To Buy Equipment

St. Peter's Kids 'Think Soup' But It's the Labels They Need

The students of St. Peter's Grammar school have soup on their minds these days, and they'd like other Bellevilleites to "think soup" also — Campbell's brand, in particular.

It isn't just another

marketing operation the youngsters are involved in, but a town-wide project to replace badly-needed audiovisual equipment the school lost through a recent State Supreme Court decision. The ruling, detailed in another ar-

ticle on this page, meant the surrender of all state-owned equipment which had been on loan to the school.

Searching for a way to recoup the losses, Sister Beatrice Guider, the school's new principal, discovered a Campbell's soup project in which a school could "buy" equipment with labels from the company's soup cans. Though thousands of the familiar red and white labels are needed to win a single piece of equipment, the youngsters and parents of St. Peter's plunged into the drive without hesitation. Despite their efforts, though, it looks as if they may not meet the modest quota they've set unless some massive support comes from outside the parish.

Eighth-grade teacher Paul Reitemeyer, coordinator of the drive, told the Times last week 6,500 labels have been collected towards the \$5,000 needed. The target quota would bring St. Peter's the following: three portable cassette players, three record players, two listening centers (tape players with several earphones which a number of students can use at one time) and three slide projectors.

The desired equipment doesn't approach the amount

the school gave back to the state (including 16 record players and 16 listening centers), but Reitemeyer believes the Campbell's equipment could be a start to building the supply up again. There's no doubt the equip-

Leaf Removal Set To Begin Monday

Leaf removal equipment will move through town for two weeks beginning Monday, Nov. 19, Director of Public Works Mary V. Senatore announced this week.

Mrs. Senatore urged residents to lend their cooperation in the removal operation, which will see Town workers follow a designated route through Belleville. She added a leaf packer has been rented for the operation in order to save trips to the dump and give more time for leaf removal.

Public Works trucks will start Monday in clearing the Valley section, and then will move along Washington Avenue to Union Avenue and through the northern section of town above Greylock Parkway. The route then extends all through the Greylock area, up to Rutan Road, all through the St. Peter's area and all streets off Belleville Avenue and Joramelon Street.

Next, Public Works employees will concentrate on the Soho area and the Silver Lake section. Mrs. Senatore said the route has been set up according to the density of trees in each area. She added every street in town will be covered during the two weeks which the Department has rented the leaf removal equipment.

Pharmacists Develop Senior Aid Program

Belleville pharmacists recently met to implement a program which will allow reduced service rates to senior citizens who patronize drug stores here.

Owners and managers of all six major pharmacies decided to enter the Senior Citizens Assistance Program (SCAP) which will allow seniors bearing a SCAP card to receive services at a "reduced professional fee."

A spokesman for the group said, "Because of the economic pressures upon the older segment of our population and the decreasing power of pensions and Social Security payments, a decision was made to aid our senior citizens." The Department of Public

Affairs will assist the druggist by mailing application forms to local seniors. Any resident of Belleville, aged 62 or more may qualify for the program by filling out and returning the application. Each applicant will then receive a SCAP identification card.

The participating pharmacists will give reduced fees for prescription medications, delivery service, patient profile cards, prescription pickup and charge accounts. Local pharmacist are permitted to join SCAP under legislation recently enacted by the State Legislature. The program receives no financial support from the government, and the burden of the decreases in fees will be borne by the druggists.

In Bond Groundwork

Committee to Review Architects for School

The Board of Education will name a citizens' committee to review a field of three architects, one of whom the trustees will name to plan a proposed addition for the Senior High School. The panel will be appointed at a meeting of the Board Monday, Nov. 26.

The selection of the architect will be a prelude to the organization of a multi-million dollar bond referendum which will come before Belleville voters probably within the next 10 months. After interviewing six architects, the Board narrowed their consideration to three, who will now be interviewed by the citizens' committee. Board of Ed president Lawrence Schwartz said the group's recommendation would be returned to the trustees, who would name one of the three candidates to the job. The decision of the citizens' group would not be binding on the Board.

Schwartz said the panel will be composed of 10 or 12 residents, "some of whom will be familiar with building, and all of whom are active in the school system and have an interest in what happens in Belleville schools." The Board president said selection of the committee is not yet completed. He also declined to name the three architects

under consideration by the school board.

