## Livingston Lancers will do battle here

Lights, cameras, action! All these props will be present Monday night at Belleville Municipal Stadium for the opening production of the 1976 Bellboy football season.

The Blue-Gold gridders have been perfecting their act in pre-season scrim-mages and coach Tom Testa has picked the Belleville cast for opening night with the Livingston Lancers. When the fans are in place, the lights go on, and they strike up the band, the stage will be set for a Bel-boy year that might be a long running sm-ash.

Last week in a pre-season tryout the Blue-Gold football team practically chased Columbia off the field, tallying a 48-6 scrimmage score. Though Columbia might be in for a tough year, the Bellboy team ex-ecuted their game with enough finesse and discipline to indicate it was the strength of their talent and not the lack of Columbia's that carried the contest.

## Girls' tennis team is new program

The athletic program for girls at Bel-leville High School is gradually expanding and the turnout for the first year female tennis team shows the enthusiasm of the Bellgirls for organized varsity sports.

Two tennis courts were jammed with more than 40 aspiring Billie Jeans for the first day of tryouts two weeks ago. Coach Karen Fuccello called the response "a tremendous turnout" and with the late start, immediately began the search for Bellgirl court talent.

The results of the first girls tennis prac-tices in the history of the school will begin to form with the opening match against Nutley, away on September 28.

This will be a building year for the Bel-girls but sophomores constitute the ma-jority of the racketeers so the future looks good. The entire 40 won't be on the varsity but they'll constitute a club court team from which varsity members can be drawn.

After a hectic two weeks of practice, coach Fuccello has named the first varsity members of the Bellgirl tennis team. The original members of the co-ed net set in-clude juniors, Pat Connelly, Tina Ogilvie, and Karin Sciacca along with sophomores,

Mary Connelly, Donna Fantacone, Peggy Gilbray, LuAnn Graffeo, Nikki Guarino, Wendy Hesford, Denise Juliano, Sue Klein, Suzanne Reiman, Leanora Siubis, and Toni Sperduto.

One senior will be on the Blue-Gold club team but no one from the class of '77 made the varsity squad. Coach Fuccello was also disappointed more freshmen didn't try out for the court contingent but said it was probably due to lack of publicity at the junior high school.

There is no firm calendar for Bellgirl tennis competition yet but the opponents for the first season will include Nutley, Montclair, Columbia, Kearny, Irvington, and Immaculate Conception. Possible ad-ditions to the Blue-Gold court docket will be Caldwell, and East Orange Catholic. The confirmed challengers will play one match at home and one away.

Fuccello said her racket squad has a "very positive attitude." The coach noted none of the players have any competitive experience except for the Connelly sisters, Pat and Mary, who have had some ac-

## BHS soccer squad could be very tough

Based on the talent exhibited by the 1976 Bellboy soccer team in their pre-season scrimmages coach Tony Cahill believes the squad has a chance at finishing in the top half of the Big Ten, perhaps even third.

The road to Belleville's first winning soccer season started at Orange, Tuesday and continues today with a rescheduled away game at Montclair. The results of Tuesday's opening contest were in too late for this edition of the Times-News.

Bloomfield Tech faced the Bellboys in the last scrimmage match and the Blue-Gold 11 triumphed over the tech team, 4-1, last Wednesday. Coach Cahill said he was especially proud of the Belleville defensive unit in the contest. Goalkeepers Tony Cor-dano, Vito Tamborrino, and Bob Neblung, held the opposition to one well placed penalty kick scored by Bloomfield in the second quarter. Center Steve Dempsey and fullback Robert Freda were also acclaimed by the coach for their defensive prowess in the contest.

Both teams went scoreless through the first quarter of play and the Bloomfield team scored first with the penalty shot in the second period. The advantage didn't last long, Belleville got on the board when Hernan Borja scored with an assist from senior lineman Jim Cooney. The closing minutes of the second quarter featured another Bellboy talley when sophomore Raimero Borja followed up his brother's feat and feet by scoring on an assist from right wing junior Mike Licamelli.

The Blue-Gold took a 2-1 lead into the second half of the contest and boosted their margin by two more points in the third quarter. Two senior soccer men com-bined for the first of the period when Oleg Kostin assisted right winger Fred Chalet

for a score.

Once again Hernan Borja, last season's high scorer, booted the ball through to goal in the third to cap the Belleville scor-ing for the day.

The defense held off Bloomfield throughout the fourth quarter to assure the

Belleville victory at 4-1. The Bellboy defenders allowed only four tech shots on goal the entire game while Belleville managed 12 shots in the contest. Coach Cahill pleased with the pre-season varsity

## Bruin diamond crew played excellent ball

The Bruins played excellent baseball this summer. Their record, 31-13, exhibits a .704 win percentage any team would be proud to display. Yet there was some sense of regret at the end of the season because the Bellevilleites had not equaled or bet-tered their toughest competition, the 1975 Bruins.

Last year's team, 39-9, won the Essex, County League and took the state title. This year the Bruins ran away with their division but didn't put it together in post season play to go all the way. Regardless of the fact the Bruins did not repeat their titles, the Bellevilleites continued success on the field was a demonstration of the depth of talent on the third year expansion club.

"It was a good season," coach Dennis Sasso said. "We ran away with the league." The Bruins returned as a power to be reckoned with this summer despite the loss of three fireballers from last year's Bruins squad. Paul Mirabella, Rich Wal-ler, and Ron Herlihy were all signed for minor league ball and each one was in-strumental in last season's victories. This year the Bellevilleites pitching came from two often used aces.

