

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
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A Need For Seat Belts

'Girl In My Soup' Called Very Funny Winter Show

There was only one thing wrong with the Meadowbrook's opening night performance of "There's A Girl In My Soup," and that was the girls who were in my soup at the dinner table, rattling dishes and cups, and delivering orders from the bar almost continuously throughout the first act. A couple of Meadowbrook performances ago, Imogene Coca - then starring in "High Spirits," mentioned she was making a big thing out of refusing to appear on stage until all the waitresses and busboys were off the floor. Miss Coca had the right idea; and Van Johnson, the star of "Soup," wouldn't be wrong in following Imogene's lead.

Terence Frisby's "There's A Girl In My Soup" is a very topical and funny three-act comedy which is beautifully performed by the Meadowbrook cast. We've been a little reserved with handing out praises for some of the current crop of "situation comedies" now on Broadway - they're all suffering quite badly but "Soup" is really funny. Actually, you'd be a lot better off these cold nights if you changed any plans gambling on a New York Show and visit the Meadowbrook instead. Van Johnson as Robert Danvers, Judi Stein as Marion and Andrew Hunter as Peter Pagan are just that great.

One Year Ago

the Belleville school system finally received official state certification of his position after waiting nearly five years. Word came to the Board of Education that state approval of the business administrator position was granted. Dufford had been acting in his post, waiting for state approval.

The Miss Belleville crown would no longer guarantee local girls a trip to the New Jersey State Pageant. Belleville's charter to send its queens to the big contest was rescinded as part of a state-wide move to eliminate townwinners from the pageant. The local contest, however, was still to take place each spring, with the winner then entering the Miss Essex County Pageant.

At 12:25 in the afternoon of February 3, guidance counsilor George Nucera paused a moment at the front door of Belleville High School, checked his watch, and then led the entire school staff out of the building in a walkout aimed at dramatizing teacher -Board of Education problems. Thirty-five minutes later, Jerry Kennelly, Belleville Education Association president, marched out of the Junior High School with a full stort behind him in a companion move The teachers were to follow the same time schedule everyday until deadlocked salary negotiations were settled.

Five Years Ago

The Belleville Board of Education lost a bid to distribute the 67-page National Education Association's highly controversial report on Dr. Frank M. Durkee, ousted superintendent of schools, when State Commissioner of Education Frederick Raubinger issued a "cease and desist" request to both the Board and Dr. Durkee. According to Board Attorney Max Schwartz, Raubinger's declaration was not an order but a request. The State Commissioner placed an injunction and restraint upon Durkee, forbidding him to make statements to the

The Belleville-Nutley Master Plumbers' Association filed a formal complaint with the Town Council charging some 13 violations of the Belleville Plumbing Code against Bernard O'Connor, recently appointed part-time plumbing inspector. The complaint, signed by John Young, director, was forwarded to the Town Manager, Mayor Nuncio R. Pico, and members of the Town Council. Mr. Young complained that no action had been taken by the Council nor had the complaint even been acknowledged In a 90-minute meeting at School No. 8

before seven residents and two newspaper reporters, the Belleville Board of Education adopted a \$3,995,705 1966-67 school budget, placed a \$275,000 School No. 2 construction bonding issue on the February referendum and explained that the increase was caused by the previous year's budget cuts by the Town Council.

Ten Years Ago

Board of Education president Mrs. Violet Rochau asked the school board to "rtop all action on the new high school" until after the February 14 election. Mrs. Rochau and board vice-president Richard Drake were seeking re-election to the board. Mrs. Rochau's request, made at the height of the controversy over the school's architect, was denied.

School board member Dr. Frank DiRuggiero, who had walked out on a meeting that he said was "rigged," insisted on an investigation into the background of the architect hired to plan the proposed new

The largest city in the western world, London, is also setting the pace for the western world in other ways. And because it is a well-run city, with relatively little violence and surprisingly good manners exhibited by most citizens, tourists are flocking there.

The American influx jumped 35 per cent between 1968 and 1969. The increase is continuing. Guests find the parks clean, inhabitants human and usually polite, and prices tolerable. In short, London as a big metropolis works.

All of which is a stark contrast to the situation in many U.S. cities, including New York City, the nation's largest. The obvious lesson in studying conditions in London and crime-infested, corruptly-governed U.S. cities is that residents in London and the U.S. cities have a different idea of citizenship; mandatory courses in citizenship in the schools might be one step in the right direction.

Coffee Slips

The Fun-American Coffee Bureau has revealed that only 32 percent of those from fifteen to nineteen drink coffee. As recently as 1950 the percentage was 54 percent. Obviously, the young are not taking to coffee these days. In fact, the bureau says high school and college students have reduced their intake of coffee by sixty percent in the last twenty years.

Why the decline? Some feel young people today are on a far-out kick, seeking to do nothing their parents do. Others feel good coffee is seldom found these days; thus youngsters really don't know how coffee should taste.

Coffee is a stimulant, of course, and it might be better if youngsters never develop the habit - since so many drink. too much coffee. So the present trend might be a good one. But for those who want to drink it, the bureau says the way to make the best coffee is to use a drip corree maker. On two level tablespoons of freshly ground or vacuum packed coffee, in a paper filter (cone shaped), should be poured six ounces of boiled water. It should be allowed from four to six minutes to drip through - no more or less. That is the perfect cup of coffee - the bureau says.

THE SUE BACON MURDER was solved by the Sheriff's Office of Fort Lauderdale's Broward County. The attractive 31 year old strawberry blonde was killed by three motorcycle gang members in what Sheriff Edward Stack called a "brutal, senseless slaying". In custody are three young hoodlums, ages 21, 24 and 26, Miss Bacon was beaten and kicked in the head allegedly by a 24 year old youth and then shot in the right shoulder by a shotgun and through the heart by a hand gun. Sheriff Stack said he believed the victim knew she was going to be murdered. This tragedy, so close to home, reminds as of the murder scenes which authorities have charged to the Manson family in California. Authorities implied that one hoodlum has turned state's evidence. The youths were members of South Florida's notorious Outlaws motorcycle gang, two holding additional memberships in Ohio's Legions of Hell motorcycle gang.

Berg urges doctors to give their coronary-prone patients a blood triglyceride in addition to a blood test for cholesterol. The article is the result of a, 9-year-long investigation by government supported scientists at the National Institutes of Health in Bethesda, Maryland. The investigation team led by 46 year old Dr. Donald S. Fredrickson and 33 year old Dr. Robert I. Levy concludes that those people who are in the greatest danger of a heart attack are either eating the wrong foods or have faulty genes that cause too many fats to build up in their bloodstreams. A triglyceride test would disclose blood-fat abnormalities beyond the results of a cholesterol test.
