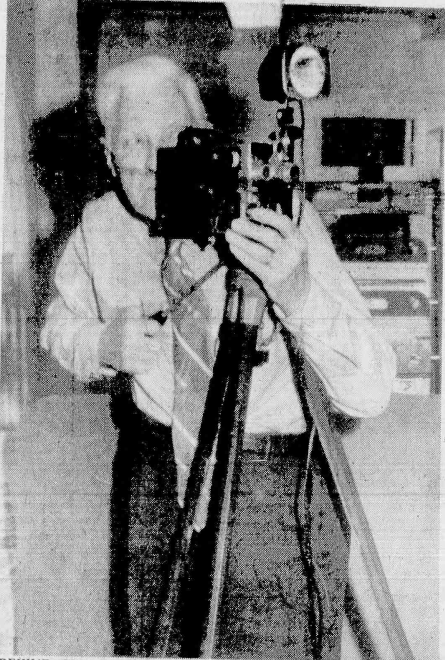

Man Behind the Camera has 2 Decades experience



BEHIND THE CAMERA and in his familiar pose is Neil Horne, sole producer, director and cameraman in tomorrow night's "Old Belleville" film festival epic at Belleville High School.

The man behind the camera, and the picture, is Neil Horne, who is the Belleville Historical Society's sponsor of the showing of a full-length movie made in Town over 30 years ago is Neil P. Horne, a home film buff who is both owner and maker of the Belleville flick.

Raised and schooled in Belleville, Horne now resides in West Caldwell with his wife, the former Eleanor Hagemann. But over the years he has kept in close contact with friends here and still considers Belleville his "Home Town." In fact, his great love of the Town is what prompted him to film a full-length movie here. The feat, accomplished in February, March and April of 1934, takes about three hours of viewing time, and that's after considerable editing.

Still, the film is of a high quality and is invaluable to history-oriented residents here.

Although many Belleville residents know Horne through his efforts on the Belleville film, the amateur film maker is better known throughout the area for his film library of famous people. The former Belleville boasts a vault of over 1,500 film shorts taken over a 42-year span with personalities ranging from millionaire recluse Howard Hughes to ex-heavyweight champ Joe Louis. Actually, the list of famous persons filmed by Horne is almost endless and runs a complete course, from Hollywood stars, to top sports figures, to well-known

2 Captains, Another Deputy

Police Force Will Get 3 Executive Officers

A Robert Laterza sponsored ordinance creating three more police executives cleared a public hearing without much discussion and then was unanimously adopted by Town Fathers Tuesday night.

The measure would increase the number of deputy chiefs from two to three and add two more police captains, bringing that total to five. According to Commissioner Laterza, director of Public Safety, the adding of more executive officers, when completed, would cost the Town about an ad-

ditional \$26,000. Laterza said that eventually two or three new patrolmen would have to be added to the force.

While Laterza was painting a picture of the "need for increased protection in Town," two residents attending the public hearing spoke against the measure. Both citizens saw the proposal as unnecessary at this time and felt that the creation of the new positions would add nothing constructive to the force, but only increase the taxpayers' burden.

"We may wind up with too many chiefs and not enough Indians," said

Joseph Granese, a Silver Lake resident. Granese told the Board that he took his own private survey of executive officers in neighboring Nutley and the results showed that in Nutley there are less "brass" than in Belleville, yet the population and police force of both Towns remain about the same.

Granese explained that Nutley, with a population of about 35,000, had one police chief, one deputy chief, four captains and five sergeants.

"I'm not saying that we don't need the protection in Town but why must these officers be brass."

Recheck Traffic Survey

Laterza's Parking Bill Tabled for More Study

Belleville Commissioners Tuesday night voted 4-1 to table a Robert Laterza sponsored parking ordinance for further study despite the objections of the Public Safety director.

The areas of controversy arose when residents of Cedar Hill Avenue and Mt. Prospect Avenue complained that a proposal for alternate side of the street parking on those two thoroughfares may not be the solution to traffic problems there.

Cedar Hill Avenue residents attending the public hearing on the proposal complained to Laterza that the measure in its present form does not alleviate the dangerous traffic conditions that exist there. Those citizens were concerned that the measure failed to mention Sunday parking prohibitions. Sunday, they claimed, was the busiest time of the week when children were at home and at play.

