Disposal Woes Loom

Pollution Problems Could Force Schools To Fork Out Big Cash

Belleville School Board methods of disposal and added pollution-free incinerators News Monday. have become wizards at operating with less money than they'd like to the nine years because of voter rejected budgets. Now it appears the Board will have to reach still deeper into its bag of tricks to deal with yet another financial problem looming on the horizon.

That horizon is a grey one, one which concerns polluted skies. The Suburban Air Pollution Commission is in-vestigating reports of air pollution stemming directly from local schools, and has promised the local Board of Education a report within two

weeks.
The Pollution Commission, which the Town of Belleville has recently joined, visited several local schools last week to investigate claims by a Rutgers educational research team that several schools in town are polluting the air.

That research team was hired to assess Belleville's school system last year with the eye toward solutions to overcrowding problems.

Part of an extensive report issued by the research team last month recommended garbage disposal practices in Belleville schools be altered or stopped because of pollution

abuse.
"The use of incinerators for burning waste at the elementary schools should be discontinued," that report said. "In several of the schools, trash is actually burned openly on the school site," the report continued.

Confirm of **Tuition** Hikes

The Belleville Board of Education confirmed reports Monday it is planning to make the local adult and schools self-supporting through tuition increases.

The Board's move, which also affects the previously free summer music program, is an attempt to offset financial problems resulting from cuts made by Commissioners in the voter-rejected budget and an unexpected settlement price

Back announced at Monday night's regularly scheduled meeting the Adult School will raise tuition charges to offset an estimated cost of \$2,000 to the Board for running the facility

Back says Adult School directors have not decided yet how large an increase is needed. Current charge per course is \$13.

Also scheduled for fee hikes is the Summer School, which will jump from \$30 per course to \$45. Fee for taking two course will increase from \$55 to \$80. It is hoped this will offset Board expenses of \$14,450 in salaries.

The previously free summer music program will also see a fee charge. Students will be charged ten dollars for the program which includes a hours of lessons a week. The cost for running the program is \$2,100.







Legislative Redistricting

The bipartisan legislative redistricting committee produced a redistricting map which places Belleville and Nutley in a new voting complex known as District 3 Verona, Glen Ridge and Montclair, Bloomfield make up the balance of the area. Assemblymen Ralph Caputo and Richard Fiore now represent Newark's North Ward, Belleville and Nutley. Both Fiore and Caputo were elected as residents of Newark's North Ward. Caputo has moved his Recently residence to Belleville.

We believe the new District 3 contains municipalities that have a common - far more than Nutley or Belleville could identify with anyone of Newark's Wards. Newark is divided into two election districts, the fourth and fifth. The North Ward is now combined with the West Ward and the remaining districts in Newark make up another assemblymen representing communities making up the new District 3 except for Nutley and Belleville

We think the redistricting panel performed an excellent job in the result it obtained. Essex now has five-assembly districts resulting from a 1970 census. This represents a loss of one district or two assemblymen and will also mean a decrease in the Essex County senate from six to five. State senate candidates will run at-large.

Court tests challenging the new district set-up are expected. They are expected to be resolved quickly and preserve a June Primary Election date.

Congressional Redistricting

Some time ago Governor William Cahill advised New Jersey's congressional delegation he would accept any congressional redistricting plan that enjoyed the unanimous approval of incumbent congressmen Democrat and Republican.

Cahill established a March 15 deadline for the receipt of such plan. March 15 expired and the congressmen were split 12-3 on a redistricting plan.

Now it remains for the Republican dominated legislature to produce a sensible, realistic and fair congressional redistricting map based upon the 1970 census.

