Frank Mozeika (5-11, 195) will start at offensive fullback and do double duty as a defensive linebacker. The offensive side is new to the BHS senior but coach Testa said Mozeika beat out the rest of the competition for the spot. Chris Cervasio (5-10, 195) will be another 48 minute man on the team serving as an offensive tailback and a safety on D. Testa said Cervasio "did a very good job against Columbia" and is starting to run like a tailback

Testa cites the steady performance of Rocco Balsamo (5-8, 185) as a reason for his assignments. The senior is another double duty player who will be in the action as an offensive guard and a defensive linebacker. Senior Bernie DalCortivo (5-11, 195) will join Balsamo in the offensive guard position.

A slimmed down Ralph Amiano (6-4, 245) will stay on the field the entire game as an offensive and defensive tackle. The senior tackle is the

Offensive end Greg Grasso (6 foot, 190) will join Speer as an offensive, end and Cervasio as a defensive

Testa called senior Scott Ochse (6-1, 190) "a real defensive veteran" who will start as a defensive end. The Bellboy senior is recovering from an injury but will start Monday. George D'Alessandro (5-9, 230) missed action last year but the senior will see plenty of it now as a defensive tackle. Frank Constantino (5-9, 185) has made good progress at his middle guard position according to Testa.

Robert Racioppi at cornerback rounds out the defense. the 5-9, 165 pound junior is the second underclassman to make the starting team.

The Bellboys have seven players who will play both O and D. The average weight of the starting offensive line is 208 pounds. The defensive four weigh-in on the average of 218 gridder pounds.

The offense will be run from primarily a multiple-I formation, as Testa calls it. The Blue-Gold coach said the formation allows flexibility and can be used to overload the backfield to one side or allow the possibility of more receivers going downfield.

The coach said the defensive formation will depend on the tendeacies of opponents but will basically be what Testa calls an odd defense with a man keyed on the center.

The coaches of the Bellboys have scouted the Livingston squad but Testa said since this will be the first Bellboy versus Lancers contest he isn't sure how coach Allen Jacobson will handle his gridders against BHS.

Coach Jacobson isn't sure either. His scouts were at the Belleville-Columbia scrimmage and brought back glowing reports on the Blue-Gold size and ability. "Our scouts were most impressed," Jacobson said. The Livingston leader said there isn't one Bellboy his team will ignore. He said all of his scouts liked everything they saw the Bellboys do against Columbia. "They're all tough, hard-nosed kids," Jacobson

The Lancers were 10-1 last year, so no matter how impressed the opponents are they will probably show up Monday and provide a tough opening game for Belleville. The offensive Livingston line averages 192 pounds and the defenders average Jacobson is most impressed with the size of the Belleville gridders. #### Carl Orechio Critical of Wiley Nomination

Assemblyman Carl A. Orechio of Nutley added his opposition to the growing number of legislators criticizing Governor Byrne for his nomination of Senator Wiley to the New Jersey Supreme Court.

"I'm appalled at the Governor's blatant attempt to pay off the Senator for his help in developing and passing the onerous T&E law and more recently the unwanted and unneeded new income tax. I am sure many of our legislators and taxpayers were as misled as I was in interpreting what the Governor meant when he said he was going to give us 'Government Under Glass.' 

"How can any intelligent person believe that Judge' Wiley's colleagues on the bench will not be influenced in matters coming before the Supreme Court concerning T&E or our new income tax, even though 'Judge' Wiley abstains from any decisionmaking relative to the two subject matters.


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


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

# Saletta will seek emergency funding

By CHUCK JACKSON

Public Safety Commissioner Rocco Saletta will introduce a resolution next Tuesday asking for an emergency appropriation in order to meet police contract demands.

Saletta told Times/News this week, "There is no sense in putting off the PBA. I am going to introduce a resolution at the next Commission meeting seeking emergency funding."

That resolution, if approved by at least three other Commissioners, could end the threat of contempt of court citations against the Board and Town Treasurer Francis McCoy. The Commissioners are scheduled to appear before Superior Court Judge Sherwin D. Lester to show cause why they should not be held in contempt for not implementing the contract. Town Attorney John Scott will represent the officials.

The Board members were presented with the show cause order at the September 14 meeting of the Commission. A copy of the order was also mailed to McCoy by certified mail. The Town Treasurer was on vacation at the time the orders were issued.

