# Mary Senatore Files Bid for Senate Seat

Commissioner of Public Works and Town Democratic Chairman Mary V. Senatore filed in Trenton this week as a candidate for State senator in the newly-arranged 30th District. Workers for the commissioner had been canvassing Belleville and surrounding towns in recent weeks and have collected over 2,000 names for the petition for nomination. Only 100 names are legally needed, but Mrs. Senatore said her workers wanted to gauge her strength in the other towns included in the 30th District after reapportionment was affected last month, placing Belleville in a district with Secaucus, Kearny, Harrison, East Newark and part of North Newark.

The commissioner was enthusiastic about the response to the petition campaign. "I didn't realize how many people in the other towns in the area know my name," she said.

Deadline for filing of petitions is next Thursday, and the Democratic primary will take place June 5. Mrs. Senatore said she has not yet heard of any opposition to her bid within the Democratic party.

The redistricting shuffle in March brought about a merger between Democratic forces in Essex and Hudson Counties and it is not yet known whether another Demo candidate will emerge from Hudson.

# Churches to Observe Rites

Belleville's Christian churches will celebrate Maundy Thursday tonight and continue for the rest of the week throughout Easter Sunday in commemoration of the life and death of Jesus Christ.

Several churches plan sunrise services Easter Sunday morning. Branch Brook Park (dead-end section to the right, near the footbridge) will be the scene of a Sunday morning service at 6:30 a.m. sponsored by the junior high classes of Belleville Reformed Church and Wesley United Methodist Church. After the service, a pancake breakfast will be held at Belleville Reformed.

Tonight, Belleville Reformed Church will renew the Last Supper and sing hymns to celebrate Maundy Thursday. The sanctuary will be open Friday from 12:30 p.m. to 3:30 p.m. with the Gospel being read every half hour. In addition to the sunrise service a regular service is scheduled for 11 a.m.

St. Peter's Church will hold a Concelebrated Mass tonight with a procession at 7 p.m. There will be visits to the Repository until midnight. Good Friday will see Stations of the Cross at 3 p.m. and a solemn liturgy including

veneration of the Cross and reception of communion at 7 p.m. On Saturday there will be an Easter Vigil Mass with ceremonies at 7 p.m. Confessions will be heard Saturday from 4 to 5:30 p.m. On Sunday masses will be held at 7, 8, 9:30 and 10:45 a.m. in the church and 9:30 and 10:45 in the auditorium.

At St. Anthony's Church tonight, there will be a solemn Concelebrated Mass. Tomorrow at 2:30 p.m. there will be a solemn liturgical communion with Stations of the Cross at 7:30 p.m. On Saturday at 7:30 p.m. an Easter vigil will be held followed by a solemn Mass. Masses on Sunday will be at 7:30, 9:30, 10:11 and noon.

Fewsmith Memorial Presbyterian Church will hold communion tonight at 8 p.m. Tomorrow will see a vigil from noon to 3 p.m. Identical services will be held Easter morning at 9:30 and 11 a.m. In a departure from past

## Is Belleville Prepared?

# Agencies Are Pooling Emergency Resources

(Fourth in a series by Times reporter, Pat Diana to determine how our town is prepared to handle a disaster)

For the first time in the history of Belleville, according to Civil Defense Director, Jim LaMotta, Belleville District, American Red Cross and members of the CD Auxiliary Police and Fire Department held a preliminary meeting to pool resources and concentrate on long-range planning in the event of a town-wide disaster. LaMotta further stated he felt Belleville was the first town to accomplish this coordination.

Belleville's EOP (Emergency Operation Plan), which is to be updated to reflect the new image of Civil Defense — preparing for any emergency before it happens as opposed to an atomic attack — lists several town functions. Among those which will most likely remain and be geared to new standards are police, public works, welfare and medical operations group as well as a shelter section.

The EOP also inventories and lists vehicles in the Department of Public Works as well as privately owned equipment by such firms as Hoffman Rigging & Crane Service, all of which could be brought into play should a disaster occur such as this series of articles simulating an airplane crashing into the Senior High School cafeteria at lunchtime.

About five years ago, LaMotta made a survey of the doctors and nurses, to compile an emergency roster. Clara Maass Memorial Hospital, of course, has a more complete listing and it is believed the Red Cross also has a compilation. This is one project to be coordinated by Jim LaMotta with the Red Cross and the Hospital personnel, as part of the long-range plans for a more comprehensive EOP program.

In the March 30 edition of the Star-Ledger, an article on trained rescue squads to provide on-the-spot treatment to heart attack victims with telemetered electrocardiograms monitored by a hospital based physician (R-Exess) and passed in the Senate by 34-0. A similar bill was being considered in the Assembly. LaMotta commented on this by saying it was a good and forthcoming thing, and that at the meeting held with other CD officials and the Red Cross, paramedics were discussed as part of the planning.

With reference to simulating a disaster at the High School, LaMotta stated that West Orange, which is planning a disaster in May, had been planning the event since November 1972 and it would not be feasible, at this time, for Belleville to hold such a drill in the immediate future. Belleville's Civil Defense was active during WW II and interest fell off a

# Library Land Deal To Be Reappealed

An appeal to enforce sale to the Free Public Library Board of Trustees of an option to buy land adjacent to the library was dismissed last week and Town Attorney John Scott has requested that a \$1,000 deposit be placed by the Board to be returned to the town.

Lawrence Schwartz, attorney for John Hudson and Patrick Kiernan, who hold the option on the property and had arranged to sell the option to the Library Board in late May of 1968, said Tuesday he will move to reinstate the appeal and charged he and his clients had been led to believe a settlement could be reached without an appeal being decided.

For that reason, said Schwartz, he had not drawn up a brief for his clients' appeal, which was then dismissed.

"I'm not blaming the Library Board or their attorney for this," he had also attempted to settle without the appeal," said Schwartz.

