

Belleville Reformed 275th Birthday History Steeped

(Belleville Reformed Church on Main Street celebrates its 275th anniversary in October. The historical site is the oldest in Belleville and one of the landmarks in Northern New Jersey. The Anniversary Committee of Belleville Reformed, in conjunction with the celebration, pieced together this historical sketch of the church. E.A.)

History, being a recording of events of the past, is often incomplete, because of the absence of records. As a consequence facts become legendary and are useful only for the purpose of joining together the known facts to complete the story. Fortunately our records are fairly complete and since we must be brief, due to limited space, we will confine ourselves to the record.

The exact date of the origin of our Church is not known but the known facts indicate that it was established in the year 1697. In the beginning, services were held by Reverend G. Berthoff in conjunction with the church at Acquackanonk. Old records tell us that the original Church building was replaced by a new one in 1725, under the direction of a committee composed of: Garrill Weurterse, Frans Van Dyck, Gideon Van Winkle and Johannes Koning.

Among the by-laws of the Church, passed at that time, was one that seats were to be provided for all within the township of Newark, who contributed toward the Church and who helped with the salary of the pastor. Arent Schuyler, who was apparently one of the more influential founders of the original Church, was to retain his pew in the southwest corner of the new edifice the

same as he had in the old Church.

The ground for this new house of God, located where the present Church stands, was conveyed by a deed by Francis Speer and his wife, Catryna. The new building was a square stone structure with a belfry constructed upon the centre of the roof and the sexton, in ringing the bell, stood in the center aisle. The belfry was later removed to a stone tower erected in the north end of the Church.

The Rev. Henricus Coens was installed as pastor in 1726. He also served Acquackanonk and other Reformed Churches in the northern part of the State. It was during his pastorate that the "Schuyler Trust" was established and to this day, the Church continues to benefit from the proceeds of this bequest. In appreciation, the consistory gave to the Schuylers, the right to call upon any minister of the faith, when a replacement was required. The first pastor called under this agreement was the Rev. Gerardus Haughton from the Church at Freehold. He was installed in 1735. The next fifteen years were years of considerable spiritual development and growth for the Church and town. Rev. Haughton served until his death in 1776 and he was buried under the Church. During the Revolutionary period and until 1784 there was no regular pastor, services being conducted by the Voorloper or Clerk of the Church.

In 1784, Rev. Henricus Schoonmaker, pastor of the Acquackanonk Church entered into an agreement to supply part of the time. On June 5, 1790 the Church became incorporated as "The Reformed

Make More Comprehensive

Mayor Shelves Moratorium Bill After Attorneys Attack

Mayor Joseph McGreevy Tuesday night tabled his proposed ordinance for a two-year moratorium on apartment construction in Belleville after a heated public hearing on the question.

The Mayor tabled his proposal after two well-known attorneys attending

the Tuesday night Commission meeting suggested the measure in its present form may be unconstitutional, discriminatory and place an unfair burden on property owners here. Of all the residents in attendance who spoke on the bill, the majority were against its adoption in its present form.

Both Belleville lawyer

Robert Gaccione and former Town Attorney Jack Soriano addressed the Commission on the moratorium matter. The two said they were speaking on behalf of private clients who either at present have applications for the construction of apartments in Town or in the near future are considering making application or erection of apartments here.

McGreevy, after listening to remarks made at the public hearing, moved that the bill be tabled for further study. The remainder of the Commission concurred and the Board voted unanimously to shelve the proposal.

McGreevy said that he may want to make the measure "more comprehensive" in light of a recent Belleville Planning Board release of a detailed map of zoning districts in Town.

"I have to take the Planning Board's recommendations into consideration before ordering a final vote on the proposed ordinance," remarked McGreevy.

Commissioner Mary

Senatore too reportedly has

some interesting statistics about apartment construction in Belleville and how it affects the School System and rateables here.

Mrs. Senatore revealed last week that she has researched Essex County Planning Board records of a survey on

apartments here and their effect on the Town but she added that she is saving the results of that survey.

"I'll release my figures when the Mayor tells me the results of his survey," said

Liquor License Measure Tabled

Commissioners tabled Tuesday night a proposed bill which would shorten the minimum distance between taverns on Washington Avenue after liquor license owners here turned out in force to protest adoption of the measure.