Commissioner Laterza told residents that he based his ordinance on a traffic survey taken in the area and that the survey showed Sunday was not the busiest day of the week.

Commissioner Michael Marotti questioned the wisdom of the survey and added that Sunday was when most people were home so the safety factor involved should come more into play then.

Mrs. Mary Senatore, director of Public Works, asked that Laterza have the bill tabled until residents of the area could meet with the director of Public Safety to further discuss traffic and safety problems on Cedar Hill Avenue.

"I believe we should have the traffic survey rechecked. Most kids do their running around on Sunday," suggested Commissioner Vincent Strumolo.

All four Commissioners, including Mayor Joseph McGreevy, suggested that the measure be tabled until the survey could be rechecked and Laterza could meet with residents of the area in question.

Laterza though saying he would cooperate, had full faith in this survey and voted to pass the ordinance without change.

Check For \$282 Received

First Monies Are Realized From Glass Reclamation Drive

The glass reclamation drive in Belleville the last several months showed a positive affect this week with the realization of a \$282 check from an area firm. The money, profits from hauling tons of reclaimed glass to a Jersey City reclamation installation, was presented to the Shade Tree Committee by Mrs. Mary Senatore, Director of Public Works.

Mrs. Senatore and her Public Works employees have proved invaluable the past few months in both collecting and then storing the glass garnered by the Shade Tree Committee. Public Works employees too have carted the containers to Jersey City for reclamation on monthly trips. To provide a more central location and a more efficient operation the Shade Tree Committee this week has changed its collection dates from bi-monthly to monthly. This Saturday's collection has been cancelled. The next collection is January 23 at People's Bank on Washington Avenue. Shade Tree Committee members stressed that residents become aware that there will be only monthly collections and those will from now on be held at the People's Bank location.

"All totaled, the reclamation effort has netted over 17 tons of glass for which we will receive over \$300," said Mrs. Senatore. "My Department will continue to cooperate with the effort but I urge residents to give more cooperation."

Mrs. Senatore announced that all interested businesses

or residents with large amounts of glass to be collected may call 759-1356 to have that glass picked up. She said that all monies realized from the project will be funneled back to the Shade Tree Department for the beautification of the Town.

"I'm sure residents can

cooperate more than they have been doing. In my home alone we fill two shopping bags full of glass per week. Imagine the funds we can gain if every resident saved their glass," added Commissioner Senatore.

The \$282 check received by the Shade Tree Department

will go into a special fund. It is expected that in the Spring those funds will be used for tree and shrubbery. This is the second check received from the glass reclamation project. The first check had a \$68 amount but the project has been picking up in recent weeks.

The festival will be shown in Belleville High School auditorium and the doors will open at 7:15 p.m. The BHS Band will entertain until curtain time at 8 p.m.

A somewhat hybrid affair I'd call it.

It is most unfortunate that some of the foregoing questions were not called upon to be answered before this matter was disposed of. I've received some reports that leave doubt as to just why more deliberation was not given this matter. Looks like they could well stand a good "watchdog" around the "Hall" again. politics. Horne's behind-the-scenes stories of how he captured many "up-tight" personalities on film sometimes prove just as interesting as the film itself. Many times Horne had to sneak through police barricades or pose as a news correspondent, or wait hours on a park bench outside an apartment building for his subject to come along; but the innovative filmer usually found a way to "get his man."

Most of his film inventory though, was accumulated through courteous letter-writing, asking for a private sitting. Surprisingly enough, that approach works most of the time. But Horne has been more aggressive in his picture-taking. Like the time he filmed Great Garbo through a telephone booth or sneaking on location during the filming of "Hello Dolly" and capturing Barbara Streisand on his private film.

Horne began his hobby in film shortly after high school, over 40 years ago. Oddly enough, he sold his interest in a Belleville newspaper to purchase his first camera and equipment.

"I had just completed my second year at Columbia University when myself and a

few friends thought Belleville was ripe for a newspaper of its own," explained Horne. "So I dropped out of school to found 'The Belleville News' with four other friends."

That venture lasted about two years before Horne discovered there were "too many cooks boiling the soup." He sold his interest in the paper and bought his own movie camera with the money realized from the paper.

"I bought the equipment

just to take pictures of the family but my shooting James Paddock, then billed as the 'world's fastest human' changed my whole outlook on filming," added Horne.

Horne, at the time, was working for a Newark firm and the publicity department there got him a filming with Babe Ruth.

