## Fall School Semester To Begin Next Week

### N. Petti School 9 Principal

Two Board of Education members voted against the appointment of Nicholas Petti to become the new principal of School #9 at a special meeting Monday evening in School #8 on Union Avenue.

"My abstention", said Board President Rocco Saletta, "is made not without having the utmost respect for Mr. Petti, but I will not go along with him at this time."

Trustee Ernest Arvidson, also voting in abstention, told board members, "I hope this in no way affects Mr. Petti personally, a man for whom I have the highest regard."

The 32-year-old appointee has been serving for the past two years as Senior Guidance Counselor at Belleville High School.

A resident of Belleville since birth, Petti graduated from Belleville High in 1933. An academically successful student in the classroom he was also captain of both the basketball and baseball teams while at high school.

#### Played with Red Sox

After graduating from Belleville High he signed up with the Boston Red Sox's and remained with the team's Texas league until December of 1954 when he entered the Army.

Receiving his honorable discharge from the armed service in September of 1956 he enrolled into Montclair State Teachers College where he remained until 1960, leaving there with his Bachelors Degree in teaching. While at Montclair State he was voted the "Most Valuable Baseball and Basketball Player", and the "Most Outstanding Athlete".

Another credit to add to his shelf of many was that he scored over 1400 points in the four years he played sports at MSC.

After graduation he worked full time and went to New York University nights until October of 1963 when he received his masters degree from them.

Additional education includes studies at both Seton Hall University and Newark State College. At present, Petti has an added 45 credits besides his masters degree. He also holds certificates in supervisory and guidance posts; high school principal and vice-principal positions; teacher of social studies and physical education and elementary principal.

His proud parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Petti reside at Greylock Parkway. Petti is married to the former Theresa Sinelli and they have two children, Nicholas John and Joseph. Mrs. Petti is a graduate of Paterson State College and holds degrees in both elementary and secondary teaching.

Aside from his present post as guidance counselor Petti was also assistant football coach, freshman basketball coach and head baseball coach in the Belleville School System.

#### School Board Hires

#### Three New Teachers

The Board of Education has hired several new teachers to complete the fall semester roster when classes begin on Wednesday.

Rocco Saletta, board president, asked the members to cast their votes on the appointments of three new full-time teachers for the 1967-68 school year. The teachers, Mrs. Elizabeth D. Follansbee, Miss Phyllis Marchesani and Mrs. Millicent M. Teplow were then duly appointed by a majority vote. They will receive total salaries of \$16,200.

Also receiving a majority vote, but to be appointed as substitute teachers with permanent certificates were, Mrs. Rose Paul of 456 Washington Avenue and Miss Annamaria Nuoli of 113 Major Street, both of Clifton.

With the recommendation of both the Superintendent of Schools and the Supervisor of Special Education a resolution was passed which would permit the establishing of a class for neurologically impaired children at School #3.

The board then voted on the appointment of

#### Irate Citizen

#### Sally Hood Indignantly Talks

#### Beyond A Five-Minute Limit

Mrs. Sally Hood, a regular and vocal participant at Town Commission meetings, had to be escorted to her seat by a policeman this week when she refused to close her public statement at the commission meeting.

The governing body had set a five minute limit per spokesman during the public portion of commission sessions to keep the meetings extending late into the evening.

Before the five minute ruling, some residents were known to talk for over a half hour, and during some budget hearings filibusters were known to run over three hours.

For the most part Mayor Kenneth D. Smith has been enforcing the ruling, often sharply reminding speakers that they had talked beyond the prescribed limit.

Mrs. Hood last Monday complained about the commissions bidding practices regarding the installation of an air conditioning systems part of town hall renovations.

Realizing that her five minutes would soon be up, she did not want to hear prolonged comments on her statements from Smith.

"You're using up my five minutes," she said.

"You've used them up already anyhow," he answered. And when Mrs. Hood continued her statements, Smith ordered that policeman seat her.

#### Flag Display Urged

In another matter at the meeting, Mayor Smith and the Town Commission officially recognized the present crisis existent in Viet Nam. They urged all citizens in Belleville to display the flag daily as a "reminder to all that the town stands in full support of the present Viet Nam crisis and in full support of the principles of freedom and Democracy as being tested in Viet Nam."

