drawing up an ordinance prohibiting Pathmark from staying open 24 hours a day, officers of the food store will also be working to have that proposed ordinance defeated. The bill will be presented at the next regular Commission meeting, Tuesday, June 13.

According to Frank Tucker, a Pathmark vice president who operates out of headquarters in Woodbridge, keeping the Belleville store open 24 hours can do nothing but benefit the community. He believes that when the "real facts" are pointed out, residents, and Commissioners, will get a different opinion.

To date, though, Commissioners seem united against keeping the local food store open all-night. Commissioner Robert Laterza, director of Public Safety, initiated the ordinance to limit store hours, and he was backed up by the majority of the Commission. Mayor Joseph McGreevy and Commission-

ers Mary Senatore and Vincent Strumolo expressed a favorable opinion to the bill while Michael Marotti remained uncommitted. Marotti said he would like to wait until the ordinance is drawn

## Summer School Sessions Slated

Registration for Belleville Summer School begins Wednesday, June 21, between 2 and 4 p.m. Sessions will begin Monday, June 26 and run through August 4. Again, the school will host public and resident students.

Supervising the program will be Ernest Musmanno, who will direct and administrate the summer school again this year. Students may register for make-up, grade improvement or enrichment courses.

Courses for make-up or grade improvement will be \$50 for one and \$75 for two white courses for enrichment will cost \$25 for one and \$40 for two classes. Grade six students, from Belleville Public Schools only, will be admitted for \$20 for one and \$30 for two courses.

Belleville Senior High School students may register at the senior high school on June 21, 22 or 23 between 2 and 4 p.m., and on Saturday, June 24, from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. Belleville

### Mrs. Senatore Does Well

## Town Bucks State Trend By Nixing McGovern, 2-1

Belleville Democratic voters bucked the statewide trend in Tuesday's Primary Election as regular organization delegates out-pollied Sen. George McGovern's slate here by a 2-1 ratio. About 25.5 per cent of the Town's registered voters cast ballots, almost identical to the turnout on the state level.

Commissioner Mary Senatore, the only local resident on the ballot Tuesday, was confident she won a spot as a district delegate to the national convention but because of the complicated ballot, exact figures won't be

known until sometime today. Mrs. Senatore, running with 13 other regular Democratic organization delegates as uncommitted against a McGovern slate, polled 1,888 votes in Belleville.

The regular Democratic organization line carried Belleville by a comfortable margin and reflected the picture in Essex County, where the entire regular Demo slate won easily. For U.S. Senator, the regular party choice, Paul J. Krebs, out-pollied the McGovern backed candidate Daniel M. Gaby by 1,820 to 172. Krebs won the right to face U.S. Sen. Clifford P. Case in November, a Republican incumbent who polled 677 votes here. Sen. Case handily out-pollied James W. Ralph, who totaled 223 votes in Belleville in the Republican primary.

Of the 4,607 voting in Belleville, 3,541 registered as Democrats while 1,066 cast ballots in the Republican primary. In Belleville's new 11th Congressional District, Democrat Joseph D. Minish was unopposed and will face Republican Milton A. Waldor, a former Essex senator, who also ran without opposition Tuesday.

At Belleville Town Hall, the first polls didn't reach Town Clerk Eugene Barnett until nearly 11 p.m. The first polling place reporting returns here was in Ward II at 10:30 p.m. The American Legion was the first to report returns at 10:32 p.m. from Ward II District 2. Because of the complicated ballot and the small staff at Town Hall, exact figures on the McGovern-Humphrey contest in Belleville couldn't be reported locally today as Town Clerk Barnett instructed his workers to bypass totaling delegate votes and instead, send them directly to the county for tabulation. Barnett said many municipalities in the area followed suit in not computing delegate votes.

## Sanitary Sewer Threat At Huge Local Firm

Immediate emergency action is being taken by the Department of Public Works here to repair the main sanitary sewer line at the Wallace and Tiernan Co. in Belleville. The eight-inch sewer line, which ruptured sometime last fall, has recently become worse, causing concern that there may be a total blockage of the flow of sewage.

According to administrative clerk James Soldo, who is heading the project for the Public Works Department, the broken line is a threat to the total operations of Wallace and Tiernan.