"That opened the doors for me," Horne said. "Ruth was the hero of the day and my

filming of him was my ticket to other personalities."

His first efforts took place in 1928 and he has been going strong ever since. Although Horne has held many jobs throughout the area, he has never sacrificed for his main interest in film making, and his movie library, with almost 1,500 separate films, shows the fruit of his efforts. Horne hopes to retire from his position as manager with Channel Lumber in Cedar Grove sometime next year to devote all his time to his hobby.

Horne lists an impressive total of having met and filmed 1,637 famous personalities spanning over two decades. Over 1,000 of them are well-known sports figures.

"I've shown portions of my collection to various fraternal groups in the area I believe there is considerable interest

in the film library and I think my collection could be the only one of its type."

Horne, married in 1940 in Belleville, has two children. Neil Jr. is basketball coach at Westfield High School and his daughter, Mrs. Lois Doherty, resides in Wallingford, Conn. His wife Eleanor taught at Belleville's School No. 8 for over 25 years. The couple now resides in West Caldwell.

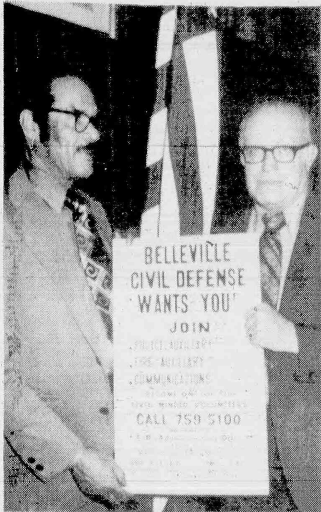

Scott Settles \$450M Suit

A South Orange girl and her family have accepted a settlement of \$450,000 in the Essex County Superior Court. The case arose out of an accident which occurred on June 23rd, 1970 in South Orange. At that time Leslie Shupin, age 6, was struck by a garbage truck owned by the Maplewood Disposal Company as she was playing in front of her home. She suffered extensive injuries of the lower portion of her body.

Judgements totaling \$450,000 were entered in favor of the Shupin family and against the South Orange Disposal Company. The judgements were entered before Judge H. Curtis Meador of the Superior Court—sitting in Newark. Leslie Shupin and her family were represented by Belleville attorney John R. Scott. Scott is also the Belleville town attorney.

They Bail Out Pre-Schooler Care Center

After last Thursday, St. Bridget's Church of Newark should be considerably closer to meeting the financial needs of its Community Day Care Center for Pre-School Children, thanks to people like Mrs. Betty Valladares, Mrs. Blanche McCombe, and a group of concerned friends, all of whom were in Belleville.

The group planned a card party for that date to be held in St. Peter's auditorium, 152 William Street, Belleville.

"The idea for the Card Party developed very quickly about a month ago," said Betty Valladares, "when my husband and I were telling some friends of the Day Care Center's financial need, and how we were looking for some way to help St. Bridget's raise some money."

When the Card Party was suggested, Mrs. Valladares contacted Msgr. Richard M. McGuinness, pastor of St. Bridget's, and Father Ray Gora, also of that parish who administers the Day Care Center, for permission to conduct it—which was quickly granted.

"Things began to fall in line rapidly," said Mrs. Valladares. "You'd be amazed at the number of people who were willing to help, even on such short notice, and we are very confident that this affair will be a huge success because of the enthusiasm of the Committee. Local stores and businesses have been very cooperative in donating prizes."

The Day Care Center, located at 403 University Avenue, Newark, is sponsored by St. Bridget's and is open to all residents of the immediate area. It is part of the New Jersey Day Care 100 Program.

"The building is currently undergoing extensive renovations," said Father Gora, "to meet standards set forth by the New Jersey Day Care 100 Program. When completed," he added, "it will offer, in addition to the Day Care program, recreational facilities for older children, and can be adapted for other community uses during the non-day care hours."

Informative Flyer Explains International Road Signs

Director Ray J. Marini today said the New Jersey Division of Motor Vehicles and the Department of Transportation are taking steps to insure a safe and orderly transition to international signs on the State's roads and highways.

"To acquaint every licensed driver in New Jersey with these new signs, the Division of Motor Vehicles is mailing an informative flyer along with driver license renewal applications," Marini explained.

