## Polls Will Test Budget, Ten Candidates

### R. Saletta Urges Budget Passage For Town's Sake

Voters were urged this week by outgoing Board of Education President Rocco Saletta to pass the school body's 1971-72 budget, a \$4,863,441 tax package, representing an increase of \$256,076 over what residents paid last year. Polls are open at all schools from 2 to 9 p.m.

At press time teachers were scheduled to meet Saturday morning with the Board and a mediator from the state Public Employee Relations Commission over deadlocked salary talks. Both sides say meaningful dialogue has begun, and are hoping to resolve the issue before the

new Board takes office next week.

Saletta told the Times no additional money would be added to the budget when the salary impasse is settled, and said that funds would be shifted if necessary from other areas of the instruction account, such as new and expanded programs calling for additional teacher personnel. The Board president did say if any current expense surplus was present in June, it would be poured back into these areas.

The overall budget, which includes revenue from other sources, comes to

### Norma McCool: 'I'm Informed'

Nine-year incumbent Mrs. Norma McCool this week acknowledged her campaign has not been as vigorous as the three previous ones because of family difficulties, but said she hoped her "nine years of service to education would make up the difference" at the polls.

"I have never been in a campaign before where I wasn't totally active and where I hadn't exhausted all avenues of approach," Mrs. McCool told the Times-News. "It will be interesting," she continued, "to see if my nine years of effort is able to make up the difference."

In response to off-the-record questions on her record, attendance records, said that "irregardless of my personal

problems, I am as up to date as any Board member, as informed as any Board member, and as aware and able to discuss any educational problems facing our system as any Board member."

The longest standing member of the School Board added "I have attended all major meetings of the Board and have been in close contact with members at all times concerning issues facing our school system."

There had been rumors that close friends of Mrs. McCool have urged her not to run because of the illness of

early as five weeks ago the Board member said she felt "an obligation to repay in

### Bartell Hoping To Lower Costs

William E. Bartell, in his final press release, continued to address himself to what he considers the major educational issues facing Belleville, and pledged his major concern as a Board member would be to check "rising costs" and to provide at the same time "for quality education."

In his release, Bartell summed up his positions on what he considers the central problems facing this school system: rising enrollment; increased costs; politics on the school body, and drug problems facing youth.

The resident of 79 Liberty Avenue said in his release:

"I am an independent candidate for the Board of

Education. My platform is based on honesty and representation of the Town's Citizens. My major concern is for rising cost and quality education. Politics often results in illogical decisions that can only benefit insiders or a select group of people.

"I violently oppose the formation of a balance of power on the Board of Education that will inhibit the contributions of its independent members. Being a life long resident of Belleville I realize that the majority of people have fixed or stable incomes and cannot afford construction cost in our budget.

"It is with this in mind

### DeJura Seeks Bilingual Classes

Carl M. DeJura, a Newark teacher and candidate for the local Board of Education, proposed this week the establishment of bilingual classes for non-English speaking students.

"We have in our school system a number of Spanish and Italian children who are non-English speaking," DeJura told The Times-News. "These students are at a

disadvantage because they are in a regular class and are not receiving the full benefit of the teaching taking place," he continued.

"There is the possibility of setting up these classes as part of our Saturday morning remedial instruction program at School One. As a Board member I will be concerned with all of the needs of our

### John Monaghan: Against Building

John J. Monaghan this week said he was against any school construction unless "the need for additional classrooms is established after all available space in our present buildings is utilized."

In Monaghan's prepared release to the Times-News, he said:

"There has been much discussion relative to expanding the physical structure of our schools. Contrary to the preliminary

findings of the Rutgers Report, which is partial to additions to our Junior and Senior High Schools, in order to accommodate the anticipated growth of the student body, I feel every effort should be made to utilize all available space in our present schools. During the past two weeks I have made inspections in every school building. My inspections revealed that at

### Romano Says His NO Vote Was Symbolic

Caesar Romano, the only member of the Belleville School Board to vote NO in balloting for the 1971-72 budget, this week clarified his position.

"I voted NO to bring back the budget in order to avoid 'a step backwards for the children,'" Romano said.

Romano said his primary objection to the budget was "to the ratio system controlling administrative salaries as outlined in our budget." He also complained it "unjustly places all principals at the same level of income."

Romano said he considered the budget a "sound bill," however, and added "that we've got some darned good administrators and my objection is not leveled at them."

The lone dissenter on the seven man Board did indicate however, he was disappointed in what he termed the "status quo" aspect of the budget.

"It's a sound budget," Romano told the Times-News, "but only to the extent it allows for the status quo." "There are no

innovations here and I see no promise for the future," Romano added.

Asked why he felt the budget allegedly lacked innovations, he replied "no change over time."

"This budget is being used as a stepping stone," Romano

### Lively Campaign Presents Voters Difficult Choice

All the handshaking, the smiles and the countless campaign promises of the past six weeks will be put to the test Tuesday when Belleville's unpredictable electorate chooses three Board of Education members from a large field of ten hopefuls.

Voters have been courted by eight men and two women in a campaign surprisingly issue-oriented and relatively free of public mud-slinging.

Political observers, normally confident and quick to assess the election scene,

have been cautious in predicting the outcome of this lively race.

This is not to say, however, that predictions aren't being made. Depending on which candidate's camp you frequent, each political hopeful seems to be "running strong," so that in the end, the objective observer - if there is any - has thrown up his hands in despair and is awaiting the outcome of Tuesday's polling.

Voters will choose from a field which includes the

### Schwartz Hits Drugs, Bussing

Lawrence S. Schwartz wrapped up his campaign this week with a discussion of external problems facing the Belleville School System. In particular, Schwartz pledged to continue the Board's interest in drug problems and said he was opposed to any form of busing.

