McGreevy Complains

U.S. Revenue Giftbag Wasn't Heavy Enough

Mayor Joseph McGreevy was slightly disgruntled over the distribution of funds from the recently-enacted federal revenue-sharing program and will appeal to the Treasury Department to gain the \$394,000 Belleville was promised before the act was passed.

Meanwhile, McGreevy said, the town will use the \$245,929 already given Belleville, "as revenue to stabilize the tax rate."

Belleville is not alone in rebelling against the division of funds, said the Mayor, who ran down a list of towns in Essex County where they feel they were short-changed and claim they also will appeal to the government.

McGreevy said the reason given by the government for the reduction is that "new data" about the towns was received by the Treasury Department. The formula used by the government to

disperse the funds is a complicated one based on the aggregate income of the town, the population, the per capita income, the adjusted taxes and inter-governmental income.

In addition to the \$173,000 cut after the act was passed and the "new data" calculated, McGreevy said the Treasury Department is holding \$5,071 "in reserve."

Asked if other towns and cities across the country are experiencing similar problems, the Mayor answered, "I don't know, but it sure is happening in Essex County. Montclair was supposed to get \$507,000 and they received \$170,000. Verona was cut from \$150,000 to \$46,000. South Orange got \$55,000. Bloomfield took the worst beating of all. They were expecting \$672,000. After the act was passed they were to receive \$600,000.

Then the government refigured and Bloomfield wound up with \$298,502." Belleville received her share in two checks which arrived in December and January. McGreevy said the appeal will be filed sometime this month.

Student-Teacher Troupe Opens Comedy Saturday

A young and successful theatrical troupe from the Belleville Junior High School will open their annual production Friday night, 8 p.m., at the Junior High auditorium when they perform "George Washington Slept Here," a George S. Kaufman-Moss Hart comedy.

The dramatists are a unique student-teacher team known as "The Group," whose first two productions have been so successful that they were able to finance "George Washington" solely from past proceeds. They debuted in 1970, and have performed "The Impossible Years" and "Don't Drink the Water."

Like "George Washington," both plays were comedies. Director R.W. Lefebline, a teacher at the Junior High, said this week, "Because the audience is mostly young people, it seems that comedy works much better and draws a larger audience than a straight drama would."

Another part of "The Group's" successful formula is the combination of students and teachers in the starring roles. There are also roles for members of the outside community.

Board Tables Pool Measure

A measure which would have limited all new pools in Belleville to an area of no more than 50 percent of a rear yard was tabled by the Board of Commissioners Tuesday night after a stream of objectors said the ordinance was too confining.

The decision was made after a private citizen, Chris Albanese of 53 Frederick Street, suggested portable pools be made exempt from the size limitations, which in-

cluded the 50 percent limitation plus a restriction of five feet from abutting sidewalks. Public Works Commissioner Mary Senatore, who sponsored the ordinance, was amenable to the change, but the bill will have to be drawn up again before it can be passed in the new form. All new permanent pools would be subject to the size limits.

And another limiting ordinance, this one restricting the size of fences to four feet in residential sections and six feet in industrial areas, was passed unanimously by the Board. Building permits, available free of charge, will be necessary to erect any future fences. The ordinance, said Mrs. Senatore, was designed to prevent the erection of "spite fences" between yards of quarrelling neighbors.

Mrs. Senatore said the pool ordinance was intended as a safety measure, since its provisions call for four-foot fences to be put around all existing pools within 45 days of the passage of the ordinance. None of the objectors was present.

School Heist: Two Caught

Two men who allegedly stole six typewriters and 13 microscopes from Belleville High School early Monday morning made it as far as Newark, where police apprehended them the same day with most of the merchandise.

All of the \$4,200 worth of equipment was regained Monday by Newark and Kearny Police and the suspects charged by authorities in Newark, Kearny and Belleville with breaking and entering, larceny and possession of stolen property.

Belleville Police received a call Monday at 7:30 a.m. from High School Principal Raymond O. Smith who said six electric typewriters and eight microscopes had been removed from classrooms over the weekend. Patrolmen Raymond Caruso and Rocco Westby responded and while they were investigating another call reached Police headquarters, this one from Newark Police who said they had caught the suspects that morning after receiving a tip from an informer. The Newark authorities said they had recovered four typewriters and eight microscopes.