Saletta's decision to seek emergency funding to meet the pay requirements of the contract may halt the legal proceedings instituted by the PBA. The town has been under a court order since July, and a re-affirmation of that same order was issued August 6 by Superior Court Judge Irwin Kimmelman. Since

the recent retirement of Kimmelman, Judge Lester has taken charge of the

The Public Safety Director's decision to seek the emergency appropriation is a reversal of an earlier position. Saletta has stated publicly in the past he would not look for special funding to meet the contract requirements.

It was hoped by town officials the money could be obtained through budget transfers later this year. That hope, however, appeared to fade when financial projections indicated the other governmental departments would not

have sufficient monies to contribute.

Saletta indicated his decision to seek

emergency funds came after his fellow Commissioners vaccillated on their promise to provide funds.

# Testa will leave at season's end

Tom Testa has resigned his position as head coach of the Belleville High School varsity football team effective at the end of the season. The Bellboy leader informed the Board of Education of his plans in a September 13 letter and the Schoolers have accepted his resignation.

The coach told the Times/News he is

leaving the position for "personal and professional reasons." Testa cited the pressures of his teaching and athletic responsibilities as factors considered in making his decision. "I've always said athletics and academics are compatible but if one has got to go it better not be academics," Testa said.

The surprise resignation comes after the high school coach was reappointed to the varsity job by the Schoolers last spring. "I'm at a loss as to why the resignation was turned in now," School Board president Matthew Pica said. The Board leader added there has been "no pressure whatever brought on by the Board of Education" for Testa's resignation since his reappointment. There haven't even been any conversations about the matter,

Testa affirmed Pica's appraisal of the situation. "Since last year there's been no pressure at all," the coach said. It was during the summer Testa made the decfision after discussing it with his wife. "This was our volition and nobody

### Escott back on force

Belleville PBA president William Escott will go back to work tonight after a five day suspension from the force.

The Local 28 leader was taken off the work roster, without pay, by Public Safety Director Rocco Saletta, following comments Escott made at the September 14 meeting of the Town Commission.

Escott said this week he would appeal that suspension, but declined any further comment. He would not reveal what form that appeal will take. PBA attorney Lawrence Whipple will represent Escott in the matter, it was learned.

The punishment handed down by the Commissioner was the maximum Escott could receive without a Civil Service hearing. The PBA president objected to the severity of the punishment, saying, "I feel the duration of the suspension far exceeded the act. I don't think my action at the meeting deserved the penalty I received."

Saletta suspended the six-year veteran of the force after he angrily shouted, "If you were half a man I'd take you out on Washington Avenue and break your as-

The Public Safety Director later characterized the act as typical of "poor leadership in the PBA."
"I just feel," Saletta continued, "if

"I just feel," Saletta continued, "if these are the types of individuals who are going to run the PBA, and I am not just speaking of Escott, there is a lack of good leadership. Relations will not get back to normal as long as they have the same leadership. If the leadership changes, then perhaps they and the elected officials will be able to deal on a good basis."

Escott responded to Saletta's comments, saying, "Perhaps with a change of the Commissioner of <u>Public</u> Safety, the Public Safety Department would get back to where it is supposed to be.

"The Public Safety Director wants to

surround himself with advisors that consist of a tavern owner and a pizza man. I am proud to be surrounded by the fine police officers and leaders who surround me."

Escott questioned Saletta's reasoning

Escott questioned Saletta's reasoning in suspending him, and referred to an incident earlier this year, saying, "I was out of line for using the word "ass," and suspended for five days for it, then what should his punishment be for telling the people of the Town of Belleville to take his job and stuff it up their asses"



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## Commission wrong

In April an arbitrator handed down a decision concerning Police Department wages. The Town Commission and Police Department members agreed to binding arbitration. The arbitrator rendered a decision for 1976 and 1977 — covering a two year period.

The Town Commission took exception to the two year term, accepting binding arbitration for 1976. This act, of itself, put the Town Commission on notice that members of the Police Department were to be paid a higher wage for 1976 amounting to approximately \$80,000 in additional pay. To keep down the Town budget, no provision was made in the 1976 budget for wage increases to the Police Department. Despite the arbitrator's decision, the Town Commission did nothing about raising the funds to pay the cops the increase to which they were en-

their own hands and issuing traffic tickets to local citizens in order to put the heat on the Town Commission, the responsible members of the PBA took the legal course, went to the courts and received a favorable decision. The court directed the Town Commission to pay the salary increase to the cops for the year 1976.