Led by Belleville attorney Leslie Finch, who was urging defeat of the bill on behalf of a client, 30 liquor license owners here would attend the Tuesday Commission meeting. Finch claimed the adoption of such an ordinance would directly affect a court case he is now involved in. Several private residents attending the hearing joined with Finch and the liquor proprietors in urging the defeat of the bill because it catered to special interests.

The proposed ordinance introduced by Commissioner Vincent Strumolo would change on the Route 7 portion of Washington Avenue from 1250 to 200 feet the minimum distance from one alcoholic beverage outlet to another.

Finch is representing the Princeton Grill in halting the transfer of a liquor license from the Villa Italia Restaurant to the Belleville Motel on Washington Avenue. After Commissioners six months ago approved the transfer, Finch had that ruling overturned by the State ABC Board. The Villa Italia in turn is now appealing the

State ABC decision to the Appellate Division of Superior Court.

Finch claims should the Commission adopt the bill it would make that case before the court "mute" because the Villa Italia would then be less than 1250 feet but more than 200 feet from the Princeton Grill on Joramelon Street and not in violation of any ordinance.

Strumolo said he introduced the bill to stimulate business on Washington Avenue.

After-BEA Complains

School Board Tables Sick Leave Resolution

A resolution changing certain Board of Education bylaws governing sick leave pay was tabled for further study by the School Board Monday night.

The unanimous vote to table the resolution came after a Belleville Education Association official cautioned the Board that adopting the resolution might violate a two-year contract with teachers here.

The Board of Education sought to delete a subsection from the "allowance for personal illness" clause in its bylaws stating "after 30 days of service, sick leave in excess of the above shall be left to the discretion of the Board of Education."

The School Board wanted to instead replace that clause with wording stating "an employee whose sick leave allowance is exhausted, and who continues to be absent will not receive any further compensation in the form of

salary from the Belleville Board of Education. If an employee is concerned about a salary continuation program in the event of a serious prolonged illness, it is recommended that he purchase insurance coverage

through an income protection plan."

The Board, after tabling the resolution, promised to meet with the BEA to further discuss the change. Jerry Kennedy, for the BEA, was on hand Monday night.

Publisher Named As Nixon Booster

The publisher of a chain of Essex County newspapers has been appointed as the Essex County Chairman for the Re-Election of the President.

Frank A. Orechio of Nutley was announced as chairman today by Governor William T. Cahill, chairman of the New Jersey Committee for the Re-Election of the President, and former State Senator Harry L. Sears, State campaign chairman.

In making the announcement, Sears said that Orechio was recommended for the key campaign post by Essex GOP Chairman George Walhauser. "Although the Committee for the Re-Election of the President is a separate entity, it will be working closely with the County Republican organization," Sears said.

New Position Created

Mrs. Shader Will Get \$2,600 Pay Boost

The Board of Education Monday night granted School Board secretary Mrs. Mary B. Shader a \$2,600 increase in pay and tacked on a new title of business administrator effective January 1, 1973. The unanimous vote came after a heated debate between residents and Board members over the wisdom of such a move.

Mrs. Shader will assume most of the duties of the current business administrator Harold Dufford, who will retire at the end of this year after over 35 years of service.

The resolution adopted Monday states that Mrs. Shader will take over purchasing and supply management; pupil transportation; food service; insurance and personnel management for positions in above areas. The School Board will also create two new positions to help Mrs. Shader with the

work load developed by Dufford's retirement. In the near future the School Board will hire a supervisor of buildings in the \$12-15,000 range and an accountant in the \$10-12,000 range.

According to Mahmorian, it will cost an additional \$2,500 in cash cost to replace Dufford, give Mrs. Shader her raise and create and fill two new positions. Many of

the residents on hand Monday disagreed with Mahmorian's figures and claimed that changing the complexion of the administrative offices would actually cost taxpayers up to \$29,000.

Mahmorian also told residents that the \$2,500 immediate deficit would eventually be made up many fold by making the board

Bellboys Traveling Again To Face Wishbone Bengals

Belleville's varsity gridgers face another stern test Saturday afternoon when they clash with the Bengals of Bloomfield in a Big Ten Conference contest. Game Time is 1:30 p.m. at Foley Field in Bloomfield.

