

## Belleville Teachers Ask For Mediation For Salary Dispute

"We have reached the point of impasse."

With these words, Jerry Kennelly, president of the Belleville Education Association, announced that his teacher's group was calling in PERC, the official mediator for public employee disputes. It is the first time an outside mediator has been called into to discuss teacher salaries in town.

Failure of the teachers and school Board to agree on salary schedules was cited by both sides as the cause for calling in mediation.

Kennelly wrote Monday to the Public Employees Relation Commission asking for a mediator to conduct further discussion. A representative from PERC is expected this week.

This historic move was made possible by a recent law which gave all public employees the right to negotiate salaries and working conditions. The law also provides for use of PERC when negotiations are stalled.

Last week the Times reported teacher salary offerings included in the Board's proposed \$5,757,648 budget which were incorrect. The offerings were those for Nutley teachers and were included through a misunderstanding. No figures are available on teacher salaries except the overall sum listed as \$3,668,056, a hike of \$368,461 over last year.

Speaking for the School Board, Dr. Frank Di Ruggiero

said: "After many faithful negotiations on salary matters, our final offer to the teachers has been rejected. They have chosen to use PERC and by law we must cooperate."

The Board president said that "we had hoped we could settle peacefully and get quality education to meet the taxpayers needs. Now we will await future talks."

Kennelly also issued a statement, and said his group would take what ever action

proved necessary. He did not discount the possibilities of a strike.

"We have not reached an agreement on a fair and equitable guide," Kennelly said. "The Board has not seen fit to agree to our philosophy on salary needs."

By philosophy Kennelly said he meant the Board's estimation of a teacher's value to a school system.

The junior high school teacher said the two sides

## Winter Problems Plague Belleville

New Jersey's worst winter in nine years has caused numerous problems for Belleville's Department of Public Works, including a record usage of 500 tons of street salt.

Obtaining the salt, which sells for \$17.50 a ton, has proved a difficult task. Public Works Commissioner Mary Senatore and purchasing agent Thomas McLaughlin report that the town's salt supplier, Morton's, ran out of a 30,000 ton stockpile. The two were able to obtain the extra salt, which represents over 150 tons more than the previous high, from Diamond Crystal Co. and from Essex County.

The commissioner says that round the clock snow removal has been installed during storms, but said the

fixing of potholes will have to await warmer weather. The director says a \$10,000 federal government annual grant will help the cost of a thin overlay.

The worst problem so far, has not been the salt or the potholes. Mrs. Senatore says that refusal by residents to remove cars during snow removal have seriously hampered operations.

Working with eight plows which the commissioner calls "inadequate," crews have been dumping the snow at the stadium and on a town lot near Mill Street.

One aid this year has been the institution of diesel engines to replace gasoline powered ones. The idea was credited to Joseph Vitiello, a member of the snow removal crew. Vitiello, who lives at 145 Floyd Street, says the diesel engines stand up better to punishment, are cheaper to operate and require less maintenance.

"It's been tough," he says. "You're up all hours. I've seen myself come back from shoveling at five in the morning. You just can't make any weekend plans this winter if you're on the crew."

One of Vitiello's most bitter experiences this winter was the repair of a six inch water valve at the Industrial Center. His crew had to shut down the whole center and break through thick ice to get to the problem. In all it represented 10 hours out in the cold weather.

"It's my job. I can't complain."

This year's statistics paint a cold picture: Between two and six inches of snow have been on the ground for 28 consecutive days. And there have been 17 consecutive days when the temperature was below the season normal.

The temperatures of those days averaged 11 degrees below normal.

## Air Code Adopted Monday

Belleville took its final preparatory step toward a multi-municipal attack on dirty air in Essex County when it unanimously passed an anti-air pollution code at Monday nights Commission meeting.

With the passage of the code, the town becomes eligible to join the Suburban Essex County Air Pollution Control Commission, a group of municipalities with headquarters in West Orange.

The ordinance, introduced a month ago by Public Affairs Commissioner Vincent T. Strumolo, will give the Health Department greater control over air pollution in Belleville. It establishes standards for the installation, maintenance and operation of equipment which might become potential sources of air pollution. It also provides for more effective penalties and fines.

The maximum penalty for violating the code is now \$200. The commissioner will have the power of handing out summonses.

Under the code, air pollution is defined as any artificial outdoor atmosphere which is injurious to health or interferes with life or property.

One major change in the code will be the use of a modern scale for grading smoke density. The scale is a device used by the State Department of Health in setting density standards.

Strumolo says the code was not created to answer any urgent need in Belleville, but is part of his drive to update all Health Department standards in town. It was one of Strumolo's campaign promises to create a better air pollution code.

## 32 Family Set-Up Okayed By Town

A 32 family apartment building is scheduled for erection on Harrison Street. The complex was okayed at Monday night's Commission meeting by a 4-1 vote, Commissioner Joseph McGreevy dissenting.

The Ren-Cent Holding Company of Irvington will build the apartment house on a lot 116 feet by an average depth of 350 feet.

The proposed building will cut across two zones, necessitating the variance. One hundred feet of the building will be set in a business zone, while 16 feet will cross into a residential "B" area.