"If the line backs up the factory will be without sanitary facilities and therefore would have to close down," remarked Soldo. Last week's heavy rain has decreased the flow of sewage even more and has widened the cave-in in the area. The break in the line is located near Main Street on Wallace and Tiernan property, where the sanitary sewer line from the factory connects with a 12-inch

main line. Public Works employees were expected to excavate this week. When the break was first discovered, Town officials hoped that since the line was located on Wallace and Tiernan property, the company would pay for repairs. However, it was discovered that the Town still kept its sewer rights to the property and was responsible for maintenance there.

"The break needs immediate attention," stressed Soldo. "We will excavate the area this week to determine exactly where the break is. We are assigning six men to the project but as of this moment we have no idea how much it will cost. First we must survey the actual break."

Soldo noted that about a month ago there was a complete stoppage in the flow of sewage there and emergency crews from the Town were called to reopen the line. The break needs attention now to prevent a recurrence of that condition.

## Problems Ranging From Faulty Wiring To Inadequate Toilets Revealed By Officials On Tour Of Three Grammar Schools

### Immediate Repairs Needed In Buildings

Board of Education president Richard Mahmarian, accompanied by two top administrators in the School System here, toured three grammar schools last week to expose deteriorating conditions there. Problems ranged from faulty wiring to inadequate lavatory facilities.

The tour was the third in a five-part series, designed to show residents the need for immediate repairs in most of the schools here. In all three grammar schools toured last Thursday afternoon, School No. 1, No. 8 and No. 9, it was discovered that lighting was insufficient, storage space was at a minimum and classrooms were filled to 100 per cent capacity.

Again, overcrowding seemed to loom as a major problem. In School No. 8, overcrowded classrooms and a minimum of storage space threatened the education process of the facility. According to officials, the 20 classrooms there average 23-24 pupils per class but an anticipated increase in enrollment there next year may make it necessary to consolidate more classes there. At present, School No. 8 pupils have to do without an art or music room.

According to School Board president Mahmarian, only a change of location of the School System administrative offices can save the school from further overcrowding next fall. Currently, the School Board and administrative offices are housed in No. 8 but a plan by Mahmarian would bring those offices to the recently Town-purchased Prudential Building on Washington Avenue. The Department of Public Affairs is housed in the first floor of that structure and talks are now underway with the Town to rent the vacant second floor for new administrative and

School Board officers, "If that move is successful then we could make, three classrooms and a music and art room from the vacated offices here," remarked Anthony Greco, superintendent of schools who, along with Harold Dufford, business administrator, accompanied Mahanian on the tour.

Dufford added that storage is a critical problem at School No. 8. He said that the school auditorium is now being utilized as a storage area but that prevents School No. 8 pupils from presenting plays or scheduling assemblies.

School 8 was constructed in 1924 but an addition to the facility hasn't been added since 1929, when the south wing was built. That same year the administrative offices were moved into the building. The school houses about 502 pupils and is operating at maximum capacity.

Old, outdated wiring is also a problem at No. 8. Be-

cause the old wires can't handle the load of modern lighting equipment, candlepower is inadequate and could result in eye strain to pupils. The school still has its original wiring and new modern fixtures can't be installed until the building is rewired. According to Dufford, today's voltage requirements are too high for the old wiring to handle. One good electrical aspect of the building is the relatively new main electric panel, which was replaced eight years ago.

Fire doors on all three schools viewed, especially School No. 8, were of the old wooden variety, considered outdated by present day standards. Officials say the old doors should be replaced by more durable aluminum doors, which are lighter and easier for small children to open in emergencies.

"We are not saying our school buildings should be torn down and replaced by new ones," said Mahanian. "Belleville's schools are structurally sound. Too many towns make a point of tearing down older buildings instead of renovating them. We believe it is both more economical and more practical to renovate our buildings." Officials on the tour said

old window sashes must be replaced by the modern aluminum variety. Sidewalks leading to the school are cracked and in a state of disrepair and they too must be replaced or repaired, say officials.

Greco pointed out that School No. 8 has no faculty room so teachers there must use the library for lunches and meetings. The school library must also double as a teacher lounge. The library does have kitchen facilities where the faculty can wash.

School No. 9 was built in 1927 and although it houses only about 166 pupils and is one of the smaller grammar schools, many of the problems at No. 8 also plague No. 9. With a staff of seven teachers, principal Nick Petti, now in his fifth year there, sees many areas where improvements are needed.

