## On Four Charges

## Stellatela Held For Grand Jury

Sam Stellatela, owner of Sonny's Lounge in Belleville, was held for the action of the grand jury in connection with three charges of possession of stolen property and a charge of having a dangerous weapon.

Stellatela was in the news two years ago when he turned over to the Essex County prosecutor's office tapes which allegedly implicated Senator Sarcone of Newark in a plot to obtain \$600 from Stellatela in return for killing an ABC violation against the tavern owner.

Last week's preliminary hearing in Belleville Municipal Court came as a result of the intense efforts of two Belleville detectives, Cornelius Berrigan and Barton Rossi. The two spent more than six months on the case.

Stellatela was arrested at his bar, Sonny's Lounge, Williams Street, Belleville, on June 30. After being brought to police headquarters, Stellatela was asked to empty his pockets, which resulted in the discovery of a .25 caliber pistol. When questioned about the gun, Stellatela said it was registered with the Bloomfield police department.

A short investigation into the matter found that Stellatela was lying. Bloomfield police said Stellatela filed for a permit to buy a gun but never registered for a permit to carry the weapon. Stellatela was then charged with

carrying a dangerous weapon. In the preliminary hearing, the state brought forth its star witness, Reggie Revis of Nutley. Revis is currently in the county penitentiary at West Caldwell for being convicted in the Nutley court of breaking and entering an automobile and stealing an organ. He was apprehended last month by Belleville police after a high speed chase which resulted in speeds of over 100 mph.

Revis testified that he had on three occasions, met with Stellatela and given him stolen property. The first time, Revis met with Stellatela at Sonny's Lounge and gave him a pearl cocktail ring with what appeared to be diamond chips in it. Revis told Stellatela to have the ring appraised but the item was never returned.

In the next two meetings with Stellatela, Revis told the court that two stolen tape players were purchased by Stellatela for \$10 apiece.

The state called Det. Sgt. William Dietz of the Nutley police department to the stand in connection with a conversation between Stellatela and Dietz. But when Town Attorney Nicholas Amato, representing the prosecution, asked Dietz of the conversation with Stellatela, defense council objected. The defense lawyer raised the question of Stellatela being advised of his constitutional rights before entering the phone conversation with Dietz.

## Belleville To Fight Sewage

Belleville Commissioner Mary Senatore and Acting Mayor Joseph McGreevy are standing firm in their opposition to the dumping of 100 million gallons of sewage daily in the Passaic River by the Passaic Valley Sewage Commission, despite the fact that a bypass plan will cost the town \$58,900.

Meanwhile, Congressman Peter Rodino stated that the Federal Water Pollution Control Administration is giving technical aid to the state by helping formulate alternate plans to the dumping. Those alternatives consist of (1) a bypass tunnel running parallel to the broken sewer; (2) an open cut bypass; (3) the erection of another line through a grouting process; (4) the construction of an additional line within the old; and, (5) complete repair of the existing line.

A bypass plan, suggested by the state, was introduced at a special meeting of the PVSC called to discuss the recent controversy. The plan will cost \$2,500,000 if put into operation.

The PVSC caused a furor two weeks ago when it announced that it was going to dump large amounts of sewage in the Passaic River while repairing a sewer main on Gouverneur Street in Newark. River while repairing a sewer main on Gouverneur Street in Newark.

If the sewage is dumped into the river, the cost to the towns participating in the PVSC will be only \$500,000.

# Circus Atmosphere Puts Spotlight On Commission

## Crowd Attends Meeting

Acting Mayor Joseph McGreevy, presiding over his second Commission meeting, found himself called upon to play circus ringleader and "Dear Ann Landers," as over 80 noisy residents crowded Town Hall Monday night to voice grievances and back a rezoning ordinance.

Amid the confusion, an ordinance was passed on first reading which would rezone a portion of the Silver Lake area from business to residential C.

The first act, staged in ring one, began at about 8:15, when Getty Oil company applied for a permit to reconstruct an Esso service station at 310 Belleville Avenue.

About 40 residents from the area adjacent to the station, were present to question Getty architects, engineers and lawyers.