At School 8 Public Examines Budget Tonight

The Belleville Board of Education will present its case for a \$7.4 million budget with a 15 percent increase over last year to the public tonight, 8 p.m., at School Eight before voting on adoption of the package.

The public hearing before the Board traditionally does not draw a large crowd, usually no more than a hundred citizens, and much of the campaigning by the Board for their economic blueprint is done at meetings with PTA groups from various schools around town.

The Board of Education reportedly is still divided on the best method to finance needed repairs in Belleville schools. While some Board members are anxious to have the work done as soon as possible through budget appropriations, others are apparently unwilling to see the repairs go down the drain scuttled by the voters, as the past 11 packages have been.

Such members are more in favor of a bond issue to be presented to the voters in a special election sometime later in the year.

The new tentative budget includes an increase of \$141,255 in contracted maintenance services in an attempt to raise the money for necessary projects such as electrical rewiring, roof repairs and the elimination of seepage

into classrooms. Superintendent Anthony Greco described the dilemma of the Board by pointing out that 82 percent of the budget is devoted to salaries, the majority of which have already been bargained for and cannot be touched. He added the \$322,205 allotment for debt service also must be paid, and fixed charges, representing expenditures to funds established by the state or county, total six percent of the budget.

Consequently, said Greco, if Belleville voters rebel on February 13 against the \$935,554 increase over last year, the only place substantial cuts can be made will be in the vital appropriations. "The only place the Board has any freedom to 'make cuts' is precisely where they shouldn't be made," Greco said.

Greco pointed out in the instruction account, where an increase of nearly \$500,000 in salaries is budgeted, the \$840,000 for the 4.8 percent increase in the negotiated teachers' contract and the addition of 10 new teachers, three of them for a work-study program to be initiated in Belleville High School. The other seven teachers, he said, have to be brought on because of the increased enrollment in the school. There are 418 seniors ready to

Vandalized Bathroom Sparks Impromptu Candidates' Debate

member Caesar Romano (also up for reelection) and Steve Rogers, a 20-year-old Air Force sergeant accompanying hard to unscrew one of the incriminators.

The lavatory in question is a boys' restroom located near the gym in the high school and has been repeatedly vandalized over a period of years, with mirrors, sinks and even urinals being ripped out of the walls. The resolution proposed and passed Monday night allowed for a special sink with cast iron legs to be bolted to the floor. The cost is \$495.50.

Mahmorian said before the vote, "Repairs to that lavatory must have amounted to thousands of dollars over the years. I've sat on this Board for three years and seen them (vandals) destroy the type of wall we've put in there."

Superintendent Anthony Greco suggested the employment of monitors in the lavatory might be the only viable solution to the problem, and other board members concurred, with one suggesting it would be illegal to close the lavatory.

"Maybe it's time we didn't comply with the law," said Mahmorian. "I want people in this town to be aware of what's going on in their schools."

After a brief flare-up with Mahmorian over the right to the floor, Romano said he didn't want to see the lavatory shut down because it would penalize innocent students and because outsiders need access to the restroom. "When people come into our schools from out of town," he said, "I want us to put our best foot forward."

Mahmorian was not satisfied with the idea of bathroom monitors, either. "I don't think we should have to spend tax money on monitors when a little discipline can solve the problem," he said.

While the Board caucused, Rogers, who regularly attends school board meetings, told reporters he thought

Mahmorian's idea to close the lavatory amounted to "running away from the problem." He proposed an open study hall for students during which they would be free to leave the school or remain and do schoolwork. "If students have nothing constructive to do, they'll do something destructive. I think the two outside courts at the school should be made into student lounges," he said.

Rogers characterized students as being "locked inside the building all day," and said, "If you tell a student he can go outside, he's not going to stay around and vandalize the school."

In lieu of a workable solution, Rogers said, the Board should conduct interviews with teachers, custodians and students to determine the motives behind the vandalism. When the Board reconvenes from caucus, the floor was opened to citizens and Rogers expressed his opinions again. Mahmorian pointed out his

suggestion to speak with students had been tried in the past when Board members annually or semi-annually met with student leaders. He said the students had wanted to monitor the lavatory themselves and the Board had encouraged this, but the method had failed. "That lavatory would have to be monitored every period everyday," he said.