The four-color flyer briefly explains that the new pictorial and symbol signs are part of a nationwide move toward un-

iformity of traffic control devices. It illustrates 16 of the new regulatory, warning and guide signs—many of which convey a familiar message via a new shape or color.

The flyer, which is also available at all Motor Vehicle Agencies, was designed by the Department of Transportation and the Division of Motor Vehicles and funded by the New Jersey Office of Highway Safety.

"The Oddie also provided a \$6,000 grant for 14,000 "Duff-A-Sign" wheels, which are being distributed to municipality officials, driver education teachers, and

elementary school teachers," Marini said.

Prepared by the DOT's Bureau of Traffic Engineering, the wheel comprises 52 new regulatory and warning signs with their corresponding old signs. It also references each sign's new dimension and the page number in the Manual On Uniform Traffic Control Devices where further details are available. Some 1,200 copies of this manual are being sent to community officials to aid in the switch to the new signs.

Since March, the Bureau of Traffic Engineering, in cooperation with the New Jersey State Safety Council, has conducted seven seminars to teach about 3,000 township engineers, road supervisors, police chiefs, and driver education teachers about the new international road sign system.

Transition to the new signs must be completed by December, 1974. Early this year, the New Jersey Office of Highway Safety approved a \$250,000 grant for installation of 12,000 new signs in 275 municipalities.

Assault Brings \$100 In Fines

George Cereface of 201 Linden Avenue pleaded guilty in Belleville court November 22 of assault and battery upon his wife. Judge Edward Abramson fined him \$100, sentenced him to a suspended 10-day jail term and placed him on probation for two years.

Newark's Racial Confrontation

A handful of reckless black leaders in the City of Newark have undertaken an effort to oust three white councilmen from membership in the Newark City Council. Their excuse to seek the ouster of the three white men is predicated upon the councilmen's refusal to rubberstamp some of Mayor Kenneth Gibson's appointments.

Under State legislation which governs Newark certain appointments made by the Mayor require Council confirmation. Members of the City Council in withholding their approval of certain mayoralty appointments exercise a constitutional responsibility.

Let us tear away the mask that hides the real motives behind the effort of the black leaders to oust the white councilmen. Stripped of its public relations statements the black movement to oust the three white councilmen is a raw power play.

There are now three black councilmen who sit on the Newark City Council. The election of three black councilmen to replace three white councilmen would be a

black community total control over government in the City of Newark.

This is the real objective of the present move to oust the three white councilmen. The effort is being masterminded by the revolutionary black leader, LeRoi Jones.

This week a group of white organizations has announced a campaign to recall Mayor Kenneth A. Gibson. A recall-Gibson effort appears to be an effort to quiet down the black movement to oust the three white councilmen.

We believe both actions are wrong. The terms of the Mayor and the Council expire in May 1974.

We believe the electorate will have an excellent opportunity at that time to make any changes it desires in the make up of the Newark City Council and determine whether or not Mayor Gibson is worthy of another four-year term.

Christmas Giving

Complaints grow louder each year that the Christmas season has become mostly a party-buys-and-commercial-bonanza. But those who wish to enjoy an old-time Christmas can still do so, with proper planning and determination.

Family members will enjoy helping mothers prepare special Christmas dishes and foods ahead of time and some of these specialties can be the presents to be given family, friends and neighbors. All of us appreciate self-made gifts and this also saves money and shopping effort.

The secret to a relaxed, old-time Christmas is to plan ahead so that Christmas Eve, Christmas Day and one or two days after Christmas are not hectic, overly-filled days. Those who enjoy traditional,

large family dinners should attend them but those who do not can substitute a brief call at a time which will not interfere with their own home's holiday observance.

Imagination and perhaps sometimes discipline will be needed to keep the family together and calm—during the holidays. Television might be profitably disconnected and temptations to dash out on the highway resisted. Instead, family games, talks, sports, meals and projects of pleasure should be enjoyed—good food, good company, dedication to the meaning of Christmas. In guiding the family along this path American fathers, too many of whom play the role of the television dunce husband, might assert their influence for a change.

A Senate Must

One of the first orders of the new Senate should be consideration and passage of the so-called Rodino bill which would provide penalties for employers who knowingly hired illegal immigrants.

The bill passed the House earlier this year overwhelmingly (253-47) but the Senate failed to act on it in its traditional last-minute rush. The bill was authored by Congressman Peter Rodino (D-N.J.), Chairman of the House Immigration Subcommittee, a group which held hearings in many cities on the measure, hearing 187 witnesses.