He noted that the youth of the country are presently engaged in the defense of the principles of freedom. He said the crisis presents to the world a supreme test of democracy in action. The American Legion had recommended that during the current involvement that local townsfolk display the flag daily.

#### More Man-Power

#### Strumolo Calls Belleville Health

#### Department "Quite Deplorable"

Commissioner Vincent T. Strumolo this week advised Mayor Kenneth D. Smith to "practice what he preaches" regarding "rumors which have done much to damage the image of Belleville."

In a recently published statement by Mayor Smith he said "Rumor has it that our Board is 'split' and these rumors

emanate from an element that would like to see a so called split come to pass."

Then in an obvious contradiction he feeds the very rumor he denies by attacking a fellow commissioner through the use of distortion and misrepresentation," Strumolo said.

"This is the same man who on April 18, 1967, when campaigning for office,

said . . . "that in the past unfounded stories and rumors have done much to damage the image of Belleville."

"Why doesn't the mayor practice now what he preached when he was a candidate for commissioner," Strumolo asked.

#### False Statements

He added, "The statements made by the mayor, of course, are positively false. I have documented proof to substantiate my claim. Despite what the mayor and revenue and finance director say, my personal investigation from the time I took office as director of public affairs to this date, show that the Health Department is in a deplorable condition." He said, "This is due to lack of man power. (We have a part-time health officer and one sanitary inspector), which makes it impossible for our Health Department to carry on public health activities and maintain minimum standards of performance. As a result the people of Belleville are being deprived of basic health protection," Strumolo said.

"I am responsible for the health and welfare of all citizens of Belleville. I am doing what, in my opinion is their best and immediate interest."

Ralph M. Risoli, the town registrar who manages the health department, said "that the department was paralyzed."

"We can't conduct our regular inspections of restaurants and food stores," Risoli said, "all we can do is concentrate on checking out complaints."

The Belleville health inspector and his assistant who had been working for three weeks although there was no money in the town's budget to pay them failed to report

### Classes To Start Sept. 6

Belleville's school population will return to classes Wednesday for the 1967-68 school year.

Anthony Greco, superintendent, said those students who have not registered for the new term may do so this week from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. The superintendent's office will be available to handle any inquiries. New students were reminded to bring a transfer card with them when they register.

A school staff of 298 will greet students when the doors open to the town's school system on Wednesday.

Beginning today all seventh grade students were invited to attend a "know your school open house" at the Junior High School. The meeting begins at 10 a.m. this morning in the auditorium on the second floor of the school.

Following an introductory presentation the visiting students are to be conducted through a tour of the building.

Seymour Grossman, school principal, said, "We hope that the orientation will help to make the students feel more comfortable on the first day of school in a new situation."

#### High School Information

Belleville High School will open at 8 a.m. to start the new school year. Students will report directly to their homerooms where they will receive schedules for the new year.

Schedules this year were prepared by the new IBM system 360 which is quite refined over the previous computerized scheduling process. Students will be provided with a printed schedule, as will the Guidance Department, the school nurse, and the main office. Teachers will receive class lists which will contain much more information relative to the students in their classes, than previously available.

The anticipated enrollment will be approximately 1100 students with the incoming sophomore class being the largest group with about 400 students.

New students are urged to report to the guidance office prior to September 6 so that they may be properly registered and scheduled.

Students will report to the Junior High School for the fall semester to begin the school day which will begin at 8:15 a.m. and close at 3 p.m.

On the first day, any student who does not have a combination lock may purchase a pair for \$3.

All students in grades seven and eight were given their homeroom assignments before the close of school in June. Homerooms for ninth grade students follow.

Bus transportation, furnished by the Belleville Board of Education, for Junior High School students will be the same as last year.

Bus pick-ups will be as follows: Bus 4, 8 a.m., Belmont and Franklin Avenue; bus 5, 8 a.m., Belmont and Franklin Avenue.

#### \$200 Expenditure

#### Challenged by Trustee

The Board of Education argued at a special meeting recently over the right of Rocco Saletta, board president to authorize expenditures without consultation with other trustees. The discussion centered around Saletta's okay of a \$200 increase for improvements to a local school.

After awarding a \$700 contract to the Garden State Brick Face Co., for refurnishing of masonry work on portions of the James G. Shawger School which the company had resurfaced, Rocco Saletta, board president, said that he had authorized an additional \$200 for the work.

Trustee Dr. Frank Di Ruggero said, "the president should not have authorized the additional expenditure of money without first consulting the board."