# Arraignment Tomorrow For Joseph Biancardi

U.S. Attorney Frederick Lacey's much publicized probe into organized crime reached into Belleville this week and indicted Joseph Biancardi, a teamsters official and former State Assemblyman. Lacey also

ordered grand jury appearances for Mayor Ken Smith and Anthony "Jack Panels" Santoli of Belleville.

Biancardi, who was negotiating a labor contract in Nutley's town hall when he learned of the indictment, is scheduled to be arraigned tomorrow on embezzlement and conspiracy charges.

Mayor Smith, who said he had been called to answer questions about Belleville residents, has not been recalled. Panels, referred to frequently in the "DeCarlo" tapes and alleged to be a close friend of the reputed Mafia leader, was unavailable for comment.

Reaction in town to Lacey's local investigation

was mixed and often emotional. "It's about time they started looking here," said one resident. "This town's another Peyton Place," said another. Many felt that the probes should delve even further into town.

Others, however, were somewhat surprised, particularly at Biancardi's indictment. "He's such a wonderful man," one resident said. "He's done so much for this town. It's a shame." Others felt that Lacey was conducting a "witch hunt," and criticized the attorney for what they said was "trial by the press."

Perhaps the most frequent comment in town concerning Biancardi was that his numerous charity contributions were not mentioned anywhere by the press. The teamsters president, who is 63, has for many years made contributions, both personal and through his Joseph Biancardi Association to such causes as Boys Town of Italy, St. Lucy's Cadets, Cerebral Palsy, the NAACP, Muscular Dystrophy, the Heart Fund and the March of Dimes.

Biancardi told the Times that he was innocent of any wrong doing and was prepared to answer every charge leveled against him.

The former assemblyman was named along with two other labor officials in an 18 count indictment which Lacey says is the result of a year long investigation by the U.S. Labor Department and the Justice Department's Organized Crime Task Force.

Named with Biancardi, who is Teamsters Local 97 president, are Henry Garrod, secretary-treasurer of the union and James Caputo, a part-time organizer for the local and building superintendent for the Essex County Hall of Records.

The men are charged with making unauthorized political contributions, taking excess salary checks and using union funds for personal expenses for a total of more than \$15,000 according to the indictment.

The true bill also accused the defendants of conspiring to embezzle Local 97 funds to finance the political campaigns of Biancardi in 1965 and 1967. Elected for one term, Biancardi lost the 1967 race.

U.S. Attorney Lacey pointed out the Landrum-Griffin Act forbids union officials from making political contributions without full consent of union membership.

In addition to a conspiracy count, Biancardi, who lives at

16 King Place, was charged in five counts with embezzlement funds to pay for his campaigns; finance newspaper ads; repair his car; make unauthorized political contributions and taking 67 weeks salary in 1968.

Biancardi and Garrod were named in one count charging they made an illegal contribution of \$1,000 to the

Essex County Democratic

Committee and falsifying records during 1965-68.

Both are also accused of filing false annual reports with the Secretary of Labor for those years.

Conviction carries a maximum sentence of 48 years imprisonment and a \$160,000 fine for Biancardi.

Biancardi, whose salary is \$40,500, is accused of using nearly \$6,000 to pay for

## Bob Cook Quits Planning Board

Robert Cook, a member of the Belleville Planning Board since 1967, has resigned. Named by Mayor Ken Smith to fill his unexpired term is Vincent Mustacchio, the board's clerk for five years.

Cook announced his intention to resign in a letter to Mayor Smith and cited numerous time consuming activities related to his recreation directors job as the primary reason for his action.

"I have enjoyed being on the board, and will be happy to render service to it in the future," he said. "I feel I can still help the Board in my capacity as Recreation director."

Mustacchio was named by Smith at Monday night's Commission meeting and will serve until 1971.

Cook, who says he hasn't had more than 10 days vacation in the last two years, has been recreation director for 17 years. His duties, he says, demand three to four nights of his time. A weight lifting enthusiast, he also serves as national chairman of a weightlifting association. He has been active recently in steering the Belleville Rotary

and Lions Clubs toward a program of subsidizing local athletes for national competition.

There have been some reports lately that Cook has been dissatisfied with the Board. The recreation director reportedly criticized the Board at a recent Rotary meeting.

Cook, however, denies such

## Candidates Scurry On Tea Schedule

Candidates for the two open Board of Education seats hustled themselves around town this week trying to keep up with a dizzying schedule of teas and impromptu rallies.

Tuesday night the three hopefuls, James Risoli, Caesar Romano and Richard Mahmarian met head on in the Junior High School for a presentation of platforms before the Consolidated PTA's and Home and School Association. The Times went to press before the meeting, but a complete report will follow next week.

The Times did receive press releases from Risoli and Romano which spoke in general terms of their candidacies. At press time nothing was received by Mahmarian.

In his statement Risoli talked about the use of logic, sound reasoning and understanding for problems confronting the school system.

Risoli also said that there appears to be a harmonious relationship between administration, teachers and parents," and that "all are striving to provide the best educational opportunities and instructions."