The intent of forming an advisory committee to help select the architect is to head off public reaction similar to the furor which accompanied the construction of the high school building in the early 1960's. In proposing the referendum, the Board of Education is hoping to buck the familiar voting trend in Belleville which has seen the rejection of 11 school budgets in the past 12 years. Schwartz said the trustees would conduct an intensive tour of local elementary schools to explain all facets of the bond proposal in the weeks preceding the vote.

The bond would finance an addition of approximately 20 classrooms at the high school, along with a major repair program at the junior high school and in all nine elementary schools, which would

receive repairs in the lighting and electrical systems. If approved by voters, the project would probably be completed

in 1976.

The new addition on the high school would enable the relocation of the ninth grade from the junior high to the senior high school building, thus relieving overcrowding in both schools. The Board president said Belleville High School has a student population of 1,400 in a building constructed for 1,000, while there are 1,500 in the junior high school, which was designed for 1,000.

Schwartz added the entire Board of Ed is unanimously behind the expansion and maintenance package, but said differences may arise over the extent of the costs involved. He added no estimates can yet be made on the cost of the bond until the architect has made preliminary calculations.

Plan Two Joint Services For Eve of Thanksgiving

Church, Belleville Reformed, Montgomery Presbyterian, Fewsmith Presbyterian, Assembly of God and Second Baptist.

The sermon at the Reformed Church service will be delivered by Chaplain (Col.) Harold B. Lawson,

U.S.A. (ret.). The sermon will be titled "Thank We All Our God."

Chaplain Lawson is a minister of the United Presbyterian Church in Newark and a graduate of Princeton Seminary and Yale Divinity School.

Plagiarism, literary theft; the passing off as one's own the words or ideas of another, is anathema among credible writers. It is eschewed as a plague, ergo, let the fact be known that while the sentiments expressed in this particular article reflect my own thinking, they are largely the borrowed views so cogently written by Ernest Cuneo in a recent syndicated Star-Ledger editorial page commentary.

I feel they are especially appropriate at this time when the credibility of so many of our Nation's highest leaders is in doubt. While some may have read Mr. Cuneo's article, it is probable that many missed his description of a few of the outstanding men of the past in the field of politics whose honesty and integrity, regrettably seems missing today.

His theme "The Little Flower Was A Rare Breed" portrays the sterling quality of men in public life of an earlier era. Mr. Cuneo writes as follows:

"The honesty of Big Jim Farley is legendary in his time. 'This is a great day for me,' he confided to a friend in 1958. 'After 18 long years, I'm at last out of debt. I

State Requirements Delay Parking Meter Revamping

A plan to add another hour of parking time to Washington Avenue parking meters was held up last week as the Board of Com-

missioners await approval for the project from the State Department of Transportation.

The Town needs routine approval from the State after removing seven meters from Washington Avenue after State planners said they impeded the flow of traffic. The meters were located opposite T-intersections.

The new plan will see parking meters located all along Washington Avenue on both sides of the street from Newark to Nutley. The biggest change from the present pattern will be the availability of two-hour parking on the meters. Parkers will be able to buy one or two hours at a nickel apiece.

The chief promoters of the

new arrangement are Washington Avenue merchants who feel the extra hour on the meters will stimulate shopping activity on the Avenue.

The final vote on the change was expected at last Thursday's Commission meeting, but had to be postponed because the approval by the State had not arrived.

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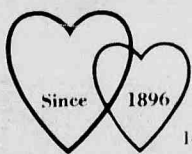

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Lions Learn Of Air, Water Pollution Ills

Robert J. Baker, Technical Director, Wallace and Tieren Division, Pennwalt Corporation, Belleville, N.J. addressed the Belleville Lions Club on air and water pollution problems at the November 8 meeting.

Baker pointed out the conflicting goals between energy conservation and air pollution control. As an example, he reported that a system to remove sulphur compounds from the flue gas of a coal fired power generating plant will require five percent of the electricity produced.

He pointed out further that so long as materials are used and consumed for the benefit of man there are going to be wastes and these can only be disposed in our waters, in the air or on land. He claimed that the national goal of zero pollution of our water resources is unattainable and predicted that the law will be modified to a reasonable and practical degree.

The Oil Shortage

More important to U.S. consumers than oil developments in the Middle East was Venezuela's recent hike in oil prices — a 56 per cent increase, the tenth announced this year.

Added to other oil acquisitions and price problems, this development greatly increases the need for the United States to develop other sources of power, to acquire more oil from new sources and for the American people to save fuel in every possible way.