The Blue and Gold defensive eleven, which played such an outstanding game last Saturday against the Knights of West Essex, will be called upon again to hold the game within range for the offensive squad. Captain Robert Luongo and his defenders will be facing the much publicized wishbone offense of Bloomfield.

Head coach Rocco Cafone reports that although the wishbone set does create problems to defense with its quarterback options, only minor changes and adjustments will be made on the Belleville side.

"Our boys played excellent defense against West Essex but we will only make minor adjustments. Our defense played well so I see no need to change now," Cafone remarked.

The Bellboys dropped a close contest to an excellent Bloomfield team last Fall, 13-8, and the Blue and Gold will receive added incentive to reverse that decision Saturday. It will be the second straight away contest for Belleville, before the team returns home for its opener against arch-rival Nutley on October 7.

The Sam Cavallaro coached Bengals also lost their season opener Saturday when they were edged by a top rated Seton Hall squad, 13-7. But because of their strong showing, Bloomfield will be rated a favorite going into Saturday's encounter. Belleville plays Seton Hall later during the season.

Belleville may have problems suiting up a fit quarterback when it travels to Foley Field Saturday. Junior Bill Telesco was injured in the first quarter of the West Essex game and his stand-in, Joe West Essex, also a junior, also received an injury. Both signal-callers are suffering.

Deputy Police Chief Haight Enrolls In FBI National Academy Program

Three-Month Course Best In The Country

Deputy Police Chief Frank Haight departed last week for a special three-month training session at the FBI National Academy located within the confines of Quantico Marine Corps Base in Virginia.

Haight is the first law enforcement official in the Northern New Jersey area to take advantage of the course. The program, run in affiliation with the University of Virginia, awards 15 credit hours of work in five educational subjects for each police officer who satisfactorily completes the academic courses.

The FBI National Academy program, which offers the same course regular FBI agents take, is seen as the most comprehensive and thorough program a law enforcement official can go through. The Academy attracts police officials from all over the world into its confines.

To Deputy Chief Haight, entering the program will fulfill a personal goal and to the Belleville Police Department it will benefit by having an officer with the most up to date crime prevention and detection methods.

"I guess you could call this the fulfillment of a lifelong

am," said Haight, who began the course Monday.

"It's taken many years for me to get the opportunity to enroll in the FBI Academy but I think it will be worth it," he remarked.

Haight will have a full day at the FBI Academy and he ended the upcoming experience to going to college. According Haight, he will spend a full eight hours, five days a week in various classes, and evening hours, when he returns to his "military," will be devoted almost fully to studying. Haight expects to find time though to return weekends to his family in

Golden Comments

With vacation's end of backbreaking home chores and an opportunity to scan the pages of the papers once again, one comes upon several headlines that cause consternation and misgivings about the soundness and even the integrity of all levels of our government and those upon whom we repose our confidence to discharge the duties of high office with honesty and a dedicated sense of fair dealing in handling the affairs of the people.

Daring headlines which proclaim, "Ex-Lawmaker's Firm Won Security Job-PARKWAY ADMITS TO CONTRACT IRREGULARITIES" Another stating "JERSEY MISUSES TRANSIT TAX PAID BY NEW YORKERS." THEN THE CLINCHER — "HEARINGS TO FOCUS ON 4 COUNTIES-SCI TARGETS MUNICIPAL CORRUPTION." One is left aghast at the terror conjured up in the average citizen's mind by such flagrant charges of corruption in high offices of trust. Is there no agency beyond the influence of evil? Many are prone to ask. It is indeed upsetting and thought provoking.

These latest developments, together with the furor created over the scandals attending the conviction of former Governor Hughes' Secretary of State Bob Burkhardt and the latest mess caused by the indictment of Governor Cahill's Secretary of State Paul J. Sherwin have shattered the public's confidence in most public officials and their office holding appointees.

The corruption plagues all strata of our political agencies even the structure of our Model Cities programming comes under attack by the threat of a Congressional Oversight Task Force investigation of alleged misspending and poor accounting in the Newark program.

Much disgust and dissatisfaction is expressed by an overwrought populace determined to put a quick halt to these unpardonable misdeeds. Little succor can be expected by any officer holder, past or present, who may become enmeshed in the foils of justice now being marshalled to uncover and expose any dastardly crime they may have committed.