President Saletta said that he agreed to the additional figure after a meeting with Harold Dufford, assistant superintendent of business. He was informed that the company would need more money to refinish certain portions of the building aside from an earlier resolution.

We commend Mayor Smith for his demonstration of keen leadership and trust it is an indication of greater decisions for the future—all leading to a Better Belleville for everyone. F.A.O.

## Essex County GOP County Contest

Tuesday, September 12, Independent Republicans and Organization Machine Republicans will visit the polls to decide whether or not Reform Republicans should replace the present leadership.

The choice will not be reflected in the election of a new Republican county leader for the laws do not permit direct election of such a post. Republican voters will be asked to express a preference of candidates for county and state legislative offices as well as a nominee to represent the GOP for the office of county sheriff.

The Reform Republicans For Party Integrity believes the GOP needs new leadership. They claim the Essex party leadership represents wheelers and dealers whose prime interest is control of the party machinery. The Organization Republicans are arrogant when they suggest that only they serve the party's best interests by attacking Democrats and refusing to participate in a meaningful Primary Election.

Organization Republicans are arrogant when they refuse to accept a challenge of the Reform

Republicans to debate the campaign issues from the same stage. One wonders from what they want to hide.

If we are to be citizens respectful of law and order we must remember New Jersey election laws provide for a direct Primary Election for the nomination of county and state offices. Reform Republicans For Party Integrity have entered into a spirited contest with the "Ins" to lay before the people of Essex County their claims to superior leadership.

It is not enough for the Organization Republicans to piously proclaim they only want to contest Democrats.

The Primary Election is the legal vehicle for voters to select their party representatives. For the Organization Republicans rumor and fiction suddenly become fact and doctrine.

Political rumor published in daily papers use cutely phrased references to Dr. Virginius Mattia, president of Hoffmann-LaRoche.

While the suggestion is flattering to the Republican Party, the hard fact is that Dr. Mattia's desire to see U.S. Senator Clifford P. Case as the GOP's 1969 gubernatorial standard bearer has been common knowledge among his friends for some time.

But the political rumor reporters are not interested in fact. What they seek is grist to feed the political mill of the professional politicians who control the party machinery today.

We believe the best interests of Essex Republican voters lay in the election of Reform Republicans on Primary Election day, Tuesday, September 12. Superior Republican candidates and superior Republican leadership for Essex Republicans are to be found on LINE E of the voting machines. F.A.O.

### One Year Ago

Former Councilman James Golden, a well known town critic, was arrested after being hauled in handcuffs from a meeting of the Belleville Town Council. Golden was charged by Mayor Nuncio R. Pico with being a disorderly person and disturbing a public assembly. Golden had protested an ordinance to appropriate \$79,500 for the purchase of a new street cleaner. Mayor Pico ordered him removed when Golden turned the meeting into a "shouting contest." The ordinance, incidentally, was passed by a 4-1 vote.

The Belleville Parking Authority still remained in the planning stages, despite promises of full scale operation. Mayor Nuncio R. Pico explained that the Town Council had not had time to discuss the authority because of "all they other stuff."

Commissioner Robert A. Roe of the State Conservation Department informed the town that, unless the present trend in precipitation was reversed, water use restrictions would return to effect in September.

### Five Years Ago

Dr. Ward R. Young, who was appointed Belleville High School principal by the Board of Education, notified school officials that he would not accept the position. Dr. Young chose to accept the offer of the position of superintendent of schools in Morris Township instead. The Board of Education was expected to appoint Raymond O. Smith, principal of Manville High School, to the Belleville principalship.

Robert Kesner, 17 year old member of the Belleville High class of 1962, died five hours after sustaining injuries in an auto accident at Passaic Avenue and Greylark Parkway. Daniel Bienkowski, with whose car Kesner collided, was in fair condition at Clara Maass Hospital.

Arthur H. Vincent, 310 Greylock Parkway, was feted at a luncheon at Forest Hill Field Club, Bloomfield, on the occasion of his 40th anniversary with New Jersey Bell Telephone Company.

### Ten Years Ago

W.J. Happel and Co., realtors, announced that over eighty per cent of the homes sold in the new Rutan Estates development off Joralemon Street had been sold to present Bellevillites. Rutan Estates homes were priced from \$16,990 to \$18,500.

