet," said Town Manager John H. Barnett, adding he would have to discuss the matter in greater detail with the council. The municipal code gives Burnett authority to make such an appeal.

Monday night Town Attorney Jack Soriano advised the Town Council to make such an appeal. In making the ruling, the Superior Court said the proposed 3-story 30-bed nursing home came within zoning code Class C, which provides for boarding houses and hotels.

Judge Ralph L. Fusco said a nursing home is essentially a boarding house with extra care. The original application for a permit was denied by the building inspector May 5 when he said the nursing home didn't meet the zoning requirements. The Board of Adjustment upheld the action and refused the variance June 8.

The Town maintains the proposed nursing home would lower property values. The home will be built and operated by P.D.M. Construction Co. of Belleville.

## PTA Photographs School 2 Class For Comparison

School 2 PTA members watched with approval as the Board of Education received some 25 applications for the architect to survey conditions at School 2 last week.

PTA members had picked the Board of Education at School 8 recently to dramatize their plight — a lack of proper facilities for their children, a spokesman said.

Last week members were taking photographs of the School 2 auditorium which they plan to show to other PTA's of schools with comparable enrollment.

"Superintendent Henry Minasian tried to stop us," said Mrs. Mary Valentinsson indignantly Monday afternoon. "We had permission of the Consolidated PTA, she said. 'He said we would be disrupting classes.'"

Members had claimed that School 2 lacked proper auditorium space and no recreation room, as well as having no kindergarten. Children are now attending a kindergarten class at a nearby church.

## Fair Play Committee Says 'No'

Was Dr. Frank M. Durkee given a fair hearing by the National Education Association's investigators October 17?

Allen H. Crisp, co-chairman of the Fair Play Committee here does not think so.

In a letter to Richard B. Kennan, executive secretary to the Commission on Professional Rights and Responsibilities of the NEA Monday, Crisp charged the committee with a one-sided investigation of the charges against Dr. Durkee, who had been suspended from office for four months on what he described as vague charges.

"Your committee heard charges against Dr. Durkee, but neither he nor his supporters were permitted to learn the charges made," Crisp wrote. "Regardless of how unfounded they might be."

The board minority and Dr. Durkee had been promised an opportunity to answer the charges during the hearings in Newark, Crisp said, but neither were given that opportunity.

The group supporting Dr. Durkee had also been told, Crisp said, that their testimony would be heard even if it took until Friday to listen to it. The commission, after two days of hearing interested parties, left on Wednesday.

Only three of the six former board members scheduled for an appearance before the investigators were heard. One, a former board president, was limited to some eight minutes, Crisp observed.

The committee heard testimony by staff members listed by the board majority, but not one listed by Dr. Durkee, the letter noted. Durkee had no opportunity to refute unfriendly testimony.

Crisp listed 9 charges he plans to press before the NEA procedural operation of the committee:

1. The board majority presented a report to the committee and refused to permit minority members to have a copy. The committee failed to make the report available to Durkee or other board members;
2. Three days before the hearings the board minority found out from the board counsel that they, too, could have submitted a report. It was then too late to submit any kind of a report; Crisp said;
3. The committee heard the board majority's witness, but

# O'Connor New Plumbing Inspector

## Is He Holding Two Jobs During The Same Hours, Council Asks?

Bernard E. O'Connor, 203 Franklin Avenue, was named a permanent part-time plumbing inspector Monday night by Town Manager John R. Burnett, but an ordinance creating an annual salary bracket of \$1,200 to \$1,800 for the post came under fire. O'Connor replaces Vincent J. Mustachio, municipal water foreman, who had been acting building inspector since Jan. 28, 1963 with a building inspector's salary. The Town ordinance sets a full-time plumbing inspector's salary at between \$6,000 and \$8,000 per year.

"We don't need a full-time inspector," said Burnett last week. "We only use him maybe twice a day." Yearly fee for the service

appointment is not possible until the ordinance for salary scales are passed.

He asked Burnett to delay his appointment to Mustachio until Mustachio could begin litigation.

The attorney also said Mustachio has sufficient grounds to sue because O'Connor did not have necessary qualifications to take the Civil Service examination. He did not elaborate. O'Connor came in first in the examination, Mustachio second in a field of two.

