

'Fiorello' Scores Huge Success At Belleville High School

Belleville High School music department scored a success with its musical production of 'Fiorello' last week. The extravaganza was staged and directed by Robert Wing, BHS bandmaster.

The story written by Jerome Weidman and George Abbott, with songs and lyrics by Sheldon Harnick, is about Fiorello Henry LaGuardia. The play follows LaGuardia (affectionately called "Little Flower") from his pre-World War I law practice to his second campaign for mayor of New York City.

John Reilly was cast in the title role. He is a junior, who played supporting roles in the plays: King and I, Oklahoma,

and 'Guys and Dolls. Cindy DeBonis and Diane Rappa played opposite Reilly as Fiorello's two wives.

Miss DeBonis played Thea and to the disappointment of most of the audience, sang only one song. She had a lead part in King and I as Anna Leonowens, and minor roles in 'Guys and Dolls' and Oklahoma.

Difficult Role

Diane Rappa played the difficult role of Marie, LaGuardia's secretary and second wife. Diane sang two of the more popular songs of the show: "Marie's Law" and "The Very Next Man." She played the supporting role of Tuftim in King and I in addition to minor roles in some of the other plays.

The next three supporting roles were filled by seniors that will surely be missed in future productions. Bill Idenden played the cynical Republican party leader, Ben Marino. As in 'My Fair Lady,' Guys and Dolls, Oklahoma, and

King and I, Bill made "a great performance." Gene Harvey, despite little past experience, portrayed the part of Horace Owens with a good deal of acting and singing ability. Doubling as student director, Nick

Pallante portrayed the role of Neil. Nick has been in the four previous musical productions as well as this year's senior play, the only actor in the school able to boast that much experience. Stealing the show, however,

was a sophomore, Roseann Morano. She played the part of Dora, a striker who falls in love with a cop, to the delight of the audience. The large cast did an excellent job with a very difficult play.

Mary Ciali as Mrs. Pomerantz won the audience with her huge fur coat and "I'm waiting foist." Jim Soldo as Mr. Garibaldi and Joe Ferreri as Mr. Lopez had amusing minor roles.

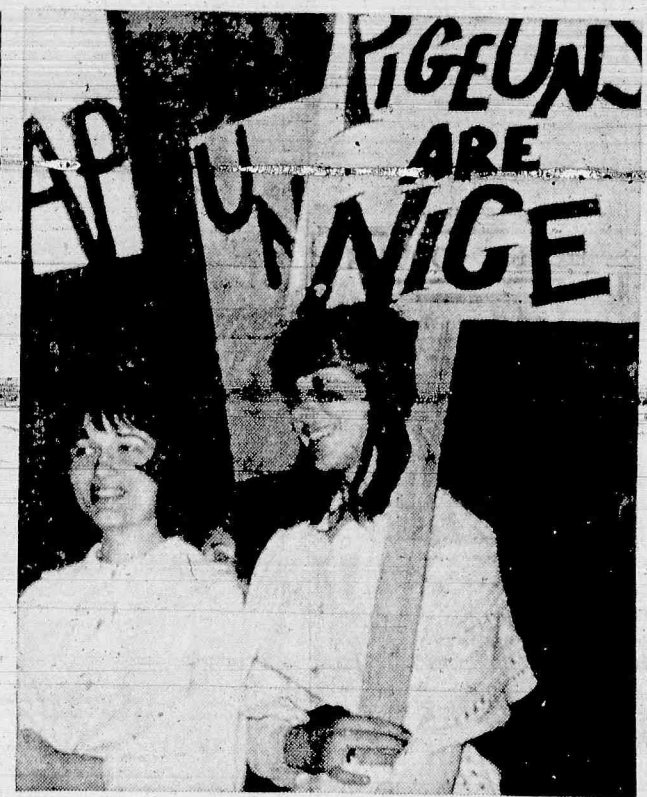


PROUD DIRECTOR — Robert Wing, director of Belleville High School's production of Fiorello, views the finished product with pride.

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Camp Ro-Li Needs Additional Funds To Secure Its Season

Although several local groups provide campership funds for the children of Belleville residents, the need for Camp Ro-Li remains an important one. This view was expressed by Thomas J. Devine, Jr., president of the camp at a recent meeting of the Belleville Community Council.

