

## School Board Accepts Commission Invitation To Share Building

Although the Board of Education lost its fight to get an additional wing in the new Public Health Building, educators have agreed to take the entire second floor for its administrative offices.

Commissioner Vincent T. Strumolo and his Department of Health relocated to the 383 Washington Avenue building last Monday but it may take more than six months for the School Board and its staff to move. Educators sought, in addition to the upstairs space, an additional wing in the building for special education classes. Commissioner Michael Marotti denied that request but invited them to use the second floor facilities.

"We received a letter from the Commissioner about two weeks ago inviting us to use the space," reported Board President Leonard Back. "We responded favorably. It's a healthy sign for the Town of Belleville to see the two boards cooperate and we hope the joint effort will work to the long term interests of the citizens here."

Final details of the sharing of the building are not yet worked out but Back sent a letter yesterday to Commissioner Marotti requesting a meeting. According to Back, he believes the Commission shouldn't charge the School Board rent because "it's all taxpayers money and would only be taking from one pocket and putting it in another."

The two board attorneys will have to work out the details on how utility and supply expenses will be paid," added Back.

Belleville architect Michael Troita, who is based at 147 Joralemon Street, has already submitted a layout of the upstairs space. The main problem seems to be that presently the upstairs is on an expansive room while the floor plans call for partitions.

## Public Hearing Scheduled

## Education Budget Gets Air Tonight In School No. 8

School officials will introduce the tentative 1972-73 budget for an airing tonight, 8 p.m., in the School No. 8 auditorium. Previous to the public hearing will be a short regular meeting of the Board of Education.

The current tentative budget, termed "tight but workable" by officials, calls for a total tax package of \$5,157,886, which is a \$238,116 or 4.8 per cent increase over last year. The Board of Education introduced the tentative budget in a close 3-2 vote at a recent meeting.

Expected to turn out at the public hearing is 75 to 100 residents, a very small percentage considering well over 3,000 persons vote regularly in board meetings. Last year between 80 to 90 persons were present during the public hearing. But school officials, on the whole, do not seem discouraged by the lack of interest.

"We have already set up several meetings with several Home and School and Parent-Teacher groups in Town," remarked Super-

tendent of Schools Anthony Greco. "This is where we get across our ideas in the budget." The format for tonight's public hearing will be almost the same as last year with Board President Leonard Back introducing the package and Board members issuing their own statements. Also fielding questions from those residents attending will be Board secretary Mrs. Mary Shadler and Board attorney Max Schwartz.

Against the year the School Board has decided to bypass any elaborate booklet or slide display program, as is the practice in neighboring Nutley, due to economic reasons. Line item copies of the budget will be made available at the door.

Teacher negotiations are still taking place but all involved in the delicate talks have an official "no comment" on the progress of a new contract. Teacher salary allotment is a regular line item in the current budget and should a settlement be reached that is higher than the amount called for in the

budget, speculation is that the additional funds needed will be taken away from other line items, such as textbooks, supplies, etc.

To date, the Public Employees Relations Commission, PERC, has not yet been asked to enter the negotiations, according to superintendent Greco.

"All I can say is that we are in the midst of negotiations," he said.

Greco attributes the increase in the budget to mainly press release announced for 438 employees, additional staff (three new teachers at the high school and two new educators at the junior high).

## Six Narcos See Top Jury Action

Six Belleville residents and a Newark man have been sent to the Essex County Grand Jury on narcotics charges stemming from county-wide drug raids December 16. Three have not been found as yet.

The raids culminated efforts by Belleville police and the Essex County Sheriffs since September. Arraigned in Municipal Court Thursday were Lyman Bingham, 29, of 43 Skyler Street, Louis Fiorello, 23, of 55 Carpenter Street, and John Sweeder, 23, of 26 Seamore Drive. They have been charged with possession and distribution of heroin.

Missing from the hearing were Charlene Trimarco, John Biniewicz, and Norman Clayton, all charged by Belleville detective Thomas Rodden with distributing drugs. A "Wildcat", or open warrant has been issued on each.

The Newark man, 22-year-old Vincent Molino, is presently serving time in Bordenstown Penitentiary, and was found guilty by Belleville Judge Edward Abramson of unlawful use of a motor vehicle and given a 60-day sentence to run concurrently with the present term. He is also up on two charges of distribution of heroin, driving without a license and having a delinquent inspection sticker.

and an increase in transportation costs. Also, he cited increases in insurance, athletics, heat and utilities, supplies and textbooks.