Schwartz, a local attorney named last June to fill the unexpired term of the late Dr. Frank DiRuggiero, also declined to take a firm stand on the enrollment crisis, but said "my mind will remain open to all possible solutions."

"The Belleville School System like any other

### Peter Paglia: Attacks Surplus

Peter Paglia, candidate for the Belleville Board of Education questioned the Board last Thursday on its use of the balance of the taxpayers money borrowed as a result of an under-estimate made by engineers two years ago.

"At that time the Board sold a \$225,000 bonding referendum to the voters as a mandated item from the state for a fire detection system," Paglia said, "I congratulate the Board on getting the job done for (only) \$95,000 and

request that the balance be used to pay off the bonded indebtedness of the Board."

Paglia said he disagreed with the Board "that they can use the balance for repaving playgrounds and for furniture and equipment." Paglia said "approval of the voters two years ago was for \$225,000 to be used for capital outlay, and that legally the Board can not use the balance for current expenses."

Paglia said further the

## Births Are Up

# Belleville's Death Rate Stable; Marriages Fall

The only stable vital statistic for the Town of Belleville in 1970 was the death rate.

According to official figures released last week by town Registrar of Statistics Ralph M. Risoli, births showed a marked increase over 1969, while less people were willing to take the sacred marriage vows.

The death rate however, based on figures from Clara Maass Memorial Hospital, was 780 persons, one less than the

previous year. Of those 780 deaths, roughly 132, or 20 per cent, were Belleville residents.

The birth rate, also based on statistics at Clara Maass, shot up to 2,220 babies, compared to 2,008 the previous year. Risoli said the increase was probably due to expanded facilities at the hospital.

The registrar also said his department issued only 343 marriage licenses this year, while 370 couples were willing to enter matrimony

the previous year. Of the 343 licenses issued this year, 255 of the couples were married in Belleville. In 1969, 257 of the newlyweds joined hands in town.

Risoli dug into his record files to show that despite the decline this past year in marriages, the 343 licenses is above average for the decade. His figures show that from 1960-66, an average of 300 marriage licenses were issued. In 1967, the number unexplainedly dipped to 278. Couples returned to the altar in record numbers the following year—346 to be exact.

## Play Review

### 'Girl In My Soup' Called Very Funny Winter Show

There was only one thing wrong with the Meadowbrook's opening night performance of "There's A Girl In My Soup," and that was the girls who were in my soup at the dinner table, rattling dishes and cups, and delivering orders from the bar almost continuously throughout the first act. A couple of Meadowbrook performances ago, Imogene Coca - then starring in "High Spirits," mentioned she was making a big thing out of refusing to appear on stage until all the waitresses and busboys were off the floor. Miss Coca had the right idea, and Van Johnson, the star of "Soup," wouldn't be wrong in following Imogene's lead.

Terence Frisby's "There's A Girl In My Soup" is a very topical and funny three-act comedy which is beautifully performed by the Meadowbrook cast. We've been a little reserved with handing out praises for some of the current crop of "situation comedies" now on Broadway - they're all suffering quite badly - but "Soup" is really funny. Actually, you'd be a lot better off these cold nights if you changed any plans gambling on a New York Show and visit the Meadowbrook instead. Van Johnson as Robert Danvers, Judi Stein as Marion and Andrew Hunter as Peter Pagan are just that great.

Van Johnson is a middle-aged gourmet-writer who stumbles across 19-year-old "Marion" at a hippie party. Marion (Judi Stein) who goes home to his posh London flat, is a calculating little lady who obviously knows the score - in fact, she was even a couple up on the free-swinging and amorous Robert Danvers. After some funny exchanges, Marion wins the first night's game and sleeps alone, as

he had wished. The next morning, she invites herself to move into Danvers flat "for a few days" and before too much time passes, Danvers has his little girl accompanying him to a wine-tasting convention in France.

The generation-gap conflict is played to the hilt. It all comes off very funny and Thursday's opening night audience never seemed to stop laughing - a fact that seemed to astonish (off-stage, of course) Peter Pagan, who plays "Andrew Hunter," Danvers' editor and best friend. Incidentally, he and Van Johnson have been together in "Soup" for a recent road show.

Judi Stein began her career in Chicago, studied at the Royal Academy in London and recently appeared in the United States with Molly Picon in "Dear Me The Sky Is Falling" and with Will Hutchins in "The Paisley Convertible."

Others in the cast included Lorraine Serabian who won acclaim from critics and audiences for her role of the Leader at the world premiere of "Zorba" in New Haven.

Mr. Pagan, we mentioned before, was born in Australia. In recent years he's spent most of his time in film-making. He starred in "The Overlanders."

"There's A Girl In My Soup" was one of the funniest plays we've seen in a long time. Van Johnson, Judi Stein and company will be warming up these cold wintry nights at the Meadowbrook through February 28.

#### One Year Ago

Harold Dufford, business administrator for the Belleville school system finally received official state certification of his position after waiting nearly five years. Word came to the Board of Education that state approval of the business administrator position was granted. Dufford had been acting in his post, waiting for state approval.

The Miss Belleville crown would no longer guarantee local girls a trip to the New Jersey State Pageant. Belleville's charter to send its queens to the big contest was rescinded as part of a state-wide move to eliminate town winners from the pageant. The local contest, however, was still to take place each spring, with the winner then entering the Miss Essex County Pageant.

At 12:25 in the afternoon of February 3, guidance counselor George Nucera paused a moment at the front door of Belleville High School, checked his watch, and then led the entire school staff out of the building in a walkout aimed at dramatizing teacher - Board of Education problems. Thirty-five minutes later, Jerry Kennelly, Belleville Education Association president, marched out of the Junior High School with a full staff of teachers to follow the same time schedule everyday until deadlocked salary negotiations were settled.