The International Association of Machinists strike against the Eastwood Nealley Corporation, Joralemon Street wire cloth manufacturers, entered its eleventh day. One hundred ninety four union members struck, and 198 members of the American Wire Weavers Protective Association walked out in sympathy.

The Belleville Town Commission introduced an amendment to the liquor ordinance limiting club licenses to organizations that had existed in town for 10 consecutive years prior to time of application.

### Twenty Years Ago

Frank Lukowiak, a 23 year veteran of the Belleville Police Department, died in St. Barnabas Hospital, Newark, after an illness of two weeks. Lukowiak was a native of Belleville and lived at 11 Minkler Place.

More than 1,700 Belleville youngsters were given their fill of hot dogs, hamburgers, soda, ice cream and candy when the Patrolmen's Benevolent Association played host to them at its annual outing at Doerr's Grove, Millburn. The PBA had originally planned for only 500 children, but the number grew rapidly after the outing was first announced. Twenty buses and 17 private cars were needed to transport the guest to Millburn.

The town commissioners granted a go ahead signal for a garden apartment planned for the intersection of Joralemon and Celia Streets.

### Thirty Years Ago

Public Service Coordinated Transport invited the people of Belleville to a free ride on the line's new "all-service" vehicles operating in Belleville.

A leading Newark daily published a poem by Bellevillite Bob Jacob Levine, author of "Bellowing about Belleville."

Three Belleville politicians found themselves in a surprising and embarrassing situation when

they all met at the Saratoga race track in New York. Commissioner Patrick Waters, vacationing at the races, ran into Commissioner and Mrs. George Gerard. The three of them did a double take later in the day when, seated in the grandstand, they spotted Mayor William H. Williams. With Belleville's leaders out playing the horses, the commissioners had cause to wonder who was minding the horses.

### Thirty Five Years Ago

Public Safety Director William D. Clark claimed that a reduction of \$14,000 in the fire and police department budgets was "entirely out of reason." The reductions had been requested as part of the Belleville economy drive.

Commissioner Patrick Waters, however, claimed that the water department could absorb large budget cuts. It was revealed that the town spent 71¢ per water bill issued; these clerical costs were sharply attacked.

James Falcone, 85 Johnson Street, was awarded a Purple Heart with an Oak Leaf for injuries sustained while serving as private in the first world war. Falcone was the fourth Belleville resident to receive the honor.

### State Moves to 10th

#### In Road Construction

Despite formidable obstacles, the State Transportation Department awarded a whopping \$123.3 million in road construction contracts in fiscal 1966-67—about double the previous year's amount.

The vastly increased pace of contract awards has moved the state from 23d place among the 50 states in 1966 to 10th place in 1967 in dollar value of road work started.

### Microwave Link

#### In Puerto Rico

An important step in efforts to bring Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands into the satellite communications league was taken yesterday with the filing of an application for Federal Communications Commission approval of new microwave link.

The application filed by ITT Cable and Radio, Inc., Puerto Rico (ITTCRPR), an associate of ITT World Communications Inc., calls for a 30-mile, 11 KMC microwave link between a satellite earth station, now planned for construction at Cayey, Puerto Rico, and ITTCRPR's international terminal in San Juan.



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### Code Would List

#### Sulphur Content

A proposed code regulating the amount of sulfur in fuels and designed to remove 740,000 tons of sulfur dioxide annually from the New Jersey atmosphere in a three-phase program beginning January 1, 1968 was announced by the New Jersey State Department of Health. The code would be applicable throughout the state.

The second phase is slated to commence on October 1, 1970, and the third on October 1, 1971. Emission of the noxious gas, which results largely from the burning of fossil fuels, such as coal and oil, would be cut below the level recommended by the federal government.

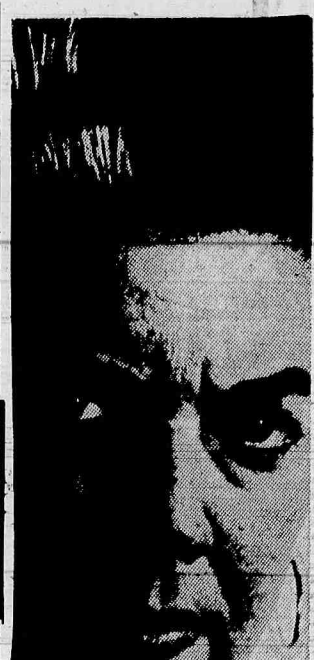

All manufacturers of TV sets buy certain parts from specialty manufacturers. It would be far too expensive if every factory would make all its own parts, in fact it would be almost impossible. The same goes for cabinets. There are only a couple of TV makers who have facilities to make their own cabinets. Most of them buy them from furniture factories.