There's now little doubt — because of events in the Middle East and elsewhere — that an oil shortage exists and threatens to

remain a problem for several years. That being the future, the proper role of the federal government is to hold price increases to reasonable levels, to bar sharp and excessive hikes always a temptation to sellers in shortage situations, and to order allocations when necessary.

The U.S. supply of petroleum products will continue to be quite large, relatively, though not always enough for everyone everywhere; thus the development of new energy sources and the conservation of energy by families, businesses and the local, county, state and federal governments, are a must.

Trapeze Tragedy

Another aerial acrobat fell recently while performing without a net before a large crowd; in this case (in Canada) it was a woman and she was so critically injured she was not expected to recover.

These accidents occur regularly, and usually before crowds including hundreds of children. The performers are risking their lives for money (as do drivers in automobile racing) and part of the attraction among spectators is the morbid

danger and risk involved.

A law requiring aerial performers to work over nets is long overdue; the performance is equally impressive, and when a mistake occurs — and they are inevitable — no one dies to pay for it. Ticket sales for the threat of death, whether at race tracks or circuses, have no place in America — money is not something citizens should be allowed to risk their lives to earn, for promoters and themselves.

Local Bank Heist Suspect Pleads Guilty Before Judge

According to Stern, Stakiwicz admitted by his plea that he took \$1,560 from the DeWitt Savings and Loan Association, 463 Washington Avenue, Belleville, on September 21. Stakiwicz was arrested shortly thereafter by

According to Stern, Stakiwicz faces a maximum sentence of 20 years imprison-

ment and a fine of \$5,000.

Stern praised the Federal Bureau of Investigation and the Belleville Police Department for their excellent work leading to the apprehension, indictment and conviction of Stakiwicz. Assistant U.S. Attorney G. Donald Haneke handled the case for the Government.

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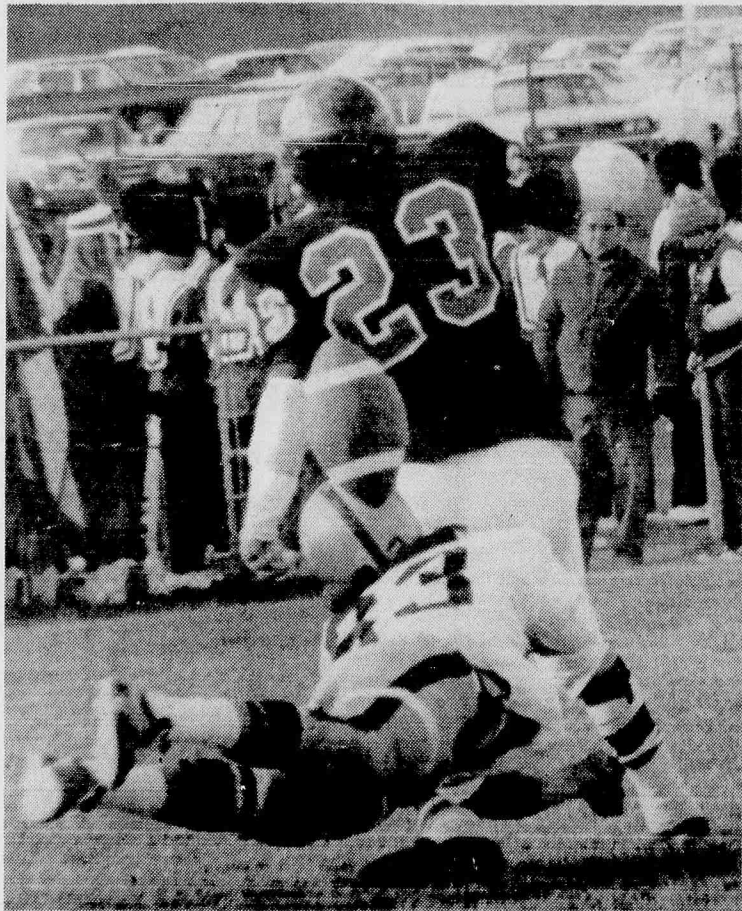