#### Five Years Ago

The Belleville Board of Education lost a bid to distribute the 67-page National Education Association's highly controversial report on Dr. Frank M. Durkee, ousted superintendent of schools, when State Commissioner of Education Frederick Raubinger issued a "cease and desist" request to both the Board and Dr. Durkee. According to Board Attorney Max Schwartz, Raubinger's declaration was not an order but a request. The State Commissioner placed an injunction and restraint upon Durkee, forbidding him to make statements to the press.

The Belleville-Nutley Master Plumbers' Association filed a formal complaint with the Town Council charging some 13 violations of the Belleville Plumbing Code against Bernard O'Connor, recently appointed part-time plumbing inspector. The complaint, signed by John Young, director, was forwarded to the Town Manager, Mayor Nuncio R. Pico, and members of the Town Council. Mr. Young complained that no action had been taken by the Council nor had the complaint even been acknowledged.

In a 90-minute meeting at School No. 8 before seven residents and two newspaper reporters, the Belleville Board of Education adopted a \$3,995,705 1966-67 school budget, placed a \$275,000 School No. 2 construction bonding issue on the February 8 referendum and explained that the increase was caused by the previous year's budget cuts by the Town Council.

#### Ten Years Ago

Board of Education president Mrs. Violet Rochau asked the school board to "stop all action on the new high school" until after the February 14 election. Mrs. Rochau and board vice-president Richard Drake were seeking re-election to the board. Mrs. Rochau's request, made at the height of the controversy over the school's architect, was denied.

School board member Dr. Frank DiRuggiero, who had walked out on a meeting that he said was "rigged," insisted on an investigation into the background of the architect hired to plan the proposed new

high school in Belleville. Dr. DiRuggiero said that he had information from reliable sources indicating that Alfonso Alvarez Jr., the architect, had encountered difficulties with school officials in several municipalities.

Not one objection to the proposed 1961 school budget was voiced at a public hearing in School No. 8 auditorium. The budget included increases of \$115,000 in salaries including about \$95,000 for a new teachers' guide. Several items, however, had been reduced, leaving approximately \$78,000 to be raised by local taxes.

Miss Patricia Orlando of 47 Union Avenue was crowned 1961 Snow Queen at the 15th annual Essex County Snowball Dance held in the Seton Hall University gymnasium. Crowning the local girl was the 1960 Queen, Miss Janet La Conte.

#### Twenty-Five Years Ago

Announcement of the 1946 quota of the local chapter of The American Red Cross was made when the drive scheduled to commence in March drew its sights on a goal of \$30,000. Simultaneously with the quota release came the appointment of W. Douglas Clark as General Chairman and Gilbert L. Wright as Industrial Chairman of the drive.

The Helen V. Davis Circle of Grace Baptist Church held a 25th anniversary meeting at the home of Mrs. W. D. Clark of Clearman Place when the founder was honored and seven "first year" members were among the group. They were Mrs. George Karrer, Mrs. Charles Thompson, Mrs. Edward Russell, Mrs. Kenneth Cole, Mrs. George Allen, Mrs. George Weirich and Mrs. Clark.

Candidate number two came forth with the news of trying to garner a commission post in the coming May election when Anthony A. Pascal announced he would enter the race. Pascal, a Bloomfield High School physical education instructor, stated in his opinion that the time had come for new blood to be injected into the commission.

#### Forty Years Ago

The Belleville Woman's Club held a reception welcoming the new members to the group. Mrs. Charles Smith, membership chairman, was in charge, and the new members were welcomed by the Club president, Mrs. R. Clifford Whitfield.

Miss Ruth Sokol, daughter of Mr. & Mrs. M. Sokol of Washington Avenue, was voted the prettiest among the honor graduates from the New Jersey State Normal School.

#### Fifty Years Ago

More than 100 citizens petitioned the Town Commissioners to discontinue legal advertisements in Newark papers and do their advertising in the Belleville Times. According to the editor of the paper, who was president and general manager, S. H. Blades, personal reasons were the only reason for the commissioners to cease using The Times, over the protests of Mayor John Waters.

The Belleville Knights of Columbus celebrated their seventh anniversary with a banquet at Saint Peter's Hall. With more than 150 guests in attendance, James T. Boylan, first grand knight of the council, acted as toastmaster.

## How Does London Do It?

The largest city in the western world, London, is also setting the pace for the western world in other ways. And because it is a well-run city, with relatively little violence and surprisingly good manners exhibited by most citizens, tourists are flocking there.

The American influx jumped 35 per cent between 1968 and 1969. The increase is continuing. Guests find the parks clean, inhabitants human and usually polite, and prices tolerable. In short, London as a big metropolis works.

All of which is a stark contrast to the situation in many U.S. cities, including New York City, the nation's largest. The obvious lesson in studying conditions in London and crime-infested, corruptly-governed U.S. cities is that residents in London and the U.S. cities have a different idea of citizenship; mandatory courses in citizenship in the schools might be one step in the right direction.

## Coffee Slips

The Pan-American Coffee Bureau has revealed that only 32 percent of those from fifteen to nineteen drink coffee. As recently as 1950 the percentage was 54 percent. Obviously, the young are not taking to coffee these days. In fact, the bureau says high school and college students have reduced their intake of coffee by sixty percent in the last twenty years.

Why the decline? Some feel young people today are on a far-out kick, seeking to do nothing their parents do. Others feel good coffee is seldom found these days; thus youngsters really don't know how coffee should taste.

Coffee is a stimulant, of course, and it might be better if youngsters never develop the habit - since so many drink too much coffee. So the present trend might be a good one. But for those who want to drink it, the bureau says the way to make the best coffee is to use a drip corree maker. On two level tablespoons of freshly-ground or vacuum packed coffee, in a paper filter (cone shaped), should be poured six ounces of boiled water. It should be allowed from four to six minutes to drip through - no more or less. That is the perfect cup of coffee - the bureau says.

