

Twelve Roads Being Resurfaced Here

Thin Asphalt Layer Used For Repairing

The Public Works Department embarked last week on their annual Thin Overlay Program to smooth streets in Town. Work will continue through next week when the project is slated for completion.

According to Commissioner Mary Senatore, 12 Belleville streets will be repaired with a thin layer of asphalt. The project, she said, is entirely funded by the state government. After the 12 streets have been worked upon, Mrs. Senatore says she will have completed 52 roads in Town that have been gone over with the overlay of asphalt.

Bids were received last month by Commissioners for the project with low bid received from the Newark Asphalt Company. The firm now has a full-time crew working on local streets to complete the project, although work has been slowed by inclement weather.

Work was halted earlier this week because of rain but Public Works officials say the project will start again early next week.

To date, six streets have been completed in Belleville. Work was begun last Thursday on Williams Street, where an asphalt layer was completed from Union Avenue to Washington Avenue.

Other streets include Church Terrace; Hornblower Avenue from Belleville Avenue to Academy Street, and Van Houten Place, Holmes Street and Rossmore Place, all from Washington Avenue to Hornblower Avenue.

Coach Cafone Hopes To See A Rejuvenated Bellboy Squad

Both Belleville coach Rocco Cafone and Bloomfield mentor Sam Cavallero expect to see a "rejuvenated Bellboy squad take the field" Saturday afternoon at Municipal Stadium. Game time is 1:30 p.m. when the local club hosts the Bengals in Belleville's home opener.

The Bengals will be seeking to avenge a 7-6

defeat at the hands of Belleville last Fall while the Bellboys will be looking to rebound after a disappointing loss Friday night at the hands of the Bayonne Bees. Both clubs have a young team but Bloomfield is rated the definite favorite off its 21-0 victory over a bigger and stronger Seton Hall club.

Both sides will come into the game with excellent scouting reports. Coach Cafone personally viewed last Saturday's Bengal win at Foley Field while Cavallero was in the stands Friday night when Belleville was being overwhelmed by Bayonne.

"I don't think Friday's game was a proper indication of what kind of team Belleville has this year," said Cavallero. "They are a lot more talented than what we have seen."

Cavallero expects

Belleville to come out passing and is preparing his defense accordingly. He said Belleville will also try to mount a running attack but he fears more the aerial game and will be keeping an eye on both Bellboy quarterbacks, Joe Lotruglio and Phil Bruno.

"Both boys showed they can pass the ball," added Cavallero. "They showed me that Friday night."

Cafone is looking for

Bloomfield to have a "tough team that will be bigger than the Bellboys."

"After seeing them Saturday I know that they can both pass and throw," he added.

Bloomfield has an excellent runner in sophomore Wayne Ripley, who ran wild over Seton Hall with 170 yards and two touchdowns.

Teamsters Lose Unionization Bid

Local Teamster Union No. 97 was turned down in its bid for representation of Department of Public Works employees. The vote total at the Town Garage Wednesday afternoon ended in a 16-16 tie. According to rules set up by the Public

Employees Relations Commission, in an event of a deadlock vote, the union loses its bid for representation.

Commissioner Mary Senatore, director of Public Works, indicated this week that she will lodge an objection to PERC on the way the election was handled by their area representative.

"Their representative didn't know the regulations," she said.

Mrs. Senatore explained that nine employees scheduled to vote Wednesday were barred from the balloting at the

Residents Complain

Flooding Is Seen By Commissioners

The Belleville Commission was flooded at its last regular meeting Thursday night. Flooded, that is, with flood complaints from about 50 local residents.

Citizens from several sections of Town were present at the meeting and all lodged complaints against the "poor sewer and flood conditions in Town." Residents from the Silver Lake district, Belleville Avenue and Main Street, Fairway Avenue and Carmer Avenue said they live in fear every time rain is forecast for the metropolitan area.

Several solutions were offered at the meeting, mostly unfeasible, but the consensus opinion was that the problem isn't Belleville's alone. Surrounding Towns such as Bloomfield and Nutley must also do their share in repairing main sewer lines and cleaning up the Second and Third Rivers if something is to be done to alleviate flood conditions here.

Bids were received at the Commission meeting for a 200-foot storm sewer to help halt flooding conditions in the Watchung Avenue section of Town. Commissioners received 27 signatures on a petition from the Watchung Avenue residents stating that something should be done about flood conditions there.

Residents there stated that water in basements is almost a natural condition when rains come. One Watchung Avenue man said he had to "wade in water up to his chest" during the recent storms. The residents are asking that a larger storm and sanitary sewer be installed.

Commissioner Mary Senatore, director of Public Safety, said the new storm sewer which bids were received on during the meeting, should help the situation. She also told complaining Mitchell Street residents that flooding there stems from land owned by the Public Service Gas and Electric Company. Work was reportedly begun this week to alleviate the flood problem there.

Citizens residing at Belleville Avenue and Main Street near Route 21 reported that a sewer collapsed in their area near Wallace and Tiernan. Commissioner Senatore also promised that work will begin to correct that situation.