Representatives of Getty told the Commission that it planned on replacing the present station with a modern three-story colonial structure. There would be no major repairs done at the station, and car washing would be permitted only for regular customers.

Despite assurances by Getty, that the structure would not increase traffic or be built on residential zone land on Columbus Avenue, the residents were visibly

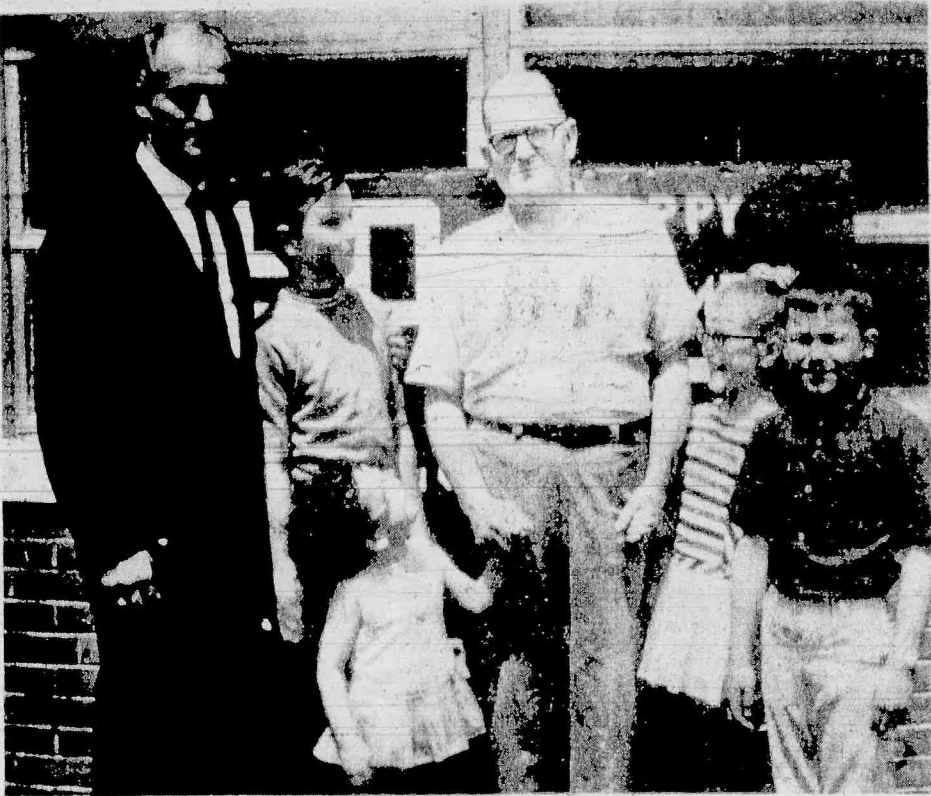
## Vince Balkan Dies; High Mass Today

displeased and kept up a barrage of questions.

The application was granted 3-1, Commissioner Vincent Strumolo casting the negative vote.

A second permit was given to Atlantic-Richfield for reconstruction of an existing station at the corner of Franklin Avenue and Joralemon Street. There was no opposition and the permit was granted 4-0.

The action shifted briefly to the center ring as an ordinance was introduced to rezone an area near Heckel Street. Commissioner William Cullen, a member of the planning board, told the assembly, that although he was not opposed to the change, he felt it was "rather odd that after their (Silver Lake residents) strenuous objection to the master plan that now the neighborhood is up in arms and wants to do what the planning board proposed."

The commissioner continued, saying "I am rather taken back that in such a short time the neighborhood requests a change."

The spotlight shifted to Commissioner Mary Senatore, who drew loud applause from the audience when she said the residents had been misled when the master plan was introduced. She said they were not shown a map of the proposed change.

"I beg to differ," said Cullen. "There were large maps, in color I might add. Being a member of the planning board, I am only defending its master plan."

In what was to be a prelude of later events, Cullen drew catcalls from the audience which thought the Commissioner was opposed to the rezoning.

After the rest of the evenings business was conducted, a hearing was opened to the citizens present.