## Departure From Flight 897 Proves To Be Interesting

THE SUE BACON MURDER was solved by the Sheriff's Office of Fort Lauderdale's Broward County. The attractive 31 year old strawberry blonde was killed by three motorcycle gang members in what Sheriff Edward Stack called a "brutal, senseless slaying". In custody are three young hoodlums, ages 21, 24 and 26, Miss Bacon was beaten and kicked in the head allegedly by a 24 year old youth and then shot in the right shoulder by a shotgun and through the heart by a hand gun. Sheriff Stack said he believed the victim knew she was going to be murdered. This tragedy, so close to home, reminds us of the murder scenes which authorities have charged to the Manson family in California. Authorities implied that one hoodlum has turned state's evidence. The youths were members of South Florida's notorious Outlaws motorcycle gang, two holding additional memberships in Ohio's Legions of Hell motorcycle gang.

GOVERNOR BILL CAHILL presented his first annual message to the Legislature in which he called for modernization of our court system and a fundamental reorganization of the State Institutions and Agencies Department to make it more responsive and more action-oriented. Governor Cahill wants to see speedy justice. The case backlog in the New Jersey Courts

annoys him to no end. Cahill's proposal does not require new taxes for 1971, and for this we can be grateful to the Governor.

His speech was replete with references and demands that State spending be curbed to avoid additional tax burdens upon the citizens of New Jersey. In this regard Cahill said, "the burdens placed upon the taxpayer and the home owners who are caught in the present inflationary spiral must be understood and respected. The fiscal plight of the individual taxpayer, the municipality, the county and the state must be fully considered and respected in our search for the expansion of new college facilities." High welfare and education costs and disappointing low yields from the state sales tax is making it difficult for the Governor to balance next year's budget. One of the most important sections of the Governor's message dealt with the review of his activity in combating organized crime in New Jersey. This of itself has already gained for Cahill a historical place in New Jersey history. Before Cahill took over, New Jersey was known and considered to be the capital of organized crime in the nation. Today organized crime members look upon Jersey as a leprosy colony, afraid to come near its borders or even on its highways. Joining Bill Cahill in his efforts to clean up organized

crime was crack crime buster, Fred Lacey and his able assistant Herbert Stern, the two top men at the U.S. Dept of Justice.

This week's Look Magazine contains a very interesting feature on what's "behind heart attacks". The thrust of the article written by Roland H. Berg urges doctors to give their coronary-prone patients a blood test for triglyceride in addition to a blood test for cholesterol. The article is the result of a 9-year-long investigation by government supported scientists at the National Institutes of Health in Bethesda, Maryland. The investigation team led by 46 year old Dr. Donald S. Fredrickson and 33 year old Dr. Robert I. Levy concludes that those people who are in the greatest danger of a heart attack are either eating the wrong foods or have faulty genes that cause too many fats to build up in their bloodstreams. A triglyceride test would disclose blood-fat abnormalities beyond the results of a cholesterol test. "By testing only for cholesterol" emphasizes Dr. Levy, "you may be missing as many as 50% of the patients who are in danger" - so now we have another word added to our vocabulary - apparently very meaningful when it comes to coronary problems - and that is triglyceride.

## Federal Income Taxation Filing Is Set To Be Eased

An estimated 175,000 New Jersey people will no longer be required to file income tax returns because of liberalized rules added to the law by the Tax Reform Act of 1969.

According to Roland H. Nash, Jr., IRS District Director for New Jersey, a single person is not required to file a return unless he had a 1970 income of \$1700 or more. Previously, such a person had to file if he had an income of \$600 or more. Single persons 65 or over do not have to file a return unless they had \$2300 or more income during 1970 instead of \$1200 as in the past.

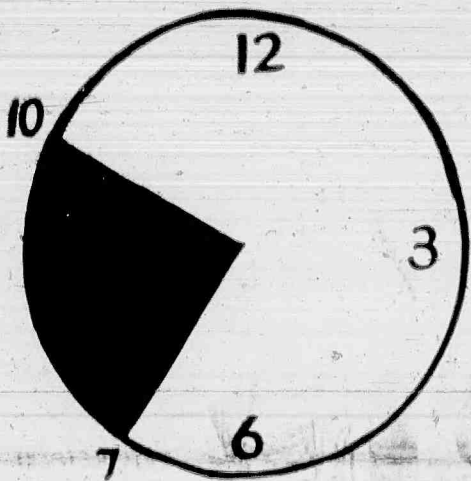

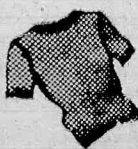

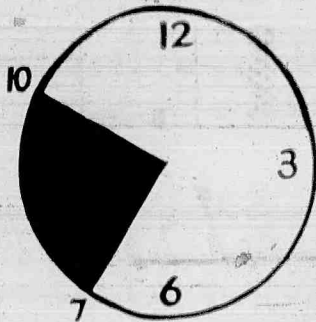

following candidates in the order of their appearance on the ballot: Mrs. Ruth Hess, 267 Linden Avenue; William E. Bartell, 79 Liberty Avenue; Peter Paglia, 70 Malone Avenue; Carl M. DeJura, 28 North Eighth Street; John J. Monaghan, 51 Linden Avenue; Mrs. Norma McCool, 194 Fairway Avenue; G. Fred Burlazzi, 18 Mt. Prospect Avenue; Lawrence Schwartz, 4 Fairview Place; Mathew Pica, 59 Mt. Prospect Avenue; and James Risoli, 7 Dawson Street.