A third party named in the suit was the Belleville Board of Commissioners, led by Mayor Joseph McGreevy. Schwartz went on to say he was "surprised and dismayed that Mayor McGreevy gave this information (on the appeal dismissal) to the newspapers. I believe he did it to make publicity for himself."

The town launched the dispute when the commissioners and Town Attorney Nicholas Amato argued, soon after the \$1,000 deposit was placed by the Library Board with Kiernan and Hudson, that only the municipality can

purchase land for the library.

The property for sale was land at 211 Washington Avenue, owned by the late Dr. Donald Brown. The total purchase price was \$45,000, with \$5,000 being the price for the option to buy. A deposit of \$1,000 was placed by the Library Board, with another \$4,000 due to Kiernan and Hudson within 90 days. However, when town officials found the money had been appropriated from the library's state aid account, the other \$4,000 was immediately frozen by the town. Since 1968, that \$5,000 in question has been denied to the library. Had Schwartz and his clients decided to reinstate the appeal, the money would again be released to the Library Board and entered into their account for maintenance of the library with state aid.

Schwartz was notified this week the town wants back the \$1,000 deposit, but the lawyer would not comment on whether the sum will be returned. Since the appeal will be reinstated, however, it seems likely the money will remain out of town hands until the litigation is finally ended. The case went against Kiernan and Hudson in Superior Court last year.

Schwartz said he did not file his appeal brief "because it's an expensive process to appeal and I was trying to alleviate costs for all parties involved. But I see now we didn't get the same consideration so I'm moving for the appeal in order to protect my clients."

At the time of the original deal in 1968, Kenneth Brooks was president of the Library Board and Joseph Casale was secretary.

# Schools Set for Crackdown On Rising Vandalism Rate

Stricter measures will be employed in Belleville schools to curb vandalism if the current rate of property destruction continues, Board of Education president Lawrence Schwartz told the Times this week.

Schwartz said costs of repairs due to vandalism amounted to about \$1,500 for the first three months of this year. He said the repairs were mainly for the replacement of

a sink in a boys' lavatory in the high school (\$800) and for damage to 58 small windows in School Nine. Vandalism repairs demanded 140 man-hours during the past three months.

Schwartz said the Board is contemplating a "get-tough" policy featuring a closer watch on "trouble spots" and certain prosecution of all apprehended vandals, with a demand for full restitution for all damages.

Beyond that, he said, the Board may "begin to close bathrooms and areas of science rooms that are repeatedly vandalized and we may start to replace broken windows with plywood." He said these measures would be taken "to teach the kids a lesson. We can't condone out-and-out vandalism."

Schwartz added other solutions, such as having students monitor the restrooms, which had already been tried and failed.

The president said the figure for repairs over the past three months is nearly twice as high as in prior years. Though he conceded \$800 is going towards replacement of one sink, he said, "there's still \$750 left being spent on other sorts of destruction."

The new sink placed in the bathroom earlier this year was a large three-basin fixture set into the wall supported by cast-iron legs. It replaced sinks that had been ripped out of the walls by unknown vandals.

Though the new sink was thought to be nearly "indestructible," said Schwartz, the toilets have already been torn off and had to be replaced.

# Schoolers Detail Budget Position

The Belleville Board of Education last week filed a brief with Acting State Commissioner of Education Edward Kilpatrick detailing their side of the 1973-74 school budget dispute and outlining reasons for their request to reinstate the \$450,880 cut from the budget by the Board of Commissioners.

The town fathers will follow suit with their own brief and Kilpatrick will set a date for a hearing between the two parties.

The schoolers' brief was a strongly-worded statement charging the commissioners' "basic and sole motive was to keep the tax rate down." The document went on to contend the large budget slash would disallow "a thorough and efficient system of local schools in the community."

The Board of Education stated they had notified the commissioners of the present dangerous condition of the buildings and the demands by the public at Board of Ed meetings. They included a listing of the ages of all Belleville schools, ranging from 76 years for School Three to eight years for the high school (the only major school to be erected in the last 47 years).

The brief criticized the commissioners' suggested cuts as being "an analysis which was arbitrary and without consideration for the educational needs of the community and primarily and almost exclusively used for the purpose of keeping the tax rate down and could not possibly provide a thorough and efficient system of school in the community."

The document twice made note of the fact the school board was not officially informed of the amount of the cut until the March 20 public hearing on the municipal budget.

The maintenance needs of the school system were repeatedly stressed in the document, with school buildings described as "in advanced stages of obsolescence." Over the years, it read, the Board of Ed had deferred much-needed maintenance and improvements to the school buildings, and further deferment could not be made and keep the buildings safely open to the children and in operation.

# New Mail Schedules Damaging Deadlines

A New post office work schedule put into effect recently in all local and most national mail centers is making for changes in the handling of all bulk and second class mail before and after it reaches the hands of the carriers.

The new postal program, according to Newark Post-

master Joseph Benucci, is entitled the "Expedited Mail Delivery Program" and is intended, say local postal officials, to provide better mail service, especially in the speed of first class mail delivery.

Local weekly newspapers and producers of timely bulk mail such as flyers and other "junk" mail, however, now have earlier deadlines to meet in getting their materials to the post offices to guarantee delivery on the proper day.

Under the new procedure put into effect March 19, bulk mail must be received in the early hours of the afternoon, for it to be processed and delivered the next day. The new schedule of working hours brings the carriers to work at 6:45 a.m. rather than the previous time of 6 a.m., thus cutting short the time required to sort and process bulk mail in the morning. Mailmen work later in the afternoon, however (to 3:15 instead of 2:30) which gives them a chance to take care of the bulk mail for the next day.

According to a spokesman

for the Nutley Post Office, there is now no excuse for first class mail received in the morning not to be delivered the same day. On the other hand, the carriers (who both sort and deliver the mail) are now unable to handle bulk mail received in the morning.

