Immediate Repairs Needed In Buildings

Board of Education president Richard Mahma-rian, accompanied by two top administrators in the School System here, toured three grammar schools last week to expose deteriorating conditions there. Problems ranged from faulty wiring to inadequate lavatory facilities.

The tour was the third in a five-part series, designed to show residents the need for immediate repairs in most of the schools here. In all three grammar schools toured last Thursday afternoon, School No. 1, No. 8 and No. 9, it was discovered that lighting was insufficient, storage space was at a minimum and classrooms were filled to 100 per cant capacity.

Again, overcrowding seemed to loom as a major problem. In School No. 8, overcrowded classrooms and a minimum of storage: space threatened the education process of the facility. According to officials, the 20 classrooms there average 23-24 pupils per class but an anticipated increase in enrollment there next year may make it necessary to consolidate more classes there. At present, School No. 8 pupils have to do without an art or music room.

According to School Board president Mahmarian, only a change of location of the School System administrative offices can save the school from further overcrowding next Fall. Currently, the School Board and administrative offices are housed in No. 8 but a plan by Mahmarian would bring those offices to the recently Town-purchased Prudential Building on Washington Avenue. The Department of Public Affairs is housed in the first floor of that structure and talks are now underway with the Town to rent the vacant second floor for new administrative and





Okinawa Finally Paying Off

The last great battle of World War II was the American assault on Okinawa, the last stepping stone on the way to Japan; it was a costly battle, both for the army, and unusually so for the navy, hundreds of ships being hit or sunk, far more than in any other campaign.

After its capture in 1945 it was steadily transformed into the most powerful U.S. military base in the western Pacific. There are currently 43,000 U.S. troops on the main island and other islands of the 400-mile long chain (55 islands in all.)

Sovereignty of the islands was turned back to Japan May 15th and the U.S. military installations remain on the strength of a newly-signed treaty syith Japan. All nuclear weapons have been

removed from the islands as requested and the United States has agreed to consult Tokyo before using island bases as for-ward staging areas for war operations, including Vietnamese operations.

The million inhabitants affected, of the yellow race, are now voicing mixed emotions over the transfer, though they have long been in favor of the move.

The transfer removes the most vexing issue between Washington and Japan among the Japanese populace and, one hopes, paves the way for close cooperation and friendship in the future. If that is the eventual outcome, the transfer and earlier cost of capture will have accomplished much.

Many Are Happy With Castro

Because Cuba is now in the grip of a communist regime and Fidel Castro is unpopular in the United States, we tend to assume communism can't succeed in Cuba and that everyone remaining on the island is dissatisfied.

But the evidence mounts that many are satisfied. In recent weeks the government has been able to provide more food and consumer goods to the people than at any time in recent years. Meat is still heavily rationed but there is more butter, vegetables an fruit and better food is available in restaurants. In addition, television sets are now available, at high prices, as are refrigerators, sewing machines, etc. Reuters reports that the people there are "receiling" in the new availability of consumer goods.

Of course, such a state of affairs is not comparable to that in the United States.

nor to the variety of goods once available to those with money in Cuba. But it should be remembered that the present regime has brought advantages to the poor never enjoyed before—such as education for all, social and health services, and welfare aid, etc. As in China, the plight of the poor before communism was quite grim and these social improvements have favorably impressed the the impoverished and diseased, who now enjoy better care and services than when Cuba was free.

All this is not to praise communism; it is still a totalitarian system. Nevertheless, in analyzing the stuation to the south of us, one should objectively assess plusses and minuses. Convincing ourselves, as we did a decade ago, that the Cuban people will rise up against Castro because he is not popular at the first opportunity is wishful thinking, to a considerable degree.

For far too long, education failed to receive the priority it deserved, and in far too many cases, underpaid teachers helped subsidized to the control of the contr

education in our state. But we've had to pay, a price. That price has been an alimost constant rise for the past decade in our local property lates.

In mot municipalities throughout the state, the cost of operating our local schools accounts for approximately 60 per cent of money raised by local taxation. Since real estate is the principal source of local revenues, it means that most of the cost of education is borne by the property owner. This cost has become burdensome - some think unbearably so - and, unfortunately, all experts agree that it can only become worse under a gree that it can only become worse under our present tax set up.

That's why the Tax Policy Committee has recommended an whole new approach to our problem of financing education, one that will free us stepin a system where very often those who can least afford to pay, pay the most. The effective tax rate for families with incomes in excess of \$25,000 pay only 3.3 per cent of it in taxs.

The most practical, viable answer's for the state to take over the responsibility of financing the schools. This is really the essence of the Tax Reform program which I have recommended to the Legislature. Taxation for school purposes would be level by the state at the rate of \$1 for each \$100 of assessed valuation on real property, and it would be pageed at this level by constitutional amendment to insure against future increases. Since this would raise less than the amount now being raised by the local districts, the difference would be made up by a graduated income tax. This would then place the cost of government where, it belongs, on those who can best afford to pay.

The most frequently raised objection I've beard is the fear that this plan would mean the end of local control of schools. This is a condition the Tax Committee has carefully considered, and, I believe, fully insured against. The proposed law provides for local abords of education to carry on the functions they now perform. They would continue to hire techers, to establish budgets, to pla

they now perform. They would continue to hire techers, to establish budgets, to plan facilities and all the other responsibilities now assigned to them.

Under the new arrangement, school financing will be based on a per-pupil cost, averaged throughout the state. This means that instead of having rich districts and poor districts, we will eliminate the poor districts, we will eliminate the poor districts, we will eliminate the state alto agree per pupil will be permitted, to continue. In addition, districts desiring to spend more than the state allocation will be, able to do so, provided it is first, approved by the voters of the district. What we are doing, in effect, is putting a floor on our oducational financing. We are saying that no child will receive a substandard education just because he lives in a poor district. At the same time, we are removing the burden of financing because he lives in a poor district. At the same time, we are removing the burden of financing the authority for deciding the educational process at the local level where it belongs.

While state financing of schools will be the principal thrust in reducing property taxes, here will be other factors. The two principal ones will be assumption of state responsibility for welfare and for most of our judicial system.

I firmly believe that public welfare is the responsibility of the Federal Government. But until the Federal Government End until the Federal Government that the state should remove this expensive burden frim the counties and municipalities. In addition to relieving property taxes, it will permit the introduction of administrative efficiencies by centralizing what is now an extremely-fragmented-program.

Similar opportunities for efficiencies are researced by the state, rather than the counties, funding the major portion of our judicial system.