According to Devine, when Camp Ro-Li was launched in 1945 under the joint sponsorship of the Belleville Foundation, the Belleville Rotary and the Belleville Lions, it was designed to serve two groups: the children of local residents and the children of employees of local businesses.

Through the years, Belleville firms have provided subsidies to assist their employees' children to pay the camp fee, now \$70.00 per two week period, but few in this category are town residents. While such local groups as the Belleville Women's Club, the Clara Bart Foundation, the DeWitt Savings and Loan Association and the teachers of school 3 have given generously, they have by no means been able to meet the local need for camperships," Devine said.

LOCATED IN BLOOMINGDALE
Camp Ro-Li is located on

Glen Wild Lake in Bloomingdale. Its objective is to provide a good outdoor experience for children, ages 8-13. It has enjoyed a low rate of turnover in that staff have come back year after year. Its high level of performance is attested by the fact that it is a member of the American Camping Association, Devine said.

The Camp is divided into four two-week periods with a capacity of 70 children at any one time. The girls come in July with the boys following in August.

Activities consist of swimming, boating, canoeing, hiking, nature study, arts and crafts, etc. The camp has always prided itself on serving good food, Devine said.

In addition to his post as president of Camp Ro-Li, Devine is vice president-elect of Belleville Rotary, member for three years of the Camp Ro-Li administrative committee and member of the scholarship loan committee of the Belleville Foundation. Smith Gets Fulbright Grant For New Zealand Studies

Michael C. Smith, son of Mr. and Mrs. John T. Smith of 155 Forest St., Belleville, has been awarded a Fulbright Grant for study in New Zealand during the 1967-68 academic year.

New Type Oral Contraceptive Dosage Works

In a careful evaluation of the new oral contraceptive dosage form—the 1 milligram tablet of norethindrone with mestranol—the Los Angeles Planned Parenthood Center has found not a single pregnancy occurred in a group of 697 women followed through 9 thousand menstrual cycles.

In an interview, the center's directors Dr. Edward T. Tyler, declared that the new dosage form—actually 1 milligram of norethindrone (a progestin) and 0.05 milligram of mestranol (an estrogen)—was as effective in preventing pregnancy as the older 2- and 10-milligram dosages.

They are prescribed as Ortho-Novum 2mg. and 10 mg. The new form will be available for prescription as Ortho-Novum 1 mg. in early April.

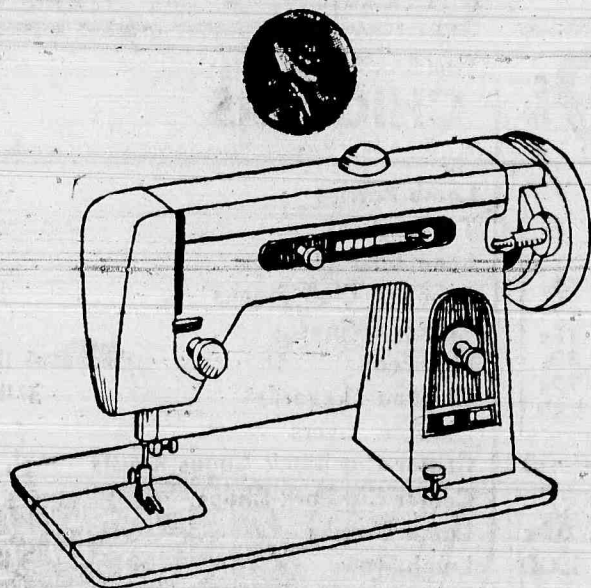

DEADLINE DELAYS: Putting together a Thursday morning weekly that is printed on Wednesday afternoon can produce considerable deadline chaos when an important story happens on a Tuesday evening. Such was the case last week when the hiring of John Amabile as head football coach at Belleville High School was announced Tuesday evening.

At that time a hasty summary of the newly appointed 28-year mentor's grid philosophy was assembled for the coming Thursday edition; now time allows a more thorough analysis of the man himself who will be leading Belleville's grid legions into their 1967 wars.

One should be thankful for small favors, however, this reporter supposes, for if the ever present, or so it seems, rains had not come, a depiction of the long awaited Belleville-Nutley baseball clash would have also been flirting with the deadline. As it developed the game was postponed until last Thursday afternoon at which time the Bellboys made their bid for an unprecedented third consecutive Big Ten Conference crown with a decisive 5-1 decision, but that is another story.

