## Cherry Blossom Parade This Sunday

Belleville's ninth annual Cherry Blossom Parade will march down Washington Avenue this Sunday at 3 p.m.

Featuring Congressman Peter Rodino Jr. as Grand Marshall, and Miss New Jersey, Cheryl Carter, the Jaycee run pageant will begin on Greylock Parkway, proceed down Washington Avenue past a reviewing stand at Town Hall, and end at Williams Street.

and Francine Parisi, second runner-up

In addition, two past Miss Belleville beauties have promised to join the parade, Carole Cornish (1968) and Judy Bondkowski (1967).

Adding to the accent of queens, Vyninski has promised that Miss Montclair State and the Essex County Junior Miss will also be in the annual pageant, which marks the coming of Cherry Blossoms into bloom.

Of local groups, only the Kiwanis at press time indicated they would provide a float. Vyninski had contacted all local organizations the past few weeks.

## **Belleville Car Dealers** Refuse To Pay Fees In Ordinance Protest

Apparently most new car dealers in Belleville are refusing to pay their 1970 operation licenses out of dissatisfaction for the existing licensing ordinance, but no one, including town officials and dealers wants to talk about it.

Both dealers and licensing officials have refused to either confirm or deny reports that fees due this past January have not been paid. Adding to the mysterious situation is that, what little information has leaked out from both sides appears to be contradictory.

Reliable sources told the Times last Friday that new car dealers are dissatisfied with the existing ordinance and specifically are objecting to having to pay separate fees for new and used car operations.



## An Essex GOP Fight?

Rumblings of a Republican family fight at the June Primary Election are being heard all over the county. Contested Primary Elections need not be fatal to any party or any candidate. Governor Cahill won his office in a General Election after a bitterly fought Primary Election. U.S. Senator Clifford P. Case is sitting in the U.S. Senate today after a few Primary fights of his own.

Throughout the length and breadth of New Jersey hundreds of public officials have won elections in November after surviving bruising

This is not to suggest that Essex County Republicans need a Primary contest this year. In fact, we are strongly for a compromise.

The present Essex County Republican Chairman is William F. Yeomans, who shares leadership of elected public officials with Joseph A. Intile, Jr., of West Orange. Intile's supporters include Freeholder Director Raymond Stabile, Freeholder Deputy Director Joseph Napolitano, County Supervisor Walter Blasi, County Registrar Hymen Mintz, and Surrogate Anthony Grosso.

There is a charge that Intile worked out a deal with the Democratic leadership to install Stabile and Napolitano in their respective offices for the votes of three Democratic Freeholders. There is no doubt that such an accommodation has taken place because the results speak for themselves.

Yeomans insists that Intile first repudiate his coalition with the Democratic minority on the Freeholder Board before he, Yeomans, agrees to sit with Intile and work on the details of a compromise.

We believe if Intile and Yeomans are unable to bring peace to the party that Republican elected and appointed officials make their own effort to bring unity to the party.

The Republican party, and its leaders can ill afford to exclude anyone from its membership. In order to win in November GOP candidates will need every Republican vote and then some - and the only way this result can be insured is by party unity in this critical election year.

#### As a resident of the Bellwood Park Section and a member of the Executive Board of School No. 10 Parent Teacher's Association, I would like to comment on the recent action of the Belleville Zoning Board of Adjustment in which they approved a variance for the construction of a 21-family apartment building on Belleville Avenue between Fairway Avenue and Carpenter Street.

The people in this neighborhood (which has been designated an "A" zone by the Belleville Planning Board) are unequivocally opposed to this construction. Their whole-hearted opposition was elequently witnessed by the large number of objectors (approximately 100) who consistently attended the five hearings on the subject application. Only one person residing in this neighborhood - other than a few who were directly related or business partner of the applicant - expressed approval of the proposed building, and he is himself the owner of other multiple - family dwellings.

During the hearings, Rocco Saletta, chairman of the Board of Education, testified to the opposition of the Board because this building will increase the enrollment of School No. 10, which is already seriously overcrowded. A PTA representative stated the unamimous opposition of that group because 91 small children will have to cross the wide driveway of the proposed building four times each day, and the 25 cars entering and exiting therefrom will endanger the safety of these children since the five-foot high garbarge dumpsters to be erected in front of the barracks-like building will conceal the children and obstruct the view of the drivers. Another highly qualified witness attested to the traffic hazards on Belleville Avenue which would be increased by the proposed multiple-family dwelling. Last, but not least, a tax appraiser who qualified as an expert witness testified that the value of the homes in the Bellwood Park Section will depreciate considerably, those on Carpenter Street by from \$3,000 to \$5,000 each.

The residents on Carpenter Street have Isrge wooded back yards which they now enjoy for picnics, swimming, and other family outings. If this building is constructed, these yards will face a 30-foot high brick wall embellished by 42 windows, noisy exhaust fans, air conditioners, and according to the architect "aesthetic" fire escapes. The privacy, sunlight, and quiet nature of their back years will be destroyed. Although my neighbors would probably not

classify themselves as intellectuals, I believe we are all reasonably intelligent, yet we were expected to swallow some incredible allegations made by a real estate agent and "quasi" traffic expert hired by the applicants: (1) the property in question could not reasonably be used for other purpose; (2) no children will live in the proposed apartments; (3) there is no drainage problem on Belleville Avenue; (4) there is ample parking available on side streets; (5) no odors will emanate from the garbage dumpsters. (6) only "prudent" drivers will live in these apartments, hence, no danger to the children;



the past and it is a most beautiful thing to see. I think it is a very good thing for the town. It promotes good relations and give the residents something to be proud of.


It brings people together for a peaceful gathering. The cherry blossoms in Branch Brook Park are widely known and as a result the town gets a good



when the fortune telling line is smaller and maybe friendlier. Don't mess with a woman who reads Jeanne Dixon and watches "Dark Shadows.'





HAT TRICK — Bellboy soph catcher Gary Falkman loses hat as he is tagged out at the plate during Bellboy victory over East Orange, 11-7.





SLIDES SAFETY — Senior Joe Ritacco slides safely into third base against Kearny last Saturday. Joe went on to score in another close call at the plate.






GOT ONE — Senior Bellboy Frank Fury is forced at second base in 4-2 loss to Nutley. Game was marked by power hitting