Surprisingly enough, the candidates have avoided alliances - at least publicly, although the underground political network (usually referred to as the grapevine) has it that some hopefuls are

sharing support and that still others have flirted with each other, but found marriage an undesirable prospect.

Of the ten candidates, two are incumbents. Mrs. Norma McCool, who seeks her fourth consecutive term on the Board, is the dean of the present school body. Normally a vigorous and aggressive campaigner, Mrs. McCool has not been actively seeking support because of an illness in the family, and in her final address to voters this week, expressed hope her nine years on the Board "would make up the difference."

The other incumbent, Lawrence Schwartz, is actually making his first political venture, having been appointed to his post last

June, after the death of veteran Board member Dr. Frank DiRuggiero.

Almost every candidate has addressed himself to issues, the primary one apparently being the mounting enrollment crisis in the junior and senior high school.

In the absence of an official Board stand on the crisis, candidates have complained of being hampered in their campaigns, but have nevertheless expressed quite a bit about the crisis, and in many cases proposed plans to alleviate the situation.

Occupation-wise, voters will have the choice of two full-time teachers, a self-employed investment analyzer, a real estate appraiser, an attorney, two

housewives, a business management executive, a technician with Public Service and a retired Belleville cop with 42 years of experience on the force.

One thing is for sure, voters won't be allowed to rest until they've visited the polls to cast their ballots. Belleville politicians (and their rabid supporters and managers), are known for their aggressive election day hustling, and stories about people being dragged out of bed and from their dinner tables are not that exaggerated. Last year in fact, the Times-News has it from very reliable sources that one candidate's supporters hired limousines to insure voters of a safe, comfortable and hopefully predictable ride to the ballot booth.

that I oppose a building program which would place a fiscal burden on the home owners of Belleville. While researching possible alternatives to the building program, I discovered at least three educationally sound alternatives using our present facilities. One alternative would be to implement staggered sessions as now exist in our Junior High School.

"Another popular idea is to have split sessions, eliminating lunch periods and study hall and students would attend approximately four hours of class in a single block. Finally the newest innovation is the Chicago 45-15 plan. Under this system, our schools would remain open on a 12 month basis with four rotating cycles and periodic vacation breaks. "I would recommend that the new Board of Education seek consultation in Education Administration to discover the feasibility in the adoption of one of these plans.

"A recent survey by the Belleville Jaycees supports my contention that the Town of Belleville has a drug problem. I would recommend that the Board of Education secure the free services of the New Jersey Narcotics Officer

Enforcement Association which would make a comprehensive drug study to discover the scope of the problem.

"At the conclusion of this study we could use the following school personnel: Superintendent of Schools, School Psychologist, School Nurse and School Doctor and various School Principals to plan educationally sound solutions and adopt remedial measures.

"I think this problem could be drastically reduced in the future if we adopt positive activities to keep our youth off the town streets. I propose to open up the gyms. They can be used on a rotating basis until the support in each area can be ascertained. This idea is neither unrealistic nor costly and would aid in the developing of our variety athletic programs. It has also been brought to my attention that schools in Newark like South Side and Central provide sports activities for their girls.

"I say we could do the same, we could start by turning the area adjacent to the girls' gym into a field that could be used for soft ball or field hockey and many other activities. For the better skilled girls, an interscholastic schedule could be arranged

by the Athletic Director to compete with other suburban communities.

"The platform that I have proposed is sound, logical and will help to levitate many of our school and town problems. I believe that what is good for youth is good for Belleville and that the success

or failure of our children to a great extent are determined by the manner in which our Board of Education functions.

"It is with this thought that I hope the Citizens of Belleville will vote for the Candidates who will accomplish the most for our children.

# First National Hits Billion-Dollar Mark In Total Resources

First National State Bank of New Jersey, a wholly-owned subsidiary of First National State Bancorporation, yesterday announced that its total resources as of December 31, 1970, exceeded the one-billion dollar mark, reaching \$1,003,991,782. The bank thereby becomes the first individual commercial bank in New Jersey ever to achieve one billion dollars in total assets.

Invested resources, both

securities and loans, were \$820,027,729 at December 31, 1970, as compared to \$725,337,243 at the same point last year, an increase of 13.1 percent. The increase in loans accounted for most of the rise in invested resources, with loans going up by \$61,790,541, against a rise in securities of \$32,899,945.

The earnings of the bank will be reported on a consolidated basis in the report of First National State Bank corporation, the parent holding company. The holding

company in 1970 accomplished the affiliation of five banks, the largest of which is First National State Bank. The consolidated First National State Bancorporation figures, including those of The Edison Bank, First National State Bank of North Jersey and First National State Bank of Spring Lake and Warren County National Bank, will be released within a week.

### Hair Clippings Were Opportune

On January 5, Belleville's wrestlers obeyed the referee's orders to have their hair cut before the match against Passaic. Carmen Russomano then took a pair of shears to a few of the Bellboy wrestlers, and Coach Jim Silvestri took care of any others.

Some other teams had gone to extremes to protect their teammates right to wear their hair long. One team was taken out of a Tournament by their coach because the boys with long hair were his best performers.

Evidently, Belleville did the thing that the New Jersey State Interscholastic Athletic Association wanted to see. Bellboy Coach Jim Silvestri received a notice from the NJSIAA dated January 11 dealing with the same topic.

The letter read: "To all member schools. A number of teams have requested an official interpretation of Rule 3 Section 2 Article e of the NCAA Wrestling Guide. The following interpretation has been made by the official rules interpreter, Michael Schibanoff:

"Rule 3 Section 2 Article e:

"Contestants shall be clean shaven, free of mustaches, sideburns trimmed no lower than the earlobe level and hair trimmed and well groomed. Because of the body contact involved, this rule has been approved in the interest of health, sanitary, and safety measures."