PLAYING STAR: Belleville's new grid mentor comes to the local scene with a Hudson county aura that marks not only a 27-year-old man teacher with a half dozen seasons as a varsity grid coach already under his belt, but a former player of high caliber.

Looking back to 1953, John Amabile began his organized playing career with a year of seasoning at St. Peter's Prep. in Jersey City that was to pave high school varsity campaigns in the years to come.

Operating as the St. Peter's quarterback offensively and doubling as a defensive safety, Amabile was to proceed to first team All-Metropolitan, first team All-State Group, All-Parochial, and first team A., Hudson County honors after a strong senior year in 1956.

Capping Amabile's amazing scholastic career was the "Tommy Meyers' Most Valuable Player Award" for his performance in the final game of his St. Peter's years on Thanksgiving Day 1956 against Dickinson High School.

Upon his high school graduation, Amabile chose to continue his education and his football route to his mathematics degree. Amabile found time to also participate in three strong Varsity grid seasons.

Quarterback was still the position that held the key to Amabile's performances, although he did continue to double as a defensive safety. Distinguishing himself collegiately as he had done scholastically, the new Belleville mentor went on to earn All New England, and All Eastern honors while drawing an All-American Honorable Mention. Several Most Valuable Player Awards and a B'Nai B'rith presentation as the outstanding Scholar-Athlete in the Boston Metropolitan Area also marked Amabile's Boston College days.

Upon his graduation in 1961, Amabile went directly into the coaching ranks, returning to Jersey City to lead Lincoln High School's forces through four highly successful campaigns, but before detailing Amabile's coaching record, let's complete the story of Amabile the player.

After a two year lay-off Amabile returned to the active ranks for the 1963 and 1964 seasons with the professional Jersey Giants of the Atlantic Coast League. Pro ball proved no different for this proficient honors' getter as Amabile led the Giants as their quarterback and in the process led the A.C.F.L. in passing and established a league record for the most touchdowns thrown in a single season at 26.

COACHING CAREER: Taking over the top job at Lincoln out of college in 1961 right out of college

at the age of 22, Amabile began to forge what might well be a permanent niche for himself in the state's scholastic coaching annals. Serving at Lincoln for four seasons, two Southern Hudson County Championships ensued while two All-State players were being developed under Amabile's tutelage and the outstanding lineman of Hudson County award from the Fifth Quarter Club Coach's Association was also won in 1962.

After the 1964 season at Lincoln, Amabile chose to make the first move of his grid career by assuming the head role at Dickenson High School also of Jersey City.

Amabile explained his move thusly, "A challenge was presented to take the D.H.S. ballclub, which in the previous three years had won three games. The school's football fortunes had reached a very low ebb. "In two years," he continued explaining the results of this challenging assignment, "we had gained the support of parents and alumni, which had been lacking at the school for the previous four or five years. We initiated the first Father and Son Football Banquet, sponsored by the alumni, invited parents to meet with myself and the staff prior to the football season. In two years at D.H.S., we won five games, in comparison to the previous record of one win in two years, and had built the squad from thirty-three to sixty-three boys."

GRID OUTLOOK: And so it is that John Amabile has compiled the credentials that have brought him to Belleville to fill the shoes of retired mentor Tom Testa, whose four year reign ended with a 31-13-2 won-loss record in the BHS annals. Amabile appears to have all of the needed insight to help him continue Belleville's outstanding grid tradition of recent years. As Hugh Delano, scholastic sports editor of the Newark News, explained to this reporter last week, Amabile is undoubtedly the most outstanding young coaching prospect that the Hudson-Bergen County area had to offer, and possibly the entire state, for that matter. Delano's opinion is one to be valued.