Rev. Rocco Constantino of 136 Heckel Street said "We are here tonight to demonstrate we are unanimous in our backing of the rezoning change. We want to thank you and ask for your support."

What followed was a

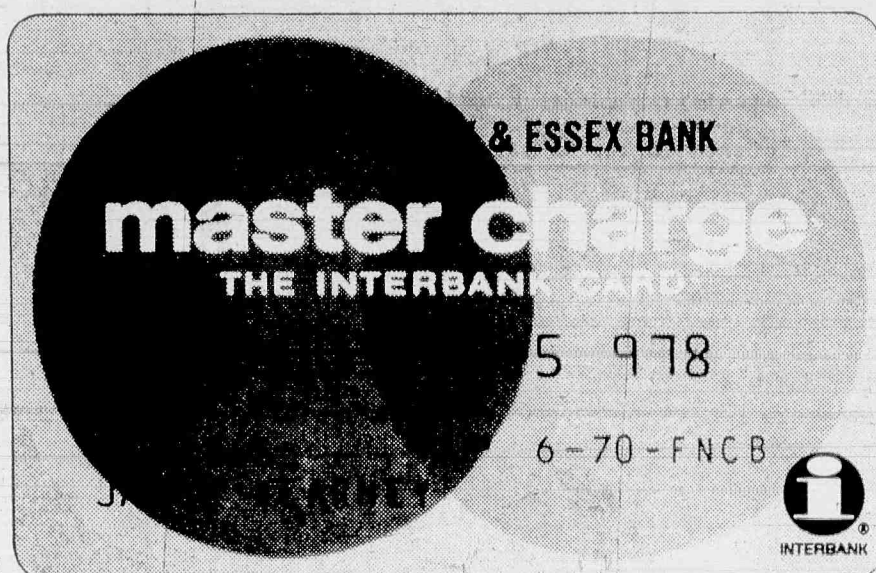

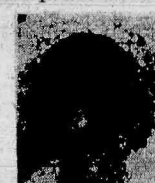

## Should Walter Blasi Quit?

The controversy which involves the Essex County Vocational School Board begins with the appointments made to that body by County Supervisor Walter Blasi, a Republican.

The Nutley Republican County Committee last week voted to ask for the withdrawal of Blasi as a candidate for re-election in this November's election.

The contention of the anti-Blasi people is that he showed poor judgment in appointing Frank Marmo and Louis Bertolino to the Vocational School Board.

About two years ago Blasi appointed Marmo to the Board and later attempted to rescind the Marmo appointment. Marmo went to court and the appointment stuck.

At the time, Blasi was issuing statements which were calculated to earn for him the compassion and understanding of Essex County residents.

With this experience under his belt, one would think that Walter Blasi would be extremely careful with his next appointment to the Vocational School Board.

Along comes Board Member, Charles Dubel, who in June tendered his resignation effective June 30 on the condition that he would be subsequently appointed as Counsel to the School Board at the specific annual salary of \$12,500.

Acting on the dubious Dubel resignation, Blasi quickly moved to appoint Bertolino, Marmo's attorney, to fill the Dubel vacancy.

No sooner was he sworn in than Bertolino made common cause with Marmo, and from that moment forward the end of the Marmo regime became only a question of time.

The Bertolino appointment raises the issue of a credibility gap with Mr. Blasi. Was his response over the Marmo appointment real or merely for public consumption?

Was he compelled to appoint Bertolino because of a pre-Primary political deal which includes the allegation that Blasi executed a letter of appointment for Bertolino in April of this year? If so, who ordered the deal? And why?

There is much that remains unanswered in

the Marmo-Bertolino-Blasi problem.

The question that looms on the horizon for Blasi is whether or not his continuation in the job of Supervisor and his re-election bid may be fatal to Republican Party victory this November.

There are many Party leaders who believe Blasi should resign from his present post and abandon his bid.

There are others who believe Blasi should retain his post but give up the nomination to someone else.

There are others who believe Blasi should retain his post but give up the nomination to someone else.