Presently there are three different congressmen representing segments of Essex County. Union County Congresswoman Florence Dwyer has a congressional district which includes a handful of communities in the southwest corner of Essex County. Congressman Joe Minish of West Orange represents a district which takes a piece of Newark, the western communities of Essex, and north to Cedar Grove. Our own Peter W. Rodino, Jr. has a district which begins in

Newark and arcs arounds to Montclair. There is a strong effort being made to carve out Newark from the rest of Essex County and create one congressional district. It has been publicly stated by those who espouse this course of action

that a Newark-only district is required to provide negroes with the opportunity of electing a negro congressman,

The Supreme Court on more than one occasion has made it clear that congressional districts within a state must be equal in population and that deviations in population between in "afford" order · to representation to racial or economic or recognize historical or geographic considerations are improper. This is based on the premise that the equal protection clause requires that each citizen cast an equally weighted

The Republican dominated legislature has the opportunity to produce a congressional redistricting plan which is constitutional and treats fairly all ethnic

We do not believe any congressional district should be created simply to give ethnic representation, be it negro, Jew, Italian, Polish, Irish, Puerto Rican, etc.

We cling to the silly, old-fashioned notion that, like water, in America, any person has the opportunity to seek his own level.

Enrollment Is A Problem For Board Of Education

By Elaine Averbach One Year Ago

Anticipating an unprecedented number of new students in the school system for fall 1970, the Board of Education stepped up measures to meet the already problem of enrollment. Specifically, the board hired an architectural consultant to begin a thorough analysis of school expansion possibilities. The Board also requested that the Zoning Board notify the school body of all proposed new apartment construction in town, a move which was apparently motivated by the belief that new buildings

Commissioners Joseph McGreevy and Mary Senatore issued statements defending the Commission's 1970 budget actions, and called for increased citizen interest in tax problems on all levels of government. Labelling the 1970 budget a sound document, the two town officials proposed the formation of a tax committee to aid the town in formulating future budgets. Belleville's budget total was \$11,191,869.

Easter Sunday found many residents consulting their calendar and shaking their heads in disbelief, as a Christmas style snowfall had put a damper onto everyone's spring fancies. Five Years Ago

Mayor Nuncio R. Pico told councilmen that the parking problem in Belleville was "so complicated it is beyond the realm of the council" and introduced an ordinance calling for the establishment of a parking authority which would examine the acute shortage of parking lot facilities, make recom-mendations, and act on the matter. Councilmen voted 3-2 for the authority, with James R. Golden and William Cullen opposing the

Belleville animal lovers were out enmass to protest the awarding of a \$2,599 contract to the Humane Animal Shelter of New Jersey in Lodi - but since the shelter was the lowest of two bidders, it was approved by the Council. The management of the Lodi shelter had been the center of bitter controversy by Belleville residents who claimed that the establishment was in violation of many state law requirements. Town Attorney Jack Soriano said, however, that no evidence had been found of any violations.

I hope you can now see that what he has allowed us to do showed many, with evidence, that the young pople (and many of the future citizens of Belleville) can prove themselves and their maturity in handling responsibilities. 





Donor Lunch Caps Season For Hadassah

Close to 1200 women, including members of the Belleville-Nutley Chapter of Hadassah, are expected to cap a successful fund-raising season on behalf of several medical and educational projects in Israel with donor uncheons at The Goldman. West Orange.

To accommodate all those eligible to attend, the Northern New Jersey Region of Hadassah was scheduled the 44th annual event for two successive days, April 20 and April 21. Mrs. Jerome B. Hamburger is the chapter's donor chairman; Mrs. Frank Edelman and Mrs. Nathaniel Rubin are the chapter's presidium.

"Hadassah - the Dream, the Determination, the Deed" is this year's luncheon theme and Mrs. Hamburger pointed out some of the latest deeds as she called upon every member of her chapter to fulfill her obligations "to the multi faceted program of Hadassah which must keep us with the maintenance and expansion needs of a vast medical complex, Youth Aliyah child care institutions, and an up-dated school system which provides both academic and vocational

training."
In the field of medicine Mrs. Hamburger mentioned the development of a unique new pacemaker by a bio-engineering team in the Cardiac Physiology Laboratory at the Hadassah -Hebrew University Medical Center in Jerusalem. This pacemaker, governed by the heart-rate controlling mechanisms of athe body, automatically adjusts itself to a new situation and chooses the most desirable way of pacing.