Besides the need of a complete rewiring, new lighting fixtures, a new service panel, and new fire emergency doors, the Ralph Street School's heating system is inadequate and new units are needed there.

Principal Petti reports that there are no lavatory facilities for the teaching staff and women faculty members must use the nurses room while the men teachers must share the boys' room lavatory with pupils.

Although School No. 9 does have an art room, there are no slop sinks for pupils to wash hands after using art materials such as paint or crayon. Custodians at the school also are in need of a shop sink for cleaning up af-

ter mopping and cleaning chores.

# Pathmark Spokesman To Appear Tuesday

up before lending support to the measure.

Tucker this week cited several reasons why the Pathmark here should remain open 24 hours a day. He said when the ordinance is introduced next Tuesday there will be Pathmark representatives at the meeting to tell their side of the story.

"I would also like to speak with each of the Commissioners on this matter. I'm sure I can convince the Commissioners to see the benefits of keeping the store open. The benefits surely outweigh the little problems that can be corrected," Tucker stated.

An ordinance on the books already prohibits Pathmark from opening on Sundays. The bill now being prepared by Scott would now limit the daily hours of Pathmark.

Problems cited by Commissioners in keeping the store open all-night included disrupting the tranquility of the neighborhood, increasing the risk of a hold-up there and financially hurting the small local businessmen.

Tucker, on the other hand, thinks these problems are blown out of proportion, and what problems there are can be rectified. He said a private poll taken by Pathmark showed that their customers favored an all-night opening by as much as four to one.

In answer to police protection, Tucker said that the Belleville store's security force will be beefed-up when the business remains open all-night.

"The true facts are that of the 96 stores we operate, only six were held-up in a one year period and since we instituted our all-night policy, none have been held-up," Tucker noted.

Tucker also believes that the Pathmark is not in competition with small stores.

"We don't take away from the small store. There are certain people who shop in small stores for certain items and they will always shop in those stores. Keeping our Pathmark open 24 hours has nothing to do with the small businessman," he added.

Also, keeping the store open all-night wouldn't disrupt the neighborhood. It would make it more convenient for area residents," Tucker said. "Also, we have many employees from the area and this would increase their opportunity for work."

The Pathmark chain just recently instituted their 24 hour policy in all 96 stores in five states. Besides New Jersey, the food chain operates in New York, Connecticut, Pennsylvania and Delaware. Tucker said there were some communities opposed to the idea but that the vast majority of stores got no resistance when open all-night. According to a Pathmark poll, over 90 per cent of stores are open around the clock.

Pathmark spokesmen said that when the store remains open all-night, all services will be in operation. All the regular day-in and day-out consumer services at Pathmark are available day and night, they said. Also, there will be no increase in price.

Spokesmen for Pathmark gave two reasons why they adopted the 24-hour policy. First, Pathmark feels their customers should not have to pay higher prices elsewhere when their stores are closed, and secondly, Pathmark officials believe habits of the consumer have changed. They say the shorter work week

allows for more time for people to shop late at night, rather than having to do the marketing on the weekends. Officials believe usually more

than one member of the family works so shopping can only be done late at night. People are on different shifts, they say, but can now shop whenever they want.

To date, Pathmark is the only chain to adopt a 24 hours a day, every day, policy.

## Okinawa Finally Paying Off

The last great battle of World War II was the American assault on Okinawa, the last stepping stone on the way to Japan; it was a costly battle, both for the army and unusually so for the navy, hundreds of ships being hit or sunk, far more than in any other campaign.

After its capture in 1945 it was steadily transformed into the most powerful U.S. military base in the western Pacific. There are currently 43,000 U.S. troops on the main island and other islands of the 400-mile long chain (65 islands in all).

Sovereignty of the islands was turned back to Japan May 15th and the U.S. military installations remain on the strength of a newly-signed treaty with Japan. All nuclear weapons have been

removed from the islands as requested and the United States has agreed to consult Tokyo before using island bases as forward staging areas for war operations, including Vietnamese operations.

The million inhabitants affected, of the yellow race, are now voicing mild emotions over the transfer, though they have long been in favor of them.

The transfer removes the most vexing issue between Washington and Japan among the Japanese populace and, one hopes, paves the way for close cooperation and friendship in the future. If that is the eventual outcome, the transfer and earlier cost of capture will have accomplished much.