Jack Rake, 10-1, on the mound this year was always supported by the Bruin bats. Coach Sasso said the bears of the di-amond averaged about 10 runs a game when Rake took mound duty.

Greg D'Allessandro, a thrower for Montclair State, was also a workhorse for the Bellevilleites. His hurling stints com-piled a 10-2 record. "He did a great job every time out and got better as the season went on," Sasso said.

The infield was also a strong point of the diamond bears attack. "We had the best infield in amateur baseball," Sasso said. The coach called Frank Petite the best hitting second baseman in the league and Bruno Giordano the best all-around second baseman. Third baseman Tony Rosselle and shortstop Kevin Goy also came in for praise from the coach. The Bruin leader called Bill Otskey "the most underrated catcher in the league" and said Danny Dunn put in "a great year at first."

Sasso sees Giordano as an outstanding player and "definite prospect" for the pros. Outfielder Willie Puentes was dubbed the "leading baserunner" for the Bruins by the coach who also praised his talent.

The Belleville Broncos blasted the venom out of the Montclair Cobras Sunday to open their 1976 football season with a 20-0 triumph.

Both grid squads went scoreless in the first quarter but the Broncos moved the ball to the Montclair 49 yard line early in the second period. Quarterback Frank Fazzini dropped back to pass on the second down but decided to run and carried the ball 39 yards for the first Bronco touchdown. A pass play for the extra point was incomplete.

The second half started with the Broncos ahead, 6-0. Belleville went on the board again on the next play when fullback Angelo Centanni powered his way through the middle for a touchdown. Sam DeCapua ran for the extra-point and the Broncos took the lead 13-0.

Late in the game, John Bucciarelli wrapped up the scoring by taking a hand-off from Ken Constantino and dashing 61 yards untouched for a touchdown. Con-stantino then lofted a pass to Bob Salgei for the extra point.

down field featuring successful passes mixed in with a consistent running attack. Coach Testa said he was especially pleased by the squad's discipline, highlighted by the fact the Bellboys incurred just one penalty in 48 minutes.

"They made the officials officiate," Testa said. "A team that makes less mistakes will win the ballgame nine out of 10 times. Let the other team gain five yards the hard way."

The Columbia scrimmage also featured a 50 yard pass play from quarterback Joe Gelpi to Anthony Speer. Runners Frank Mozeika, Chris Cervasio, and Joe Salters also showed talent for aggressive second effort. "We always told them, the only thing to stop them is the whistle," Testa said.

Gelpi has been slated as the starting Bellboy quarterback. The 6-2, 190 pound senior picked up game experience last year and has yet to reach his potential, according to the coach. The Bellboy leader booted an excellent punt in the Columbia match, scored a touchdown on a quarterback sneak, and connected on enough pass plays to indicate an exciting season is in store for Belleville fans.

Frank Mozeika (5-11, 195) will start at offensive fullback and do double duty as a defensive linebacker. The offensive side is new to the BHS senior but coach Testa said Mozeika beat out the rest of the competition for the spot. Chris Cervasio (5-10, 195) will be another 48 minute man on the team serving as an offensive tailback and a safety on D. Testa said Cervasio "did a very good job against Columbia" and is starting to run like a tailback.

The list of Belleville ironmen continues with Ken Nicosia (5-8, 172) who will also serve on O and D squads. The senior athlete is called a steady performer by the coach and will see duty as an offensive slot back and defensive end.

Mike Limongelli (5-10, 205) had a pulled muscle and didn't make the Columbia game but will be in the starting line-up Monday night. The center is one of two juniors slated for first team assignments.

Testa cites the steady performance of Rocco Balsamo (5-8, 185) as a reason for his assignments. The senior is another double duty player who will be in the action as an offensive guard and a defensive linebacker. Senior Bernie DalCortivo (5-11, 195) will join Balsamo in the offensive guard position.

A slimmed down Ralph Amiano (6-4, 245) will stay on the field the entire game as an offensive and defensive tackle. The senior tackle is the

heavyweight on the Blue-Gold squad and should be a lot of football player for BHS opponents to get around. Another tall tackle is senior Al Nufrio (6-2, 210). Testa is very pleased with the two tackles and looks for pleasant results from the power pair.

Quickness and good hands are the coaches comments on the talents of senior Anthony Speer (5-9, 165) who will man the end spot on offense and play cornerback defender as well. Offensive end Greg Grasso (6 foot, 190) will join Speer as an offensive end and Cervasio as a defensive safety.

Testa called senior Scott Ochse (6-1, 190) "a real defensive veteran" who will start as a defensive end. The Bellboy senior is recovering from an injury but will start Monday. George D'Alessandro (5-9, 230) missed action last year but the senior will see plenty of it now as a defensive tackle. Frank Constantino (5-9, 185) has made good progress at his middle guard position according to Testa.

Robert Racioppi at cornerback rounds out the defense. the 5-9, 165 pound junior is the second underclassman to make the starting team.

The Bellboys have seven players who will play both O and D. The average weight of the starting offensive line is 208 pounds. The defensive four weigh-in on the average of 218 gridders pounds.

The offense will be run from primarily a multiple-I formation, as Testa calls it. The Blue-Gold coach said the formation allows flexibility and can be used to overload the backfield to one side or allow the possibility of more receivers going downfield.

The coach said the defensive formation will depend on the tendencies of opponents but will basically be what Testa calls an odd defense with a man keyed on the center.

The coaches of the Bellboys have scouted the Livingston squad but Testa said since this will be the first Bellboy versus Lancers contest he isn't sure how coach Allen Jacobson will handle his gridders against BHS.