Carmer Avenue residents claim they took a "terrible beating" during the last storm. They said they were unable to use the water in their basements because it was mixed with sewer water, unhealthy and a health hazard.

"The odor in my basement is terrible," said one Carmer Avenue resident. "Whenever we experience heavy rains the storm sewer water backs into the Town water system and we are unable to use our basement appliances."

Mayor Joseph McGreevy said that a meeting with Nutley is scheduled for the near future to see what can be done about the situation. He promised action soon.

A Fairway Avenue

woman complained that police hung up on her after she telephoned for assistance during the recent storm. Commissioner Robert Laterza said he will look into the situation.

Laterza also suggested that the Army Corps of Engineers be called into Belleville to widen and deepen the river here.

"The river is getting smaller all the time, creating more flooding and less space for the passage of water," he said.

One woman just about summed up the flood situation in Belleville, although her advice may not be taken.

"Let's get together as a Town and get something accomplished," she said.

Special Meeting Tonight

Belleville Commissioners will travel to Nutley tonight for a closed-door meeting concerning a still-hush-hush giant apartment project being proposed for River Road on the boundary line between the two towns.

No one would say anything about the proposal, but the Times-News was able to learn from reliable sources that the project would be the largest apartment complex in Belleville, and one of the largest in Essex County.

Tonight's meeting reportedly will concern itself with the relocation of a jointly-owned sewer line which runs from the Hancox Avenue area down by the Big Tree Public Service Garage to River Road on the Nutley-Belleville line. The sewer line reportedly would have to be realigned if the apartment project is approved.

The sewer line in question is about 50 years old and may have to be rebuilt in sections to accommodate the proposed giant apartment complex.

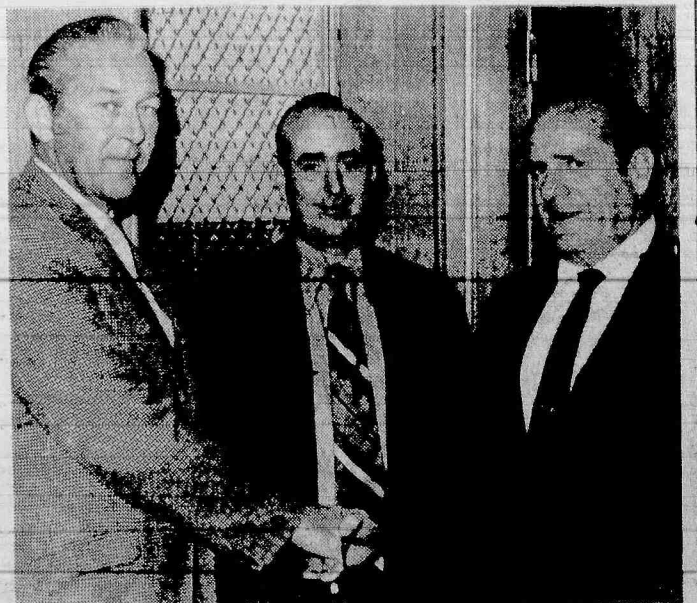
Help Solve Murder

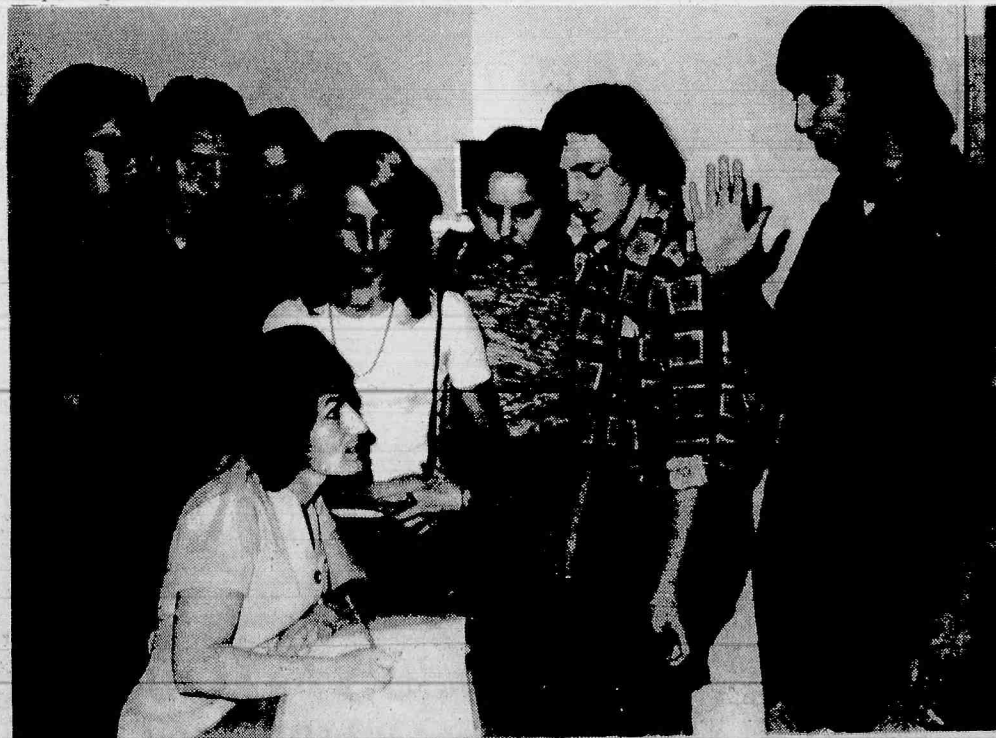

High School.