Mahmorian tempered his earlier remarks of the evening and emphasized he was not opposed to repair of the bathroom, but upset with the need to repeatedly use tax funds to replace the vandalism. He mentioned the idea of hiring aides might be the only effective way of dealing with the problem.

Mahmorian also said he strongly supports the Board policy of billing the parents of students found guilty of vandalism.

Romano later heartily en-

Register Monday For Adult School

For the homemaker there will be four classes in Sewing for Beginners and a class in Interior Decorating. Both have been well-received in the past in light of today's high prices for ready-made clothing and interior decorations.

The sports-minded adult will find satisfaction in such courses as Beginners and Advanced Tennis, Judo-Jitsu, and Activity Night for Women, the latter ideally suited for today's figure-conscious women.

Those needing a foreign language can take Italian (beginners and advanced), Spanish (beginners and advanced), and a special course in Japanese language and culture.

Oddly enough, I received correspondence from Civil Service on January 5 that was almost apologetic in trying to explain their failure to have my June 16, 1972 letter answered. They are still contending that Belleville's Tax Collector is now in the unclassified category, despite the fact that prior to 1960, on the recommendation of C. All this "fuss" comes about only because of the reluctance to give the appointment to Jim Byrne, who is in line for it and has done an excellent job in his acting-tax collector role. A town properly should have a "real" tax collector, not an acting one.

It would be nice if the deserving employee were permanently appointed without further delay.

The lead editorial of the Nutley Sun issue of January 4, states it is committed to doing everything in its power to retain the present Nutley Post Office site. It joins the Town Commission and the Chamber of Commerce in their unanimous efforts to persuade the federal postal authority to change its mind and keep the local post of-

With the opening of this \$15.7 million section of the State highway on Wednesday, January 17, which extends from Lafayette Avenue to Monroe Street, motorists will

have 9.5 miles of uninterrupted freeway driving from Clay Street, Newark, to Passaic.

Future construction contracts "will complete the northern end of the freeway to its terminus with Interstate Route 80 in East Paterson. This 2.6 mile section, now in design, is estimated to cost \$30 million.

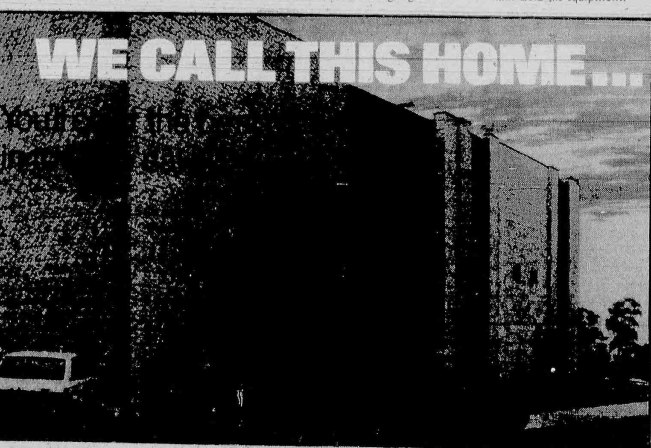

DeWitt Sets Financial High

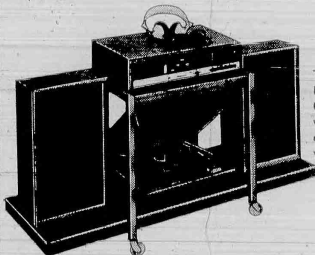

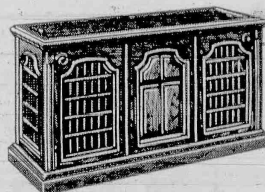

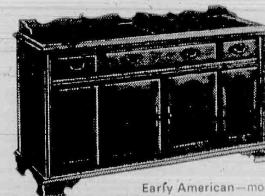

Gambling, Drugs and Rent Control

Various members of the New Jersey Legislature this week sponsored legislation concerning gambling, drugs and rent control.

Essex County State Senator Ralph DeRose wants an agreement among New Jersey, New York and Connecticut to control the flow of drugs from one state to another.

New York's Governor Nelson Rockefeller and Connecticut's Governor Thomas Meskill have called for mandatory life sentences and the death penalty for drug pushers. If these are successful Senator DeRose believes the drug pushers will end up doing business in New Jersey. We believe Senator DeRose's recommendation should be adopted by the Legislature.