Coach Jacobson isn't sure either. His scouts were at the Belleville-Columbia scrimmage and brought back glowing reports on the Blue-Gold size and ability. "Our scouts were most impressed," Jacobson said. The Livingston leader said there isn't one Bellboy his team will ignore. He said all of his scouts liked everything they saw the Bellboys do against Columbia. "They're all tough, hard-nosed kids," Jacobson said.

The Lancers were 10-1 last year, so no matter how impressed the opponents are they will probably show up Monday and provide a tough opening game for Belleville. The offensive Livingston line averages 192 pounds and the defenders average 205. Jacobson is most impressed with the size of the Belleville gridders. "They aren't big, they're huge," the Lancer skipper said of his opposition. "We're sending out little boys against men. We don't see teams like this."

The Lancers have six returning veterans. Co-captain John Stevenson (5-9, 194) will start at offensive right tackle. Bob Brower (5-10, 168) is another vet who is slated to start at tailback.

Vets of last year's defensive squad include team captain, Jim Groome (6-1, 230) who doesn't sound like a little boy. Groome is a senior who plays left tackle. Dan Craig (5-8, 185) returns to right guard, Steve Godfrey (5-9, 165) will be cornerback, and Geoff Campisi (5-9, 157) starts at defensive cornerback for the Lancers.

New to the Lancer first team this fall is quarterback Greg Gennaro a 5-10, 167 pound senior. The rest of the offensive team belongs to the senior class too, including Joe Sibilia

(6-1, 174) at left end; Tony Sages, (6-1, 218) left tackle; Eric Fox, (5-7, 171) left guard; Chris Riccio (5-8, 196) center; Phil Errico (5-8, 182) right guard; Greg Morgan, (6 foot, 170) right end; Scott Bilby (5-8, 166) wing back; and Frank Kling (6, 191) at fullback.

New Lancers on the defensive platoon include left end Jim Cece (5-11, 180); Jack Sullivan, (5-11, 210) left guard; Dan Craig, (5-8, 185) right guard; Tim Braun (6-1, 197)

right tackle; George Reinhardt (5-10, 191) a junior at linebacker; Gary Auerbach, (5-10, 181) cornerback; David McLaughlin (5-11, 174) cornerback; and Bobby Vidal (6-1, 172) at cornerback.

Monday night the Bellboys will face the "little boys" and the results could begin to make men out of one of the teams. The Bellboys are ready for the confrontation. "We think we're going with the football players," Testa said.

Bev, 18, and Ken, 20 attended Manalapan High School and both earned laurels on the sports field and in the school room. Prior to moving to Manalapan, the Potis family lived in Belleville. Kenneth A. Potis, the father of both the student-athletes is still working full time as a Belleville firefighter.

Beverly finished high school last spring and is attending the Bauder Fashion College in Atlanta, Georgia, this fall. She was captain of the girl's track team at Manalapan and also participated on the tennis, and cheerleading squads. Bev ran hurdles on the track team and won a High School All-American award for her efforts on the cinders.

The scholar-athlete was also named "Most Athletic Female in the Class of '76," was honored as an Athletic of the Year, by Women's Sports Magazine. Bev was also selected for the publication of "Who's Who Among High School Students."

Ken Potis attended Belleville High School until sophomore year before moving to Manalapan, where he was a four letter winner. The former Bellevilleite's two years on the track team set two school records that have since been bettered.

Even more impressive was his talent on the football team. Ken made the All-District team at safety and was involved in more than 50 percent of the tackles made by Manalapan in one year. Despite his sports activity, Potis did not let it interfere with his academic pursuits. He graduated in the top 25 percent of his class and is currently attending Rutgers for pre-law courses.

While at Belleville, Ken played baseball, football, and earned a jayvee letter in basketball. Potis said he still has a lot of friends in Belleville but didn't mind moving to Manalapan because the school was smaller and it gave him a better chance to compete on the teams.

Even though he is attending

Rutgers in preparation for law school, Ken Potis recently completed a 30-hour course at the Bradley Real Estate School in Howell. The scholar, athlete, and now, agent, is currently working at nights and on weekends at Sterling Thompson Associates in Englishtown. He figures his familiarity with contracts will help him with his law courses.

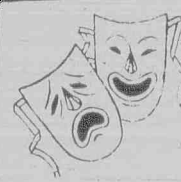

above .500" according to coach Cahill. The Belleville skipper said he bases his optimism on the second year varsity's aggressiveness and increased knowledgeability. The soccer Bellboys are "showing a lot more ball control and they know when to pass and not to pass," Cahill said. "They have demonstrated a great deal of maturing," he added.

Cahill said the varsity is carrying 20 players and "the nice thing about this year is we can substitute almost any position and not lose any effectiveness." The coach has been shuffling assignments throughout the scrimmage season to give his men experience in different aspects of the game. It is hoped the Bellboys will be more versatile due to their familiarity with all parts of the field.

The increase of talent and experience for Belleville could result in a much better season than last year's sorry, 2-14-1. "I think we could surprise a few people," Cahill said.

St. Peter's School today announced a free and reduced price meal policy for school children unable to pay the full price of meals served in schools under the

National School Lunch, and Special Milk Programs. School officials have adopted the following family size income criteria for use in determining eligibility.

Children from families whose income is at or below those shown are eligible for free or reduced price meals and/or free milk. In addition, families not meeting this criteria but with other unusual expenses due to unusually high medical expenses, shelter costs in excess of 30 per cent of income, special education expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child, and disaster or casualty losses are urged to apply.

They may do so by filling in the application forms sent home in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in the school. The information provided on the application will be confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility. Applications may be submitted any time during the school year.

In certain cases foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If a family has such children living with

them and wishes to apply for them, they should contact the school.

