### Receives Quarterly Check

## Strumolo Gets State Funds For Pollution, Rodent Control

Commissioner Vincent T. Strumolo last week received two checks on behalf of the Department of Public Affairs — one from Rutgers University and the other a \$5,919 aid grant from the state.

The check from the state was a quarterly payment on a grant that will total \$23,679.36 for 1973. Strumolo's health department is the only

department in Belleville town government to receive outright funding from the state for special programs. All others must match state funds with an equal amount.

The grant is earmarked for salaries of health department employees and Belleville's air pollution and rodent control programs.

Strumolo obtained the an-

nual grant in 1968. Since then the revenues from the state have varied from about \$15,500 to \$34,600, according to the amount appropriated by the state legislature. Last year's grant totaled \$27,282.64.

"Municipalities throughout New Jersey receive the health funds according to their population and

town must employ a full-time health officer and meet departmental standards set by the state. For Belleville, the revenue will comprise about 17 per cent of the Public Affairs operating budget.

Strumolo's other check, from Rutgers University, was for \$805 and represented payment for field training given two Rutgers students last summer by the Belleville Health Department.

The students, Jack Dempsy and Daniel Jordan, worked for eight weeks as sanitary inspectors trainees under Health Officer Edward G. Hilley. Both have since passed state examinations and are now employed by health departments in Jersey City and Bridgewater.

The summer project was the first of its kind initiated by Rutgers and they selected the Belleville Health Department for a training ground because the local department operated under high standards with modern facilities.

## Board of Ed Votes \$7.4 Million Budget

The Belleville Board of Education Monday night adopted a tentative budget of \$7.4 million budget for 1973-74, representing a 15 percent increase over last year's budget. School Board President Richard Mahamarian

said much of the increase will go towards repairs on school facilities that "absolutely must be done."

The tentative budget was delivered yesterday to Essex County Superintendent of Schools Simeon Moss for his

approval.

Board of Education members worked right up until Monday night meeting and afterwards on the budget.

On Tuesday, the Board will meet with the system's top administrators and principals of all schools to justify each request for funds.

Legally, the budget must be published a week before a scheduled January 25 public hearing at School No. Eight, after which the final budget will be adopted for presentation on the February 13 ballot.

No budget submitted by the Board has been approved by Belleville voters in the past 11 years, said Mahamarian, who pointed out the urgent need for emergency repairs in many Belleville schools. The Board president added one of the new programs included in the budget this year, a work-study project, would bring a 50 per cent refund from the state after a year.

The increase amounts to \$995,113 over last year's budget of \$6,413,748 for a 1973-74 total of \$7,408,861.

### Golden Comments

No better example need be observed of the unparadigmatic desire of entrenched political officeholders, from the President on down to the lowest ward-heeler, than the obnoxious trend to stiff and out-of-news from the public, by threats to the press and broadcasting arms of the news media such as now comes from the Court's action in incarcerating news reporters who refuse to divulge their news sources or the implied "suggestion" that the FCC, the federal agency that controls TV and radio broadcasters, may not renew their licenses should they project unfavorable images of the government's leaders.

In short, it adds up to the suggestion that the public not be alerted to the deeds or misdeeds of their rulers, if it presents them in an unsavory or unfavorable light, notwithstanding that this has consistently been the rule of a free press as guaranteed by the first amendment of our basic law, The Constitution of the United States.

It is little wonder that a more informed, educated and suspicious public has lost confidence in the integrity and honesty of most of our elected officials who wish to hide and conceal their many devious doings from the exposure of public light in the expansive manner that is possible by the modern day news media presentation.

When fear of commenting seems the only "out" for these vulnerable public officials they remain silent, like taking the fifth, the only out for those unable to justify a questionable conduct of either their own, or the conduct or those immediately under their supervision.

Just such a situation presently exists concerning a few matters that affect Belleville that I have sought to have clarified for some time without success.

Shortly after creation of this column on August 10, 1972 I directed a letter to State Transportation Commissioner, John C. Kohl, advising him of my concern over the traffic congestion created at Belleville Ave. and Washington Ave. which is State Highway #7, because of the Fidelity Union Trust Company's Branch Bank using the highway as a "drive-in land" for its customers. A condition which our local police deplore.