Still nothing was done. Public Safety Director Rocco Saletta introduce an emergency resolution in order to comply with the directive of the arbitrator and the courts. Well, Mr. Saletta marked time while our restrained Police Department

members waited in vain. At last Tuesday's Commission meeting, the local PBA President served a notice on all members of the Commission, citing them for contempt of court.

A fiery exchange ensued between Police Commissioner Rocco Saletta and Belleville PBA President William Escott. Both men made some uncomplimentary comments about each other. Was the PBA President goaded into losing his temper? We think

Four months is a long time to be strung along with a load of bull and promises from politicians who never intended to keep faith. Mr. Saletta was not penalized for statements he made about Mr. Escott but PBA President Escott, who already is finding it hard to meet the financial burdens of heavy taxes and raising a family, was suspended for five days without pay.

Minutes after the Tuesday Instead of taking things into night outburst, PBA President Escott returned to the Commission Chamber and publically apologized for his behavior. The people of Belleville are still waiting for Mr. Saletta to apologize to the police for not performing in accordance with the laws he was sworn to uphold.

The PBA is absolutely right. The police should have received a pay raise in May and the Town Commission has been derelict in its duty for not abiding by an arhad the prime responsibility to bitrator's binding arbitration and a court order.



## Legal troubles at Town Hall

The Belleville Board of Adjustment hired an attorney without providing for payment. As a result, the attorney, Ronald H. Shaltian, sued the Town for his fees, \$1,339.99.

Well, do you know what haptained a judgment against the Town of Belleville by default! Town Attorney John R. Scott failed to defend the town. On December 22 Municipal Treasurer Francis McCoy requested Town Attorney Scott "to immediately file an order to Show Cause and Vacate Judgment and Stay of Execution and to locate any Judge to immediately grant the above."

Scott's reply? "Pay the bill." We don't know what Mr. Scott's explanation is for his failure to defend the Town in this legal matter. ## More legal problems

Again we have a problem with a difference of opinion between Town Attorney John R. Scott and Municipal Treasurer Francis H. McCoy.

It seems that Mr. McCoy is determined to protect our taxpayers and our public officials from intentionally violating the law. Purchases were made from the New Jersey Pipe Foundry Company/U.S. Pipe Foundry Company in 1974 and 1975.

One purchase order was in the amount of \$2,953.20. Since a purchase above \$2,000.00 requires public bidding, Mr. Mc-Coy believed the purchase was made in violation of the law.

Additionally, there were purchases made in one year and charged to appropriations of another year. Mr. McCoy is so concerned over the legality of these transactions that Essex County Prosecutor Loseph Lordi and State Director of Local

Government Services Joseph F. Laezza have been requested to determine if laws have not been

The Town does employ certified public accountants whose duties include the very items that Mr. McCoy refuses to approve and he comments as follows: "I am not going to subject the Governing body or myself to any violation of State Statutes which would be deemed a misdemeanor."

A misdemeanor is a criminal act — and we just wonder how sensitive our public officials are to the need to obey the laws of the state — even at Town Hall in Belleville, N.J.

#### Golden Comments

A few eyebrows were raised and questions asked, even among the planners, about the propriety of accepting a "gentlemen's agreement" to provide adequate parking facilities for a local establishment undergoing expansion.

Since gentlemen's agreements are seldom written contracts and have no specific terms as far as the duration of the agreement goes, they are subject to defeasance. That is a legal term meaning they may be rendered null and void. Likewise, the hypothetical question may be pondered as to what would happen if the present owner, entering into the agreement, were to sell his property.

Under the terms of such a sale, unless a restrictive covenant or proviso were included in the conveyance of the deed to the new owner, the new owner could ban the use of the property for parking use by the catering firm. Such a condition could discourage any sale of the

In the event of such a happening, just where would that place the town, the people in the surrounding area and the owners of the restaurant? The attorney for the catering firm noted no objectors to the parking proposal were present at the variance hearing. What he didn't tell was the big question; were any notices sent out to alert the surrounding residents of the area that the matter was coming up for review at the variance hearing? If not, how could they be there to object? Seems like an unusually strange manner of resolving the matter.

In Belleville, even the choice of which cable television company would be awarded a franchise provokes a controversy. The report of the committee chaired by George Riepe, which recommended Suburban Cable, said in the original report the opinion was unanimous. However, School Trustees who were members of the committee, Michael Chieffo and Matthew Pica, pointed out their preference for UA-Columbia and insisted the report be amended to read "the majority opinion.