"Hair trimmed and well groomed" shall be interpreted as hair that shall not cover the eyes in the front, ears on the side, and no longer than the collar of a normal dress shirt."

### Frosh O'Toole Played Varsity

## Belleville's Best Wrestlers Ever Out To Get Kearny For Coach Silvestri

### Team Mark Is 7-1

Coach Jim Silvestri's wrestling squad will travel to Kearny tomorrow looking for their sixth straight win after beating Clifton Tuesday afternoon on the Mustangs home mats, making their season record 7-1.

The win over Clifton assured the grapplers of the first winning record for wrestling in the history of Belleville High School. In wrestling's ten years there has never been a squad to break 500, and the seven wins insure at least this average as the team has a total of 13 meets a year.

Silvestri also had to settle for a 22-16 loss to his home town last year. The former Kearny graduate and grid teammate of Alex Webster, had made it evident last year that the meet meant a lot to him, but the squad still fell to a 22-16 loss.

Tuesday, Belleville continued its mastery on the mats, whipping Clifton 30-16, including pins by Angelo Zoppi, Brian Banda and Brian Waddell.

Four Bellboy wrestlers retained their unbeaten marks, led by team-captain Carmen Russomano with his 8-0 season mark. Russomano easily won his Clifton match, 16-2, but could not master the pin.

Also remaining unbeaten were Frank Marano (7-0), John Mustacchio (7-0), and Frank Savastano (7-0-1). Vito Marcogliese lost 6-2, to go 6-1 for the season.

Ed Dunkley was the other Bellboy to score win against Clifton, posting a 9-8 triumph with one minute riding time. Going down to the only Bellboy defeats were Fred Areal, Walt Bennett and John Atherton.

Atherton's loss was a bit ironic, in that the heavyweight who beat him was a former Belleville resident, Joe Schiavone, who moved to Clifton at 11. Schiavone is a tough wrestler, and owns a 7-0 mark, including pins against all his opponents, except Atherton, who fell 5-0.

In the Bloomfield Holiday tournament last December, Kearny placed sixth, while Belleville was third. In the tourney, four Bellboys squared off with Kearny wrestlers, and three of them won: Mustacchio, Marcogliese and Bob Campbell. At 168 pounds, Russomano was handed a shutout defeat by Bill Harrison who had signed up for 178 pounds, but came down a class just to wrestle Carmen.

## Cagers To Close Dismal Year With 3 Straight Home Tilts

Belleville's cagers will close out a dismal season with an 8 p.m. match-up with Bloomfield tomorrow, the first of three straight home games.

Tuesday, the West Orange Cowboys will come riding into town hoping to revenge a loss to the Bellboys earlier this year, Belleville's only win and the biggest upset of the Big Ten Conference thus far.

Then on Friday, arch-rival Nutley, owner of a one point last second victory over Belleville comes to the BHS gym to closeout the first season for new coach Bob Palma.

Last Tuesday Belleville slid to its fifteenth loss in 16

games, falling to Kearny 63-51 at the Cardinals home court.

Belleville started off on an even keel with Kearny, behind only 18-17 in the first quarter. In the early moments of the second period the Bellboys took the lead briefly, 21-20, but then Kearny ran off 14 straight points — 12 by Jim Gaffney — to pull away for good. The halftime score was 34-23.

The Bellboys did not play sloppy, but just were outshot and overpowered under the backboards. In one period, the Cardinals outrebounced the Bellboys 15-4, which means the Belleville squad was only getting one shot and

no second chances.

Shooting-wise, Belleville hit a respectable 44 per cent from the floor, with senior star Rocco Marotti leading the way with 15 points, on 6-15 from the floor. Rich Caravetta also hit double figures with ten, and junior Joe Lotruglio hit a season high with eight.

In beating Belleville, the Cardinals upped their big Ten mark to 4-11, and are 7-11 overall.

With the Bellboy cage season more or less a loss, Coach Palma has begun to experiment with junior varsity performers. On the graduation lists for the squad is star shooter, Marotti,

captain Caravetta, Ralph Macri and Steve Tremel.

Despite the loss of the core of his squad, coach Palma hopes to field better squads in the near future. The young coach from Newark State College has been working with town recreation superintendent Bob Cook and athletic director Herman Wische to stir up interest in the cage sport, including the institution of Saturday morning clinics and increased recreation league action.

Wische has been working with the School Board to get additional backboards and lights placed at various sights in the town, so that despite the dismal showing of the

Bellboys this season, the cage sport is far from dead at the once prestigious school.

Perhaps the only laurels open to this season's squad lie in the individual department — Rocco Marotti, who is in the top five for scoring in the Big Ten conference. A hot hand in his final three appearances could propel Marotti up in the standings.

## Mighty Grapplers Blast Barringer, Bloomfield

Five unbeaten wrestlers

continue to lead the Belleville wrestling squad at an unprecedented rate with a 6-1 record as the season reached its halfway point with victories over Barringer 44-7 and Bloomfield 32-12.

Carmen Russomano, at 168, heads the list of unbeaten grapplers as the only Bellboy to have won in all seven of the team's

matches this season.

During the first half of last

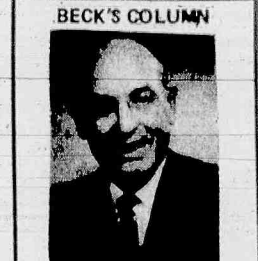
year, Marotti saw limited action, but he earned himself a starting role about halfway through the season. Over the remainder of the campaign, he averaged ten points and five rebounds a game.