I offered an alternative suggestion that Greenwich St., in the rear of the bank, have its present North-South one way designation reversed to South-North and that this secondary street of the town have one lane designated

## Schools Race Field At Four

Mrs. Evelyn T. Pelia of 75 Frederick Street, who only announced her candidacy for the Board of Education last week, garnered the top spot for the February 13 election.

Only two challengers filed their intent to attempt to unseat School Board incumbents Richard Mahamarian and Caesar Romano making this the smallest field in many years.

Last February six candidates vied for two seats on the Board compared to today's four hopefuls.

Sтивен Rogers, the 21-year-old Air Force officer who announced his candidacy several months ago, won the second spot on the ballot, while Romano is third in line.

Board president Richard Mahamarian got the final spot on the ballot.

Born in Newark, Mrs. Pelia in her early years attended the Newark School System. Later, her family moved to neighboring Nutley, where she was graduated from

Nutley High School. Mrs. Pelia came to Belleville with her family after completing high school. She has also attended Rutgers University and Newark State College and has studied in the field of education.

She is currently an executive secretary to the vice president of a nationally known plastics manufacturer. Married over a year, she is the sister-in-law of William A. Pelia, a former Belleville Board of Education candidate in 1964 and presently superintendent of schools in Woodbridge.

In her opening remarks at announcing her candidacy, Mrs. Pelia said she is running in this election "in the interest of total community involvement in our Board of Education. It would be my intention as a Board member to bring the Board of Education closer to all the people of Belleville. In order to meet this goal I would schedule

forums throughout all areas of our town each month. In these forums every citizen would have the right to make his or her views known concerning the educational experiences of the children of Belleville. Further, I would initiate a telephone hot line so that

### OK 4.8% Boost

## Teachers Settle Contract Hassle

Negotiators for the Belleville Board of Education and the Belleville Education Association this year avoided long hassles that marked last year's contract agreement and settled early on a 4.8 per cent across the board increase in the local system.

Praise was graded back and forth between the two bargaining teams at a Board of Education meeting Monday night after Board President Richard Mahamarian cosigned the agreement with Jerry Weiss, president of the teacher's association and Jerry Kennedy, chief negotiator for the BEA.

The contract calls for a total of \$270,000 in pay raises in the coming year for

Belleville teachers. A new teacher in the system will receive \$8,800, representing a \$350 jump from last year's salary of \$8,450. The overall 4.8 per cent increase, in line with other New Jersey school systems, does not include longevity increments. Thus, the highest-paid teacher in the Belleville system would be a 16-year veteran holding a master's degree plus 12 extra course credits. That teacher would be entitled to draw \$18,400 — up from \$17,550 last year. Sixteen-year teachers with bachelor's degrees will receive \$13,100.

The negotiations were called when

## Police Press Commission For Answer On Salaries

The Board of Commissioners heard a complaint Tuesday night from Officer Patrick McCabe, president of the local PBA chapter, who charged the Board with dragging its feet in returning an answer to Belleville policemen on their pay demands.

Parks Commissioner Michael Marotti told the proposed salary ordinance

had been "drawn up wrong" and the commissioners were to hold a special meeting this week to draft a new ordinance.

"We've been negotiating 14 months," said McCabe when Mayor McGreevy opened the floor to hear citizens' complaints after the regular meeting. "We thought we had a gentlemen's agreement with the Board," said McCabe, adding, "Our patrolmen start the job as the fifth highest paid policemen in the county but after three years they're among the lowest. Our superiors are also among the lowest-paid in the county."

Marotti then told the patrolman a final resolution

on the matter would be forthcoming this week.

Another citizen's complaint, this one lodged against actions of the Belleville Board of Adjustment, charged there may have been irregularities in the November 6 Board ruling that recommended to the Commission to allow Luciano Calandra to build 11 more apartment units into a 33-unit building at 146 Brighton Avenue.

"Schmitt" charged the Brighton Garden Apartments have already been built without regard to property lines and said the Board of Adjustment should have considered this in their ruling.

## Bus Service Curtailment Blasted By Officials Here

Nutley and Belleville officials reacted with disappointment this week as the Public Utilities Commission authorized Transport of New Jersey to curtail weekend service on routes 28 and 112 which run between here and Newark.

