In Bond Groundwork

Committee to Review **Architects for School**

The Board of Education will name a citizens' com-mittee to review a field of three architects, one of whom the trustees will name to plan proposed addition for the Senior High School. The pan-el will be appointed at a meeting of the Board Mon-

day, Nov. 26.
The selection of the architect will be a prelude to the organization of a multimillion dollar bond referendum which will come before Belleville voters probably within the next 10 months. After interviewing six architects, the Board narrowed their consideration to three, who will now be in-terviewed by the citizens' committee. Board of Ed president Lawrence Schwartz said the group's recommendation would be returned to the trustees, who would name one of the three candidates to the job. The decision of the citizens' group would not be binding on the Board.

Schwartz said the panel will be composed of 10 or 12 residents, "some of whom will be familiar with building, and all of whom are active in the school system and have an interest in what happens in Belleville schools." The Board president said selection of the committee is not yet completed. He also declined

The intent of forming an advisory committee to help select the architect is to head off public reaction similar to the furor which accompanied the construction of the high school building in the early 1960's. In proposing the referendum, the Board of Education is hoping to buck the familiar voting trend in Belleville which has seen the rejection of 11 school budgets in the past 12 years. Schwartz said the trustees would conduct an intensive tour of local elementary schools to explain all facets of the bond proposal in the weeks preceding the

The bond would finance an addition of approximately 20 classrooms at the high school, along with a major repair program at the junior high school and in all nine elemen

Plagiarism, literary theft; the passing off as one's own the words or ideas of another, is anathema among creditable writers. It is eschewed as a plague, ergo, let the fact be known that while the sentiments expressed in this particular article reflect my own thinking, they are largely the borrowed views so cogently written by Ernest Cuneo in a recent syndicated Star-Ledger editorial page commentary.

I feel they are especially appropriate at this time when the creditability of so many of our Nation's highest leaders is in doubt. While some may have read Mr. Cuneo's article, it is probable that many missed his description of a few of the outstanding men of the past in the field of politics whose honesty and integrity, regrettably seems missing today.

His theme "The Little Flower Was A Rare Breed" portrays the sterling quality of men in public life of an earlier era. Mr. Cuneo writes as follows.

"The honesty of Big Jim Farley is legendary in his time. 'This is a great day for me,' he confided to a friend in 1958. 'After 18 long years, I'm at last out of debt. I

Leaf removal equipment will move through Town for two weeks beginning Mon-day, Nov. 19, Director of Public Works Mary V. Senatore announced this

Mrs. Senatore urged residents to lend their cooperation in the removal operation, which will see Town workers follow a designated route through Belleville. She added a leaf packer has been rented for the operation in order to save trips to the dump and give more time for leaf removal.

Public Works trucks will start Monday in clearing the Valley section, and then will move along Washington Avenue to Union Avenue and through the northern section town above Greylock Parkway. The route then extends all through the Greylock area, up to Rutan Road, all through the St. Peter's area and all streets off Belleville Avenue and Joralemon Street.

Next, Public Works employees will concentrate on the Soho area and the Silver Lake section. Mrs. Senatore said the route has been set up according to the density trees in each area. She added every street in town will be covered during the two weeks the Department has rented the leaf removal equip-

six major pharmacies decided to enter the Senior Citizens Assistance Program (SCAP) which will allow seniors bearing a SCAP card to receive services at a "reduced professional fee.

A spokesman for the group said, "Because of the economic pressures upon the older segment of our population and the decreasing power of pensions and Social Security payments, a decision was made to aid our



Bruce M. Creditor, son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Creditor of Belleville, New Jersey, will be performing in New York City as clarinetist of the New England Conservatory Ragtime Ensemble Sunday at St. Stephen's Church.

This ensemble, founded and conducted by the versatile (performer, composer, conductor, educator, and historian) president of The New England Conservatory, Gunther Schuller, has gained nationwide attention and recognition with its recording the authentic orchestrations of Scott Joplin Rags, "The Red Back Book" nicknamed thus because of the long lost collection which was found two years ago in New Orleans, in a 'red-backed book'. 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

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


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Lions Learn Of Air, Water Pollution Ills

Robert J. Baker, Technical Director, Wallace and Tiernan Division, Pennwalt Corporation, Belleville, N.J. addressed the Belleville Lions Club on air and water pollution problems at the November 8 meeting.

Baker pointed out the con-flicting goals between energy conservation and air pollution control. As an example, he reported that a system to remove sulphur compounds from the flue gas of a coal fired power generating plant will require five percent of the electricity produced.

He pointed out further that so long as materials are used and consumed for the benefit of man there are going to be wastes and these can only be disposed in our waters, in the air or on land. He claimed that the national goal of zero pollution of our water resources is unattainable and predicted that the law will be modified to a reasonable and practical degree.

American people to save fuel in every possible way.

There's now little doubt — because of events in the Middle East and elsewhere that an oil shortage exists and threatens to remain a problem for several years. That being the future, the proper role of the federal government is to hold price in-creases to reasonable levels, to bar sharp and excessive hikes always a temptation to

and excessive lines a aways a templation to sellers in shortage situations, and to order allocations when necessary.