The candidate did say, however, that a "closer in depth home-school relationship" should be encouraged.

"Parents should attend school conferences with teachers as frequently as possible," he said. "They can point at problems at home which might influence a child's behavior in school." Risoli said some student problems are not apparent on report cards.

Proposed by Risoli in his statement was an expanded guidance department to "assess the strengths of the students so as to provide effective guidance into the areas more compatible with the students ability and aptitudes."

Romano emphasized in his statements two facets of his background which he feels will aid him to better serve the Board.

The candidate, who is a

sales representative for an international container corporation, said his business knowledge will help "bring economy and better dollar value to our educational system." He said that that maintenance can be done "with a degree of continuity without letting fiscal plants deteriorate to the point where major refurbishing is required."

As to future financial activities of the Board, the candidate recommended that it proceed with "cautious optimism until such time as the plans of national economists to stabilize the economy are successful." He was referring to investments by the Board in the bond market, which he says are not feasible at the present time.

He also said his public relations experience will help promote a good public image for the schools system.

## Smith's Overtures Rejected By Board

Mayor Ken Smith's proposed flight into the future via a mass modernization project for the town, will have to be a solo trip.

Monday night the Board of Education, toying for weeks with the idea of joining a town-wide effort at modernization, decided to withdraw as a participant.

"Though we do not disagree that our schools need modernization, we cannot take part in a bond effort at this time," Board Attorney Max Schwartz told the Commission during an open hearing of citizens.

Speaking for 15 minutes, the Board spokesman told the town fathers that current litigation between the two bodies requires that his client withdraw from the Mayor's proposal to modernize all town-owned buildings through a multi-million dollar bond issue.

Smith listened intently but replied to the long-time Board attorney that the

litigation was "irrelevant" to the current issue.

In the ensuing discussion, it became obvious that the two governing bodies still hold hostile feelings for each other, and that a joint effort of any type in the near future seems unlikely.

The town is currently appealing a state Board of Education decision to restore \$128,000 to the Belleville Board's budget. The budget had been cut \$205,777 by commissioners' after being twice rejected by voters.

The feud over the budget has kept the two bodies at odds with each other until recently when Smith proposed the two work together to modernize Belleville through separate bond issues.

Now all hopes of the joint effort appear over. Just why the marriage was dashed on the rocks is not quite clear, despite several public statements by Board spokesmen and commissioners.

A newsmen for 40 years, his byline has appeared in many papers, including The Detroit Free Press, The Newark Star Ledger, The Newark Evening News, The Jersey City Journal and the old Bronx Home-News.

His love for naval destroyers also led him to write a book called "Destroyers in Action." He was also a frequent contributor to "Our Navy Magazine."

Mr. Shafter's penchant for sea travel caused him to leave his family and ship out on a square rigger, enabling him to circle the earth via major waterways and seaports.

The young seaman returned to Germany during World War I to enlist. He was decorated in action and made a lieutenant.

Leaving his homeland after the war, Mr. Shafter crossed the Atlantic to Canada, where he roamed that country's provinces as a lumberjack in Nova Scotia, a miner in Cape Breton and a cowpuncher in Alberta. A muscular man with a great barrel chest, he followed the harvests in the Dakota's

(Continued from page 1) personal political campaign advertisements and materials, of spending \$232 in union money for repairs to his car, and taking the 67 weeks salary, amounting to \$3,648 in excess wages.

Biancardi reportedly draws salary and expenses from three union posts, according to the most recent available Labor Department records. As president of Local 97, he receives more than \$34,000 a year, including \$32,160 in salary with the balance consisting of reimbursed expenses and other disbursements. As an organizer for Teamsters Local 575, his salary is listed as \$4,105. He also is trustee of the Teamsters Joint Council 74 with a salary of \$2,400.

Overt acts cited in the indictment accuse Biancardi and Garrod of using union funds to make numerous payments to political groups and associations. Biancardi alone allegedly drew union checks of \$75 to the Paul J. Krebs Association, \$100 to Armand Lembo, \$250 to the Senators Testimonial Dinner Committee, \$40 to the Commissioner Vincent T.

(Continued from page 1) reports, saying he is leaving the board with "no bitterness."

His criticism, he says, is leveled at the people of Belleville for rejecting the Board's master plan a few years ago which called for the orderly industrialization of parts of the Valley.

As for the Rotary meeting, Cooks says he told Rotarians that the board was "weak" but was using a special term applied to such bodies. A "weak" board, he explained, is one which can only make recommendations, while a "strong" one is autonomous and is involved in policy setting.

The departing Planning Board official said he was undecided whether the local body should become stronger.

Cook said he made his decision four weeks ago. In 1968 lack of time forced him to resign from the North Essex Child Guidance board.

Mustaccio, meanwhile, will bring experience to the board, a board which has been criticized by some as being politically motivated. The major activity of the Board in recent years was its comprehensive Master plan, which members reportedly

still have hopes for.

The new member has been a town employee for 22 years, currently serving as building inspector. He has also served the town as acting building inspector, plumbing inspector and a former supervisor of the Sewer and Water Department.