Belleville Commissioner Vincent Strumolo and Nutley Mayor Carmen Orechio, both of whom joined to force the PUC into holding a public hearing last October on the then proposed service cutbacks, today were highly critical of the state agency which authorized the curtailment, Strumolo, in fact, called upon Gov. Cahill and the N.J. Legislature to create a watchdog agency to represent "the little people's interests" in PUC activities.

Mayor Orechio said that although he was disappointed in the PUC decision, "I am at least a little pleased that Transport of New

Jersey has been ordered to re-direct some of its No. 13 buses on Saturdays over a portion of the re-route."

The re-routing of some of the No. 13-Broad line buses through Belleville and Nutley was first proposed by a resident at the October hearing. Mrs. Eleanor Hein of Belleville made the proposal at the October 19 PUC hearing.

This week, the PUC announced that in deciding to permit Transport to eliminate Saturday service on the 28-Summer Avenue line, "we have directed [NJ] to continue to supply Saturday bus service over a portion of the No. 28 route through an extension of the No. 13 Broad line."

The PUC news release failed to detail how the "extension" of the 13 line would operate. Late yesterday, a spokesman at the Board of

# Retail Buying has Climbed 10 Per Cent in December

Total retail sales across the State for December are expected to show a 10 percent increase over the amount registered during the corresponding period in 1971.

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The statistical measurement based on a survey conducted by the Office of Business Economics, estimates retail sales will aggregate over \$1,824,000 at month's end.

According to the report, December sales scored progressive gains in each of the past three years: \$1,268,000 in 1969, \$1,528,000 in 1970, and \$1,658,000 in 1971.

Department Commissioner Ronald M. Heymann said, "These figures are significant, in that they show a strong upsurge in the retail sector. This data reinforces other indications that New Jersey's economy is on the upswing."

Consumer confidence in the State's overall economy and willingness of the public to make greater expenditures for larger items are cited as major factors for the upswing.

Also noted in the study is the fact that New Jersey personal income has risen 8.4 percent over last year. It attributes the recent Social Security increases to retired persons as contributing toward more sales. In the words of one of the retail executives interviewed, "Personal income is the name of the game here. When it's up, so are sales, and that's what people spend."

Sales of toys are reported highest in major discount chains and small variety stores. At the time of the survey, women's and men's sportswear were in high demand. This trend is expected to continue through the pre-Christmas season. Outerwear, cosmetics, jewelry, small electrical appliances and color televisions are listed in peak demand.

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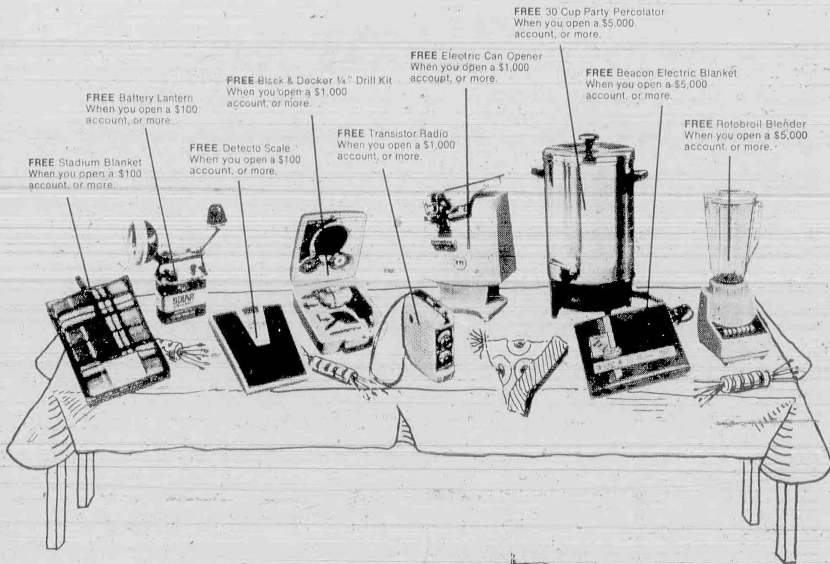

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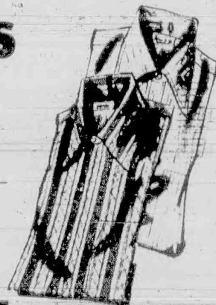

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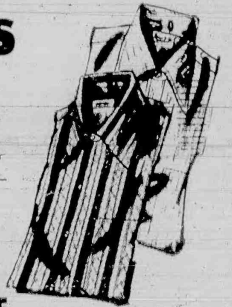

## Of The Turnpike

### Grand Jury Investigation

Newspaper accounts indicate the New Jersey Turnpike Authority Executive Director approved the hiring of certain real estate appraisers merely as an office formality rather than responsible action.

