One word—unpredictable—sums up the 1965 Bellboy grid squad. While moving toward a 63 record, the erratic Bellboys kept the opposition, the fans, their coaches, and even themselves guessing with their powerful spurts and disastrous letdowns. Every contest was a cliff-hanger as the Bellboys biggest margin to start fast, pulling ahead by a touchdown or two—and then, falling asleep. Then the opposition would slowly catch up to provide still another thriller for the ever-growing spectator ranks. Despite efforts by the coaches to cure this let-up, the Bellboys' habit continued against parties and state powers alike.

Through it all Tom Testa's Blue and Gold warriors showed enough power to be ranked 15th by the respected Saylor ratings out of some 336 New Jersey schools.

This was a Bellboy team that never quite reached its peak despite its impressive record. Eagerly in the season fumbles and a weak defensive secondary held BHS down. ## The Registrar: Risoli Is The Only Applicant For The Town Hall Job

Ralph M. Risoli, a senior clerk and acting registrar of vital statistics, may become permanent registrar soon after Mrs. Sue La Muro, deputy registrar and one of two possible applicants for the position, announced her intention not to file.

He has been an acting registrar since Oct. 13 when the State Civil Service named him temporary registrar while awaiting a promotional examination for the post. His duties, said Civil Service, are classified as a registrar.

Only two persons are eligible to file for the post, said Town Manager John R. Burnett, after Rule 24 is invoked. Risoli now earns \$4,800 per year with an extra \$100 for his duties as acting registrar.

If Risoli is the sole applicant for the office, Mrs. Thelma P. Sharpe, president of the Civil Service Commission is authorized to decide if an examination is necessary, or to invoke Rule 24 which would allow Mrs. Sharpe to authorize the promotion without an examination, as long as veterans rights of preference are not violated.

Final appointment may be made by the town manager if Rule 24 is invoked. Risoli now earns \$4,800 per year with an extra \$100 for his duties as acting registrar.

**Dispute With Parent Organisation Cited As Reason For Move**

Application to Kiwanis International has been applied for and petition received to organize a new Kiwanis Club in the Branch Brook-Bellefonte area.

The club will cover parts of North Newark, Belleville, and the southern end of Bloomfield. Signatures of five former past presidents and two officers, as well as several members of the present club, have been obtained along with applications from business and professional men.

The Bloomfield Kiwanis Club will act as sponsors under the leadership of Ted Skillman, chairman of the new club. Plans are underway to charter the new club by the first of the year.

The proposed club is the result of recent actions and policies taken by the incoming board, among them the removal of the present secretary, Russell P. Hopkins, who has served the Belleville club for the past eight years and was the first charter president in 1955. Along with Edward J. Abramson, Belleville magistrate, and Kenneth D. Smith, former councilman, they were the organizers and guiding lights behind the club in its formative years said a spokesman. All served as presidents and held other offices within the club.

Hopkins, who is known through out the New Jersey district as "Mr. Kiwanis," has been responsible for the recognition of the club by Kiwanis International and the New Jersey District. Two

# ROSAMILIA NAMED TO REPLACE DURKEE

## Family Of Four Rescued During Pre-Dawn Blaze

**Raymond Massey Family Treated At Clara Maass For Smoke Inhalation**

Four members of the Raymond Massey family were rescued by police and neighbors from their burning two-story home at 151 Main St. early Sunday morning after a basement fire filled their bedroom with smoke and flames.

Mr. and Mrs. Massey, their two children, Barbara Ann, 4, and Brett, 3, were taken to Clara Maass Memorial Hospital and released. The two young children were held overnight for observation and released Monday.

The fire was noticed by La David Waddell shortly after 3:30 a.m. Responding to his call for help were Kennel Place and Patrolman Anthony Fantanoone who immediately sped to the scene. Within minutes after they had erected a ladder to the second floor apartment, firemen arrived and worked to contain the blaze.

As neighbors and Place held the ladder, Fantanoone climbed up to the second floor and lowered the two children into Fantanoone's waiting arms. Massey and his wife, Thomasina, followed the officer down the ladder to safety.

It was impossible to use the smoke-filled hallways or doors, said Lt. Waddell, and the windows were the only means of exit.