A lifelong Belleville resident, he is a member of the American Society of Sanitary Engineers, the American Waterworks Association and the Building Officials Conference of America. He is a World War II veteran and fought in the European Battle of the Bulge.

Schwartz told the Commission that "you are completely without authority to interfere with the running of the school system." What the attorney was referring to was the belief by some Board members that Smith is out to railroad the school council's power and force them to abdicate their separate bonding rights to a joint town effort overseen by Smith.

The Mayor denies any such intentions. On the Mayor's side of the ledger, there are no public statements on record which would give credence to this belief. Some observers have said the Board's mistrust of Smith has caused the split.

Last year the Mayor actively campaigned against passage of the budget, and although Smith said he was doing so to save the taxpayers from what he called an exorbitant budget, the Board saw it otherwise. To trust the Mayor now appears to be difficult for the Board.

Schwartz also told the Commission that he had been asked by the State Commissioner of Education not to put any money into capital improvements

until the case was settled.

The proposed 1970-71 school budget contains \$250,000 in capital improvements for rewiring at the Junior High School. Schwartz says, however, that this has been done only because the rewiring constitutes an emergency.

Both Smith and Town Attorney Nicholas Amato told Schwartz they saw no relevant connection between the appeal and the situation on hand. According to the town's special counsel, San Christiano, Schwartz had volunteered three weeks ago to advise his Board to spend the restored cash frugally, a proposal endorsed by the State Commission because of the pending legislation. In a previous release to the Times, Schwartz had not mentioned

that he had also promised to advise the Board to abstain from capital improvements.

Smith repeatedly asked Schwartz why the School Board "persisted in repairing piecemeal at a great cost to the taxpayers and not through a bond issue."

Schwartz told Smith that repairs in the schools are such that a master plan for improvement would be difficult. "Problems crop up each year," Schwartz said, "and we can't possibly anticipate them."

Dr. DiRuggiero, Board President, declined to elaborate on Schwartz' comments. Asked if his Board would bond if the litigation was over, the doctor declined to comment, saying that Schwartz had represented the Board's opinion at the present time.

# Appeal Is Delayed On Board Budget

The Town Commission's appeal case involving the recently restored Belleville Board of Education budget is being held up in Trenton because the State Education Department has an overload of appeals.

The news came from Sam Christiano, West Orange attorney who is handling the case for the town along with Town Attorney Nicholas R. Amato. The commissioners are objecting to a \$128,000 restoration by State Commissioner Carl Marburger to the local budget twice rejected by voters.

Christiano says he has received a report from the

Department's court stenographer that it will be two weeks before he can type transcripts of the appeal hearing which led to the restoration. The case will be heard some time after the transcripts are typed, but Christiano would not venture a guess when.

The lawyer, who is West Orange Board of Education attorney, says he hasn't decided what line of attack the town will take.

Mayor Ken Smith, however, gave some indication of the commissioners' intentions at Monday night's town meeting, when in the midst of a discussion with Belleville Board attorney Max Schwartz, he indicated that Marburger's legal authority to alter budgets would be challenged.

# State Aid Asked To Help Signals

Mayor Ken Smith has decided to seek state aid for the purchase of a new signal system for the Police and Fire Departments.

An ordinance authorizing purchase of the \$65,000 system has already been okayed by the Commission, but Smith withdrew a resolution to advertise for the system at Monday night's Commission meeting. If the project is advertised and a bid received, the town would not be eligible for state aid.

Smith said recent talks with state officials have convinced him that when the new state budget arrives there will be funds available for the system. He says he will ask the state to underwrite the whole cost of the system.

The present system was purchased second hand from the Town of Hackensack in 1928, and according to Smith, barely functions.

Basically, a signal system sets up call boxes at various locations in town, linked with a central receiving unit at police headquarters. Present signaling between patrol cars, fire headquarters and the police station is done by radio.

The Mayor said there are several key advantages for a police force having a signal system. With the widespread use today of ham radios, police messages are becoming impossible to keep secret. Mayor Smith said that many robbers today use short wave radios to pick up police signals during a burglary. Only recently, youths causing

disturbances repeatedly on Belmont Avenue were picking up police calls and dispersing before the officers arrived.

With the signal system, police messages placed at call boxes could not be picked up by anyone but the desk man at headquarters.

## Stiff Fine Set By Ordinance

Violators of parking violations in town who have their vehicles towed away, will face stiffer punishment because of an ordinance passed by the Town Commission at Monday night's meeting.

Previously violators had to pay towing expenses and in some cases a minor fine. Now the fine has a maximum ceiling of \$500, according to Mayor Ken Smith who introduced the ordinance to "put some teeth" into the existing law.