Assembly Speaker Thomas Kean, Republican of Essex, is making a strong effort to have the Legislature adopt a bill to control rents. In this effort we support Tom Kean's effort. The federal government has removed controls from apartments and Tom Kean's bill would permit municipalities to roll back rents to the January 1 level and permit only such increases in the future as would be reflected by rises in the cost of living index.

The basic law of economics hinges upon supply and demand. Demand for first-rate apartments continues to be greater than

the supply, hence the need for government control.

State Senator Wayne Dumont is in favor of a November referendum permitting voters to decide whether or not the state's anti-gambling statutes should be abolished. If voters approve such a change the Legislature will be in a position to pass separate laws legalizing casino gambling and the numbers game. We believe Senator Dumont's effort is in the right direction for we find it hypocritical of government to permit a bet to be placed legally, on one side of the fence (at a race track) and the same action on the other side of the fence is considered a crime. We just cannot reconcile the double standard. Either we have gambling or we don't have gambling. Already we have race track gambling and the public lottery, all receiving wide support from the general public. We think it is time to stop hypocrisy concerning government's double standards on gambling and permit the people an opportunity to express themselves on the broad subject of gambling.

Welfare Reform

Just about everyone who has seriously studied the welfare picture in the United States agrees reforms are needed; there are, of course, differences as to how present laws, agencies, local offices, state collaboration agencies, etc., should be streamlined.

All agree there's too much paper work, varying with the various kinds of welfare, and administered by different agencies, local offices can't keep up with the paper work if recipients report each change of address, rent increase, pay hike, new expense, new employment, etc. As a result, the present over-loaded complex system translates into many receiving checks long after they should have been discontinued,

ineligibles receiving checks, some who should receive aid obtaining it late, or obtaining too little, etc.

One impossible requirement of the present system is that it requires recipients who work a different number of hours each week to report the changes. The local office is then supposed to recalculate the recipient's budget, change the amount of money to be given him and notify the central office of that change. Most offices don't have the personnel for such a paperwork task; in fact, many don't have the personnel to check on recipients to see if they are still eligible, every six months, as the law requires.

ONE YEAR AGO

William J. Friel of 208 Stepheno Street retired after serving 36 years as a Town employee. For 26 of those years, Friel had held the position of tax collector. "I had mixed emotions about leaving the position after so many years," he commented. "I served my time and was glad to be of service to the taxpayers here. Most important is that I went out with a clean record."

Unrest by the Belleville Education Association and the slow moving pace of teacher negotiations overshadowed the unanimous adoption of the 1972-73 school budget without modification by the Board of Education. The school board, after a public hearing, okayed a \$6,413,748 total budget figure. Thomas Testa, president of the BEA, asked that the adoption of the budget be tabled for further consideration but his request was turned down by the Board.

Miss Catherine Mathias of 75 Emmet Street, representing the Holy Family CYO, was chosen as the 24th Essex County Snow Queen and received her crown from Rocco Rooney, the town queen. The event took place at the annual Snowball Buffet Dance at the VFW Post Hall in Cedar Grove.

FIVE YEARS AGO

John J. Vreeland was appointed Belleville's new town engineer. Formerly assistant town engineer of West Orange, Vreeland had been employed by the engineering department for 10 years. Professional Engineer Vreeland was a land surveyor and a professional planner.

According to Mayor Kenneth Smith, a parking lot under town auspices was to be ready for operation in March. The Mayor did not release the location of the lot because the Town had more than one location in mind. It seemed definite that the lot would be located within easy distance of Washington Avenue, where at least sixty shops and businesses were in competition. About 90 meters were to be installed at the spot.

Commander Jack Gorgan of Belleville Post 105, The American Legion, announced at a meeting that four members of Post 105 would be honored with life membership cards. The four who were to receive the honor were: John Daley, John McShane, James Travers and George Mitchell.

TEN YEARS AGO

Ralph M. Risoli and Edward Burdy, both Department of Health and Welfare employees, denied that any conflict of authority existed in their particular departments. Both men commented on a news story that had appeared in another paper in which both were said to be at loggerheads over the command of the nine-man department.

An Essex County Grand Jury cleared Councilman James R. Golden of a charge of using town property to further his campaign before his election. After hearing eight witnesses the grand jury voted against

taking any action on the matter. Former Belleville Town Commissioner George Kieran was alleged to have okayed the use of a machine that Golden had utilized for campaign purposes.