Even more harrowing, like in MacBeth, are the tortured and harried minds and consciences of those who may have done wrong and now, in fear, anticipate the stigma and punitive sentences which may be invoked against them. We do not know whom these culprits are, but they do. It is they who must now bear their crooked crosses. If guilty they deserve their just due.

In view of the foregoing, it is interesting to observe that Assemblyman Carl Orechio, hailing from our neighboring town of Nutley has been picked by Assembly Speaker Tom Kean (R-Essex) to serve on the newly created legislative Committee to prepare a conflict of interest law and a code of ethics for elected and appointed officials at the municipal and county level, as well as members of local Boards of Education. The Assemblyman's past experiences in local government as a former Nutley commissioner will prove helpful in this overdue effort to stamp-out corruption in public office.

Unfortunately, in the past, many well intended similar legislative moves have been undertaken. Legislation was prepared. Its merits extolled. The press urged its adoption into law...then, alas, the lawmakers who would be most controlled by such reforms refused to pass the measure into law.

Let's hope this much needed correctional control over the conduct of our public officials will succeed this time around...but don't bet on it. Most of the pretentious promises of our lawmakers turn out to be buncombe.

Mrs. Sally Hood sounds a strong note at the last town commission meeting when she inquires "How Come" it's now September and we still don't have the Annual Budget report which was due in May?

The lady's right, despite the explanation given her that the delay was occasioned by the death of Mr. A.M. Hart, head of the audit firm. The State granted an extension until July because of the emergency, then the local commissioners passed a resolution granting another extension. They did the same thing last year, when there was no death in the firm. Mr. Hoening, is a most capable member of this firm, well qualified to complete the audit within the specified time limits set down by the State.

A further quirk possibly may be raised since the audit contract the town has with the A.M. Hart Co. reputedly, is now being performed by S. Klein Associates through some type merger with the A.M. Hart Co., probably due to the demise of Mr. Hart.

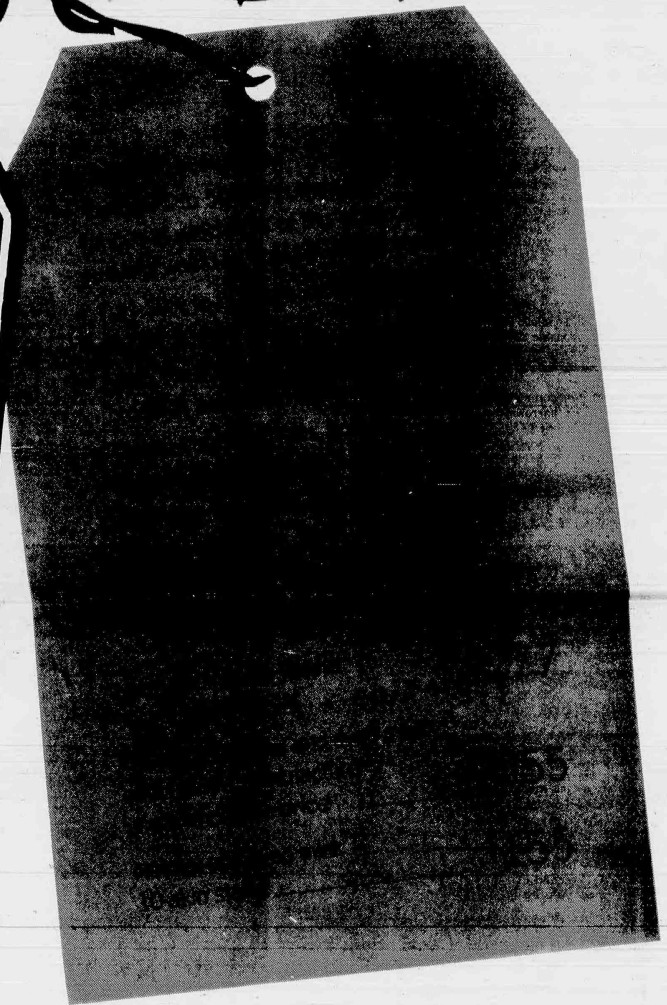

Look Under Leaves For Lace Bugs

Be sure to get thorough coverage of the lower leaf surfaces when you spray to control lace bugs, urges William F. Munk, senior county agricultural agent of Essex County.

