Funding for the tri-town Community Mental Health Service was assured Saturday when elected officials of Bel-Wille, Bloomfield, and Nutley agreed to finance the center for 1977

Board to seek new bids following loser complaint

New bid proposals for a fruck and trash compactor will be sought by the town following a special hearing at Town Hall on Monday.

The Commissioners reversed an earlier decision awarding the contract to Mack Truck of Hillside after one of the bidders protested the action. Following a closed executive session, Commissioner Mary Senatore, who had sought the truck, made a motion to rescind the bid award and another motion rejecting all other bids and requesting new bids at the December 14 meeting of the Commis-

This week's hearing came after George Post of the Industrial Truck Body Corporation protested granting of the bid to Mack, the highest bidder. According to Post, the published bid violated New Jersey law in that it listed specifications which could only be met by one manufacturer. He also objected to the fact that the bid was granted because immediate delivery was the reason for giving the contract to Mack, but that requirement was not specified in the published legal notice.

The challenged notice read, in part "One 1976 Mack six-wheel truck, Model RD 600S or equal with Heil 25-yard garbage compactor body or equal ... Availability and delivery of the complete

vehicle, fully equipped, shall be a factor in the award of the bid.

According to state law, the municipality may set certain minimum standards necessary for the award of a bid, but any specifications which are overly restrictive are outlawed.

Questioned by the Commissioners on

the matter, Town Attorney John Scott said, "If the specifications indicate a par ticular product, the bid and any award would be illegal.

The Town Attorney would not comment on the specific reason for the Com-mission's move, and Mrs. Senatore also Please see "Most" on page 2.

Football equipment stolen in burglaries

Officials have not yet determined the amount of football equipment stolen in a break-in at Belleville Municipal Stadium Sunday night

Belleville High School Athletic Director, Jim Silvestri said footballs, kicking tees, and football jerseys were among the items missing from an equipment room as a result of a second burglary within two weeks. "I'm working together with the town and the police to see if we can limit the accessibility of the building,

The AD added the break-ins were unfair to the many students who were participating in the football program at the

Varsity football coach Tom Testa es-

timated 15 to 18 footballs were stolen in the two thefts. Footballs have been costing the school about \$35 dollars each and the coach called the losses costly to the taxpayers as well as bad for team morale

Belleville Deputy Police Chief Frank Haight said property damage was also involved in the break-in that was discovered on Monday morning. The police will be working with the school "to try to take more stringent precautionary measures in the future," the Chief added.

Belleville detective Martin McNish and Barton Rossi have been assigned the case and will be working in conjunction with the high school to find the football



Cable representatives meet with Trustees

Representatives of the Suburban Cablevision Company met with the Board of Education this week to discuss the kind of service the school system may expect when installation is complete.

Sal LaMarca, program director for the company and Dennis Evans, manager of engineering services, attended this week's meeting at the request of Trustee president Matthew Pica. He asked the men to speak with the Board in order to obtain details on what Suburban would do for the schools.

According to LaMarca, the company will provide on a loan basis portable videotape machines for the high school and will also train students in the use of the equipment. He said the training "could be done in 10 minutes," and added the picture quality would be "excel-

Several Board members asked if the company would provide free service to each of the town's schools, but engineering manager Evans indicated the schools would have to pay. Installation, however, would be free.

Evans also said the company is now before the Public Utilities Commission, its regulating body, seeking permission to charge schools on an hourly basis rather than on the flat monthly charge. He added it was "likely the PUC will approve

All sporting events will not be covered by the company, La Marca said, but those that were not could be covered by students with portable cameras, and public access time could be used to air the

The Suburban representatives also revealed there would be no "X-rated" films shown by the company. Both men said it was "against franchise policy" to show such films. There will be "R-rated" films, however, but these will be shown after 9 p.m.



Senior notes

Beginning January 1, beneficiaries of Social Security will be able to earn \$3,000 per year in wages without loss of benefits. That's an increase of \$240 over the current level. This is good news for some of the elderly who work either full or part time.

Now for the bad news. Also beginning January 1, a person who goes to the hospital under Medicare will be responsible for the first \$124 of his or her bill. The deductible at present is \$104. Patients will also have to pay \$31 a day for the 60 through the 90 day of a hospital stay, up from the present \$26 a day.

In the recent election, in which turnout was supposed to have been light because of voter apathy, it was revealed that 47 percent of those eligible voted. There has never been apathy among the aged, and this time was no exception

Of those over 55 years of age and eligible to vote, 65 percent turned out to cast their ballots. The difference between the two levels is the "senior power," which the organized senior citizens movement is trying to make work for the benefit of all Americans.

The Belleville Senior Citizens Club program committee reports a good turnout last Tuesday for a showing of the television program, "A Man's Dream." This hourlong showing was presented by the Bell Telephone Company. The meeting followed.