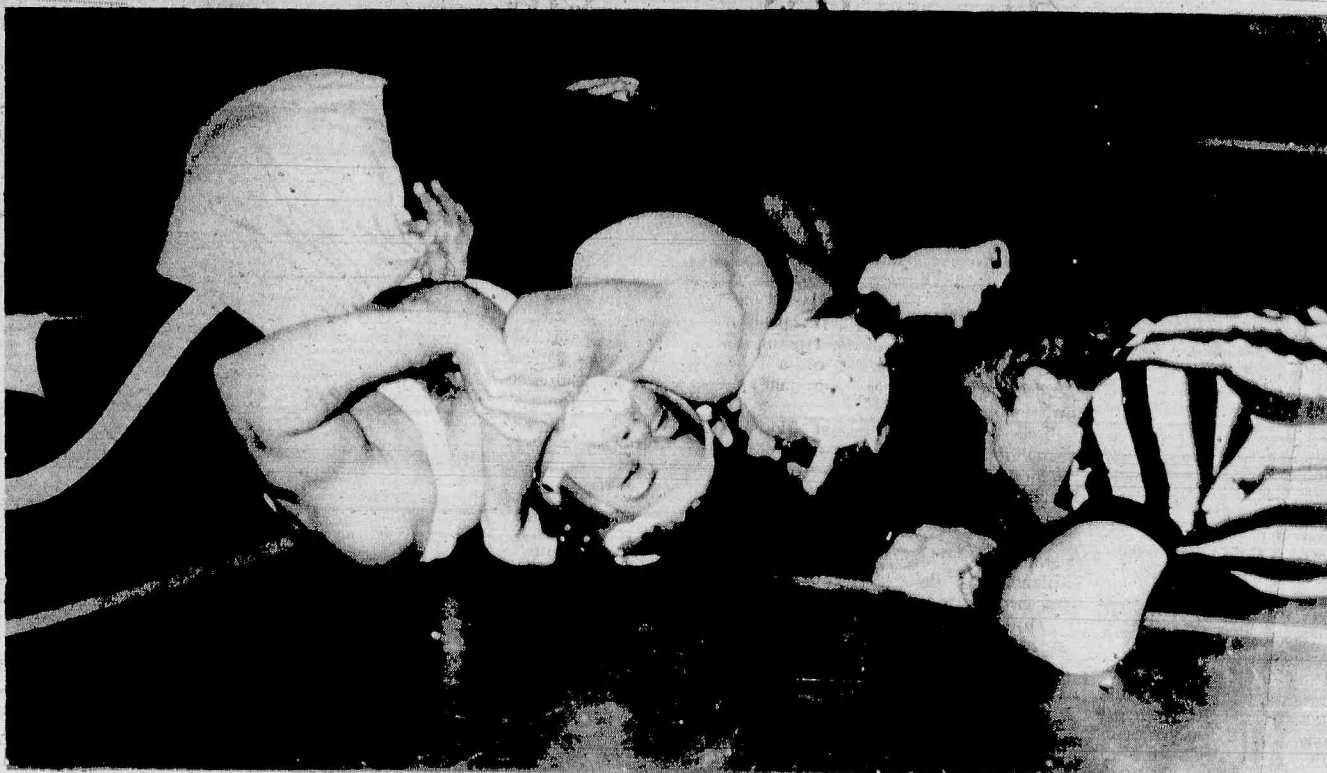

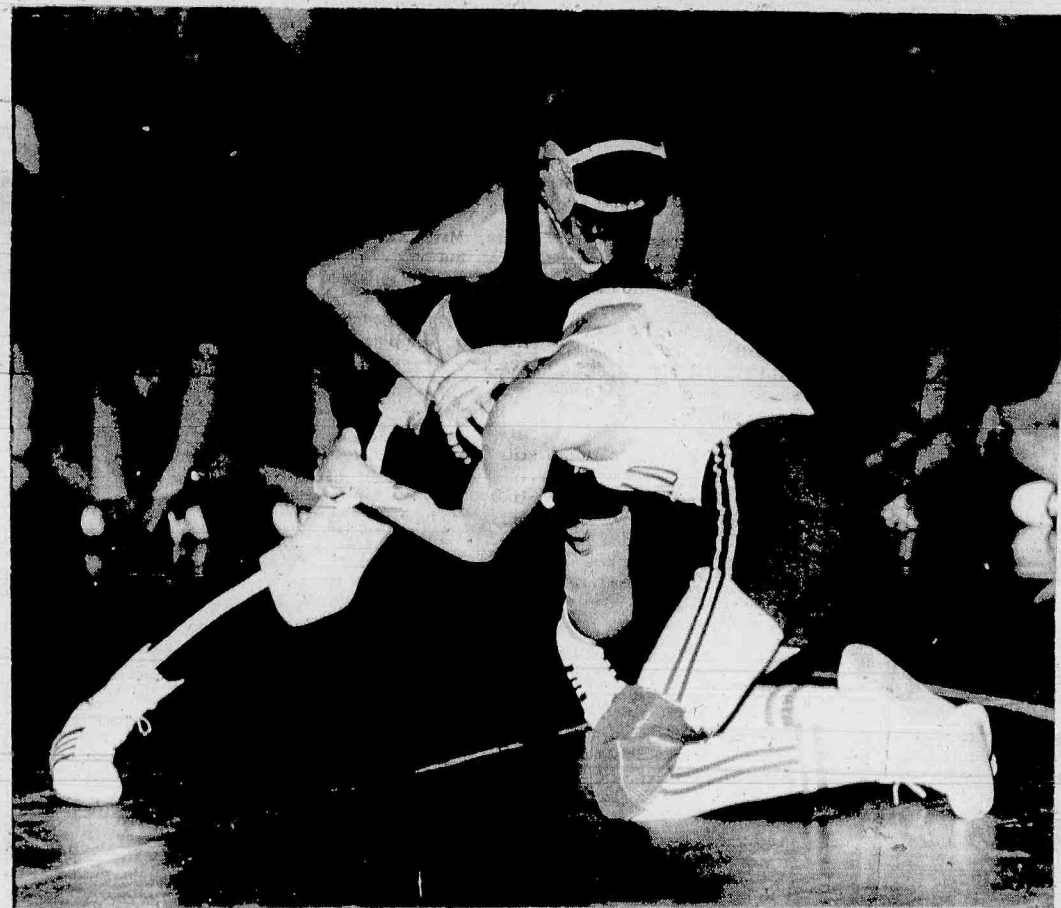

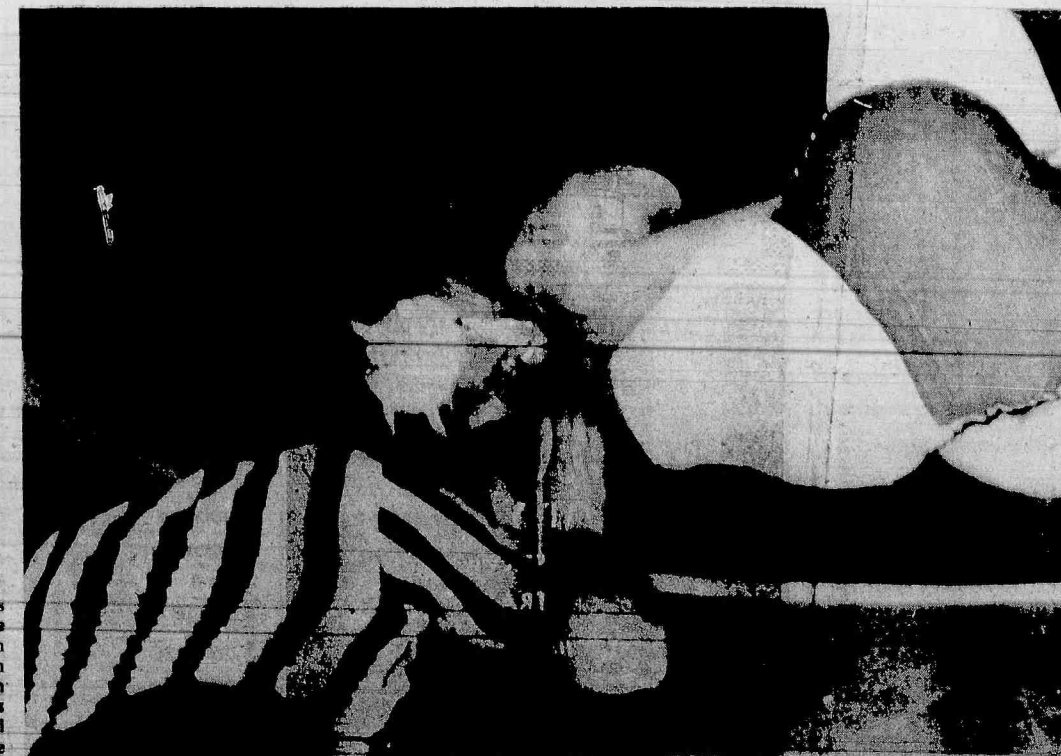
