Parking, tardiness Belleville actress gets 'big break' are big problems

"Parking and tardiness are two problems facing BHS administrators this year," states George Nucera, assistant to the principal.

Students must park their cars in the assigned parking lot near the tennis courts of the school. Becuase there are only a limited number of spaces, students tend to park in teachers' spots and in other places where they are not permitted to be.

At the moment, the only disciplinary action being given students is a verbal warning. In the future, however, further action may be taken

Mr. Nucera explained how, by law, he could call the police when students park illegally. Since students have their parents' cars, this would cause problems for the

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parents. Also, if a student owns his Lynn own car, this may cause an increase

in his insurance. Mr. Nucera comments, "There is an increase in the defacing of walls and fixtures in the school. I only wish students would have more pride in their school and their community."

When a student is late more than three times, a letter is sent home to. the parents. If students are still late, then the student is suspended until the parent comes in for a conference. Finally, home suspension may be given. Here, a student is at home for three to five days and has work provided for him. According to Mr. Nucera, "When a student comes in late, this immediately goes on his record and effects his grade. So, in the future, when he goes for a job, this record will be used as a basis for employment evaluation."

Necessary steps are being done to remedy both the parking and tar-diness problems, and Mr. Nucera said he feels if the students would only cooperate a little bit more, these problems could be solved in the high school



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McCoy 'negligent,' **Trustee charges**

School Board member James Risoli this week called Francis McCoy, Town Treasurer and Custodian of School Funds "negligent" and asked that he be

The charge came after a review of an auditor's report, which indicated a full audit was impossible due to lack of information on the payroll account. McCoy would supply that information.

The Town Treasurer was unavailable for comment before the Times/News went to press.

The blast against McCoy was initiated by Board member Richard Mahmarian, who singled out the passage allegedly critical of the Custodian of School Funds.

"Mr. McCoy has not reconciled the payroll account to the Board or the auditor, and I would like to know why Mr. McCoy has not fulfilled his obligation.

Risoli immediately followed Mahmarian's comments, calling McCoy "negligent," and later adding, "I believe we received this report late due to our Custodian, and I recommend the Board fire McCov

State proposal could be burden

As many as 2,000 patients presently confined to mental health hospitals could be released under a state proposal next year and returned to the communities where they previously resided for outpatient care.

The concept is called "de-institutionalizing" the state mental health hospitals which, as presently operated, are so overcrowded that proper treatment cannot be given and accreditation has been lost.

Unless New Jersey can get its mental health hospitals at Marlboro, Trenton and Greystone accredited, the state will lose millions in federal health care funds.

Bay Rabinowitz, a Nutley resident who is the president of Atlantic Chemical Corp, a former Essex Freeholder and a leader in public health programs for decades, is presently the chairman of the Essex County Mental Health Board. The agency is a small one, appointed by the Board of Freeholders and operating with only two persons on the payroll - but an agency nonetheless which coordinates more than \$1 million in funds for mental health services throughout Essex County.

Rabinowitz addressed last month's Community Services Council luncheon in Nutley to explain the possible effects of those changes now taking place in Trenton and Washington.

Belleville, for example, would be forced to provide out-patient mental

health care for, those deinstitutionalized persons from the state hospitals, ac-cording to Rabinowitz. ""We're talking now about people who no longer have any family or other ties with these local and geographical only because they happened to once live here," Rabinowitz



Carmen Orechio, say they're confident that once Belleville and Bloomfield understand the overall problem, those neighboring towns will jump on the bandwagon to support and increase the programs presently offered at the North Essex unit.

Belleville recently precipitated tritown discussions on the future support for the Community Mental Health Services when it voted to discontinue funding of the unit. Mayor Michael Marotti subsequently pledged the town would contribute to the 1977 budget and appoint representatives to a Belleville, Bloomfield and Nutley task force to study the merits of future participation.

