# **Belleville Reformed 275th Birthday History Steeped**

Belleville Reformed Church on Main Deticulte Reformed Church on Main Street celebrates its 375th anniversary in October. The historical site is the oldest in Belleville and one of the landmarks in Northern New Jersey. History, being a recording of events of ther past, is often incomplete, because of the past, is often incomplete, because of the absence of records. As a consequence facts become legendary and are useful only for the purpose of joining together the known facts to complete the story. Fortunately our records are fairly complete and since we must be brief, due to limited space, we will confine ourselves to the record.

The exact date of the origin of our Church is not known but the known facts indicate that it was established in the year 1697. In the beginning, services were held by Reverand G. Berthoff in conjunction with the church at Acquackanonk. Old records tell us that the original Church building was replaced by a new one in 1725, under the direction of a committee composed of Garrit Weutrerse, Frans Van Dyck, Gideon Van Winkle and Johannes Koning.

Among the by-laws of the Church, passed at that time, was one that seats were to be provided for all within the township of Newark, who contributed toward the Church and who helped with the salary of the pastor. Agrand Sharing of the more influential founders of the original Church, was to retain his pew in the southwest corner of the new edifice the

same as he had in the old Church.

The ground for this new house of God, located where the present Church stands, was conveyed by a deed by Francis Speer and his wife. Catryna. The new building was a square stone structure with a belfry constructed upon the centre of the roof and the sexton, in ringing the bell, stood in the center asise. The belfry was later removed to a stone tower erected in the north end of the Church.

The Rev. Henricus Coens was installed as pastor in 1726. He also served Acquackanonk and other Reformed Churches int northern port of the State. It was during his pastorate that the "Schuyler Trust" was established and to this day, the Church continues to benefit from the proceeds of this bequest. In appreciation, the consistory gave to the Schuylers, the right to call upon any minister of the faitig, when a replacement was required. The first pastor called under this agreement was the Rev. Gerardus Haughnoort from the Church at Freehold. He was installed in 1735. The next fifteen years were eyears of considerable spiritual development and growth for the Church at 1776 and he was buried under the Church During the Revolutionary period and until 1784 the was no regular pastor, services being conducted. # Deputy Police Chief Haight Enrolls In FBI National Academy Program

Three-Month Course Best In The Country

Deputy Police Chief Frank Haight departed last week for a special three-month training session at the FBI National Academy located within the confines of Quantico Marine Corps Base in Virginia.

Haight is the first law enforcement official in the Northern New Jersey area to take advantage of the course. The program, in affiliation with the University of Virginia, awards 15 credit hours of work in five educational subjects for each police officer who satisfactorily completes the academic courses. The FBI National Academy program which offers the same course regular FBI agents take, is seen as the most comprehensive and thorough program a law enforcement official can got rough. The Academy attracts police officials from all over the world into its confines.

To Deputy Chief Haight, entering the program will fulfill a personal goal and to the Belleville Police Department it will benefit by having an officer with the most up to date crime prevention and detection methods.

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

#### By David Moore

In columns past I've gone on at length about the worldwide problem of energy: its supply, use and waste. I haven't changed my view that energy (in general terms that which comes from the sun, is stored over millions of years in gas, coal and oil, and is being used up by modern man at a terrifying rate) remains everybody's biggest environmental problem.

That's why my eye was caught recently by an article in the New York Times which underscored one of those little hangups in today's affairs which contribute mightily to the sinking state the whole world's in. It seems that a spokesman for a big manufacturer of electrical appliances is taking strong exception to efforts of some utility companies to get people to conserve electricity.

It's seldom we get such a clear-cut, naked look at conflicting priorities which add up to a cultural inability to recognize that civilization is on the brink of having to reshape itself somehow to get along without those fossil kinds of energy. At any rate, I guess it's actually refreshing to see the

boys come out of the back room and publicly argue once in awhile.

As I've noted in the past, the huge Consolidated Edison Co. of New York, beset as it is by electricity supply problems, has been urging the public via advertising to "Save a Watt." Public Service Electric and Gas Co. has been doing the same thing here in New Jersey. I've been gratified at these campaigns, even though they've been relatively unsuccessful.