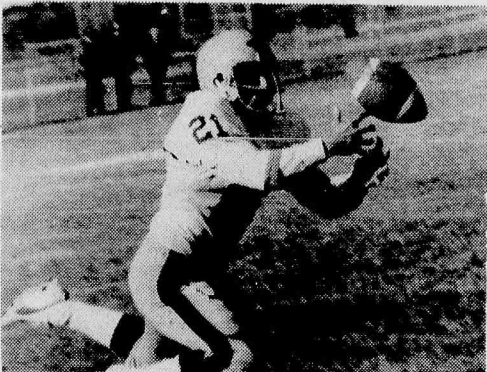

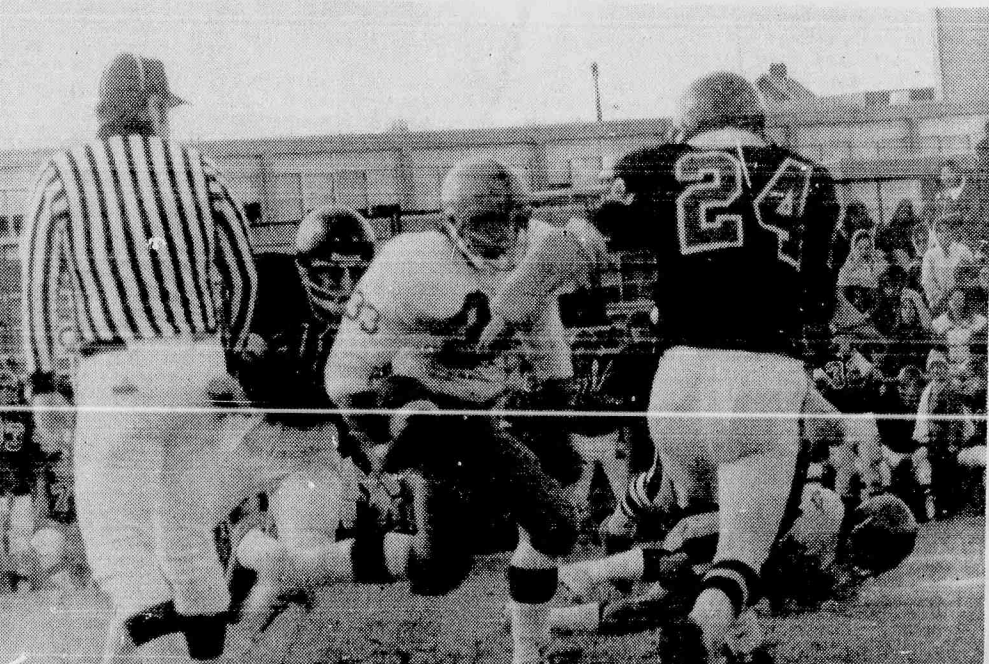

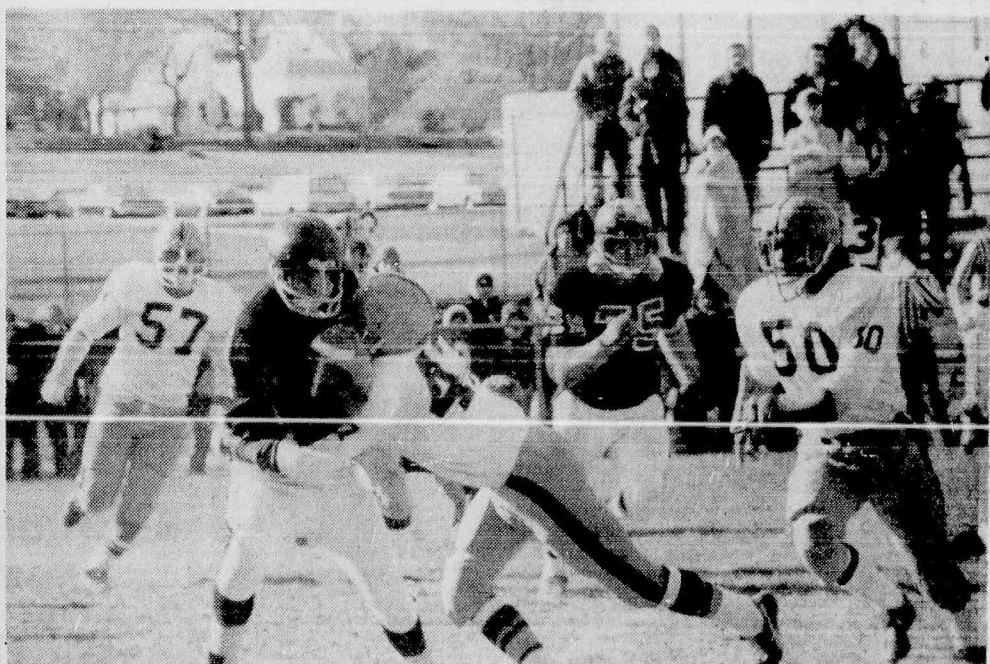

Miss State Finals

Runners End Season; Leave 8-5 Record

The 1973 cross country season has now come to a close as the harriers defeated Passaic in Belleville Park before their hopes of advancing to the state finals were halted last Saturday in the Group 4 sectionals held at Warinaco Park in Elizabeth. The final team record stands at eight victories as opposed to five defeats.