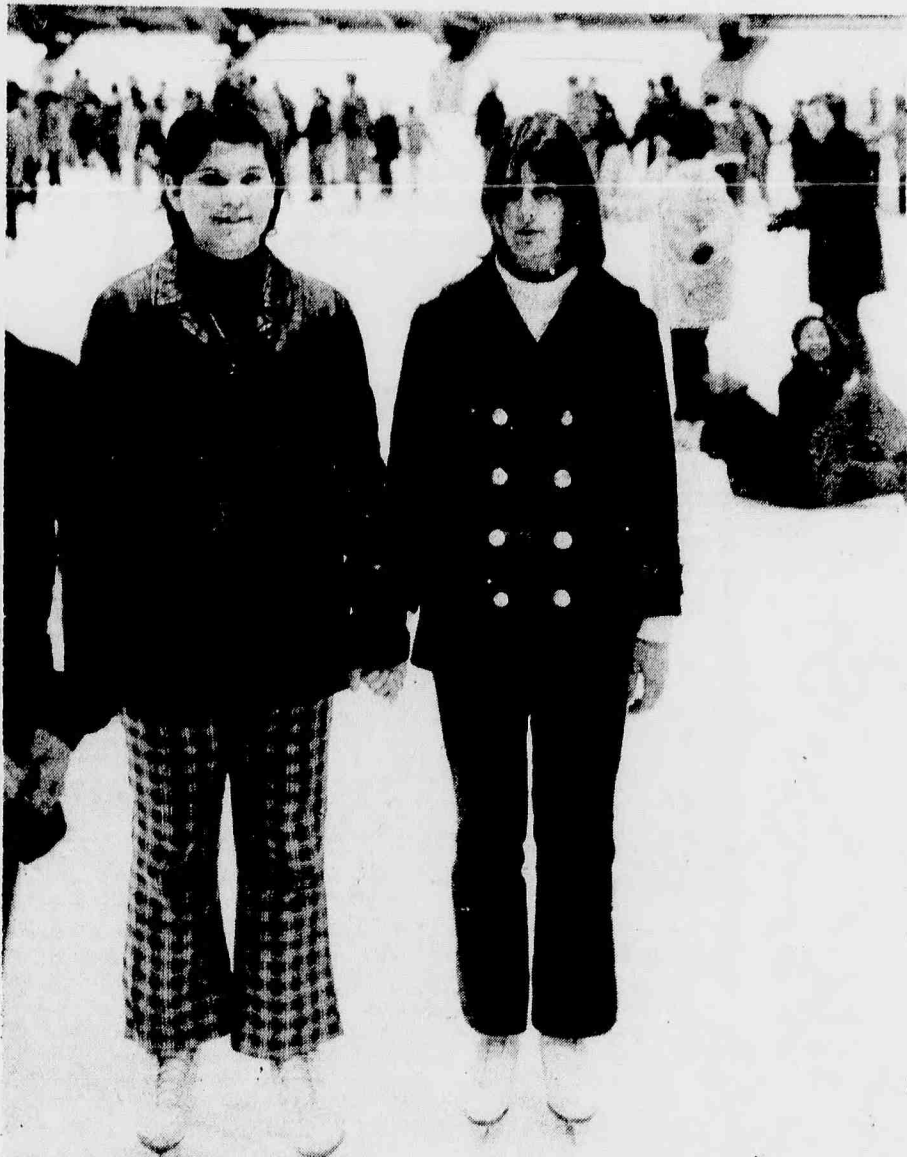

## Ice Skating Center Sets Course For Beginners

Are you afraid of getting on the ice to try learning how to skate with hundreds of other people whirling around you? Or maybe you are just too embarrassed to let others see you making your first try on those narrow blades. Whatever the reason, the Branch Brook Ice Center in Branch Brook Park, Newark, is introducing a new evening instruction program especially designed for adults.

Han Gerschwiler, former World Skating Champion, has been enlisted to instruct the new adult group skating course. He guarantees that regardless of how well or how bad a pupil might skate, the program will improve his ability and develop his potential. According to Gerschwiler, who has taught

and coached a number of United States Skating Champions, an important aspect of the new program is that classes will be arranged according to individual skill levels.

Enrollment for the classes, which will be held each Thursday evening at 8:30 is still open. Cost for the entire 10-week course, which begins February 5, is just \$22; this includes admission to public skating sessions following each class. Anyone over 16 years of age may apply.

The Ice Center, which is operated by the Essex County Park Commission, is anticipating a good turnout for the new evening program.

According to John Squartino, manager of the Center, this is the first time that such a course of

instruction has been possible at the Branch Brook facility. "The Ice Center was only recently enclosed," Squartino said, "and since we are now protected from bad weather conditions, we have been able to expand our season and our time-table from previous years."

Squartino indicated that the South Mountain Arena in West Orange has experienced tremendously successful adult programs over the years, and he advises those interested in the Branch Brook offering to apply immediately.

Schools, clubs and organizations of all types are being encouraged to apply. "Secretarial pools and even executives will find skating an exhilarating and healthful way of getting together after work," the manager said.

## Commissioners Delay Fulfillment Of Promise

The Town Commission came close to fulfilling its promise to build a retaining wall for Rutgers Court, Monday night, but decided to withdraw an ordinance appropriating funds for project until a complete estimate of costs could be obtained. A figure of \$10,000 was listed on the ordinance.

Former town engineer Ray Dalley had promised area residents that a retaining wall would be built to prevent mud from running down slopes into streets, according to Mayor Ken Smith. The Mayor said the foundations of certain houses on the street are in danger of cracking.