But in the Times story by Gene Smith, I'm told that an executive of the General Electric Co. is touring the country, urging utility companies to lay off that kind of advertising. He happens to be in charge of G.E.'s electric-utility market development, and he is upset by efforts of utilities to reduce public nower demands.

The man from G.E. was quoted as saying, "What I'm doing is offering a sane perspective to this problem." He was said to be perturbed at an apparent movement away from electrical home heating, something which Con Ed is no longer pushing. He argued that electric

heating reduces air pollution and that its demands on a utility, coming in the wintertime, help level off the electric supplier's year-round business.

He also claimed, according to the Times story, that if all houses were heated electrically, overall air pollution would drop by 20 percent. Another 20 percent reduction in air pollution would come "if we got half the ears off the road and switched to electric vehicles," he added.

The G.E. man claimed it would be "a national tragedy" if every utility adopted Con Ed's stance about saving a watt. He asserted there are only limited power shortages, "with only one utility in trouble - Con Edison."

I suppose the G.E. man was jumping to the handy conclusion that continuing increases in electrical consumption can be handled by building more nuclear power plants, as do so many of his brethren in the utility business. The only hitch is that as technology of atomic power grows, more problems, or potential problems, are found to slow down proliferation of "muke plants." The latest, for example, is a new and agonizing doubt about the safety of

atomic reactors in case of cooling system breakdowns, and a new problem with the fuel itself not behaving as expected.

The G.E. man just might have some logic going for him in regard to cutting down air pollution, and saving overall energy at the same time, when he advocates electric heating of homes. My idea about this is that most electrically heated homes now are terribly wasteful of energy. However, with much-needed stiffening of construction quality requirements everywhere, extra household insulation could save a whale of a lot of energy during winer heating.

Added to this solar energy which could make remarkable savings in energy consumption by directly converting sunlight to heat for hot water and heating houses. In our beclouded wintertime, some extra source of heat would often be necessary, but any solar energy which coud be used would be a positive saving.

It all comes back to the fact that energy spells pollution, be it smoke from a fossil- fueled power plant or home furnace, or heat and radioactivity from a nuclear power plant.

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

Dutch Church of Second River."
Reverand Peter Stryker was installed as paster in October 1794. He was the first pastor to conduct services in other than the Dutch tongue allaho he cointinued to preach monthly in the mother tongue. He also constituted the Church of Stone House Plains (Brookdale) in 1801 from members of the western section of our contregation.

In 1804, a violent tornador endered the Church unfit for services and a new edifice was erected and dedicated in 1807. During the period of construction we were permitted to hold services in the Episcopal Church. This demonstration of the ability to work together in a common cause and in unity with other faiths was again demonstrated when in 1835, the use of our Church was permitted during the building of a new Episcopal Church. The same spirit of friendly cooperation was again evident in 1846 during the rehabilitation of the Methodist Church. The same spirit of friendly cooperation was again evident in 1846 during the rehabilitation of the Methodist Church whose congregation were accorded the use of our huiding.

Our present Church was erected and dedicated in the year 1853 during the pastorate of Rev. Isaac S. Demund who in turn was followed by Rev. Thornas DeWitt Talmadge. The latter started his illustrious career here, to be followed by a quarter of a century of service at the Brooklyn Tabernacle and then in Washington, D.C. The building committee for the present church consisted of Messrs. John Van Rensselaer, John H. Joralemon, Nicholas N. Joralemon, John C. Lloyd, James Brown, Sebastian Duncan and Dr. Samuel L. Ward.

In 1882, some 35 Chiese families became members of our Church. They were employed in a laundry across the river. Their children attended our Sunday School.

Our present chapel was built and dedicated in 1895, while Rev. Andrew Hageman was pastor. The dedication service was too one of the most impressive event wirnessed at the Church and included the presentation of several of the memorial windows, The services were offer week long duration and are still a pleasant memory to many of our older members.

In 1915 under the leadership of Rev. J. Garland Hammer, a fund was raised sufficient to obtain from the Carnege Foundation, a like amount with which to purchase a new organ which is still in use and has served to make more impressive, our religious and other services.

By 1927 the pollution had been reduced to a minimum and under the leadership of our present pastor, the Rev. John A. Struyk, a program of rehabilitation was begun which, when finished, attracted many