## Many Are Happy With Castro

Because Cuba is now in the grip of a communist regime and Fidel Castro is unpopular in the United States, we tend to assume communism can't succeed in Cuba and that everyone remaining on the island is dissatisfied.

But the evidence mounts that many are satisfied. In recent weeks the government has been able to provide more food and consumer goods to the people than at any time in recent years. Meat is still heavily rationed but there is more butter, vegetables, an fruit and better food is available in restaurants. In addition, television sets are now available, at high prices, as are refrigerators, sewing machines, etc. Reuters reports that the people there are "reveling" in the new availability of consumer goods.

Of course, such a state of affairs is not comparable to that in the United States,

nor to the variety of goods once available to those with money in Cuba. But it should be remembered that the present regime has brought advantages to the poor never enjoyed before—such as education for all, social and health services, and welfare aid, etc. As in China, the plight of the poor before communism was quite grim and these social improvements have favorably impressed the impoverished and diseased, who now enjoy better care and services than when Cuba was free.

All this is not to praise communism; it is still a totalitarian system. Nevertheless, in analyzing the situation to the south of us, one should objectively assess pluses and minuses. Convincing ourselves, as we did a decade ago, that the Cuban people will rise up against Castro because he is not popular at the first opportunity is wishful thinking, to a considerable degree.

# Atlantic City Competition For 'Little Miss Belleville'

### One Year Ago

Public Works Director Mary Senatore was seeking a bid from Town Attorney John Scott on whether she could hold the job title of Superintendent within her department. Mrs. Senatore said she had been performing the duties of Superintendent of Public Works for five years without pay and was requesting only that the official title be given to her. The Commissioner said she would not accept the \$13,500 salary for the position.

The Board of Education was expected to decide whether or not to build an addition to the senior high school. Although Board president Leonard Back said that school officials were undecided, there were strong indications the majority of board members were committed to construction and that the only real question in the air was how many bond referendums to have.

A taxpayers suit to remove the Michael Marotti controversy was being prepared by several residents and attorneys. Marotti, who had been elected to the Board of Commissioners in May, had retained his position as a detective in the police department, and had been severely criticized for his actions by several townspeople. Town Attorney John Scott had ruled that Marotti could both serve as a detective and as a Commissioner. However, the citizens were determined to bring their suit to court. All that was required for a court hearing was a petition signed by 25 taxpayers. According to reliable sources, Marotti's salary as a detective was to be held up until the matter was judged in court.

### Five Years Ago

A resolution which would add a new dimension to the tax revaluation crisis in Belleville was being prepared by the Town Council. The measure was sponsored by Councilman Ralph Casale. The governing body had to decide whether it wanted to petition the state legislature for remedial legislation regarding the state's policies on the revaluation of property throughout New Jersey. Town Attorney Jack Soriano had presented a four point proposal which the Council had agreed to study. Soriano's recommendations were to form the foundation of the Council's petition.

Army Specialist Four Steven Crowley, son of Mr. and Mrs. John J. Crowley of 337 Stephens Street, was awarded the Combat Medical Badge for service in Vietnam. Spec. Crowley received the award for service as a medical specialist under hostile fire. He had entered the Army in 1965 and had been stationed at Fort Lewis, Washington, prior to his overseas tour in October, 1966.

"Little Miss Belleville" received an invitation to compete in the "Little Miss Garden State" contest which was to be held June 28 at Atlantic City. Cynthia Corris of 25 Lloyd Place was excited about the competition. "I can't wait to get to Atlantic City," she commented. The winner of the "Little Miss Garden State" contest would receive a color film, a picnic contest, a trophy, and a \$100 U.S. Savings Bond.

### Ten Years Ago

The Board of Education decided to temporarily close the inside walls of the

east portion of the James G. Shawyer School, and then to determine the extent of permanent repairs which might be necessary. Jan Parker Edwards, architect, and Amerigo Visco, engineering consultant, had estimated that repairing the wall would cost about \$21,000. Edwards said he believed the damage to the wall was caused by deterioration of the flashing which had allowed water to seep in and freeze.

### Fifteen Years Ago

Governor Robert B. Meyner swore in John Noonan, of 31 Overlook Avenue, as Deputy Attorney General for New Jersey. Mr. Noonan had originally been assigned as a legal assistant to the Governor. He had graduated from law school in 1953 and 10 years later had been admitted to the New Jersey Bar.