Smith said there was no particular reason why the erection of the wall had taken so long, just that officials "had been putting it off."

Also withdrew from the agenda Monday night Commission meeting was an ordinance to license dogs and to provide for the destruction of dogs running at large. The

bill was withdrawn for further study.

## What Do You Read?

Some centuries ago when the art of printing was developed, the way was opened to spread intelligence among the masses of mankind. Up to that time, when Gutenberg used his movable types, information and intelligence belonged to a very exclusive group of existing society.

It was presumed, in that far away day, that the production of books in numbers would make available to every man and woman the opportunity to learn and to know. It was presumed, of course, that men and women would be anxious to assimilate the accumulated knowledge of the ages.

A survey some years ago by the University of Michigan indicates, however, that nearly half of all Americans do not read books. This, despite the fact that more than half of our adults live within a mile of a public library. Presumably, many Americans are

satisfied with what they know and do not bestir themselves to find out anything new.

The making of books has become a mass-production enterprise in the United States. Unfortunately, many of them are not worth the time consumed in their reading. Others are extremely partisan, presenting prejudiced viewpoints and artful propaganda for theories that appeal to the author.

Nothing is to be gained by criticizing the author of popular volumes or the publishers who put them on sale. After all, the author wants to write a book that will sell and the publishers want the profit that comes from publishing a best seller. Nevertheless, libraries and publishers might render a public service if they created some agency to function in an advisory capacity and to serve the interest of readers rather than writers and publishers.

One Year Ago

It took an even dozen meetings between the Belleville Education Association (BEA) representing the town's teachers and the Board of Education's negotiation team, but an agreement was finally reached on the teacher's salaries for the 1969-70 school term. The starting pay for teachers was put at \$7,000. Whether the new salary guide would take effect or not depended upon the reaction of the voters in the February election.

"Belleville is at a crossroads," stated Mayor Kenneth Smith, "It either has to go down and backwards or up." The Mayor was discussing the pros and cons of granting a variance for the erection of a 37-family garden apartment at 138-146 Brighton Avenue. The variance was approved 3-2.

Robert F. Walsh of 65 Melwex Street, Belleville, was selected for listing in the 1968-69 edition of "Who's Who in American Universities and Colleges," a directory of the campus leaders from more than 1,000 of the nation's institutions of higher learning.

5 Years Ago

At the annual meeting of the DeWitt Savings and Loan Association Belleville John P. Dailey of 60 Reservoir Place was elected president.

The Town Council was informed that attorney Emil Wulster of Hackensack would not accept the post of special counsel to the Town. Counselman Robert Westpry made the surprise announcement to the council, charging that Wulster refused to accept the post because of an editorial printed in the Belleville Times.

Mayor Nuccio R. Pizo kicked off the annual Cookie Sale of the Girl Scouts when he purchased a box of each of the five varieties of cookies from Camille Di Costa who represented Belleville's over 700 girl scouts.

10 Years Ago

The controversial amendment to an old town ordinance to permit local bowling alleys to remain open around the clock found no opposition from the Belleville Board of Commissioners. However, a number of citizens did object.

New officers were elected by the Democratic Club of Belleville. Miss Adela Madis of 40 Charles Street succeeded Raymond R. Jordan as president. Jordan was the group's charter president and Miss Madis the first woman president of the club.

The fundamental issue in the Board of Education election race appeared to be the question "What is the relationship of the

superintendent of schools to the Board of Education?" Most of the candidates had made clear their stand on the issue.

15 Years Ago

An ordinance that would have permitted funeral homes in residential zones died in the making. The vote was 3-2 with Mayor Isadore Padula casting the deciding vote. Before the climatic vote, the crowd gathered at the meeting had heard 1½ hours of recital by lawyers for and against the measure.

The Town Commission showed their power by voting unanimously against an ordinance that would permit stores to operate on Sundays. The plea was originally voiced by Max Schwartz, an attorney for Emmanuel Vorius, a hardware store owner at 390 Washington Avenue, representing other hardware store owners.

25 Years Ago

Two bandits led Belleville Police on a two-mile chase over icy streets after they had staged a holdup with a blank filled gun at the Washington Liquor Store. 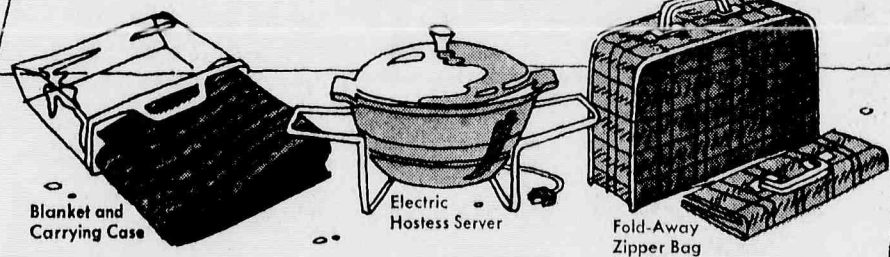

# Community Resources Directory

A new "Community Resources Directory" which lists over 600 public and private social agencies has just been published by the Council of Social Agencies of the United Community Fund of Essex and West Hudson.