There are still others who believe Blasi did nothing wrong -- that his appointments of Marmo and Bertolino were proper, and anyway, the appointing power should not retain veto over the people he appoints to office.

Whatever one's conclusion may be with respect to the course Blasi should take in the interest of the Republican Party, one thing remains clear -- the Blasi-Marmo-Bertolino problem continues with unabated fury -- and sooner or later Republican leaders must issue a statement of renewed confidence in Blasi, or in the alternative, a statement of no-confidence.

If Blasi's actions meet with the approval of Republican leaders, then he is entitled to a public vote of confidence. On the other hand, if the Blasi appointments to the Essex County Vocational School Board have made a school system subservient to political manipulation, then Blasi should be asked to take the appropriate step necessary to renew public confidence in the Essex County Vocational School System and the Essex County Republican leadership.

## Politics and Judgeships

Pending judicial appointments to the State Judiciary in Passaic County are at a virtual halt because three elected Republican State Senators insist the new judges be "their" men.

Governor Richard Hughes named three eminent Passaic attorneys to judicial vacancies. Hughes nominated Irving I. Rubin of Paterson to the County Court, Murray A. Laiks of Passaic to the District Court, and Peter Cilino of Clifton to the Juvenile and Domestic Relations Court.

These men have received the approval of the New Jersey Bar Association.

However, the Passaic County Senate Delegation is more concerned with their personal selections for the judicial plums than they are with the qualifications of the present nominees, despite constitutional requirements that judicial appointments be made by the governor.

As a consequence of this stalemate, Passaic County Assignment Judge John F. Crane ordered that starting in September the Superior and County Courts of the County would not handle any civil cases. Instead all of their time will be devoted to criminal cases.

Thousands of citizens are being deprived of justice and their right to a quick trial because of a political controversy created by Passaic County's Three-Man Republican Senate block.

This misuse of Senatorial courtesy is not doing the Republican Party any good.

## What Is Faith?

Is the task of religion - the attempt to answer the question, 'Why? What is the meaning and purpose of life?' - too difficult even for the most valorous and intrepid? Difficult? It is probably impossible! Doubtless, we can never fully succeed. And yet, if humanity is to survive, someone must be willing to try. We cannot stop the flow of information, discovery and invention; and should not, even if we could. We must learn to live with and, if possible, to benefit from all that any research can teach us. Indeed, if we are to survive, all of us everywhere must constantly make the effort to put the pieces of understanding together: to see life whole and to deal with it as a unity.

No one knows all that he needs to know in order to enable him to live his life perfectly. For that matter, no one can even imagine what a perfect life would be. Not all the accumulated knowledge in the world is sufficient to enable even one individual with certainty to live out his life in complete bliss. Yet, if we are to live at all, we must do so with just the means at our disposal. That is, with knowledge which is incomplete and resources which fall short of total adequacy. We must make the best use we can of what

we have and what we know; and, employing our best intelligence, make the best possible guess as to the meaning of the unknown. We can do no better than to act on our most educated hunch, until better knowledge proves that hunch to be false or unreliable. This reliance on our best guess as to the unknown is what we mean by faith.

All of us live, in very large part, by faith. Columbus had no absolute, guaranteed certainty that this planet is a globe-curved round in every direction that land lay west of the Azores, any more than the Wright Brothers knew beyond a shadow of a doubt that heavier-than-air craft could fly.

You and I do not know for certain that we will be here tomorrow, or that people we love are trustworthy; or that pledged promises will be fulfilled; or that when we flip an electric switch a light will glow or a motor whirl. We accept all this on trust, we believe this because it had happened thus in the past; it is reasonable to assume it will happen thus again. We accept all this on faith, because this is the only sane way to live - namely, to accept what we know, for certain, and have faith where we have no such certainty.