It appears the appraiser so hired recommended the purchase of Meadowland at \$10,000 per acre while a subsequent appraisal placed a value at \$2,000 per acre.

On the face of the facts and admissions reported in the news account it appears the New Jersey Turnpike Executive Director, Democrat William Flannigan should be fired.

Perhaps more important is the need for a grand jury investigation of the circumstances surrounding the hiring of the

appraisers who did not meet the high standards required of professional appraisers. It appears the appraiser partnership was organized solely for the purpose of performing services under the turnpike contract and upon completion of the work the partnership was dissolved. Hundreds of thousands of dollars were involved in the fees and excessive costs of land acquisition. To clear the air of doubts and suspicions it is our judgement nothing less than a grand jury investigation would suffice.

A few years ago the Hong Kong flu put many Americans down. The count; this year the "flu" strain is the London flu.

Federal officials at the Public Health Center for Disease in Atlanta say London flu, first detected at the Air Force Academy in October, and which struck hard at Baltimore in late November, is not a major threat, nor, spreading in epidemic proportions.

Rather, they say, the flu situation in the United States is about normal for this time of year. The London flu virus is merely the latest strain making the rounds; it was first detected in India in

1971 and appeared in London early this year.

It has thus far been detected in Colorado, Arizona, California, Washington, Hawaii, Kansas, Texas, Illinois, Tennessee, Maryland, Pennsylvania, New York, Connecticut and Massachusetts. Doctors are prescribing for it what has for many years been prescribed for fluebed rest, plenty of fluids including fruit juices, aspirin and, perhaps, cough syrup. As with other ailments not fully understood, they're in effect, letting the body make its own recovery.

### BHS Still Open Without Its Proper Accreditation

One Year Ago

Belleville police were lauded by County Prosecutor Joseph Lordi for being instrumental in cracking a \$10 million a year gambling ring operating in Essex and Union Counties. Local detectives using electronic surveillance equipment, discovered the multi-million dollar enterprise while tapping the telephone wires of a Belleville apartment believed to be used as an illegal betting parlor.

Police initiated emergency patrols on Washington Avenue when a power failure blacked out lights and set off burglar alarms. The 45-minute power failure was a result of a multi-million dollar generator exploding at the Public Service Electric and Gas Company's central generating station in Newark. A machinist working in the area was killed as a result of the explosion.

A date was definitely set for a meeting between the Belleville Recreation League Team and New York Jets Football players in a benefit basketball game to be played at the high school. Proceeds from the event were to go to three handicapped men residing in town. Members from the Jets team who were to participate were: Bob Davis, Emerson Boozer, W.K. Hicks, George Nock, John Dockery, John Schmitt and Ralph Baker.

Ten Years Ago

Belleville High School entered its second year without proper accreditation by the Middle States Association's Commission on Secondary Education. The Commission said the school lacked adequate facilities, had a chronic shortage of teachers and would not restore accreditation until firm plans for new facilities were in preparation and proof of scholastic standards could be shown to the Commission.

Belleville detectives, accompanied by Essex County Sheriff's men, raided a \$1,100 per day bookie joint at North Belmont Avenue and arrested one man as he hid behind a living room sofa. The young man was charged with possession of lottery slips and maintaining a lottery.

Belleville's 50 Town Hall employees were to begin a 40-hour work week January 14, the first change in five years, with one night a week at their desks. Employees were to report to work at 4 and would go home at 4, except for Monday evening, when offices would remain open until 8:30.

Fifteen Years Ago

Following a lengthy and quite often heated discussion with a number of local insurance agents, the Board of Education voted 4-3 to place their insurance contracts up for bidding to all insurance agents, brokers, or companies regardless of locality. The resolution, which was introduced by Dr. Palmer Brude, provided that the bids be submitted 60 days after the specifications were published.