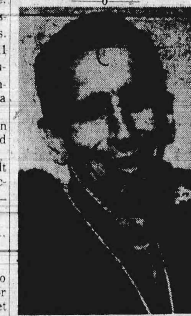

## Donald Brady Arrested After 110 Mile-Per-Hour Chase By Police

It took 12 police cars from six towns to bag 40-year-old Donald Brady Thursday morning after he knocked down a patrolman, sped off down Route 46, and crashed into a bus at Wayne's Route 22 Traffic circle.

Police later charged him with drunken driving, careless driving, and speeding in excess of 100 miles per hour while trying to escape police.

Brady, who lives at 79 Smallwood Avenue, was arrested after he struck a De Camp bus which had slowed for a red light at the circle.

Patrolman Walter Witt, an off-duty Troy Hills Parsippany police officer, pieced together this story.

He noticed Brady emerging unsteadily from Margies Tap House near Beverwyck Road on Route 46 and warned the man he was unfit to drive. Brady ignored the officer's order and climbed into his car with a companion. Witt said he tried to stop the driver

The car spun out of control at the circle and crashed into the bus. There were no injuries. As Brady attempted to back away from the collision, police officers leveled a gun at him and Brady sobered up fast.

He was later arraigned on charges of assault with a motor vehicle and being drunk and disorderly.

## Juvenile Court Proceedings Opened to Press Coverage

New Jersey has lifted its ban on press coverage of juvenile court proceedings.

The State Supreme Court amended the former rule to permit coverage at the discretion of individual judges. Under the new rule, newspapers may print the names of young offenders, their pictures and other identifying information, if the judge permits.

The aim is to foster public understanding of juvenile court procedures and problems with the hope of stirring public opinion over the lack of sufficient rehabilitation facilities for the juvenile offender.

Whether or not a private citizen does or does not pay his debts is of no concern of this newspaper—unless he is a town official.

Then he becomes subject to closer scrutiny.

He won his long standing battle against bigotry when President Johnson signed in to law a bill to democratize the nations antiquated immigration program.

### BECK'S COLUMN

The TV industry is gradually starting to use transistors in TV sets instead of tubes. What does this mean, as far as it benefits you, the consumer.

First we have to know what a transistor does. Just about everybody today knows what a tube is. It heats up like an electric light bulb, although not as bright, and in so doing, it develops quite a bit of heat. It also uses up considerable electric energy. Its function is to amplify the small electronic impulses which are used for numerous applications. We are concerned with radio, photo and TV apparatus. Tubes are used in any number of other devices, of course.

A transistor performs essentially the same function as a tube, only it is much smaller. Some are the size of a match head, some as large as a pea and some the size of a quarter, only a little thicker. Transistors do not heat up, they do not have a filament like tubes. They save the energy which is needed to light up a tube. Nevertheless they also amplify electric impulses, the same as tubes do, only they are very much smaller, do not create heat and consume very much less energy than tubes. Furthermore, it is assumed that transistors last forever—none they are not supposed to get weaker as invariably a tube does. If you have a TV set, you know that every once in a while a tube burns out, shorts or becomes weak and unable to do the work of amplification any longer.

Only time will tell whether transistors are "forever". So far, they seem to stand up very well although there are failures occasionally. Since transistors are in use for only a relatively short time, and by this is meant just about 10 years or so in consumer products, nobody really knows whether they will last forever. Theoretically, they should. So far they have proven themselves very well in those small radios operated on batteries.

Melt 2 tablespoons of the butter in a 5 1/2-inch (8 1/2-inch) ring mold. Sprinkle 1/4 cup of the brown sugar over bottom; top with cranberries. Combine remaining butter, brown sugar and orange peel. Mix well.

Split rolls to but not through bottom crust; fill with orange-brown sugar mixture. Arrange rolls, sugar upside down, over cranberries in pan. Bake in hot oven (425 degrees F.) about 15 minutes or until well-browned. Cool for a few minutes until bubbling stops; invert pan onto serving plate. Let stand a few minutes; remove pan. Serve coffee ring upside down.

## Rodino Joins Committee On Viet Nam Inspection

Rep. Peter W. Rodino Jr. of 265 Grafton Avenue, North Newark, left Monday morning on a tour of Viet Nam and other areas of the Far East.

Rodino is a member of one of three teams established by the House Judiciary Committee to investigate implementation of the new immigration legislation which becomes effective Dec. 1.