We hear often from customers that they have been told that a certain brand has "all Japanese parts". Invariably this is a gimmick used by dishonest salesmen to discourage customers to buy this brand, which in most cases they do not carry in stock. There is hardly a radio or TV set made these days that does not use some parts made in Japan, Holland or Germany. There is nothing wrong with these parts. All these countries know how to make electronic products just as good as they are made in the U.S. to say the least. Chances are that these parts are of better quality as they could be bought for the same price in this country.

Just about every major manufacturer is building factories in Formosa for subassemblies. It is well known that Japan sells tremendous quantities of all kinds of electronic equipment to this country.

## Pre-School Play Program Is Underway In Belleville

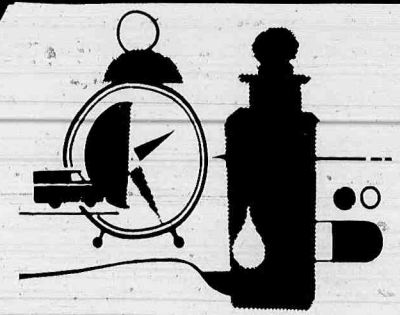
Parents of four-year-old children may be interested in the Recreation Department's Pre-School Play Program.

## Now's The Time To Use Peaches

Now's the time for fresh peaches. In New Jersey peaches are in peak supply around the 10th to the 20th of August. Take advantage of this home grown fruit while it is plentiful.

When buying look for peaches that are fairly firm and are free from bruises and blemishes. For easy preparation choose free-stone peaches. These break away easily from the pit.

Peach color varies with the variety. Usually they have a yellow to cream colored background with rose to red blush.

Fresh peaches will ripen at room temperature, but once ripe, they should be stored in the refrigerator. To make fresh peach ice cream, crush 2 cups sliced fresh peaches and sweeten to taste with sugar. Fold this mixture into 1 quart of softened vanilla ice cream. Turn into an ice cube tray and freeze until firm. A quick and easy peach dessert is sliced peaches with sour cream and confectioners' sugar

to taste. Flavor the mixture with vanilla extract and chill until serving time.