Local taxes makes up about 80.4 per cent of the funding of the budget while state aid comes to 14.7 per cent. Tuition is 14.7 with the balance 1.8 and miscellaneous items 2 per cent.

The tentative budget will go up an estimated 10 tax points, figured upon Town Treasurer Francis McCoy's calculations. Each tax point represents \$23,000. The increase in taxes on a home in Belleville assessed at \$15,000

would be \$15; a home with a \$20,000 assessment would realize a \$20 increase and a \$25,000 assessment can see a \$25 per year increase in taxes to pay for the school budget.

According to Greco, the cost per pupil in Belleville, based upon the Commissioner's 19th Annual Report for 1969-70 shows \$774.21 here. This includes cost of transportation and tuition. Bloomfield has a \$845.16 per pupil cost, while Nutley, which pays much less for transportation than Belleville, lists a \$751.91 cost.

Enrollment figures here as of December 30, 1971 shows 6,071. Last June the total was 5,862, reflecting a 208 increase.

Education made a significant effort to compile a tight budget. As a result, the higher taxes currently being paid this year by home owners are due primarily to the increase in county and local taxes

rather than for the school system. In other words, the Board of Education succeeded in keeping the tax increase relatively modest and it is expected that again this year any increased taxes for the schools will be on a modest scale.

"That is not to say that everything needed for the Belleville schools is in the budget. There are always ways that money can be spent to improve our schools. But we can expect that a change in the State's tax system will enable our schools to better fulfill its needs under a taxation system that is more fair than the one we have which today falls largely on the shoulders of the home owner," he said.

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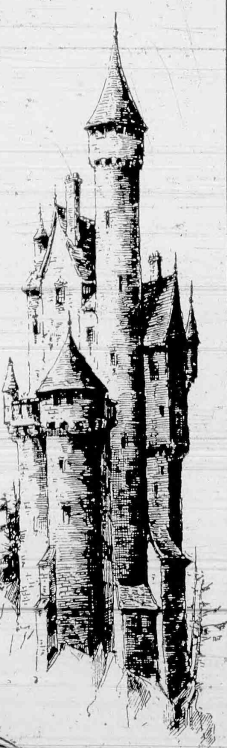
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## The Wallace Bid

One of the fascinating political answers which will come out of the Florida primary in mid-March is whether George Wallace still commands the support of ten per cent of the Democratic electorate.

Assuming Wallace enters the primary, which everyone else has entered, he'll be up against middle-road Democrats like Senator Henry Jackson, liberals like Senator Edmund Muskie, others close to extremist positions and outright radicals.

All these Democratic candidates agree the 1972 Wallace vote is an unknown. Perhaps some are right, that the Alabama

Governor's voter appeal is down from its 1968 level—when Wallace netted ten per cent of the votes (and for a time during the campaign was supported by fifteen per cent).

George Wallace thus far has been the most enduring third-party candidate in recent American political history. It may even be true that he prevented Hubert Humphrey from being elected in 1968, as he claims (by drawing away enough Democratic votes in pivotal states as New Jersey, Missouri and Ohio). Wallace currently claims greater popular support at this time of year than he enjoyed in 1968.

## Half-Time Shows Viewed

Now that the 1971 football season is done, it's appropriate to have a look at the half-time shows, with an eye toward possible improvements in the years to come.

The average half-time extravaganza features bands, majorettes and, perhaps, a few speeches or presentations, concerning which fans could care less. If the music is good, and the field drill well done, fans enjoy this part of the show. But by the end

of the season, they've seen it ten or more times. Interest has begun to sag, even if the baton-twirlers and twisters are now throwing their thing higher than ever.

One would not suggest doing away with bands and majorettes. But a little more variety and imagination and less repetition at half-time would be welcome, both by television audiences and fans in the stands.

## The Germans

For more than twenty-five years West Germany and her allies among the western democracies have hoped that, someday, somehow, East Germany would be reunited with West Germany. Toward this end the great majority of nations of the world have refused to recognize East Germany; indeed Bonn broke relations with any country that did—until recently.

Now it appears that once West and East Germany ratify the Berlin agreement, East Germany will be recognized by a growing number of states and both Germanys admitted to the United Nations, perhaps in the current year. In other words, West Germans have at last swallowed very bitter pills.

Once the two Germanys are widely recognized diplomatically and both admitted to the U.N., the present-day boundaries of Europe, dividing Germany, will be finalized. Chancellor Willy Brandt has already

agreed to this, though he has been taken to task by some Germans for accepting the transfer of so much former German land to Poland, which critics feel cannot be morally or historically justified.