In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of his race, sex, color, or national origin.

Under the provision of the policy the School Principal will review applications and determine eligibility.

If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the Principal, he may make a request either orally or in writing to Bishop Joseph A. Costello, Pastor, whose address is 155 William Street, Belleville, New Jersey for a hearing to appeal the decision.

Hearing procedures are outlined in the policy.

A complete copy of the policy is on file in St. Peter's School and in the Rectory of St. Peter's Church where it may be reviewed by any interested party.

## Free Pap tests planned at Maass

A major step in the campaign to conquer uterine cancer will be taken September 29 and 30, when free Pap Tests are being made available to all women 18 and over who live in Belleville, Nutley and Bloomfield.

The testing program, to be offered on a large-scale, no-charge basis to residents of the area, is sponsored by Clara Maass Hospital, where it will be conducted both days from 1 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. Tests will be performed by Dr. Gerard Cicalese, director of obstetrics and gynecology at the Belleville hospital, and by Drs. Kathleen Bissel, Margaret Brisco, Eugene D'Allessandro, Edwin Gevitz, Edward Johnson, Bernadine Killeen, John Sesta, Betty Sobol and Carl Stetz, all of the Clara Maass medical staff.

A hospital spokesman estimates that more than half the women living in Belleville, Nutley and Bloomfield have never had a Pap Test. "Women who do not have a Pap Test," she said, "are taking a needless health risk. This year, probably more than 10,000 American women will die of uterine cancer simply because the disease was not diagnosed early enough to respond to treatment. Yet, uterine cancer can be one of the most curable if detected in its early stages. Every woman over 18 in the United States should have a Pap Test every year — not just one Pap Test once. An annual Pap Test should be a way of life."

What is the Pap Test? A simple procedure - named for its developer, Dr. George Papanicolaou - to examine the cells that are shed normally from a woman's uterus and collect in the vagina. It doesn't hurt, it takes only a minute or so, and it not only detects cancer, but also reveals changes in body cells that could mean cancer will develop.

For the test, these cells are gathered on a cotton swab or stick, then studied under a microscope. Ordinarily, if any of the cells are suspicious, the doctor will make further tests, and if the diagnosis is cancer, begin treatments promptly. In the two-day testing program at Clara Maass, all results that indicate any possibility of cancer will be forwarded immediately to the woman's private physician.

No appointments are necessary, and it is suggested that skirts or dresses rather than slacks be worn. Any additional information, if needed, may be obtained by calling Mrs. Lois Werner, R.N., 751-1000, ext. 881, on Tuesday, September 28, between 1 p.m. and 3:00 p.m.

## Saletta will seek emergency funding

By CHUCK JACKSON

Public Safety Commissioner Rocco Saletta will introduce a resolution next Tuesday asking for an emergency appropriation in order to meet police contract demands.

Saletta told Times/News this week, "There is no sense in putting off the PBA. I am going to introduce a resolution at the next Commission meeting seeking emergency funding."

That resolution, if approved by at least three other Commissioners, could end the threat of contempt of court citations against the Board and Town Treasurer Francis McCoy. The Commissioners are scheduled to appear before Superior Court Judge Sherwin D. Lester to show cause why they should not be held in contempt for not implementing the contract. Town Attorney John Scott will represent the officials.

The Board members were presented with the show cause order at the September 14 meeting of the Commission. A copy of the order was also mailed to McCoy by certified mail. The Town Treasurer was on vacation at the time the orders were issued.

Saletta's decision to seek emergency funding to meet the pay requirements of the contract may halt the legal proceedings instituted by the PBA. The town has been under a court order since July, and a re-affirmation of that same order was issued August 6 by Superior Court Judge Irwin Kimmelman. Since

the recent retirement of Kimmelman, Judge Lester has taken charge of the case.

The Public Safety Director's decision to seek the emergency appropriation is a reversal of an earlier position. Saletta has stated publicly in the past he would not look for special funding to meet the contract requirements.

It was hoped by town officials the money could be obtained through budget transfers later this year. That hope, however, appeared to fade when financial projections indicated the other governmental departments would not have sufficient monies to contribute.

Saletta indicated his decision to seek

emergency funds came after his fellow Commissioners vacillated on their promise to provide funds.

"First they (the Commissioners) tell me they will have the money, then they say they won't. If the other Commissioners can't assure me they will have money, I would just as soon go out for the emergency funding."

The Public Safety Director also indicated he felt his fellow Board members were placing all responsibility for the current situation on him, and he added, "I am being made the scapegoat and it bothers me. I am not against awarding the money. I won't wait until November

## Testa will leave at season's end

Tom Testa has resigned his position as head coach of the Belleville High School varsity football team effective at the end of the season. The Bellboy leader informed the Board of Education of his plans in a September 13 letter and the Schoolers have accepted his resignation.

The coach told the Times/News he is

leaving the position for "personal and professional reasons." Testa cited the pressures of his teaching and athletic responsibilities as factors considered in making his decision. "I've always said athletics, and academics are compatible but if one has got to go it better not be academics," Testa said.

The surprise resignation comes after the high school coach was reappointed to the varsity job by the Schoolers last spring. "I'm at a loss as to why the resignation was turned in now," School Board president Matthew Pica said. The Board leader added there has been "no pressure whatever brought on by the Board of Education" for Testa's resignation since his reappointment. There haven't even been any conversations about the matter, Pica said.

Testa affirmed Pica's appraisal of the situation. "Since last year there's been no pressure at all," the coach said. It was during the summer Testa made the decision after discussing it with his wife. "This was our volition and nobody else's."