The Election Day meet with the Passaic Indians was hampered by low temperatures and gusting winds making the conditions for the seasons home finale less than ideal. Still the team was determined to end the regular season on a positive note.

The race started just as many other races had begun. Steve Budrick and Mike Fortino were up close to the front of the pack while Bill Goodwin, Nelson Seda, Walt Siubis and Jim Beck were scattered in the middle of the field. The early placement of runners is rarely very permanent when the race is run over a 3.1 mile course as the early leader was Indian Steve Kudla who eventually finished fourth.

Placement becomes more definite after two miles and the signs were very encouraging for the Bellboys. Senior captain Bill Goodwin

was again leading the field. Nelson Seda was second as Steve Budrick was third, which immediately assured the Belleville victory. The times of these were 15:33 for Goody, 15:55 for Seda, and Budrick was timed at 15:57 as they retained their positions for the victory. Kudla was the first Indian home with a time of 16:28 which was good for fourth.

Next were Walt Siubis and Mike Fortino as the two junior runners finished fifth and sixth respectively with times of 16:36 and 16:55. Bruce Turnbull of Passaic was seventh at 17:05. Doug Wamsley was eighth at 17:18 and Steve Duba was tenth with a time of 17:36. George Rodriguez, Stan Kendrick, Lou Valentin were timed 17:46 to 18:07 for finishing at places 11th through 13th. Tom Couhlin broke the Passaic string when he finished 14th at 18:12. Pete Fitzpatrick was 16th, timed at 18:55. Completing the field were John Matera at 19:38 and Dominic Mobilio at 19:55. Jim Kosalka and David Ritacco were 20th and 21st with the respective times of 20:26 and 20:37.

Two Bellboys were injured during the course of the race and were forced to drop out. Joe Vincenti suffered a sprained foot while Jim Beck was sidelined with a painful

lump in his leg muscle, a recurring injury that has hampered him all year. Still the score was a convincing 17-43 victory for the Bellboys. The victory dropped the Indians to 2-8.

The win was a step in the right direction as the Bellboys prepared the rest of the week or the sectionals. Representing Belleville were the same runners that entered the Big Ten and Essex County races. They were seniors Bill Goodwin and Steve Budrick, juniors Mike Fortino and Walt Siubis, and sophomores Nelson Seda, Doug Wamsley, and Jim Beck. Racing with the Bellboys were Nutley and Montclair along with a strong squad from Westfield as well as Cranford.

The field of 98 got off to a very quick start on the 3 mile course. The majority of the Belleville runners were near the middle of the pack. As the race was nearing its conclusion, a very tight battle was developing between Lou Celebre, an individual entry from Livingston and Gary Crandall of Montclair. Celebre was able to kick out the win with a 15 yard advantage over Crandall and a winning time of 14:34.4. Yet the team title went to Cranford as they won its first state sectional cross country title by the score of 59-68 over its closest rival Westfield. Sophomore Bob Amtrani led the Cranford team in third place at 14:37 and Mal Pringle was 5th in 14:43.

The Bellboys will not send any runners to the state finals this year although everyone ran their best times. Bill Goodwin and Steve Budrick, running in their last high school meet, finished 32nd and 61th respectively with the times of 15:45 and 16:31. Nelson Seda finished 44th at 15:59. Walter Siubis was timed for 72nd place at 16:57 and Mike Fortino was in at 66th place with a time of 16:43. Doug Wamsley was the last Bellboy finisher with a time of 17:35 for finishing in 80th place. Jim Beck again was not able to complete a race because of the pain in his leg.

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Fracas Ends Game

Kearny's Kickoff Return Spells Sixth Bellboy Loss

The Bellboy gridders take a welcome break in a hard season this week as they take Saturday off and rest up for the Thanksgiving Day confrontation with undefeated Lyndhurst. Last Saturday saw another bad chapter written in the team's 1974 history as they were edged by Kearny, 8-6.