The Kiwanis Club held its annual installation of officers and directors. Charles B. Telesco, local attorney and administrative clerk of the Department of Public Safety, was installed as president of the club. Others installed were: Frank Bolen, William F. Pick, Joseph Ebel, Russell Hopkins, William Voss, Leo Taubin, Henry Wahlers, Edward Abramson.

Charging that the proposed formation of a municipal Planning Board was merely a "political football" Martin Resnick, president of the Riviera Park Civic Association declared: "Town Planning is something that has to be done by professionals and we don't mean just a quickly hired outside 'team' that makes a running survey and then beats it again, leaving behind a staggering bill for services rendered." According to Resnick, town planning would take care of itself once a competent municipal government was installed.

Twenty-Five Years Ago

Mrs. Edward Engel, who told the Board of Commissioners they based their decisions on "who paid them the most," had no comment on whether she would substantiate her charges or apologize to the Board. Her outburst followed the board's granting of a variance to George Kiernan, local mortician, to build a combination residence and business on the corner of Lloyd Place and Union Avenue.

Public Safety Director Noll announced the promotion of acting lieutenant of detectives Charles McGinnis to the rank of acting captain, effective the first of the year. A resident of Belleville for 25 years, the detective captain had been a member of the police force for 12 years.

Samuel Linden was elected president of Congregation A.A.A. Other officers elected were: 1st vice-president, Robert Gruhn; 2nd vice-president, Wilfred Yudin; recording secretary, Irving Garson; financial secretary, Martin Kabot, and treasurer, George Cherrin.

as the "drive-in lane" for the bank, thus, alleviating the traffic confusion on the avenue at the busy intersection of Belleville Ave.

On August 17, 1972 a letter was sent advising that Const. Kohl had directed the Bureau of Traffic Engineering to look into the matter discussed in my letter to him. Time passed, yet, no action was taken to the chagrin of both the police who direct traffic at that location and myself.

Piqued by the inaction and disappointed by the indifference, it recalled to my mind that another "Big Shot" from Trenton, James A. Alloway, President of the State Department of Civil Service, had previously played the unique discourtesy of having failed to show me the respect of answering my letter of away back on June 16, 1972.

Why would such well staffed and knowledgeable men choose to neglect the common decency of responding? They apply the silent treatment when they are "over-a-barrel" and don't care to try to explain an action they have taken or failed to take. For reasons they wouldn't care to have the public know about, seems the most logical explanation.

Let's observe how this seems to apply to the Town of Belleville in the case of Mr. Alloway's reluctance.

After attempting to get a clarification from the Civil Service President about the status of the tax collector's position in town without any success, I communicated with State Senator Jim Wallwork to put the "heat" on the "big guy" to have him explain his position in regards to this office, which had been considered as being under Civil Service Classification since 1959.

In a letter dated April 27, 1972, resulting from Sen. Wallwork's intervention, Mr. Alloway wrote that in 1959 the Civil Service Commission ruled the position of Tax Collector in the Classified Service because a search of the statutes failed to show any laws that excluded the Tax Collector's office from the provisions of the Civil Service Law.

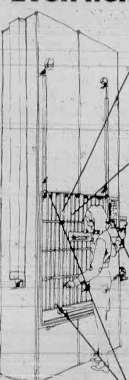

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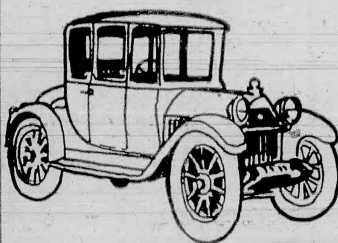

# Teachers Here Settle Contract Differences

teachers ought to invoke their right to negotiate the two-year contract they had signed with the Board of Education last May, when they won a 5.8 per cent increase. The revised contract signed Monday will apply for the next year.

Salaries for Belleville school nurses were excluded in the agreement pending an interpretation of the American Arbitration Association on whether non-degree nurses can be represented by the BEA. That decision is expected to come in the next six weeks.

The negotiating team for the BEA was composed of president Weiss, chief negotiator Kennedy, Michael Harvey, treasurer and Sylvia Armino. The Board of Education was represented by Lawrence Schwartz and G. Fred Bartolucci. The two teams began negotiations October 10 and ended last week — a sharp contrast to last year's wrangle, which got a late start in mid-December and didn't end until April 11.