According to athletic director Wische, a decision on dropping or playing Bayonne in the future will come within two weeks.

"I was unhappy and disappointed with what we had to cope with at Bayonne," said Wische. "I don't want to rush into a decision but Mr. Smith and I will make our recommendation within two weeks. The whole affair left a sour taste in my mouth."

Wische will be "mulling around" his recommendation. He said he is "very upset" with what happened in Bayonne.

Belleville officials are dissatisfied with several aspects of the way Bayonne handled the game. First, both Belleville and Bayonne fans were forced to sit on the same side of the field. The Belleville squad was placed on the home side of the field, where they were subject to ridicule by the fans and had to cope with youngsters running on the Belleville sidelines.

Local football officials report that in some instances, fans took swings at the Belleville football players. Also, the game was set to start at 8 p.m. but it didn't begin until 8:15 p.m. There were no game programs offered at the contest.

According to Wische, the policing of the stands by Bayonne was "very poor."

"I saw only four or five

policemen," he said.

Superintendent of Schools Greco, along with several members of the Board of Education, were also displeased with the events surrounding the game.

"I'm always annoyed when the conduct of young men and women is unsportsmanlike," Greco remarked. "We are going to have to think twice before going back to Bayonne."

Greco reported that board members, after Monday night's meeting, inquired of him to see if there was anything to do about the situation.

"There are several other teams in the area that have expressed a desire to play us," added Greco.

He named West Essex, Montclair, Seton Hall and Essex Catholic High Schools as possible opponents.

representing several areas in Town that the situation will be looked into.

Arson Arrest To Jury

A Belleville man charged with attempting to burn down a local tavern saw his case referred to the Essex County Grand Jury September 16 in Municipal Court.

Jorge Torres, 36, of 34 Union Avenue was arrested July 15 by Newark police and Town Detective Ermin Oliveri in connection with the July 11 attempted arson on Gallaghers Tavern, 157 Belleville Avenue. The arrest was made after Oliveri received information from neighbors of Torres that "he was bragging about burning the tavern."

Torres was picked up in Newark and later signed a written report of an oral statement in which he admitted setting fire to the gas-soaked rear door of Gallaghers.

The apparent motive was an argument that Torres had had earlier in the bar.

Town Judge Edward Abramson continued bail set at \$25 until Torres' arraignment.

The Gifted Child

It appears that a child with a 170 IQ or one less talented with an IQ of 157 may be required to attend classes with average youths.

The handicapped child does have special programs provided for him at public expense. Such is not the case with the gifted child.

For the past two years a special school for gifted students was established in the Newark school system at the South Side High School. Students of superior IQ were selected to attend. The special school was supported by the federal government, the Newark Board of Education and the Prudential Insurance Company.

There was no federal help available this year. Thursday night the Newark Board of

Education will determine if funds will be allotted to continue the school for gifted children.

We think it is an outrage that money is not available at the state or local levels to fund a special school for gifted students throughout New Jersey and the United States. More than likely the future leaders of our state and nation will come from the gifted students group. They should receive the same encouragement from government — the same help from government as do the handicapped children.

Exit Look

Following the 1969 failure of Saturday Evening Post, recently revived as a quarterly, Collier's and other slicks, Look Magazine recently ceased publication because of financial losses totaling more than ten million dollars in thirty months.

The main causes of difficulties were television competition and sharply higher postal rates. The general purpose entertainment magazine, with no special field, has been especially hard hit by television. A question the Look failure leaves unanswered is how well Life, the only magazine left in this class, will do over the long run. It's certain to pick up circulation and advertising revenue in the short run. (Gardner Cowles, board chairman of Look, predicted the country would support Life and that it would do well, in his announcement that Look was closing.)

The Postal Service has proposed to

increase magazine rates by 142 per cent over the next five years. This would have pushed Look's mailing costs up from \$4-million to \$10-million and was a factor in the board decision to cease publication. Mailing costs, of course, have already risen in the last year or two.

The end of Look raises further grave doubts about the wisdom of the congressional decision to turn the Post Office Department into a private corporation which would pay its own way. One of the finest and most beneficial government services to the average citizen for generations has been federally-subsidized postal service. With the government spending billions on just about everything else, low-cost mailing of newspapers, magazines and books, in the public interest as educational and informative, should not be the target of federal retrenchment.

Five New Commissioners For Parking Authority

Five Years Ago

Five commissioners of the newly formed parking authority were sworn into office by Town Clerk Eugene Barnett. G. Fred Burlazzi, of 18 Mount Pleasant Avenue, was elected chairman of the group, and Frank Garruto, of 267 William Street, was chosen as secretary. The other commissioners were George Kiernan, John Caruso, and Emile Casale. All the men agreed at a preliminary meeting that there was a need for professional planners to look over the aspects of city parking for Belleville.