## Trio robs Peoples branch in Belleville

Belleville police are searching for two men and a woman who held up the Tri-City branch of the Peoples National Bank, officials said.

According to police, the trio entered the bank, located at the corner of Belmont and Bloomfield Avenues, at 9:07 Tuesday morning. Authorities said all three were wearing plastic masks.

Belleville Deputy Police Chief Frank Haight said the woman involved in the theft held a gun on bank employees and customers as her accomplices moved to the back of the bank. One of the men then vaulted a teller's cage, Haight reported, and removed money from each

of the teller's areas.

According to officials, the robbery took little time, and the threesome fled the scene by auto.

## Escott back on force

Belleville PBA president William Escott will go back to work tonight after a five day suspension from the force.

The Local 28 leader was taken off the work roster, without pay, by Public Safety Director Rocco Saletta, following comments Escott made at the September 14 meeting of the Town Commission.

Escott said this week he would appeal that suspension, but declined any further comment. He would not reveal what form that appeal will take. PBA attorney Lawrence Whipple will represent Escott in the matter, it was learned.

The punishment handed down by the Commissioner was the maximum Escott could receive without a Civil Service hearing. The PBA president objected to the severity of the punishment, saying, "I feel the duration of the suspension far exceeded the act. I don't think my action at the meeting deserved the penalty I received."

Saletta suspended the six-year veteran of the force after he angrily shouted, "If you were half a man I'd take you out on Washington Avenue and break your ass."

The Public Safety Director later characterized the act as typical of "poor leadership in the PBA."

"I just feel," Saletta continued, "if these are the types of individuals who are going to run the PBA, and I am not just speaking of Escott, there is a lack of good leadership. Relations will not get back to normal as long as they have the same leadership. If the leadership changes, then perhaps they and the elected officials will be able to deal on a good basis."

Escott responded to Saletta's comments, saying, "Perhaps with a change of

the Commissioner of Public Safety, the Public Safety Department would get back to where it is supposed to be.

"The Public Safety Director wants to surround himself with advisors that consist of a tavern owner and a pizza man. I am proud to be surrounded by the fine police officers and leaders who surround me."

Escott questioned Saletta's reasoning in suspending him, and referred to an incident earlier this year, saying, "I was out of line for using the word 'ass,' and suspended for five days for it, then what should his punishment be for telling the people of the Town of Belleville to take his job and stuff it up their asses?"

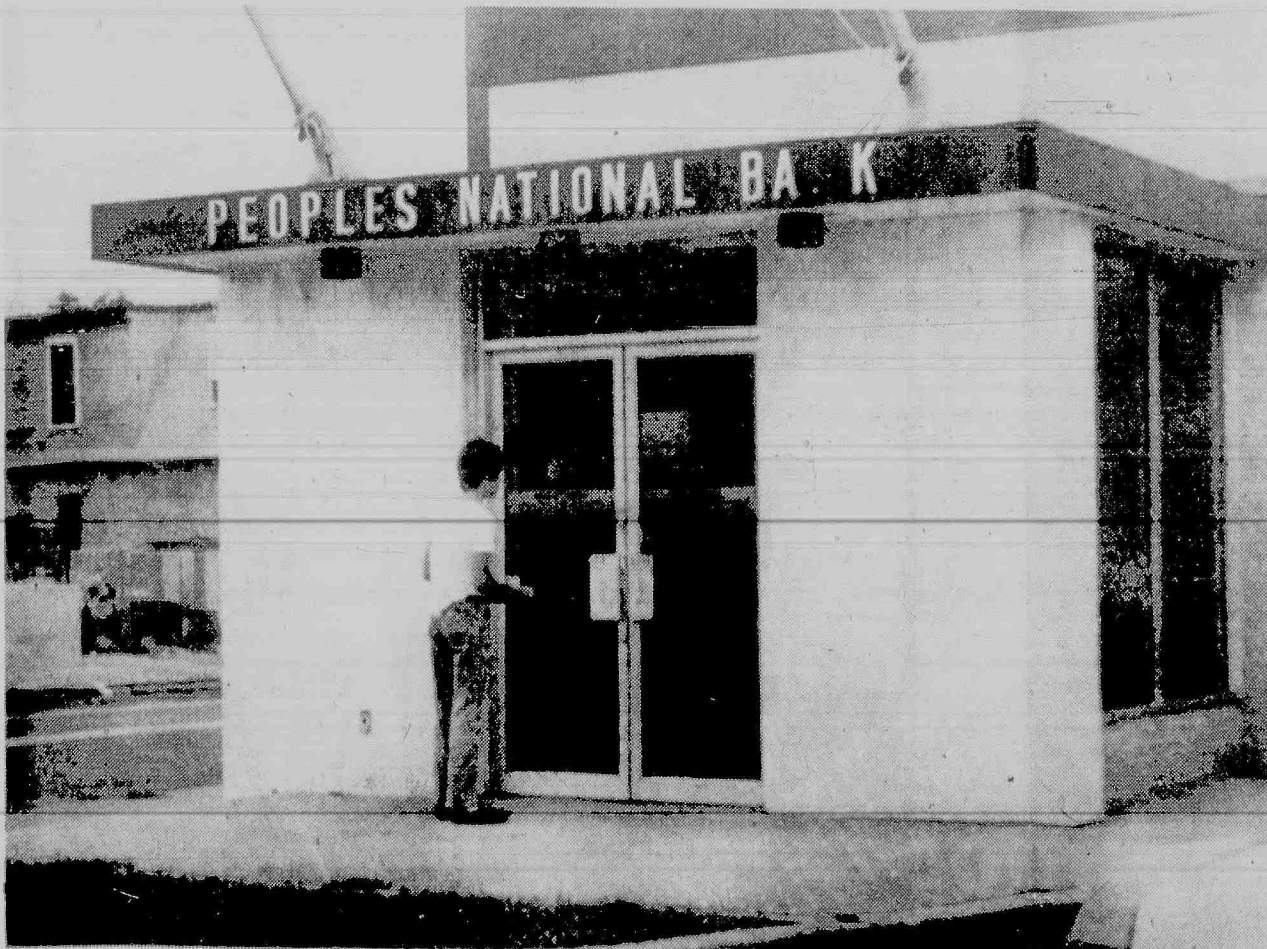
Saletta was heard to make such a comment in anger during a particularly unruly meeting several months ago.