Though both companies are recognized, established firms, providing satisfactory service with similar rates for that service, a cursory review of the financial structure and record" of the bying firms tends to conflict with the committee report on finances. That report stated that due to "a lack of pertinent information regarding the financial well-being of the applicants, particularly Suburban, and to a lesser degree. UA-Columbia, an investigation into this crucial area was somewhat hampered."

Yet, under finances in the compilation of the committee's report, there is a clear comparison of abstract information which discloses estimated capital requirements over a five year

period as follows:

Suburban, \$937,000; UA-Columbia, \$2,345,982. Estimated Annual Revenues, Suburban, \$2,185,000; UA-Columbia\$3,830,216. Average Revenues per Subscriber per Year, Suburban, \$103; UA-Columbia, \$121. Number of Homes Passed at fifth year, Suburban, 10,000; UA-Columbia, 6,353. Percentage of Subscribers at fifth year, Suburban, 425; UA-Columbia, 52. Performance Bond Offered, Suburban, \$25,000; UA-Columbia, \$100,000. Source of Funds. Columbia, \$100,000. Source of Funds, Suburban, Toronto Dominion Bank; UA-Columbia, Internal Cash Flow, Intermediateterm bank financing and long-term institutional

In view of the foregoing, it would appear the financially stronger firm was by-passed and a much smaller bond was offered by the company which got the award. Committee member Pica's objections to giving the franchise to Suburban on the reported grounds they failed to promptly install cable systems in other municipalities and requested rate hikes in several communities were ignored. Most importantly of all, the trade unioon slogan "Buy American" was also ignored. We wonder why?

It was like a breath of refreshing air to observe our good mayor. Michael Marotti, stood alone in withholding his vote to bring in the Canadian fianaced TV cable company, just like to fresh and clear air on Sunday when his civic association held its third annual picnic at the Old Cider Mill Grove in Union.

#### Is fire department political?

I am a Correction Officer with the State of New Jersey, assigned to the State Prison at Rahway. On August 24, I was injured in the line of duty and taken by ambulance for admission to Rahway Hospital. After two days my doctors thought it in my best interest to be transfered to Clara Maass Hospital where I would receive the care of Belleville based orthepedic specialists.

My wife telephoned the Belleville Fire Department to ask for an ambulance and arrange my transfer. She spoke personally with Chief Sbarra who, instead of giving her the courtesy one would expect from a man of the chief's position, became extremely rude and told her in no uncertain terms he would not grant this service.

I then telephoned the department after being refused a conference with the chief, was connected with a captain. I explained the situation to the captain and he too refused my request.

I explained to him I have been a resident of Belleville for 21 years. I had never in the past asked for the town's services and also, I had done three and one half years of volunteer service with Belleville's Auxiliary Police Department. The Captain's reaction to this was hanging up on me! Consequently, I received no service from the town of Belleville. My town of Belleville.

My humiliation made me think. A short time ago I was discharged from

the Auxiliary Police over an incident involving Commissioner Rocco Saletta's Civic Organization and the Belleville PBA, a union of which I am a member. I supported my brother officers. On the pretense my expression was a disgrace to the Auxiliary organization, I was discharged, humiliated and degredated. I was made a fool. I was made a scapegoat for politics.

I thought perhaps my denial of aid by the fire department was the way in which Belleville's Town Fathers repay its citizens - citizens who give their time and effort to help the town in which they live. Not only has the town of Belleville made a fool of me twice, but they continue to haggle with the police department.

The political situation in this town disgusts me! My wife and I both have been insulted by the Fire Department's actions. But I do not condemn the hard working firefighters who risk their lives performing a job that few men can do. Rather, I am angered and saddened by the actions of the individuals in the upper circles of the Department of Public

I will not be made fool of again. I wish only to advise the citizens of this town to beware of the unexpected. This country was founded by citizens who stood up and said what they felt. I am proud to be such a person.

## Belushi: a really fine one-man show

'Not Ready For Prime Time Player' John Belushi treated students at Montclair State College to insights into the theater in general and specifically relating to 'Saturday Night Live.! When asked if the show was performed 'stoned,' Belushi quipped, 'we write the show stoned.'

Belushi opened the show with handstands across the stage, then the traditional 'Saturday Night Live' fall. In a strange mood Belushi asked "How many from New Jersey?" to the rousing cheers of the audience. It wasn't long before everyone in the audience warmed up to the sometimes ribald, definitely funny style of Belushi.