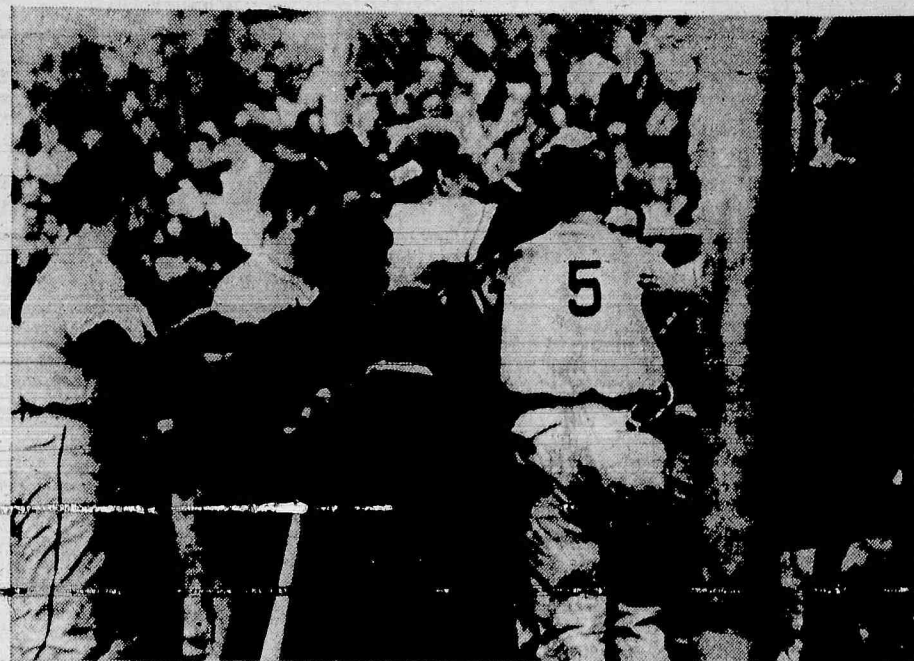
From all indications, Amabile will be inheriting the assistant coaches that served during Testa's tenure with Pat Forte remaining as chief assistant and Line coach, Mario Cocchiola as Junior Varsity mentor, former frosh coaches Albanese and Smith, who last year served as scouts, being reinstated along with the Junior High team with the budget passage, and one additional assistant being added to head the sophomore team that will once again join the Belleville grid picture.

All of these aforementioned assistant coaching positions are tentative as yet, awaiting formal confirmation from coaches and Board alike.

As far as personnel is concerned, Amabile will be inheriting a strong nucleus around which to fashion his first Bellboy squad. Perhaps the key to the former backfield star will be the return of quarterback Rich Del Guercio, who as a junior during the past season completed 28 of 59 passes for 502 yards and 11 touchdowns while running for another 253 yards and three scores during the nine game campaign. A strong and veteran line will also be awaiting Amabile with two way 245 pound tackle Lou Della Terza heading a returnee group that also includes sometime starter Angelo DiModica. Punter-Defensive back Greg Kostowitz will be another big addition as the running back situation looms as the only sketchy area with the graduation of the top six Blue and Gold backs. Including 1010 yard gainer, Steve Ferruggelli.

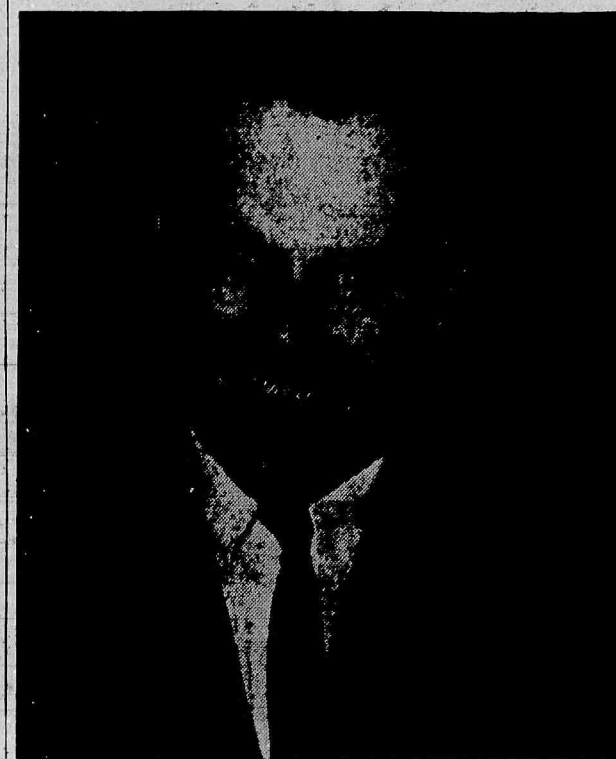

Cuomo Sparks 5-1 Victory Over Nutley

To the surprise of most area baseball experts, the long awaited pivotal clash between neighboring Big Ten Conference leaders was not the tight battle expected, instead, the Bellboys completely dominated their Nutley rivals in every facet of the game en route to a decisive 5-1 victory.

