Belleville Is Proclaimed Cherry Blossom Capital

Belleville teachers and represen-tatives of the School Board came to a tentative agreement on the teacher's contract for the 1972-1973 school year. The settlement called for a 5.8 per cent hike in the salaries along with fringe benefits and better working conditions.

Memorial services for Dr. Donald S. Brown, the physician for both the Town and the Board of Education were held at Wadsworth Funeral Home. Dr. Brown was the school physician for more than 40 years, first named to that post in 1931. He served as sports team doctor for more than 18 years, and was appointed official Town Physician in 1963. Dr. Brown succumbed at Clara Mass Hospital after a long illness. He was 67.

Peeling plaster, rotting window sashes, huge holes in the walls and an-tiquated fire doors, in addition to poor lighting and inadequate toilet facilities were highlights in the four given of the Belleville Junior High School to members of the local press.

Nutley and Belleville residents sadly watched town officials lower flags to half mast, in mourning for the crewmen lost on the submarine Thresher. The Thresher was lost in the Atlantic while on maneuvers in deep water. All crewmen were lost, and the ship was never recovered.

The Rev. Peter Dekenbach announced plans to retire from the ministry at a special Parish Meeting. The announcement came after his serving the Church for almost 50 years, almost all of which was spent as Rec-tor for the Christ Episcopal Church in Belleville. Why The Cost Of Beef Is At An All-Time High

It is predicted that per-capita consump-tion of beef will reach 118 pounds in 1973, and that by 1980 it will hit approximately 130 poinds. In the average super market, near and meat products account for ap-proximately 25% of all sales with beef ac-counting for ahout half of all sales at the meat counter. Outside the U.S., the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations estimates that beef consumption in 1980 will be 37% above the,1970 level. **WHY DEMAND IS UP** People like beef. Add to this the fact that people as more beed when their purchasing power increases. These two factors add up to increased demand. Factors influencing this increased

Increased demand. Factors influencing this increased purchasing power are many. Most impor-tant among them are: Civilian employment is up. Last December, it was up atmost 1.9 million per-sons over the pervious year. Average weekly earnings are up. For example, in the same period they were up 9.2% in manufiscturing industries over the previous year. Disposable consumer income (after taxes) was up about 7%.

THE EFFECT OF FOOD STAMPS

The EFFECT OF FOOD STANTS In the fiscal year of 1969, government expenditures in the important Federal Food Stamp Program for supplementing the disc of low-income and indigent families and in-dividuals amounted to \$251 million. In the current fiscal year — 1973 — these expen-ditures are running at an annual rate of \$2.2 billion, a leap of 776% over fiscal 1969.

Food stamps may be used only to buy food and, as Secretary Butz has said in summing up the effect of this on the current beef price situation: "One of the first items purchased with added dollars in the Jood budget by consumers eligible for food stamps is meat — preferably beef." AN ADDED COMPLICATION — PORK AND POULTRY Park sumples raditionally have a direct

AN ADDED COMPLICATION - PORK AND POLITRY Pork supplies traditionally have a direct impact on beed demand. Corn blights in 1970 and 1971 sent feed grain prices so high that many hog breeders went out of business or were forced to reduce their herds diastically. As a result, the price of pork went up faster than the price of beef. Pork is the second choice, after beef, of housewiess shopping for meat, but when there is little difference in price, they generally buy beef. "Cheaper" pork to longer is the alternative. Increasing grain prices have sent poultry prices upward, to, diminishing the attrac-tiveness of this alternative to high-priced beef. For example, broiler chickens for delivery to Chicago in the week beginning February 19 cost about 39 a pound, up 11e over a year ago.

Peruary 19 cost about 39k a pound, up 11c over a year ago. WHAT ABOUT SUPPLY? The total supply of marketable beef available to consumers in 1972 increased by about 2% over 1971. Predictions are that 1973 will show an increase of approximately 3%. Neither figure, according to experts is sufficient to meet demand and thereby reduce prices to the consumer. A 10% in-crease in all meat supplies has been cited as necessary before that occurs.