Mrs. Hamburger also singled out Hadassah's Department of Ophthalmology for two new "deeds" this year. One is the opening of an ultra-sound clinic which uses a technique which is not only diagnostic, but also therapeutic. Ultra-sound waves make it. possible to locate very accurately a foreign body or a tumor in the eye and they

can also be used to move the offending body.

The other deed is the opening of a guidance clinic to help patients with personal problems arising from eye injuries or possible blindness. Questions that have a bearing on the social, psychological and economic aspects of a patient's life are dealt with by a doctor, a social welfare worker and the director of the Blind School.

Mustacchio Fourth In World Eliminations

Belleville's varsity 123 pound wrestler, Boff Mustacchio placed fourth this past weekend in the United States Wrestling Federation's Second Annual Junior World Tournament for the

Boff was one of the prime movers in trying to get as many Bellboy wrestlers as possible to enter the event at J.P. Stevens High School in Edison, N.J. In the end, Boff only got three to go, (eight signed up) and he placed highest of the three, himself, Walter Bennett, and Bill Natale.

The 123 pounder for Belleville entered the 123 pound weight class for the Jr. Worlds and captured his first two opponents with pins. In his third preliminary round, Boff found himself looking at the ceiling as he was pinned by Jim Stuart, the number three wrestler in the NISIAA State Finals and second place winner at the Ir World.

and second place winner at the Jr. Worlds.

Since the rules for this competition differ from NJSIAA rules followed by High Schools throughout the state, Boff was allowed to continue and retallated by pinning his fourth-round opponent. For the fifth round, Boff picked up a 14-2 decision over Mat Apella of Roselle Park. But this was the last win for Boff as he was decisioned by Pay Stuart of Piscataway, third place finisher in the Jr. Worlds.

The reason for Belleville's 11-1 grappler being allowed to continue is the fact that inthe Jr. Worlds, a wrestler remains in the preliminary eliminations until he has accumulated six

No "black" points are given if he wins by a pin, half a point given on a decision if the margin is more than ten match points and a full point if the margin is ten or less. (Therefore, it is possible for a wrestler to win six straight matches but be disqualified for the final "round robin" between the numbers one, two and three men, if each victory was by less than 10

This possibility is corrected by the three points given for a lost decision and the four to a pin loser, making the wrestlers classified as best as possible according to their offensive and

Even the match rules and match points are changed under the Olympic Freestyle Rules. A pin is not both shoulder blades held to the mats for two seconds, but both shoulders on the mat for an instant with both of the two referees agreeing in

For the match points, only one point is awarded for a takedown, none for an escape, one for a reverse, three for a near fall, and one for an added call, an "exposure." The exposure is when the defensive wrestler has his back facing the mats, but is not on his shoulder. (If one shoulder were on the mat and the other less than three inches away, it would be a

The two two-minute periods for this match start both grapplers in the regular first period neutral referee's position with both standing. Should the wrestlers go out of bounds, the referee's control position has the top wrestler placing his hands on the bottom man's back, rather than the waist and elbow used in the NJSIAA.

All these changes didn't have a major effect as all 260 wrestlers had the same rule changes and most had the three weeks to work out on their own as Belleville did between the March 6 Districts and the Jr. Worlds on March 27.

'Gramby" Is Out Both Boff and Walter Bennett had to change some of their regular style for the matches to meet the pin rule. The pair of juniors often use the techniques of the "Gramby" style that they picked up this past summer at the Billy Martin Gramby School of Wrestling in Virginia Beach. This style used many rolls to reverse and control an oponent, which would be called a pin or exposure in the Olympic Free style.