The appointment of Ataura R. Faruque as Principal Librarian of the Public Library was announced by the library. Faruque, who had come to the United States from East Pakistan, had been a Reference Librarian in the Queens Borough Public Library and had also been Assistant Director of the Long Beach Public Library, New York. Faruque was to be in charge of adult services and was to serve as administrative assistant to the library director.

For the fifth straight year the Bellboys lost their opening game with the East Orange Panthers by a slim margin of one-point that left them nursing bruised egos, but pleased that their inexperienced teammates had kept the Panthers down to a 7-6 score in their season opener against a well-drilled and fast team.

Ten Years Ago

Another threat to Belleville's already beleaguered educational future appeared when a team of State Department of Education experts refused to grant the local school district the usual five-year approval given by the department to schools meeting mandatory state minimum requirements. Warner, Director of Secondary Schools in New Jersey in a letter to Dr. Frank Durkee, superintendent of schools, were "the seriousness of the building problem confronting the school district" and "substandard conditions at the high school."

One of the most important games on the local gridiron scene was to take place at Municipal Stadium when Belleville took on an invading Bloomfield High. Both teams had lost their initial outings, and would be out to win. The Bengals

had lost 25-6 to Seton Hall. The Bellboys had been defeated by one point, 7-6, by an evenly matched East Orange squad.

The town commission heard Commissioner Kiernan, Director of Parks, withdraw his proposal for a pay raise for employees in his department that would have cost the taxpayers \$19,751. At the same meeting, the Commission also heard a discussion of the Krugman-DePetro apartments which had been proposed for the foot of Fairway Avenue. David H. Krugman refused to put a price on his eight and one half acre property

Twenty-Five Years Ago

In the latest move in a series of political shake-ups engineered by Public Safety Director Noll since taking office, Recorder Everett B. Smith was ousted after fourteen years of service. In a statement given to another newspaper, Commissioner Noll gave as his reason for replacing Smith the fact that all things must come to an end, and after 14 years, he believed someone else was entitled to the position.

The Belleville Foundation, in conjunction with the release of their annual report for 1945, announced the addition of five trustees, making a total of fifteen trustees in the organization. The Foundation's by-laws had been amended to provide for the change in order to broaden the base of membership. Those named as new members were Mayor James J. Tully, Dr. James Irwin, Herbert Schmutz, Wayne Farmer, and Dr. James Morse.

At the regular meeting of the Belleville District Committee of the Robert Treat Boy Scout Council held September 24, the resignation of Ludley A. Graves as district commissioner was accepted and Pierson R. Crisp was appointed to fill the vacancy.

Senator Suggesting Lottery Surplus Go Toward Education for Handicapped

State Senators James H. Wallwork, Michael A. Guiliano, and Milton A. Waldor said today that they "will urge a portion of the extra money from the State Lottery be used to provide quality education for New Jersey's handicapped children."

In a joint statement, the three Republican Senators said, "Until now the problem of educating handicapped children has been left to local school boards. These boards want to do a good job, but the cost and variety of instruction needed for hearing handicapped, brain injured, cerebral palsied and other handicapped children are more than a local school board can meet adequately."

"Since the Lottery is a tremendous success, we would like to see some of the extra money used for a comprehensive state-wide program for the education of handicapped children," Senators Wallwork, Guiliano, and Waldor pointed out that "three bills now pending in the Legislature would establish a master plan for the educators and local boards of education. The stumbling block has been the cost of implementing the program."

The bills, sponsored by Wallwork provide:

The state would be responsible for supervising the education of handicapped children and would pay 75 per cent of the cost.

The state would be divided into regions with local school boards

formulating a cooperative plan for the education of handicapped children within each region.

The participating school districts within each region would determine what facilities and services each would supply.

Each regional plan would have to be approved by the State Board of Education.

Handicapped children would attend special classes within a normal school setting, sharing art rooms, music rooms, and other facilities with typical children.

For multi-handicapped children or children too severely handicapped to profit from classes within a normal school setting, a companion bill establishes regional day school facilities, so that these children can live at home and attend during the day.

"Senators Wallwork, Guiliano, and Waldor pointed out that "right now many handicapped children are being sent as far as 200 to 400 miles away to obtain schooling."

"Every handicapped child deserves the very best education we can give him. A state-wide program will end fragmentation that exists in special education and will enable handicapped youngsters to get the quality education they need," the Republican Senators concluded.

Senator Clifford P. Case Sunday predicted a Republican win in the State and county because "people are sick and tired of hustlers - people who are out for only what they can get."

The State's senior senator flew in from Washington to lend his support to Frederic Remington, Essex County Senate candidate. He was the principal speaker at a breakfast attended by about 400 persons for Remington at The Manor in West Orange.

Case praised President Nixon and emphasized that maintaining control of the State Legislature and regaining control of the Essex County Board of Freeholders was a "crucial matter."