During discussions at the last tritown meeting, Belleville Public Affairs Commissioner Vincent Strumolo and Bloomfield Mayor John Kinder were especially concerned the Mental Health facility had gone beyond its original charge child guidance.Commissioner Strumolo noted some of the clinic's programs were duplicated by the county and Mayor Kinder favored limiting the center's responsibilities to children's mental health.

However, should the three towns decide to end funding after 1977, the area would have no formal unit to handle out-patient care if the state hospitals are de-institutionalized.

Mrs. Ruth Cowell, Director of the Community Mental Health Services, said there is no way of knowing how many patients would come under Belleville's care, if de-institutionalization was ac-

treated as close to home as possible," Mrs. Cowell said. However the each of the three towns to establish Community Mental Health Services their own individual out-patient has not yet been told "anything specific in this regard." So far the state has not indicated what each town's responsibilty to the outpatients would be.

But the deinstitutionalizing of the hospitals is only part of the problem. Another critical area results from the court-mandated "bill of rights" for state hospital patients. "It's now difficult to find doctors willing to sign committment papers becasue no doctor wants to go through the ordeal of proving beyond the shadow of a doubt that his best professional judgment dictates that the patient should be hospitalized," Rabinowitz told the Nutley Community Services luncheon.

The result is that patients who in the past would have been committed are now left to make the best of it in their home communities, again increasing the need for greater outpatient mental health care services.

New Jersey will eventually release \$2.7 million in aid to local communities. The funds are called "community care dollars'' and are designed to enable towns to cope with the coming problem of providing out-patient care for those persons being released by the hospitals."

Needless to say, the state and federal government have an endless list of guidelines which an outpatient mental health clinic must meet to qualify for those community aid dollars. Rabinowitz, meanwhile, has another problem complicating the local scene. A new federal program mandating New Jersey upgrade its mental health services has resulted in the state's being zoned into "health service areas," and while Hudson County comprises a single unit, Essex for some reason has been zoned with Sussex, Warren, Union and Morris Counties. "That type of madness as emerges from Trenton is enough to turn off even the most enthusiastic health propoent," Rabinowitz says.

Rabinowitz is hoping Trenton will change its mind and make Essex a single unit as well. Under the Morris-Sussex-Warren* Essex-Union County plan, Rabinowitz says the local area would be severely penalized "because a block of money will be allocated from Washington for a region. If Essex had to share its monies with a rural area, it's obvious the bulk of the funds would go to those places without a hospital to begin with. 

Ruth Cowell shows grave rubbings

Early American gravestone rubbings by Mrs. Ruth O. Cowell, executive director of the Community Mental Health Services for Belleville, Bloomfield and Nutley, are presently on display in the Little Gallery of the Montclair Art Museum as a feature of the Bicentennial Year.

The exhibit will close at 3 p.m. this Sunday with a demonstration and slide talk by Mrs. Cowell in which she will show the techniques of rubbing and present "The History of Symbolic Meaning of American Gravestone Art.'

The rubbings are of the carved designs on the early gravestones. Christian symbols used signified such ideas as the fleeting nature of time, the certainty of death, the promise of life after death and the joys of eternal life. Another group of stones showed, among other images, the station or the occupation in life of the deceased person.

Since the rich imagery ceased to be used by stone carvers after 1800, this wealth of early American gravestone art will become in time a part of our lost heritage.

Persons interested in seeing the early American gravestone rubbings is invited to visit the museum. Admission is free for the demonstration and slide show on Sunday afternoon.

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



Mental health clinic

Since 1958 Nutley, Belleville and Bloomfield established the Tri-Town Community Health Clinic. The clinic is subsidized by state contributions. Annually each town budgets a nominal sum to cover its participation. This year both Belleville and Bloomfield were having reservations about their on-going participation in the program.

Were Belleville and Bloomfield to abandon its support of the clinic, that withdrawal would end the project - one that has proven its value and its need.

Fortunately for the unfortunate people who are served by the program, Belleville and Bloomfield officials have recon-

sidered their position and decided to continue in the future as in the past.