He'd Planned To Go At 143

Walt had originally planned to go 143 at the Tourney, but was two pounds overweight for that class on the night of the first preliminary rounds. Walt commented later "I thought I might as well go up a class to 154 since I came there to wrestle, and it didn't make too much difference."

The 6-3 varsity 136 for Belleville this year won two matches on decisions, 5-1 and 3-0, but then lost a tight decision 2-1 on a penalty point. Bennett lost out when he was pinned by Larry Lambert of Newton. Lambert continued on to take third

Belleville's undefeated JV 157 didn't fare as well as his two fellow Bellboys. Bill Natale, the junior who went 11-0-1, was pinned in his first round by Frank Falitico of Newton at 165 pounds. Falitico was Newton's varsity 168 pounder this past season and took third in the tournament. Bill went over the six point limit when he was decisioned 6-0 by a Delaware Valley High School grappler, who went 14-0 in his dual season.

Wrestlers Finish Thirteenth

Belleville's wrestling Coach Jim Silvestri had high hopes for his grapplers this season and they didn't let him down as they compiled a 12-1 record for the dual season. damage, particularly to trees due to ice, and to electric wiring. As has to be expected, we had a number of calls where the TV antennas were damaged.

It is a very good idea to have your antenna checked. The severe low temperatures contracted the metal, bolts, and nuts so they tend to be loose. The lead-in wire has been stretched or even cracked. stretched or even cracked and consequently the picture quality is poor or the picture flickers, if there is a poor connection. Some antennas have been turned by the strong winds, others have broken or bent staffs. It is easy to spot a loose bracket and it is much better to have it taken care of now before the antenna falls down. This may cause a lot of damage. stretched or even cracked damage.

Generally speaking, it is a good idea to replace the lead-in wire every few years. The insulating material tends to crack under the extremes of temperature and sun. If your picture is poor when it rains, this is an almost sure sign that the antenna wire is cracked.

The Navy has a ready reserve that is in fact ready to meet any task assigned it. VS 73, under the leadership of Commander Robert F. Dolan of Malverne, New York, has adhered to active duty policy and tactics. The crew concept in aircrew and pilot training has proven invaluable. All crews fly together as a crew and obtain valuable training as well as a high level of cooperation that can only be gained through experience.

Of the squadron's 19 pilots, nine earn their living by flying for the airlines and two are involved in aeronautical research. All the squadron pilots are qualified in the Navy's the S-2 "Tracker", over 60 percent of all the pilots have had combat experience and all have had previous anti-submarine warfare experience.

Income Taxes Cause Lots Of Headaches

"Each year about April 15 almost every taxpayer thinks HF has big tax problems. However severe these may be, they can't come close to comparing with those that Internal Revenue Service has," says John R. Amato, Belleville-Nutley manager for H&R Block, America's largest tax service.

Mr. Amato said that the tremendous volume of mail received by the IRS, the speed of its Automatic Data Processing equipment, and taxpayer errors are the main causes of confusion. Often one compounds the other.

As an example, Mr. Amato cited the fact that 2 out of 5 of the 70 million individual returns filed last year arrived at IRS during the last 15 days of the filing season. The deluge of mail was fantastic. A good many tax payments got applied to the wrong account simply because an incorrect social security number was supplied or none was given.

The system that the IRS uses depends on correct social security numbers or employee identification numbers. The computer cannot administer the system without this common numerical denominator, and many problems arise when the number is not furnished or written correctly.

"Taxpayers can help both the IRS and themselves by supplying their correct number," said Mr. Amato. "An easy way is to use the gummed address label on the FORM 1040 sent out by the government,"

With the swiftness of ADP, an amended return sometimes gets processed before the original return. Mr. Amato said that with a little imagination it is easy to see


the errors that this causes. The IRS has introduced a new EORM 1040X, showever, which is designed to eliminate many problems with amended returns.

"But, perhaps an even bigger cause of errors," intimated Mr. Amato, "is the fact that too many people who prepare their own

returns try to do a job that should be done by an experienced tax preparer. As a consequence, many do-it-yourselfers often overlook legitimate deductions."