You can expect to find these pests on London plane, hawthorn, azalea, Pieris (Andromeda), and rhododendron.

Leaves of azalea may become so bleached because lace bugs are sucking out the juices that you may suspect chlorosis sometimes caused by a lack of proper nutrients.

However a close look at the leaves probably will show the tell-tale excrement spots of the lace bugs which attack plane trees. They overwinter in adults and fly to newly expanding leaves during early May to lay their eggs. Lace bugs that attack the broad-leaf evergreens overwinter in the egg stage on leaves, and the eggs hatch in May.

Dutch Church of Second River. Reverend Peter Stryker was installed as pastor in October 1794. He was the first pastor to conduct services in other than the Dutch tongue altho he continued to preach monthly in the mother tongue. He also constituted the Church of Stone House Plains (Brookdale) in 1801 from members of the western section of our congregation.

In 1804, a violent tornado rendered the Church unfit for services and a new edifice was erected and dedicated in 1807. During the period of construction we were permitted to hold services in the Episcopal Church. This demonstration of the ability to work together in a common cause and in unity with other faiths was again demonstrated when in 1835, the use of our Church was permitted during the building of a new Episcopal Church. The same spirit of friendly cooperation was again evident in 1846 during the rehabilitation of the Methodist Church whose congregation were accorded the use of our building.

Our present Church was erected and dedicated in the year 1853 during the pastorate of Rev. Isaac S. Demund who in turn was followed by Rev. Thomas DeWitt Talmage. The latter started his illustrious career here, to be followed by a quarter of a century of service at the Brooklyn Tabernacle and then in Washington, D.C. The building committee for the present church consisted of Messrs. John Van Rensselaer, John H. Joralemon, Nicholas N. Joralemon, John C. Lloyd, James Brown, Sebastian Duncan and Dr. Samuel L. Ward.

In 1882, some 35 Chinese families became members of our Church. They were employed in a laundry across the river. Their children attended our Sunday School.

Our present chapel was built and dedicated in 1895, while Rev. Andrew Hageman was pastor. The dedication service was one of the most impressive events ever witnessed at the Church and included the presentation of several of the memorial windows. The services were of week long duration and are still a pleasant memory to many of our older members.

In 1915 under the leadership of Rev. J. Garland Hammer, a fund was raised sufficient to obtain from the Carnegie Foundation, a like amount with which to purchase a new organ which is still in use and has served to make more impressive, our religious and other services.

The Old Church, with its congregations including many prominent citizens of the Town, suffered from river pollution, causing many of our constituents to move elsewhere and the buildings to deteriorate until 1926. By 1927 the pollution had been reduced to a minimum and under the leadership of our present pastor, the Rev. John A. Stryker, a program of rehabilitation was begun which, when finished, attracted many

new members.

Our building looks about the same as 25 years ago except the front was landscaped. A new bulletin sign board erected 1960, in addition to the one that has a weekly message. Looking toward the river there is "progress" to accept in the form of a "Monster" or call it what you will. The nice parkway on the other side of Main Street by the river and the maple trees on our lawn are gone with history. New is the pretty dogwood tree.

So much for church building and grounds, of which the original founders would probably be very proud!

Our organizations provide for fellowship and mission work. The Ladies' Aid, the Guild, the Sunday School Junior and other departments support missions at Annville, Twin Wells Mission, Winnchago, and Taiwan, mentioning a few. The Missionary Society was 75 years old in 1950.

The Couples and Friendship Club, Stamp Club, Youth Canteen, Choir, concerts and Talent Shows promote fellowship as well as spiritual inspiration. Girl Scouts and Sea Scouts hold regular meetings weekly.

The Ladies' Guild was started in 1960. A nursery program during church hour started also. In the summer some of our youth attend conferences.

Another source of spiritual enlightenment is through music. A Junior Choir started in 1947. They sang many times alone, and also with the Senior Choir, looking very sweet in their hand made gowns. Recently our organist made a record of vocal and organ music, of which many people became owners.

The youth of the church is the future church and there have been youth groups which, over the years, have had serious services, joyous affairs, and done mission work in many areas including the church home.