The clinic provides a full range of services including psycho-therapy, consultation education, a theraputic nursery, a child abuse counseling service, and a theraputic day camp.

We applaud the decision of the Belleville and Bloomfield officials, but the public should note that without the prodding of Nutley officials, the project would have been abandoned.

Binding arbitration

Some public officians are opposing legislation that requires binding arbitration covering police and firemen labor negotiations.

We believe the best interests of taxpayers and all public employees are served when. strike conditions are eliminated from labor negotiations.

Without binding arbitration labor negotiations with public employees is a one-sided deal after a bit of negotiations public officials can tell public employees — and sometimes they do - take it or leave it. This is unfair and the condition must be remedied.

Labor negotiations presuppose equality of parties. In the case of public employees and

public officials there is no such equality.

We believe binding arbitration should extend to every public employee. Most public employees are prohibited by law or can be prohibited by a court order - from using the strike weapon as an economic measure. Certainly, if a public employee cannot resort to a strike to press a point, those employees should have a right to a final determination and resolution of a difference. That result only can be achieved by binding arbitration.

Golden Comments By James R. Golden

A few weeks back, this columnist was ex-pressing concern over the local School Board's plans of how they proposed to fund the substantial increases in the salaries and wages given the employees of the system. Mention was made that the school officials told the residents they still have a \$600,000 appeal of the 1976-77 budget, which was reduced by that amount by the Board of Commissioners. The Commis-sioners told the Trustees to use "full funding" State school aid

Since that time, the State Legislature, by special legislation designed to distribute the proceeds of the income tax, has opened the flood gates to the school districts afound the state to find ways to spend around \$107 million in new found school funds before the school year's end. All of the money coming to the local school districts, the state Department of Education, and of course, the leaders of the teachers lobby, NJEA, will tell them how much they'l get. Any of this money not spent would go to property tax relief next year


Many local School Board Trustees, mindful of the plight of the taxpayers, say they will convert any increases in state aid directly to property tax relief. It is the opinion of this columnist that is the path the Belleville Board members properly should take. Likewise, we remind them tht the election of a few of them comes up early next year and the anxious homeowners, who greatly outnumber the teachers, will be watching to see whose interests they will protect. Perhaps if they ignore the needs iof the homeowners, it will sufficiently arouse them to get out a heavy, concerted tax-apyer's School Board vote and "drive the ascals out.'

At the recent teachers' convention, NJEA president Judith M. Owens, in a speech made the plaint, "The tyranny of the press has become an increasing threat in these times. We've all read the attacks on public schools and public school teachers. It has become fashionable to demean you and downgrade your work. The newspapers are quick to blame the teachers for every school problem imaginable and most of society's ills."

No, Mrs. Ownes, it is not the tyranny of the press you need fear. It is the refreshing new freedom of intelligent, fact-finding, objective, fair-minded bodies of young reporters, such as Robert J. Braun, Star-Ledger Education Editor, who are shattering the fallacious myuth of ethereal, sacrosanct deification of education especially in the realm of public school categories.

They have exploded the theory of pedagogues and preceptors pretention of ohief concern for their students and unveiled their selfish, avaricious striving for more money with less work and fancy, unnecessary trimmings. They have uncovered a potent labor lobby gain ing unmerited concessions through the obso quious docility of too many members of our legislature, in quest of support for giving them all they ask for. They have exposed the vacil lating, wishy-washy craven policy stand of the State Commssioner Education, hesitant to do anything that would anger the NJEA, which wants, seemingly, to run the whole education 'show

These fine reporters have presented the true other side of the coin - the seamy side. They bring to light that, despite enormous increases in the cost of education, the quality of educa-tion has grown less and less, now having reached its nadir. Students passed on in the stereotyped gristmill of education have entered college unable to read or write. Indeed, a pious fraud and rip-off of the taxpayers' money is being poured into the cornucopia for higher educator's salaries.


The Tax Convention will be held Saturday, December 4 at 10 a.m. in Plainfield High School, 950 Park Avenue, Plainfield.