FIFTEEN YEARS AGO

A budget of \$2,410,376 for the 1958-59 school year was tentatively adopted by the Board of Education. The new budget exceeded by \$97,483 the expenditures for 1958. The total budget came to the sum of \$2,512,859. The board announced that a public hearing would be held at School Eight at the end of January.

graduate," he said, but 539 freshmen are scheduled to come in next year.

The budget, if approved by the voters would result in an increase of 44 points in the tax structure — meaning, for instance, a taxpayer with a \$20,000 house assessment would pay an extra \$88 next year.

Last year, a budget Greco called "tight, but workable," was rejected by a slim margin of 32 ballots. That budget, amounting to \$6,413,748, with a \$238,116 (4.8 percent) increase over the previous year, was sent to the Board of Commissioners for further prunning.

The Board had made plans for a side presentation on the need for physical improvements in Belleville schools to be shown Thursday night. Other than that, the presentation is not expected to be much different than past years. Booklets will be distributed and each account described in detail to the audience, after which Board members will field questions from the audience. After the public hearing, the Board will vote on the budget.

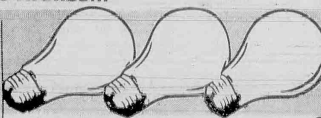

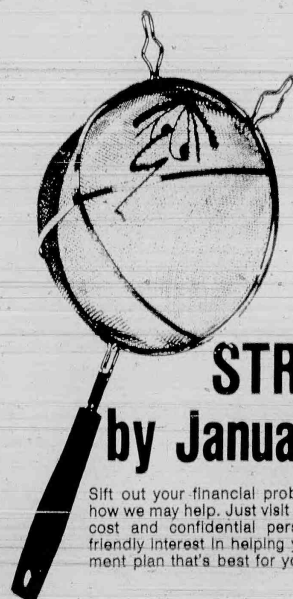

Local Businesses Targeted In Two Armed Robberies

Belleville detectives are investigating two separate and unconnected armed robberies which occurred within an hour and a half of each other January 12.

Two business establishments located in opposite sides of the town were hit by men wielding revolvers. The first was Cal's One-Hour Mart, located at 543 Washington Avenue, where a lone gunman entered at 4:35 p.m., displayed a pistol to the female clerk on duty and removed what Deputy Chief Frank Haight called "a small amount" of money from the cash register. Haight said the police

only have "a vague description" of the suspect for the investigation.

Haight further said police were able to determine that robbery was unconnected to the holdup of Delevan Auto Body at 8-10 Delevan Place. Owner Frank Sprella reported two men entered at 6:04 p.m., brandishing revolvers and stole the day's receipts — a "substantial amount" of money, according to Haight.

Minish Supports Welfare Reform

Congressman Joseph G. Minish, 11th District - New Jersey, has reintroduced his legislation providing for a Federal takeover of the major portion of welfare costs.

In 1969, Minish became the first member of Congress to sponsor legislation providing for assumption of skyrocketing welfare costs by the Federal government.

The Minish bill would convert the Aid to Families with Dependent Children Program to a wholly Federal Program administered by local agencies under Federally prescribed terms including national minimum standards and uniform eligibility requirements. The program's cost would be fully borne by the Federal government.

"By compelling the Federal government," Minish said, "to relieve the States and localities of AFDC welfare costs."

"In addition," Minish commented, "by spreading welfare costs across the broader base of the entire na-

Mounties Best Cagers In Defensive Struggle

The Bellboys clinched with the Montclair Mounties in a close defensive battle Tuesday night and held on for two quarters until their foes broke out and outscored the blue and gold 30-2 over the third and fourth quarters to post a 54-41 win.

Belleville came into the third quarter hanging onto a hard-earned one-point lead, but soon found their zone defense riddled by the Mounties' fast breaks and jumpshots.

The Bellboys are hoping for better luck when they travel to Hillsdale High School Saturday afternoon to meet a team they've never challenged before. The Hillsdale squad has posted a better-than-500 record this season, and one of

their conquered rivals is Morristown, formerly ranked 14th in the state. Their top gun is Harvey Wooten.