Also contrasted was the mood of both

parties after agreement was reached. While the long dispute left bitter feelings last year, the BEA team agreed with Board member Lawrence Schwartz Monday when he said the contract talks this year were "the most cordial negotiations" in recent years and "a lot has been accomplished in terms of a better relationship between the Board of Education and the Belleville Education Association."

Last year's negotiations were thrown off the track by the federally-imposed wage-price freeze. It took a total of 13 meetings before an agreement was finally ratified by both parties. The school board was passed well before the salary agreement was reached and the final package, costing the Board of Education \$3,712,025 came in about \$10,000 above the amount allotted in the budget for teachers' salaries.

The two-year agreement did, however, cover fringe benefits and working conditions, leaving only salaries to be renegotiated this time around.

# PUC Decides To Halt Weekend Bus Service

Utility Commissioners in Newark was contacted and explained:

"We have ordered Transport of New Jersey to reroute its 13 lines as follows: leaving its regular route as Washington Avenue and Joramelon Street, Belleville, thence via Joramelon to Franklin Avenue (still in Belleville), then north to Centre Street, Nutley; west on Centre to Bloomfield Avenue, and then north to Kinnelwood Street and finally west to the West Essex-Darling Avenue juncture in Nutley."

The PUC spokesman also announced that Transport of New Jersey has been ordered to operate 10 round trips each Saturday on the extended No. 13 route, with the first trip leaving Nutley "at about 9 a.m." and the last from the Raymond Boulevard area in Newark "at about 6 p.m."

Transport of New Jersey, which also received notification of the PUC decision this week, has not yet set a date to begin the new 13-Broad service, or to establish the exact timetable. At the moment, 32 buses are assigned to the 28 line which is being totally discontinued on Saturdays. The 28 line will continue to operate weekdays, being routed over Newark's Summer Avenue to Pennsylvania Station.

The number 111-112 line starts in Clifton, and runs through Clifton, Nutley and Belleville enroute to Newark. In the Nutley-Belleville area, the No. 112 route follows the same course as the 28 line.

The PUC this week authorized Transport to eliminate its total Sunday schedule on the 112 line.

The effect of the PUC decision is to leave only the 13-Broad line as a weekend link between Nutley, Belleville and Newark. Officials and residents alike are bitter about the curtailments which among other things leave Clara Mass Memorial Hospital isolated from public transportation.

Also merchants in Nutley and Belleville no longer can be visited by customers in most residential areas. During last year's 75-day work bus strike in New Jersey, Belleville Mayor Joseph McGreevy said store owners in town "heavily felt the pinch because many of our residents couldn't get to the center of town by bus. It's totally unfair."

Nutley Mayor Orchio yesterday predicted "the only way we're ever going to get increased service now is through more subsidies or a state takeover of mass transit. There is no other alternative."

Commissioner Strumolo, director of Public Affairs in Newark, was extremely critical of the PUC and Transport of New Jersey.

In addition to calling for a legislative

watchdog committee to monitor the Public Utilities Commission, Strumolo said senior citizens and the public in general "are being subjected to a disgrace. Public Service (PNJ) can't show me one thing they've done in the last 30 years to improve their mass transit system. Some lines established a quarter-of-a-century ago have never been evaluated."

Strumolo said the PUC was created to look after the public's interest. "But you can't tell its purpose from looking at decisions like this one this week. The PUC is clearly working for the benefit of the private corporation, not the public," Strumolo charged. The Belleville Commissioner also mentioned the PUC's approving higher telephone rates for N.J. Bell this month as "one more indication of the PUC's public-benefit attitude and concern instead for the private corporation."

The PUC announcement this week justified its position by citing financial losses incurred by Transport of New Jersey during and following its 75-day work stoppage last year. Transport of N.J. says it costs \$10.84 in direct-out-of-pocket expenses to operate its buses. Saturday service on the Summer Avenue (28) line averaged \$7.04 on two Saturdays surveyed. On the No. 111-112 line, income was averaged at \$5.24, Transport said. The PUC seemingly has accepted the bus operating expenses and income as presented by the company. However several riders testified at the local public hearing that receipts are frequently mislaid, that buses are dirty and don't follow schedules, that vehicle routes are improperly marked and that runs are often cancelled without notice. One Nutley resident testifying at local public hearing noted that on the Sunday dates that Transport of N.J. used to illustrate lack of patronage on Sundays, "we were having a blizzard. You know, the last thing people are going to do on a snowy Sunday afternoon is go out and wait for a bus."