It represents an updating and extension of previous directories which have been compiled by the Council and covers Essex and West Hudson agencies offering services in the fields of health, social welfare, informal education and recreation. It also includes new agencies in the civil rights and community action fields, consumer protection and narcotics addiction.

The directories are used extensively by public and private agency personnel, social workers, welfare workers and government employees who deal with the public. These people find the directory's listing of agencies invaluable in referring people to the social agencies which can provide the kind of help they need.

Kilduff, executive director of the Family Service Bureau. The new format of the book includes name, address, telephone number, contact personnel and description of agency services.

Fees, if any, are also shown. Agencies are listed by type of service and a new indexing system has also been used to make the directory fast and efficient to use.

# Slow Drivers Are Hazards On Highways

"Highway turtles" are growing into a major traffic hazard in New England's tourist areas, the Automobile Legal Association has warned.

The ALA said "highway turtles," drivers who creep along the highways at speeds far below the posted limits, are particularly hazardous on the narrow, winding, two lane roads in the mountains and in the heavily-traveled coastal regions.

"These slow-moving motorists not only impede the orderly flow of traffic but they are often guilty of contributing to an accident, even if they are not physically involved," the ALA said.

"By causing traffic to pile up behind them, they frustrate many motorists with the result that some motorists take unsafe chances in passing and then speeding to make up for lost time."

"And at night there's the danger that a motorist traveling at the posted speed limit may unexpectedly overtake one of these 'highway turtles' too quickly and could lose control of his car when he slams on his brakes," the ALA added.

The ALA urged all motorists to drive "at safe and reasonable speeds near the posted limits and to stay alert for those that don't."

"Remember, all turtles, even those on the highways, usually get to where they're going," the ALA said.

third period. Forfar, who had been averaging 17 points a game wound up with a mere four points to his credit.

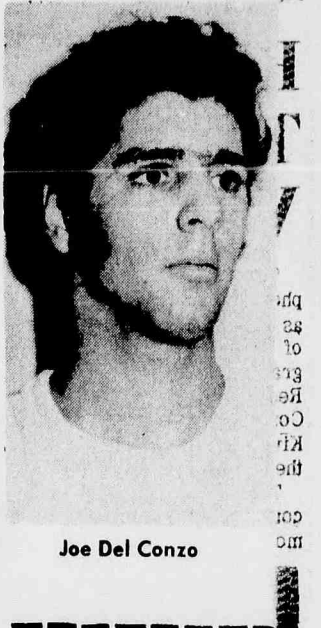
Belleville never trailed in the tilt, taking a 28-20

## Top Ranked Panthers Roll Over Belleville

The Panthers of East Orange, undefeated and top ranked in the state by the weekly Star-Ledger poll, handily defeated Belleville, 79-47, last Friday afternoon at the Belleville gym. The victory was East Orange's 13th of the season, and was anything but unlucky.

The mighty Panthers, last year's Group IV champion, feature no single outstanding performer, but a group of five excellent basketball players. Their key to success has been their fine team work and well balanced scoring attack. East Orange has all five starters averaging between nine and 15 points per game, and this balance has left opposing teams in a defensive bind, including Belleville.

Although Belleville was succeeding in keeping the score down, their offense was unable to penetrate the Panther zone. The score was 6-0 before Belleville attempted a shot, with 3:35

remaining. After Dennis Motley hit a free throw, Vin Costantino scored Belleville's first basket from the left corner, to make the score 7-2. The Panthers took advantage of Belleville mistakes and led 13-4 at the end of the quarter.

East Orange took command with a 10-point streak, early in the second quarter, for a 25-6 lead. Ron Schulz tried to lead the Bellboys back as he hit for six points in the quarter, four on long jump shots. The deficit was cut to 15, at 27-12, but Dennis Motley and Dennis Thomas regained control of the boards and the Panthers went to the locker room with a 33-16 advantage.

The outcome was still very much in doubt during the first few minutes of the second half. Belleville was able to dominate play for a few minutes and trailed by only 15, 39-24, with 3:30 left in the third period. However, the momentum suddenly shifted back to the Panthers who scored the next 11 points, taking a 50-24 lead.

Dennis Motley of East Orange took game scoring honors with 21 points. His teammate, Dennis Thomas followed with a 16 point performance. Vin Costantino scored 14 for the Bellboys to lead their attack. Joe D'Alcaonzo also scored in double figures with 10.

Barring a major letdown or injury, East Orange seems destined to repeat as Group IV champ, and cop the Big Ten for the second straight year.

Mike scored a takedown over Clarence Terry in the first 25 seconds of his match and pinned Terry 40 seconds later. Mike is now 1-1 after losing in the season opener to Bloomfield.

Belleville's second buzzer pin came as Vito Marcogliese at 130 pounds wrestled Ralph Austin. Vito tallied his fourth win in five bouts as he took Austin down and rode him until the end of the period when Vito moved Austin into a pinning combination.

Senior Jessie Towns scored the fastest pin against Vailsburg in the 136 lb class.

Towns' fourth pin in a row this season, came in the first 55 second of his match against Bob Quackenbush.