The subcommittee designed the bill to help stem the flood of illegal immigration into the U.S.—desired mainly by employers who exploit illegal arrivals. The continuing flow of these immigrants works special hardship on women, blacks, older workers and those in depressed areas, since the illegal immigrant will accept almost any working conditions to remain in this country. They are thus exploitable, and deprive American citizens of thousands of jobs.

Five Years Ago

For the first time since 1961, the Nutley and Belleville High School crews were to have a completed boathouse from which to work. Bids on the long awaited facility on the banks of the Passaic River were signed and work on the structure had begun. Dr. Sidney Rogoff, president of the Nutley-Belleville Rowing Association, said that the boathouse would be ready before the opening of the spring season.

The Younginger-Alden Jr. VFW post 275 and its ladies auxiliary were sponsoring the 21st annual "Voice of Democracy" contest at Belleville High School. The year's theme, "Freedom's Challenge" was thought to be properly suited to times characterized by the Communist tyrants. The winner of the contest was to be awarded a certificate of merit and a plaque.

Susan Underwood, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. Robert Underwood of 345 Washington Avenue, was named as a semifinalist in the 1967-68 National Merit Scholarship Program. Susan was one of 14,000 semifinalists throughout the nation who placed highest in each state on the Qualifying Test.

Ten Years Ago

Belleville was to have a \$43,000 Public Library Branch in the People's National Bank building at the corner of Joramelon Street and Washington Avenue if the Town Council approved their request in the 1963 budget. The plans called for the library to open its doors with an initial collection of some 3,000 volumes, including a basic reference collection as well as a children's section.

The shadow of ousted Town Manager William Sommers brought about the defeat of a resolution calling for the appointment of Eugene Barnett as town clerk. James R. Golden had sought to have Barnett appointed clerk but the move was vetoed by a 3-2 vote.

Fifteen Years Ago

Despite the bad weather, slippery driving and walking about 100 citizens of Belleville turned out for a mass meeting of the Citizen's Tax Council. The meeting was opened by Louis Donato, president of the Council. George Turturiello presented a report on a Board of Commissioners meeting at which the Council had gone on record as being opposed to the construction of a town-owned parking lot, calling it a "waste of money."

With the terms of two members of the Board of Education expiring in February one of the members whose terms were up an-

nounced his decision to retire. Eugene Kelly said of his nine year's experience as a board member that he felt "amply rewarded by the advances made in public education during those years." The other board official up for re-election, William Boyd, had not announced whether he would seek another term in office or not.

With a week to go before the close of the "Citizen of the Year" contest, thirteen nominations had been placed for the award. Those whose names were submitted were: Edward Litting, the Rev. Peter Deckenbach, William Orchard, Bernard Tinsdale, Robert Cook, Jack Hudson, Vincent Strumulo, Isadore Padula, Jesse Starkman, Ernest Stelanetti, Esther Adams, George Buchanan and Irma Dryer.

Twenty-Five Years Ago

The appointment of Frank J. McFadden, prominent Belleville banker, to the Board of Education was announced by Mayor James Tully. McFadden was to succeed Joseph Arnold who had stated that he would not be a candidate for reappointment to the position. McFadden was to serve for five years.

A requisition for music supplies in the amount of \$159.00 was unanimously passed by the Board of Education. An explanation for a reduction of \$600 from the original amount of the music supply request was explained as a "misunderstanding."

The Belleville Fire Department was awarded a Class B rating by the Schedule Rating Company insurance experts. The announcement was made by Fire Chief William Dunleavy, who stated that the action assured local citizens of a lower annual premium for fire insurance.

Christmas Trees

In a few weeks millions of Americans will buy Christmas trees. Many know very little about them, or how to look for value, freshness, etc. The National Christmas Tree Growers Association says prices ranged from three to twenty dollars last year, the average being about six dollars.

Americans buy more Scotch pines than anything else, a bushy tree which holds its needles well. Red and Norway pines are also bought but are losing out with growers because wet snows often damage them. Eastern and western pines are also sold but many growers feel firs are best, since they hold their needles indoors longer. There is balsam and Douglas fir (not a true fir), both popular.

The spruces hold their needles a shorter time, though pretty. There is Norway spruce, white spruce (less popular) and blue spruce, a very expensive tree because it grows slowly.