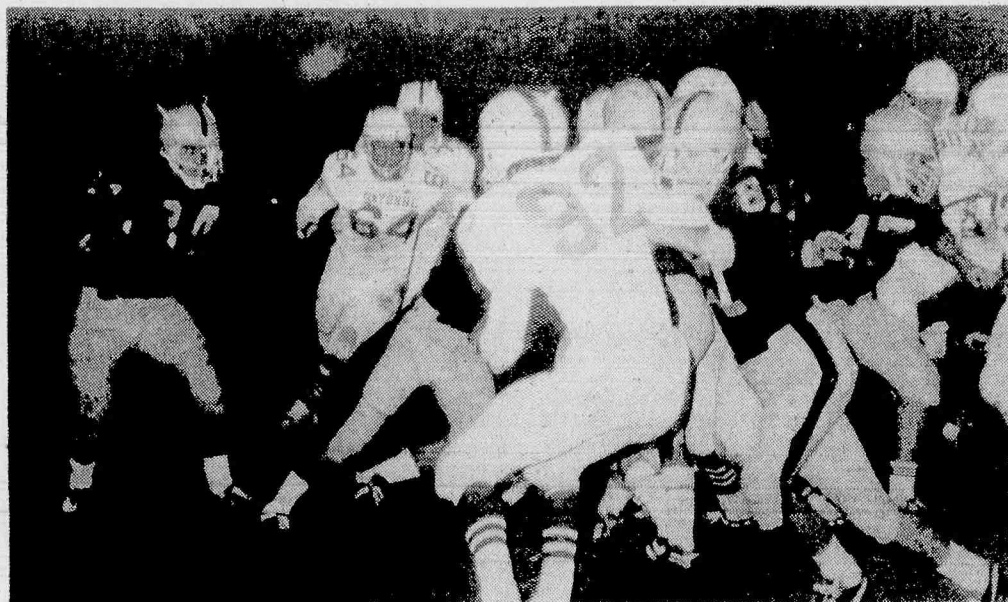

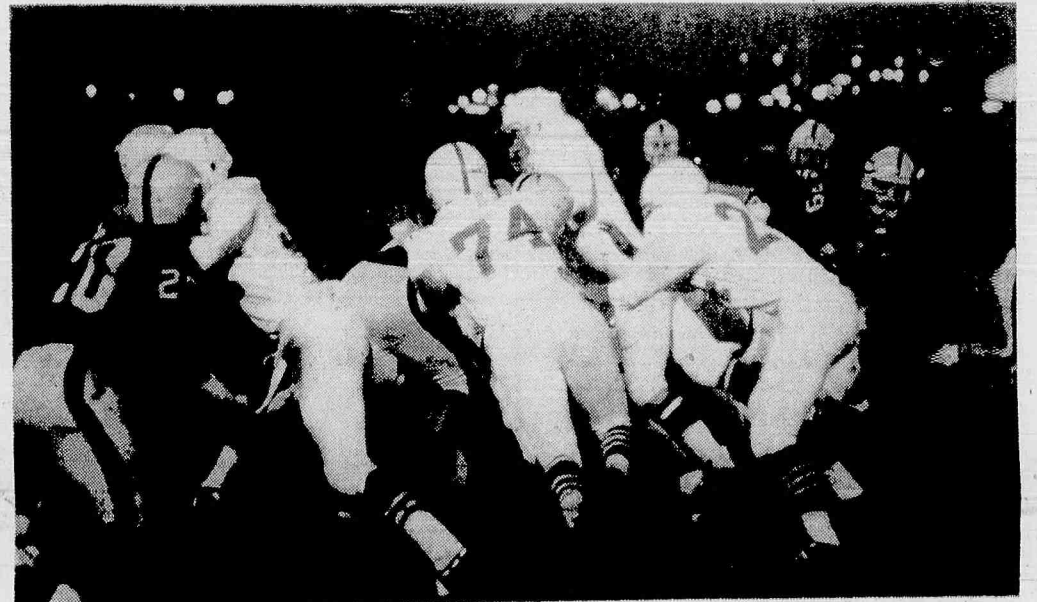

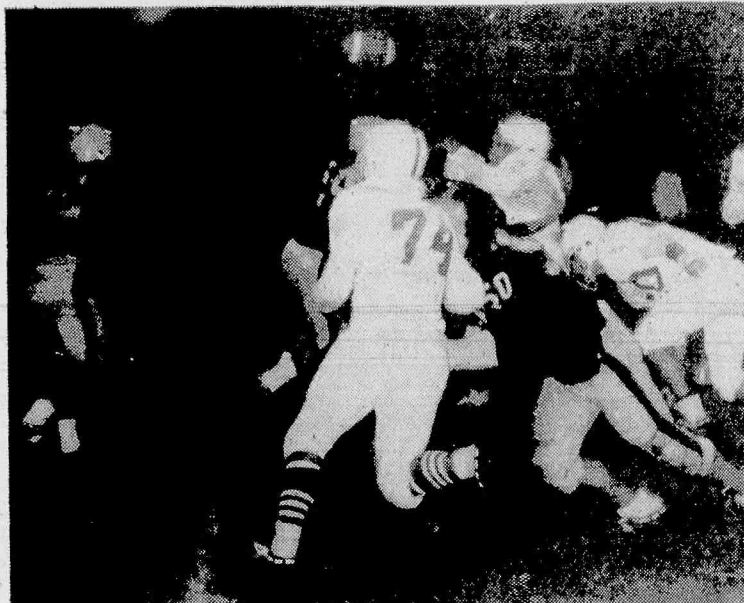

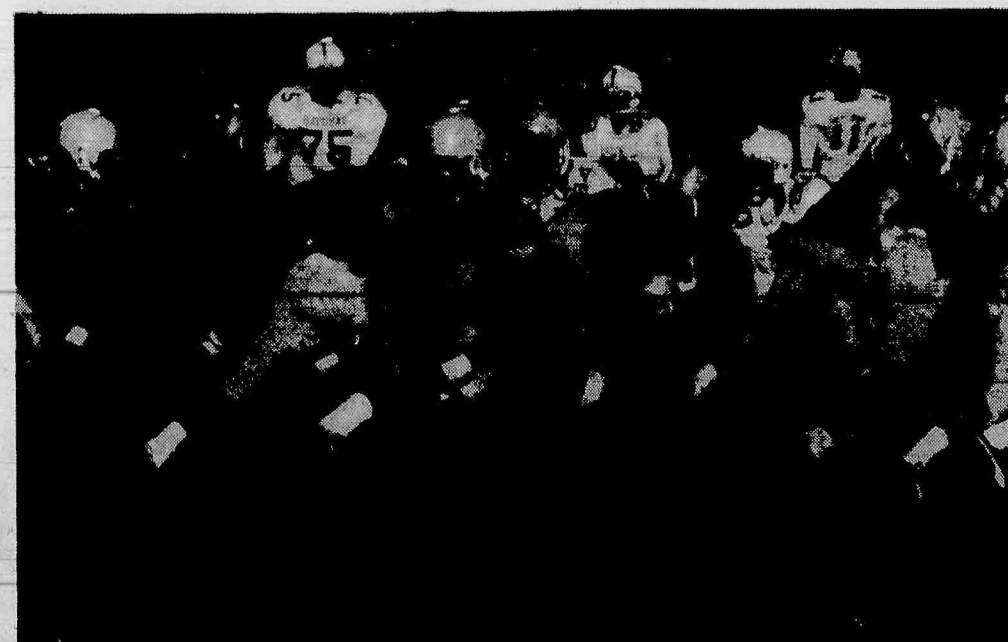

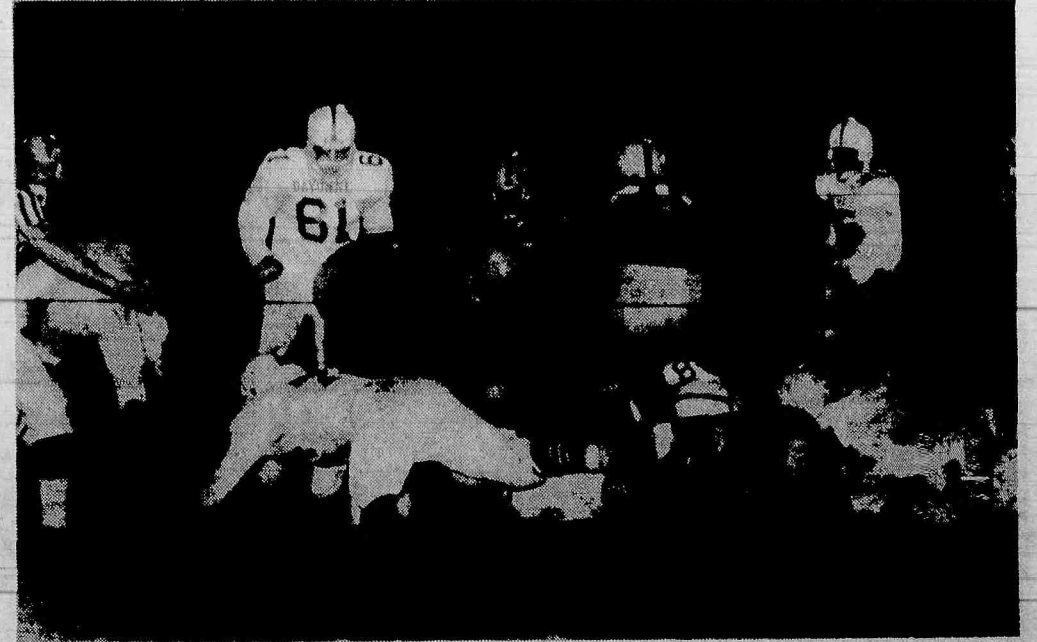
DUMPED behind the line in the first quarter of Friday evening action is Bellboy tailback Augie La Luna. Belleville registered minus yardage in rushing stats.

Bob Luongo Spotlited

Middle Linebacker Doubles As An Offensive Tackle Too

Although only a 16-year-old junior at Belleville High School, Robert Luongo in his second year with the varsity football team has more field experience than many seniors on the squad.