The test for Europe will be whether the two Germanys can exist and prosper peacefully in the coming decades, whether they will be content to remain separate, speaking the same language and sharing the same culture and much of the same history. Certainly this prospect is a questionable one, to say the least.

But Brandt and the East and the West are now to try it. Just as Korea and Vietnam are divided, so too Germany is to remain divided. If one could peek into the future, perhaps a hundred years, one suspects German people would somehow have united again. But the chance is very remote at this juncture in history.

## Seems Only Yesterday

### Ex-High School Gridder Tackles Big Lottery Prize

#### One Year Ago

A former Belleville High School football star tackled the \$50,000 top prize in the January 14 New Jersey State Lottery. The lucky winner was Gerald P. Piserchia, a barber in Nutley who was residing in Clifton. The 1963 BHS graduate had played varsity center on the Belbo's grid squad and ironically enough, his uniform number was 38—the first two digits of his winning ticket.

The Belleville teacher's union requested state mediation in its salary negotiations with the school board, and instituted a job action which sent teachers home a half-hour earlier than normal. Chief negotiator for the teachers, George Nucera, said the action was begun because "we've reached an impasse over salary." Nucera, a guidance counselor at the senior high, warned taxpayers that budget figures released by the Board were "deceptive, in that an increase of up to \$150,000 may occur in the instructor account." Nucera criticized the board's philosophy toward teacher salaries, which he claimed was based "on attrition and train teachers, but not to keep them in the system."

#### Five Years Ago

Belleville's first baby of 1967 was James Joseph Walsh, born on January 3, 1967 at 4:14 p.m., weighing 8 pounds and 13 ounces, with blonde hair and blue eyes. James was the son of Mr. and Mrs. James Walsh, formerly of Pennsylvania. Walsh was an installer with New Jersey Bell Telephone and Mrs. Walsh was a registered nurse at Clara Maass Memorial Hospital.

Two important issues were to be voted on by the people of Belleville. The first would decide whether Belleville's form of government should be retained or changed to the Commission form. Another very important issue was the election of members to the Board of Education. John Di Rienzo was seeking re-election on the basis that the board's image was very good. Mrs. Helen Rudder shared his views on the image projected by the board. Mrs. Anthony Izzo proclaimed that she was seeking election to the board in order to help pass the budget, while Caesar Romano and Michael Albertine wanted to minimize animosity among board members in order to draw attention to the problems affecting the school system.

#### Ten Years Ago

Mayor Isadore Padula, director of Revenue and Finance, said that he was calling a special meeting "to suggest to the commissioners an appeal" of a \$5,000 and \$7,500 assessed valuation of Washington Avenue property levied by the Essex County Board of Taxation upon property owned by the wife of Commissioner Robert Grubin. The Board was expected to vote unanimously for the appeal. The property had been purchased for \$9,000 and the tax assessment had amounted to \$7,350.

For the graduating class of 1961, loss of the Middle States Accreditation on December 31, 1961, was a serious matter. Dr. Frank M. Durkee, superintendent of schools, said: "To help the students in their efforts to gain admission to colleges, the administration is taking certain definite

measures." Durkee explained that students would be given letters from the Commission pointing out that they had attended an accredited school for three years and that the school system was attempting to gain back its accreditation. Students were being encouraged to take standardized tests in order to more adequately meet questions pertaining to their aptitude.

#### Fifteen Years Ago

"This is the goal I've wanted to reach all my life," said Mrs. Pauline Yankowski, of 117 Brighton Avenue, when asked why she had become one of Belleville's five lady traffic officers. "In that way, it's almost a family tradition, you see, my father was a fireman, and I even wear his uniform." Mrs. Yankowski could be regularly seen directing traffic at Saint Anthony's Parochial School. She indicated that she hoped to go further up in the ranks of the department. "Right now, I watch all the detective programs I can on television. I especially go for 'Dragnet' and 'Highway Patrol'."

Director of Parks and Public Property Elmer S. Hyde revealed that he had contacted the Essex County Park Commission to point out to that group the serious effect that loss of park and recreation areas along the Passaic River would have on Belleville. According to scheduled plans, a major portion of the county park land along the river would be lost when the construction of the new Route 21 expressway was started. Hyde suggested that a proportionate share of the funds realized in the sale of the Belleville land be allocated as a replacement measure for the land that would be lost.

#### Twenty-Five Years Ago

In a surprise announcement, Herbert C. Schmutz, president of the Board of Education, declared he would not be a candidate for re-election for the presidency of the board. All members of the board expressed surprise but there were no comments made about Schmutz's decision. Speculation immediately began concerning the problem of Schmutz's successor. Schmutz had declared that he was stepping down from his position due to the advice of his physician.