The new legislation, enacted Oct. 3, permits each country to participate evenly in the number of visas allotted on a first-come, first-served basis.

Rodino said his group would study whether existing facilities in Asia and elsewhere are adequate to handle the expected increase in the number of registrations, and at the same time maintain full security measures.

Rodino estimated that some 700,000 refugees in South Viet Nam have been uprooted from their homes. There is no possibility of resettling these people outside of Viet Nam at the present time.

Rodino's group will also visit Bangkok and Singapore and attend an international conference in Geneva.

The congressman will be working with the Intergovernmental Committee on European Migration which expects to move 75,000 refugees this year and 75,000 in 1966 to various parts of the world.

## Document Losses For Income Tax

Federal taxpayers who have casualty losses can save time and money by documenting their loss while it is fresh in their minds. If they wait until they are preparing their 1965 income tax returns, they may forget to document losses which they may be unable to remember all of the details.

Deductions for casualty losses

on income tax returns can be made only by taxpayers who itemize their deductions on Form 1040. They cannot be claimed on the short tax form or by taxpayers who use either of the standard deductions.

Casualty losses result from the destruction of your property by fire, storm, automobile, accident, shipwreck or other losses caused by natural forces. Automobile damage caused by accident or collision can be deducted if it is not due to fault driving but it cannot be deducted if it is due to negligence or to a willful act. You can also deduct theft losses but not those due to mislaying or loss of articles. If a loss is reported to your local police department.

**Negroes Take 45% Of New Postal Jobs**

Negro employees in the Postal Service have increased by more than 14 per cent over the last fiscal year. They have made particularly large gains in the field of management during the past four years.

In the Postal Field Service, the Negro has shown an increase of 8.6 per cent in positions paying from \$6 to \$11 thousand dollars annually, and in the upper regions of management in positions which pay from \$10 to \$25 thousand dollars annually. Negroes have advanced by more than 37 per cent.

## BHS Team Is Still Sluggish; But Badly Crippled? Never!

With another pivotal clash, this one with Kearny, facing them Saturday, the Bellboys will have their newly revamped backfield ready for action.

That Belleville backfield was set until a string of injuries began decimating it three weeks ago. Offensively, Charley Godleski was the man of the game with only occasional assets from the Bellboy speed boys stealing some of his play.

Godleski was rolling along to a magnificent season, having established himself as the Blue and Gold "bread and butter" back in the tradition of Joe Cervasio, John Senacki, and even Richi Luzzi. After five games of consistent running and blocking, Charley had carried 79 times for his fullback spot; more than any other two Belleville backs combined.

While doing so, Godleski had doubled the Bellboys' rushing totals by going 347 yards for a steady 4.3 yards per carry.

Besides providing drive-saving second efforts on many occasions, Godleski had barreled over for four touchdowns, more than any three other Bellboys. Then just as fleet-footed Charley Reed was coming up rapidly to provide a potent and balanced attack, Godleski busted an ankle.

This left only the "Mr. Outside" of Belleville's "Charley Act."

To compensate for the loss, co-captain Jim Corino, who was coming along brilliantly as a defensive corner back, was to double as a halfback rather than sub-signal caller. This move it was anticipated would give Belleville a potent threat on the option pass.

But things were not to be so, for Belleville's new interception king, Corino, fractured his collar bone early in the subsequent game with Garfield. To further complicate matters — besides having two of the team's top offensive and spiritual leaders crippled — Steve Ferrughelli, the leading JV running back was hospitalized with a ruptured kidney.

All this left just one man the Bellboys could turn to, the up and coming Charley Reed.

No longer could Reed carry only occasionally to throw the opposition off stride with his amazing speed, Reed is now the "bread and butter" man.

With the opponents' defenders keying off him, Reed had to respond. And that he did Saturday as he carried 12 times each half for 52 yards each. Charley's second 100 yard game was in essence the Belleville attack; if it hadn't been for a few missed downfield blocks he might well have added 8 yards and two long TD runs to his efforts.

In doing so, Reed burst past Godleski's old mark for yards gained, moved up to the 31-yard plateau after 71 carries. Most of the credit for Reed's 52 average stems from his 101 yards in six tries vs. West Side. Since assuming the leader's chores, Reed has settled down to a 4.3 norm to rival Godleski.

