

## Mysterious Paste-Like Substance Clogging Main Street Sewer Line

Officials in the Department of Public Works are investigating into the origin of a thick, gooey, paste-like blue substance clogging Belleville sewer lines on Main Street. The resulting back-up is inconveniencing several homes here.

The problem was discovered Monday morning when the mysterious substance appeared in sewer lines on Main Street between Bayard and Williams Street. A sewer

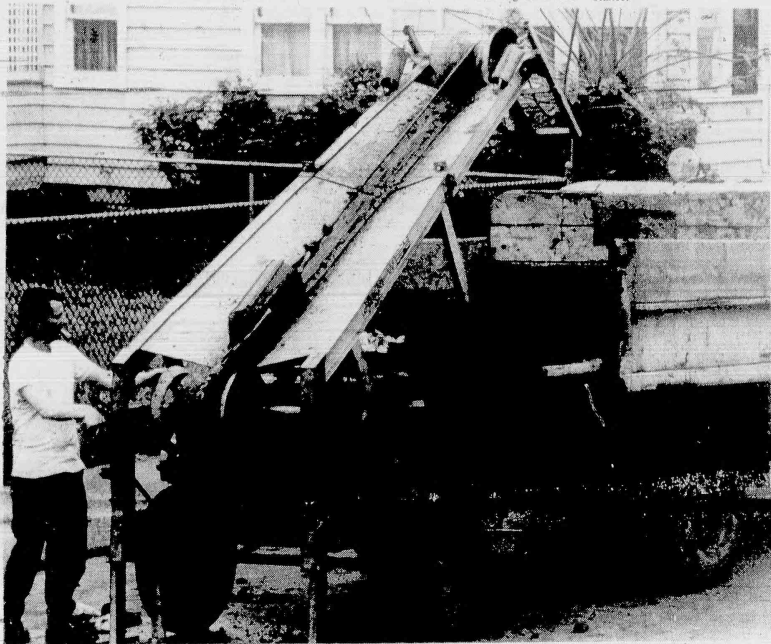
bucket machine was immediately dispatched to the area to clean the pipes but officials now say it may take upwards of a week to clean out the mess. The blue mire, according to administrative clerk James Soldo, is backing up a 12-inch main sewer line on Main Street. The sewer bucket machine is operating only a few hundred feet away from the Passaic Valley Sewage Commission treatment plant.

"We are bringing a sample of the substance to the Passaic Valley Sewage Commission for analysis to determine its origin," reported Soldo. "We have an idea that it is being discharged from one of the factories in the River Road area but we can't make any accusations until we are sure."

The sewer bucket machine is one of the newer pieces of equipment in Public Works. Breaking down into

two parts, the machine is drawing up in buckets the tar-like substance now clogging the sanitary sewer line.

Soldo indicated that the substance may be coming from the Van Dyke Chemical plant, only a short block away from the clogged line, but he didn't want to directly accuse the company until a complete analysis is run on the strange substance.

## School Board, Administrators Settle

### Two-Year Contract Signed

The Board of Education adopted a two-year agreement with the Association of Belleville School Administrators Monday night at a special meeting.

School administrators here settled for basically the same contract package that Belleville teachers obtained last week. Terms of the two-year pact give administrators the right to negotiate for salaries next year but fringe benefits cover a two-year span. The contract with the School Board affects 22 administrators here, including the assistant superintendent of schools, principals, vice principals, directors and supervisors.

Administrators reached an agreement with the School Board in January but it wasn't until Monday that the contract was finalized. The agreement calls for about a 5.6 per cent pay increase, according to Superintendent of Schools Anthony Greco,

## New Ordinance

## Pay Ambulance Service Proposed

An ordinance which would assess a \$20 fee for ambulance service in Belleville will come before the Commission Tuesday night for final reading and a public hearing. According to Commissioner Laterza, the bill would help rather than hurt taxpayers here.

Laterza, director of Public Safety, claims there is a gross misunderstanding among townspeople interpreting the ordinance. He reports that only persons who are covered in their hospitalization plan will be billed for ambulance charges. Those with no hospitalization will not have to pay for the service.

"I have researched the number of ambulance cases here and 95 per cent of the time those requiring the service are covered under their hospitalization plan," Laterza claims.

If the new measure becomes law, Laterza reports that the Town could realize an additional \$15,000 in revenue which could be funneled back to the ambulance squad. Under Laterza's plan, the Town ambulance, run by the fire department, would usually rush the person in need to the hospital but then squad members would take their insurance company name and hospitalization number and bill them for the charge. The Commissioner added that forms would be made up so all that would be required from residents using the service would be their signature.

Last year the Town ambulance answered over 2,000 calls and according to Laterza, if only half of them had insurance to cover the service, that would bring substantial funds to the Town.