Fire safety suggestions

Every day at least 2,200 homes and apartment buildings are destroyed by fire in the United

rifying, claimed 6,500 lives during 1975. Frequently the victims were young children who were alone when the fire started. Some 3,500 youngsters through age 15 perished from fire last year and many hundreds of victims are still recovering from serious, often disfiguring in-

The tragedy of these statistics, the New Jersey State Council points out, is that the suffering and waste of lives and property could have been avoided if these families had kept and had an emergency home escape

Here are suggestions prepared by the Safety Council and the National Fire Protection Association on how to plan for a quick exit in a fire

Carefully figure out at least two routes to the outside from every room in the house, especially bedrooms. Allow for blocking of stairways and halls by fire.

Make it a rule to close bedroom doors at night. These closed doors will hold back flame and smoke, allowing vital extra time for escape.

For escape from upper floors plan to use porch and garage roofs, ladders, or trees as ways down to safety. Be sure exit windows work easily so that even a child can open them - and see that windows are low and large enough to climb through.

And who, we ask, more richly deserves such a high honor than Congressman Rodino? His appointment would bring dignity, acumen, prestige and respect to the judicial system of the United

A brief analysis of the election results shows Carter's chief strength came from a "solid South" Democratic vote for the first time in years, a heavy black vote both in the South and the big cities and the strong support of organized labor, which liked Carter' choice of Mondate as his running mate. The next vice president has long been a friend of labor and his strength helped bring Carter victory, since labor support aided Carter in key states like New York, Pennsylvania and Minnesota, Mon-

The Republican's greatest appeal was found in groups consisting of suburbanites, whitecollar workers, the well-educated and those of means. In New Jersey, the GOP made clear it is still a viable party by carrying the state for

While Carter was hurt by dissention in the Democratic ranks in New Jersey, caused by dislike for the income tax, Governor Byrne, probably did more to harm Carter's chances by associating with him than anything else.

President Ford gave a good account of himself and must be well respected for restoring integrity and trust in the office of President after the sad Nixon disgrace. In fact, Ford might have won, had he not pardoned Nixon. Nonetheless, he won't starve — he'll get a yearly pension of \$100,000. He should get by on

Patriots' park guide not available

A new report on the current status of Patriot's Path, a linear greenbelt park along the Whippany River, has been published by the New Jersey Conservation Foundation and the Friends of the Patriot's Path.

The comprehensive report is a useful guide to those interested in the 27-milelong park which NJCF helped initiate and which it serves as professional consultant in coordinating the work of the six Morris County municipalities in-

The 10-page booklet details the topography of the river, outlines the history of the Path and its planning and growth over the past decade and describes the needs it can serve. NJCF, in conjunction with the Morris County Park Commission and Morristown Rotary Club, first proposed the park concept in 1966 as a means of protecting the river corridor from further encroachment, improving water

quality, preserving open space for ational purpose alternate transportation route

The Path, about a quarter of which has thus far been opened, will link a wealth of parks and historical sites in Morristown, Mendham borough and the townships of Hanover, East Hanover Mendham and Morris.


The report shows the exact location of the Path in each town, specifying parcels of land which have been acquired and those which are still in negotiation. It lists the locations of sections of the park now open for hiking or bicycling and the length of each.

It also includes a 22-inch map of the entire park, prepared by Judy Keith of Morristown, which indicates completed and proposed sections of the Path and shows side trails, park and recreation areas along the route and natural. historical and educational points of in-

terest in the area. The communities involved in planning and developing the Path have received matching grants from federal, state and private agencies totaling nearly \$1.2 million for the project. A citizens' organization, called the Friends of Patriots' Path, was formed in 1972 to assist in promoting the park and implementing plans for its develop-

Approximately 50 percent of the land needed for the Path is now in public ownership. NJCF serves as land acquisition agent for Morristown's section of the Path.

Blue-Gold whips hapless Kardinals

The Bellboy offense finally got hot on the cold Kearny gridiron Saturday as they burned the Kardinals, 7-30, for the second Belleville victory of the year.

The seven Blue-Gold touchdowns more than doubled the offensive tally for the first seven game of the season. The Bellboys produced the offensive push. powered by the running performances of Joe Gelpi, Chris Cervasio, and Frank Mozeika. The triumphant trio scored all seven Belleville touchdowns and combined for 333 of 362 Blue-Gold ground

"I was quite impressed with Frank Mozeika's running and Joe Gelpi's," Belleville coach Tom Testa said. "Even though he was not one hundred percent (because of an injury) Cervasio did a good job," the coach added.

Both the Kardinal and Bellboy defensive squads were loose enough Saturday to allow 77 points scored but coach Testa said he was pleased with the Kearny kick blocked by Ralph Amiano for the Bel-Iboys. Testa noted Amiano's blocked kick forced the Kardinals into attempting two point conversions for the remainder of the contest without success.