Elsewhere in the backfield, Curtis Smith has been the number two man all season. His 44 yards in 10 carries Saturday boosted him to 522 yards in 68 tries as he picked up his first TD. Dur is also the leader of the receptions with eight for 22 yards.

Taking over the other running back spot has been Tom Fullman who started the season as a linebacker. Besides averaging just under four yards in ten tries, Fullman has been used mainly as a blocking back and received three receptions for 32 yards. His steady performance has been a big help.

Defensively, with Mario Ponticelli continuing as the wild man over the middle and John Giabella developing as the leading Bellboy ball hawk, a replacement was needed for Corino. With Fullman already occupied as a sophomore Greg Kostowitz got the call Saturday and filled in ably in his varsity debut. The lanky soph adds some much needed height to the secondary.

Around the rest of the defense, another soph, George D'Amico broke into the starting unit with co-captain Lew Tombridge being returned to one-way duty at center. Meanwhile the rest of the line provided a vicious push to account for the Cowboys one yard rushing total. Joe Veneziano turned in a strong effort.

Offensively, it was the same old story of one missed block, penalties, and this time interceptions, which cost the Blue and Gold completing 4 of 6 passes. Frank Mino turned in one of his poorer games by taking too long in killing several pass plays and leaving a pair of interceptions. He did fire his fourth touchdown aerial though and bring his air mileage up to 231 yards on 22 of 41 attempts.

At present with passes continuing, the Bellboys have to rate second only to Montclair (5-1) in the county and 22-15th, but Kearny (4-2) should be a stiff test to that spot.

Unless the Bellboys can finally reach the potential they've been missing by just a few blocks and penalties, it should be another close one Saturday as the Blue and Gold try to score for the first time in three years vs. the high-flying Redbirds.

The first scheduled international airline service at Newark Airport will be introduced by Pan American Airways when the first of the airport's new Terminal Buildings is completed. Harold E. Gray, president of Pan Am, announced today.

The initial flights will provide non-stop service between northern New Jersey and Puerto Rico and Bermuda, and such other services as may be justified by the level of northern New Jersey traffic.

Return flights from Puerto Rico and Bermuda are "pre-cleared" at the point of origin by customs and other federal officials so that such clearances will not be required at Newark Airport.

old story of one missed block, penalties, and this time interceptions, which cost the Blue and Gold completing 4 of 6 passes. Frank Mino turned in one of his poorer games by taking too long in killing several pass plays and leaving a pair of interceptions. He did fire his fourth touchdown aerial though and bring his air mileage up to 231 yards on 22 of 41 attempts.

At present with passes continuing, the Bellboys have to rate second only to Montclair (5-1) in the county and 22-15th, but Kearny (4-2) should be a stiff test to that spot.

Unless the Bellboys can finally reach the potential they've been missing by just a few blocks and penalties, it should be another close one Saturday as the Blue and Gold try to score for the first time in three years vs. the high-flying Redbirds.

## Welfare Council Told Of The Need For More State Colleges

New Jersey suffers from serious shortcomings in higher education in three significant areas, Dr. L. Bryce Andersen, Associate Dean of Engineering of the Newark College of Engineering and the Belleville Community Welfare Council Nov. 1st.

Andersen spoke on behalf of the Citizens Committee for Higher Education in New Jersey.

The deficiencies named by Andersen were two and four year colleges and graduate education.

The state at present has only one Junior College in Trenton. Four more are scheduled to open in 1966. There has been much discussion of the need for such a facility in Essex County, but action is being delayed because the County Freeholders are insisting that the state put up more than the \$200 per student per year offered under the current formula.

The junior college is important for training technicians needed by industry. State firms are having to go outside the state to recruit

such help. Dean Andersen indicated that California was the leader in the junior college field. New York State is also progressing at a fast pace.

Of four year colleges, New Jersey has only Rutgers, the Newark College of Engineering and six state colleges designed primarily for the preparation of teach-

ers. Andersen suggested teaching colleges might be opened to in New Jersey institutions, but 57, a wider variety of fields. However, graduate study is increasingly needed by industry because of the steady advance to technology. It needs 200 Ph.D.'s in chemistry each year, but only 40 such degrees are awarded in the state. Industry not only needs graduates in various fields, but it requires these be opportunities where its staff can receive postgraduate training while on the job.