Luongo is one of the few Bellboy players that plays both the offense and defense during games. A starter on both sides of the ledger, he plays middle linebacker and calls defensive signals in a six-one-four defensive alignment and doubles the first-string right tackle on offense. At 6'-0" and solidly packing 207 pounds on his frame, Luongo has the size and speed to play both positions with equal excellence.

Called the best all-round player on the varsity team, Luongo for his age carries the responsibility of a senior.

"Sure it takes much responsibility to call defensive signals and play the middle linebacker spot. But it doesn't bother me."

Luongo said, "I do my best. I know sometimes I make errors but the coaches have to expect that. As long as I'm doing my job to the best of my ability no one can complain."

Luongo is one of the few Bellboys who enjoyed a well-played game against Bayonne Friday night. He intercepted a pass and was in on several tackles. On offense he admits that the line needs to perform better.

"Our offensive blocking broke down against Bayonne," he remarked. "That's why we lost the game. We should do better Saturday."

Luongo has come back this year from a knee injury sustained in the seventh varsity contest during the 1970 season. He tore up the ligaments in his left knee in the seventh game and was lost to the club the remainder of the season. The coaching staff wondered if he could perform this fall at 100 per cent but his output in the Bayonne game stopped all doubts.

"The knee feels fine now," added Luongo.

During the summer months, to both strengthen the knee and get in condition for the coming season, Luongo worked hard on a daily program of running and lifting. Special leg exercises were emphasized to build back up the knee.

Last fall Luongo saw most of his action on defense at the linebacker

spot but the coaching staff was, at the same time, grooming him for his new offensive role.

"During several games they put me in the offensive line in the last quarter," he said. "I enjoy going both ways. As long as I'm on the field and playing."

Bob thinks that playing defense has more enjoyment in it for him. He said that his linebacker position has "more of a challenge and

offers more hitting" than at offensive tackle.

"You can get in a lot more good hits on defense," he added.

Considered the "boss of the defense," Luongo receives his defensive signals from coach Vince Harris on the sidelines. He keys on the fullback to find where he plays in the defense.

During his sophomore campaign, Luongo went 'both ways' and was named captain of the team.

"I've grown a little since my freshman year but I don't mind carrying the extra weight if it doesn't slow me down or affect my quickness," he said.

Last spring Luongo also received a letter in track for his performance in the shot put and discus events. He plans to again join the track team this spring.

With another full high school season still ahead of him, Luongo isn't thinking too much about college. He said he would like to play football while attending college but attached some conditions to the plans.

"I don't want to become just a number," he said. "I'd like to attend an Ivy League School, not one of those football factories."

Ripley," said Cafone. "But I also respect their passing game. Bloomfield stayed mostly on the ground against Seton Hall but they showed me they can pass. They have a good quarterback in Todd Tripucka."

Ripley and Tripucka make up the heart of the Bloomfield offense. Both boys have good size and speed. Ripley is 5'-11" and 160 pounds while Tripucka tips the scales at 185 pounds on his 6'-2" frame.

Belleville again, this week will have to make up in toughness and quickness what they lack in size. According to Cafone, the majority of the Bloomfield squad stands six-foot or bigger.

"Seton Hall did a good job defensively against Bloomfield until the second half. Then they got put in a hole and made mistakes," said Cafone. "They were put in the same situation that we were in against Bayonne. They couldn't get out from the area of their own goal post."

Cafone reports that Bloomfield isn't as green as most grid observers see. He said that seven seniors started Saturday for the Bengals and the team looked very poised.

"But I think we have a very good chance to beat them," Cafone added. "We just have to cut out the mistakes and execute properly."

Although Belleville admittedly looked bad on

offense Friday, Cafone does see a silver lining in the game in that it gained valuable experience for the younger players. According to the coach, the defense had staying power and, discounting minor breakdowns, gave a respectable showing.

"But we had a breakdown in basics on our offense," Cafone said. "Our club is green and they had a letdown in the first ballgame. I expected our offense to move the ball on the ground. They did that in pre-season scrimmages so I know they have the ability."

Cafone will not push the panic button. He indicated that he has faith that the offense will come around and the Bayonne debacle was only something that the Bellboys had to get out of their system.

Belleville was put in a hole early in the game and found it difficult playing "catch-up football" after being down 16-0 at the conclusion of the first quarter. The Bellboy passing game showed signs of life but passes were dropped by receivers and the quarterback had only limited time to set up.

Cafone points to a breakdown on the offensive line as a big cause in the defeat. He said Bayonne was stunting its linemen, confusing the greener Belleville players.

"But we expected that. They didn't pull any surprises," Cafone said. "We told the boys what to do but they just were not

responding to the coaching."

Mistakes in a bad center snap on a punt, a fumble and a bad pass also led to the Belleville demise.

"If it wasn't for the mistakes I believe our

offense would have become fairly effective," the coach added. "But I'm not taking anything away from the Bayonne squad. They were a fired-up ballclub. Our boys were green and excitable."

BECK'S COLUMN

Some color TV sets have so called rabbit ear antennas built in. Many people conclude that they have to work only on this built in antenna. Others think that this is the only antenna needed under all circumstances. Neither of this is right.