Tuesday, the cage quieted down for Columbia, where they will meet the Cougars, a comparatively weak team who nonetheless whipped Belleville 64-51 earlier in the season.

Both the Mounties and the Bellboys employed excellent zone defenses for most of the game Tuesday night, with neither team able to get many shots off. The lead went back and forth through the first half, with the Bellboys ending it one point above the taller Mounties. Despite the fact the Mounties were faring better under the boards, the blue and gold kept pace.

Once into the third period, however, the Mounties were able to consistently get the ball downcourt before the Bellboys could set up their zone. Good jumpshots and offensive tapping pulled the Mounties into the lead while their defense smothered the hopeful Bellboy visitors.

The loss puts the Bellboys' record at 2-10 overall, and 4-10 in the Big Ten.

Tom Cotugno had the best hands on the Belleville team Tuesday, pouring in 16 points, more than half of any other team member. Vin Turturiello, Abdel Anderson and Mark Corino all had eight apiece.

Columbia is an excellent-shooting team, but their offense relies basically on two

players — Rich Broski and Barry Adams. The Bellboys will have to stop both of them in order to stay in the game Tuesday.

After that contest, three games remain on the regular schedule — Orange on February 2, Irvington on February 6 and the final game at East Orange, who the Bellboys defeated earlier in the season in a startling upset. Both Orange and Irvington have previously beaten Belleville.

Scheduled for February is the state tournament, which will be preceded by local playoffs to determine the contesting schools.

A uniform farm price of \$6.61 per hundredweight (46.5 quarts) for December milk deliveries to pool handlers under the New York-New Jersey marketing orders was announced today by A.J. Pollard, market administrator. The uniform price was \$6.87 in November and \$6.24 in December 1971. The butterfat differential was 8.1 cents for each tenth of a pound of fat above or below 3.5 percent.

Dr. Pollard reported that receipts from producers totaled 762,072.632 pounds, a decrease of 40,279,708 pounds or 5.0 percent from December 1971. Sales of fluid milk products (Class I) were 425,106,648 pounds or 55.8 percent of the pool. This was 7.1 percent or 12,500,985 pounds under last year. The December Class I price was \$7.58.

Average daily deliveries per producer were 1,073 pounds, up 18 pounds. The number of producers in the pool fell 1,631 to 22,912, the administrator said.

The amplifiers, powered by transistors, develop very little heat. They are now hardly larger than a fairly large book.

Many people who formerly did not have the space for large apparatus now can enjoy excellent tone quality through component parts, which fit on shelves or can be positioned inconspicuously out of the way places.

If you have the space and want to match the furniture in this room, you can buy magnificent designs for every taste with the finest tone quality. However, you don't need large boxes any more as in the early days in order to have excellent sound reproduction.

You know, I must apologize to Gene Muscara of Muscara Music. He was my business spotlight interview last week and, a most interesting personality. Somehow... somehow... one whole page disappeared and his article was printed minus this last important page.

We reprint it here, in its entirety.

While I waited to interview Gene Muscara, entrepreneur of Muscara Music, I chatted with a young lady who told me her brother had come from St. John's in the Virgin Islands to the store to purchase another instrument. Muscara has had customers from all over the world, the Philippines, Quebec, Canada, London. There's a secret to his success... he really enjoys people.

Gene Muscara started playing the accordion at age 8. He branched out to other instruments, taking lessons from teachers who were specialists in their field. He remembers his accordion lessons with Charles Nunzio of Nutley and, at age 15, he was appearing on radio shows. During the Second World War, he organized bands that played all over the Pacific Islands, one band was the "Mau" the other, "the 14 Hawks", and he appeared with such notables as Bob Hope, Harry James and Betty Grable.

After his discharge, Muscara traveled quite a bit, mostly with the Sammy Del Trio. He credits his wife, Phyllis, as "the woman behind the whole idea" to settle down and open Muscara Music, which they did, in 1952. Since then, Muscara has enlarged his studio to include six stores along Washington Avenue.

Along one wall in the store, there are dozens of photographs, of different "groups", all with a similar message: "thanks for helping us make it." Muscara says it is not financial backing the groups refer to, but the encouragement they needed and, he always finds time to listen. Asking him about the majority of his customers, who are teens, he said "the longer the hair, the more they are," but also said his customers range from age 7 - 70.