In buying your tree, here are some useful tips: 1. Bend a needle. If it breaks, don't buy. 2. Bounce the stump. If needles fall, don't buy. 3. Look at the stump. If not moist or sticky, don't buy. 4. Keep your tree green longer by cutting an inch off the stump and keeping it in water or damp sand. Some add sugar, aspirin, etc., to the water - according to pet theories.

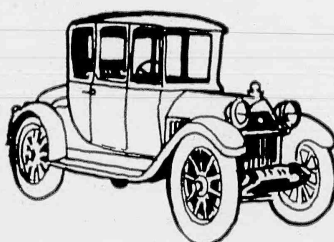

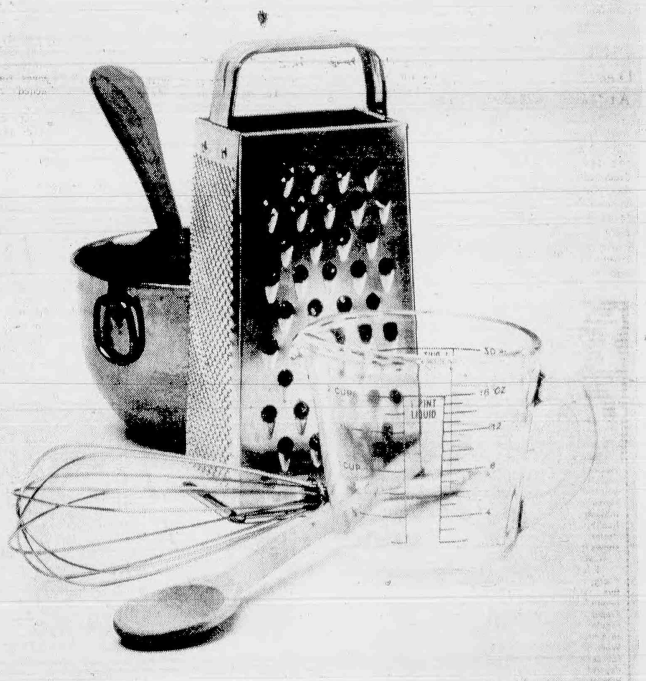

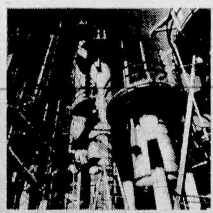

April showers came in November this year, according to a monthly meteorological summary issued by Union College's Meteorological Station, a cooperative station of the U.S. Weather Bureau.

November 1972 set a record for rainfall at the Union College station with 11.21 inches recorded, which is more than 7.4 inches above normal. Precipitation was measured on 12 days during the month, with the greatest amount of rain falling in a 24-hour period occurring on November 8 when 3.12 inches was recorded.

Snow fell three days this month on November 15, 19, and 30, while sleet was reported on November 19, 28, and 30. Fog covered the area on November 9, 28, and 30.

The total precipitation measured thus far this year is \$5.46 inches. Last year at this time it measured \$3.71 inches. The lowest November rainfall on record at the Union College Station was in 1964 when only 1.68 inches of rain fell.

Temperature-wise, Nov-

ember was about normal. A maximum temperature of 67 degrees was recorded on November 3 while the month's low of 17 degrees was recorded on November 23.

The mean temperature for the month was 45.3 degrees, a departure of 1 degree below normal.

The highest temperature for November on record at the Union College Station was 77 degrees on November 4 and 5, 1961, and November 2, 1971.

Ju-Jitsu Club Founder Says Self-Discipline Is Art Form

Amid the sounds of grunts, lightly thudding feet and intense concentration, I interviewed Nick DiNapoli, president and founder of NB Ju-Jitsu Club at 234 Washington Avenue.

Nick, a former industrial engineer, enjoyed working with people, so about five years ago he opened the doors to those interested in the art of self-defense. Ju-Jitsu is the mother of the arts, Judo the wrestling part and Karate the blocking, striking and kicking counterpart. There is a great deal of misconception on the part of the public when you mention the word "karate." Immediately to mind come visions of men breaking bricks in half with the mere force of their hand. Tain't so, according to Nick. This is usually done in demonstrations only and the trend, is to do away with that particular image.