While Belleville managed the second victory of the season, coach Testa wasn't completely happy about the way the contest was handled by the refs at Kearny. Two Belleville players were ejected from the match by the refs and the Belleville leader blamed it on lack of self-discipline and the rivalry involved in the cross-river game. The ejections weren't so hard to take for Testa as some calls however. One that dismayed the Believille coaches was a pass received by a Kardinal and a first down denied to the Bellboys

The completed pass looked very incomplete to the Belleville bench and the first down attempt looked successful to the same viewers. "The officials were atrocious,' Testa said. He also complained some Kardinals were "spearing" some Belleville players with their helmets without getting called for a penalty by the

Overall, Testa said he was very pleased with the offense generated by the Bellboys at Kearny and thanked the underclassmen who "made us work during the week" in preparation for the second

Belleville won the toss, and received to begin Saturday's offensive festival. It only took a little more than two minutes for the Bellboys to drive 79 yards for the first score of the day. The march to paydirt was aided by two penalties on the Kardinals, a 32 yard gain by Gelpi, a 15 yard run by Nicosia, and Cervasio's 17 yard scamper into the end zone. The Blue-Gold took the lead 7-0 with a successful extra-point kick by Bob Racioppi.

Borja named MVP by Big 10 coaches

Senior Bellboy Hernan Borja has been named Most Valuable Player by the Big Ten soccer coaches for the 1976 season. The Belleville forward booted 15 goals to lead the Blue-Gold team in scoring and finish fourth in the league.

Coach Tony Cahill cited his star forward's all-around ability as Borja's strong point in compiling MVP votes. Not only did Borja lead the team in goals, he also made eight assists. In addition, Bellboy Borja was high man on the team with 78 throw-ins, 97 free kicks, and 19 corner kicks.

Borja was also credited with one save for the year during one of his stints at a defensive spot and Cahill called him Belleville's "most all-around player and obviously the most skilled." The MVP honor for the Bellboy was coupled with Borja being named to the first team named by the coaches for the Big Ten conference

Two Belleville juniors on the second year booter squad were also picked for the second and third all-conference teams. Bobby Freda, a junior halfback was picked for the second team in the Big Ten conference and junior forward, Joe Coscarelli was named to the third allconference squad.

Cahill called Freda and Borja the two most valuable Belleville booters. "I can't say one was more valuable than the other," the Blue-Gold coach said. Freda, halfback, was a defensive star for the Bellboys throughout the season. Coscarelli made six goals and two assists for the season.

The season was the second varsity effort for the BHS team and the booters improved from 2-14-1 to 5-11. While the record increased in the win column, Cahill said the most disappointing aspect considering the number of seniors on the team. Nine of the upperclassmen started on the first Belleville soccer team as sophomores and 15 seniors will be lost to the team at graduation.

The process of seeing his veterans become better soccer players by improving their skills in three years was one of the most gratifying experiences of the season, Cahill said. However with so many graduating the coach anticipates the team will need a lot of help from the fullbacks and halfbacks in filling in the

Mike Licamelli was the third leading scorer for the Blue-Gold in '76. The junior Bellboy booted two goals and one assist even though he was injured off and on throughout the season and missed the last six games of the year. His potential for next season "will be a lot greater than it was this year" Cahill said.

Injuries: they're cyclical

Members of the Bellboy coaching staff apply a little psychological medicine to some of the injured gridders during the season by telling the sidelined players they are on the "turkey shelf."

The comment is used to help spur the Bellboys back to the field without nursing their wounds too long and means the footballer won't be used again until the Thanksgiving game

Conditioning before the season is stressed to help keep the ball players off the "turkey shelf" because once the real hitting and bruising begins the injuries can go beyond wisecracks to fractures and sprains. Then the hurt can become too real especially for seniors.


It has been reported one million high school football players sustain injuries during the fall season and as many as 20-0,000 miss a week of playing due to physical mishaps. The most serious pain caused on the gridiron in recent years has been inflicted on the knee. About 40,000 knee operations resulting from high school field injuries are expected to take

Bill "Doc" Ellis has been a trainer with the Belleville varsity for 28 years and he agrees the knee is the most susceptible spot. "The knee is so vulnerable, there's no way to prevent it from being injured," Ellis said

The veteran trainer pointed out most teams will disguise a player's ailing knee by taping both knees before a game. Sometimes opponents will take advantage of a player's weakness. "If they know a player is hurt, the natural thing is to go for the injured leg," Ellis said. Thus Belleville protects both knees as most

The Bellboys have incurred an unusual amount of hand hurts this year, according to Ellis. The most prominent sore hand, belonging to Joe Gelpi, whose quarterback talents were lost for a few games due to a "bone bruise" in his right