The bruising battle opened with Kearny's Steve Martin running back a Belleville kick off in an 89-yard touchdown dash followed by a two-point conversion. The day ended when referees called the game after an inter-squad fistfight erupted with Belleville in possession of the ball on their own 23-yard line and 15 seconds on the clock.

Coach Rocco Cafone this week said he was satisfied with the playing of his team, which he said held up well under the onslaught of the Cardinals, who have given a rough time to such teams as Bloomfield and Montclair this season. The head coach added the melee at game's end underlined a plan to use the last 15 seconds to pass to field goal position and have Bill Telesco boot for the winning score.

Besides good work on both the offensive and defensive lines, the coach said Belleville had superior running from the offensive backfield, which included a total of nine backs spelling each other. With key starters injured, Cafone opened with Joe Cancelliere, Vinnie DeNotaris and Nick De Filippis on the offensive ground attack and Jim Di Modica in the quarterback slot. Regulars Bill Telesco and ailing runners Joe Napolitano, Steve Senatore and Tony Nicosia were used sparingly throughout the game. Cafone said he expects this week's rest to bring all players back up to full capacity, including end Mark Cosenzo, injured Saturday while attempting to block a punt. Cosenzo received a bad bruise on his chest, but no cracked ribs.

For the first time in his career at Belleville, Cafone saw an opposing team run back a kick off when Bellboy defenders missed a couple

tackles as Kearny's Martin apparently broke from the Cardinal's double wedge formation to improvise his 89-yard run. After the initial setback, the coach added, "I can only have pride in the way the kids played. We had scouted Kearny against both Montclair and Bloomfield and neither team could run against them. But we were able to run against them. We knew we had the running backs and we had worked on our passing, along with some special blocking to handle their four-four defense."

Statistics show that Belleville was able to outgain the Cardinals on the ground, 156 yards to 85, and in fact had amassed more yardage for the entire game, 188 to 154. Belleville collected nine first downs to Kearny's six, and forced the Cardinals to punt five times to their three. But Cafone said crucial penalties and an inability to capitalize on Kearny errors cost Belleville the game, along with the premature cancellation of the contest.

After an unsuccessful first series and a brief offensive by the Cardinals, Belleville got their first break when Joe Cancelliere was to block a Kearny punt on the Kearny 31, and return the ball to the Kearny four-yard line. "We had planned that out," Cafone said later, "because we knew Kearny tended to spread out their three defenders on the punts. So we tried to spread them even wider and Joe zipped right in there."

On the offense, however, a penalty set the Bellboys back five yards and runs by DeFilippis and Cancelliere gained little yardage. A pass on third down by Jim Di Modica to Barry Dunleavy was incomplete, and a fourth down aerial was intercepted by Kearny's Bill Novak in the end zone.

The rest of the quarter and into the second stanza saw defensive play reign supreme as neither team was able to sustain an attack.

Then Belleville tallied their only touchdown of the day in the second quarter when Joe LaVatic recovered a Kearny fumble on the Cardinals' 32

yard line, and Telesco then passed to Cancelliere. An attempted two-point conversion via another pass failed.

The second half opened with runners Joe Cancelliere and Joe Napolitano driving to the Kearny 25, where three successive incomplete passes ended the attack. Kearny took the ball and moved to the Belleville 50, where they were forced to punt.

Another Belleville series, again relying mostly on mainstays Steve Senatore and Joe Napolitano took the attack to the Kearny 21, where once again the drive withered with two incomplete Belleville aeriels. The game seemed until the Bellboys fought off a final assault by Kearny that ended on the Belleville eight-yard line.

With less than a minute left in the game, Bill Telesco, who had piloted the Blue-Gold most of the game, opened up

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Beck's Column.
Most color TV sets in use at this time still have tubes. It will take many years until most sets will have transistors.

Tubes have to be replaced in due time. Many troubles can be taken care of by the replacement of a tube. So if you can find a reliable tube tester, you can have your tubes tested and thus save the cost of many a service call. The problem is to find a reliable tube tester.

A consumer magazine recently made a check up of 18 tube testers. 15 of them had bad sockets that made it impossible to check tubes properly, the rest had one or more defective sockets. Even the 3 testers whose sockets seemed to hold the tubes properly, still failed to register "good" on tubes which were known to be good. No one tube tester of all of the 18 checked was wholly reliable. You find these tube testers in drug stores, electronic parts stores, even sometimes in supermarkets and candy stores.