Three other persons living in the house managed to escape without trouble from the first floor. They were Earl Willis, 47, who was also treated at the hospital and released; Joseph Cole, 22, and Thomas Hamilton, 33.

Firemen were unable to explain the cause of the fire, which was confined to the basement. The residents were unable to return to the house because of smoke damage and sought shelter with friends and relatives.

And it really was, an embarrassed Selective Service official agreed; but it was all a mistake made by an overzealous computer which chose out similar inquiries by the thousands.

How did Enrica's name get into Selective Service hands? Every fall college officials mail a list of all male students to state Selective Service headquarters. By some weird stroke of fortune, her name—which may sound masculine—wound up on the list.

The computer, with a mechanical single-mindedness, was unable to distinguish between a pretty co-ed and a brawny male, with the information available.

An A somehow was changed to an O, making her name into the Italian masculine: Enjorio.

McCool, vice president of the board, and Nicholas Juliano. There were no opposing votes in what was a formality after Dr. Frank M. Durkee's ouster last week.

No Change

"My position remains the same," said Rosamilia Monday night. "I have no desire to be superintendent of schools."

During his stint as acting superintendent after Durkee's first suspension by the board, he had made his position clear. He was, he explained, a man in the middle who was satisfied with his position as second highest executive under Durkee, and, who had no ambitions for his superior's job.

The appointment was effective immediately and was scheduled to continue until further order from the Board of Education, subject to the approval of Commissioner of Education Frederick S. Soriano, comes under this.

## Premium Gas Is OK'd For Town Ambulance Here

**Golden's Objection Is Overruled By The Town Attorney In Decision**

Councilman James R. Golden, the self-appointed fiscal watchdog, backed up the wrong tree last week when he told the Essex County Prosecutor the town's purchasing policy was "circumventing its contractual obligations" in buying top grade gas from a local retail dealer.

Friday Town Attorney Jack Soriano, who frequently sets the councilman straight in legal matters, ruled the purchases were not in violation of state bidding laws.

Soriano handed down his decision in a letter to Municipal Treasurer Francis H. McCoy, who had been holding up payment of some \$100 on two gasoline vouchers. He directed McCoy to make the payments.

The trouble came after Golden discovered the town had been buying top grade gas at 23.9 per gallon, after taxes, from Jannarone's Shell Station at 342 Washington Ave. Instead of a medium grade gas from the Humble Oil Co. at 12.8 cents per gallon as per the town contract.

The state bidding law explained Soriano, allows municipalities to purchase supplies when "the safety or protection of public property or the public convenience require." An ambulance, said Soriano, comes under this.

## A Story Of Grim Heroism At Plei Me: 'We Had Men Dropping Like Flies'

### Belleville GI's Relate Tales of Viet Nam Fight

"Everybody was wounded. We were down to about 14 guys," said Dom Rotonda 23 years old, of 4 Memphis Ave.

"All of a sudden we saw the V.C. (Viet Cong) closing in. We killed so many I can't count them."

Specialist Rotonda is a cavalryman with the 1st Cavalry Division (Airmobile).

After some of the most ferocious fighting of the Vietnamese war dwindles away into military history, and sporadic firing in the river valley near the Cambodia away, accounts of heroic behavior by Specialist Rotonda and other American Soldiers are beginning to filter back to their homes in the United States.

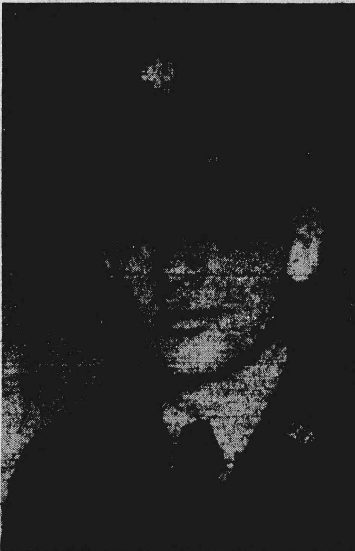
**Ambushed**

The Belleville soldier had spent the night of Nov. 17 lying with other G.I.'s where they had been left behind when a cavalry battalion of about 300 men ambushed by a North Vietnamese regular force estimated at some 1,000 men.