There have been many break-ins and robberies in neighboring towns recently, mostly in the homes of senior citizens while they are away on vacation. Be careful when you go away. Let your neighbors know you are going but don't publicize the fact. If your expect visits by tradespeople while you are away, let your neighbors know, and also let them know if you don't expect any visitors.

In three robberies in Nutley recently, houses were broken into by individuals and household items placed in bags. All the activity went on unnoticed from the outside, and later a van or station wagon pulled up and the loot was loaded aboard. The outside activities took less than one minute.

If your see a strange vehicle parked nearby, get the license number and if the occupants act strangely, call the police immediately. It may be a false alarm, but it may also be for real. Take a chance on the latter. It could save someone a lot of grief.

## Social Security checks to be delivered early

Social security checks, which are normally delivered on the third of the month, will be delivered Friday, October 1 since the third is a Sunday, William A. Fogarty, social security district manager in Newark, has announced.

The Friday check delivery is a new policy, Fogarty said. Social Security checks will be delivered on a

Friday whenever the third falls on a Saturday or Sunday. The same schedule will apply to beneficiaries who have their social security checks deposited directly in a bank or other financial institution.


Formerly, checks were delivered on Saturday when the normal delivery date fell on Sunday, but many people had to wait until Monday to cash the checks. The new policy will eliminate that inconvenience, Fogarty said.

The delivery of SSI checks will not be affected by the new policy. Social security pays monthly retirement, disability, and survivors benefits to eligible workers and their families. The supplemental security income program makes monthly payments to people with little or no income and limited resources who are 65 and over or blind or disabled.

A conference for the leaders of the 250 home-school associations in the Archdiocese of Newark has been scheduled for Saturday, October 2, at Paramus Catholic High School, by the Archdiocesan Federation of Home-School Associations.

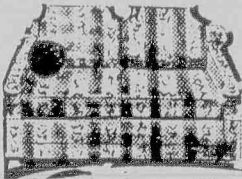

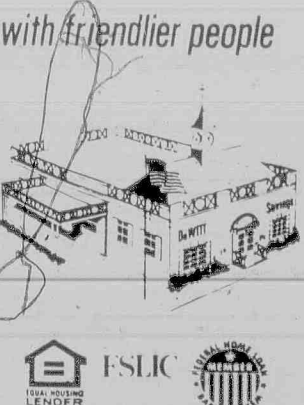

## Commission is wrong

In April an arbitrator handed down a decision concerning Police Department wages. The Town Commission and Police Department members agreed to binding arbitration. The arbitrator rendered a decision for 1976 and 1977 — covering a two year period.

The Town Commission took exception to the two year term, accepting binding arbitration for 1976. This act, of itself, put the Town Commission on notice that members of the Police Department were to be paid a higher wage for 1976 amounting to approximately \$80,000 in additional pay. To keep down the Town budget, no provision was made in the 1976 budget for wage increases to the Police Department. Despite the arbitrator's decision, the Town Commission did nothing about raising the funds to pay the cops the increase to which they were entitled.

Instead of taking things into their own hands and issuing traffic tickets to local citizens in order to put the heat on the Town Commission, the responsible members of the PBA took the legal course, went to the courts and received a favorable decision. The court directed the Town Commission to pay the salary increase to the cops for the year 1976.

Still nothing was done. Public Safety Director Rocco Saletta had the prime responsibility to introduce an emergency resolution in order to comply with the directive of the arbitrator and the courts. Well, Mr. Saletta marked time while our restrained Police Department

members waited in vain. At last Tuesday's Commission meeting, the local PBA President served a notice on all members of the Commission, citing them for contempt of court.

A fiery exchange ensued between Police Commissioner Rocco Saletta and Belleville PBA President William Escott. Both men made some uncomplimentary comments about each other. Was the PBA President goaded into losing his temper? We think so.

Four months is a long time to be strung along with a load of bull and promises from politicians who never intended to keep faith. Mr. Saletta was not penalized for statements he made about Mr. Escott but PBA President Escott, who already is finding it hard to meet the financial burdens of heavy taxes and raising a family, was suspended for five days without pay.

Minutes after the Tuesday night outburst, PBA President Escott returned to the Commission Chamber and publically apologized for his behavior. The people of Belleville are still waiting for Mr. Saletta to apologize to the police for not performing in accordance with the laws he was sworn to uphold.

The PBA is absolutely right. The police should have received a pay raise in May and the Town Commission has been derelict in its duty for not abiding by an arbitrator's binding arbitration and a court order.

## Legal troubles at Town Hall

The Belleville Board of Adjustment hired an attorney without providing for payment. As a result, the attorney, Ronald H. Shaltian, sued the Town for his fees, \$1,339.99.

Well, do you know what happened? Attorney Shaltian obtained a judgment against the Town of Belleville by default! Town Attorney John R. Scott failed to defend the town. On December 22 Municipal Treasurer Francis McCoy requested Town Attorney Scott "to immediately file an order to Show Cause and Vacate Judgment and Stay of Execution and to locate any Judge to immediately grant the above."