The decision brought the defending conference champions record to 7-1 while dropping the Maroon to 8-2 for a percentage lead that may well be the impetus needed to launch the Blue and Gold nine on the road to an unprecedented third consecutive Big Ten crown.

Cuomo Dominant
Charley Cuomo proved to be the dominant factor in a game that saw the Bellboys overcome an early 1-0 deficit with a three run out-burst before coasting to a seven hit day against the Big Ten's pitcher Ken Inglis. It was Cuomo who led the assault with a three-for-three out-put that included a long triple to launch the second inning come-back and a two-run four-bagger in the fifth to ice the Belleville victory.

Driving in two runs and scoring another pair, Cuomo brought the previously undefeated Inglis his first set-back in eight decisions. (Continued On Page 14)

ions while making the relatively unheralded Bellboy mound corps the superior one for this standing room only crowd's opinion.

Pisano on Mound

Joel Pisano started on the mound for the Bellboys and after a shaky start turned in six strong five hit innings to keep the Maroon at bay. Then with the soon to be 4-1 senior southpaw tiring in the final round, Mike Welsh came to the rescue with a nifty bit of relief work that saw a double-play and a strike-out close out the game.

Cuomo's attack at the plate accentuated a Belleville attack which had been described as the most potent in the league and lived up to its billing by lashing not only seven safeties in the seven inning game, but four other hard-hit balls that were corralled in the outfield for long outs. In itself however, Cuomo's showing was merely the continuation of an amazing performance that has seen the veteran Bellboy catcher stroke three hits in each of the past three outings to produce a 9 for 10 batting streak that has included two home-runs, a triple, a double, and five RBI. This outburst has boosted Cuomo into the

club batting lead with a fast rising .414 mark that has the Bellboys winging; the slow start of the big clean up hitter appears to have evolved into a torrid mid-season that might well spell pennant if it continues.

Inning By Inning

Taking things inning by inning, the results of the long-awaited clash follow:

As the pre-game festivities were coming to a close the first indication of what was to come appeared during the Belleville batting practice. With Inglis calmly watching the procedures as a daily paper had proposed a day earlier as an important ritual, the Blue and Gold rattled their sabres and quite possibly the veteran hurler's composure.

Once again it was Cuomo who led the way, this time by putting two offerings onto Franklin Avenue outside of the confines of Nutley's Park Oval. This was followed by solo batting practice feats by fifth batter Dave Rothwell and eighth batter Tony Cervasio. Inglis was now thinking.

Long Fly

Opening the game with a long fly to center Jim Serritella began the official assault on the Nutley southpaw's myth of invincibility, as did second man Jim Catalano with an even longer

poke to right.

All of this sabre rattling almost went for naught in the bottom of the inning however as Nutley threatened to decide matters early. Lou Graziano, a last minute line-up insertion for Pete Cesta, opened the attack with a bloop single to short right.

Tom Biel followed with what was to be the Maroon offensive trademark, the sacrifice bunt before third baseman Dennis Russonello leaned into a 1-1 pitch to send a drive down the foul line and into the ground-rule double portion of the Park Oval. This apparent foul scored Graziano and put a Raider on second with one down and Nutley's most potent hitter Art Zinicola at the plate.

2-2 Pitch

True to his All-County form, the veteran Raider almost responded to the call for action by delivering a 2-2 pitched for the play that may well have been the decisive factor of the game. For after fouling off one 2-2 offering, the Nutley first baseman got good wood on one of Pisano's offerings and sent it screaming down the third baseline with ground rule double written all over it.

This was not to be the case however, for Belleville's stalwart defensive third baseman Dave Rothwell leaped into the air at the last possible second and made a spectacular grab of the hard hit ball to retire Zinicola and easily double Russonello off second.

Instead of having two runs in, a man on second, and one down, the inning was over after but one tally and the Nutley momentum broken thanks to Rothwell's game saving catch.

Masterpiece

Quickly taking advantage of the inning ending masterpiece the Bellboys managed to turn the tide decisively while forcing the Raiders to display the major difference between the two contenders — defense. Cuomo started the uprising with an authoritative two strike blast to deep right-center that was converted into a stand-up triple.

After Rothwell had grounded into an infield out, the Bellboys made their anxious move to even the count. With Sam Calabria at the plate the call was for the suicide squeeze. Calabria executed it perfectly as Cuomo steamed across the plate and the score was tied, but the best was yet to come.