A Bible Club met every Saturday morning for children and Vacation Bible School in the summer. Attendance at that went to the sixties in number.

As our 275th year comes to a close, we look forward to the future. Today, even though our congregation has shrunk due to members moving too far away, we remember our real place in God's plan is mission. So we look to the future generations of the church to grow "inward to ourselves, outward toward others, and upward to God". There are many who have left us in these twenty-five years and many more of us will join them in the next twenty-five but with God's help and guidance our prayers for the future beg for peace, courage, and harmony for many more years for the Church of Second River by which Belleville (the Beautiful Village) was once known.

So it is very befitting as the next new church season starts, that we have a new pastor who is going to lead and show us the "way home".

He is in the Law Enforcement and Education and Training in Law Enforcement.

Haight, when he completes the course, hopes to impart his newly acquired knowledge to the Belleville Police Department.

"That will be one of the biggest benefits of the course bringing back to Belleville what I learned at the Academy," he said.

Qualifying for the FBI Academy course is a long, tedious and difficult process. According to Haight, he was subjected to an extremely comprehensive medical examination and a thorough check of his background. The waiting list for entrance to the Academy is several years and Haight reports he first made application for the course in 1967.

Haight, who has been a member of the Belleville Police Force over 24 years, has made law enforcement his life's work and he sees his entrance into the Academy as the highest and best way to enhance his career.

"I've entered and completed several law enforcement courses throughout my years as a police officer but this course by far should prove to be the most rewarding," added Haight.

fering from sprained wrists received in Saturday's action. To make matters worse, quarterback Mike Dondarski, another fill-in on the varsity, bruised his ribs in this week's jayvee encounter.

Scouting reports show that the Bengals utilize quarterback John Stanford, six-foot and 195 pounds to run out of the option. Bloomfield's strongest point is its running attack, centering around two backfield veterans in Felix Flores and Wayne Ropley. Coach Cavallaro reports that although the team is strong in the backfield, almost the entire line is inexperienced. The Bengal defense is a stubborn unit, limiting powerhouse Seton Hall to only two touchdowns. The Bengals had seven wins against two losses last Fall and the Big Ten power is expected to do that well again this year.

Belleville, if it expects to upset the Bengals, must cut down on costly mistakes that robbed them from a victory against West Essex. The Bellboys again must show

that stubborn and aggressive defense, but even more important, the offense must execute better.

The Blue and Gold had four turnovers against West Essex and a fumble in the fourth quarter cost them the game. Although the passing attack did show signs of potency, coach Cafone reports that passes were clearly dropped at least three times. The Bellboys threw 16 times and completed four.

"Our pass blocking was good and most passes were thrown," said Cafone. "Many times our receivers were open but there were too many balls dropped."

The Bellboys' running game left a lot to be desired. Although Joe Ross and Joe Troise did make several good runs, too many times blocking assignments were missed and runners were thrown for losses in the backfield. Coach Cafone explained that inexperience on the line hurt Belleville's running attack and too many blocking assignments were missed when West Essex linebackers stunted on running plays.

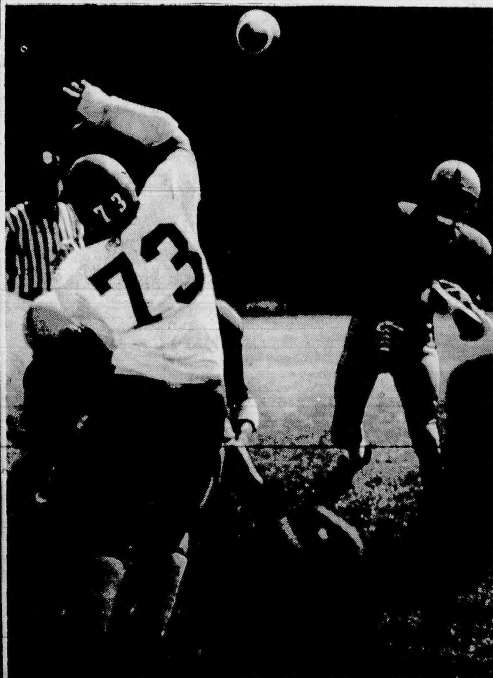
"They (West Essex) brought almost everybody up on the line and blitzed into our backfield and played bump and run with our receivers," said Cafone. One can buy a brand new portable b/w TV set for about \$100. - and it has the advantage of not being so large and bulky as the old set and can be carried around easily.