The Custodian of School Monies, Arthur Ackerman, was bonded for \$250,000 on a resolution proposed by Board member George Brown. Ackerman was bonded by the town of Belleville for \$300,000, and the question of bonding him for a special board meeting. Max Schwartz, the Board Attorney, stated that not having the Custodian of School Monies was "unthinkable."

### Twenty-Five Years Ago

The Board of Directors of the Belleville Chapter of the American Red Cross elected B. Thomas Aitken chairman of the group. Other officers chosen by the directors to lead the local chapter were: vice-chairmen, Rudolph H. Dejean, Mrs. Raymond Metz, and Harvey Thompson; treasurer, Albert Luscombe, and secretary, J. Claude Powers.

The Board of Commissioners agreed to reimburse the state in the amount of \$7,000 for the utility cost of the temporary housing project in town. The matter had been the subject of a state-wide controversy and one which had threatened to hold up the additional 18 units which had been scheduled for construction on Bellavista Avenue and Cortlandt Street. Mayor Tully said that there was a moral obligation on the town's part to pay for the utilities.

### Forty Years Ago

Dr. Daniel E. Kavanaugh, of 252 Washington Avenue, was elected and installed as president of the Belleville Lions Club at a meeting of the organization. Mr. Kavanaugh succeeded A. Edward Locher in the presidency. Prior to his election, he had been chairman of the major activities committee.

The four-man golf team representing Belleville High School came in second at the first annual New Jersey Intercollegiate Golf Tournament at the Hopewell Valley Club course in Hopewell, covering thirty-six holes in 1964. ## The Governor's VIEW

### Tax Reform's Key Essence Is State Funding for Schools

While the cost of just about every service or product we use has been rising steadily, education is unquestionably the single public service that has escalated the most rapidly in the last dozen years.

For far too long, education failed to receive the priority it deserved, and in far too many cases, underpaid teachers helped subsidize lower tax rates by struggling in outmoded buildings to educate our children.

Enormous strides have been made to correct these conditions and to improve the quality of education in our state. But we've had to pay a price. That price has been an almost constant rise for the past decade in our local property taxes.

In most municipalities throughout the state, the cost of operating our local schools accounts for approximately 60 per cent of money raised by local taxation. Since real estate is the principal source of local revenues, it means that most of the cost of education is borne by the property owner. This cost has become burdensome - some think unbearably so - and, unfortunately, all experts agree that it can only become worse under our present tax set up.

That's why the Tax Policy Committee has recommended a whole new approach to our problem of financing education, one that will free us from a system where very often those who can least afford to pay, pay the most. The effective tax rate for families with income under \$3,000 is 14.6 per cent while families with incomes in excess of \$25,000 pay only 3.3 per cent of its taxes.

The most practical, viable answer for the state to take over the responsibility of financing the schools. This is really the essence of the Tax Reform program which I have recommended to the Legislature. Taxation for school purposes would be levied by the state at the rate of \$1 for each \$100 of assessed valuation on real property, and it would be pegged at this level by constitutional amendment to insure against future increases. Since this would raise less than the amount now being raised by the local districts, the difference would be made up by a graduated income tax. This would then place the cost of government where it belongs, on those who can best afford to pay.

The most far-reaching rejection I've heard is the fear that this plan would mean the end of local control of schools. This is a condition the Tax Committee has carefully considered, and I believe, fully insured against. The proposed law provides for local boards of education to carry on the functions they now perform. They would continue to hire teachers, to establish budgets, to plan facilities and all the other responsibilities now assigned to them.

Under the new arrangement, school financing will be based on a per-pupil cost, averaged throughout the state. This means that instead of having rich districts and poor districts, we will eliminate the poor districts. Districts spending more than the state average per pupil will be permitted to continue. In addition, districts desiring to spend more than the state allocation will be able to do so, provided it is first approved by the voters of the district. What we are doing, in effect, is putting a floor on our educational financing. We are saying that no child will receive a substandard education just because he lives in a poor district. At the same time, we are removing the burden of financing education from local properties, while leaving the authority for deciding the educational process at the local level where it belongs.

While state financing of schools will be the principal thrust in reducing property taxes, there will be other factors. The two principal ones will be the assumption of state responsibility for welfare and for most of our judicial system.

I firmly believe that public welfare is the responsibility of the Federal Government. But until the Federal Government recognizes and accepts that responsibility, I agree with the Tax Policy Committee that the state should remove this expensive burden from the counties and municipalities. In addition, relieving property taxes, it will permit the introduction of administrative efficiencies by centralizing what is now an extremely fragmented program.