Initial Culprit

For the Maroon were pressing in the field just as they had been a day earlier against Irvington, and Russonello was once again to be the initial culprit. The over-anxious Maroon third-baseman easily fielded Calabria's successful suicide offering, but instead of converting it into out number two, overthrew first to send Calabria on to second on a two base miscue.

This brought Bob Banda to the plate for the Blue and Gold and the left field responded with a single to right that appeared too short to score Calabria.

Fielding Festivities

But Nutley was not yet through

with its fielding festivities, as Graziano uncorked a wild heave toward home that literally sailed over to allow Calabria to come home with what was to be the decisive tally and Banda to advance to third.

With the infield drawn in to prevent any further carnage, Tony Cervasio provided just that moments later by bouncing a ball through shortstop Gary Klop to score Banda with run, hummer three.

The rally died here as Cervasio was picked off first and Pisano bunted foul with two strikes. The tide had been turned successfully however with three runs, two hits and three errors.

The Nutley miscues later prompted one area daily to proclaim that Nutley errors had been the story in the Belleville victory. This statement seems a little tainted although two of the tallies were unearned, for with the legitimate suicide score and Cuomo's ensuing four-bagger, a 3-1 decision would have been encountered had it not been for the miscues, but so much for the anti-partisan press.

3-1 Lead

Having been provided with a 3-1 lead with which to work with, Pisano settled down in the second allowing only a walk to interrupt three infield outs. The story was to be the same for the leading Belleville starter an inning later as a walk prefaced a pair of inning ending strike outs.

Meanwhile, the Belleville batters had used another miscue, and a walk to threaten in the third and a base on balls in the fourth as neither team could be retired in order.

Nutley Fourth

The Nutley fourth might have produced that feat had Cervasio not misjudged a Zinicola fly to center, running past it for a tainted double thanks to the suddenly rising wind. Pisano took the play in stride however and retired the next three Raiders in order to further boost the Bellboy spirits.

The Blue and Gold fifth started rather dismally as Inglis recorded two of the ten strike-outs that were to stand as the only Nutley strong point in a surprisingly one sided day. Then vet Rich San Filippo broke the spell with a single to center. This brought Cuomo to the plate and the encounter between the Big Ten's hottest pitcher, and its hottest hitter ensued.

The hitter won the contest when after fouling off two 1-2 offerings Cuomo unloaded the lumber for a two run blast into the centerfield bleachers some 375 feet away. This was the crowning glory. Belleville now led 5-1, it was just a matter of time, Belleville had prevailed on offense, on defense, and most significantly on the mound.

Bouncer

A bouncer up the middle and an infield safety by Inglis began to revive the Nutley hopes in the bottom of the round, but Pisano countered with two infield outs and a whiff to end the threat.

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Belleville High School Participates In Youth Physical Fitness Meets

Belleville High School this afternoon is participating in the eighth annual Marine Corps youth physical fitness meets at Newark State College, Union. These meets are the culmination of a continuing program held in high schools throughout the school year.

The program was conceived to help improve the physical condition of the nation's youth, due, in part to the concern shown by the president over the physical condition of our future leaders.

From a pilot program in just one high school in 1958, the program has grown to where some 427,000 young men from 15,550 schools participated last year. Of these, 180,000 were students at 356 high schools in the Metropolitan New York area.

The program achieved national recognition in 1962, when it was endorsed by the President's Council on Physical Fitness.

Each school is represented by a six-man team. All six men participate in the same five ex-

cercises administered to Marine recruits undergoing training at Parris Island. These events are officiated under strict supervision by Marine noncommissioned officers of our Recruiting Service.

To attain a maximum possible individual score of 500, one must do 85 sit-ups in two minutes; 18 pull-ups; 41 squat thrusts in one minute; 60 push-ups; and a five lap 300 yard shuttle run in 44 seconds. The team score is an aggregate of the five highest individual scores of the six men, with low score being disregarded, except in cases of ties.