I get the impression Gene Muscara likes to try everything, as he appeared on the radio with an orchestra at the Hotel Douglas for two years, the Aldo Aldi TV show where he displayed his talent on the keyboard and more recently, he has done a TV Commercial, playing a glockenspiel. In 1971, he visited among other locations, Managua, Nicaragua as a representative of the United States and Florida in importing and exporting of water purification.

Asking him about youngsters who start music lessons, and then balk, he replied that "the instrument is 40 per cent, the teacher 40 per cent and the practice value 20 per cent." If a youngster comes to purchase an instrument, say, a trombone, Muscara considers it important that as the child advances and learns more the instrument is the type to want what the child has learned. If you have a \$100 trombone, its acceptance is limited and high and low notes prohibitive. In explaining, Muscara noted that a performer, such as Harry James, could take an instrument of low acceptance and play beautifully on it, but he would not demand more of that instrument (highs and lows) that it could give. That's the basic difference in "just buying an instrument" and in preparing for many future years' use. Muscara stresses that the pupil-teacher relationship is vital and if a youngster suddenly finds excuses for not practicing, suggests that you give it another try, change teachers and see if it is really a loss of interest in music, or that the

teacher is not reaching the pupil.

Muscara Music sells and services any type of instrument from a 1 and one half inch harmonica to a Lowry organ. Lessons are also given at the Washington Avenue location. His wife, Phyllis, besides giving him the idea to open the store, works right beside him. The couple have two children, Sandra, a teacher at #3 School and Ed.

The store is open six days a week, Monday, Wednesday and Friday 10 - 8:30; Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday 10 - 6. With a very busy schedule, Muscara finds little spare time, but is a member of the Chamber of Commerce. Employees must find it a great place to work, too. Manager, Janica Torre, for the past five years.

In one of the shops on the Avenue, Muscara's son, Ed, advised him to put in a display... and it is the world's largest display of Zildjian cymbals in the world, about 800.

Muscara said if he had time, there is one goal he has in mind... he would like to teach the blind. "They can get so much out of it, tour around the world by playing all the different music of all nationalities." He once saw Jose Feliciano, one of the finest, and yet blind, guitarists in the world play a Gionanni guitar on TV. The artist wrote a song about "I was blind and couldn't see... and God looked down on me and put a star in my hand." Gene Muscara is a rather exceptional man. PMD

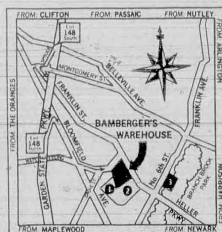

Booklet Briefs Young Adults On Rights, Responsibilities

Community Affairs Commissioner Lawrence F. Kramer today announced the release of a "Guide to 18 Year Old Adulthood in New Jersey," a handbook especially prepared for distribution to New Jersey's estimated 500,000 "new" adults.

Commissioner Kramer also issued a copy of the booklet to each municipal mayor in the state, noting that it would serve as "an excellent guide" in explaining the new rights of those who recently attained the age of majority.

The small handy booklet attempts to summarize the legal rights and responsibilities acquired by the state's 18-21 year-old population under the Age of Majority Law, which took effect yesterday. The publication was prepared and written by the Department's Office of Youth Services and has been endorsed by Governor William F. Cahill and the State Departments of Community Affairs, Education and Law and Public Safety Division of Motor Vehicles.

"This new law will free you from the double standard that made you old enough for some adult rights but not old enough for others," Governor Cahill noted in a letter included on the inside cover of the booklet.

Veneri Issues Blast At Phase 3 Policy

In a joint statement reacting to Phase III of the Nixon Economic Program, Maurice M. Veneri, of Nutley president of the New Jersey Industrial Union Council, AFL-CIO, denounced the new program as one that will "blow the lid off prices, rents and profits, while wages will be rigidly controlled by employers who will simply refuse to go beyond the limitations, which the

President's so-called-voluntary controlled program imposes."

Veneri and Bywater pointed out that by failing to place any restraints on raw agricultural products and cattle, the cost of food to the people of this country will continue to sky-rocket as it has in the past few months, when in

December alone, farm prices increased 6.8% and wholesale prices rose at an annual rate of 20%.

Veneri and Bywater said in the crucial area of rents, removal of controls at this time, when vacancy rates are less than 1%, will give a "field day" to unconscionable landlords.