Carriers now return from their routes after lunch to take care of the bulk mail that has arrived. Though the "Expedited Mail Delivery" program is national in scope, its implementation at post offices around the Metropolitan area has been varied. Newark Post Office, for example, said the Nutley Post Office Superintendent, only recently switched over to the new schedule, while other postal stations like Orange have been using the system for a while now.

hit, then picked up during the Korean and Vietnam actions. LaMotta is striving to make inroads and pull together all resources such as Clara Maass Memorial Hospital, the Salvation Army, Churches, Schools and of course, the American Red Cross, Belleville District. He went on to say that planning for such a disaster means permission from the County Civil Defense and the cooperation of surrounding towns, as "No town is sufficient by itself to withstand a disaster of large proportion. We must have reciprocal aid."

LaMotta was pleased with the first meeting with the Red Cross, as he feels they are disaster-oriented and a pooling of resources would result in a more comprehensive program. He hopes to have a minimum of six meetings a year and progressively pull in representatives from the Hospital, Churches, Schools and Salvation Army and feels that in about one year a mock disaster drill could be held to test the individuals and the Emergency Operation Plan.

On a rainy, cold evening, this reporter spent some time riding around on patrol with some CD Auxiliary Police. I thought to myself I would rather be in my warm home watching TV, and I guess, so would these volunteers. The predominant feeling of these volunteers is that they are "doing something" for their town.

There are some gripes, of course. Receiving almost the same training as a regular policeman, they can't write tickets or carry a gun. If they were to come upon a robbery in progress, they would have to call in to headquarters for a regular policeman to handle. They feel, thwarted in this respect and feel that they lack an image and prestige, which could lead to bad morale in the ranks. The volunteers practice shooting and, should a disaster arise, they would be armed with weapons — those having passed the

requirements and tests.

Volunteer policemen continue their training by refresher courses. When asked if they felt qualified to participate in a mock disaster such as described, to a man they said "yes." They felt a simulated disaster would show Belleville what they can do as the second line of defense to our regular Police Department. On my ride around town that night, we toured schools, parking lots, chatted with youngsters on street corners.

A call came over the radio for a regular police car to proceed to the High School, as a "car was blocking another car". This was a call the CD police felt they should handle, to alleviate the regulars for more hazardous duty.

As in any business or organization, those "in the

ranks" follow orders of the "higher ups" that they don't agree with or understand. It

was mentioned by a former CD Auxiliary Police Chief that "not all the men should

carry guns" and to differentiate, psychological testing was suggested.

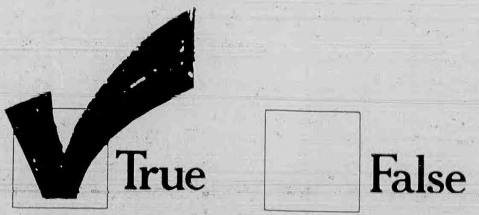

## Teacher Interviewed Advisor Recommends Expansion of Courses

"Teaching High School is a way to reach the youth of America," states Mrs. Marie Bertucci, our four year English and Journalism teacher at Belleville High. She declares that this year has been her most productive. Her informal classroom atmosphere has erased any discipline problems and promotes thinking and receptive students.

Mrs. Bertucci encourages discussion in her classes to motivate her students. By relating to other people, new avenues of learning are opened up. "The students obtain a deeper interpretation of life through communication," she points out, "different perspectives and views on life are received from all participating in an open talk session."

Featured soloists included Nancy Tripp who sang "Michael from Mountains" and "Searlati's 'Gia H sole dal Gange,'" sung by Charles Neiminger.

Kathy Gill was the soprano soloist, Jeff Stone tenor, and James Dahlquist, baritone. Also from the "Creation," they sang "The Heavens are Telling" with soloist Julie Flocke, games Dahlquist and Jeff Stone.

Piano accompanist was Susan Griwert, and the Rock Group accompanists were Russel Purdie on guitar, Donald Messina played bass guitar, and Kenneth played drums.

An added feature, and surprise to all, was the appearance of the Madrigal group, originally not included in the program. Their selections were Bach's "Bouree" arranged by Swingle and "Wilt Thou Unkind" by John Dowland.

## Consumer Problems

The average legislator in Trenton usually is well motivated when she or he introduces new legislation. Among thousands of new bills up for consideration by the legislature is one which would require every retail establishment install a scale for use by customers buying packaged meat and other food products.

The scales would allow consumers to check the weight of their purchase against what is listed on the package. Additionally one bill would compel butchers to grind meat in open view of customers. Another bit of legislation coming to our attention would prohibit large chain stores without a New Jersey registered pharmacist "to sell, dispense and/or furnish internal medicinal products containing anti-histamines, ethyl alcohol in a 10 per cent or greater volume to volume concentration, belladonna, alkaloids or phenobarbital."

The scale requirement sounds good but one of the problems with the scale proposal is the fact that scales are calibrated in pounds and ounces and most packages are calibrated on a decimal scale basis. The customer would be required to read a conversion chart or in the alternative the store owner would be required to invest \$4,000 to \$5,000 in a decimal reading scale.

The suggestion to compel butchers to grind meat in open view of customers sounds very good but such a proposal would be in violation of most community health regulations — not to mention the effect upon the small butchers or the local neighborhood store. The need for a scale and the requirement to grind meat in public view of customers would drive most

small neighborhood stores out of business.

Offices of Consumer Protection in one form or another exist at the state level, the county level and at the municipal level. There are enough inspectors around to fully protect the public interest.

The proposed prohibition to prevent non-pharmacy stores from selling certain nonprescription medicines reminds us of the "Aspirin Bill." That was a piece of legislation which would have prohibited the sale of aspirin except at pharmacies. The public interests were served by the defeat of that measure.

The sale of nonprescription medicine in large discount stores seems to fit a public need. The new regulation being proposed by the State Board of Pharmacies, if adopted, would be against the public interest. The requirement for merchants to furnish a scale for the convenience of customers doesn't make sense because New York has a similar law and few shoppers ever use the scales.