Instead, consider if you will, that the art is a form of self-discipline; conquering yourself to form a better image. It is a mind-builder as well as physical building-up. "One thing you must remember here," Nick says "there is no such word as 'can't'." Positive thinking is stressed. Rapport and mutual respect must be established between the instructor and the student, to accomplish

anything. There are classes for boys, girls, men and women — individual as well as group.

There are many degrees of strength, commencing from a "starter" belt of white up through varying shades of blue, green, brown and (as we all relate to) the black belt. Did you know there are ten degrees of black? You must go right up the line to the ultimate in attainment, the red belt, which takes about 20 years. To do this the individual must pass many tests including verbal interrogations. Emphasis is stressed on attitude at all levels. People who enroll for these courses are interested in more than self-defense — it's a good exercise, teaches coordination of the body and its main aim is creating a better self image. Nick has also taught blind people judo and attends many competitions nationally. "At these 'meets' Nick said "you continually try to find fault with the movements you now make and improve on the present technique."

Nick is a member of the Gen Lee federation, which means "the way of truth." The art of judo, ju-jitsu and karate is, of course, Oriental in origin. Normally, the orientals stress formality, harshness and severity. At the NB Ju-Jitsu Club members

An early date for the season's opener this year will match Belleville High School's wrestling squad in a tough bout with Bloomfield High on home mats next Thursday afternoon.

Leading the Bellboys onto the mats will be a strong trio of returnees, Ramon Lijo at 106 pounds, Brain Banda at 130, and John Smith at heavyweight. But these three seniors are all that Coach Jim Silvestri has coming back from the 10-4 team of 1972.

This will make the opening match even tougher than the 25-23 Bloomfield victory last year would indicate.

As for the individual prospects of each of the returning grapplers, each will be in

strong control of his weight class in Belleville's district, should they fare well through the season.

Smith is another returning district champ, and also placed third later in the Regionals.

This year Silvestri has added Patterson Kennedy and West Essex, the latter a team Belleville faces each year in the Bloomfield Tourney. Dropped from the slate are Pope Paul IV, whose 48-2 loss to Belleville last year got them only one year on the schedule and a regular competitor, Clifton High. Clifton had to be dropped as they changed their conference and now can have only a restricted number of outside meets.

With three scrimmages completed, Silvestri sees his own team as "green," his annual pre-season comment.

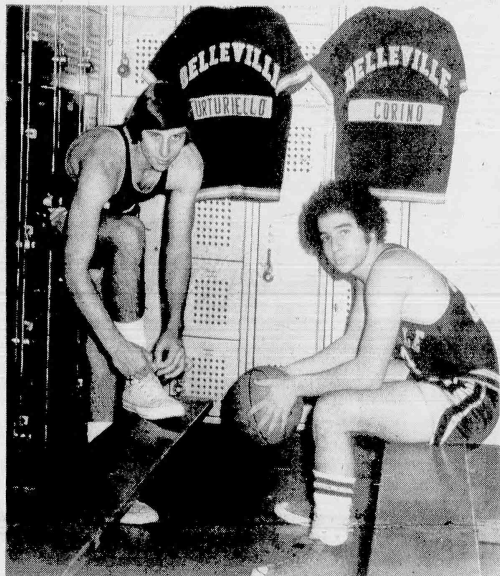

Beck's Column

The station selector or "tuner," as it is mostly called, has been the bane of the TV serviceman's existence. If you have a TV set, you had trouble with the tuner.

Everytime you switch from one station to the other, you make and break about a dozen contacts. Every contact is a potential troublemaker. They are either solid silver or plated. As you know, silver or for that matter every other metal tarnishes or corrodes in time, and if this happens, the contact does not make "contact" any more. How many times did you have to wiggle the tuner or push a match book or something else between the dial knob and the cabinet in order to get a picture, until it went off and you had to wiggle again. Finally the corrosion became so much that you had to call a serviceman to clean the damned thing. Depending on the location, all would be a while and then the same thing started all over again.

You read now in some advertisements that some sets have "new" tuners. On UHF stations, which have a continuous tuner without contacts, a defect has been added for some or all stations. This is a convenience. We as servicemen, look forward to the day when a station selector on all channels does not have any contacts at all. This would eliminate many a repair bill and would make the life of the TV serviceman a little easier.

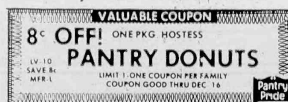

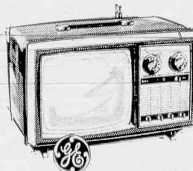