The U.S. supply of petroleum products will continue to be quite large, relatively, though not always enough for everyone everywhere; thus the development of new energy sources and the conservation of prepry the families businesses and the energy by families, businesses and the local, county, state and federal governments, are a must.

These accidents occur regularly, and usually before crowds including hundreds of children. The performers are risking their lives for money (as do drivers in automobile racing) and part of the attraction among spectators is the morbid danger and risk involved.

A law requiring aerial performers to work over nets is long overdue; the perfor-mance is equally impressive, and when a mistake occurs — and they are inevitable — no one dies to pay for it. Ticket sales for the threat of death, whether at race tracks or circuses, have no place in America — money is not something citizens should be allowed to risk their lives to earn, for promoters and themselves.



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Fracas Ends Game

Kearny's Kickoff Return Spells Sixth Bellboy Loss

The Bellboy gridders take a welcome break in a hard season this week as they take Saturday off and rest up for the Thanksgiving Day frontation with undefeated Lyndhurst. Last Saturday saw another bad chapter written in the team's 1974 history as they were edged by Kearny, 8-6.

The bruising battle opened with Kearny's Steve Martin running back a Belleville kick off in an 89-yard touchdown dash followed by a two-point conversion. The day ended when referees called the game afper an inter-squad fistfight erupted with Belleville in possession of the ball on their 23-yard line and 15 seconds on the clock.
Coach Rocco Cafone this

week said he was satisfied with the playing of his team, which he said held up well under the onslaught of the Kardinals, who have given a rough time to such teams as Bloomfield and Montclair this season. The head coach added the melee at game's end underlined a plan to use the last 15 seconds to pass to field goal position and have Bill Telesco boot for the winning

Besides good work on both the offensive and defensive lines, the coach said Belleville had superior running from the offensive backfield, which included a total of nine backs spelling each other. With key starters injured, Cafone opened with Joe Cancelliere, Vinnie DeNotaris and Nick De Filippis on the offensive ground attack and Jim Di Modica in the quarterback slot. Regulars Bill Telesco and ailing runners Joe Napolitano, Steve Senatore and Tony Nicosia were used sparingly throughout the game. Cafone said he expects this week's rest to bring all players back up to full capacity, including end Mark Cosenzo, injured Saturday while attempting to block a punt. Cosenzo received a bad bruise on his chest, but no cracked ribs.

For the first time in his career at Belleville, Cafone saw an opposing team run back a kick off when Beliboy

tackles as Kearny's Martin apparently broke from the Kardinal's double wedge formation to improvise his 89yard run. After the initial setback, the coach added, "I can only have pride in the way the kids played. We had scouted Kearny against both Montclair and Bloomfield and neither team could run against them. But we were able to run against them. We knew we had the running backs and we had worked on our passing, along with some special blocking to handle their four-four defense."

Statistics show that Belleville was able to outgain the Kardinals on the ground, 156 yards to 85, and in fact had amassed more yardage for the entire game, 188 to 154. Belleville collected nine first downs to Kearny's six, and forced the Kardinals to punt five times to their three. But Cafone said crucial penalties and an inability to capitalize on Kearny errors cost Belleville the game, along with the premature cancellation of the contest.

After an unsuccessful first series and a brief offensive by the Kardinals, Belleville got their first break when Joe Cancelliere was to block a Kearny punt on the Kearny 31, and return the ball to the Kearny four-yard line. "We had planned that out," Cafone said later, "because we knew Kearny tended to spread out their three defenders on the punts. So we tried to spread them even wider and Joe zipped right in there.

On the offense, however, a penalty set the Bellboys back five yards and runs by DeFilippis and Cancelliere gained little yardage. 



"Although they never liked each other particularly, Farley and New York's Mayor Fiorello LaGuardia were alike as pillars of integrity. As his law secretary, it was perfectly obvious to me that LaGuardia actually enjoyed integrity - and hugely. He told of how he was about to attack a railroad for falsifying balance sheets and watering stock in the bad old 20s, when he was offered a hugh block of its stock on the eve of his

assault."
"For your sake,' he told the attempted briber, with mock concern, 'I hope you haven't been offering much of this stock around, Because,' he added savagely 'the whole railroad won't be worth a damn nickel tomorrow night when I get through exposing you and the lousy crooks who sent you.

"His musings on corrup-tion were both incisive and sad. The devil for any public servant,' he said, 'appears as his best friend, asking him for something he would love to give him for helping to get him elected - but which he can't do and keep his oath of office. So he doesn't.' "

"Thus, on the night when he was elected, he jumped up on a table and told his wildly enthusiastic followers, 'a great cause — integrity in government — had succeeded. You have made me its trustee by electing me. My first qualification for mayor of the City of New York is my monumental in-gratitude to each and all of you. I shall meet that qualification.' He did."

"Like Harold Ickes, he would become something of a bore when he reached the grandiose point of believing that the search of Diogenes was over the day he was

"Suspicious of everyone, like Ickes, he too often came up with the evidence proving H. L. Mencken's contention that, while it is a sin to think evil of people, it is seldom a mistake."

"On the other hand, he was as world wise as the proverbial serpent. One night he said, 'The people don't want reformers like us. They don't need us when they're right, and they badly need Tammany when they're wrong. And Tammany helps them for a price,' "

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

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