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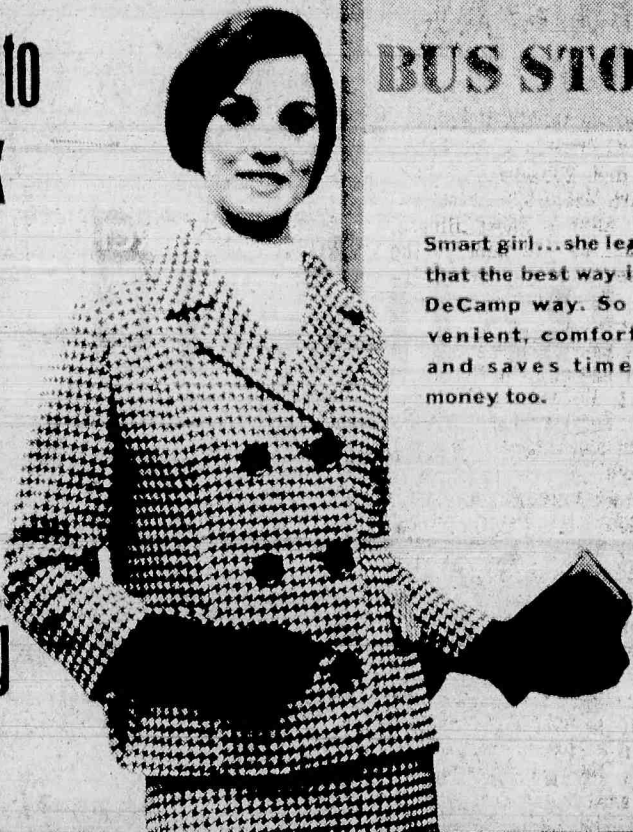

It has been the practice of one large national retailer to advertise in this manner. Occasionally there was just this one advertised set in the store and it was impossible to buy it, although we layed cash right on the line and agreed to all kinds of delays in delivery. The set just could not be bought. Needless to say that the salesman tried his darndest to switch to a different set which was "much better" etc. etc., probably you have experienced these things yourself.

It would be a real service to the public if this deceptive advertising and listing of fictitious "list prices" would be stopped, as at least in New York apparently it will. This should be national, not just in New York.

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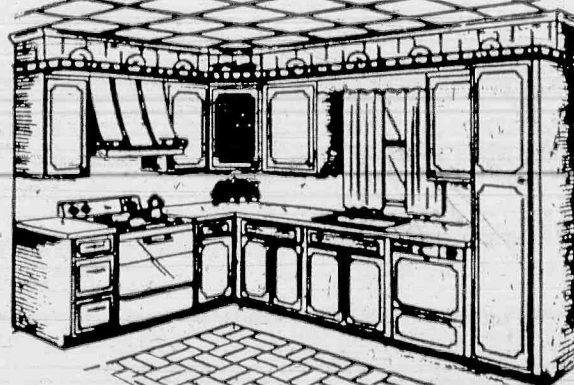

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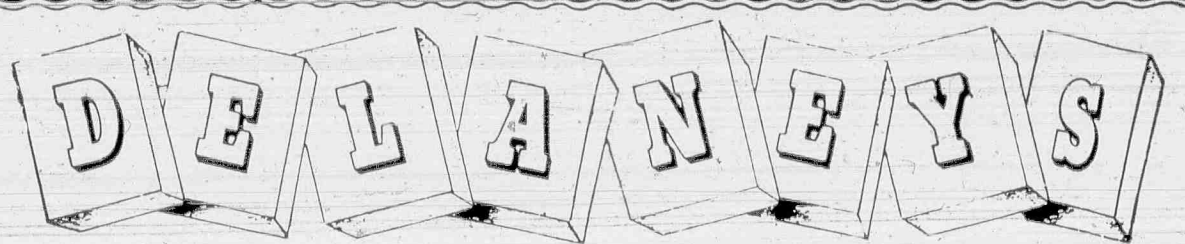
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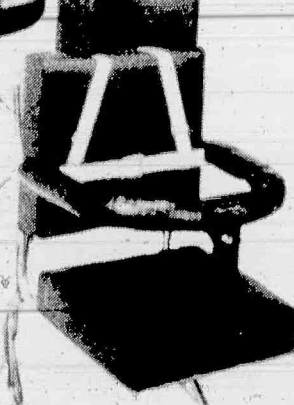