"You know, many people don't even realize that the fee a person pays to have his return prepared is

"The Phenomenal Blocks Of Kansas City"

The Story of the Men Who Built America's Largest Tax Service

Fifteen years ago, two enterprising young brothers from Missouri set out to try their luck with the American dream -and in the process pioneered a totally unique service business. Their names are Henry and Richard Block, president and chairman of the board respectively of H&R Block, Inc., America's largest firm dealing exclusively with the preparation of Federal and State income tax returns.

From one office in Kansas City in 1955, which prepared a few thousand returns, the firm has grown to over 5000 offices throughout the United States and Canada, which this season will do an expected ten million returns. The secret of H&R Block's success: a volume business based upon low cost, reliability and a good measure of hard work.

Henry and Richard Block were born and raised in Kansas City, Missouri. Henry graduated from the University of Michigan, and Richard from the Wharton School of Finance at the University of Pennsylvania.

In 1946, the brothers opened the United Business Company, which offered small businessmensuch services as bookkeeping, management assistance, collections and income tax preparation. Tax returns were prepared free of charge for their business clients.

As the firm prospered, many people heard of their abilities in tax preparation. They sought out the Blocks and paid a small fee to have them prepare their returns.

By the tax season of 1954, tax preparation and United Business were consuming all the brothers; time – seven days and nights a week. That year Henry and Richárd Block decided that there was a great need for professional tax assistance for the average man. Reputable CPAs and attorneys had more than they could handle and often did not care to do the average man's return for a nominal charge. Something had to be done.

On January 25, 1955, United Business was replaced by a new firm which specialized in income tax - H & R Block, Inc. During the weeks that followed the company did a volume of over \$20,000. In one season they had done nearly a third of the total volume United Business had taken nine years to develop.

In contrast to methods often employed by others in this field who charged on the basis of whatever the traffic would bear or on the amount of time spent, H & R Block devised a method of charging related solely to the number of pages or schedules in the return. The charge did not vary with the size of the income, tax refund, or time involved. This same schedule of charges is used today - \$5.00 minimum; \$10.00 average.

To test their new business on a larger scale, the Blocks opened seven offices in New York in 1956. At the end of the first season they had done a volume of \$65, 784.50. They knew opportunity was knocking.

of the business became apparent, Henry and Richard realized that they could not possibly operate all offices personally. The solution was to obtain qualified local men, train them in Block methods, and let them operate on a franchise or salary basis under the H & R Block banner.

Now their real growth began. In January of 1957 they opened Columbia, Missouri, and Topeka, Kansas. In 1958 they added Des Moines, Oklahoma City and Little Rock. From this point on expansion compounded itself. Top employees were sent out to open hew cities. In 1969 Block had 2,406 offices nationwide. The volume was in excess of thirty-eight million dollars. In 1971, there will be over 5,000 offices ready to prepare over 10 million tax returns.

Although the firm today is the largest of its kind in the United States, Henry and Richard Block still hold to the original principles and practices that were responsible for the company's phenomenal growth. Each new manager becomes a specialist in the 1040 form and an expert in


personal relations. Each is taught to greet customers with a smile, a warm handshake and a cup of free coffee. But, most important, the Blocks teach that every state and Federal return must be accurate. So proud is H & R Block of its work that each client receives a written guarantee of accuracy.

The formula works. Although new clients are continually discovering Block, more than eight out of ten return each year to have the firm prepare their income taxes.

Is there still room or growth? According to a government estimate, some 50% of the people still prepare their own returns. "H & R Block is not interested in the returns already being prepared by CPA's and attorneys", says Henry Block. "We want to provide a real service to the majority who still do their own income taxes. Our immediate goal is to prepare 20% of the nation's returns. This year we anticipate preparing about 13% of all returns filed."

And if past performance is any indication, H & R Block will achieve its goal in record time.