Just about the only thing you can do is check the new tube which you are about to buy. If it reads the same as the old tube, chances are that your old tube is still good and that the tube tester is faulty. Insist before you buy that you may test the tube in the store's tester. If the store keeper does not want to agree to this, go to some other place.

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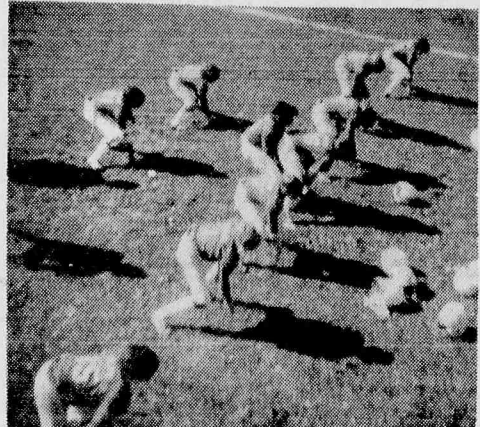

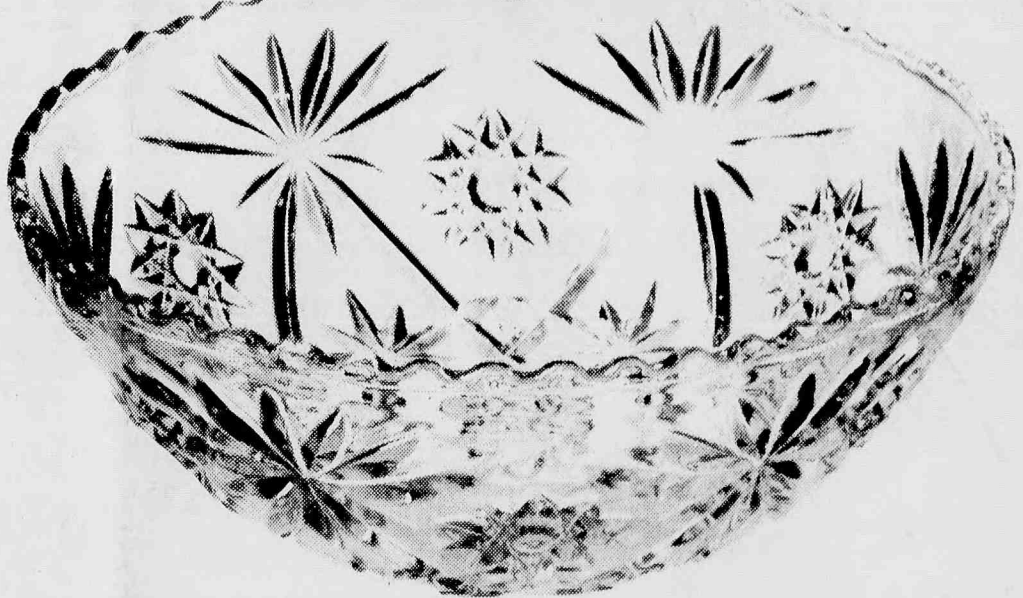

made the last payment this week."

"Postmaster General James Farley, king of Democratic patronage, builder of thousands of post offices, donor of air line routes, quit politics in 1940 because he was \$100,000 in debt and had a family to educate. Farley was never for sale."

"Although they never liked each other particularly, Farley and New York's Mayor Fiorello LaGuardia were alike as pillars of integrity. As his law secretary, it was perfectly obvious to me that LaGuardia actually enjoyed integrity - and hugely. He told of how he was about to attack a railroad for falsifying balance sheets and watering stock in the bad old 20s, when he was offered a huge block of its stock on the eve of his assault."

"For your sake," he told the attempted briber, with mock concern, "I hope you haven't been offering much of this stock around. Because," he added savagely "the whole railroad won't be worth a damn nickel tomorrow night when I get through exposing you and the lousy crooks who sent you."

"His musings on corruption were both incisive and sad. 'The devil for any public servant,' he said, 'appears as his best friend, asking him for something he would love to give him for helping to get him elected - but which he can't do and keep his oath of office. So he doesn't.'"

"Thus, on the night when he was elected, he jumped up on a table and told his wildly enthusiastic followers, 'a great cause - integrity in government - had succeeded. You have made me its trustee by electing me. My first qualification for mayor of the City of New York is my monumental ingratitude to each and all of you. I shall meet that qualification.' He did."