Scott's reply? "Pay the bill." We don't know what Mr. Scott's explanation is for his failure to defend the Town in this legal matter. If he had no authority from the Town Commission to take the action he pursued, then we have a serious question whether or not Mr. Scott acted with due diligence to protect the interest of Belleville taxpayers. The people are entitled to an answer — and not a default judgment.

## More legal problems

Again we have a problem with a difference of opinion between Town Attorney John R. Scott and Municipal Treasurer Francis H. McCoy.

It seems that Mr. McCoy is determined to protect our taxpayers and our public officials from intentionally violating the law. Purchases were made from the New Jersey Pipe Foundry Company/U.S. Pipe Foundry Company in 1974 and 1975.

One purchase order was in the amount of \$2,953.20. Since a purchase above \$2,000.00 requires public bidding, Mr. McCoy believed the purchase was made in violation of the law.

Additionally, there were purchases made in one year and charged to appropriations of another year. Mr. McCoy is so concerned over the legality of these transactions that Essex County Prosecutor Joseph Lordi and State Director of Local

Government Services Joseph F. Laezza have been requested to determine if laws have not been violated.

The Town does employ certified public accountants whose duties include the very items that Mr. McCoy refuses to approve and he comments as follows: "I am not going to subject the Governing body or myself to any violation of State Statutes which would be deemed a misdemeanor."

A misdemeanor is a criminal act — and we just wonder how sensitive our public officials are to the need to obey the laws of the state — even at Town Hall in Belleville, N.J.

### Is fire department political?

To the Editor:

I am a Correction Officer with the State of New Jersey, assigned to the State Prison at Rahway. On August 24, I was injured in the line of duty and taken by ambulance for admission to Rahway Hospital. After two days my doctors thought it in my best interest to be transferred to Clara Maass Hospital where I would receive the care of Belleville based orthopedic specialists.

My wife telephoned the Belleville Fire Department to ask for an ambulance and arrange my transfer. She spoke personally with Chief Sbarra who, instead of giving her the courtesy one would expect from a man of the chief's position, became extremely rude and told her in no uncertain terms he would not grant this service.

I then telephoned the department and, after being refused a conference with the chief, was connected with a captain. I explained the situation to the captain and he too refused my request.

I explained to him I have been a resident of Belleville for 21 years. I had never in the past asked for the town's services and also, I had done three and one half years of volunteer service with Belleville's Auxiliary Police Department. The Captain's reaction to this was hanging up on me! Consequently, I received no service from the town of Belleville. My town of Belleville.

My humiliation made me think. A short time ago I was discharged from

the Auxiliary Police over an incident involving Commissioner Rocco Saletta's Civic Organization and the Belleville PBA, a union of which I am a member. I supported my brother officers. On the pretense my expression was a disgrace to the Auxiliary organization, I was discharged, humiliated and degraded. I was made a fool. I was made a scapegoat for politics.

I thought perhaps my denial of aid by the fire department was the way in which Belleville's Town Fathers repay its citizens — citizens who give their time and effort to help the town in which they live. Not only has the town of Belleville made a fool of me twice, but they continue to haggle with the police department.

The political situation in this town disgusts me! My wife and I both have been insulted by the Fire Department's actions. But I do not condemn the hard working firefighters who risk their lives performing a job that few men can do. Rather, I am angered and saddened by the actions of the individuals in the upper circles of the Department of Public Safety.

I will not be made fool of again. I wish only to advise the citizens of this town to beware of the unexpected. This country was founded by citizens who stood up and said what they felt. I am proud to be such a person.

## Belushi: a really fine one-man show

"Not Ready For Prime Time Player" John Belushi treated students at Montclair State College to insights into the theater in general and specifically relating to "Saturday Night Live." When asked if the show was performed "stoned," Belushi quipped, "we write the show stoned."

Belushi opened the show with handstands across the stage, then the traditional "Saturday Night Live" fall. In a strange mood Belushi asked "How many from New Jersey?" to the rousing cheers of the audience. It wasn't long before everyone in the audience warmed up to the sometimes ribald, definitely funny style of Belushi.

Overcoming mike problems in the opening minutes of his show, Belushi traced his early career from Second City in Chicago to National Lampoon and the Lampoon show "Lemmings." His work on the satiric National Lampoon Radio Hour and his friendship with head-writer of

"Saturday Night Live," then Lampoon writer, Michael O'Donoghue was also outlined in his brief description of the cast of the only "live" show on tv today. Belushi noted in his whimsical way that cast member Gilda Radner had "more miles than the Queen Mary."

As the "last one to be hired" for "Saturday Night Live" Belushi showed only moderate hostility. He found something amusing, yet slightly nasty to say about everyone except Dan Ackroyd who is, according to Belushi, underrated.

Belushi presented film clips of Milton Berle, Sid Caesar and satires from "Saturday Night Live" including the "Jamito!" and the "Rubin Hurricane Carter, National Express" commercial parodies. Commenting at times from the side of the stage as to the intelligence of each Belushi had everyone in stitches. Or as another former National Lampoon writer, Chris Rush, might say, everyone had "laugh-face."

## Golden Comments

A few eyebrows were raised and questions asked, even among the planners, about the propriety of accepting a "gentlemen's agreement" to provide adequate parking facilities for a local establishment undergoing expansion.

Since gentlemen's agreements are seldom written contracts and have no specific terms as far as the duration of the agreement goes, they are subject to defeasance. That is a legal term meaning they may be rendered null and void. Likewise, the hypothetical question may be pondered as to what would happen if the present owner, entering into the agreement, were to sell his property.

