Twelve Roads Being Resurfaced Here Residents Complain

Thin Asphalt Layer Used For Repairing

The Public Works Department embarked last week on their annual Thin Overlay Program to smooth streets in Town. Work will continue through next week when the project is slated for completion.

According to Commissioner Mary Senatore, 12 Bellevil Fe Mary streets will be repaired with a thin layer of asphalt. The project, she said, is entirely funded by the state government. After the 12 streets have been worked upon, Mrs. Senatore says she will have completed 52 roads in Town that have been gone over with the overlay of asphalt.

Bids were received last month by Commissioners for the project with low bid received from the Newark Asphalt Company. The firm now has a full-time crew working on local streets to complete the project, although work has been by slowed inclement weather.

Work was halted earlier this week because of rain but Public Works officials say the project will start again early next week.

To date, six streets have bean completed in Belleville. Work was begun last Thursday on Williams Street, where an asphalt layer was completed from Union Avenue to Washington Avenue.

Other streets include Church Terrace; Hornblower Avenue from Belleville Avenue to Academy Street, and Van Heuter, Place Holmes Houten Place, Holmes Street and Rossmore Place, Holmes all from Washington Avenue



Bids were received at the Commission meeting for a 200-foot storm sewer to help halt flooding help conditions in the Watchung Avenue section of Town. Commissioners received 27 signatures on a petition from the Watchung Avenue residents stating that residents stating that something should be done about flood conditions

there. Residents there stated that water in basements is almost a natural condition when rains come. One Watchung Avenue man said he had to "wade in water up to his chest" during the recent storms. The residents are asking that a larger storm and sanitary sewer be installed.

Mary Commissioner Senatore, director of Public Safety, said the new storm sewer which bids were received on during the meeting, should help the situation. She also told complaining Mitchell Street residents that flooding there stems from land owned by the Public Service Gas and Electric Company. Work was reportedly begun this week to alleviate the flood problem there. Citizens residing at Belleville Avenue and Main near Route 21 Street reported that a sewer collapsed in their area near Wallace and Tiernan.



Two Belleville detectives have been cited by the Essex County Prosecutor's Office for being instrumental in the arrest of two local young men charges of murdering a 41-year-old Kearny man. Deputy Chief Frank







Some color TV sets have so called rabbit ear antennas built in. Many people conclude that they have to work only they have to work only on this built in antenna. Others think that this is the only antenna needed under all circumstances. Neither of this is right.

Any TV set, black and white or color, regardless of the built in antenna, can be used with an outside or a different "rabbit ear" antenna. There are some rabbit ear antennas which perform much better than the built in ones. As far as color TV is

As far as color IV is concerned, you may get a fairly good picture on the built in or even a better quality inside (or attic) antenna will always improve the picture quality very much. The signal strength picked up by much. The signal strength picked up by the inside antenna is not nearly as strong as the signal picked up by an outside antenna or an outside antenna installed in the attic. Your set will require much less adjustment than with the built in antenna, because this bas to be this this has to be manipulated for the best picture and the controls in most cases, need re-adjustment. This is rarely necessary if the set is used on an outside