qualities while helping to better the communities in which we live."



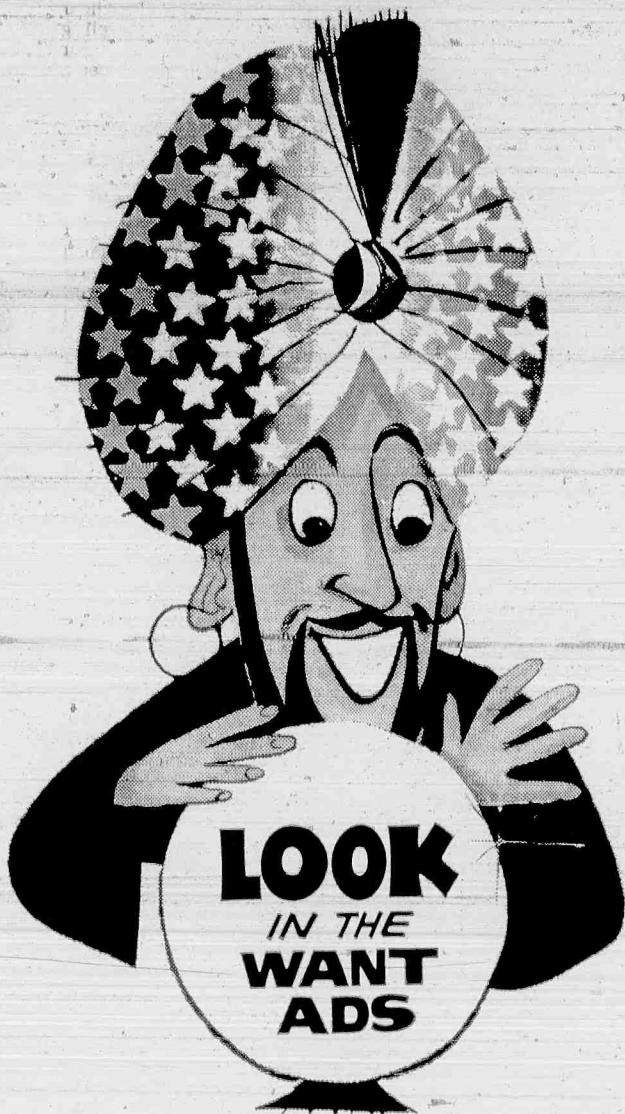

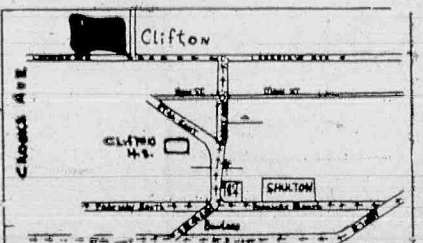