It should be mentioned that it is a common misconception though that portable TV sets cost less to repair. This is incorrect. As a rule the only saving is for transportation to the shop and back to the home. Most people bring them in and take them out instead of having us pick them up and deliver them. Portable sets are sold with the understanding that they have to be brought to the shop for a free repair in case of failure during the duration of the guarantee. The margin of profit on portable sets is so small that free home calls can not be made. So if you call your repairman for a repair of a portable TV, you might as well be prepared to pay him for a home call, a charge which you would save if you would bring the set to the shop.

Belleville Distance Runners Drop First Two Meets Of '72 Season

The Belleville varsity cross-country team dropped its first two meets of the 1972 season last week. The local harriers

lost to a steady performing Orange team and then were defeated by a very powerful Columbia squad. Both meets

were held at Belleville Park. The Belboys were beaten in their opener, last week, by a slim 22-33 margin.

The distance runners raced Barringer High School on Tuesday at Belleville Park and then travel to Mountain High School today. The club is back home tomorrow to face an improved Montclair team. Coach Ray Haneke reports that the team has good chances of winning two of the three next meets, which would bring them closer to the coveted 500 mark.

Benjamin Bennett of O.H.S. placed first with an excellent 13:34 time in the Belleville season opener. The Bellboy harriers' Bill "Goody" Goodwin crossed the finish line first for the local team. Goodwin came in at third place. His time was a good 14:11.

Goodwin was doubtful before the meet, complaining of soreness in his left heel, but he still ran well. Promising sophomore Walter Suibis placed sixth with a 14:59 clocking while captain Rocco Cuozzo, Peter Fitzpatrick and Mike Fortino finished seventh, eighth and ninth respectively.

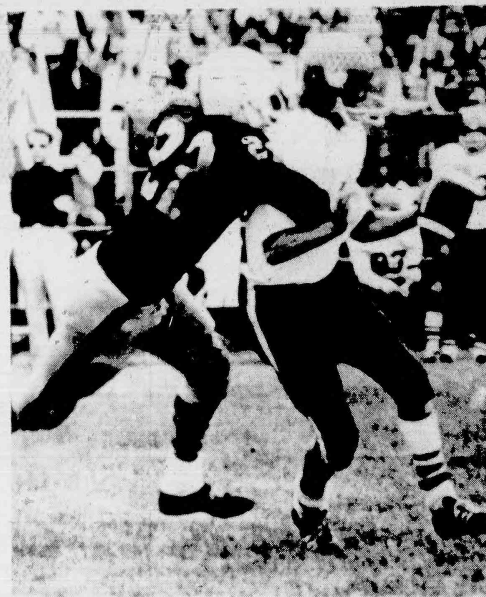
Sophomores Brian Wood and Ron Lamoureux finished 12th and 13th, while junior performers Steve Dyla, Wayne Kellenbence and Dan DeSantis placed 15th, 17th and 21st to round out the field of 24 runners.

Last Friday's meet against potent Columbia, one of the best teams in the Big Ten Conference and a top Essex County contender, defeated the Belboys without any trouble by a 15-50 shutout score. Columbia took the first twelve spots, until Bill Goodwin came in 13th with a 13:40 time.

Peter Davis of Columbia ran a fantastic 11:34 for the two and one-half mile course. Davis is rated one of the top runners in the Big Ten. Belleville's Fitzpatrick, who placed 19th, still ran well, with a 14:16 time, while soph's Suibis and Fortino followed in 21st and 22nd. Other finishers for the Belboys were Cuozzo, Kellenbence and Syls. Brian Wood and DeSantis placed 27th and 28th.

The day before the Columbia race Belleville coach Ray Haneke reportedly measured the course to be 2.7 miles. An official cross-country race is 2.5 miles, so Haneke shortened the course by starting the meet with a three-tenths lap instead of a half-mile start.

The Belleville harriers' attack was weakened somewhat when strong running junior, Steve Budrick, was sidelined with a pulled ligament in his left leg. Budrick, however, is expected to be back in action this week.