And as for grinding the meat in the public view this proposal makes very little sense because one could well imagine the filth and dust in the air which would penetrate the meat particles as they are being ground. Spot inspection by Consumer Protection investigators should be relied upon to ensure that honest labeling is a fact and not a fiction.

## Insemination

In Britain, where medical services and progress have often shown the way, a British Medical Association panel composed of leading gynecologists and other experts has proposed the National Health Service begin providing artificial insemination to married women.

Under the plan, sperm banks would be created. Donors, who would be thoroughly examined, might be paid. Doctors at regional centers in Britain would apply to the sperm banks for suitable semen specimens, to be matched with the racial, physical and blood group of the prospective parents.

Presently British couples desiring what is termed AID babies (artificial insemination by donor) must usually go through private channels; many couples are hesitant to do so or cannot afford to do so and,

in any event, those desiring AID babies constitute a number in excess of private capacity.

The official British panel suggests the proposed program be carefully studied and controlled, and that babies resulting from the program be declared legitimate and parents declared their legal parents. A continuing study of babies resulting from the program would look into genetic effects, especially where frozen semen has been used, into possible effects on family relationships, etc.

While it is early to comment on a program not yet begun, the concept is a common-sense one; it might well be that in the future many couples who are childless and desire children will have two choices rather than one — adoption and artificial insemination.

## Easter Seals

## Belleville Is Proclaimed Cherry Blossom Capital

One Year Ago

Belleville teachers and representatives of the School Board came to a tentative agreement on the teacher's contract for the 1972-1973 school year. The settlement called for a 5.8 per cent hike in the salaries along with fringe benefits and better working conditions.

Memorial services for Dr. Donald S. Brown, the physician for both the Town and the Board of Education were held at Wadsworth Funeral Home. Dr. Brown was the school physician for more than 40 years, first named to that post in 1931. He served as sports team doctor for more than 18 years, and was appointed official Town Physician in 1963. Dr. Brown succumbed at Clara Maass Hospital after a long illness. He was 67.

Peeling plaster, rotting window sashes, huge holes in the walls and antiquated fire doors, in addition to poor lighting and inadequate toilet facilities were highlights in the tour given of the Belleville Junior High School to members of the local press.

President of the Board of Education Mahmorian, who led the tour, called the conditions "deplorable," and stated that almost no work had been done on the building since 1964, in favor of the up keep of the Senior High School, which he described as the "showcase" for the Belleville school system.

Five Years Ago

Enthusiastic crowds lined Washington Avenue to watch the Cherry Blossom Parade. The celebration was a salute to the town reputation as "the Cherry Blossom Capital." Thousands of people in the area took advantage of the clear weather to witness the display. The highlight of the affair, of course, was the crowning of the Cherry Blossom Queen, Miss Pat Mercier.

Dr. Gerson-Ram, local health officer, was pressing charges against two local pigeon lovers. Dr. Ram was charging Michael De Pasquale and Robert Thaler of improper handling of pigeons. Dr. Ram, when he learned that news of his decision had reached the public, refused to answer questions about the extent of the violations, or any other questions concerning the case.

Ten Years Ago

John R. Burnett became Belleville's

second Town Manager, after leaving semi-retirement at Normandy Beach. Burnett had won the unanimous approval of the Belleville Board of Commissioners. He had been a member of the municipal government in Newark, but had been prematurely retired when the new city government took office.

Nutley and Belleville residents sadly watched town officials lower flags to half mast, in mourning for the crewmen lost on the submarine Thresher. The Thresher was lost in the Atlantic while on maneuvers in deep water. All crewmen were lost, and the ship was never recovered.

The Belleville Little League schedule was announced, and youngsters were told to go to the High School stadium to try out for Farm and Little League positions. Grow-ups were also offered the opportunity to compete, and were told the teams would be formed for them also, if they too completed tryouts.

Fifteen Years Ago

The Heyer Products Co., which employed many Belleville residents announced that it was moving to Pennsylvania. The move came after the company was unable to arrange for financing for this new plant in northern Jersey. Its payroll for its 250 employees, mostly from the Belleville area, brought close to 1½ million dollars a year to the area.

The Rev. Peter Dekenbach announced plans to retire from the ministry at a special Parish Meeting. The announcement came after his serving the Church for almost 50 years, almost all of which was spent as Rector for the Christ Episcopal Church in Belleville. The announcement came at a meeting presided over by Bishop Leland Stark, who was there to inaugurate the church's "Every Member Canvas."

"Self-appointed 'Town Critic' Golden charged Commissioner Sullivan with playing politics in his giving of personnel pay increases. "Commissioner Sullivan, once confident and intrenched politically, betrays a despairing and pitiful portrait of a desperate man grasping for straws when he attempts to size up departmental efficiency in combating of a recent ruinous fire, as vindication for his recent 'giveaway' folly in having granted a \$400 a year pay increase to all his employees."

## She Opposes Zone Variance For Apartment

As a resident of the Bellwood Park section and vice president of the School Ten Home and School Association, I would like to comment on an application for a variance currently pending before the Belleville Zoning Board of Adjustment for the construction of an 84-unit apartment building adjacent to the intersection of Laverne Street and Smallwood Avenue.

The residents of this neighborhood (which has been designated as an 'A' zone by the Belleville Planning Board) are unanimously and unequivocally opposed to this construction. Their whole-hearted opposition has been eloquently witnessed by the large number of objectors who have consistently attended numerous hearings on this application. Not one resident of Bellwood Park has expressed approval of the proposed construction.

During hearings on this variance, every opportunity has been taken by the attorneys for the applicants to suppress viewpoints of the objectors by raising objections to the majority of their questions during cross examination of applicants' witnesses. Are they concerned that the Zoning Board of Adjustment will uncover the true facts about the disastrous effects which this apartment complex will create? Or are the applicants reluctant to admit that their aversive for economic profit will result in the destruction of an entire residential neighborhood?