Transport of New Jersey told the PUC that cutting service here on the 28 and 111-112 lines would save the company approximately \$19,750 each year.

The PUC decision acknowledged the company's contention that the lines have been lightly patronized, resulting in substantial operation losses. The PUC in a news release further indicated there appear to be "sufficient alternate transportation facilities available to meet the needs of the public who ride the Sunday Clifton-Newark line. With the extension of the No. 13 route," the PUC release continues, "and use of alternate lines, passengers requiring Saturday service in the area of the No. 78 route should be adequately served."

## Suspended Sentence Too

# Pot, Booze Brings Fine To Local Trio

Three youths were convicted Monday in Nutley court of possession of alcohol and marijuana. Judge Edwin J.C. Jorgi fined each \$100, placed them all on probation for a year and sentenced them all to suspended six-month jail terms.

# Gene Muscara Says He Enjoys People

While I waited to interview Gene Muscara, entrepreneur of Muscara Music, I chatted with a young lady who told me her brother had come from St. John's in the Virgin Islands to the store to purchase another instrument. Muscara has had customers from all over the world, the Philippines, Quebec Canada, London. There's a secret to his success...he really enjoys people.

Gene Muscara started playing the accordion at age eight. He branched out to other instruments, taking lessons from teachers who were specialists in their field. He remembers his accordion lessons with Charles Nunzio of Nutley and, at age 15, he was appearing on radio shows. During the Second World War, he organized bands that played all around the Pacific Islands, one band was the "Maui" the other, "the 14 Hawks", and he appeared with such notables as Bob Hope, Harry James and Betty Grable.

After his discharge,

Muscara traveled around the U.S. quite a bit, mostly with the "Santitas" Del Trio. He credits his wife, Phyllis, as "the woman behind the whole idea" to settle down and open Muscara Music which they did, in 1952. Since then, Muscara has enlarged his studio to include six stores along Washington Avenue.

Along one wall in the shop, there are dozens of photographs, of different "groups", all with a similar message: "thanks for helping us make it." Muscara says it is not financial backing the groups refer to, but the encouragement they needed and, he always finds time to listen. Asking him about the majority of his customers, who are teens, he said "the longer the hair, the nicer they are," but also said his customers range from 7 - 70.

I get the impression Gene Muscara likes to try everything, as he appeared on the radio with an orchestra at the Hotel Douglas for two years, the Aldo Aldi TV show where he displayed his talent

on the keyboard and more recently, he has done a TV Commercial, playing a glockenspiel. In 1971, he visited among other locations, Minagua, Nicaragua as a representative of the United States and Florida in importing and exporting of water purification.

Asking him about youngsters who start music lessons and then balk, he replied that "the instrument is 40%, the teacher 40% and the practice value 20%." If a youngster comes to purchase an instrument, say a trombone, Muscara considers it important that as the child advances and learns more, the instrument is the type to accept what the child has learned. If you have a \$100 trombone, its acceptance is limited and high and low notes prohibitive. In explaining, Muscara noted that a performer, such as Harry James, could take an instrument of low acceptance and play beautifully on it, but he would not demand more of that instrument (highs and lows) than it could give. That's the basic difference in "just buying an instrument" and in preparing for many future years' use. Muscara stresses that the pupil-teacher relationship is vital and as a youngster suddenly finds excuses for not practicing, suggests that you give it another try, change teachers and see if it is really a loss of interest in music, or that the teacher is not reaching the pupil.