The sixth team pin came in the 141 pound match. John Salvato of Belleville took Jim Netis down and had him pinned in one minute and 35 seconds. Salvato is now 2-1-1 for the season.

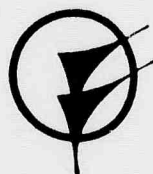

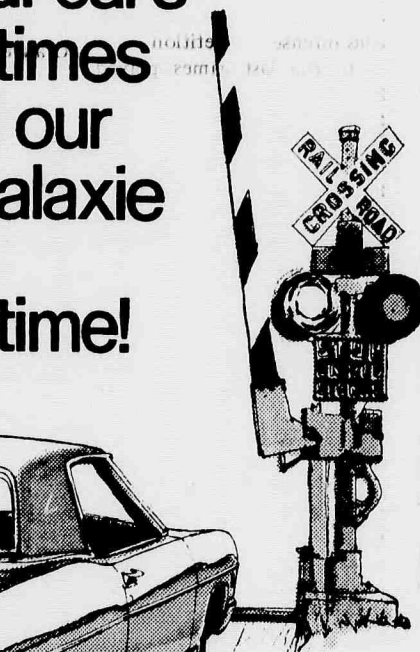

## Montclair State Gridders Establish Season Marks

Montclair State College's fine comeback performance on the gridiron this fall has resulted in a wholesale rewriting of the all-time Indian's recordbook with five new marks recorded and two standards tied.

Coach Clary Anderson's eleven, posting a brilliant 8-2 record and winning the last five games in a row, set three new individual marks and tied a fourth. Roland Kascher, a junior from Westwood set four new records and tied a fourth.

The former Westwood High School standard established a new single season record for most pass receptions with 32 and most yards on passes in one season set by Lynn Francis in 1963.

The new Kascher records erased standards of 24 for passes caught and 289 yards for yardage gained both set by Bob Cannon.

Kascher also tied the record for the most touchdown passes caught in a single season set by Lynn Francis in 1963. The record is five.

Quarterback Bill Kulikowski set a new all-time mark for total offense with 1087 yards gained. The old standard was 1003 set by quarterback Bob Bentsen back in 1963.

For the 1969 season, Kulikowski led the Indians in four departments — passing, kickoff returns, total offense and punt returns. The former Irvington High School senior

completed 55 of 131 attempts for 669 yards and eight touchdowns while he averaged 14.1 yards per punt return with 12 for 169 yards.

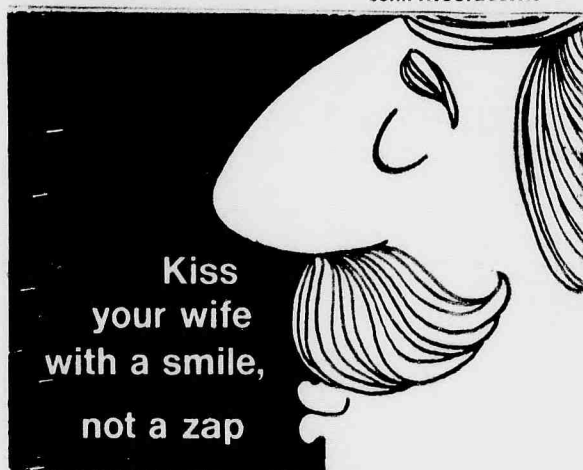

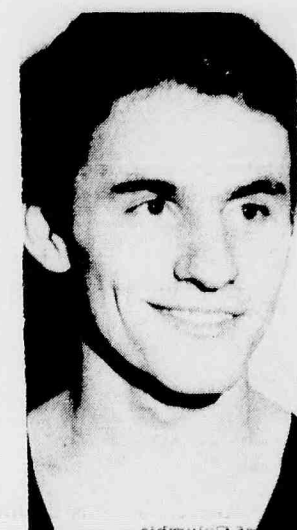

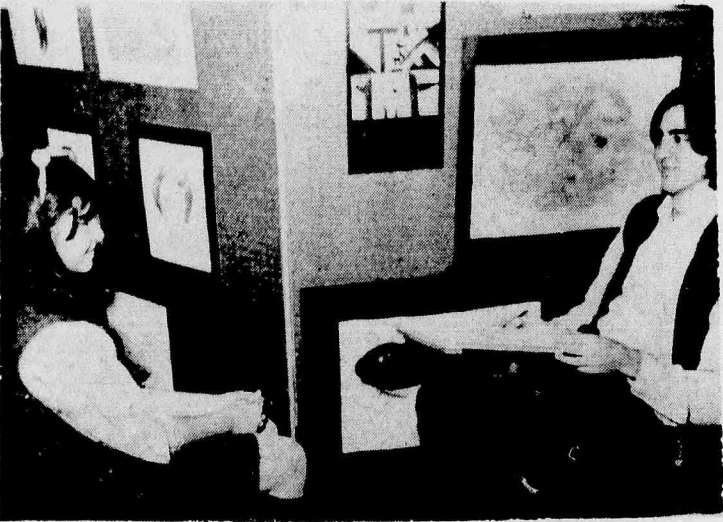