Incidentally, neither of the applicants is a resident or taxpayer nor do they conduct business in Belleville or send their children to Belleville schools. Obviously, other than gross economic profit, neither will be affected by this apartment construction. It is equally obvious that the welfare of Belleville or its residents does not enter into their motivations.

How can any fair honest individual equate the welfare of an entire neighborhood, including the education and safety of our small children, with the economic profit of two greedy men whose only interest in our community is in gleaming the last dollar of profit from our citizens? Can this possibly be construed as justice? I submit to you that it is the grossest type of injustice perpetrated in the name of pure and simple avarice.

Why is this distasteful variance even being considered? For years the citizens of Belleville have been baffled by certain elected officials into the misguided belief that reduction or stabilization of taxes can be accomplished by increasing ratables through apartment construction. Let's set this myth straight once and for all. The fact is that neighboring communities who have attempted to increase ratables through apartment construction have discovered too late that the cost in municipal and educational services incurred by these apartments far exceeds the meager return in tax assets.

I respectfully submit that we in this neighborhood pay more than \$300,000 annually in municipal taxes. We are paying 'A' zone tax rate and like our neighborhood the way it is otherwise we wouldn't be living here.

There are numerous valid reasons why we are opposed to this construction. The enrollment in School Ten, which is already seriously overcrowded, will be increased as will the enrollment in the Junior High and Senior High Schools also seriously overcrowded. Approximately 150 additional automobiles will be emanating from these apartments onto Belleville Avenue from Laverne Street which is an extremely short street (less than two blocks long) and contains two major intersections (Laverne Street and Smallwood Avenue and Laverne Street and Belleville Avenue), where approximately 180 elementary school children will be required to cross these two intersections four times each day. Certainly, their safety will be seriously endangered by the additional 150 cars entering and exiting from these apartments. In addition, the traffic hazards on Belleville Avenue, which are already extensive, will be increased by the proposed multiple-family dwelling. Many mornings and evenings I am now required to wait as long as ten minutes to enter or exit from Laverne Street and there are now less than twenty cars in this street.

The most serious consideration against approval of this variance is the safety of the potential tenants, since the only access to the apartment site is across a dangerous, gateless railroad crossing which has already been the scene of several automobile/train collisions. According to testimony brought out at various hearings, the estimated daily rate of movement across this railroad crossing will be 700 automobile movements. This does not include pedestrians (adults and children) who will be required to cross the tracks on foot. At times when lengthy freight trains are transgressing these tracks, emergency vehicles such as police, fire and ambulance services will be unable to reach the apartment site and to fulfill the needs of the tenants for these services. This reason alone mandates that the Commissioners deny the application for this variance.

Regrettably, my neighbors have received threatening letters, phone calls, and even visits, and my own children have been harassed and abused by "strangers" in order to achieve the economic profit of these applicants. I fervently protest. Despite these hardships, I am proud to say that we refuse to accept these inequities in the mistaken belief that "You can't fight City Hall." We have banded together and pooled our resources to ensure that this injustice is resolved. We will use all the resources available to us including the county and state courts and our attorney General's office, if necessary, and of course, our voting power.

However, at this time we still have some measure of confidence in our duly elected and appointed officials. When the Zoning Board of Adjustment next convenes to consider this application, my husband and I will join with our neighbors to inspire them not to betray our faith, not to destroy the residential nature of Bellwood Park, not to depreciate the value of our homes, and not to endanger the education and safety of our children.

## Why The Cost Of Beef Is At An All-Time High

It is predicted that per-capita consumption of beef will reach 118 pounds in 1973, and that by 1980 it will hit approximately 130 pounds. In the average super market, meat and meat products account for approximately 25% of all sales, with beef accounting for about half of all sales at the meat counter.

Outside the U. S., the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations estimates that beef consumption in 1980 will be 37% above the 1970 level. WHY DEMAND IS UP

People like beef. Add to this the fact that people eat more beef when their purchasing power increases. These two factors add up to increased demand.

Factors influencing this increased purchasing power are many. Most important among them are:

Civilian employment is up. Last December, it was up almost 1.9 million persons over the previous year. Average weekly earnings are up. For example, in the same period they were up 9.2% in manufacturing industries over the previous year.

Disposable consumer income (after taxes) was up about 7%.

THE EFFECT OF FOOD STAMPS In the fiscal year of 1969, government expenditures for important Federal Food Stamp Program for supplementing the diets of low-income and indigent families and individuals amounted to \$251 million. In the current fiscal year — 1973 — these expenditures are running at an annual rate of \$2.2 billion, a leap of 776% over fiscal 1969.

Food stamps may be used only to buy food and, as Secretary Butz has said in summing up the effect of this on the current beef price situation: "One of the first items purchased with added dollars in the food budget by consumers eligible for food stamps is meat — preferably beef."

AN ADDED COMPLICATION — PORK AND POULTRY

Pork supplies traditionally have a direct impact on beef demand. Corn blights in 1970 and 1971 sent feed grain prices so high that many hog breeders went out of business or were forced to reduce their herds drastically. As a result, the price of pork went higher than the price of beef. Pork is the second choice, after beef, of housewives shopping for meat, but when there is little difference in price, they generally buy beef. "Cheaper" pork no longer is the alternative.

Increasing grain prices have sent poultry prices upward, too, diminishing the attractiveness of this alternative to high-priced beef. For example, broiler chickens for delivery to Chicago in the week beginning February 19 cost about 39¢ a pound, up 11¢ over a year ago.

WHAT ABOUT SUPPLY?

The total supply of marketable beef available to consumers in 1972 increased by about 2% over 1971. Predictions are that 1973 will show an increase of approximately 3%. Neither figure, according to experts is sufficient to meet demand and thereby reduce prices to the consumer. A 10% increase in all meat supplies has been cited as necessary before that occurs.