Rotonda, a slender, lean-jawed soldier with a crew-cut, remembered the men about him falling like flies before a mortar shell landed behind him giving him a wound that was to earn him the Purple Heart.

"We were trapped and had no way out," said the Belleville GI. "We had about 30 guys and we formed a perimeter defense. The V.C. were knocking us off one by one and trying to make it to allied lines where they were patched up."

"It was the worst feeling I ever had," Rotonda said. "I did lie behind my prayers. Only a miracle could of gotten us out of there alive."

**An Escape**

With his buddies, Rotonda crawled 800 yards, blowing up a machine gun nest on the way, and managed to make it to allied lines where they were patched up.

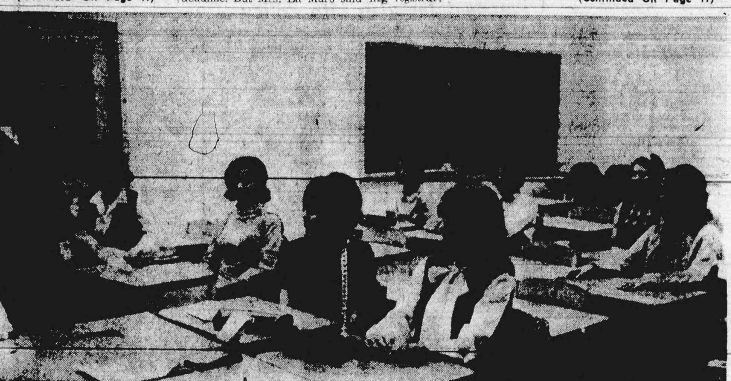
He wound up with shell fragments in his left arm and a bullet wound in the right leg.

But many of his buddies never made it back at all.

But three days later Rotonda was safely in a military hospital near Qui Nhon. They even have nurses here," he observed with satisfaction.

Specialist 4 Rotonda now has less than 91 days left in his enlistment and expects to return to the United States soon. But he

The Belleville soldier was not alone in his experiences. Councilman William H. Cullen received a letter from "Belleville soldier now in Viet Nam."

"It's rather ironic," he wrote to Cullen, "that while those 48 units are marching down Washington Ave. (On Veterans Day), I'll be preparing my baggage to leave for Viet Nam."

He underscored the dependence of small countries on the armed and economic might of the United States. "Except the Lord keep the city," he quoted the Bible. "the watchman waketh in vain." It came from an undelivered speech prepared by John F. Kennedy to be used in Dallas.

#### Soldier's Observation

Pte. Paul Trinker, also in Viet Nam, told his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Bernard Trinker, 16 Princeton Terr., "These poor people here have to be helped, and we're the one's to do it."

"If some people could see the disease, the filth, the fear in the people's eyes, they would thank God they live in a clean, wealthy, and most of all, a free country like the United States."

A next door neighbor, Pte. Robert Miskiewicz, is also fighting in Viet Nam.

"We're all very, very proud of our boys over there," Mrs. Trinker said, "even though our hearts are breaking every moment they're away from us."

## Smoke Signals

**WELL, HAY-LO, DERE!** After a week's absence, perhaps a note of explanation is in order. Due to the affair Durkee last week, and the avalanche of type necessary to outline the 22 charges, two regular features disappeared — Guidance Notes by Herman Knuppel, and Smoke Signals. Today both appear in their customary place.

"**ALL ERTAI! ALL ERTAI!**" sang Ferrando to his men Saturday afternoon at the Metropolitan Opera House, and "Stay awake," the audience did as the 26th consecutive Texaco broadcast filled homes with music across the nation.

When the magnificent Italian Giuseppe Verdi was 38 he turned out *Il Trovatore* in some 30 days. For the past 112 years it has challenged tenors, sopranos, and baritones around the globe. Saturday, two out of three missed the musical mark.

Tucci hasn't the lyric power needed for the A-flat role of Leonora. Her lovely soprano was unsatisfying from eighth row center. Bruno Prevedi, a tall tenor from Milano, gargled the four eight notes in the second bar of the tenor lusted "Di quella pira," and failed to sustain the final high C. Sad.

