A school staff of 298 will greet students when the doors open to the town's school system on Wednesday.

Following an introductory presentation the visiting students are to be conducted through a tour of the building.

Seymour Grossman, school principal, said, "We hope that the orientation will help to make the students feel more comfortable on the first day of school in a new situation.

High School Information Belleville High School will open at 8 a.m. to start the new school year, Students will report directly to their homerooms where they will receive schedules for the new



We commend Mayor Smith for his demonstration of keen leadership and trust it is an indication of greater decisions for the future -- all leading to a Better Belleville for everyone.

Essex County GOP County Contest

Tuesday, September 12, Independent Republicans and Organization Machine Republicans will visit the polls to decide whether or not Reform Republicans should replace the present leadership.