WHAT ACCOUNTS FOR THE HIGH COST OF BEEF? A situation which has disrupted last week's supply. Well, I asked the question and I received a nine-page answer. Now I invite our readers to be my guest and receive the answer to the question why is the price of beef so high?

FACTS ABOUT THE HIGH COST OF BEEF The price of beef in the United States today is at an historic high. At the wholesale level in January, according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture, it had gone up 18.2% over the past three months, and at the retail level — what the consumer pays at the checkout counter — it had gone up 8.4% during the same period of time. The rise is continuing, with experts forecasting the possibility that wholesale prices will climb another 8% before the summer.

Why? Consumers everywhere are asking this question as they see their food dollars shrink in value, with the cost of hamburger, roasts and steaks going ever upward.

There is no one, simple answer to the question. If there were, it would be relatively easy to find one, simple solution to the problem.

Rising beef prices have come about through a combination of many circumstances. Perhaps the most important reason is that more people than ever before

are consuming beef. They like it, not only in the U. S. A., but in just about every part of the industrialized, and emerging, world. Although supplies are greater than ever before, they have not been great enough to meet demands.

With demand soaring, a logical question then is why have not supplies kept pace? Also, when will prices level off and go down?

The purpose of this "BEEF PAPER" is to answer these questions with information as authoritative as it is possible to collect at this time, and in so doing to answer another question often asked — by the consumer: Who, if anyone, is reaping undue profits in getting beef to the meat counter from the range?

First, let's look at the demand: "EVERYBODY WANTS MORE STEAKS AND ROASTS"

Recently, Secretary of Agriculture Earl B. Butz, in commenting on the increased demand for beef, said, "People want beef, and as they have enjoyed more, and more real wages, they have been buying more and more beef — and a better quality beef, too."

Despite relatively high beef prices in 1972, per-capita consumption of beef in the United States increased 2.9 pounds over 1971 — from 113 pounds per person in 1971 to 115.9 in 1972. Twenty years ago, per-capita consumption of beef was 56 pounds, less than one-half the current rate.

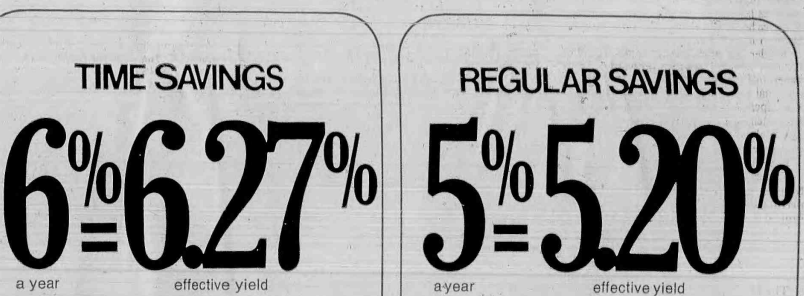

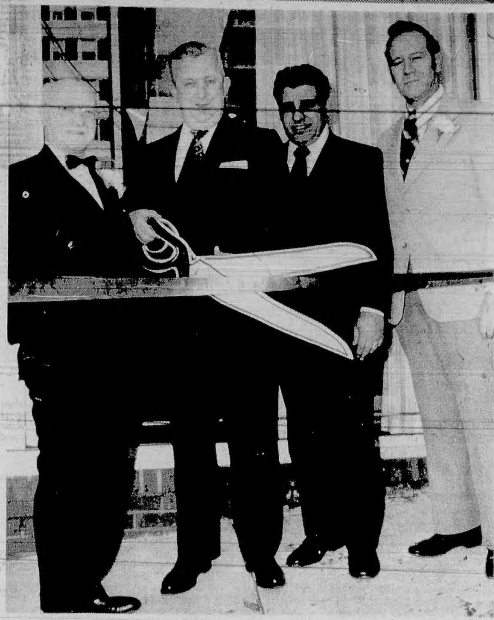

## "WHY I'M RUNNING FOR GOVERNOR"

by Ann Klein



I am always amazed at the number of people who seek public office considering that the labor is exhausting, merciless, and so very public. Apparently, they are all rewarded sufficiently to persist. But it is because I feel very strongly about this state and what it needs, that I am running for the Democratic nomination for Governor.

Before I tell you why I want to be Governor, let me introduce myself to those of you who may not know me.

I am, at present, Assemblywoman from Morris County. I have lived in Morris town for 23 years, raising a family, getting involved first in school and community affairs, later on a statewide level as a member of the New Jersey League of Women Voters and then as Governor Hughes appointee to the New Jersey Council Against Crime and the State Tax Policy Commission.

### First Democrat in 60 Years

It was my work in these areas, seeing the need for fairer laws, particularly regarding the tax structure, that made me decide to run for the State Assembly. When I won, in 1971, I became the first Democrat to hold that seat in over 60 years.

I now find myself the first woman to seek a major party's nomination for Governor of this state. As you know, to vote in the New Jersey primary one, does not have to be a registered Democrat, merely a registered voter. Thus I ask every one of you to be sure to vote on Primary Day June 5. The kind of campaign that is waged will make a big difference in the kind of administration we get, no matter who wins in November. It will also affect the nature of the Legislature. One of the greatest problems in getting any reform through is the backing, or lack of it, in the Legislature.

So be sure to vote on June 5.

Now, why do I ask you to vote for me?

### Independent Candidate

Of all the Democratic candidates I am the only one that is not the product of a machine. I believe all the voters should be given an opportunity to assess their candidates. For that reason I refused to appear before the Democratic party's screening committee, preferring, instead, to bring myself and my record to you, the voters.

While I am the first woman to seek this office in New Jersey I consider myself a woman candidate, not a woman's candidate. I introduced an amendment on equal rights for women and I firmly believe that all people, regardless of sex, race or religion should be given every opportunity for education and for service in our society. However, while in the Assembly I sponsored 23 bills, co-sponsored 93 of them. They were concerned with a broad spectrum of problems — consumer protection, education, ecology, insurance, housing, labor relations, taxes, transportation.