Robert Merrill, the Conte Di Luna, histrionically wooden, but vocally thrilling, filled the house with noble sound. He's slowly filling the vast emptiness left by Leonard Warren, whose likes we will not see again. Covic lacked the mezzo growl needed for the demented Azucena. She sounded more like a peevish grandmother.

Why do I attend such third-rate performances? Simple. Grand opera starts off great and gets better. And even when it's lousy it's terrific!

**IN A WAY** it is not the individual performer, but the orchestration of the larger cast who make a production a marvel of musical magic. Therefore, it was with some surprise that a recent review of "Guys and Dolls" was met with something less than wild enthusiasm. Many — well, perhaps 14 persons out of a population of 35,000 — sprang to the defense of MISS GAIL CRONAUER and her role in the play.

They were disturbed that the blonde senior didn't get more than the paragraph allotted to her. To praise her performance was fine; but, for them to say that other "minor" performers were less important was needlessly cruel. Why was Miss Cronauer (a fine singer, by the way) passed over with a brief paragraph? It wasn't done with malice, to be sure; and certainly not for a lack of esteem. The reason was more prosaic.

Mr. Adams was backstage most of the time, photographing the actions of other actors and actresses, and interviewing same. Miss Cronauer who was in front of the curtain, sang and acted for an enchanted audience and went unseen and unheard by the reviewer. It is much easier to complain than to compliment, but one small item emerged.

"I was amazed at the good coverage we got," said one school official. "Last year we didn't get the slightest mention."

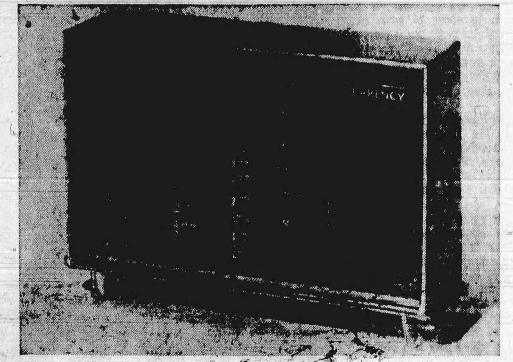

## Councilman Golden Goofs Again

To justify his unfair, unjust and inaccurate criticism of land swap between Wallace & Tiernan and the New Jersey State Highway Department incorporated in the new Route 21, Councilman Golden is attempting to convince anyone who will listen that this situation is very similar to the sale of the former Temple building on Washington Ave.

There is no truth to the assertion. The Temple building involved an outright purchase of tax exempt property.

The Route 21 matter basically involves an exchange of one parcel of land for another. Wallace & Tiernan exchanged

a piece of its land required by the New Jersey Highway Department to relocate a section of Main Street, and in its place the company was to receive the old section of Main Street located at its main entrance.

While motorists are using the property as part of Route 21 the company is not using the abandoned section of Main Street, and continues to pay taxes for property in the exclusive public domain.

This is just another instance of Councilman Golden playing fast and loose with the facts.

## The Danger Sign

Director J. Edgar Hoover of the Federal Bureau of Investigation recently said: "Is America as a Nation being swept by an epidemic of spiritual malnutrition? I fervently hope not, but the danger signs are all too clear. I fear that the public may be coming to accept widespread lawlessness as an unavoidable adjunct to our way of life."

"What has happened to the civic pride, the righteous indignation, of otherwise respectable citizens who turn their backs on helpless victims of beatings, robberies and sex crimes? The incredibly indifferent attitude of these people is exacting a heavy toll. It has helped to turn the streets and parks of many cities into virtual jungles

of fear — where, according to a recent survey, nearly one half of the residents are afraid to walk alone at night.

"Despite the continuing efforts of some self-professed 'experts' to minimize the crime problem, the undeniable fact remains that crime is increasing — in both numbers and intensity — at an alarming rate. It is growing six times as fast as our expanding population."

Hoover quotes President Johnson's declaration that "The control of crime is a major target of this administration." It should and must be. But that is not enough. It must be a major target of governments at all levels — and of law-abiding citizens everywhere.