"People with hospitalization are already paying for this coverage," added the Commissioner. "We are only

utilizing something which the people already have paid for."

Laterza also states that there will be no charge to residents who are not covered for ambulance use under their hospitalization plan. The same rules apply to out-towners.

Currently, the Town has two ambulances but only one is in dependable operation.

One ambulance was purchased about five years ago but an earlier model, over 10 years old, is in the garage for repair more than on the road. The fire department runs the squad but only firemen with special training are allowed to operate the vehicles.

Hopefully, enough funds could be gained to purchase a third ambulance in the near future.

## Four Netted

## More Gambling Arrests Here

Four residents were arrested here last week on gambling charges in conjunction with a tri-county raid by the Organized Crime Strike Force in Newark. The Belleville arrests netted over \$40,000 in betting receipts.

In three Belleville gambling raids, local detectives worked with members of the Essex County Prosecutor's Office, Police Chief Joseph Smith said that the Strike

Force raids, which netted 22 arrests at 24 locations in Union, Essex and Bergen Counties, were initiated after information received by Belleville police.

Arrested in Belleville was a Wallace and Tieren employee, a husband and wife team and a Columbus Avenue resident. All four persons were charged with gambling or gambling related complaints. Municipal Court hearings have been set June 15.

Belleville detective Barton Rossi arrested a 48-year-old resident about noon last Thursday in the Wallace and Tieren Co. The employee there has been charged with bookmaking, possession of gambling paraphernalia and conspiracy. He was released on \$1,500 bail.

A husband and wife duo was also sought last week in their apartment on Belleville Avenue. Detectives, after securing a warrant, entered the premises and arrested a 40-year-old man. Also in the home, police confiscated

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





## Grand Jury Receives Hot Camera Charges

Charges against Horace Richard Dorey, 41, of 96 Lighth Street, charged with larceny and receiving stolen property in connection with 80 cameras valued at \$4,000, were referred to the Essex County grand jury May 10 by Judge Carl Steen.

Dorey pleaded not guilty and was placed on \$5,000 bail after a complaint was filed by Joseph Stivala of the New Jersey Waterfront Commission.

He was arrested last month by members of the Newark City-County Strike Force on Organized Crime. The cameras were believed to be a part of a shipment of 2,120 cameras valued at \$128,000 which came into Newark from Japan in March. The consignee, W. 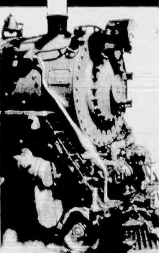

The BHS golfing contingent have now won eight straight matches.

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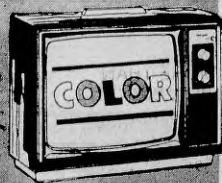
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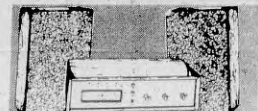

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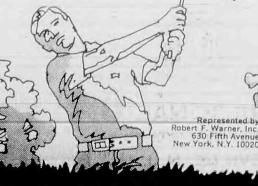

## Ebronix Open House To Mark Anniversary

Ebronix Learning Center, 500 Franklin Avenue, is holding open house for the community on May 19, 20 and 21 to celebrate its first anniversary. Charles Houston, Director of the Center, invited parents, students and educators to visit the Center to see its facilities and equipment and meet the staff. Open house hours are: Friday, May 19, 4-8 p.m.; Saturday, May 20, 11 a.m.-4 p.m.; and Monday, May 22, 4-8 p.m.

The Center works with students in grades 1-12 and adults to improve the basic skills of reading, math and spelling. Mr. Houston described their approach to helping children learn as combining intensive individual tutoring at home, programmed learning, teaching machines and incentive systems to spur success, which is rapid, usually a grade level in 2-3 months. The programs are supplemental to school and the students' progress is coordinated with his teacher and school.

Each student coming to the center is tested to determine his achievement level, learning needs and learning potential. A program is designed for him based on these test results, with the goal being improvement to grade level or beyond. Other

goals are to help the student develop a real interest in learning and to have confidence in his own ability.

"The Center employs a number of approaches to reading, as needed by the student," Mr. Houston stated, "and we have just added the Phonovisual method to help children master phonics quickly. Lipincott and Dolch are among the basic reading series used." He continued, "We maintain a large library of graded materials, including the complete SRA series, so that a student can always find something interesting to read at his grade level. For math, we use the Ebronix Math Program or Houghton Mifflin's Modern School Mathematics, supplemented by the student's own textbook."

In addition to Charles and Doris Houston, owners of the center, the staff consists of Miss Stefanie Kotsaert who has an MA in Elementary and Art Education plus several years' teaching experience, and Edward J. DeLong who has an MA in Speech Arts and teaching experience. Gerard Veglia of Westfield serves as Learning Disabilities Specialist consultant. Tutoring is done by a large staff of tutors, usually college students, who are carefully screened, tested and trained.