For example, I introduced bills:

- requiring every applicant for a marriage license to be informed of the

existence of genetically linked diseases and ailments and of tests and counseling help available ("Genetic Diseases Information Act of 1972").

- appropriating \$1,000,000 for family planning.

- banning the use of mgs in baby foods.

- requiring high school American history courses to include black history.

- appropriating \$10,000,000 for the acquisition of lands for recreation and conservation.

- requiring an accounting of lottery money.

- granting municipalities access to state funds to make necessary housing repairs.

- making emergency repairs deductible from tenants' rent.

- requiring the Board of Public Utilities to consult with the Department of Environmental Protection before granting franchises and privileges to public utilities.

- making psychological service benefits available under group health insurance.

### Campaign on Issues

I list these examples only to show that my interests are the interests of all the people of the state, not just the women, not just the special interests. While it would be exciting and historic for New Jersey to have the first woman chief executive, that is not what this campaign is about. It is about issues, very real and pressing issues. I do not pretend to have all the answers. But I do believe I see the problems and have the experience to find and inspire the very best people to explore these problems. The people of New Jersey have lost faith in their government. And, I am afraid, for very good reason. We are the 5th richest state, yet we cannot provide adequate housing for all our people. The New Jersey homeowner pays the highest property tax in the country. In many instances they are paying on what they owe — mortgages — rather than on what they own. Our cities are being abandoned by industry because they find it less costly to operate in the suburbs. This leaves a corps of jobless in the cities; our unemployment is 4.5% higher than the rest of the country. The Port Authority, which was established to provide transportation, has been permitted to concentrate only on the own, and the results are choking our roads and placing an intolerable burden on the commuter. The Consumer Protection Agency, set up to protect the consumer, spends its time and budget printing weekly menus that are suitable for upper income families of four who never eat breakfast or lunch. Why isn't it publishing regular bulletins warning of consumer frauds, the way other states do? And for stories of corruption I refer you to the daily papers.

In the weeks until Primary Day, June 5, I will be writing in this column about these issues. I hope that by the end of that time you'll have the answer to why I'm running for Governor.

## You And Your Pet Pet Allergies

Webster's Dictionary defines "allergy" as an "exaggerated or pathological reaction to substances, situations or physical states that are without comparable effect on the average individual."

As many pet owners know, the "individual" may be a dog as well as a person.

In fact, it has been estimated by veterinarians that 10 to 15 percent of all dogs—roughly the same percentage as in the human population—may be subject to allergies.

Your dog may be allergic to a number of things. If his allergy causes a skin condition, it may be traced to something in his home or neighborhood dust, pollen, a plant or flower or chemicals in the soil.

The allergy may reveal itself as inflammation, swelling about the face, itching, scaling of the skin or loss of hair.

These are also symptoms of other skin problems. So your veterinarian will have to decide whether or not your dog's problem is caused by an allergy.

All dogs can have fleas, but while some have no serious reaction to these pesky parasites, other dogs can be extremely allergic to them. Some experts believe the allergic condition is not from the flea itself but from the flea saliva.

Whatever the exact cause, once the allergic problem has been diagnosed by your veterinarian, fleas are normally easy to get rid of, and the allergic reaction will disappear along with the fleas. Fleas only come to your dog to eat. For proper control, your premises should be sprayed with insecticides.

Parasites also cause conditions called canine scabies mange, which causes itching, and demodectic mange.

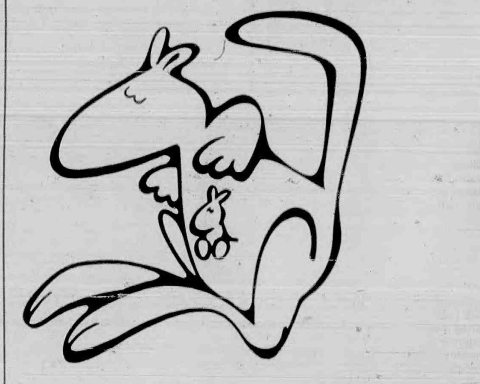

trict and continue his tenure and in the upper-chamber of the legislature. Belleville is losing the fine representation of this eminently qualified trio.

Who will win the "brass ring" on the political carousel resulting from the new district? You can bet your bottom dollar that there will be a real Donnybrook "dog-fight" that will center around this usually quiet town in such elections. The reason the candidates... for the top slot of Senator... Publicly announced and running is ebullient, popular North Ward Champion, Assemblyman Anthony Imperiale. Pitted against the Independent political heavyweight will be Belleville's own, Commissioner Mary V. Senne who recently, at a well attended gathering of selected invited guests, proclaimed her intentions of seeking that seat under the Aegis of the Democratic Party.

The Party is beholden to Mrs. Senne for her graceful withdrawal from consideration as an appointee to fill an unexpired Freeholder term. The Party designation could prove helpful because of the strong democratic vote coming out of Hudson County. Yet, it, likewise, could result in the immolation of a budding political star, since the suave, magnetic, charismatic power of Tony Imperiale appears growing and invincible.

Well, at long last, after strong "pressure" applied by Senator Jim Wallwork, at my request, we can now explain the real story of why nothing has been done to clear up that disgraceful traffic congestion at Belleville and Washington Avenue.

At the behest of the Senator, Comm. John C. Kohl, State Dept. of Transportation, ordered his Chief Engineer, Frank S. Parker, to respond to my inquiries about the situation. His communication discloses a man from his Bureau met with Chief Joseph Smith, after investigating traffic conditions, to discuss the problem and my suggested solution.

The engineering chief states it would be desirable to have the left turns removed so that the Commissioner is empowered to do this by law, but, they must depend on the local officials to enforce such regulations. He indicated the local officials are not in agreement and that they could, ergo, expect little enforcement.