"Like Harold Ickes, he would become something of a bore when he reached the grandiose point of believing that the search of Diogenes was over the day he was born."

"Suspicious of everyone, like Ickes, he too often came up with the evidence proving H. L. Mencken's contention that, while it is a sin to think evil of people, it is seldom a mistake."

"On the other hand, he was as world wise as the proverbial serpent. One night he said, 'The people don't want reformers like us. They don't need us when they're right, and they badly need Tammany when they're wrong. And Tammany helps them - for a price.'"

"In a sense, LaGuardia was

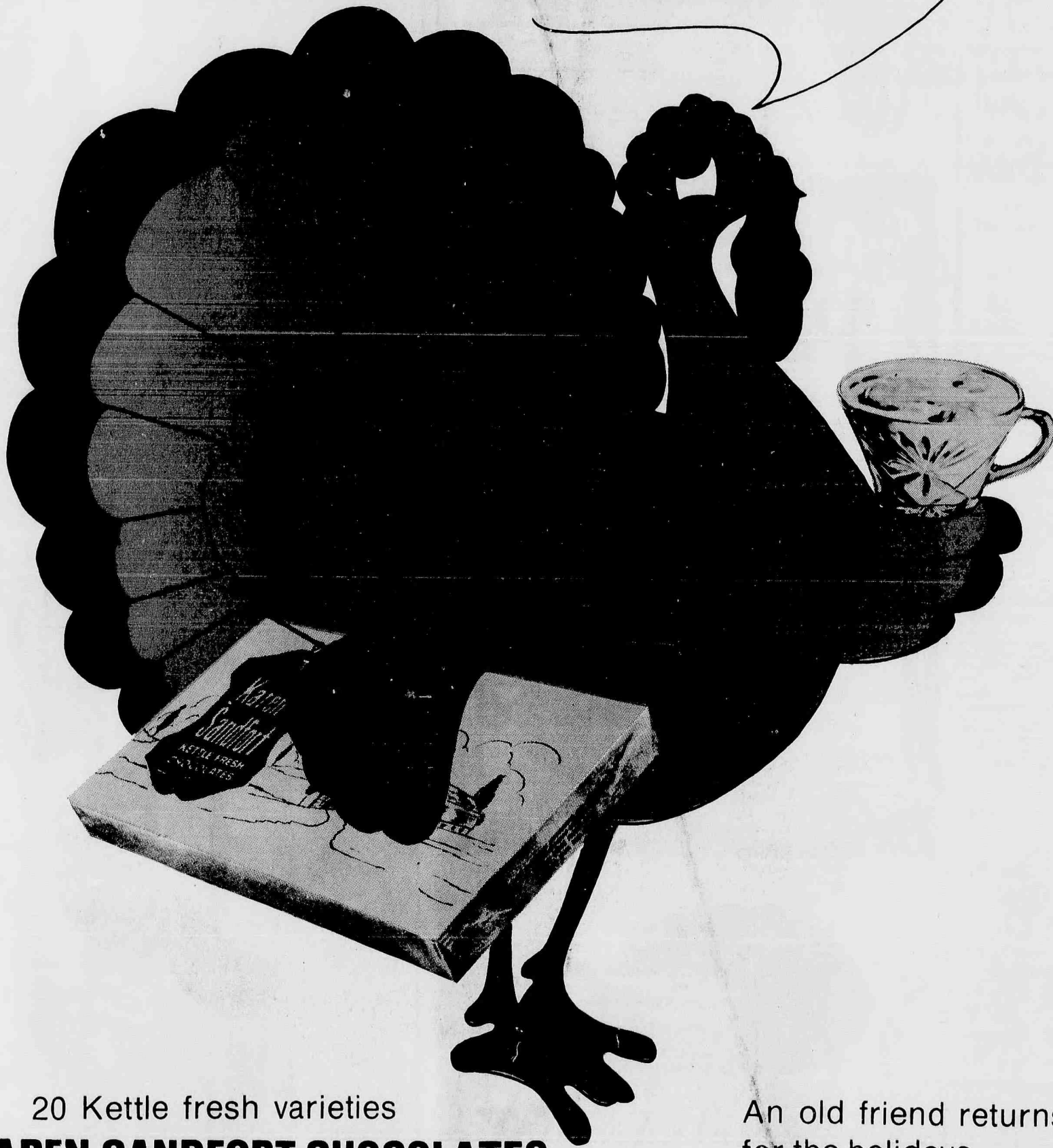
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