Any TV set, black and white or color, regardless of the built in antenna, can be used with an outside or a different "rabbit ear" antenna. There are some rabbit ear antennas which perform much better than the built in ones.

As far as color TV is concerned, you may get a fairly good picture on the built in or even a better quality inside antenna, but an outside (or attic) antenna will always improve the picture quality very much. The signal strength picked up by the inside antenna is not nearly as strong as the signal picked up by an outside antenna or an outside antenna installed in the attic. Your set will require much less adjustment than with the built in antenna, because this has to be manipulated for the best picture and the controls, in most cases, need re-adjustment. This is rarely necessary if the set is used on an outside antenna.

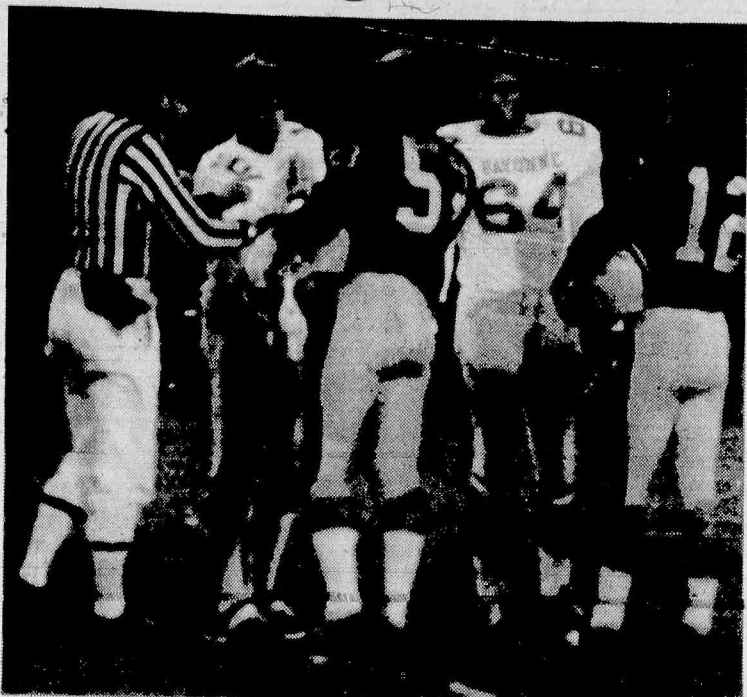

Goodwin, rated as the Bellboy's top runner by pre-season observers, had a good 13:51 timing in his first showing against Orange. He was only six seconds off the winning pace. Budrick had a 15:19 time.

Others finishing for Belleville included Mike Spillane (11); Rocco Cuozzo (12), and Rich Solenski, in 13th place.

The Bellboy cross-country squad will run against Montclair High School today in Brookdale Park while the travel to Kearny next Tuesday afternoon.

The September 24 meet run at Cameron Field against Columbia had Goodwin, Belleville's top distance runner, getting only eighth place. Four other local runners figured in the scoring.

New Billiard Record Made In Belleville

The Guys and Dolls Billiard Lounge, 524 Washington Avenue, Belleville, had a new billiard record last week. The new mark was made, and tied, all in one week.

Ten consecutive three cushion billiards were made by James E. Tsonas, 24, of 41 South Munn Avenue, East Orange, and Jack F. Youtt, 67, of 1993 McCarter Highway, Newark.

Breakdowns in the offensive blocking assignments by the Belleville linemen and mistakes capitalized upon by Bayonne led to a 20-0 shutout loss for the local squad on its season opener last Friday night in Bayonne. It was the first night game the current crop of local youngsters have played.

Over 4,000 fans were on hand in Veterans Stadium to see the Bees score all their touchdowns in the first quarter of play. All the scoring in the game came after Belleville errors.

Belleville was held in the contest to minus yardage on the ground as time after time the Bayonne line penetrated to the Bellboy backfield, sacking runners for four and five yard losses. Although the local squad at times looked like its passing attack may get untracked, both quarterbacks, Joe Lutruglio and Phil Bruno had almost no time to set up to pass. The quarterbacking for Belleville saw eight passes thrown with four short completions and two interceptions.

College Soccer Starts

Moving into the final stages of its preseason training period, Coach Leonard Lucenko's Montclair State College soccer team is starting to round into topflight form despite a number of surprises.

The Indians, 34-6-3 over the last three years and a National Collegiate Athletic Association tournament entry in 1969, have suffered the loss of starting fullback Dennis Ball of Bermuda and Andre Charles, a key reserve, out of Newark.

Ball has transferred to the University of Chicago while Charles is not taking part in soccer this year. This plus the loss via graduation of John Smith, who tallied 38 goals in his four year varsity career.

The Bellboys kicked from their own 20-yard line and moved in 10 plays for 54 yards and a touchdown. Dave Annetta swept right end for a 22-yard touchdown jaunt.

Another Belleville mistake led to the Bees second and final touchdown. Still in the first quarter, Lutruglio dropped back to pass but threw the ball into the arms of Maak. The Bayonne defensive back scurried 11 yards before being tackled on the two.