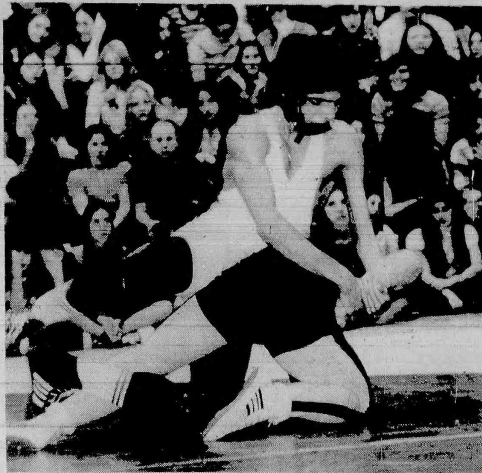

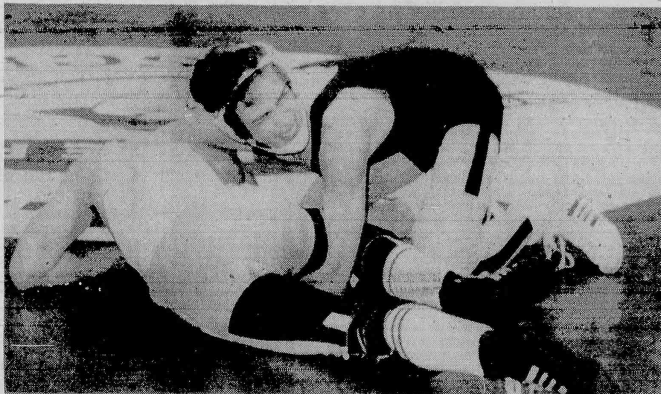

Wallhauser Sr. said today that a review of the Parkway Troop E Task Force's first six months indicates that the unit "is doing an effective job not only in catching drivers who drink but also in serving notice that if drinkers drive they shouldn't come near the Parkway."

### Commissions Slash Bel Tel Rate Request

William E. Ozzard, Anthony J. Grossi and George M. Wallhauser, Jr., of the New Jersey Board of Public Utility Commissioners today issued a precedent-setting Order in their first rate decision since the Board was created by the Federal Price Commission. Several major precedents were established in the Board's ruling on a request by New Jersey Bell Telephone Company for a 22% hike in rates which would have raised the utility's revenues by \$137,100,000. The PUC slashed that request to a grant of \$53.2 million in rate relief, simultaneously ordered a cost-of-service study to re-evaluate the giant utility's rate structure and proposed a comprehensive adjustment clause designed to provoke fewer rate cases.

The PUC indicated that it considered its decision today to be only Phase I of the case in that it determines only the reasonable revenue requirements needed by the company to continue to provide safe, adequate and proper service. Phase II of the case will be an inquiry into the

whose agency operates the Parkway, said that with the Task Force playing an important part, Troop E in the first 11 months of this year registered a 70 per cent increase over the same 1971 period in arrests of drunken drivers. A downward trend in October and November arrests indicates, he added, "that motorists are getting the message that if they drink they run the risk of being apprehended on the Parkway."

The Task Force was created last June in a move to step up efforts to minimize the alcohol menace on the toll road and to nab other flagrant violators of motor vehicle laws. It is a six-man unit whose unmarked, unrelated cars are changed frequently to enhance their effectiveness.

In the first six months of Task Force activity, the six members apprehended 73 drunken drivers; issued 1,663 summonses for speeding and 402 for other hazardous violations; picked up 16 who were driving while on the revoked list.

In addition, the Task Force was credited with nine criminal complaints and 40 criminal investigations; recovered three stolen cars, two with occupants, and made 15 arrests other than those mentioned.

The PUC Order indicated the findings in Phase I could result in major changes in the company's various charges for service and in elimination of any inequities which might exist in the manner in which those charges are applied. The Board's proposal for a comprehensive adjustment clause will be under the Administrative Procedures Act, a separate set of hearings. The PUC proposed an adjustment clause on salaries and wages, depreciation, charges, taxes and miscellaneous expenses. Operation of the clause would be for the duration of the President's economic stabilization program or such other period as the Board deems appropriate and would be so conditioned that the company could not realize a rate of return greater than that set in today's rate order. This would effectively prevent the company from passing any of these revenues to its stockholder in the way of dividends. The salary and wage adjustment would be limited to the 5.5% guideline of the Federal Wage Board and would further be reduced by the average productivity gain of 3%. Therefore, no matter what wage settlement is reached in a negotiation, no more than 2.5% could be regained through the adjustment clause. Depreciation of new plant built to increase service to customers would be limited to the rate established in today's order. Other expenses, no matter what their growth, would be limited to a recovery rate of 50% of the increase in the Consumer Price Index for the preceding 12 months.