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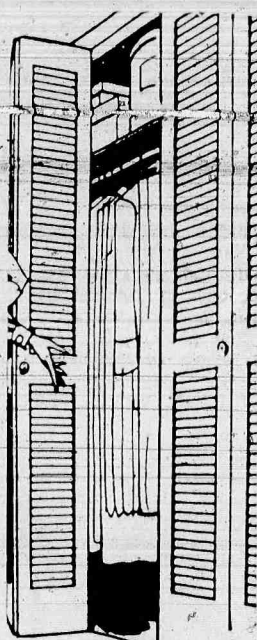
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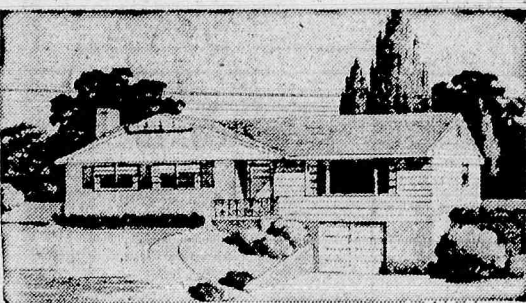


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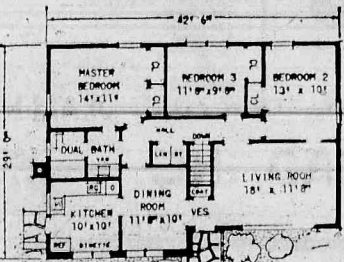
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Local Team Claims Vailsburg As Seventh Straight Victim

er who has a history of lapsing into slumps while overswinging and slugging when cutting down slightly.

Non-League Encounter

Surprisingly, the game marked the Bellboys first non-league encounter of the season. Usually such non-Big Ten foes are slated as early season conditioners, but a rash of April postponements that saw the non-loop opener postponed four times.

At least one other such game remains in the form of Central next week, while an outing with Lincoln of Jersey City has been canceled all together and a match with West Side remains pending. As an example of how these non-league games usually appear early, it can be noted that last season's president setting campaign opening seven triumphs included three such games and only four against Big Ten competition.

Consequently the current Belleville squad has won the distinction of being off to the fastest Big Ten Conference start on BHS annals, taking its first six league foes.

Biggest Inning

Most of the Belleville carnage in this record tying win was accumulated in the opening round as the Bellboys batted around for the first time this year in compiling their biggest inning of the season with a five run, two hit uprising that was highlighted by Cuomo's blast and Vailsburg miscues.

After an initial out, Sam Calabria opened the festivities by singling sharply to right and promptly stealing second. Rich San Filippo followed with a bounce to short that was bobbled for an error as

Bellboys ended up on first and third. No sooner had San Filippo taken second, than Vailsburg obligingly permitted the first tally when catcher Ed Manko couldn't handle a low Forgione offering and let it get past him into the cage-less expanses of School's Stadium for a run producing passed ball.

Cuomo then stepped to the plate and worked the count to 3-2 before unloading on a pay-off pitch to deliver Belleville's fourth home run of the year and a 3-0 lead with a towering poke into the left field stands.

Rattled

Somewhat rattled by the blow Forgione proceeded to hit the next batter, Dave Rothwell. Manko then turned in his second passed ball before Rothwell could steal third. Forgione meanwhile was walking Jim Catalano who stole second in time to capitalize on the still shaken Viking hurler's ensuing balk; this miscue delivered the fourth tally.

Finally settling down, Forgione then managed to record the second out before walking Bob Banda, who, you guessed it, stole second. The stage was then turned over to Forgione's bumbling mates as Del Guercio hit a roller to third only to have it thrown

away as Catalano brought home the rounds final tally.

Gift Attack

Previous to this gift attack, the highest single inning run production of the season had been four run efforts against both Columbia and Orange. The most men sent to the plate in any of these uprisings had been eight; ten men batted in the first against Vailsburg.

Taking to the mound with 5-0 security, Del Guercio was in command from the start as he whiffed the first batter he faced and then proceeded to retire the side in order. Opening the second by yielding a four pitch walk, any damage was avoided as the Blue and Gold infield responded with a twin killing to clear the base paths.

A one out base on balls in the third set up Del Guercio's only real problem as a wild pitch continued the wildness as the second out ensued. A Bellboy error then followed as Vailsburg cut the margin to 5-1 and spoiled the shut-out bid. Another miscue marred the fourth before the side was retired in order in the fifth, and still no Viking hits were evident.

Impressive Outing

Another infield put-out opened the sixth, before Bob Botwinick

stepped to the plate to break up the act by lining a 1-1 pitch into rightfield for the first and only Vailsburg safety in Del Guercio's impressive outing. Gamba then mopped up in the seventh allowing a pair of infield safetys to mar an otherwise strong outing.