Under the terms of such a sale, unless a restrictive covenant or proviso were included in the conveyance of the deed to the new owner, the new owner could ban the use of the property for parking use by the catering firm. Such a condition could discourage any sale of the property.

In the event of such a happening, just where would that place the town, the people in the surrounding area and the owners of the restaurant? The attorney for the catering firm noted no objectors to the parking proposal were present at the variance hearing. What he didn't tell was the big question: were any notices sent out to alert the surrounding residents of the area that the matter was coming up for review at the variance hearing? If not, how could they be there to object? Seems like an unusually strange manner of resolving the matter.

In Belleville, even the choice of which cable television company would be awarded a franchise provokes a controversy. The report of the committee chaired by George Riepe, which recommended Suburban Cable, said in the original report the opinion was unanimous. However, School Trustees who were members of the committee, Michael Chieffo and Matthew Pica, pointed out their preference for UA-Columbia and insisted the report be amended to read "the majority opinion."

Though both companies are recognized, established firms, providing satisfactory service with similar rates for that service, a cursory review of the financial structure and "track record" of the bying firms tends to conflict with the committee report on finances. That report stated that due to "a lack of pertinent information regarding the financial well-being of the applicants, particularly Suburban, and to a lesser degree, UA-Columbia, an investigation into this crucial area was somewhat hampered."

Yet, under finances in the compilation of the committee's report, there is a clear comparison of abstract information which discloses estimated capital requirements over a five year period as follows:

Suburban, \$937,000; UA-Columbia, \$2,345,982. Estimated Annual Revenues, Suburban, \$2,185,000; UA-Columbia \$3,830,216. Average Revenues per Subscriber per Year, Suburban, \$103; UA-Columbia, \$121. Number of Homes Passed at fifth year, Suburban, 10,000; UA-Columbia, 6,353. Percentage of Subscribers at fifth year, Suburban, 42.5; UA-Columbia, 52. Performance Bond Offered, Suburban, \$25,000; UA-Columbia, \$100,000. Source of Funds, Suburban, Toronto Dominion Bank; UA-Columbia, Internal Cash Flow. Intermediate-term bank financing and long-term institutional financing.

In view of the foregoing, it would appear the financially stronger firm was by-passed and a much smaller bond was offered by the company which got the award. Committee member Pica's objections to giving the franchise to Suburban on the reported grounds they failed to promptly install cable systems in other municipalities and requested rate hikes in several communities were ignored. Most importantly of all, the trade union slogan "Buy American" was also ignored. We wonder why?

It was like a breath of refreshing air to observe our good mayor, Michael Marotti, stood alone in withholding his vote to bring in the Canadian financed TV cable company, just like to fresh and clear air on Sunday when his civic association held its third annual picnic at the Old Cider Mill Grove in Union.

From the "Lemmings" show in which Belushi acted as MC for the "Woodshuck Festival of Love and Death," he recalled the "Weather Report" and his spastic "Joe Cocker" imitation. Belushi noted in a perplexed vein that the real Joe Cocker would be on the second show (Sept. 25) of the new season.

The twenty seven year old Belushi explained that he got his job on "Saturday Night Live" when he walked into the studio with his own bathrobe and proceeded into his "Samurai Warrior" bit. While placing his hair in an elastic band into an oriental ponytail Belushi revealed the character originally came to him while viewing a channel 13 Japanese film festival.

Belushi took questions from the audience, then launched into his final bit of improvisation, "Captain Kirk" of "Star Trek" upon notification of being canceled. It was obvious that the comical ingenuity of John Belushi will never be canceled.

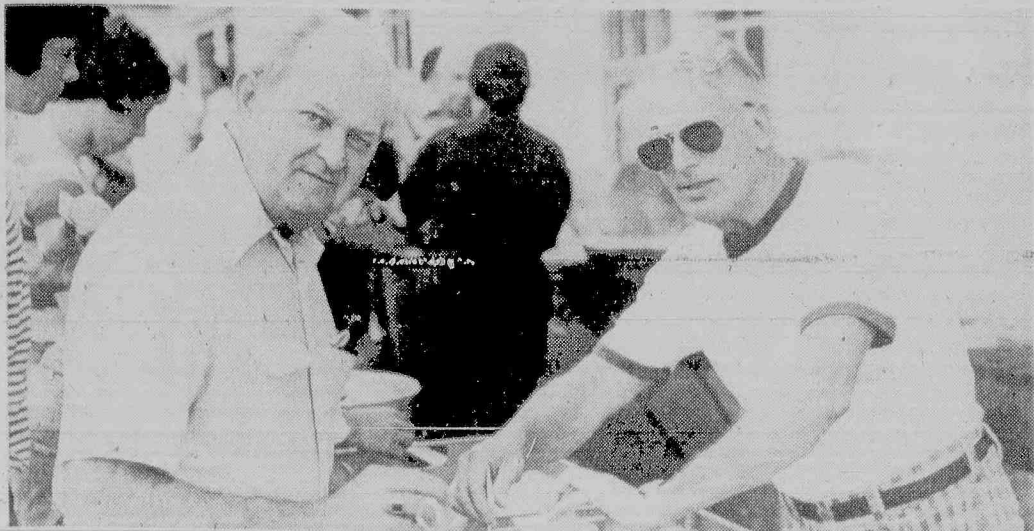

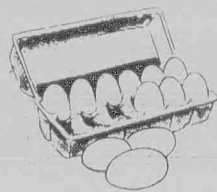
The Belleville office will be open until 9 p.m. on September 30, and October 1 and 4 for those wishing to register or transfer for the coming general election.