Chief Smith is reported to have indicated that the town does not consider the problem a serious one. The State agrees my alternate proposal has merit, but, is impossible if the local officials refuse to move to reverse the direction of the one-way street.

Chief Smith is a good man, but, patently is under the "thumb" of the local officials, since his proposal to discuss the problems with the local officials and report back to the Chief Engineer, if they were interested in pursuing the matter further, has occasioned the Chief Engineer to report, "To date, we have heard nothing from the local officials."

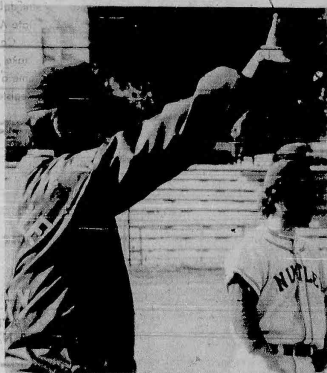

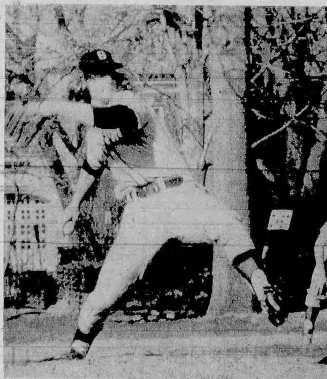

# Dry Springtime Conditions Prime for Forest Fires

Now is the time for property owners in forested areas to remove debris and flammable materials to help guard against the spring outbreak of forest fires.

That's the advice of State Firewarden William B. Phoenix who pointed out that cleaning up and removing debris and flammable materials is an important step in reducing the possibility of forest fires later on. Dry conditions and high winds usually prevail during the spring season, but forest fires can take place anytime when the woods are dry enough to burn.

Phoenix reminded property owners that permits are required for recreational fires or any prescribed burning in any area located within 200 feet of woodland, brush, salt marsh, or field which might carry fire to these flammable areas. Permits can be obtained from local firewardens.

He cautioned that Chapter 2 of the state air pollution code prohibits open burning of leaves, plant life or refuse and prohibits any salvage operation by open burning.

For five of the last six years, New Jersey has held its forest fire damage to under 10,500 acres. Less than one-tenth of one percent (1,931 acres) of all lands protected by the department's Forest Fire Service were burned

during 1972. The 1972 damage was the lowest ever to be recorded by the state.

Major factors in this accomplishment, according to Phoenix, were the use of modern firefighting equipment, intensive training of forest fire personnel and good individual conservation practices of hunters, fishermen, picnickers and residents.

Approximately 47% of New Jersey (or over two million acres) remains forested, and public cooperation is still most vital in the control of fires.

In preparation for the spring forest fire season, eight air attack bases are maintained and fully staffed from April 1 through May 12. Six of the bases are for helicopters: Hopalong State Park, Morris County; Holmansville State Quail Farm and Miller Air Park, Ocean County; Thompson Park, Jamesburg, Middlesex County; Atison (Wharton State Park), Burlington County; Davis Field, Mays Landing, Atlantic County. Two fixed wing air tankers are stationed at Coyle Field, Burlington County and at the Downtown Airport, Gloucester County.

Helicopters loaded with liquid fire retardant will be on standby alert during the danger period. Under actual fire conditions, the helicopters

and fixed wing aircraft drop retardant on a blaze and keep it under control until the arrival of Forest Fire Service crews and equipment.

Helicopters are extremely effective in containing such blazes because they can take water on board from lakes, ponds or rivers without returning to the home base. The fixed-wing aircraft must return to base or landing strip for replenishing from a tanker supplied by the Forest Fire Service.

Only special permits for burning during daylight hours will be issued in forested areas while the air attack program is in effect.

## Van Cliburn Slated In Sell-Out Concert

Van Cliburn, pianist, will appear on the Unity Institute concert series at the Montclair High School auditorium on Friday evening, April 27. The performance is sold-out.

Since 1958 when he delighted the world with his stunning performance at the First International Tchaikovsky Competition in Moscow, Van Cliburn has enjoyed recognition far greater than most politicians and performers in the popular arts. Upon his return from Russia he was given the first ticketpage award for a musician in Manhattan, congratulated by President Eisenhower and given a

testimonial luncheon in New York City.

Born in Shreveport, Louisiana, he was already a veteran of public performances by the time his family moved to Kilgore, Texas, when he was six. His mother had been a talented pianist who had studied with Arthur Friedheim, a pupil of Franz Liszt. Her parents had prevented her from following a concert career but due to her

years of practice and study she was able to start her own playing the piano when he was three years old. At age twelve he won a state-wide young pianist's competition, and played the Tchaikovsky First Piano Concerto with the Houston Symphony. That same season he made his Carnegie Hall debut as winner of the National Music Festival Award. Until he came to New York to study with Juilliard's Mme. Rosina Lhevinne at age fifteen his mother had been his only teacher. Upon graduation from Juilliard with highest honors, he won two awards

which enabled him to go on to graduate work. At eighteen he won the Leventritt Foundation Award with his playing of Liszt's Twelfth Rhapsody. Although the Leventritt competition is held annually, no prize is awarded unless the judges feel there is a worthy recipient. When Van Cliburn received the award in 1954, he was the first winner since 1949. As winner he had the privilege of playing in concert with major American orchestras, the New York Philharmonic, the Cleveland, Pittsburgh, Denver, and Buffalo symphonies. (The Buffalo will be appearing here next

year on Unity's 54th Concert Course.) The story of Van Cliburn's invasion of Moscow is well known. He immediately won the hearts of the Russian people, as well as the acclaim of the critics, and tickets were in such demand that people lined up three or four days in advance. Word seeped back to America, which until then had been fairly oblivious to the Moscow Competition, and by the time Cliburn was proclaimed the winner he was front-page news around the world and the idol of millions. Upon his return home he had lived up to expectations.