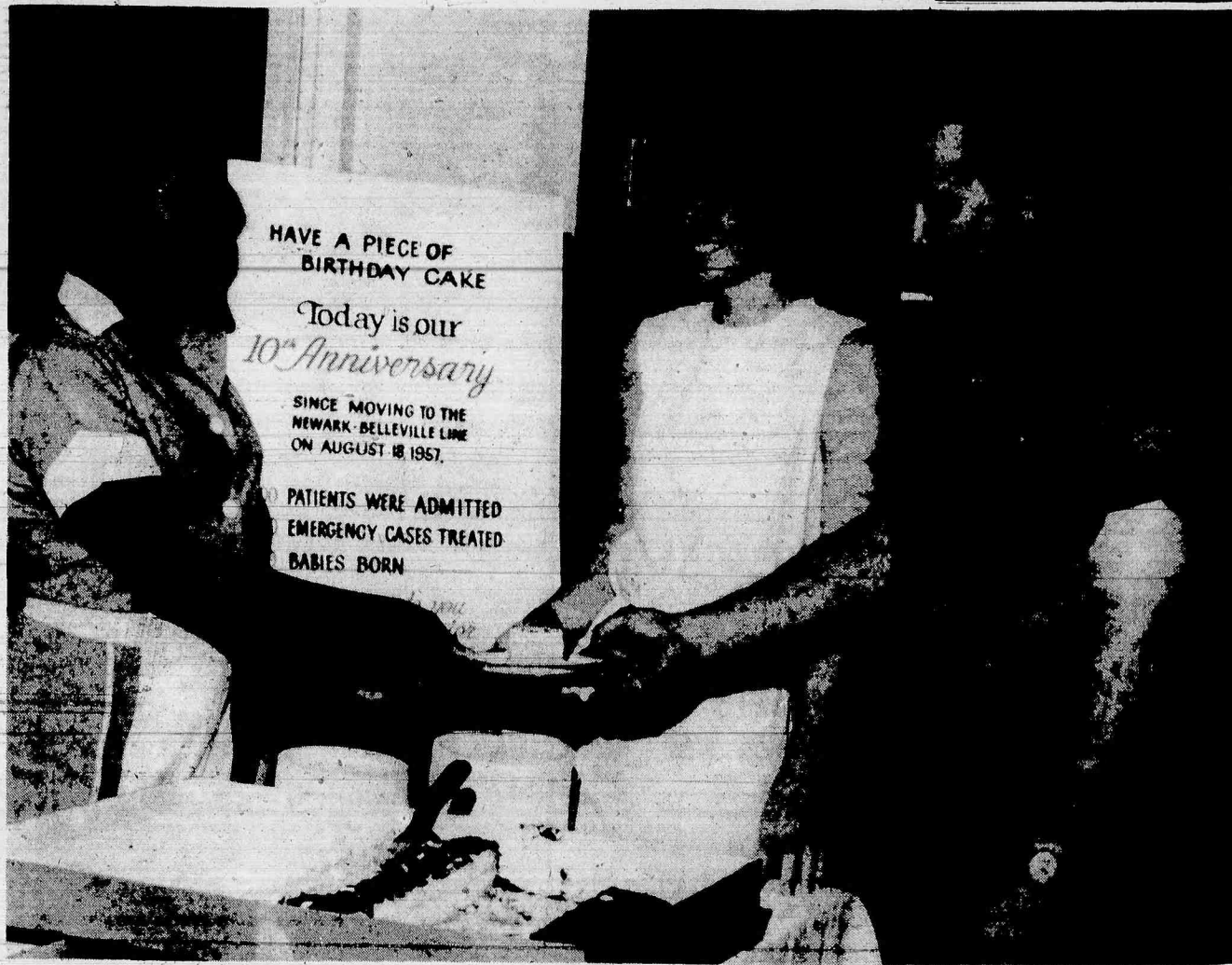

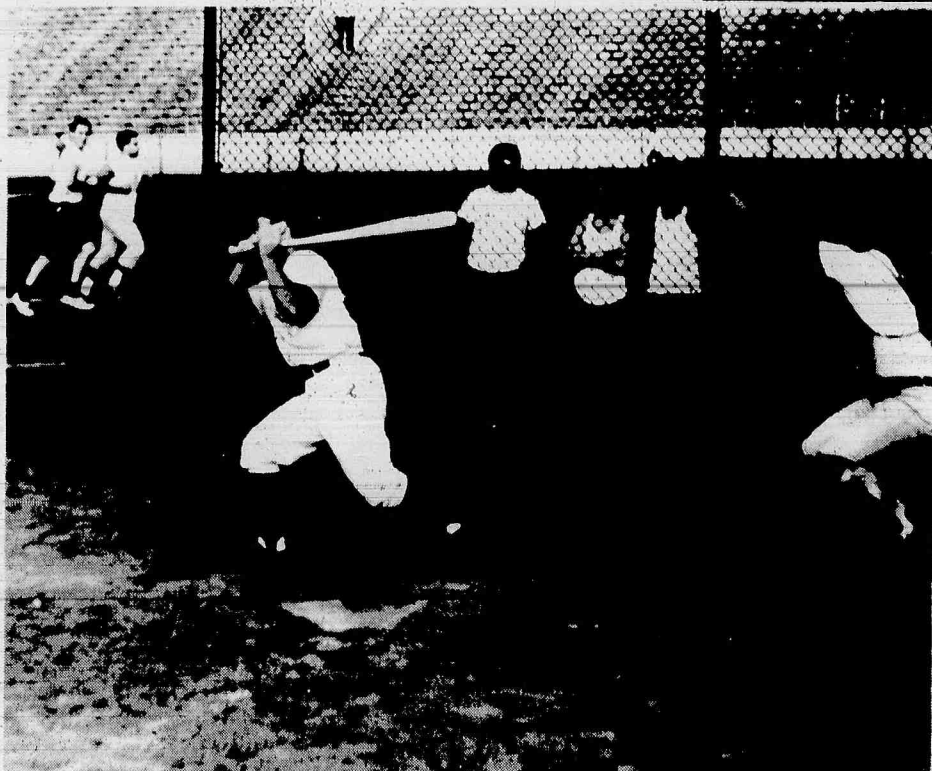