Similar opportunities for efficiencies are presented by the state, rather than the counties, funding the major portion of our judicial system including the offices of the county prosecutors and their assistants, and the probation services which are desperately in need of standardized and modernized methods of procedure.

The effect of these changes will be to relieve property taxes of all except the funding of what are, essentially, county and municipal services.

## You And Your Pet Parakeets Are Popular Pets

Of the 8,000 known living species of birds, parakeets are among the most popular as household pets. They are easily the most talkative. In fact, one parakeet is said to have a vocabulary exceeding 500 words.

Parakeets, also known as "budgies," "shell parakeets," are considered the most popular parakeets. They keep as pets, probably because they are the most talkative.

Originally, natives of Australia, these birds are long-tailed birds measure about 7.5 inches long.

During the process of domestication, more than 40 distinct color varieties have been established. Each has acquired its distinctive color by selective breeding. The wild Australian parakeet was a green.

Most parakeets, particularly if acquired young, around six weeks old, learn to talk quite well. They have a few dozen astounding vocalizations. The most frequent is a loud, clear, whistle-like sound. It is known as a "whistle" in English, with a reported vocabulary of 40 words, including the word "hello."

When speaking, a young parakeet, if it is kept in the presence of a human, will often repeat words of other parakeets. Or else, it will repeat the words of the human.

It is not infrequently repeated over and over the same word that is being taught. Speak more slowly than normal. Parakeets have a tendency to speed up words when they repeat them.

As soon as one word is learned, teaching can begin on the next.

another. Parakeets can also be taught to do various tricks. They will become very tame with careful handling.

Birds that have been in captivity for many generations, such as canaries and budgies, are quite simple to care for.

While many pet owners keep their birds in ordinary wire cages, these tend to be rather drab.

I would recommend keeping the bird in a box type cage, closed on three sides, top and bottom, and with wire only in the front. Paint the inside with a light color non-toxic paint, such as used for painting baby's toys.

No matter what type of cage you choose, it should have a bottom that is easy to remove and clean without the danger of the bird escaping. Food and water containers should be kept as clean as possible.

Parakeets are fond of chewing on everything they reach, their perches should be of the hardest wood available. Never use metal perches. They are bad for the bird's feet, perches made from wooden dowels can also lead to foot troubles. They are too smooth for secure footing and of the same diameter and curvature. This forces the bird to always bend its toes in the same way.

Many veterinarians, especially those who specialize in the care of birds, recommend perches made from natural twigs or branches cut from trees, such as fruit trees, elm, ash, maple, willow or nut trees. Branches provide a much better natural perch. They give the parakeets a variety of diameters to grip and are rough enough for sure footing.

It is a good policy to do the feeding, watering and cleaning at the same time each day. Birds become accustomed to a routine. They may be disturbed if these operations are performed at unpredictable times. Remember to move slowly and deliberately around birds. Don't make loud sounds as birds are easily frightened by unanticipated movement or sound.

Many seed-eating birds, including parakeets, suffer from malnutrition because their owners are unaware that their seed cups are filled with empty husks, which the birds will not eat even when hungry.

Remember to empty the seed cup and refill it with seeds each day.

Recommended diets consist of a mixture of plain canary seed, with oats and millet. Fresh drinking water, a mineral mixture, cuttlebone and fresh green food are essential, as is a small dish of insoluble grit to aid in digestion.

Fruits, B vitamins, sulfur-containing amino acids, and cod-liver oil have also been suggested.

If you intend to buy an air conditioner this year, we would like to give you some advice about to look for.

It always surprises us how many people take it upon themselves to determine the size of the unit. Manufacturer's specifications are so vague, that for all practical purposes they are useless. They tell you that a certain unit will cool so many square feet, and there is a tiny asterisk after this statement and somewhere, hidden, it is qualified by saying "under favorable conditions" or something to this effect. These favorable conditions never do exist and the claims listed for the size of the room respectively square feet as a rule are vastly exaggerated. For instance, a 200 square room on the first floor on the north side may require 4000 BTU of cooling, while the same size room upstairs or in a converted attic may need 16,000 BTU.