### A Statement Printed At A Reader's Request

To the Editor, Belleville Times:

This is a request for you to print the statement read by me to the majority bloc last Monday night.

In his usual habit of attacking anyone who dares to oppose him ("I am the law, Nicholas Julian"), scoffed that it was unbelievable that a mere citizen should have such information. "I would remind Mr. Julian, that it is when mere citizens become disgruntled enough and aroused from their apathy that tyrants fall. I charge that the very action to suspend Dr. Durkee without waiting for the N.E.A. report speaks louder than words and is proof in itself that the final report will not be as one-sided as they have been intimating."

This person told me that the recommendations to the community could be the most important of all in settling this matter.

This morning I had a conversation with a member of the N.E.A. Special Investigating Committee. I told of this meeting being called by you and the propaganda being spread by you as to the justification of the probe. I said that you were taking this action because you and your fellow majority bloc members felt that the final N.E.A. report would substantiate your position and the charges.

This member offered the following advice to whom it may concern:

1 - Nothing should be done that will change the status quo of this affair at this time. If any action is taken by this board on the basis of what the N.E.A. Report will contain, they are assuming too much.

2 - The committee has not yet completed its findings and each member is now in the process of

writing their individual opinion and haven't even presented their opinions to the committee as a whole yet.

3 - This committee has never recommended punitive action and any implication of interference by any member of this committee to individuals indicting policy to the contrary is erroneous and completely false.

Furthermore, the word, registration, will not appear anywhere in the report and anyone using it to pressure the superintendent is also creating a false impression as to what the report recommends.

4 - The committee's first responsibility is to the community and in the best interest of the education of its children and to this end it will make three sets of recommendations:

a - Recommending specifically to the Board of Education.  
b - Recommendations specifically to the Superintendent.  
c - Recommendations specifically to the Community.

To arrive at the third recommendation the committee apprised itself on some of the background of this community, and concluded that the best means of solving this controversy would be to issue the report within 3 to 4 weeks so as to give the community ample time to review the report, demand full explanations from both sides and then make their decision in the coming February election.

Mrs. Anthony Izzo (a message from an unidentified person, necessarily, because hearsay and not fact when conveyed by another party. Board member Nicholas Julian had scoffed at Mrs. Izzo's statement, and asked why a member of the committee had to deal with the Board of Education through a private citizen. — Editor.)

## Road Crews Are Prepared For Coming Winter

The New Jersey State Highway Department today issued a report outlining its plans for keeping its 2,000 miles of highway clear of snow and ice during the coming winter.

Snow plows are ready; rock salt, calcium chloride, sand and other abrasives are stockpiled, state highway snow removal crews are set and prepared for the first snow storm.

A Highway Department spokesman said that overall control of snow-removal activities is accomplished through the Department's network of 425 two-way mobile radio and 10 base radio stations. The "command post" for state-wide operations is located in the Department's Trenton headquarters.

The Department's snow-fighting plan goes into action when advance warning of threatening weather conditions is received at Trenton Headquarters. These warnings, provided by the federal weather bureau and a private weather service, alert the snow control staff and keep it informed of changing weather conditions.

Approximately 2,000 pieces of mechanical snow-and-ice removal equipment, and about 2,900 men are on standby alert. This includes more than 600 privately owned trucks, loaders and graders fully manned, hired only when and if, needed by the Highway Department to supplement its own forces in an emergency or severe storm.

Stockpiles of salt and abrasives, located strategically throughout the State, have been brought up to adequate levels, based on the experience of past winters.

For this winter, the stockpiles include 27,000 tons of rock salt; 40,000 cubic yards of abrasives including sand, cinders, stone grit, and crushed slag; and 6,000 tons of calcium chloride.

The rock salt will be spread to melt the ice and snow, the abrasives will provide traction, and the calcium chloride will keep the stockpiles from freezing solid.

## State Will Try To Catch Fog With Fish Net

The State Highway Department is thinking about a device used in the misty mountains of Chile to combat fog on New Jersey Highways.

Natives of Chile use fine nylon nets to collect moisture from the fog and mist prevalent in their mountains so that it can be used

for irrigation purposes in the valleys below. The N.J. Highway Research Division's variation of this device, labeled a "fog broom," consists of a network of fine nylon threads wrapped around a revolving frame.