Meanwhile on the Blue and Gold side of the coin, Forgione appeared dominant after those first round problems yielding little more than a second inning walk and long San Filippo fly as he went through three rounds unscathed while edging toward a strong nine strike-out performance.

Struck Again

It wasn't until the fifth that Belleville managed to strike again, putting together a pair of singles for a tally while wasting two walks to leave three men stranded. Cuomo and Catalano provided the safetys as the meager Belleville hi total was doubled.

Planning Agency Claims State Development Lags

Reapportionment of the Legis-
lature and the state's broad-based
tax "point to New Jersey's de-
termination to equip itself with
the tools" needed to meet urban
problems, but there is "a large
backlog of unfulfilled needs," ac-
cording to a survey Regional
Plan Association has released.

The report reviewed the five
years' work of the New Jersey
Committee of the association,
which covers the nine north-
eastern New Jersey counties. The
committee has successfully sup-
ported the Green Acres bond is-
sue, designation of Great Piece
Meadows for state park purchase,
commuter rail modernization
plans, organization of the state
department of transportation, im-
proved coordination of land-use
and highway plans, steps toward
the unified development of the
Hackensack Meadows, the de-
cision to put the new campus
of the state medical school in
Newark, and creation of the
Musto Commission on distribution
of state and local government
powers.

Currently, the committee is
working for better water manage-
ment, a \$400 million bond issue
for highways and rail modern-
ization, middle-income housing in
the older cities, elimination of
obstacles to faster acquisition of
parkland, a plan for the Hudson
shore which would provide for
a great deal of housing and re-
sidential services without losing
the beauty of the Palisades, lo-
cation of rapidly increasing of-
fice jobs along with major health

services. Major retailing, in-
education and cultural facilities
in new and renewed downtowns,
including Newark, New Brun-
swick and other locations to be

mittee staff, wrote the report.

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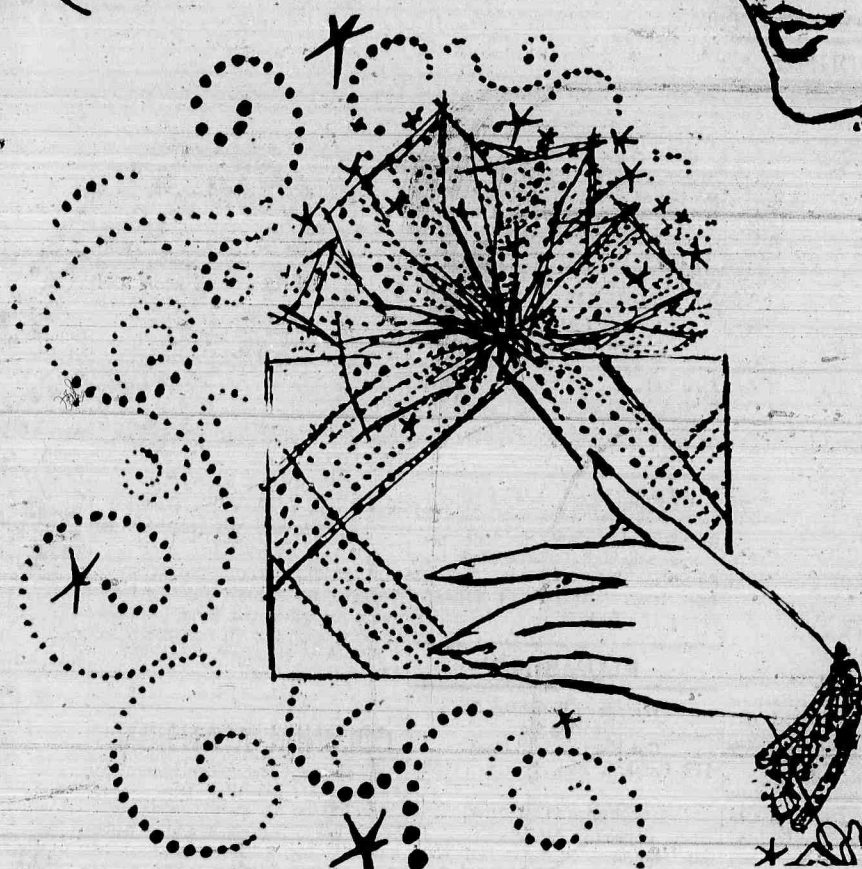