Another frequent misstatement is "just plug into any existing outlet, no need for rewiring." The average 15 amp circuit may take an air conditioner which does not consume more than 75 amps. However, if a refrigerator happens to be on the same line, there will be trouble. Needless to say the same goes if there is a boiler, dishwasher, or other heavy current consuming device on the same line.

All of this has to be carefully checked out. We would strongly advise you to have a survey made by a competent person to determine the size of the unit required where to install the unit, and whether the electrical supply is sufficient.

Peterson is the retired vice president of Hartol Petroleum, Inc., a former subsidiary of Tenneco, Inc. of Houston, Texas.

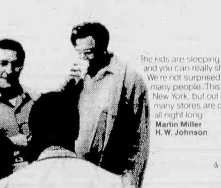

Belleville Music Director Honored At Party

Samuel W. Peck, director of music in the Belleville public schools for the past

twenty-seven and a half years, was honored yesterday at a dinner party held by the

Association of Belleville School Administrators, of which he is an active member. Peck is retiring on June 30.

Prior to coming to Belleville in February of 1945, he was director of the band and orchestra at Wyoming Seminary, Kingston, Pa., from 1929 to 1931, and director of music in the Reading, Mass., public schools from 1931 to 1945. In the fall of 1931 he founded the Reading Symphony Orchestra, and was its conductor until he left to come to Belleville.

Though born in Westboro, Mass., Peck grew up in Sharon, Mass. He earned his A.B. and M.A. degrees at Boston University, and in 1953 Columbia University awarded him a doctorate in Education. He also studied at the American Institute of Normal Methods, Malkin Conservatory of Music, New England Conservatory of Music, Eastman School of Music, West Chester State College, Westminster Choir College, Berkshire Music Center, and at the Mozarteum Academy in Salzburg, Austria. For two years he was a pupil of Arthur Fiedler, of Boston Symphony Pops Orchestra fame, who taught him conducting.

In 1925 he went to Europe to study opera conducting under Bruno Walter, Hans Duhau, and Bernhard Paumgartner. In 1940 he was one of eleven students selected from all over the world to study with Serge Koussevitzky, conductor of the Boston Symphony Orchestra, at Tanglewood in the Berkshires. Other students in the class included Leonard Bernstein, Lukas Foss, Thor Johnson, and Robert Whitney, all of whom became conductors of major symphony orchestras. In Salzburg one of his classmates was William Schuman, composer-conductor, who later became director of the Juilliard School of Music, and who, since 1962, has been head of the Lincoln Center complex in New York.

Dr. Peck has sung in various choruses, among them: the Boston Opera Company, the Mozarteum Choir in Austria, Bethlehem Bach Choir in Pennsylvania, Fred Waring's chorus, the Robert Shaw Chorus, the National Music Supervisors' Chorus, the Mendelssohn Choral Society of Stoughton, Mass. (eldest in the U.S.), and for the past twenty-seven years in the Schola Cantorum of New York under many of the world's most famous conductors among them: Mitropoulos, Walter, Beecham, Munch, Koussevitzky, Baranboim and Bernstein. Next Wednesday he will sing with the Masterwork Chorus in a performance of Beethoven's Ninth Symphony at the Garden State Arts Center in Holmdel, conducted by Henry Lewis.

Peck has been guest conductor of many different orchestras, bands and choruses. This year he was assistant conductor of the North Jersey High School Chorus, in which four of his Belleville High School students were selected by audition to sing. For nearly thirty years he was an organist and choir director in various churches, the last being St. Paul's Methodist in Newark. For several years he conducted the Roche Girls Chorus in Nutley, and was accompanist for the Roche Men's Chorus. As an adjudicator, Peck worked for the U.S. government during the 30's, auditioning musicians for the WPA bands, orchestras and choruses in the state of

Massachusetts, and he has been active in this role ever since.

Some of Dr. Peck's summers have been spent at the New England Music Camp in Oakland, Maine, where he taught piano and trombone, and played tuba or baritone horn in the concert band.

He is probably best known in Belleville for his Baker's Dozen, which he started

twenty-four years ago as a small group which could easily be transported for concerts given outside the high school. This group has sung as many as twenty-five concerts a year. It performed at the N.Y.

World's Fair, and has sung at Christmas time in the Port of New York Authority Bus Terminal in New York for the past sixteen years, and last year was chosen to sing at the Bus Terminal's twentieth

birthday party. Also, for sixteen years, the group has given Christmas concerts at Clara Mass Hospital.