Plans for an experimental long-range revised mathematics curriculum were approved by members of the Board of Education upon the recommendation of Hugh D. Kittle, principal of the high school, and superintendent of schools Parmer. The program, which had been devised by John Heffernan, head of the mathematics department, was to feature the addition of advanced algebra, general mathematics, and consumer mathematics.

#### Forty Years Ago

The Rev. Joseph M. Kelly, rector for ten years of Saint Bernard's R.C. Church in Plainfield, was selected to succeed the Rev. Edwin J. Field as rector of Saint Peter's Church. Father Kelly had once served as a curate at Saint Peter's from 1907 to 1909. Father Kelly was officially assigned to his new parish duties by Bishop Thomas Walsh.

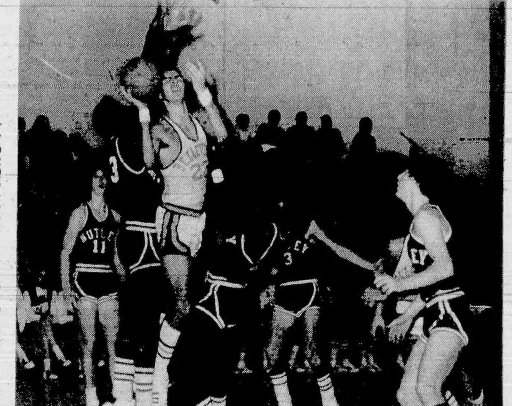

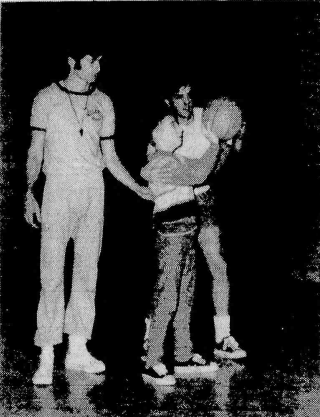


SURROUNDED by Maroon Raider defenders is Bellboy cager Ken Zoppa, who manages to get off shot. Zoppa, a stand-

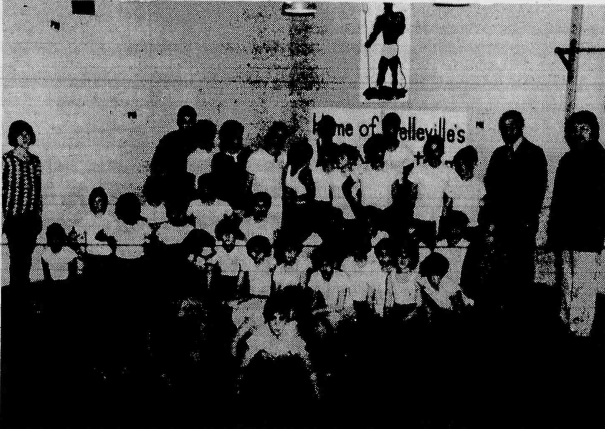

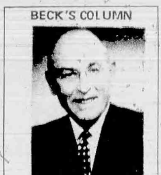

## Jobless Workers In State To Get Extended Benefits

Jobless workers in New Jersey whose employment benefits have been exhausted may be eligible for up to 13 weeks of extended benefits starting February 1, the New Jersey Department of Labor and Industry announced.

Peter Allen, Special Assistant to Commissioner Ronald M. Heymann, said that this new extension gives New Jersey workers a maximum total of 52 weeks of benefits. The basic 26 weeks unemployment benefits program, he noted, is funded from employer-employee contributions. Last summer the regular unemployment benefits program was extended for 13 weeks and funded by the State and Federal governments. This new extension is completely funded by the Federal government. New claims will be accepted through June, 1972.

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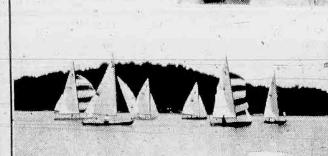


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## Area Banker Serves As Dimes Treasurer

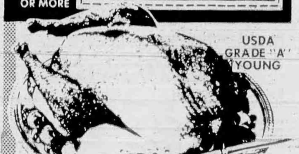

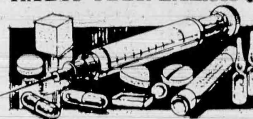

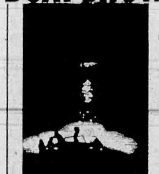