When a test model of the device was tried out in the department's fog laboratory, the revolving frame picked particles of moisture out of the air, causing the humidity to drop and the temperature to rise, and producing a tunnel of visibility in the dense mist within six minutes. The big test will come when

Dr. Frank M. Durkee was suspended without pay last Monday after the board accused him of some 22 counts which were forwarded to Raubinger for determination. He will make a decision on the charges and either reinstate, discipline, or dismiss Durkee from his \$19,100 post as the systems highest executive.

**Durkee Forces Rally**

But even as the appointment was being made, members of the

Fair Play Committee under chairman Allan Crisp made preparations to defend the ousted superintendent with a series of rebuttals to the 22 charges, labeled "ridiculous" by Crisp.

"Now that their charges are out in the open," said Crisp, "it is obvious why they were not strong enough to be filed last May." They do not involve corruption, immorality, or inefficiency, he declared.

He compared the upcoming case with a similar situation in nearby Chatham where a superintendent was ousted by the board on 28 charges. After a hearing

by the commissioner of education 24 charges were thrown out and the superintendent later reinstated at full pay.

The township, said Crisp, was faced with a \$35,000 bill for the proceedings, after the commissioner found no pattern of unfairness and that the board was found to have harassed the superintendent.

The town, its residents and students said Crisp, will pay for the folly of the board in calling for the ouster of the two board members most responsible for the suspension of the superintendent.

Pignelli, meanwhile, was doubling as a defensive captain and signal caller, a job that won him the title of "Most Valuable Player," an honor shared by Charley Reed. Pignelli's leg injury early in the final with Orange was one of the key factors in the Bellboys' defeat.

Another stalwart on the line was center Lew Trowbridge, who made second team All-State berth with his efforts. Lew steaded the offense especially in the early going while the newcomers were developing. When defensive and Rich Del Vecchio was spotted, Trowbridge also filled that spot until George L'Amico, a soph, was ready for action.

Besides his kick off duties, Lew might also have handled the punting and extra points, but no one else available seemed capable of the long hike needed.

**Good Performer**

Elsewhere on the line Joe Venzon made his 225-pounds felt defensively throughout the year, and both ways at the end. Among the remaining spots Jim Luty was guard on offense and Rich Bosowski sidewise.

In the backfield after the loss of Godleski—the story was all Charley Reed. Reed rushed for 529 yards while carrying 111 times in seven games. Three 100 performances mark Charley's 47

average rushes and 24 points. Without this "Most Valuable Player" the Bellboys would have folded completely after five games.

If Godleski and Reed had only been healthy long enough to be in the same backfield for some contests other than the Nutley game, Belleville's ground attack would have been unstopable. Instead of having rivals able to key on one ball carrier, the Bellboys would have routed at least four rivals with the efforts of "Mr. Outside" and "Mr. Inside" of the Charley team.

Throughout the season, Curt Smith turned out to be the Bellboys' only steady runner and leading pass receiver. Smith gained 20 yards in 79 tries (9.3 yards per carry) in 111 passes for 90 yards. Curt's option passing was somewhat of a disappointment with three of five tosses being intercepted before the play was abandoned.

**Mino Again**

Directing the attack, Frank Mino proved a wise play caller and leader. Although somewhat restricted, Frank got off 53 passes with 28 completions for 20 yards and four TD's.

Among his top receivers were Russ Matton, six for 109 yards, Ron Tomaszewski, five for 97 yards, and junior Rich San Filippo, four for 33 yards.

Defensively, Ciallella and junior Mario Ponzio blossomed into good linebackers while Tomaszewski and San Filippo held down the changeable deep spots.

Altogether 24 seniors were on the Bellboys final squad, more than any previous year. Only two underclassmen, San Filippo and Ponzio, held off the senior challenge all season. (Prospects for next year will be discussed next week.)

While moving to their 63 log, the Bellboys established themselves as the most unpredictable and erratic squad in Belleville history. They could have managed a perfect 9-0 record and just a little more effort—or just as easily fallen to 2-7 with a little less.