"College students have the enthusiasm and patience to relate to our students and to establish the rapport so necessary for the student to succeed," Mr. Houston said.

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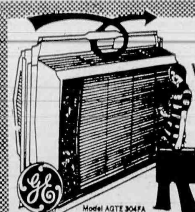

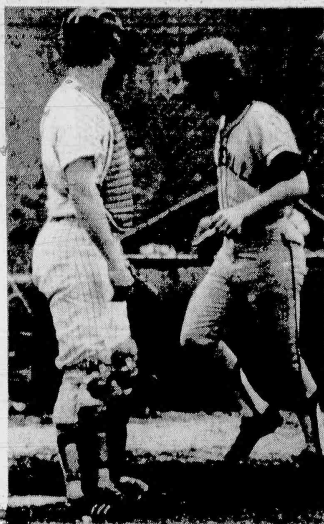
The Bellboys host Orange tomorrow afternoon but the squad is pointing to a tough encounter when Irvington, ranked third in the state, invades Tuesday.

Belleville remains in third place in the Big Ten Conference and it looks as if the local club can finish no higher. Both Bloomfield and Irvington are among the top five in state rankings.

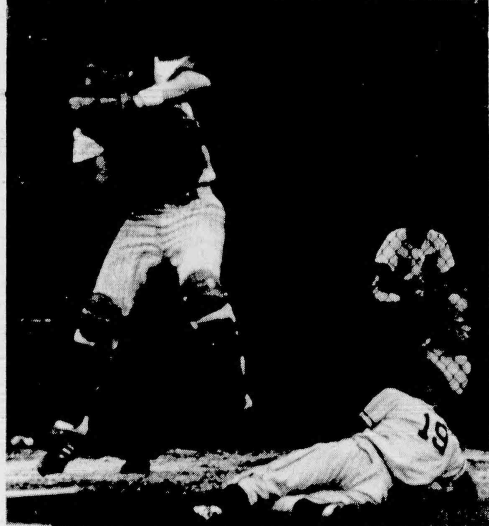

# Parkway Officials Say Exact Change Reduces Toll Operation Costs

## Do seat belts really work?

Well, if you judge by fatal accidents on the Garden State Parkway in the past Winter, the evidence is all in favor of their use by motor vehicle operators and passengers.

Every one of the nine persons killed in or thrown from cars on the Parkway in the December-through-March period was not wearing a seat belt. It's possible that several of them might have avoided such tragic consequences if they had heeded a pre-winter appeal by Chairman John P. Gallagher of the New Jersey Highway Authority, operator of the Parkway.

As winter approached, Chairman Gallagher urged motorists to use seat belts and tread-tough tires, noting that while seat belts and adequate tires were important to safety year-round, they were particularly so under the treacherous conditions normally associated with cold weather. His plea was part of a special safety campaign, in which toll collectors handed out leaflets calling attention to the need for extra precautions against the dangers of wintertime driving.

Neither snow nor ice was a factor in any of the fatal mishaps on the Parkway since then, but the statistics strongly indicate that lack of protection afforded by seat belts appears to have been a tragic element.

Seats belts were available in all but one of the cars involved. In that one, four persons without seat belts were

ejected from the vehicle in the crash. Three were hurt badly and one, the driver, was killed.

Two other car operators thrown from their vehicles were killed. In all, six drivers and three passengers were the victims of fatal accidents during the cold-weather period.

Can New Jersey's Garden State Parkway motoring public be persuaded to have the exact change when they reach the toll plaza?

Ronald S. Fecso, a senior mathematics major at Rider College, thinks that Parkway officials should stage a drive to encourage more toll road drivers to bring exact change.

An increase of only four percent of motorists with the exact change would enable Parkway officials to increase the number of exact change lanes from two to three.

This would, according to Fecso, benefit both the Parkway and the motorist since operation costs would be reduced and waiting time in

the service lanes would be reduced also.

Fecso reached his conclusions during an independent study project at Rider College this semester in which he used the computer to simulate arrivals and servicing at a toll plaza on a Parkway which has five service lanes.

The object of the study was to find the number of lanes which would be used as exact change lanes in order to make the waiting time the shortest.

Fecso determined that the number of exact change lanes to be used in order to minimize waiting time is dependent on the percent-

age of vehicles arriving with exact change.

Furthermore, he found that 75 percent of the arrival having exact change is the crucial factor in determining the uses of service lanes.

When the exact change percentage is more than 75, waiting time is minimized

with three exact change lanes, but when the exact change lane percentage is less than or equal to 75, waiting time is minimized with only two exact change lanes.

Cost of operating the toll plaza could be decreased with an increase in the number of exact change lanes.
